• Lori Mayhew, Pres. New Westminster & District Labour Council

- O Holds a Bachelor of Commerce from UBC, lives in North Delta with her husband Keith and their children Sarah, Adam, and Grace. A member of MoveUP (Movement of United Professionals) for over 20 years, her first elected position in the union was as an executive councillor from ICBC in 1993. She is also sits on the executive council of the BC Federation of Labour and the executive board of the Working Opportunities Fund, and has been the president of the New West & District Labour Council since 2007.
- Patty Hajdu, Fed. Minister of Employment, Workplace Development & Labour
 - Elected MP of Thunder Bay-Superior North in 2015 (resident since the 80's), previously served as Minister of Status of Women from November 2015 until January 2017. Worked mainly in the field of harm prevention, homelessness, and drug addiction. Prior to politics she was head of the city's largest homeless shelter. She is an advocate for a more inclusive country that benefits everyone

and that everyone has a fair shot at success. She was born in 1966 a few months after New Westminster & District Labour Council was established.

Irene Lanzinger, BC Federation of Labour President:

 Irene is the first woman to be elected as President of the BCFED (2014), prior to that she served as secretary treasurer (2010-2014). Prior to BCFED she was a secondary science and math teacher in Abbotsford (started in 1978) where she became active in the BC Teachers Federation as a chief negotiator (2000) then VP (2002) and Pres (2007).

- At the initial 1966 NWDLC meeting Tommy Douglas told members that political decisions would be paramount to labour movement; 51 years his words still ring true, serving still as our guideposts.
 - Whether it's ensuring safety for workers, giving workers a long overdue raise by increasing minimum wage, or bringing back the Human Rights Commission dismantled by our predecessors...
 - You can trust that your government is fighting for families on real issues like affordability, good paying jobs and improved public services, and an economy that works for everyone.
- The theme of this year's picnic in inclusiveness, with a focus on new immigrants that are contributing to our BC economy and communities
 - o I too came to Canada as a young, spirited immigrant worker, that worked on a farm and mill;
 - I worked my way up-and-out of the fields and production lines, but committed my life's work to fighting for those still in them.
- Many forget what Labour Day is about and think it's about the picnic or a day off of school/work
 - o It's to recognize the social achievements and progress of the working class citizen
 - Back in 1872 when Labour Day was first declared, unions were still illegal, activists jailed.
 - But they continued to advocate for human, worker and equal rights to be recognized and fair working conditions and pay, as well as better worker health and safety standards.
- Labour Day was founded on these principles and despite the progress of the labour movement, the advances made for the working men and women and the successes we celebrate on Labour Day, the role of the union remains as relevant today as it was in the 1870s
 - Providing certainty of safe and fair working conditions in the workplace
 - Ensuring vulnerable workers are safeguarded
 - Making certain equality and diversity are valued
 - o And enforcement, as well as swift actions and consequences are applied when necessary
- There is a bold contrast in governments; after 16 years it's time for change, it's what we the BC
 NDP committed to and what we've been called upon to provide for workers in BC
 - The previous government was neither focussed on workers nor worker conditions; we are.
 - We're focused on better employment standards and improved health and safety.
- Worker rights has always been my mission today it's my mandate as Labour Minister, but I also wish to make it my legacy as a fellow citizen
- As Tommy Douglas said at the first Labour Council meeting: political decisions are paramount to the labour movement
 - Today I pledge to make these decisions count in favour of working class British Columbians

- I understand that they were originally planning for 700 attendees and had to purchase 1,500 hotdogs for the grill due to overwhelming success.
- I want to recognize the service of New West & District Labour Council
- At the initial 1966 meeting with Tommy Douglas when the Council was first established, he emphasized that political decisions would play a paramount role in labour
 - o 51 years later I can say with certainty that his words still ring true
 - They also serve a guide posts for what I as your Labour Minister and what we – as your NDP government, still hold as true
- Our government is here to serve the people the interests of the people
 - Whether it's ensuring safety for workers, giving workers a long overdue raise to get the minimum wage to \$15 an hour, or bringing back the Human Rights Commission that was dismantled by our predecessors.
 - You can trust that your government is fighting for families facing real issues like affordability, good paying jobs and improved public services, and an economy that works for and includes everyone.

SCRIPT SEGUE

- I'm grateful to be here as the new Labour Minister
 - As most know, my career includes over 15 years as a union activist

- But perhaps you don't know how and why that came to be, or what made me want to stand-up and stand-out as an advocate for others
- I got involved in politics the same way I got involved in unions
 - As a young man I experienced discrimination and the sting of injustice
 - I gave voice to it and someone said "put your words into action"
- Unions do just that, they demand action; good politics does too
- Unions are about combined and collective strength, about unity of effort
- And likewise, governments should be about strengthening those efforts and supporting actions like providing better worker protections
 - Good governance makes unions a partner in labour and the economy
 - o It recognizes that unions are not the enemy
 - And it treats workers as the drivers that help move the economy, versus back seat occupants in a vehicle with no safety features
- The theme of this year's picnic is inclusiveness, with a focus on new immigrants that are contributing to our BC economy and communities
 - o I too came to Canada as a young, spirited immigrant worker
 - o I worked on a farm, then in a mill
 - I worked my way up-and-out of the fields and production lines, but committed my life's work to fighting for those still in them
- I put my words and my convictions, into action and that's what I will continue to do as your new Minister of Labour.
- That is what Labour Day all about

