The Ministry of Health is aware of public concerns and complaints that have been raised about odour emissions from Foundation Organics' composting facility. As such, we have been working with appropriate authorities, including the Ministry of Environment, Island Health, and the Capital Regional District (CRD), to ensure that any potential human health effects are properly addressed.

Please note that while odours from composting operations may be a nuisance to the public, they are not considered a health hazard under the *Public Health Act*. Island Health's Medical Health Officer and Health Protection department have discussed potential health concerns with the District of Central Saanich and, while no specific health risks have been identified at this time, they continue to assess the situation as it unfolds. If any health hazards are identified, please be assured that Island Health will immediately advise residents of recommended actions. Should any of your constituents experience worrying health problems, I encourage them to consult with a physician.

Composting operations are regulated by the Ministry of Environment's Organic Matter Recycling Regulation and Agricultural Waste Control Regulation, CRD Bylaw 2736, Workers' Compensation Board regulations, and other applicable regulations. On August 20, 2013, the CRD suspended Foundation Organics' composting facility license. As a result, the facility is temporarily prohibited from receiving and processing food waste.

Foundation Organics has appealed the decision and the matter is now under review. Furthermore, on September 9, 2013, Central Saanich Mayor Alastair Bryson requested that the CRD take immediate action on the issue, including the possible issuance of a court injunction against Foundation Organics. This request is currently being considered by the CRD's environmental services committee. The Ministry of Health will continue to monitor this situation as it develops.

Dear Ministers,

I am writing to you both on behalf of many constituents of mine residing in the Tanner Ridge area of Central Saanich, who indicate that they are suffering significant health impacts related to odour emissions from a composting facility operated by Foundations Organics at Stanhope farm.

This past summer the number of residents experiencing significant health impacts has increased and as you may be aware, many have contacted Ministry of Environment Protection Officers and or VIHA Environment Health Officers as well as the VIHA Chief Medical Health Officer, to register their concerns and symptoms of nausea, sore throat, headaches and the aggravation of existing asthma conditions.

I want to be clear that my constituents are not complaining about mere nuisance odour, they are rather, concerned about environmental pollution and related serious health impacts. On September 3rd more than 150 of these residents attended a Central Saanich Council meeting to express their growing concerns regarding a variety of impacts on their health.

I understand that numerous requests have been made in recent months for the Ministry of Environment or VIHA to undertake a formal scientific outdoor air quality survey in order to document environmental air pollution that would substantiate health impacts. My constituents believe that their air pollution and health concerns have not been taken seriously and that little or no investigation has been undertaken by either of your ministries.

On behalf of these constituents I am asking you both to look into the handling of these requests and to respond in a formal way to these legitimate health concerns. It may be that your officials have acted on this issue recently in response to concerns that have also been expressed by local government. Thank you for your attention to this request to address the urgent concerns of my constituents.

To borrow a phrase, 'Scuse me?

It seems the only department which has not pointed it's finger at another area, proclaimed loudly that "it's their job" and figured that was the end of it is the Ministry of Silly Walks, although I fully expect to hear from the Pythons at any moment. It seems that things in the Capital Region are quite circular in nature. as a result, I am responding to all at once, including the redoubtable Ms Yehia.

In a note (really a form letter, as I learned after the fact) sent at 0911 this morning, Ms Yehia, per the FAQ she so kindly attached, told me that VIHA "does not have a role in air quality testing or sampling". I was instead referred to the CRD, as I (again, from the VIHA note) "..may wish to contact the CRD, the Ministry of Environment or the District of Central Saanich, as the regulatory bodies for the facility..." For those of you who may not have viewed this rather contradictory document, I have attached it to this letter.

Just a few hours later at 5:30 pm, I am instructed by the CRD to contact Ms. Yehia? And oh yes, both the Ministries of Health and Environment have also shunned responsibility. Meanwhile, taxpayers from Hunt Rd to the Butchart Gardens live in fear that they are inhaling gases and chemicals which may have serious long-term effects on their health while the CRD, VIHA and the various Ministries all do their utmost to avoid being seen as doing something that may not be "pro green". Who will be paying the bills if the off gasses do prove carcinogenic, as they did in England? Who will pay the bills of the homeowners who cannot sell their homes because no one wants to live on Tanner Ridge, yet they are unable to stay due to the continued stench?

As a long-suffering taxpayer, I am seriously questioning if anyone in this town will ever step up and take responsibility for this mess. I urge all of you to stop for a moment, retract those pointing fingers, and 'fess up. Someone allowed this to happen.

Whatever happened to responsibility, safeguarding the public, and enforcing existing statutes? Has it all been replaced by the "not my job" mantra?

Please, no more "we are monitoring". WE who have been forced to live in the cloud are monitoring. The problem is that no one can/will tell us what we are breathing. The only monitoring we want right now is air monitoring, and that should not result in 4 separate agencies all ducking responsibility. It has become apparent that all the "monitoring" in the world isn't helping. Take action. Accept responsibility. As I write this, the stench is again rising on the evening breeze. I invite all of you to my house tonight for tea or coffee. We will sit outside on the patio and breathe in the smell. Perhaps it will help.

End this. We are (literally) sick and tired of it.

