- Good morning I'd like to start by acknowledging that we are gathered on the traditional territory of the Musqueam (mus-kwee-um), Squamish, and Tsleilwaututh (sail-wha-tooth) peoples.
- Thank you Morgan Guerin of the Musqueam (muskwee-um) First Nation for the traditional welcoming.

Building for the Future

- We've come together today to talk about building for the future.
- Everyone in this room knows what it means to build something substantial and to invest valuable time and effort -- creating real opportunities for your community and the people you care about.
- That's what we're doing here in B.C.
- When we build major infrastructure, it's an opportunity to invest in communities.

- To provide real opportunities for people to further their career path, while supporting local economies.
- To train the next generation of workers.
- To do quality work that keeps communities running and people moving.

BC's Strong Economy

- Under John Horgan's BC NDP, British Columbia has Canada's strongest economy.
- Last year, 23,000 new jobs were created in this province.
- And our GDP is expected to grow by 2.4% this year.
- All good news for the province.
- To keep this momentum moving forward, we want to work in partnership with industry as we invest in the next generation of our provincial infrastructure.

 anyone can apply to work on the project, and any
 contractor is welcome to bid for work.
- For now, these agreements will apply to a select suite
 of infrastructure projects, including the Pattullo
 Bridge replacement project and some four-laning
 projects on the Trans-Canada Highway between
 Kamloops and Alberta.
