He has the names & numbers of the local RCMP agents and I gave John Stark from the RCMP your name as the BC lead (his cell 604-861-2752). Both Judy and Mary Jordan have been informed. Some general comments below.

Agents of concern: HIV, HCV, HBV, Mycobacterium Tuberculosis, parasites, prions (extremely remote)

Fully cooked meat products: the risk is zero (or as close to zero as imaginable)

Partially cooked meats: (e.g., rare steak) the risk is close to zero as all viruses and most other microbial agents are very heat sensitive and digestive enzymes destroy most infectious agents. Ingestion is not an effective way to transmit these infections.

Raw meats: (steak tartar) the risk is extremely low as the digestive enzymes destroy most infectious agents and ingestion is not an effective way to transmit these infections.

Public risk is extremely low.

Shaun the list is very comprehensive. Items 1 to 5 should be reported by the RCMP based on what information they have or feel is appropriate to divulge. Would probably distinguish cooked vs uncooked risks as with cooking the risks are virtually eliminated. For CJD, would change that to what is the risk of CJD in the population (approx 1:500,000 or less and it usually occurs in older people) therefore risk in a younger person is virtually zero hence transmission risk close to zero. As we discussed the info on the samples we are about to obtain and test may not reflect what might have been in other products produced at the farm over the years. As you know many human agents will not propagate in pigs (if fed human matter) tuberculosis might, as might some parasites if in the right form, but the risks are very small. The non-approved porcine slaughter production might have placed persons at risk of porcine infections.

Close but...working within a designated meat inspection area does not involve CFIA. The current Meat Inspection Act and regulation are provincial statutes and set out our "domestic" meat inspection system. In Mr. Picton's case if he could demonstrate that he felf under (a) and was not selling commercially within the province, he would not have been considered illegal. At this stage, we are not clear on that status.

Restriction on slaughter

- 2 In areas established to control the slaughter of animals, a person must not slaughter an animal unless the person is
- (a) a genuine farmer slaughtering the person's own animals on the person's own premises, or
- (b) licensed under this Act or registered under the *Meat Inspection Act* (Canada) or any other meat inspection service approved by the minister.

The Pitt Meadows plant however is a federally inspected plant that apparently received live animals from the farm.

Further information.

Although the RCMP informed me that they had no evidence that meat product from the farm entered the commercial market, I understand from Larry Copeland at BCCDC that on occasion live pigs were shipped to slaughter at the Pitt Meadows plant and the meat subsequently shipped out from there, and pork product was sold to Chinese restaurateurs in Vancouver as well as donated to Food banks in Vancouver.

Also Picton operated within a designated meat inspection area, which meant he should have been inspected by the CFIA, but was operating illegally.

Issue- By the end of the week commencing March 8th, RCMP will be informing the public that there is some risk to human health associated with meat packaged by and left over from, the Pickton Farm.

The RCMP are primarily seeking to recover meat from the farm for evidentiary purposes.

They have found human DNA traces in samples of meat from the farm.

Background- RCMP called Dr Mike Rekart at BCCDC about 1 month ago with a query about the transmissibility of human viral pathogens (HIV) through consumption off human flesh. Dr's Rekart and Krajden assessed the risk from cooked pork (a meat which is usually well cooked) as very remote.

On Friday Mar 5th RCMP contacted BCCDC with information that they were preparing to notify 30-40 associates of the Pickton Farm which had received meat from the farm, of the possibility that this meat was contaminated with Human remains.

BCCDC informed the PHO of this and also contacted Health Canada for technical risk assessment.

Further discussions with the RCMP have clarified that the RCMP WILL NEITHER confirm nor deny that human DNA has been found in the meat from the farm. Rather they will position this as a human health concern.

It is possible that the health concern is a stratagem to recover additional meat for evidentiary purposes.

While the RCMP will neither confirm nor deny that human DNA is present in meat distributed for human consumption, this will likely become the focus of media enquiry and speculation.

Issues- 1- Risk to human health.

The slaughter house facilities at the farm were unlicensed and unregulated and operated with scant regard to hygienic processes. Pickton is reported to have purchased sick pigs for slaughter.

There would have been risks to human health from parasites (Tapeworm) and infectious agents (Ecoli, salmonella etc). It is doubtful that meat frozen for two years poses much of a hazard.

Agents potentially implicated in human to human transmission-

Bacteria-TB, Syphilis

Viral- HIV, HCV, HBV

Prion disease.

For cooked meat all agents pose an extremely remote risk-approaching zero.

For meat consumed raw- risk of HBV infection is a theoretical risk of 1-3/100,000 (Dr Antonio Guilivi HC risk assessment).

Freezing would again presumably reduce risk from meat still in freezers.

Past exposure is more problematic.

Psychological distress is likely to result from learning that one may inadvertently have consumed human remains.

