Sarah. The letter looks great. On the GCPE messaging I've added a few lines in red and attached MDD SN and in text below. As for the contact on program info I don't think GCPE would work. I suggest Selina Basi – cc'd – who will be implementing the programs. Selina – we'd appreciate your thoughts. This letter is going out shortly after the announcement to 331 RDP applicants

- All of you here today are unfortunately all to aware of the challenges facing our Interior forestry sector.
- Those industry challenges have resulted in job losses for many workers in communities throughout the Interior.
- Our government has consistently said we are committed to supporting you and other Interior forestry workers dealing with job losses.
- Today, I'm here to let you know what that support looks like.
- We recognize the urgency of the situation, so our government is making more than \$69 million available to implement a new approach to worker, contractor and community transition.
- To do this, we are realigning our worker and community support programs and establishing capacity to ensure that workers like you have access to the services you need, from training to work placement to early retirement.
- Our new approach includes (1) job placement coordination, (2) cost shared support for incremental early retirement opportunities, (3) short-term work opportunity creation, (4) enhanced worker training and

- mental health support and (5) transition funding for communities to provide services to workers.
- This is for Interior forestry sector only, not the coastal sector.
- We are aware of the situation on the coast and are watching it closely, but for the time being these supports are for Interior mill workers only.

Job Placement Coordination:

- We have allocated \$2 million for a B.C. Interior Forest Industry Placement Coordination Office, which will:
- Provide fair and equitable treatment of workers impacted by permanent and indefinite closures, with a focus on individual worker needs and circumstances.
- Facilitate placement opportunities within and outside the forest sector.
- Ensure that workers are receiving needed support services – ranging from employee and family assistance programs delivered by your companies, tuition support for training programs, job search assistance and support for resume-writing services where needed.
- We are also calling on the federal government to add to the available funding, to make it accessible to more workers.

Early Retirement Bridging

- We have allocated \$40 million over two years toward a B.C. Interior Forest Industry Adjustment Program.
- Based on the early retirement coverage your employers are offering, our government will establish an early retirement bridging opportunity program for age-eligible workers impacted by a permanent or indefinite mill closure or for age-eligible workers whose position could be filled by an impacted worker from another facility.

Short-Term Work Opportunity Creation

- We are providing \$15 million to establish a new shortterm forest employment program, focused on fire prevention and community resiliency projects.
- My ministry is prioritizing forest enhancement and wildfire prevention initiatives that can offer interim employment for impacted workers and contractors.

Enhanced Worker Training and Mental Health Support

 A further \$12 million will be used to fund new worker training, and enhanced community mental health support programs.

Support for Communities

- We are also providing municipalities with funding to assist workers, families and businesses impacted by change.
- Municipalities impacted by a permanent closure will be eligible to receive immediate funds of \$100,000 and municipalities responding to a publicly-announced indefinite closure will be eligible to receive funds of \$75,000, where more than 1/3 of the workforce remains in need of permanent or temporary employment.
- Municipalities responding to a shift reduction will have access to a pool of funding to provide defined services for workers and families, based on identified need.





Parliamentary Secretary Ravi Kahlon - Post announcement narrative

I spent much of this past summer on the road in B.C. visiting forest dependent communities. Many of them are experiencing first-hand the serious challenges facing the forest industry.

They are on the front lines of this problem. I met with workers, industry and elected officials in many of the Interior communities impacted by permanent and indefinite mill closures. They talked to me about what was needed to support their workers and their communities.

It's a shame that the challenges these communities are facing today was predicted years ago. In fact, the previous government talked about the possibility of 10 or more mills shutting down due to the lack of fibre. And it's a failure of their government that they didn't take steps to help the industry transform and transition during their time in office.

This government is doing things very differently. We are committed to being there for impacted workers and their communities. Minister Donaldson and I have listened to what workers and communities have told us they need to help transition to a new vision for B.C.'s forest industry.

