 Our government's new investments in housing affordability are strengthening local economies by creating over 54,000 new jobs for B.C. companies and skilled workers throughout the province.

Kamloops:

- \$4 million to ASK Wellness Society 40 homes for seniors
- \$11.2 million to CSI Centre for Seniors Information 112 homes for seniors, people with disabilities, and families
- \$4.7 million to Interior Community Services 47 homes for families and seniors
- 40 units of second-stage housing for women and children leaving violence (B.C. Govt. investment TBD)

Merritt:

•\$4 million to ASK Wellness Society - 40 homes for seniors

 Other Interior projects have been selected in Clearwater, Fernie, Keremeos, Nelson, Oliver, Salmon Arm, Sicamous and Trail

POST SECONDARY:

- In June, we announced investments in new trades equipment for the Nicola
 Valley Institute of Technology and Thompson Rivers University. Our strong
 economy and the technology driving it are rapidly evolving. Investing in
 students, skills and state-of-the-art training equipment at our province's post secondary institutions is a win-win.
- We have increased the provincial operating grant for Thompson Rivers University by more than 10% in the last decade to almost \$68 million.
- Recent support for TRU includes:
 - \$400,000 in start-up funding to increase tech seats and offer a full software-engineering degree program.
 - \$25.5 million towards the \$37 million student housing project.
 - \$8 million towards a \$37.2-million Nursing and Population Health Building that's under construction.
 - \$7 million towards a \$33-million Industrial Training and Technology Centre that's nearing construction completion
- Trades and technology workers are in high demand in B.C. We expect more than 100,000 tech-related job openings by 2028 and about 71,000 trades job openings in the next decade.
- An apprenticeship in the skilled trades is an important entry point to a longlasting, good career with opportunities around the province.

CHILD CARE:

Another big social and economic issue our government is addressing is access
to child care. If you don't have safe, affordable, reliable, child care for your
children, you're not able to participate in the labour market in the same way.

- Relief is available to thousands of B.C. parents through the Affordable Child Care Benefit, which the Province introduced in September 2018.
- The benefit, which is available to families with a yearly pre-tax household income of up to \$111,000, can save families up to \$15,000 a year, per child, on the cost of child care.
- We also launched the Child Care Fee Reduction Initiative in April 2018. It saves parents up to \$350/month per child attending licensed child care.
- 81 facilities in Kamloops have opted in to the fee reduction initiative to lower the cost of child care for families.
- Most recently, we launched the Universal Childcare BC Prototype Sites in November, which models low-cost, high-quality child care for B.C. families.
- Parents at these sites are paying a maximum of \$200 a month, per child.
- Families at the Kamloops Child Development Centre are now paying up to \$200 a month per child as part of the B.C. government's universal child care prototype project.
- The universal model will inform our next steps as we continue to implement our Childcare BC plan.

Main Message

- For two years, our government has harnessed a strong and stable economy by investing in British Columbians and practicing smart fiscal management.
- B.C.'s labour market is performing well, despite concerns from global market forces and trade disputes.
- In August, the unemployment rate in B.C. was 5%, the second-lowest in the country behind Quebec (4.7%)
- B.C.'s unemployment remains one of the lowest in Canada, showing we have a resilient economy and a strong workforce.
- In the past year, B.C. added 73,800 (+3.0%) more jobs in the province.
- The leading sectors in August include:
 - Professional, scientific and technical services, up 5.9% year over year to 227,100
 - o Educational services, up 9.6% year over year to 187,500
 - Agriculture, up 21.4% year over year to 27,100
- B.C. now has the fourth highest hourly wage in the country at \$27.54/hour, up nearly a dollar (\$0.98) from a year ago.
- However, B.C. is not an island when it comes to global market forces.
- We did see employment decrease by 8,300 last month (7,200 part time and 1,100 full time).
- And some sectors in B.C. are not feeling the benefits of the strong labour market and strong economy.

Good Morning,

Here are the Labour Force Survey Highlights for August 2019, and the briefing is attached:

- In August, employment decreased by 8,300 (-0.3%) in British Columbia to 2.56 million.
- There was a decrease of 7,200 in part-time employment and 1,100 in full-time employment.
- Year-over-year to August 2019, there are 73,800 (+3.0%) more people employed in British Columbia.
- The unemployment rate increased to 5.0% (+0.6 pct pts). British Columbia has the second lowest unemployment rate in Canada for behind Quebec (4.7%).
- Youth (age 15-24) employment increased by 3,000 in August and the youth unemployment rate increased to 9.4% (+0.2 pct pts).
 - PEI has the lowest youth unemployment in Canada at 8.5%, followed by Quebec (9.0%).
- Average hourly wages are down -\$0.05 from \$27.59 in July to \$27.54 in August, a decrease of -0.2% from the previous month.
- Year over year wages are up \$0.98, an increase of 3.7%. BC ranked 4th in year over year growth amongst the provinces, with Quebec leading at 5.1%.

Canada:

- Employment in Canada increased by 81,100 (+0.4%) in August with Ontario (+57,800) and Quebec (+19,700), leading the gains.
- The unemployment rate held steady 5.7%. The unemployment rate is 6% or lower for the 22nd month in a row in Canada.


Labour Force Survey




EMPLOYMENT GAINED/LOST (by Province)




AVERAGE HOURLY WAGE (by Province)

UNEMPLOYMENT RATE (by Province)