Time frame of exposure

RCMP have identified DNA in frozen meat from a farm meat locker from one victim s.22

Operations at the farm ceased in 2002. Activity involving disposal of missing women may have predated 1997

Scope of exposure

RCMP have no evidence that contaminated meat entered any commercial establishment. However Mr Pickton did distribute meat products to 30-40 associates.

In addition the Pickton Farm was the site of numerous open-invitation BBQ's.

Laboratory work

BCCDC will work with NML and CFIA to identify best location to test meat for pathogens. NOTE-neither negative nor positive findings will alter the risk assessment (as no tests are standardized for human pathogens in meat). Testing will be conducted for "due diligence" processes.

Legal issues

Information pertaining to this case is subject to a publication ban.

Communications

BC Ministry of Health will seek to coordinate communications strategies with the RCMP. This may present problems in terms of who can say what about human contamination. It is anticipated that shortly after the RCMP contact the Pickton Farm associates that this will become a media event.

Key messages are that risk to human health from infection is extremely remote.

We are considering establishing a line for public enquiries related to health through the BC Nurse Line. Anxious individuals will be referred to their physicians for follow up.

Health Canada officials have been involved in developing the risk assessment. It is recommended that they be cited as background.

At this point it is not determined whether this will be a joint RCMP/health release or RCMP with health responding later.

A further teleconference between Ministry, HC, BCCDC and RCMP has been scheduled for Wednesday Mar 10th at 8am PST.

I think those are the main questions Shaun.

I think we will obviously be concerned throughout to use language that will not exacerbate the grief suffered by the victims families, though the situation is so horrific the grief can't help but be compounded.

I wonder if we should, for all our discussions and draft documents and if speaking publicly, never use the term "meat" in relation to the human remains of the victims. I think your use of the word "human remains" is perhaps the best, and we use that term solely, or perhaps refer at times as necessary to "muscle tissue" of the human remains.

It just strikes me the term "meat" has too many pejorative connotations. We might want to reserve it for use with "animal meats, such as pork".

On the questions related to specific diseases, I assume we would sort out ahead of time which disease agents if any, might be in the human remains-muscle tissue, And also have a theoretical risk of transmission, from consumption.

I would assume the theoretical risk, albeit exceedingly small, would primarily be for the blood-born pathogens (hep B and HIV; other) if the consumed item was undercooked, and via potential oral mucosa lesions.

So there may be some diseases that we don't have to explicitly address, if we decide there is no risk (such as TB - but perhaps my knowledge is inadequate).

Lagree for questions 19 and 20, we need to sort out who people are calling (only the BC nurseline?) and who are they able to get testing from (only from their family physician or physician they select).

The other questions are;

- 1. is Public Health going to be told (mandatory or voluntary) of the "Picton" connection by the GPs, for anyone testing positive for one of the diseases that we may present some risk?
- 2. what follow-up occurs with anyone who says they were exposed, and subsequently test positive, for one of the diseases we said might be of concern?
- 3. is there any way (epidemiologically, or by lab testing) to prove definitively one way or the other that a given persons infection, was or was not due to consumption of Picton-related human remains?
- 4. individuals may come forward immediately, already knowing they are HIV or hep B positive, and claim to have be exposed and therefore got their infection from Picton exposure. (whether or not they have or admit to other higher risk and more likely risk exposures). How do we deal with them?

We will need to get a province-wide Physician Bulletin out immediately on announcement, if we are referring concerned individuals to physicians for testing.

I am sure we will all come up with additional thoughts and questions, as we discuss this more.

Meat Inspection/Pickton Farm Investigation

KEY FACTS REGARDING THE ISSUE:

- The RCMP are consulting with Health Canada, the BC Centre for Disease Control and the Provincial Health Officer regarding human health risks associated with meat slaughtering/processing activity on the former Pickton farm.
- RCMP initially approached BCCDC approximately one month ago, to inquire about the theoretical human health risk of
 consuming meat products from the farm-describing the condition of the slaughter house as 'deplorable'.
- Health officials say potential health risks related to consumption of pork products from a farm operating without regard
 to appropriate hygiene measures would include: parasites (tapeworm) and infections agents such as e-coli and
 salmonella. However, BCCDC officials no measurable risk of disease transmission based on the fact pork products
 are typically well cooked and this is known to effectively destroy most infectious agents. However a more formal risk
 assessment is underway and further testing of meat samples will be undertaken to identify any disease pathogens.
- RCMP are planning to hold a press conference later this week to appeal to those people who may still have meat products that originated on the farm, to provide those products to the RCMP.
- RCMP have identified between 30-40 known recipients of meat processed at the farm, though they believe it may have
 also been distributed to others in the community.
- Officials at BCCDC have confirmed from RCMP that on occasion live pigs were shipped to slaughter at the Pitt Meadows plant (a federally regulated slaughterhouse) and the meat was subsequently shipped out from there.