That's why this government has just announced \$69 million to fund a new series of measures aimed at supporting British Columbia forest workers impacted by mill closures and shift reductions in several B.C. Interior communities.

The funding being provided to enable resilient forest communities is a direct result of my discussions this past summer with the people who live and work in these Interior communities.

It will include \$40 million to establish a new cost-shared, early-retirement bridging program for older forest workers; \$15 million to establish a new short-term forest employment program, focused on fire prevention and community resiliency projects; \$12 million to fund new worker training, and enhanced community mental health support programs; \$2 million to establish a new job placement co-ordination office that will track the transition and employment of impacted forest workers on an individual basis; and

Now, I'm heading out back on the road to talk to forestry communities because I again want their input into how the \$69 million is used to best support them and workers and families in those communities.

Our government has taken real action, but not a day goes by that I am not thinking about the workers and communities who are being affected by these closures and curtailments and I want to again listen to what they have to say.

- Good morning, everybody, and thank you Mayor Hall.
- Respectfully, I want to acknowledge that we are on the traditional territory of the Lheidli T'enneh (clayt-clay den-ay) First Nations.
- All of you here today are unfortunately all to aware of the challenges facing our Interior forestry sector.
- Those industry challenges have resulted in job losses for many workers in communities throughout the Interior.
- Our government has consistently said we are committed to supporting you and other Interior forestry workers dealing with job losses.
- Today, I'm here to let you know what that support looks like.
- We recognize the urgency of the situation, so our government is making more than \$69 million available to implement a new approach to worker, contractor and community transition.
- To do this, we are realigning our worker and community support programs and establishing capacity to ensure that workers like you have access to the services you need, from training to work placement to early retirement.
- Our new approach includes (1) job placement coordination, (2) cost shared support for incremental early retirement opportunities, (3) short-term work opportunity creation, (4) enhanced worker training and mental health support and (5) transition funding for communities to provide services to workers.
- This is for Interior forestry sector only, not the coastal sector.
- We are aware of the situation on the coast and are watching it closely, but for the time being these supports are for Interior mill workers only.

Job Placement Coordination:

- We have allocated \$2 million for a B.C. Interior Forest Industry Placement Coordination Office, which will:
- Provide fair and equitable treatment of workers impacted by permanent and indefinite closures, with a focus on individual worker needs and circumstances.
- Facilitate placement opportunities within and outside the forest sector.
- Ensure that workers are receiving needed support services ranging from employee and family assistance programs delivered by your companies, tuition support for training programs, job search assistance and support for resume-writing services where needed.
- We are also calling on the federal government to add to the available funding, to make it accessible to more workers.

Early Retirement Bridging

- We have allocated \$40 million over two years toward a B.C. Interior Forest Industry Adjustment Program.
- Based on the early retirement coverage your employers are offering, our government will establish an early retirement bridging opportunity program for age-eligible workers impacted by a permanent or indefinite mill closure or for age-eligible workers whose position could be filled by an impacted worker from another facility.

Short-Term Work Opportunity Creation

- We are providing \$15 million to establish a new short-term forest employment program, focused on fire prevention and community resiliency projects.
- My ministry is prioritizing forest enhancement and wildfire prevention initiatives that can offer interim employment for impacted workers and contractors.

Enhanced Worker Training and Mental Health Support

• A further \$12 million will be used to fund new worker training, and enhanced community mental health support programs.

Support for Communities

- We are also providing municipalities with funding to assist workers, families and businesses impacted by change.
- Municipalities impacted by a permanent closure will be eligible to receive immediate funds of \$100,000 and municipalities responding to a publicly-announced indefinite closure will be eligible to receive funds of \$75,000, where more than 1/3 of the workforce remains in need of permanent or temporary employment.
- Municipalities responding to a shift reduction will have access to a pool of funding to provide defined services for workers and families, based on identified need.
- Additional funding will be available, including through the \$10 million Labour Market Partnerships Fund which helps municipalities transition to new economic opportunities and the Cooperative Marketing Funding Program for communities looking to further develop the tourism industry.