Russ- By now it is quite obvious that the slow process of getting Foundation Organics into compliance has seriously upset the Tanner Ridge community. One of the things that particularly upsets me is the fact no one knows what we have all been breathing over the particularly upsets me is the fact no one knows what we have all been breathing over the last year or more as the pile of whoknowswhat has grown. I would sincerely like to know why no one seems willing to do an Air Quality Study of the F/O stench. Studies of similar operations in Britain and northern Europe have shown a grocery list of chemicals, from ammonia to toluene, and spores such as aspergillis (Causes "farmer's lung"). Also present are known and possible carcinogens in varying amounts. However, no one in Central Saanich, nor at the CRD or VIHA knows, as no one is willing to order a study of the air around the place. Instead, we must put up with the glacial pace of incremental enforcement, which appears to have taken away the entire summer for nearly 3,000 residents while Foundation Organics continues to stockpile ever more undesirable waste, turning the once-pristine farm into nothing more than a refuse dump. turning the once-pristine farm into nothing more than a refuse dump.

Please, order an Air Quality Study. We have the right to know what we are breathing. The CRD is at least partially responsible for it, it is imcumbent on the CRD to ensure our safety.

FAQ's regarding composting operations Role of the Island Health's Public Health Department

(1) What is the role of Island Health's Public Health department regarding composting operations?

Public Health does not oversee or regulate composting facilities. Composting operations are regulated by provincial legislation (the Organic Matter Recycle Regulation and the Agricultural Waste Control Regulation), administered by the Ministry of Environment, as well as (where applicable) local and regional government bylaws.

(2) Is odour emitted from composting operations a health concern?

Odours from composting operations may be a nuisance to the public but are not considered a health hazard under the Public Health Act. While an odour may be offensive, it does not constitute an elevated risk to health.

The health authority continues to review this issue, consulting with the Ministry of Health and the BC Centre for Disease Control.

(3) When would the Public Health department typically become involved in assessing composting operations?

If an operation were contaminating a drinking water supply or agricultural food source, then there is a requirement under Organic Matter Recycle Regulation that the applicant must notify the Medical Health Officer.

(4) Will the Public Health department carry out air quality testing in reference to composting operations?

The health authority does not have a role in air quality testing or sampling.

Dear Dr. Lake,

I am writing to you with regard to a health concern which has impacted me, my family and many in my neighborhood of Tanner Ridge, Central Saanich BC.

As you may know the composting facility called Foundation Organics is currently suspended from processing their full 10,000 tons per annum of garbage, however, they have managed to maintain some of their smaller restaurant contracts and their contract with the cruise ships. He is operating through a loop hole that allows him to feed the semi loads of garbage to his (7) pigs and then compost the leftovers under the umbrella of normal farm waste. No one has yet questioned the fact that he is not allowed to feed meat products to pigs—but that is another matter.

But why I am writing to you is purely about health—mine, and my family's. The pollution off gassing from this site has been enveloping the Tanner Ridge area regularly for the past several months. It hit a critical level this summer and since we were away for almost three weeks in July I had a clear indication of before, after and then a re-emergence into the toxic mess.

It makes us sound like real complainers and my neighbors were feeling the same way. Last week, \$.22 the municipal council with our complaints there were approximately 150 people present and you could hear the persistent coughing. I thanked them—it made my point. Until then everyone was viewing their health problems in isolation but now they could see they were part of a larger picture. We are the victims of intolerable pollution and we feel it is time that the proper authorities know it.

Composting on an industrial scale should not be left in the hands of amateurs and most certainly should not be able to operate without any environmental overview. The fact that he could be feeding meat to pigs in order to keep composting during a suspension only serves to illustrate that there is no governmental controls here at all. And it is making us sick—literally!

Dear Ms Yehia:

I am writing to express my disappointment and distress with regard to the attitude expressed by you and the Health Administration in general with regard to our insistence that the off-gassing from Foundation Organics was making us sick.

I would like you to imagine that you have come to work and said to your boss that you are feeling sick and that you think it might be due to the noxious air quality in your neighborhood. He then says that he doubts that could be so. You further inform him of your symptoms and how really rough you are feeling and he looks you over and says—well, how sick are you really? You are here after all. Have you had formal proof of illness? And what makes you think that it has anything to do with the noxious odors enveloping your neighborhood? You tell him that your neighbors are exhibiting similar symptoms. He shakes his head dismissively and tells you that he, in fact, talked to your community and there is nothing to suggest that you are really sick or that the air quality would have anything to do with it in any case. Probably you just don't like the nuisance smell.

That, by the way, is exactly how dismissive you sound to us. This is not worthy of you as a human being and it is certainly not worthy of someone in your position.

I ask you this—if this same stench were enveloping the hospitals in our region and the patients and medical staff were struggling to breathe deeply—those with compromised lungs were now needing assistance, those with asthma were having to increase their medications and restrict their time outside. You start to see sinus infections, skin rashes, and allergy reactions that are new, non stop headaches and even phantom toothaches are finally examined with ct scans only to discover there is nothing wrong with the tooth in question. Then you notice that so many in the hospital are coughing and yet they don't have a cold. So—after witnessing all this, would you tell all those patients and medical staff that there is no reason to assume that they are sick, as such. It is only an odor after all. Or would you make it your business to get involved in exploring the situation properly and in shutting that stench down permanently? I doubt very much that you would allow this type of facility to be in the airshed of a hospital. Why should it be in the airshed of anyone?

I am writing to you to address a very big problem that exists in my neighbourhood of Central Saanich. We have been subjected to the toxic airborne pollution of a renegade composting facility (it has flouted many municipal bylaws) that is being operated next to a residential neighbourhood on ALR land.

The operators of Foundation Organics Ltd. (6341 Old East Road, Central Saanich) received licensing from the Capital Regional District of Victoria (CRD) based upon a loophole in the ALR land use guidelines which permits composting as part of normal farm operations. While composting is obviously a necessary part of farm operations, wholesale composting of diverted post-consumer food waste from landfills and cruise ships was obviously not even on the radar when the original legislation and regulations were drafted.

