## • BCH provided background:

The 13-bed shelter at 1660 Columbia Ave. in Castlegar will be closing after March 31, 2023. Castlegar District Community Services Society and BC Housing do not take this decision lightly and we recognize that this will have an impact on the community as there is no other shelter in Castlegar at this time. The shelter was always meant to be temporary and is closing because the building and location are not suitable or safe for long-term use.

We are working with shelter guests to provide resources and information to access services from other community partners. The Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction has community integration specialists in the community as an additional resource for people experiencing homelessness.

BC Housing never wants to see anyone left without a safe and secure place to stay, which is why we are working with the City of Castlegar and our non-profit partners to find a location for a year-round shelter. We will update the community once more information is available to share.

We also realize that shelters are not a long-term solution to homelessness, which is why we are working in partnership to deliver new affordable homes for a range of people in need in

communities throughout the province. Through provincial investments since 2017, there are more than 40,000 homes open or underway in B.C., including 80 homes in the West Kootenay region.

• BCH provided background:

BC Housing, Our Place Society, and the Alliance to End Homelessness in the Capital Region (formerly the Greater Victoria Coalition to End Homelessness) requested the City of Victoria to extend the operating licence for Tiny Home Village to September 30, 2023. The request for an extension will be discussed tonight at City Council.

Since May 2021, this Tiny Homes Village has offered safe and warm conditions to our community's most vulnerable people while BC Housing builds permanent supportive homes in the region. While many building projects are nearing completion, industry-wide construction delays have caused need for this extension. Homes with supports, like Tiny Home Village, remain essential in supporting people at-risk of, or experiencing homelessness in Victoria.

Together, BC Housing and our partners are committed to ensuring Tiny Home Village's residents are positively integrated into their community. We will be reaching out to the City of Victoria after tonight's council meeting to discuss how we can move forward together.

Response from BC Housing

The Portland Hotel elevator system was returned to full service on Feb. 7. BC Housing and PHS are both monitoring the system for any further issues, and will address any that may arise as quickly as possible.

BC Housing works closely with its partners to ensure that any and all building repairs are completed in a timely manner, with as minimal disruption to residents as possible. In the long-term, BC Housing has also elected to fully modernize the elevator beyond its most recent repairs to ensure its longevity well into the future.

BC Housing offered to relocate all tenants with mobility challenges, with most accepting. Some remaining tenants elected not to move, and were therefore not relocated by BC Housing. BC Housing continues to work with PHS closely and remains ready to assist any additional tenants interested in relocating.

Questions involving the tenant protest would be better addressed by PHS, which operates the Portland Hotel.
