Poverty Reduction Forum with MP Gord Johns

Introduction

- Hello and thank you for this opportunity to speak to you today in the territory of the Hupacasath (who-patch-eh-set) and Tseshaht (say-shot) First Nations.
- Thank you to Elder Ray Samuel for the blessing.
- And thank you everyone for taking the time to be here with us today.
- On April 2, 2017, Member of Parliament Gord Johns and I signed the Alberni Clayoquot Working Together to Reduce Poverty Protocol Agreement.
- At that time, the former provincial government had made it clear this was not a topic they were interested in.
- How things have changed.
- Since this time the Alberni Clayoquot Health Network has been continuing this work...
- Approaching local leadership tables to endorse the protocol agreement.
- Today, we gather to widen the number of leaders committed to supporting this important work.
- And to discuss ways to increase education on poverty reduction and make a difference in our communities.
- We are here to provide feedback on the next steps and opportunities for addressing poverty in our region and supporting people to meet their basic needs.
- Port Alberni is making great strides toward reducing poverty through social innovation.

- For example, we know that food access is a determinant of health.
- Food security means having access to safe, culturally acceptable, and nutritious food.
- The principles of food security include sustainability, self-reliance and social justice.
- These principles improve the health of the community, environment and people over time.
- Many of you know we have a couple local food-related social enterprises here in Port Alberni:
 - Healthy Harvest Farm, which works to develop microbusiness opportunities, help teach employment skills, and grow food for families and for sale.
 - And the Alberni Valley Food Hub, an extension of Island Health's community Food Hub initiative, which promotes local food security and community events.
- These great initiatives help build stronger, more self-sufficient communities and they are just two of many social enterprises to be found in Port Alberni.
- There is a lot of important work happening here locally to reduce poverty and support families and people struggling to make ends meet – but there is more work to be done.
- In the Alberni Valley, two in five children live in poverty, and it is more than twice as likely that Indigenous children live in poverty.
- Part of being connected as a society is ensuring that everyone can prosper.
- As a government, we are working to make life more affordable for all British Columbians, to ensure the fruits of economic growth are shared by the many and don't just accrue to the few at the top.

- We are investing in public services, from housing to transit to education ...
- Services that have been underfunded and neglected.
- Services that are a bedrock for healthy, thriving, equitable societies.
- We are also tackling the province's shameful record on poverty.
- We've removed fees for adult basic education.
- Income assistance, including disability assistance, has increased by \$100 a month and we are committed to a comprehensive review of our social assistance programs.
- People on disability assistance will also receive a supplement for their bus pass or other transportation.
- Post-secondary tuition fees have been waived for those who've aged out of the foster care system.

Indigenous Relations

- These important are investments investments that will benefit all British Columbians they are not just "social policy."
- All of these measures are fundamental to stable economic growth.
- And they are critical to the social and economic outcomes of Indigenous peoples.

- As MLA for Mid-Island Pacific Rim and Minister of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation, one of my key priorities is to work collaboratively and respectfully with Indigenous people to establish a clear cross-government vision of reconciliation...
- A vision based on implementing the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and acting on the Truth and Reconciliation Commission calls to action.
- One of the key points in the United Nations Declaration is to provide minimum standards for the survival, dignity and wellbeing of the Indigenous peoples of the world.
- This includes freedom from poverty.
- Fostering reconciliation is an important issue in the Alberni Valley and throughout British Columbia.
- This is obvious by the work that is already happening with the creation of the reconciliation committee established between the Tseshaht First Nation and the Port Alberni municipal government.
- Our provincial government is also working to improve the quality of life for Indigenous people...
- We are doing this by exploring new partnerships that will close the gaps in health, education, skills training, and employment.
- The reality is this:
 - While Canada ranks in the top 10 when it comes to the United Nations Human Development Index...
 - o Indigenous people in Canada rank 63rd on the same index.

- That is a huge gap and it is NOT acceptable.
- B.C. is launching a fair wage commission and have committed to bringing in a \$15 minimum wage.
- I'm proud to say First Nations from my riding have led the way in terms of instituting fair wage policies.
- Almost three years ago, Huu-ay-aht was the first in Canada to adopt a living wage.
- You-thloo-ith-at (Ucluelet First Nation) was the second community to adopt this policy.
- They're at \$20.11 per hour, a wage based on the cost of living in Ucluelet.
- They are tremendous examples of how to make a difference and understand that living wages support thriving economies.
- Their leadership and your leadership here in this room is helping us build a way forward.
- My colleague Shane Simpson, minister of Social Development, is leading efforts to create a Poverty Reduction Strategy.
- And a 27-member Advisory Forum is providing guidance as we develop the plan.
- The forum members represent multiple sectors, including:
 - Poverty advocates, and people with lived experience;
 - o Indigenous people, academics and experts, and...
 - o Representatives of the labour and business communities.

- Wes Hewitt from Port Alberni is on the advisory forum. [Wes if you are here please put up your hand]
- Wes is the Executive Director of the Port Alberni Shelter Society and an active member of the community.
- He sits as a member of the Alberni Clayoquot Health Network,
 Port Alberni Advisory Planning Commission, and many others.
- The B.C. Aboriginal Friendship Association is also heavily involved in shaping this work.
- To develop the Poverty Reduction Plan, B.C. is holding public meetings in up to 20 communities between now and March 2018.
- These meetings give people an opportunity to share their ideas about how to reduce poverty in their community and across B.C.
- The Port Alberni session is coming up on Tuesday, January 23, at the Port Alberni Athletic Hall at 5 pm.
- I encourage everyone to participate.
- Your thoughts and ideas will help shape the Poverty Reduction Strategy and the future of our province.
- We expect to be able to share our Poverty Reduction Strategy this fall.