WHAT WE'RE ASKING INDUSTRY TO DO

- We are asking industry to stand with us and step up to support the worker programming I've outlined here. We want industry to be partners in this.
- Company approaches to closures and curtailments have varied, and we need to work together to create a uniform, fair and organized response those impacted by closures.
- I'm standing here today and asking all Interior forest companies to step up and throw your support behind these initiatives.

- Our government is committed to supporting the people impacted by this change, but we need to forest industry and the federal government to step-up and do their part as well.

<u>Event Context</u>: Government is providing \$69 million to support mill workers and contractors impacted by permanent and indefinite mill closures in the B.C. interior. The funds are aimed at addressing short-term challenges faced by impacted workers and the supports include:

- \$2M for a new job placement coordination office that will track the transition of and assist the re-employment of impacted forest workers on an individual basis;
- \$40M for a cost-shared early-retirement bridging program for older forest workers;
- \$15M for a short-term forest employment program focussed on fire prevention and community resiliency projects;
- \$10M for worker training and community mental health support programs; and
- Community support grants aimed at providing short term assistance to communities more profoundly impacted by the closure of a major forest employer.

Mill Closure/Curtailment Summary

- Currently, there are 24 mills that have adjusted their output through indefinite or temporary curtailments and shift reductions.
- There have been four permanent mill closures.
- More than 6,000 workers are being affected across 23 communities.

Mill closures and curtailments are primarily the result of impacts to timber supply as a result of the Mountain Pine Beetle (MPB) and related fire losses. The MPB outbreak in B.C. began in the early 2000's with impacts peaking in 2005. By 2012, MPB had killed 53% of merchantable pine forests in the B.C. Interior.

British Columbia's forest industry is facing difficult times. In the Interior, the end of the pine beetle cut, lower prices for lumber, and back-to-back catastrophic wildfire seasons have led to a number of sawmill closures. This has created hardship for workers and uncertainty for the communities that depend on forestry for their livelihoods.

For more than a decade, industry experts predicted the mountain pine beetle epidemic would result in multiple mill closures. Despite this, the previous government failed to take the necessary action to help workers, industry and communities adapt. This failure to act has compounded the difficulties forest workers and communities are facing today.

Mayor Lyn Hall has been an active member of the Prince George community for over 30 years. He and his wife Lorrelle are the parents of twin daughters, both of whom graduated from UNBC.

Hall began his political career as a School Trustee on the Prince George School Board. He spent 10 years on the board holding various positions including vice-chair and chair. In 2011, he ran and won a seat on Prince George City Council. In 2014 and 2018, he ran successful campaigns for Mayor of Prince George.



Mackenzie Mayor Joan Atkinson (TBD)

Joan moved to Mackenzie with her husband Jim and two sons in 1997; both sons and her husband work in the local forest industry. She professes to recognize the importance of maintaining a strong forest economy, said publicly that she is concerned with the current provincial forest model that puts her community's forest future at risk due to fibre supply and says her community is in crisis after three wood products operations closed in Mackenzie.

Joan, once recognized as Volunteer of the Year in her community, was acclaimed as mayor in 2018, but has been a member of council since 2007.



West Fraser CEO Ray Ferris (TBD)

Ray is a professional engineer and holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Engineering from the University of New Brunswick. He assumed the role of Pres/CEO of West Fraser as of July 1, 2019. Ray joined the company in 1997 and has served in several executive positions since on both the Alberta and B.C. operations.

West Fraser has more than 50 locations throughout B.C. and Alberta in Canada, and in Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama and Florida in the United States. B.C.'s operations currently account for 34 per cent of the company's total lumber capacity – 7.2 billion board feet – with Alberta supplying 23 per cent and the USA 43 per cent.