MEAT INSPECTION ISSUES:

- The Pickton farm was not a licensed meat processing facility, but was operating in a designated Meat Inspection Area
 which would have required that it be licensed under the Meat Inspection Act.
- Currently, most meat (95 to 98 per cent) sold in B.C. is inspected, however, much of that is imported from other
 provinces and subject to federal inspection. In smaller communities where inspections are not mandatory, the
 percentage of non-inspected meat could be much higher.
- Fifteen abattoirs in B.C. are licensed under the regulations and undergo veterinary inspections. A survey by health
 authorities identified 38 non-licensed meat processing plants where inspections are not required.
- In non-inspection areas, health authorities are responsible for plant and facility inspections under B.C.'s slaughterhouse regulations. Because they are not animal inspections, these inspections meet a different standard from those applied under the meat inspection regulation.
- The province has responsibility for inspecting meat produced and distributed within B.C., most of which is not sold in larger or chain stores.
- The Ministry of Health Services is actively working on improving meat inspection procedures and has developed new draft meat inspection regulations.
- Consultation began last fall when the Ministers of Health Services and Agriculture, Food and Fisheries requested feedback from B.C.'s food animal industry on how to implement the draft regulation.
- The regulation, falls under the new Food Safety Act passed in 2002 and will result in a uniform meat inspection system.

BENEFITS FROM POSITION TAKEN:

 The public should be assured there is ano evidence of any disease transmission related to people who may have consumed products from the farm and the risk to human health is extremely remote.

ADVICE AND RECOMMENDED RESPONSE:

- The Provincial Health Officer, the BC Centre for Disease Control, and officials with Health Canada are working cooperatively with the RCMP to assess any public health issues related to meat products processed at the farm.
- The public should be assured there is no evidence of any disease transmission related to people who may have consumed products from the farm and the risk to human health is extremely remote.
- If people have specific questions or concerns, they can contact the BC Nurseline or their family physician.
- We recognize the sensitivity around these matters and the emotional impact of raising these issues for the families of the victims and the community at large.
- We also appreciate these issues are tied to an ongoing police investigation, so any other
 questions should be directed to the RCMP or the Solicitor General.

MEAT INSPECTION ISSUES:

- Our government is committed to ensuring British Columbians have confidence in the continued safety of the food supply.
- It is because we recognized inconsistencies in meat inspection practices that we passed the new Food Safety Act in 2002 – and developed new draft regulations to strengthen public confidence.
- Ministry of Health Services staff are reviewing input from stakeholders around the specific regulations and we hope to implement the new rules shortly.
- In the interim, if people had concerns about a specific meat processing facility in the province – they should contact their local health authority – and those concerns would be investigated.

STRATEGIC LINKAGES:

 PROVINCIAL HEALTH OFFICER IS MANDATED TO WORK WITH THE B.C. CENTRE FOR DISEASE CONTROL AND THE PROVINCIAL MEDICAL HEALTH OFFICERS TO FULFILL THEIR LEGISLATED HEALTH PROTECTION AND DISEASE CONTROL MANDATES.

Picton Farm Food sale and distribution

We appreciate that this issue may give rise to widespread public disgust and concern because of human remains may have been consumed by the public in British Columbia arising from the Picton Farm.

Any public advise should be prefaced by sympathy for those who may have consumed human remains but more importantly for the relatives of the victims who are the subject of the ongoing murder investigation.

Questions:

- 1. Q. What food items sold or distributed from the Picton farm are of potential concern for human health?
 - A. Any food that has been eaten uncooked or partially cooked is of potential concern. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.
- 2. Q. What food was sold or distributed from the Picton farm?
 - A. The RCMP will provide details of what animal or human food products are believed to have been sold or distributed from the Picton farm. We have been informed that human DNA was identified in 2 out of 11 specimens found in a freezer raising the question that human remains may have been offered for sale or for human consumption.

We are aware that live pigs from the Pickton farm were shipped to a Pitt Meadows plant for slaughter. We have been told that a pork product was sold to Chineese Restaurantuers in Vancouver and distributed to food banks.

Mr Picton is alleged to have distributed meat products to 30-40 associates.

The Picton farm was the site of numerous open invitation BBQs.

- 3. Q. How was the food sold or distributed?
 - A. There were public Barbeques held in a barn on the site. It is possible that the food was sold or distributed off the site.
 - 4. Q. Over what period of time was the food sold or distributed?
 - A. It appears to have been over a ten year period till at least 1997 (7 years ago).
 - 5. Q. How do we know that some of the food may have been human remains?
 - A. The RCMP will provide specifics. Testing has shown that some specimens that were in a freezer that were expected to be sold as food was in fact human remains.
 - 6. Q. What concerns are there for human health from eating human remains?
 - A. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.

If the food is not cooked there is a potential for transmission of some infections such as HIV, Hepatitis A and B, Syphilis, Creutzfeld Jacob disease. The risk however for all these infections is considered to be very low since most of what we know of the risk relates to eating fresh food that has been contaminated.

- 7. Q. What diseases can be transmitted from eating pork?
 - A. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.