Conclusion

- I have been very fortunate in my career to work closely with Indigenous leaders and to learn from them.
- They tell me the history of this valley is one of abundance and shared prosperity.

- It's a story I hear again and again from Indigenous people across B.C.
- Growing income gaps and wealth inequality are issues of that have grown as we've established this country called Canada.
- It is a legacy that we cannot allow to continue...
- And a moral issue we must deal with in Indigenous communities, and in all communities.
- We can work together to eliminate poverty. It can be a reality.
- It benefits every British Columbian if we work together to create the conditions for stronger, healthier, independent communities.

FirstVoices relaunch ŁÁU, WELNEW Tribal School

Information for Minister

Event Summary:

- Minister Fraser offers remarks at the relaunch of the First Peoples' Cultural Council (FPCC), FirstVoices website.
- The relaunch is of a beta (preview) version of the website and FPCC is seeking feedback from users until the end of March 2018.
- FirstVoices is the flagship program of the First Peoples' Cultural Foundation and is administered by FPCC. FirstVoices was developed to empower Indigenous communities to curate and control their own language data.
- The website' architecture and front end of the site has been redeveloped over the
 last few years to align with modern technological practices. Current updates include
 moving the platform to the Cloud, adopting an open source model and developing
 additional integrated tools such as interactive learning applications.
- The event will occur at the ŁÁU, WELNEW Tribal School.

About FirstVoices:

- Launched in 2003, FirstVoices is a suite of web-based tools and services designed to support Indigenous people engaged in language archiving, language teaching and culture revitalization.
- The FirstVoices language archive contains thousands of text entries in many diverse Indigenous language writing systems, enhanced with sounds, pictures and videos.
- There are currently 47 B.C. First Nations archives and 22 archives from outside of B.C. on FirstVoices.com. FirstVoices also features several innovative apps, including FirstVoices Keyboards for use on mobile devices, and dictionary apps for several B.C. First Nations languages.

Pronunciations:

- FPCC confirm there is no expectation that the minister says the name of the ŁÁU,
 WELNEW Tribal School as it is complicated.
- Tracey Herbert will introduce the minister to Elder John Elliot prior to the event to go over the pronunciation of Mr Elliot's Indigenous title.

STOLØEŁ John Elliott is a respected Elder of the Tsartlip First Nation and has taught at ŁÁU,WELNEW Tribal School in Saanich for over 30 years. His dedication to the revitalization of First Nations languages began over 30 years ago, inspired by the efforts of his father, David Elliott, to preserve the SENĆOŦEN language.

Lois Joseph

Lois Joseph is from the Lil'wat Nation and is a member of the nation's council. She is also the manager of the Lil'wat Culture Centre and an administrator for FirstVoices in her community.

Jordan Williams

Jordan Williams is from Lake Babine First Nation and is a fluent speaker of the Ned'u'ten dialect of the Carrier language. Jordan is a language teacher in his community. He is also Jordan a Mentor in the Mentor-Apprentice Program through FPCC.

- Good morning. It's a pleasure to be here today.
- First, I'd like to acknowledge that we are gathered on the traditional territory of the WSÁNEĆ peoples.
- And to thank Elder STOL@EŁ John Elliot from the Tsartlip First Nation for his welcome to this beautiful territory.
 [John will coach the minister on pronunciation]
- I'd also like to thank Tracey Herbert, Cynthia Callison and all staff at the First Peoples' Cultural Council for the invitation to be here.
 - [Minister to acknowledge anyone else in the room that he wishes to mention]
- As you know, the Premier was sorry not be able to be with you today, as was my colleague Melanie Mark, Minister of Advanced Education, Skills and Training.
- It's an exciting day the relaunch of the FirstVoices website.
- The FirstVoices website is a highly respected tool to help communities preserve and revitalize Indigenous languages.
- Language is one of the key ways we define ourselves, the world around us, and how we relate to others.

- Teaching of language connects children to their heritage and the lands they come from.
- It grounds them in who they are and opens new pathways for who they might become.
- Teaching of language also strengthens the cultural and social health of a community.
- It allows children to move into the future, grounded in Indigenous worldviews that flow from their rich heritage.
- B.C. is committed to supporting Indigenous communities to revitalize connections with their languages.
- It is part of my mandate from the Premier.
- I sat in the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's hearings when they were in B.C.
- I listened to the testimony of survivors of the residential school system.
- Time and time again, the Commission heard how survivors were made to feel ashamed...
- How they were punished for speaking their language and expressing their cultural identities.
- How the residential school system imposed cultural genocide and scarred generations.
- When it came time to make their recommendations to governments, the Commission recognized the importance of language and culture.

- It demonstrates how important the revitalization of language and culture is.
- Indigenous peoples are also traditional knowledge keepers and language is how that knowledge passes from generation to generation.
- There are words for unique Indigenous concepts and knowledge that do not exist in English or French.
- Those words are important tools for everyone as we build a shared vision of reconciliation.
- My riding and my home is in Nuu-chah-nulth territory.
- Many years ago, I learned an important phrase from Ahousaht First Nation Hereditary Chief Earl Maquinna George.
- 'Hishuk ish tsawalk' 'all things are one everything is connected.'
- This concept has shaped how I think about my work, my riding and now, my work as Minister of Indigenous Relations.
- Everything is connected.
- Another Nuu-chah-nulth word that has guided me is 'isaak'
 'respect'.
- A true vision of reconciliation starts with respect, for yourself, for your neighbours, for your history and culture.