Government outlines new forest worker support programs

PRINCE GEORGE – The provincial government has announced \$69 million to fund a new series of measures aimed at supporting British Columbia forest workers impacted by mill closures and shift reductions in several B.C. Interior communities.

The Interior forest industry has been reducing production in an effort to adjust to the end of the mountain pine beetle harvest and the devastating 2017 and 2018 fire seasons.

"The previous government knew that the end of mountain pine beetle harvest would disrupt the lives of forest workers, contractors and communities, but they did little to prepare for this inevitable transition," said Premier John Horgan. "While the forest sector must reduce surplus milling capacity to remain competitive, it cannot do so at the expense of the workers, contractors and communities who built the industry. Our government will ensure that forest workers impacted by mill closures are supported."

Horgan and Doug Donaldson, Minister of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development, met with the chief executive officers of the major Interior forest companies to set out measures to support forest workers in the months and years ahead. Those measures include:

- \$40 million to establish a new cost-shared, early-retirement bridging program for older forest workers;
- \$15 million to establish a new short-term forest employment program, focused on fire prevention and community resiliency projects;
- \$12 million for workers to access skills training, and for employer and community grants for training;
- \$2 million to establish a new job placement co-ordination office that will track the transition and employment of impacted forest workers on an individual basis; and
- Community support grants aimed at providing short-term assistance to communities more profoundly impacted by the closure of a major forest employer.

"The Province is committed to supporting the people impacted by this change, but we need the forest industry and the federal government to step up and do their part as well," Donaldson said. "I'm hopeful that the Interior forest sector recognizes that the new industry that will arise from this transition will need skilled, experienced workers to produce new forest products that can compete in global markets."

Donaldson called on the forest industry to increase supports for impacted workers, ensure key corporate leaders are working on the industry transition and ensure that it does a better job of

communicating effectively with affected workers and communities.

"The forest industry and its workers have built the success of the industry and bolstered B.C.'s economy for decades," said Harry Bains, Minister of Labour. "I am pleased that my ministry can help deliver solutions that provide direct and tangible support to workers impacted by current challenges in the forest industry and that will help sustain family-supporting jobs in communities that are home to the industry and its workers."

For Immediate Release September 17, 2019

Burnaby, British Columbia -- The United Steelworkers is responding to the B.C. Government's announcement for forest workers impacted by mill closures and curtailments in the B.C. Interior.

"Any move to provide assistance to workers who are bearing the brunt of the crisis in the forest industry is welcomed, but permanent solutions for workers, families and communities throughout the entire province are needed," says Stephen Hunt, USW Director for western Canada. "A jobs protection commissioner would also go a long way to assisting mills, workers and communities facing closures all around the province."

"From the Coast to the Interior, every community in British Columbia is being impacted by mill closures and job losses and unless there are significant changes to forest policy the crisis will continue," says USW Wood Council Chair, Jeff Bromley. "The forest industry is critical to the economic well-being of thousands of workers, hundreds of communities and our entire province. This announcement helps right now, but we cannot give up on the industry in the future."

Key Messages:

4. Will this guarantee forestry workers new jobs?

- As a start, Hammond workers will have access to the same pool of training funds allocated for other transitioning forestry workers.
- We will continue to closely monitor the situation at Hammond and on the Coast more broadly, and address further program needs as they are identified.

- Change is never easy. There are no quick fixes. If we're going to find solutions that work for everyone, we need to roll up our sleeves and face up to the challenges together.

Support for Coastal Workers:

17. The funding is aimed at Interior forest workers. Will you be doing anything for impacted workers in the Coastal forestry sector?