Beside the horrific odours coming from this facility, there are some serious health repercussions that seem to be resulting that really need to be looked into. At our local municipal council meeting in Central Saanich on Tuesday, September 3, 2013, a number of residents brought up concerns about health issues they have been suffering. Very serious sinus problems were reported by a number of individuals, and asthma and other breathing problems were mentioned as well. Many individuals also complained of headaches, nausea, vomiting restlessness at night (due to high levels of ammonia in the air), and problems with concentrating on tasks. \$.22

Because of this loophole in the ALR land use guidelines, our neighbourhood is essentially now functioning as an unwilling test group for the health problems that can result from living in close proximity to an industrial composting facility. This is unacceptable and it must be stopped. A facility of this type needs to be located in an industrial area where it does not have the ability to endanger the health of residents and farm animals living in close proximity.

I would respectfully request that you investigate the health concerns of the residents of Central Saanich that have been affected by this composting facility, and please intervene with the necessary agencies to ensure this facility is no longer permitted to negatively affect the health of our neighbourhood.

don't know what is in the air and they don't want him breathing it. They can't believe nothing is being done...... I felt my stomach hit the floor....

I pay my taxes, I colour within the lines of the law, I am respectful to my neighbours...the group of hundreds of people who are so desperately trying to get your attention are law abiding citizens. And yet regardless of the fact that Foundations Organics have had their license suspended he is still in operations. One man is controlling the strings of our lives, our

politicians, and our government officials? Why? This is not a disrespectful statement, it is how it is being perceived!

I don't care that he sees "gold", it is not about the money. It is just wrong and irresponsible to allow this to carry on when so many innocent people's live are being effected and their health is at potential risk.

I know the CRD started this by approving the licence. So I appreciate they are trying to find a solution to resolve this without political backlash or financial implication.

Every community needs a hero and someone needs to stand up and stop this operation until more research and investigation can be done. Will you be our hero? Dear Sirs

I would like to voice my concern with the smell and health hazards resulting from the operations a commercial composting operation in Central Saanich.

I live in the Tanner Road area, at \$.22 The odour is coming from the Foundation Organics commercial facility (part of Stanhope-Wedgewood Farm) at 6341 Old East Road. Through-out the summer this odour was evident continuously, on almost a daily basis. Further, even on those days when it is not as strong, the smell lingered in our home. On the days when it is not strong (far and few between), I can smell it when I walked into my house. We cannot leave our windows open, or use or yard or deck, but rather need to hide away inside with doors and window closed. If you have any doubts as to the power and strength of this obnoxious toxic odour, just drive by and take a whiff.

Certainly this is not a pleasant smell, and diminishes the enjoyment of life for people in the vicinity. However my concern is more for the health of my family. 5.22

As I understand the process it is a chemical decomposition of farm waste. It seems that the smell is a result is an emission of chemical by-product. This is more than discomfort, but I believe it is also a health risk. Anything that smells that bad cannot be good for you.

My concern is that the CRD and the District of Central Saanich allow this to continue, when there is a clear and obvious contravention of the by-laws. The odour bylaws- were set in part, to protect the health of the residents of the providence, however those responsible to enforce the bylaws, have not done so.

This operation is in contravention of CRD bylaws No 2736 which requires composting facilities to prevent odours from being detectable beyond the boundary of the land on which the composting facility is located. I believe that this bylaw violation is an extreme case of bylaw contravention, resulting in potential harm to the public and the prudent action is for Central Saanich and the CRD is to suspend these operation immediately, and investigate the health risk. However, residents of Central Saanich have been complaining about this process for 2 years, yet it continues to exist. In fact as production at the facility continues to grow, the health risk has increased. It seems that the CRD is afraid they will be sued by the operator, and so take no action.

As a minimum the operation needs to be shut down until the operators y can come up with a plan (one that actually works) to contain the odour with the bylaw.

Refer to page 4 of the document: SUPPORTING INFORMATION FOR THE OPERATION OF COMPOSTING FACILITIES IN THE CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT

"First, odours detectable beyond the boundary of the parcel on which the composting facility is situated would constitute a violation of this bylaw. Second, enforcement procedures, including fines, will be in place which will ensure a rapid response to any odour violations. Third, the operator will have a powerful incentive to treat any odour problems quickly as a condition of maintaining a valid licence.

The enforcement section of this document explains how facilities which violate the requirements of the composting bylaw will be required to comply."

Additionally, I have noticed far more dust on my deck and on my vehicles this year than in past years. And although this may be attributable to the hotter weather, I also feel the cause of the increased dust is from the commercial activity taking place at 6341 Old East Road \$.22 The Stanhope Farms and Foundation Organics location should also be investigate for it compliance with dust control bylaws and regulations.

An additional concern that is this facility is processing waste material from cruise ships. This means organic material for all parts of the world are being introduced to our local agricultural environment. This may be a extremely dangerous and have

detrimental consequences to our environment, and I sure hope the CRD is monitoring and managing this risk, and that the Ministry of Health has been advised and informed of this situation.

It is my understanding that the CRD has ceased to deliver waste to this facility for composting (Aug 01). Clearly the CRD recognizes there is a problem. However not contributing to the problem is simply not enough. Elected governing bodies have a responsibility to stop the problem, and mitigate the risk to our environment, our families health, and the CRD agricultural community (the long term heath of our communities).