- I have the greatest respect for the invaluable work of the First Peoples Cultural Council.
- B.C. is home to 60% of Indigenous languages in Canada.
- I am mindful of the urgency and scale of the important preservation and revitalization work you undertake.
- FirstVoices represents an important component of that work.
- As Indigenous language learning pathways have evolved, FirstVoices has evolved and grown.
- New integrated tools like the keyboard app for mobile devices, the iPad-based Language lab, the language tutor and interactive dictionaries...
- Each is a testament to that continued evolution and growth.
- Together with the work you do with language nests, with the Mentor-Apprentice program and all your arts programs – they are all connected.
- I said that this work is urgent and important, but I believe also there is room for optimism.
- As I said, one of my mandate priorities is to support Indigenous communities who want to revitalize connections with their languages.
- I want to work with the Council to find a path forward that will help that happen.

- There is already great work out there in individual communities.
- Including from Indigenous youth.
- For example, School District 70 is collaborating with the Nuu-chah-nulth communities on language classes in Port Alberni.
- A member of Nak'azdli Whut'en's [Nak-ah-dzlee Whu-ten] youth – Tessa Erickson – is developing an app and a summer camp to help other youth immerse themselves in the Dakelh [Da-kel] language.
- And students in School District 69 in Qualicum are learning Hul'qami'num [Hull-kah-me-num].
- These are just a few examples that demonstrate the enthusiasm of Indigenous youth to embrace their language, culture and heritage.
- Their time is now. We must help them achieve their goals.
- Congratulations on the relaunch of FirstVoices.
- This is a very exciting and I'm honoured to be with you here today.

Maa-nulth G2G signing

Introduction

- Thank you so much for being here today.
- I'd like to thank the Uchucklesaht (U-chuck-le-sat) for hosting us in their beautiful building ...
- And I'd like to acknowledge our event today is being held within the territories of the Hupacasath [Who-pe-chess-it] and Tseshaht [Tsay-shaht] peoples.
- It's a great honor for me to be here with the Elders, leaders and members of the Maa-nulth First Nations.
- I have known many of you very well for a quite some time.
- This is the first time I've had the honor of signing an agreement in my home riding since becoming Minister of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation.
- I know this agreement has been developed over a number of years, and you've been waiting a long time to bring it into effect.
- I'm very pleased that we've done so today. This is good news.
- The Province has a strong, ongoing partnership with Maanulth First Nations and our agreement reflects that.

- The fact is that reconciliation doesn't end when a treaty begins.
- Treaties are a powerful foundation, but it takes respectful and ongoing government-to-government relationships to make them effective.
- It takes a willingness to be creative and flexible.
- Our agreement is unique among First Nations with a treaty.
- It shows how treaties can evolve as relationships between the governments evolve.

- This vision will be guided by the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Calls to Action, and the Supreme Court of Canada's Tsilhqot'in decision.

- The United Nations Declaration is a human rights document with 46 articles. I encourage you to read it.
- It's about ensuring basic human rights that we take for granted but aren't always available to Indigenous peoples, such as . . .

- Society, industries and non-Indigenous communities all need to participate in reconciliation and take on bias and racism where it exists.
- We must not just talk differently. We must think and act differently.

- Within my Ministry, however, our work began in earnest in September.
- Cabinet held a record 566 meetings with more than 620 First Nations leaders at a gathering in Vancouver.

- Other priorities for my Ministry include working on the unique opportunity to truly transform the fundamentals of the treaty process.

- We have strong alignment with the Federal Government and we are working more closely with federal Ministers and departments than has occurred in a very long time.

 - Looking at the type of information being used to support decisions;
 - The process for making those decisions, and;
 - How we engage in dialogue.
- This is about approaching "consent" in a much different and collaborative way.
- If we do this, we will reach a deeper understanding between First Nations and the Province of our respective interests.
- We are confident that understanding will lead to approaches to project development that are in everyone's interests.

Role of Business:

- Our government is committed to helping companies wanting to develop resources in British Columbia to pursue partnerships with First Nations from the very beginning.
- We believe this partnership-based approach will benefit industry.
- The Canadian Association of Petroleum Producers agrees with our approach, as does the B.C. Business Council and B.C. Chamber of Commerce.
- Working with Indigenous communities can be an opportunity to bring important knowledge and perspective about potential resource-development projects.

- Our approach will include increased emphasis on talking with local governments and industry stakeholders.
- It's through respectful dialogue founded on the recognition of the important role Indigenous communities play within their traditional territories, that we can improve certainty...
- ... and increase economic development in important economic sectors, such as mining, forestry, and technology.



The PuSh Festival has grown into one of Vancouver's signature cultural events with an established international profile. PuSh Festival performances are innovative, contemporary and multi-disciplined. The festival gives artists from around the world and across Canada, including home-grown B.C. talent, opportunities to maximize their creativity and present original work. The festival has developed its own culture as a meeting place for creative artists and audiences appreciative of originality and experimentation.

Marcus Youssef

Youssef has recently been named the recipient of the 2017 Siminovitch Prize, and was among 2017 Mayor's Arts Award winners

Actor and playwright Marcus Youssef was born in 1969 in Montreal to Egyptian parents and graduated from the National Theatre School of Canada (Acting, 1992) and the University of British Columbia (M.F.A., 2002). He currently lives in Vancouver British Columbia with his partner Amanda and their sons Oscar and Zak.

In 1999-2000 he was Playwright-in-Residence at Touchstone Theatre in Vancouver, where his play, Otherwise Occupied premiered in 2001.

His other plays include True Lies (with Guillermo Verdecchia), a multi-media play produced in 1993 by Rumble Theatre and Zababwa Theatre; The Adventures of Ali & Ali and the Axes of Evil (Neworld Theatre and Cahoots Theatre Projects 2004 (with Guillermo Verdecchia and Camyar Chai), and A Line in the Sand (with Guillermo Verdecchia) for the Playwrights Theatre Centre in Vancouver. It was also produced at the Tarragon Theatre and the World Stage Festival in Toronto in 1996, directed by Verdecchia, and won the Chalmers Award for best new play in 1997.