Some parasites e.g.....

- 8. Q. Does adequate cooking of remains (human or other) prevent the transmission of food born illness?
 - Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.
- 9. Q. Does normal digestion kill infectious agents.
 - A. Stomach acid and other digestive juices kill most infectious agents that have not been killed by adequate cooking of food.
- 10. Q. What is the risk of acquiring HIV from eating human remains that was infected with HIV?
 - A. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.

It is very low except for fresh food that may have been recently contaminated.

- 11. Q. What is the risk of acquiring Hepatitis B from eating human remains that was infected with Hepatitis B?
 - A. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.

It very low unless the remains is eaten fresh – Hepatitis B has been known to be transmitted from food containing fresh blood.

- 12. Q. What is the risk of acquiring Syphilis from eating human remains that was infected with Syphilis?
 - A. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.

13. Q. What is the risk of acquiring TB from eating human remains that was infected with TB?

A. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.

- 14. Q. What is the risk of acquiring Creutzfeld Jacob Disease (CJD) from eating human remains from a person that had CJD?
 - a. CJD is caused by a prion (protein like substance), It is an exceptionally rare disease (1:1 Million Population). In Europe a new form of CJD known as New Variant CJD or nvCJD has been attributed the prion that causes Mad Cow Disease or Bovine Spongiform Encephalitis. This prion has been identified in humans. The risk of humans acquiring CJD or nvCJD in Canada from whatever the source of the remains is virtually zero.
- 15. Q. What infections may have been present in human remains on the Picton Farm?
 - A. From what has been reported by the RCMP it is possible that the human remains could have been infected with HIV, Hepatitis A and B and Syphilis.
- 16. Q. Do we have information from laboratory tests as to what infections the human remains may have?

- 17. Q. If human remains was fed to pigs could diseases be transmitted to humans who ate the pork?
 - A. It is virtually unknown for infectious diseases to be spread from animal food products to humans. This is because the normal digestive process in an animal kills microorganisms.
- 18. Q. If someone has eaten remains that has come from the Picton farm should they be tested?

- a. We are not recommending any special testing at this time. If someone has a special concern they should contact the BC Nurse line at 1-866-215-4700 in Greater Vancouver 1-604-215- 4700. The Nurse line will be provided with any updates as they become available.
- 19. Q. If someone has eaten remains that has come from the Picton farm should they seek medical advice?

Subject: Pickton Farm Food sale and distribution

This issue may give rise to widespread public concern because of information provided by the RCMP Missing Womens Task Force.

Any public advice should be prefaced by sympathy for relatives of the missing women and anyone concerned about this investigation.

(The information in this document is for Public Health Officials, to inform decision making and is intended to discover as many of the facts that are known to the Provincial Health Officer. The document may be used in the future to create suitable messaging for the BC Nurse Line and for Public Communications. Because some information known to the RCMP is subject to criminal court proceedings it may not be legal to publicize the information that has been provided to the Provincial Health Officer. Some information is subject to court declared ban on publication).

The following is from the Health Act:

- (2) The Provincial health officer must monitor the health of the people of British Columbia and provide to the people of British Columbia information and analyses on health issues.
- (3) If the Provincial health officer considers that the interests of the people of British Columbia are best served by making a report to the public on health issues in British Columbia, or on the need for legislation or a change of policy or practice respecting health in British Columbia, the Provincial health officer must make that report in the manner the Provincial health officer considers most appropriate.

Provincial health officer as a witness

5 The Provincial health officer must not, insofar as the laws of British Columbia apply, give or be compelled to give evidence in a court or in proceedings of a

judicial nature concerning knowledge gained in the exercise of a power or duty under this Act.

(note: the matter before the court is the subject of Federal Law - the Criminal Code).

Immunity

- 6 (1) No action for damages lies or may be brought against the Provincial health officer because of anything done or omitted in good faith
 - (a) in the performance or purported performance of any duty under this Act, or
 - (b) in the exercise or purported exercise of any power under this Act.
- (2) Subsection (1) does not absolve the government from vicarious liability for an act or omission for which it would be vicariously liable if this section were not in force.

Questions:

- 1. Q. What food was sold or distributed from the Pickton farm? What food items sold or distributed from the Pickton farm are of potential concern for human health?
 - A. Pork meat was sold and distributed from the farm. The RCMP have informed the Provincial Health Officer there is a likely health concern with the meat. Any food that has been eaten uncooked or partially cooked is of potential concern. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.
 - B. The RCMP will provide details of what animal or human food products are believed to have been sold or distributed from the Pickton farm. We have been informed that human DNA was identified in 2 out of 11 specimens found in a freezer raising the question that human remains may have been offered for sale or for human consumption.

We are aware that live pigs from the Pickton farm were shipped to a Pitt Meadows plant for slaughter. We have been told that a pork product was sold to Chinese Restaurateurs in Vancouver and distributed to food banks. We have been unable to confirm at this time that this occurred.