Suspension Issued to Foundation Organics Ltd. Composting Facility

Victoria, BC - The Capital Regional District has conditionally suspended the licence issued to Stanhope Dairy Farm and applicable to the Foundation Organics Ltc. composting facility on Old East Road following the issuance of a number of warning notices. The effect of the suspension is the cessation of food waste materials being received by the Foundation Organics facility.

In 2004, the Capital Regional District developed the Composting Facilities Regulation Bylaw (Bylaw 2736) to regulate the operation of composting facilities in the region. The purposes of licensing composting facilities include ensuring that the facilities do not contaminate ground or surface water, or generate unacceptable levels of nuisance odour, vectors, litter or dust. In addition to complying with CRO Bylaw 2736, composting facilities must also comply with the BC Organic Matter Recycling Regulation, BC Agriculture Waste Control Regulation, the host municipality's bylaws, Workers' Compensation Board regulations and other applicable regulations.

The CRD conducted a hearing with the facility operator on August 16th and after careful consideration of all parties concerns and views, it was determined that the Foundation Organics facility was non-compliant with Bylaw 2736 and terms of its Recycler Licence. The facility will still be allowed to continue receiving and processing materials other than food wastes and to process those materials that are currently present on site but will be required to address the bylaw violations in order to have the suspension lifted and prior to again receiving food waste materials.

While the CRD regulates the composting facility, the land application of compost material to land in the Agricultural Land Reserve in British Columbia is regulated by The Provincial Agricultural Land Commission.

As a resident of the area, I would like to support that motion and request immediate and swift action.

For 30 years we've lived in Central Saanich in the midst of ALR and the farming community, with no previous incident. We concur and practice responsible composting; however, to put it mildly, this summer has been completely, absolutely abysmal! Residents miles away from the composting site as far as Brentwood Bay are affected, and have been held hostage all summer by a stench so pervasive doors and windows can't be open. The time to end it has long passed.

Residents, including ourselves have been submitting "complaints" to the CRD, with deteriorating hope of any action. Last Saturday, September 07, 2013 morning I was awakened from a deep sleep at 3am by a strong, acrid, noxious stench permeating into our closed up bedroom.

For the sake of resident's physical and mental health and welfare, we implore you to issue an immediate cease to the practice of composting "food waste" in this region until such time as an appropriate location and responsible practice is established and enforced. Proper composting is one matter; this business is nothing short of a garbage dump.

According to public press, the attorney for Foundation Organics Ltd. "it is nothing to do with the composting facility – the airy farm has been spreading the finished compost on its grasslands, which has resulted in 40 percent higher yields".

To which, I respectfully pose the following questions:

Higher yields of what nature?

Truthfully? Is the farmer in question spreading the compost at 3-5am?

Are CRD bylaw officers on site 24/7 to ensure no further food waste is being received, and the compost is not being delivered off site, contrary to existing Municipal and CRD bylaws? It appears monitoring of suspensions are not enforced anytime, and certainly not even monitored nights, weekends, and stat holidays?

Composting is a highly scientific, complex process, which when done properly and responsibly evidentially works in other regions. However, the public governing bodies regulating the procedure here need to study and enforce the established technique prior to issuing any further licenses allowing the practice to continue. It would benefit the entire Province if health authorities define what can be included in food waste management and cease the practice of composting any food waste until such time as proper parameters and laws are determined, in place and strictly enforced.

As example: What is included in the waste at this time? Is it properly "source separated" with only biodegradable plastics included? Is it composted with enough carbon materials and proper ratio of carbon to nitrogen at a temperature of 120-150°(F)?

Aside from putrid, toxic stench adversely influencing resident's lives over the summers, our main, primary concern is the health issue. s.22

Further it's a known fact that the smallest amount of food waste attracts rats and lethal vermin carrying toxic organisms.

Of particular distress is much of the waste is allegedly trucked in from cruise ships. It's certainly common knowledge that industry is frequently plagued by the Norwalk and other communicable viruses. Further, why is it we can't take so much as a lime or tomato to the US, and yet they're allowed to dump their garbage here from who knows the origin? Are all potatoes, citrus and food items disallowed into Canada removed first?

As residents and consumers, we have the right to know where and for what purpose the apparent toxic compost is being spread, as I for one do not wish to consume anything grown on the farms in question.

Health authorities are amongst the first to advocate getting "flu" shots, and perpetually speculating the possible threat of a "pandemic" or various other contagious infections. In my personal humble hopeful opinion, for everyone's sake, it is imperative that you ensure this will not be proven to be a future potential source. This business should never have been approved in the first place, and should have ended months, if not a few years ago.

This correspondence is being copied to our physicians, as well as other governing authorities as testimony of our real concerns. Immediate and swift action is long overdue. We look forward to receiving a favourable decision to end this atrocity.

In my research on bio solids I have learned it is a toxic cocktail comprised of varying amounts of human feces, fire retardants, heavy metals, pathogens, pharmaceuticals and perhaps other elements. Class A or B bio solids differ primarily based on the difference in fecal coliform counts and level of metal contained in the matter. Cornell Waste Management Institute, Dept. of Crop and Soil Sciences, has done a considerable amount of research, including a study on what they call 'facilitated transport'. "New understanding about the movement of contaminants (both chemicals and pathogenic organisms) through soils into groundwater has been developed. This includes information showing that contaminants may 'piggy-back' on other chemicals that move in water (this is termed facilitated transport). Thus a chemical which by itself is relatively immobile in soils (such as many metals) can move rapidly through soils when other chemicals are present (such as organic matter in bio solids). In addition, another mechanism that provides for rapid movement of chemicals through soils is that water and the contaminants carried in it can move through soils along preferential flow paths (such as worm holes, root channels or wetting fingers)"1

Combine those possibilities with an extreme wet weather event and you have a very real possibility of contaminated water flowing into \$.22

The Lower Nicola Indian Band (LNIB) has received the February 20, 2015 letter regarding the Composting and Spreading of Biosolids in the Sunshine Valley. Based on our understanding of the project location we can confirm that the project location is within our territory, and that the lands and resources are subject to our unextinguished Aboriginal Title and Rights.