In 2010, he again collaborated with Verdecchia and Chai on an Ali sequel: Ail & Ali: The Deportation Hearings (Neworld and Factory Theatre). In a post-Bush Obama era, there should be some hope for change. Critic Christopher Hoile concludes however, that "when the real point of the show surfaces — the continued deaths of Canadians in Afghanistan and the detention of five men without trial in Kingston Penitentiary — all pretense of comedy drops." (Eyeweekly.com, 1 Oct 2010).

In 2012, he developed Winners and Losers with his friend, James Long. It pursues the ruthless logic of modern-day capitalism, and tests its impact on close personal relationships. Youssef and Long play an improv game in which they name things and people and debate whether, from a personal perspective, these things are winners or losers. It premiered at Gateway Theatre in 2012 in a co-production by Neworld, Theatre Replacement and Crow's Theatre (dir. Chris Abraham), then toured to Britain and Ireland, returning to Canada with a production in Toronto by Crow's at the Berkeley St. Theatre (Canadian Stage). The play was nominated for a Governor General's Award in 2015.

In 2013, in the highly personal work which included his son, Zak, entitled How Has My Love Affected You? (Arts Club Theatre), he read from the journals his mother left to him, effecting an exploration of their fraught relationship before her death.

Youssef has created installation performance events for HIVE's I and II, and the Vancouver Art Gallery. His works have been presented or produced across North America, Australia and Europe, translated into Czech and Italian, and are published by Talonbooks and Playwrights Canada Press.

For the CBC he has written and broadcast sketches, plays, commentaries and documentaries. He also writes for publications such as the Georgia Strait, and his short stories have been published in journals and anthologies.

As an actor he has worked with the Green Thumb Theatre.

Marcus Youssef is co-Artistic Director of Neworld Theatre in Vancouver, where he continues his work with community-based advocacy programs that use writing and/or theatre as tools for effecting political and social change. In 2009, he co-founded Progress Lab 1422, a collaboratively managed rehearsal and production centre in East Vancouver. He is also Western Artistic Associate of Magnetic North Theatre Festival. He teaches and lectures across Canada: in 04/05, he was an Assistant Professor of Theatre and Community Development at Concordia University in Montreal. He currently is on the faculty at Capilano University; and sits on the advisory board of the Canadian Theatre Review. He is Chair of the City of Vancouver's Arts and

Culture Advisory Council, where he advocates for the centrality of culture to Vancouver's urban future. He is senior playwright-in-residence at the Banff Centre for the Arts

- It has over 980 million monthly active users (902 million daily active users).
- WeChat provides text messaging, hold-to-talk voice messaging, broadcast (one-to-many)
 messaging, video conferencing, video games, photograph and video sharing, and location
 sharing. In addition, WeChat provides convenient payment services for consumers.
- As part of Destination BC's corporate strategy, it has been cultivating partnerships with
 platforms that have broad reach to consumers to maximize visibility for tourism to BC. In
 the last two years, Destination BC has partnered with Google, Facebook, Trip Advisor,
 Expedia, Ctrip (China) and in 2017 approached Tencent (WeChat) as new partners.
- To date, Destination BC has 52,528 followers on its consumer WeChat channel, which has been in operation for over a year. Destination BC also has 3298 followers on its Travel Trade WeChat and 122,658 followers on its other China-based social media platform, Weibo.
- Tencent currently has partnership agreements with Tourism Australia, Singapore and Dubai.

- China is Canada's fastest growing tourism market, with China representing the 2nd largest international tourism market to B.C.
- In 2016 year-over-year growth in visits to B.C. from China was nearly 20%. Year-to-date (Jan-Oct), China has continued to be the second largest source of international visitors to B.C. (after the US).
- Total inbound tourism to B.C. in 2016 totalled 5,532,226, with the majority from the U.S. overnight visitors (3,621,136).
 - Inbound tourism to British Columbia from residents of China in 2016 was 312,668 overnight customs entries (5.6% of total).
 - This has more than tripled since 2009 and China is now B.C.'s second largest market after the U.S.
- Destination British Columbia has had representation in Beijing since 2010, colocated with Destination Canada, to market British Columbia as a year-round destination. Destination B.C. attends the Destination Canada Showcase marketplaces in China annually in October to meet with key tour operators that are currently promoting travel packages to B.C., or have an opportunity to start or increase their B.C. tourism product offerings to consumers.
- In 2015, Prime Minister Trudeau and Premier Li declared 2018 as the Canada-China Year of Tourism. The federal government and Destination Canada are engaging provinces and their destination marketing organizations on details on promotional activities.
- Vancouver International Airport has more mainland Chinese carriers (7) than any airport in North America, South America or Europe. In the 2017 summer season there were 57 weekly flights to YVR connecting 11 mainland Chinese cities. In the 2017 winter season, there are 51 weekly flights.
- There are 18 flights weekly between Beijing and Vancouver alone into YVR.
- China and Canada have yet to negotiate additional air access to Canada from China. The maximum number of weekly flights into Canada (76) from China has been reached under the current air transportation agreement.
- Chinese tourists are able to visit Canada frequently with Approved Destination Status (ADS) in 2010 and the advent of 10-year multiple-entry visas in 2015. Over 50% of Chinese visitors to Canada visit B.C. at some point during their travels.