Mr Pickton is alleged to have distributed meat products to 30-40 associates.

We have been informed that the Pickton farm was the site of numerous open invitation BBQs.

- 3. Q. How was the food sold or distributed?
 - A. There were public Barbeques held in a barn on the site. It is possible that the food was sold or distributed off the site. (see above).
 - 4. Q. Over what period of time was the food sold or distributed?
 - A. It appears to have been over a ten year period till at least February 2002 (2 years ago).
 - 5. Q. How do we know that some of the food may have been human remains?
 - A. The RCMP will provide specifics. Testing has shown that some specimens that were in a freezer that were expected to be sold as food did in fact test positive for human tissue.
 - 6. Q. What concerns are there for human health from eating human remains? Are some cuts/portions of meat more susceptible to contamination than others?
 - A. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.

If the food is not cooked there is a potential for transmission of some infections such as HIV, Hepatitis A and B, Syphilis, Creutzfeld Jacob disease. The risk however

for all these infections is considered to be very low since most of what we know of the risk relates to eating fresh food that has been contaminated.

Cuts of meat can be contaminated during the food preparation process and in the slaughtering process.

- 7. Q. What diseases can be transmitted from eating pork?
 - A. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.

Pork meat is considered to be very safe to eat when cooked, whatever the diet of the pigs. In Canada parasites such as Taenia and Trichinella are exceptionally rare. Specimens of food are being tested for Tissue parasites.

- 8. Q. Does adequate cooking of remains (human or other) prevent the transmission of food born illness?
 - a. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.
- 9. Q. Does normal digestion kill infectious agents.
 - A. Stomach acid and other digestive juices kill most infectious agents that have not been killed by adequate cooking of food.
 - B. Pigs have a very effective digestive system that enables them to eat all sorts of infected material but the pork once slaughtered and adequately cooked is risk free.
- 10. Q. What is the risk of acquiring HIV from eating human remains that was infected with HIV?

A. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.

It is very low except for fresh food that may have been recently contaminated.

- 11. Q. What is the risk of acquiring Hepatitis B from eating human remains that was infected with Hepatitis B?
 - A. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.

It very low unless the remains is eaten fresh – Hepatitis B has been known to be transmitted from food containing fresh blood.

- 12. Q. What is the risk of acquiring Syphilis from eating human remains that was infected with Syphilis?
 - A. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.

13. Q. What is the risk of acquiring TB from eating human remains that was infected with TB?

A. Adequate cooking kills microorganisms that cause human illness.

- 14. Q. What is the risk of acquiring Creutzfeld Jacob Disease (CJD) from eating human remains from a person that had CJD?
 - a. CJD is caused by a prion (protein like substance). It is an exceptionally rare disease (1:1 Million Population). In Europe a new form of CJD known as New Variant CJD or nvCJD has been attributed the prion that causes Mad Cow Disease or Bovine Spongiform Encephalitis. This prion has been identified in humans. The risk of humans

acquiring CJD or nvCJD in Canada from whatever the source of the remains is virtually zero.

15. Q. What infections may have been present in human remains on the Pickton Farm?

A. From what has been reported by the RCMP it is possible that the human remains could have been infected with HIV, Hepatitis A and B and Syphilis.

16. Q. Do we have information from laboratory tests as to what infections the human remains may have?

A. ?????

17. Q. If human remains was fed to pigs could diseases be transmitted to humans who ate the pork?

A. It is virtually unknown for infectious diseases to be spread from animal food products to humans. This is because the normal digestive process in an animal kills microorganisms.

An update to earlier emails: The CFIA press release is currently due to be released this afternoon. It confirms that a **high pathogenicity H7N3** virus was found in the 2nd (younger) poultry flock on the Fraser Valley Farm. They have **not** found H7N1 on this farm. The determination of a high path H7N3 is somewhat less troublesome than the earlier information indicating that two completely different strains had been identified on the same farm.

The CFIA believes that the virus mutated while on the farm, changing from low pathogenicity (in the older flock) to high pathogenicity. According to the CFIA press release, this is "not unheard of but is rare."

The press release is also going to announce that CFIA "has quarantined a second farm where a low level of illness appears to exist among some of the birds. Testing is currently underway." Preliminary testing -- not yet public -- indicates that this illness is avian influenza.

Here's a bit more local information that may help. I'm going on my knowledge of the missing women, which is that virtually all were injecting drug using sex trade workers abducted from the Downtown Eastside. On that basis, the following information comes from a population based cohort in this population:

- HCV prevalence about 70%
- HIV prevalence about 30%
- PPD reativity (current or previously demonstrated) 24%
- Active TB rate about 0.5 per 100 person years
- HBV SAg carriage is still pretty rare 3-5%

I don't think any of this changes your overall conclusion of diminishingly low risk.

Stuart please accept this as a confidential, urgent request for information that has been requested by Dr. Perry Kendall, Provincial Heath Officer to support public health assessment in regards to the Pickton matter. This information is urgently required for a meeting tomorrow afternoon. Any and all responses would be appreciated before noon tomorrow.