We would like to make you aware that the Supreme Court of Canada continues to re-affirm that the Crown has been applying an incorrect and impoverished view of Aboriginal Title and that Aboriginal Title includes the exclusive right of Indigenous people to manage the land and resources as well as the right to benefit economically from the land and resources. The court has also concluded that when the Crown allocates resources on Aboriginal title lands without the consent of the Indigenous peoples, it commits a serious infringement of constitutionally protected rights and that permits may be cancelled and damages owed.

Based on our current understanding of the practice we remain strongly opposed to biosolid operations until a meaningful dialogue with the Crown and ministry regulators can be completed which addresses our concerns regarding this activity. Be clear that should any of the bio-waste facilities continue operation or new notifications be allowed to proceed without consultation, that we will take every action available to us to ensure that our interests are protected.





PURPOSE: Background for meeting with constituents, Minister of Health and

Minister of Transportation, on May 13, 2016

BACKGROUND:

The Blackwell Dairy Farm in Kamloops is the site of several non-agricultural operations including a waste landfill (operated since 1993), gravel and rock operations and a Biosolids Growing Medium production facility using Class A biosolids (operated by Arrow Transportation Systems). In addition, Arrow has registered under the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation (OMRR) to apply Class B biosolids on Blackwell land.

The application of Class B biosolids is for soil amendment/reclamation only at the Blackwell property and not for redistribution. Reclaimed soils contain up to maximum of 15% dry weight biosolids which is blended wet using sand, sawdust and existing soil mediums.

A qualified professional inspected the operation 4 times in 2015 and determined that Arrow was managing the biosolids in accordance with the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation (OMRR). MoE inspects the landfill annually. The most recent inspection in June 2015 found that the operation was meeting authorized landfill requirements.

During the summer of 2015, the facility received numerous complaints regarding stockpiled sawdust blowing on to residents below the property. In response, Arrow moved the stockpile and reduced its size and dust issues from the piles were resolved.

Recently the province received numerous complaints from Barnhartvale citizens living below (Dallas Dr.) and adjacent to the dairy farm (Gardiner Rd.). Citizens are concerned about health impacts of biosolids from dust from the farm. Their concerns have been highlighted by several media stories.

In April 2016, Interior Health issued a response to Barnhartvale citizens recommending they consult directly with their primary health care provider for a comprehensive clinical assessment of their symptoms. The documentation of the diagnosis and its potential association with biosolids could be used as part of a detailed investigation by Interior Health if deemed necessary.

DISCUSSION:

Recent discussions between MOE and Arrow Transport have confirmed that dust is occurring off the Blackwell property. Principle sources appear to be the gravel pit, gravel roads and springtime tilling of the soil. Arrow will be providing further information to MOE documenting dust sources.

MoE does not have sufficient evidence to suggest that the biosolids as applied at Blackwell pose a significant health risk. The biosolids at Blackwell come from sewage plants that are carefully monitored for compliance with environmental and human health standards and, based on compliance reviews in 2015, Arrow is meeting all land application requirements under OMRR.

It is also likely that biosolids application reduces dust at the farm given that the biosolid medium is damp, holds moisture and provides an organic layer for vegetative growth.

ADVICE:

MOE plans to inspect the property in May to verify the operation's compliance with OMRR, confirm potential dust sources and meet with complainants. MOE will follow-up with Interior Health with regards to findings.

They just start the operation up when and where they want, furthermore they will stop only when they are done or ready to stop! Not one hoop? One day we noticed an odour, we had to struggle to find out what it was, no transparency starting this operation.

On one hand our Mayor flies across the Country to assess what effects an operating mine has on populations living near the mine. For us living in a trailer park complaining for two years about health concerns do we get similar consideration? Our Mayor will not drive the ten minutes out here to assess what is happening in real time from a real working operation, he will not even return an email?

This is wrong, not just on the Mayor's end! Last week there was interest in possible air quality testing during a severe wind event. Then the official spoke to the owner/operator, my next conversation with that official was as different as night and day. "No need to worry, they will do some testing on their own", etc., etc., etc., this happens every time any official begins to help? And we mean every time.

This is the only community in BC where Class B biosolids are shredded directly above populations with no concern for possible health issues, completely contrary to all the research on the dangers?

Again — This is wrong! We are British Columbians and deserve as much consideration for our health and well being as the Ajax issue has!





Thank you for your emails of March 15 and 28, 2016, addressed to the Honourable Mary Polak, Minister of Environment, regarding the biosolids operation at Blackwell Farm. As Assistant Deputy Minister for the Environmental Protection Division in the Ministry of Environment, I am pleased to have the opportunity to respond.

I would like to thank you for sharing your health concerns with us. We understand that representatives from Interior Health are following up with you regarding further steps you can take in regards to the concerns you have outlined.

As you may be aware, the use of biosolids in British Columbia must be carried out in compliance with the requirements of the *Environmental Management Act's* Organic Matter Recycling Regulation (OMRR). Arrow Transportation is registered under OMRR to apply and reclaim areas of the Blackwell farm with Class B biosolids from Metro Vancouver. These biosolids come from plants that are carefully monitored for compliance with environmental and human health standards.