- Canada has opened seven new visa application centres (VACs) in China in addition
 to those already open in Beijing, Shanghai, Guangzhou and Chongqing. These
 application centres are in so-called secondary cities (Chengdu, Wuhan, Shenyang,
 Jinan, Nanjing, Kunming and Hangzhou) that will support further travel growth to
 Canada.
- The 2022 Winter Olympic Games will be held in Beijing. As part of its Olympics planning, the Chinese government has committed to encouraging more of its citizens to take up winter sports, including skiing.
- Destination B.C.'s 2017/2018 annual plan for China market includes:
 - Introducing new tourism products to tour operators to promote longer length of stays, dispersion in the province and seasonality.
 - Supporting marketing initiatives through Destination Canada by participating in content marketing campaigns, featuring key B.C. experiences in digital, media and social media channels.
 - Seeking unique media trips to B.C. for key influencers, celebrities, media outlets and events to showcase areas of British Columbia with a focus on generating awareness of and interest in B.C.
 - Supporting Destination Canada on the Canada-China Year of Tourism 2018 promotions.
 - Undertaking a campaign that builds on B.C. ski products available for the China market.
 - Launching a Chinese New Year initiative to capitalize on Canada-China Year of Tourism 2018. The objective is to inspire and motivate Chinese visitors to travel to Vancouver during Chinese New Year by showcasing B.C. winter experiences, Chinese New Year festivals and multi-cultural events.
 - Maximizing the partnership signed in June 2017 with China's largest online travel agency, CTrip, and increasing the awareness of B.C. tourism products through this influential distribution channel.
 - Actively promoting B.C.'s winter ski experiences in China market for the past four years, through the travel trade and social media platforms.

- In addition to the key strategies identified for this market, Destination BC will partner with Destination Canada to capitalize on awareness of the Canada-China Year of Tourism. Specific joint activities and tactics will be reviewed in early 2018.
- Destination BC is leading a Chinese New Year promotion for February 2018, with the goal of bringing up to 1000 Chinese consumers on travel packages to B.C. and capitalizing on the awareness created by the Canada-China Year of Tourism.
- China is Canada's fastest growing tourism market, with China representing the 2nd largest international tourism market to BC.
- In 2016, year-over-year growth in visits to BC from China was nearly 20%. Year-to-date (Jan-Oct), China has continued to be the second largest source of international visitors to BC (after the US) in 2017.
- Vancouver International Airport has the most mainland Chinese carriers of any airport in North America, South America and Europe. In the 2017 summer season there were 57 weekly flights to YVR connecting 11 mainland Chinese cities. In the 2017 winter season, there were 51 weekly flights.
- With the recent advent of the 10-year multiple entry visa (2015), and Approved Destination Status (ADS) (2010), Chinese tourists are able not only to visit Canada, but to visit frequently. Over 50% of Chinese visitors to Canada visit BC at some point during their travels.

- You are advocates, champions and drivers of our economy.

- I was amazed to learn that 98% of businesses are small businesses.
- I would like to start by telling you a little bit about myself.
- I grew up in the projects of East Vancouver. I had to overcome adversity but it shaped my own beliefs and career.
- After graduating from SFU with a degree in political science I wanted to make a difference.
- I spent eight years in BC's Office of the Representative for Children and Youth, advocating for our most vulnerable population.
- I am proud to be the first female First Nations Member of the Legislative Assembly and Cabinet Minister.
- Education transformed my life and it's important these opportunities are available to everyone.

The Three Pillars:

- As you know, our government was elected on three pillars.
- First, making life more affordable. For example:
 - 1. Cutting MSP premiums in half.
 - 2. Removing tolls on the Port Mann and Golden Ears bridges.
 - 3. Increasing disability and income assistance rates.
- Second, delivering services people count on. For example:
 - 1. Fast-tracking seismic upgrades to keep students safe in school.
 - 2. Taking province-wide action to stem the overdose emergency and help people with mental health and addictions.
 - 3. Opening the door to Adult Basic Education and English Language Learning.
- Third, building an economy that works for everyone. For example:
 - 1. Cutting taxes for small businesses from 2.5% to 2%.
 - 2. Adding more than 500 trades training spaces.
 - 3. Welcoming 1,000 more good-paying tech jobs.
- I am proud to be part of a government that is investing in people and giving them the opportunity to succeed and thrive.
- The common foundation tying the three pillars together is a strong relationship with people, businesses and communities.

Advanced Education Mandate – Nine Priorities:

 - 8. Develop more degree and certificate programs to increase the number of skilled workers in B.C.'s forestry sector focusing on growing innovation in the manufactured wood products sector.
- I will need your help to achieve all these priorities.

Indigenous Learners – TRC and UNDRIP:

- All of our mandate letters include the commitment to true, lasting reconciliation with First Nations in British Columbia.
- Our government will be fully adopting and implementing the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.
- We will be adopting the Calls to Action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.
- This places the responsibility on the shoulders of all cabinet ministers to move forward on the calls to action and bring the principles of the declaration into action.
- Our Indigenous population is growing at more than triple the rate of the non-Indigenous population, with nearly half under the age of 25.
- We want Indigenous British Columbians to be supported to achieve their post-secondary goals.
- Indigenous people need to be able to fulfil their dreams and participate in the social, cultural and economic life of their communities and the province.
- We are encouraging post-secondary institutions to work with Indigenous communities to improve programming and better meet the needs of Indigenous learners.
- It is essential that Indigenous peoples, including youth, are engaged so they can contribute to and enjoy the new and exciting opportunities.