It has emerged from the Pickton investigation that a significant number of animals were potentially received at the farm, and live animals were shipped to Pitt Meadow Meats for slaughter. This poses concern that animals that were potentially fed human remains may have entered the commercial food chain, provincially, nationally and perhaps internationally. The following questions are of vital importance to developing responses to potential questions that may be posed to Public Health Authorities.

- -are there any CFIA or Agriculture records as to how many animals that were purchased by Mr. Pickton and shipped to the farm.
- was a feed licence issued and subsequently revoked for the farm by either the CFIA or Agriculture Canada. If so when was the licence issued/revoked, and on what grounds was it revoked. What follow up actions were undertaken to resolve concerns/violations at the farm.
- were pigs from the Pickton Farm received at Pitt Meadows Meats, if so how many times/dates and how many animals were received at these times.
- were the animals accepted for slaughter, and how many were either passed or rejected.
- was there any evidence of the animals being sick/in ill health. Was there any consideration given to inspecting the farm to investigate poor farm practises based on ill health of the animals.

BCCDC officials have added the risk to human health for those who consumed the products is extremely remote, based on the fact most pork products are typically well cooked, which is known to effectively destroy most infectious agents. However, Dr. Kendall says under the circumstances, he has an obligation to the public under the Health Act to ensure those products are not consumed.

The RCMP have evidence that some products were handed out by Mr. Pickton to friends and acquaintances in and around the Lower Mainland, prior to his arrest in February 2002. The alert is focused on these individuals.

Dave Currie - Hlegal slaughtering complaint

July 19, 1995 Received a complaint with respect to illegal slaughtering of animals at

Original complaint was regarding trucks being-used to transport five animals to the property for slaughtering.

July 20, 1995 - Inderject Gill and Dave Currie went to the property, but did not go onto the property and did not observe any animals in the grazing area.

July 21, 1995 Dave Currie went back to the site and walked on the adjacent property around the farm land and did not observe any animals.

July 26, 1995 - Dave Currie met with Kier Cordner and Inderject Gill in office.

August 1, 2004 - Dave Currie spent most of morning on adjacent property observing the Picton farm and there were a couple of horses in the field, no other animals outside were observed. No sounds that would indication slaughtering.

August 2, 1995 - Dave Currie observed dirt trucks coming and going.

August 3, 1995 – Kier Cordner and Dave Currie went back to the property and observed for a period of time. Later they entered the property and identified themselves and spoke with Willie Picton at the barn and explained the nature of the complaint regarding illegal slaughtering. He voluntarily invited the Dave and Keir to inspect the property. They only observed one penned animal (a large pig) and no visible signs of a slaughter operation. The entire area was extremely clean. A walk in cooler was empty and clean and did not appear to be in operation.

There was also a chest freezer that was empty and clean and also not in operation.

August 4, 1995 Dave Currie returned and observed from an adjacent property and did not find any evidence of slaughtering.

August 9, 1995 Dave Currie returned and still did not find any evidence of slaughtering.

I have spoken to Jeet and his recollection confirmed Dave's log entries that there was no evidence to confirm the complaint.

We may get calls tonight related to news that contaminated food products (pork) were distributed from the Pickton farm at some point prior to his arrest 2 years ago.

The Ministry of Health is preparing an official press release in response that we will provide to you as soon as it is available.

The two main issues we may need to address are:

- 1. Symptom calls related to contamination of food products (food poisoning concerns)
- 2. The issue of 'cross contamination' between human remains and the pork products in question.

Symptom calls should be handled as usual, according to HWKB protocols

Information that we can provide to callers immediately:

- Reinforce proper food handling techniques http://www.bchealthguide.org/healthfiles/hfile59.stm
- Exposure likely to have been more than 2 years ago, unless product has been stored/frozen by recipients
- Contaminated food product has not been manufactured or sold on a large, public scale. This issue likely affects a very small number of people.

Only if callers ask...

Thank you for your patience and for giving me the opportunity to respond to media interest in this way.

This afternoon my office put out a news release related to meat products distributed from the Pickton Farm prior to 2002.

As a result of information recently received from the RCMP I have reason to believe that there is a possibility that some of this produce may still be sitting in some people's freezers in the Lower Mainland. We also know- as a result of conditions at the farm- which was operating for a number of years as an unlicensed facility- and from the risk assessment conducted by Health Canada, that any meat in storage does pose some risk to human health.

It is therefore important that this meat be recalled and returned. The risks are primarily related to exposure to bacterial pathogens and would be heightened by consumption of raw or uncooked meat. The risk posed by thoroughly cooked meat is minimal.

BCCDC have examined their records and we have found no evidence of outbreaks of illness that are related to consumption of pork or products from the farm.

This recall is a precautionary measure.