Based on our inspections to date, the facility is operating within the requirements of OMRR and biosolids are being handled and applied appropriately. Although there are numerous dust sources in the area, including gravel pits and roads, we have not observed evidence of dust from biosolids to date. We will continue to perform routine inspections to ensure ongoing compliance.

Dear Terry Lake,

A number of our community members who have taken their time to write to various levels of government about the biosolids issue have met with replies that suggest they are naïve as to the scientific facts around composted sewage sludge. This is just not so. Our community is not the illiterate, ignorant constituency you seem to want to believe it to be. We have done our research. We have done more than you have in merely accepting the sludge-industry's onesided, self-justifying science. We have looked at other countries, and more recent independent studies. What we find is very troubling indeed. The dangers fall into a number of categories, including, Hormones and Synthetic Hormones, Prion Contamination, Toxin Contamination (heavy metals and toxic organic chemicals), and so-called Emerging Substances of Concern -ESOCs - (microbial, organic and inorganic contaminants, pharmaceuticals and personal care products (amongst a number of ESOCs)). They are all worrying and all demand far more study. You folks in government ignore these findings at your peril. Below is a sample of such science which clearly backs our claim that we need to stop this land application of toxic sewer sludge until we are entirely clear as to what we are dealing with. We need to be cautious with Mother Earth. We understand that you see this dispersal as a cheap way to deal with big-city sludge, but frankly, we are the ones taking all the risks for this decision. This burden you put on rural areas is unfair, unhealthy and unsustainable. It is time you reconsidered this method of dealing with waste.

In light of the recent win (against the tobacco industry) by the class action suit in Quebec (of some 12 billion dollars in damages) I believe it behooves both the sludge industry, and the government endorsing it, to be aware of the direction that recent independent science is pointing, and consider carefully if they (both industry & government) too are not opening themselves up to liability. The knowledge is out there, and denial will not be a protection from future prosecution.

What our Provincial and Federal Governments have neglected to take into consideration is that they have agreed to act in environmental issues (like the one we are facing) with the Precautionary Principle in mind. The precautionary principle denotes a duty to prevent harm, when it is within their power to do so, even when all the evidence is not in. This principle has been codified in several international treaties to which Canada is a signatory.

It is time to reconsider this dubious practice of land application of biosolids. There are alternatives (see recent clean incineration methods in Denmark and Germany that actually return energy to the grid) that may have an initial cost for the government to implement, but future medical costs and environmental clean-up costs will surely amount to much more in the long-term.

Thank you for your email of September 11, 2013, addressed to Honourable Terry Lake, Minister of Health, in which you expressed concerns regarding the effects of Coast Environmental's facilities on odour and air quality in Chemainus. I am responding on his behalf.

Coast Environmental's facilities are regulated under the Cowichan Valley Regional District's (CVRD) Bylaw 2570. This bylaw was adopted in 2004, and amended in 2006, in order to regulate and help reduce the social and environmental impacts associated with private municipal solid waste and recycling facilities. For more information on the CVRD's Waste Management Plan, please visit: http://www.cvrd.bc.ca/DocumentCenter/Home/View/522.

The CVRD has been tracking public feedback about Coast Environmental's operations and has, in response, issued warnings to ensure they are complying with municipal regulations. Should compliance measures not be met, enforcement penalties will be applied. I have been advised that Coast Environmental has identified possible improvements to its biofilter system and is currently looking into potential modifications to reduce odour emissions. Furthermore, they also recently rewrote their composting operation plan to ensure better containment and storage measures in order to minimize odour. Coast Environmental has applied under their current licence to add a recycling facility to manage the following materials: cardboard, paper, drywall, shingles, metal, wood, furniture/mattresses, glass/ceramics, concrete, construction/demolition waste, and residual garbage. They have also applied to amend their current composting licence to address worker's safety issues associated with grinding yard and garden inside the composting building. As mentioned in the above link, an Open House was held at Coast Environmental's Chemainus Industrial Park operation on Thursday, September 19th, 2013, including a question period for citizens to ask about the firm's planned recycling operation. I have spoken with Ilse Sarady of the CVRD who informs me that you attended the Open House and provided your feedback. If you wish to submit additional feedback to the CVRD about Coast Environmental's abovementioned plans, please submit written comments by September 30, 2013, by emailing: es@cvrd.bc.ca.

Ms. Sarady also advised me that WorkSafe BC is conducting interviews with concerned citizens about this issue and that you are in the midst of being put in contact with a WorkSafe BC

representative. I encourage you to continue working with the CVRD and WorkSafe BC about this matter.

I hope this information helps to both inform you and address some of your concerns.

Thank you for your email of March 21, 2015, outlining your community group's concerns with the biosolids composting facility located along Sunshine Valley Road, west of Merritt, and the land application of biosolids near your community.

As you are aware, the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation, under which these facilities and the land application of biosolids are permitted, is administered by the Ministry of Environment. As such, we cannot comment on the permitting process that is required under that regulation.

Health officers at the local health authority have the opportunity to comment on land applications of biosolids when a Land Application Plan is referred by the applicant to the health authority office. Concerns with a proposed land application can be raised by the health officer at that time, including, if necessary, a directive to not apply the biosolid. Health officers can also respond to concerns raised by community members over the perceived risks to human health that may result from a proposed biosolid application or a composting facility.

We appreciate the amount of effort that the Friends of the Nicola Valley have made to raise your concerns around biosolid composting and the land application of biosolids. We encourage you to continue your dialogue with local health authority staff and representatives from the Ministry of Environment to have your concerns duly considered.