Investing in People:

- Premier John Horgan and our government want to create a B.C. that works for people.
- We want everyone to have the opportunity to reach their full potential at home, in the community and in the workplace.
- Yes, we are fortunate to have a strong economy. But we need to ensure everyone benefits. This hasn't been happening.
- We want to give people who are unemployed the opportunity to find work.
- We want to give people who are underemployed the chance to move up.
- Our students are just the future workforce.
- They are future employers, entrepreneurs and innovators.
- We are in the final stages of negotiating a new generation of Labour Market Transfer Agreements worth \$2.7 billion over six years in skills training.
- These agreements will help improve the lives of all British Columbians and help meet employer demand for skilled workers.
- We will target investments in skills training to support priority areas such as technology, manufacturing and forestry.
- Affordable and accessible education and skills training will ensure people have the opportunity to take advantage of opportunities in a B.C. that works for people.

Post-Secondary Institutions:

- We have an ecosystem of post-secondary education and skills training.
- In August last year, it was important for me to get out and tour all of our public post-secondary institutions.
- I visited all 25 in 21 days.
- This gave me the opportunity to hear directly from students, faculty and staff about trades, health care, Indigenous, culinary and quantum physics programs to name a few
- Students also told me about the challenges they are facing.
- The common themes I heard were around student debt, housing and mental health.
- These are pressure points our government is committed to addressing.
- Our government's immediate priority was to address affordability and accessibility.
- We cut the interest rate on provincial loans, eliminated tuition for ABE and expanded the tuition waiver program for former youth in care.
- Last month, I announced 2,900 tech-related student spaces. This means 1,000 additional tech-grads a year by 2023.
- You asked us for more tech talent and we listened.
- I will continue to listen and engage with students, faculty and staff as well as employers, business and industry.
- Our government is leaning in to make sure we invest in Science, Tech, Engineering, Arts and Math. Also known as STEAM.

Trades Training - Building the Best BC:

- It has been inspiring for me to meet and listen to trades students.
- I'm impressed by the range of trades.
- From culinary arts and horticulture through to the construction trades, we need it all.
- Apprenticeships in the skilled trades are essential to the development of the future workforce.
- It's no secret that our government wants to:
 - Boost the number of apprentices and help them complete their training.
 - Make sure women, Indigenous groups and other equity seeking groups have a fair opportunity in the skilled trades.
 - o Promote local hiring for government projects.
- We are working with apprentices, labour, employers, industry, training providers and the Industry Training Authority to create a world-class training and apprenticeship system for British Columbians.
- Currently, our government is engaging industry, union associations and people in the construction sector to gather advice and guidance on developing an apprenticeship ratio strategy.
- We want to get the best value possible from our planned \$14.6 billion in infrastructure spending over the next three years.
- An apprenticeship ratio policy for government projects will help build up British Columbians as we build the best B.C.

Labour Market Outlook and Evidence Based Decisions:

- We launched an updated Labour Market Outlook in November.
- It forecasts 917,000 job openings by 2027.
- These jobs are the result of a retiring workforce as well as new jobs created by economic growth.
- As we know, most job openings will require post-secondary education or training.
- With every challenge, there's an opportunity.
- Our government will use the Outlook in consultation with employers, industry and post-secondary institutions to make informed decisions about new services, investments and initiatives to lift up all citizens.
- For example, small, independent restaurants in Vancouver and Victoria are facing a challenge recruiting and retaining workers.
- My ministry provided \$275,000 so that the industry can explore ways to improve recruitment and retention issues.
- Owners need to explore different ways of doing business such as hiring single parents, newcomers to Canada and people with disabilities, providing benefits and offering more flexibility.
- We will continue to put British Columbians at the heart of our decision making so that everyone can share the prosperity of our strong, sustainable and innovative economy.
- Working together can make a positive difference for all of us.

Conclusion

- It has been a busy and exciting six months as Minister.
- People are better off because of our decisions to create the best B.C.
- No doubt, all of you are looking ahead to the Budget that will be presented by my colleague, Finance Minister, Carole James on February 20th.
- It will continue to support the three pillars.

- I'd firstly like to acknowledge that we are on the traditional territory of the Coast Salish peoples including the Musqueam First Nation.
- Thank you, Pheobe, for that wonderful introduction.
- I'd also like to thank the board of the B.C Federation of Students for the invitation to speak to such a phenomenal group of people.

Introduction:

- And thank you all so much for being here, today.
- I'm grateful to be here with so many who care so deeply about the well-being of your fellow students. That passion is what true leaders are made of.
- I've already had a chance to meet some of you during my summer tour of each and every B.C. public post-secondary institution.
- 25 schools in just 21 days. It was a whirlwind introduction to so many great places.
- And I'm looking forward to returning to every one of them during the course of my time as minister.
- On my tour, I was inspired by the passionate staff and faculty I met and by the work they are doing.
- I also had a chance to talk to a lot of your fellow students over the three weeks I spent on the road.
- As the days went by it became clear to me that B.C. students come from all walks of life and from all backgrounds. You are all so unique in your interests, your goals and your dreams.
- At every institution I listened to students talk about the high-quality of their education, the dedication of their instructors and their excitement about the future.
- But I also heard about the difficulties they were facing.

- Difficulties in accessing education, difficulties in finding housing and difficulties in affording post-secondary education and training.
- These difficulties should not be business as usual.
- Students should not be in a situation where they fight a constant battle against these barriers to get the education they need to fulfill their dreams.
- When I think about the future of Post-Secondary education...
 - I see campuses where students from all walks of life and from all backgrounds are welcome, safe and supported.
 - I see students studying for their exams in safe, affordable housing.
 - And I see students finishing their studies and thinking about starting families and buying houses, not wondering how they will ever get out from under crippling debt.
- That's my vision and my guiding star as minister.
- Making a vision a reality is hard work, though and it takes a team.
- So I am proud to be part of a government that wants everyone to have access to the education and training they need to make their dreams a reality.