- The situation in the Coastal forest sector is different from what is happening in the
 Interior. The issues in the interior are directly attributed to impacts from the mountainpine beetle. The situation in the interior has been anticipated and industry and the
 former government had known this was coming. The layoffs and impacts are
 widespread in the interior and many of the jobs that have been impacted will not come
 back.
- The situation on the coast is different, in that there is currently a curtailment, and an
 ongoing strike. The coast is undergoing a period of policy adjustment, and government
 staff continue to work closely with industry stakeholders to support them through this
 period. There is not the same period of industry rationalization occurring in that part of
 the sector. We will continue to watch the situation closely and take additional action as
 needed.
- The forest sector is facing serious international challenges, including a weakening of the U.S. housing market, and unfair, unjust duties being applied to British Columbian forest products at the border.
- We are working towards solutions that will see the long-term success of the Coast forest sector, including encouraging greater partnerships between forest tenure holders, pulp and paper manufacturers and salvagers to move more fibre into pulp and paper manufacturing.
- We've also revised log export rules to continue support for communities, workers and companies who want to harvest fibre from uneconomical areas, and bringing in two legislative changes that reflect the objective to increase public confidence in forest management activities and the sector.

18. If coastal forest workers are not eligible, what supports are you providing for the workers like the ones in Maple Ridge who were recently laid off?

- We will coordinate with WorkBC around job placement assistance, ensure that workers are linked with the government services they need, and ensure that workers are assisted as necessary with resume development for those that have not needed a resume in many years.
- The Hammond closure announcement was very recent and it is not yet known what supports or assistance might be required to help transition workers.

- As a start, Hammond workers will have access to the same pool of training funds allocated for other transitioning forestry workers.
- We will continue to closely monitor the situation at Hammond and on the coast more broadly, and address further program needs as they are identified.

General

19. What is your response to Parliamentary Secretary Kahlon saying there are "too many mills" in BC?

- I'm not surprised that the Opposition would take his comments completely out of context, but I find it disappointing.
- Especially since when the Opposition was in government, years ago, they were warned very clearly about fibre shortages and how it would cause mill shutdowns, yet they failed to act.
- We are taking a different approach. We are bringing together industry, labour, First Nations and communities to strengthen our forest-dependent communities.
- And our approach is focused on making sure supports are in place for workers and their families that's what we've been doing and what we'll continue to do.

20. Didn't the Opposition call on your government to act on some of the supports you're announcing back in June? Why did you wait until September to act?

- When it comes to the challenges facing the forest sector, it has always been the top
 priority of our government to put workers and their families first.
- That's why we've been working hard with all our partners to get forestry workers the help they need during this difficult time.
- For instance, our government is leading community transition responses for people who live in communities that are experiencing significant job losses.
- The supports for workers we're announcing today is a continuation and expansion of our efforts. We will continue to work with all our partners to support workers and their families.

21. What are your thoughts on COFI's report released yesterday outlining 60 recommendations to help the forest industry adjust to the current economic problems?

- We're glad they have made some proposals to renew the forest industry and look forward to getting some detailed analysis about their effectiveness and feasibility.
- We appreciate and agree that working together we can forge a bright future for the sector.

> · For closures in larger urban areas like Maple Ridge, support services are available immediately from the Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction, WorkBC and Service Canada. We also have FLNRO's Regional Economic Development Manager contact the local governments economic development office to offer assistance. This has been done for Maple Ridge.
> 1. What are your thoughts on COFI's report released yesterday outlining 60 recommendations to help the forest industry adjust to the current economic problems? >
> * Interestingly, COFI's report doesn't highlight what they, or their member companies, will start taking the lead on. We all know the forest sector is facing difficult times.
> * Our Ministry has been engaging for two months with many people and organizations in the forest sector. COFI has yet to share any concrete ideas with us through this engagement process despite having attended several of the inperson sessions.
> * For example, as part of the Interior Forest Sector Renewal initiative, the Premier challenged company CEO's to form a TSA coalition with other community leaders, First Nations, labour leaders and recommend what forest policy changes are required to transition to a place where we have a competitive forest sector, increased First Nations involvement, community resilience and maintain our stewardship practices. So far there have been only a few applications, and none have obtained the agreement from all sectors mentioned above.