Our united response to the Government's failure to address our issue:

The Friends of the Nicola Valley, now almost a 1,000 strong (and supported by a local petition of some 3,000) have been struggling hard for many months now to safeguard our local environment. Our visible protests along Hwy 8 have railied a great deal of community support and awareness on this issue. So many have expressed their joy at working together (First Nations and non-Native peoples of the Valley) to bring about change - to work towards a future that will ensure health and security for everyone living in this wonderful valley.

What is our goal? Simply this - to end all importation of sewer sludge into our Valley, and to immediately have the facility on Sunshine Valley Road dismantled, and the sludge piles taken back to the communities that trucked it here. This is a modest request. This is a reasonable request. Mostly however, it is a fair request! Other communities must look after their own sewer sludge. We will not be the dumping ground for the concentrated end-product of other people's water treatment facilities. We will not stand idly by and watch the heavy metals and other toxins accumulate in our forest, on our lands, or in our waters.

This area is known for its beauty and its healthy environment. Our tourism economy will only suffer as we get buried deeper and deeper by other cities' toxic waste. But more than this is jeopardized by this reckless practice. First Nations Elders have spoken of how they are gravely concerned about how traditional hunting and gathering in the forests have been disrupted. They have spoken about not being able to drink from the streams they once did, or eat the herbs and berries they once collected. Thank you for your email of June 13, 2015, to the Honourable Terry Lake, Minister of Health, expressing your concerns regarding the biosolid facility operated by Arrow Transportation Systems near Barnhartvale. I am responding on his behalf.

This type of soil development facility is permitted under the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation and overseen by the Ministry of Environment. The Ministry of Environment contact is Barb John and I have copied her on this email to register your concerns with their office.

It is not within the jurisdiction of the Ministry of Health to impose operating conditions on these facilities, unless a threat to human health is evident.

A biosolid growing medium from this facility is derived by combining a finished biosolid product, in this case a 'Class A' biosolid, with a material that reduces the organic matter content and increases the overall carbon to nitrogen ratio of the material, in this case sand and wood/bark chips. A Class A biosolid is derived from the solid part of treated municipal waste, and is a stabilized, pathogen-reduced substance that meets the quality parameters of B.C.'s Organic Matter Recycling Regulation. These stringent quality parameters are established to protect the environment and human health.

I appreciate that the amount of truck traffic to and from the facility is also of concern to you and it is not clear from your photos whether the dust is a result of the private roadway to the facility, the material being transported, or the handling of material at the facility. In any event, concerns regarding air quality can be raised with both the Ministry of Environment and with your local municipality or Regional District, as there may be bylaws or permit requirements that set limitations on dust pollution.

If you have specific concerns regarding your respiratory health or are feeling unwell, please seek medical attention. If you have concerns regarding the quality of your drinking water, I encourage you to raise your concerns with the Kamloops Health Protection Office at 250-851-7340. Some water supplies, such as the one serving Kamloops, are disinfected prior to public consumption, so that any potential impacts from pathogens in the water source are mitigated.

Thank you again for writing. I appreciate the opportunity to respond.

Arlene and Perry,

Could the provincial Environmental Health Advisory Committee undertake a review of organic matter composting? A commercial composting facility in the CRD has raised public concerns about odours, and more recently concerns have been expressed about the possibility of bioaerosols. The provincial compositing regulation addresses odours as a nuisance issue, but does not address bioaerosols. The UK has addressed bioaerosols in composting facilities by requiring a 250 metre setback from residences. I have not seen anything similar from other jurisdictions. It would be helpful to review this issue provincially to determine if there is sufficient evidence to request that the current provincial regulations be updated to require something similar to the UK in addition to any changes that may be needed in regard to odours.

I know, by searching on google, that the issue of odours has been expressed associated with commercial composters in other BC communities.

BACKGROUND:

The Blackwell Dairy Farm in Kamloops is the site of several non-agricultural operations including a waste landfill (operated since 1993), gravel and rock operations and a Biosolids Growing Medium production facility using Class A biosolids (operated by Arrow Transportation Systems). In addition, Arrow has registered under the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation (OMRR) to apply Class B biosolids on Blackwell land.

The application of Class B biosolids is for soil amendment/reclamation only at the Blackwell property and not for redistribution. Reclaimed soils contain up to maximum of 15% dry weight biosolids which is blended wet using sand, sawdust and existing soil mediums.

A qualified professional inspected the operation 4 times in 2015 and determined that Arrow was managing the biosolids in accordance with the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation (OMRR). MoE inspects the landfill annually. The most recent inspection in June 2015 found that the operation was meeting authorized landfill requirements.

During the summer of 2015, the facility received numerous complaints regarding stockpiled sawdust blowing on to residents below the property. In response, Arrow moved the stockpile and reduced its size and dust issues from the piles were resolved.

Recently the province received numerous complaints from Barnhartvale citizens living below (Dallas Dr.) and adjacent to the dairy farm (Gardiner Rd.). Citizens are concerned about health impacts of biosolids from dust from the farm. Their concerns have been highlighted by several media stories.

In April 2016, Interior Health issued a response to Barnhartvale citizens recommending they consult directly with their primary health care provider for a comprehensive clinical assessment of their symptoms. The documentation of the diagnosis and its potential association with biosolids could be used as part of a detailed investigation by Interior Health if deemed necessary.

DISCUSSION:

Recent discussions between MOE and Arrow Transport have confirmed that dust is occurring off the Blackwell property. Principle sources appear to be the gravel pit, gravel roads and springtime tilling of the soil. Arrow will be providing further information to MOE documenting dust sources.