- More, I'm proud to be a part of a team that is already making life more affordable,
 - o is already delivering the services people count on,
 - and is already building a sustainable, innovative economy that works for everyone – including students.

Inclusive Spaces:

- One of the ways to make this vision a reality is to ensure everyone has the potential to access our post-secondary institutions.
- As you all know from personal experience, every student takes a different pathway to advancing their education.
- For some, the path leads straight from high school to post-secondary and then out into the world.
- For others, like myself, the pathway twists and turns but eventually leads to the right place.
- And for still others, there are barriers that can prevent them from accessing the training and skills they need to build a bright future.
- Our government wants to break down those barriers and open doors to opportunities that have been locked for thousands of students.
- And we've made a good start.
- In just a few short months we've created or expanded programs that will help British Columbians transform their lives.
- For example, students like yourselves told us that tuition fees for Adult Basic Education and English Language Learning programs blocks adults who want to improve their lives from advancing their opportunities, increasing their chances of success and participating in the workforce.
 - So, we eliminated tuition for those programs at our public postsecondary institutions.

- ABE and ELL programs bring adult learners to our campuses and can be the stepping stones to further post-secondary education and good careers.
- This change also means many new Canadians, refugees and underrepresented groups now have a better chance to fulfill their potential.
- Our government also expanded the tuition fee waiver program for former youth in care to all 25 public post-secondary institutions
 - We are taking our responsibility as former guardians seriously and supporting these youth in reaching for the stars.
- Access to education isn't just about being accepted into a school, though. It's also about feeling safe and supported while you're there.
- My ministry is committed to supporting all students while they pursue their education.
- For example, we will be collaborating with our Indigenous and postsecondary partners to support the implementation of the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and the Calls to Action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada.
 - This will improve the relevance and responsiveness of our postsecondary institutions to Indigenous students and communities.
- My Ministry also supports services for students with disabilities so they can complete the education they need to succeed.

- Supports include financial aid, assistive services programs and making course materials available in accessible formats.
- And the institutions themselves are committed to continually improving access and academic accommodations, enabling those with a disability to not just participate but to excel.
- Our government is also committed to doing everything it can to make our campuses safe.
 - In May last year, all public post-secondary institutions in B.C. were required by legislation to have a policy to address sexual misconduct.
 - Policies that not only focus on prevention but on effective and compassionate responses when incidents do occur.
 - By law, these policies need to be reviewed in consultation with students – at least once every three years.
 - And last month we launched an initiative to further raise awareness among students.
 - You may have seen the Prevent Sexual Violence posters at your institution and I hope you'll encourage your fellow students to submit feedback on our website.
- So, in only 6 months, I think this is a pretty good beginning.
- But make no mistake, it will take time and effort to fully open the doors to post-secondary education for many groups that have historically been or have felt excluded.

 And, of course, a huge part of making B.C.'s post-secondary institutions accessible is ensuring they are affordable for all British Columbians.

Affordability - Tuition:

- Our government has committed to keeping a cap on tuition to ensure tuition rates stay affordable and predictable for students and their families.
- One of the very first acts we took after being sworn in was to reduce student loan interest rates by 2.5% to Prime.
- This reduced rate for B.C. student loans will benefit approximately 200,000 current and former students as well as future learners.
- This is just the first step in our commitment to eliminate interest on B.C. student loans.
- And stay tuned because there is more to come with a new \$1,000 completion grant and a new graduate scholarship fund.
- But having accessible post-secondary education and affordable tuition is only effective if students have safe, affordable and reliable housing.

Affordability - Housing

- I know students like yourselves are being squeezed out of affordable housing, particularly in areas like Vancouver and Victoria.
- We're facing this crisis because of a long-term lack of action on building affordable housing – including student residences.
- But help is coming.
- My Ministry is working closely with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing. Our government has committed to 114,000 new housing units that will include student housing.
- We are also working to remove barriers that prevent post-secondary institutions from building affordable places for students to live.
 - A good example is the University of Victoria's proposal to redevelop property in downtown Victoria to be used in part for student housing.
- This government knows that housing is a fundamental concern for British Columbians and we are taking action to make safe, affordable housing available to individuals, families and students.

Conclusion

- Post-secondary institutions that are accessible; tuition that is affordable; and safe, available housing – that's my vision for postsecondary education in British Columbia.
- It's a vision where students are change makers and future agents of change.
- Where students come to our campuses to get the education and training they need to build brighter futures for themselves and their families.
- And where they leave our campuses as citizens who are capable of bringing social change to communities throughout B.C. and the world.
- Post-secondary education is an opportunity for prosperity.
- Everyone deserves the chance to reach their full potential at home, in their communities and in their workplaces.
- There's lots left to do but I believe we're off to a good start.

Background:

- Custom adoption is a cultural practice in which a child is raised, according to the customs
 and values of the child's Indigenous community, by a person persons who are not the child's
 birth parents.
- The ministry has invited an Advisory Circle of 10 representatives including a youth, an
 Elder and members of First Nations, Métis and Inuit communities to guide collaboration
 with B.C.'s diverse Indigenous communities in order to better understand their cultural
 practices around custom adoptions.
- Over the next year, the Advisory Circle will provide guidance to ensure the ministry collaborates with Indigenous communities across the province in culturally safe ways.
- The findings from these gatherings will help the ministry identify ways to better support
 custom adoption as one of the ways to reduce the number of Indigenous children in
 government care.
- The community gatherings will take place in nine B.C. communities during the spring and early summer of 2018.