FINAL RISK ASSESSMENT FOR MAJOR VIRAL AND BACTERIAL PATHOGENS FROM TISSUES PROCESSED AND DISTRIBUTED BY A PIG FARM CURRENTLY UNDER INVESTIGATION BY RCMP IN VANCOUVER

Blood Safety Surveillance and Health Care Acquired Infections Division Centre for Infectious Disease Prevention and Control

Date: March 11, 2004

ISSUE

First issue

Possible transmission of pathogens including Hepatitis viruses B and C (HBV, HCV), Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV), Creutzfelt-Jakob Disease (CJD), Tuberculosis (TB) and various bacterial and parasitic agents through human tissues in the context of the RCMP investigation in Vancouver, British Columbia.

Second issue

Possible risk to the food supply of feeding human remains to pigs.

Third issue

Possible transmission of bacterial pathogens from an unsafe food processing facility.

PURPOSE

To provide scientific background information and probability estimates on the transmission of the pathogens listed above, and the possible transmission of animal pathogens to human, through a preliminary risk analysis.

BACKGROUND

At the time of the production of this risk assessment, the information available indicated that the tissue in question was supplied only to private customers or associates of the individual under investigation. The size of the group which is potentially at risk from this exposure is estimated to be approximately 2,500 individuals over 10 years. Moreover, the material handling and food processing was done in a facility that was unlicensed and had very poor environmental hygiene. This last fact is important for bacterial cross-contamination into the process that pork products undergo prior to human consumption. Note that the BCCDC will test samples of the material in question for the viruses, bacteria and parasites described below. The National Microbiology Laboratory will provide any necessary back up for the testing.

It is believed that there is the possibility that human remains were fed to pigs. This poses no known risks to the food supply. The viruses noted above do not cross the species barrier and would be inactivated by the pig digestive system. Prions are not transmissible from humans to pigs.

(1) HIV/AIDS Epidemiology and Temperature Resistance

Transmission of HIV can occur through a number of possible routes. These include sexual intercourse, injection drug use (IDU), transfusion of blood and blood products, exposure to HIV-contaminated blood or body fluid, and perinatal transmission. Horizontal spread of HIV occurs almost exclusively when virus-containing materials is directly injected or is deposited on mucous membranes or damaged skin (Richardson et al., 2003).

In Canada, an estimated 7,700 women were living with ITIV/AIDS at the end of 2002 (Canada's Report on HIV/AIDS 2003). A cumulative incidence rate of 16.6% over 48 months has been reported for HIV in female Injection Drug Users (IDUs) in Vancouver area (Spittal et al.,2002). It has been suggested that majority of prostitutes are also IDUs.

It has been demonstrated that HIV can survive at room temperature under a variety of environmental conditions (Barre-Sinoussi, 1985; Van Bueren et al, 1994). HIV has been isolated at autopsy up to six days postmortem, and can survive for several days within cadavers stored refrigerated or non-refrigerated (Puschel et al., 1991). However, it was shown that HIV can be inactivated by exposure to a temperature of 80°C for 45 minutes by heat (Pruss, A, et al, 2003). Gala (1997) collected fresh and cryopreserved post-mortem skin samples repeatedly between 1 and 5 days in 7 HIV-1 patients. The results demonstrated the potential viral infectivity of fresh or stored postmortem samples in HIV infected patients (Gala, 1997). Plasma infected with HIV is more resistant since the virus is surrounded by protein.

(2) HBV and HCV Epidemiology and Temperature Resistance

The number of infectious IIBV and HCV particles in the blood of infected individuals can be as high as 10⁹/ml and 10⁶/ml, respectively. Transmission of HCV typically occurs through injection drug use, or exposure to infected blood or blood products (e.g. during childbirth or sexual activity). In the case of HBV, transmission of the virus can occur through IDU, sexual contact with infected individuals, or vertically from mother to child at the time of birth. HBV can not be transmitted through ingestion, except under specific circumstances where individuals have damage to the tissues of their mouth or digestive tract. In any of these circumstances, the potential for transmission following exposure will depend on the concentration of the virus in the blood or bodily fluid.

The infectivity of HBV in albumin is inactivated at 60° C for 10 hours, or exposure to dry heat at 160° C for 1 hour (Hollinger, 2002). HCV in plasma is inactivated at is inactivated at $80-100^{\circ}$ C for 30 minutes and is relatively unstable to storage at room temperature or repeated freezing and thawing.

In Canada, the number of chronic HBV carriers is estimated to be approximately 100,000, with newly identified infections in British Columbia for the year 2000 calculated at 8.08/100,000 persons (NDRS). For HCV, the total number of cases in Canada may be as high as 270,000, with

newly identified cases in British Columbia for the year 2000 calculated at 116.57/100,000 persons (NDRS).