- o It's not about the picnic or BBQ, not about a day off of school or work
- o It's about celebrating social progress and collective achievements
- o It's recognizing the strength and success borne by unity of effort
- Back in 1872 when Labour Day started, the collective came together in the streets of Toronto to demand and demonstrate against unfair working conditions
 - Unions were still illegal in Canada, union activists had been jailed
 - o They advocated that human, worker and equal rights be recognized
 - That fair working conditions and pay, as well as better worker health and safety standards be put in place
- Labour Day was founded on these principles back to the 1870s
 - o The relevance of unions remains as important today as it was then
 - Today providing certainty of safe and fair working conditions in the workplace – minimums enshrined in legislation over time
- And the principles of a government that serves the people and the people's interest includes
 - Providing certainty of safe and fair working conditions in workplaces
 - o Ensuring vulnerable workers are protected and have a voice
 - o Making certain equality and diversity are valued and implemented
 - And enforcement, as well as swift actions and consequences are applied when necessary

Minimum-wage earners to see 50-cent hike as we set sights on a \$15 hourly rate

Good morning and thank you for joining the call.

Today's announcement is about helping everyday workers make ends meet.

It's not always easy to do, and it's even harder when you're making minimum wage.

Increasing minimum wage is only one way that the new government will help make life more affordable for British Columbians... but it's an important start.

It's a start that makes B.C. the third-highest minimum wage province in Canada – up from seventh.

It will put a little more money into the wallets of almost 94-thousand people.

And with more money in the wallets of B.C. workers, it will help fuel our province's economy.

The increase is 50 cents an hour.

That means minimum wage in B.C. will increase to \$11.35 per hour beginning September 15th.

At the same time, the liquor servers' wage will also rise by 50 cents to \$10.10 per hour.

And other minimum-wage provisions, like the daily rate for live-in home support workers and camp leaders, as well as monthly rates for resident caretakers and piece rates for farm-worker harvesters will increase on a proportionate percentage basis.

All of these serve as a measure to help us move toward a \$15-an-hour minimum wage by 2021.

The 50 cent increase was a commitment made by the previous government that we, as the new government, will honour and legally implement, thereby creating a stepping stone towards our \$15-an-hour goal.

We have just four years to meet that \$15 mandate and we'll do it by making incremental, predictable increases starting with today's announcement.

We have listened to business and industry, to manufacturers and hospitality owners, and to those representing the interests of workers...

We recognize the need for a gradual, phased-in strategy for increasing minimum wages...

A timeline that allows employers to plan, budget and adapt their payroll...

That's why the B.C. government is also creating a Fair Wages Commission that will set the pathway to a \$15 minimum wage.

The Fair Wages Commission was another commitment by our government, a mandate of mine set-out for me as the new Minister of Labour, and I look forward to offering more details on the commission next month.

But for today, the message is clear:

We set out clear goals for helping families, including low-paid workers, make ends meet...

For making life more affordable and public services more accessible...

For growing B.C. and making the B.C. economy more sustainable...

Increasing the minimum wage is good for working families and good for our economy.

It is a good start, a stepping stone, to how we meet our \$15 an hour minimum wage commitment by 2021.

About the announcement:

Surrey Advanced Manufacturing and Innovative Economy Labour Market Partnership Project

Minister Shane Simpson will announce \$125,823 in funding to the City of Surrey to carry out a research project that will identify and address labour market and human resource challenges in the Advanced Manufacturing and Innovative Economy in the Lower Mainland, with a focus on the Surrey area. The study, when completed, will design strategies to address development, growth and job creation in this emerging sector.

The research project is the second phase of a City-led plan to grow the advanced manufacturing and innovation sector. The first phase of the project, funded by the City, found that many talented local university graduates were leaving the region for employment opportunities.

The project aligns with government's plan to support the creation of good jobs in a sustainable economy.

The City of Surrey is using the funding to hire a consultant to carry out the research and create a report that is to be completed by April 2018. The project began on Feb. 20, 2017.

Kwantlen Polytechnic University, Simon Fraser University and the Canadian Manufacturers and Exporters Association are also partners in the project providing in-kind support.

Funding for the project is from the Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction's Community and Employer Partnerships fund, under the Labour Market Partnerships stream.

About Community and Employer Partnerships (CEP):

The Community and Employer Partnerships fund was established under the ministry's Employment Program of BC in April 2012. It has an annual budget of \$10 million and provides funding to community organizations for projects that increase employability for British Columbians and share labour market information.

This is done through skills training, work experience and labour market research through five separate streams: Labour Market Partnerships, Job Creation Partnerships, Project-Based Labour Market Training, Research & Innovation, and Social Innovation.