- It's a privilege to join you on the traditional territory of the Lekwungen [La-kwung-en] speaking people, the Songhees and Esquimalt Nations.
- Thank you for generously sharing your time, your knowledge, your experience and your intentions to help us all do our work in a 'good way'.
- As the Minister of Children and Family
 Development, I am grateful to you for helping me
 and my ministry to make a fundamental shift in our
 relationship with B.C.'s Indigenous people...
- We want to build relationships with Indigenous peoples based on respect, and this government is committed to working with communities towards real and lasting positive change.

Acknowledge the past history and current problems

- Indigenous communities know what's best for their children.
- But for too long, government has not been listening.
- The history of colonialism, residential schools, and the 60s scoop have affected Indigenous children, families and communities for generations.
- And as you will know, today more than half of the children in government care are Indigenous.
- This overrepresentation of Indigenous children and youth in care is unacceptable and needs to change.

Government commitment to UNDRIP and TRC – way forward

- Our government is serious about that change and has adopted the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and the Calls to Action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.
- In fact, the Premier has clearly stated in my mandate letter that he expects me to make a fundamental shift in our ministry's approach to child welfare.
- One critical way to put this commitment into action is to reunite Indigenous children and youth with their communities and their cultures...

Custom Adoption and role of Advisory Circle

- When it comes to Indigenous children in care, we are very grateful for the work of Grand Chief Ed John and his ideas about how government can improve outcomes for Indigenous children in care.
- Implementing an easier and more effective way for custom adoptions to be legally recognized by government was among the many important recommendations in Grand Chief Ed John's report.
- We have taken that recommendation to heart.
- We want to do it right and the only way to do it right is to make sure that the views of Indigenous communities are reflected – not only in our decisions, but in every step along the way.

- Your role is invaluable in helping us engage with Indigenous communities – your communities – in a culturally safe and appropriate way.
- We want to learn about the custom adoption practices and how we can help Indigenous children grow up within their traditional teachings and cultures.
- We want to understand what custom adoption looks like for the different communities.
- Working with you, and with Indigenous communities, will help us support children in ways that understand their past, honour their present and support their future.

Conclusion

- Having the opportunity to make things better is what motivates me both personally and as a minister.
- A child connected to their community and culture is a child growing in a safe, healthy and loving environment.
- That is my hope for Indigenous children.
- That is my hope for all children.
- I know you share that hope with me and I am grateful for your support on this journey towards positive change.

- Thank you, Orion, and good evening, everyone.
- Before I begin, I'd like to acknowledge that we are here tonight on the unceded territory of the Coast Salish peoples.
- As you know, we have a new government in this province. . . . and in a few weeks, we will launch our first full budget.
- One of our biggest goals is to make life more affordable for British Columbians.
- Affordability affects every aspect of people's lives and yet the crisis of affordability in B.C. has been getting worse – not better – for years.
- More than a third of British Columbians are only \$200 away from being unable to pay their monthly bills.

- ...and nearly half of British Columbians expect to go deeper into debt in order to pay their bills in 2018.
- That's why I'm here today to talk about a major cost facing young families.
- Child care costs some families more than their monthly rent.
- And rent's not cheap in British Columbia.
- Many families can't find licensed child care, even if they can afford it.
- And if they do find child care, it may not be licensed so they aren't always sure if it's a safe place to leave their little ones.
- This leaves a lot of parents choosing to stay home, even when they would rather be working.

- As the Premier has said, no parent should ever feel pressured, because of either a lack of available spaces or information, to go without licensed care when that is their preferred option.
- The Province is committed to making it easier for parents to check on the licensing status of their prospective child-care provider.
- This will also help ensure that child-care providers who are acting outside of their legal operating mandate – including those who are unlicensed – are identified and held accountable.
- As directed by the Premier, I can assure you that this important work is underway and will be featured in the upcoming legislative session.
- The lack of quality, affordable child care is a big part of what led me to seek office.
- Like too many parents, my husband and I couldn't find child care that made sense for our family.

- So we ended up cutting back on work and hitting pause on our shared financial goals.
- This doesn't just hurt families, it hurts businesses.
- Highly trained and skilled workers are staying home because they can't find affordable, quality child care in their communities.
- Last year the Vancouver Board of Trade named child care as one of their biggest priorities saying...
- "The high cost of child care hampers our province's affordability, makes it difficult for businesses to attract labour, and prevents many from entering the work force."
- That's why we will be taking major strides towards affordable, accessible, quality child care in the next budget.

- It's is about making life more affordable for British Columbians.
- And making our province a better place to do business.
- In my travels around the province, I've met with many parents.
- I've heard stories about their struggles to find child care they can depend on.
- Parents are giving up their jobs because they can't find a space for their child.
- I heard from a parent who put her child on more than a dozen wait lists before they were born...
- ... and has recently been told that a space may be available next year – a full two years after they first applied.

- This needs to change.
- And we are changing it starting with next budget.
- We aren't going to get there overnight.
- It will take up to ten years to create the kind of public child care supports parents are looking for.
- We have to train the workers to create the highquality early learning environment that our kids deserve.
- And we have to work with child care providers to expand the number of licensed spaces – so parents can feel confident their children are safe.
- Our health care system and our education system weren't built overnight – and our child care system will take time to build, too.

- We have to do it right and we have to do it quickly.
- Our first budget will deliver major action on child care – because it's a priority for families – and a priority for government.
- We're also in the process of finalizing an Early Learning and Child Care agreement with the federal government, this will accelerate and amplify provincial investments.
- I hope to be able to say more about that in the coming weeks.
- But I can tell you that every detail of our childcare plan is rooted in three fundamental principles...
- Accessibility, Affordability and Quality.

- We will deliver care that:
 - Improves outcomes for children
 - Supports child-care providers and those working in the child-care field
 - And leverages partnerships to deliver quality child care when and where parents need it.
- You'll hear more about the first three years of our plan on budget day.