(3) Human Enteric Pathogens: Epidemiology and Temperature Resistance

The most important human enteric pathogens in Canada as of 2002 were *Salmonella*, *Campylobacter*, *Escherichia coli*, *Shigella* and *Aeromonas*. It has been shown that when hamburger is cooked at 71°C for 2 minutes, *Salmonella and E. coli* will be reduced by a factor of 6 log and 7 log. Aeromonas cells are also less resistant to heat in hamburger steaks. Aeromonads are very common in various kinds of food (Nishikawa, 1993). An unlicensed food processing facility with poor hygiene, as is in this specific scenario, will always lead to cross-contamination of bacteria onto the food being processed within that facility. While there are many bacteria which may be present in this particular instance, the specific pathogens which may be most significantly associated with the circumstances prompting this report are *E. coli* O157:117, *Campylobacter*, *Shigella*, *Yersinia*, *Aeromonas*, and *Plesiomonas*. These are all illnesses that can infect humans, and are primarily associated with the consumption of undercooked ground meat which has been contaminated. The prevalence of these pathogens in British Columbia in the year 2001 is described in the tables below.

There is limited data on cadaveric transmission of parasites. Follow-up on organ transplant recipients has shown that parasites can be transmitted by tissue and organs (Mejia,1983). The prevalence of the 4 specific parasitic agents deemed to the most significant to these circumstances is as follows: *Cryptosporidium*, *Cyclospora*, *Entamoeba*, and *Giardia*: 10/10,000 population (each).

Group Risk: The risk of infection with any of the above agents is estimated to be less than one person in the exposed group of 2,500 individuals.

CONCLUSION

- 1. There is a very low risk to an individual contracting hepatitis B, and infinitesimally small risk to an individual of contracting hepatitis C, and/or HIV from ground tissues (cooked and uncooked) and distributed by the pig farm currently under investigation by RCMP in Vancouver. Cooking of the material prior to human consumption further reduces the risk.
- 2. While higher than for the viral agents noted above, there remains a **low to medium** risk of infection by bacterial and parasitic agents to the individuals exposed (including food handlers and consumers) because of the **poor hygiene** in the area where the meat was processed on the farm. Cooking of the material prior to human consumption reduces the risk.

3. There is no risk of transmission of infectious diseases such as HBV, HCV, HIV, CJD, by feeding human remains to pigs.

Note: This risk assessment may be revised should further information become available.

Re: Public Health Advisory on the Robert Pickton Farm

On March 10, 2004, I made a public health advisory about pork meat that had been distributed from the Robert Pickton Farm in Port Coquitlam (http://www.healthservices.gov.bc.ca/pho/advisory.html).

As you are aware this farm has been the subject of an ongoing investigation by the RCMP Joint Missing Women's Task Force.

The RCMP have informed me that some of the pork meat from this farm may have been sold or given to the public and it is possible that the meat may still reside in freezers.

Anyone who has meat from the farm is asked to contact the police so it can be examined.

At the request of the RCMP, the BC Centre for Disease Control and Health Canada conducted a detailed health risk assessment as to possible transmission of human and animal diseases from the meat product. One hypothetical scenario dealt with possible contamination with human remains.

The risks of transmission for HIV, hepatitis B (HBV) and C, tuberculosis and Creutzfeld Jacob Disease (CJD) have been examined and the conclusion is that the transmission of these infectious agents is only a remote and likely theoretical possibility. This is on the assumption that any meat would have been adequately cooked.

Consumption of fresh raw product carries a very low risk of transmission of HBV.

Experts from Health Canada consider the risks of CJD to be zero.

The greatest risk for contamination of the meat would have been from the extremely unsanitary conditions found on the farm. This could give rise to the usual enteric infectious diseases (E.Coli, salmonella, etc.).

As you are aware these enteric diseases are prevented by adequate cooking of food.

The RCMP and my office have directed individuals with health concerns to either the BCNurse Line (1-866-215-4700 or 604-215-4700 on the lower mainland) or their medical practitioner.

I am not recommending any testing of individuals. I am leaving it to your clinical judgment to conduct tests on a patient if an assessment of symptoms warrant such action.

Just a quick update.

The inspector for the Port Coguitlam area from 1974 to 1989 was Steve Martin, following Steve was Dave Currie. In discussion with Steve Martin he recalls that he was out to the Picton farm for an animal welfare issue and does not recall any permits for food related events.

Dave Currie has determined from log book entries, that he investigated 2 illegal slaughtering complaints, first in 1993 and second in 1995. No evidence to support the complaint was found in either incident.

We have reviewed Temporary permit files back to the early 1991's without finding any applications or permits issued for this site.

It is evident that there were numerous parties held at the Burns road site and I understand that Mr. Picton (I believe Robert Picton) charged \$10.00 entry fee which included a buffet with a roast pig. This was well known in the community however at no time was health advised or a permit requested/issued according to our records and recollection from the previous inspectors.

The remaining records are off site and will not be recalled at this point since for the past 9 years from 1991 to 2000 there is no record of a permit issued. It is felt that it would be highly unlikely that Health would have received an application to operate a food premise in the previous years in view of the information above.