MoE does not have sufficient evidence to suggest that the biosolids as applied at Blackwell pose a significant health risk. The biosolids at Blackwell come from sewage plants that are carefully monitored for compliance with environmental and human health standards and, based on compliance reviews in 2015, Arrow is meeting all land application requirements under OMRR.

It is also likely that biosolids application reduces dust at the farm given that the biosolid medium is damp, holds moisture and provides an organic layer for vegetative growth.

MOE plans to inspect the property in May to verify the operation's compliance with OMRR, confirm potential dust sources and meet with complainants. MOE will follow-up with Interior Health with regards to findings.

Merritt Biosolids - Drinking Water Protection Act Investigation Request Denied

Background

- Since December 2014, Interior Health has been involved in significant public and political attention regarding the use of biosolids in the Merritt and Nicola Valley areas. This attention has included media interviews, presenting at a public forum on Jan. 26, and briefing elected officials at the Thompson Nicola Regional District.
- The community and local First Nations continues to protest, lobby various levels of government, and most recently occupied Premier Christy Clark's office in Kelowna.
- On January 12, IH received a letter from the First Nation's Chiefs of the Nicola Valley regarding the
 application of biosolids within the Nlaka'pamux Territory. They request that all current activities
 cease and that no new notification proceed until the Crown and ministry regulators establish a
 meaningful dialogue. This letter references the Supreme Court of Canada's decision regarding the
 rights of aboriginal title to manage the land and resources in a manner that fits the vision for the
 territory.
- Interior Health responded to the letter referring the First Nations leaders back to the Ministry of Environment as the agency that oversees the legislation covering biosolids. This includes the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation (OMRR) and the Environmental Management Act.
- IH Health Protection staff attended a meeting with the Environment Minister and local First Nation representatives on Feb. 2 to discuss their concerns further.
- Throughout this time, Health Protection has established a tracking document to track complaints and calls related to biosolids. To date, ## complaints have been received. In response, Health Protection provides information on the process of biosolids and options for the complainant.
- On March 23, Interior Health received a request from the Nooaitch Indian Band for an investigation
 of a threat to drinking water under section 29 of the Drinking Water Protection Act (DWPA). This
 request is in regards to the Class B composting facility and biosolids land application plan located at
 2988 Sunshine Valley Road near Merritt. The Nooaitch band is concerned that both the
 composting facility and land application activities will negatively impact their drinking water, which is
 supplied by two ground water wells.
- When these requests are received, Interior Health designates a statutory decision maker (Environmental Health Officer) to review the complaint and available information to determine the next steps.
- After reviewing the request from the Nooaitch Indian Band, applicable submissions and the legislation, the Environmental Health Officer concludes that the evidence and facts do not warrant a Section 29 Investigation of a threat to drinking water at this time.
- · This is based on the following:
 - Since the composting facility and land application process are regulated by the OMRR, any prohibitions outlined in Sec 23(1) and 23(2) of the DWPA do not apply as it is clearly stated in Section 23 (3)(b) and 23(3)(c) of the DWPA that:
 - (3) The prohibitions in subsection (1) and (2) do not apply

- (b) if the introduction or activity is authorized or required under an enactment or the person is otherwise acting with lawful authority, or
- (c) in relation to an activity prescribed by regulation that is undertaken in accordance with any conditions prescribed by regulation.
- The land application plan for Sunshine Valley was received and there are no restrictions for the application of Class A biosolids or Class A compost within a watershed.
- The Class A biosolids will be applied as per the land application plan submitted by the Qualified Professional as required by section 7 of OMRR.
- IH also reviewed the Source Water Protection Plan completed by Kala Geosciences Ltd. (qualified professional) in April 2013. This information details that are the two groundwater wells servicing the Nooaitch Indian Band are both considered not to be under the direct influence of surface water.
- The Source Water Protection Plan recommends that the source water protection areas are set at a specific area, and both the composting facility and biosolids land application are located outside of these areas.
- Finally, IH does recommend the wells providing water to Nooaitch Indian Band be evaluated for Groundwater at Risk of Containing Pathogens as per the provincial guidelines. It also recommends that a long-term water quality program be developed for the water system that includes both microbiological and chemical parameters, which is best practice for water source protection and the safety of public health.

Key Messages

- Interior Health is committed to the protection of human health through the appropriate management
 of organic matter, including biosolids. We have recently been requested to conduct an investigation
 under the Drinking Water Protection Act regarding the impacts of biosolids on Sunshine Valley
 Road to wells serving the Nooaitch Indian Band.
- Based on the information available at this time, Interior Health finds the information does not warrant any further investigation of a threat to drinking water.
- We understand the community is concerned about the safety of biosolids in the Merritt and Nicola Valley and based on the information available there are currently no known drinking water health hazards.

Hi Tim – referrals are made from MOE to the health authority – it's up to the health authority to route it to the right person to respond. We often are consulted by their staff to provide advice. Our standard advice is that unless there is demonstrable, evidence-base health risk due to the proposed land application, or an obvious error in the proposed land application that is uncompliant, the permitting process through MOE, under the OMRR, for biosolids and land applications sufficiently accounts for risks to human health and pathways of exposure.

Most recently I have been responding to referral questions from Anita Ely at IH.

In this particular case I have not yet seen the correspondence given that MOH was apparently copied on the letter. When we receive the letter I would check in with IH to ensure our response is consistent with theirs.



We the Chief's of Nicola Valley, have become aware of several bio-waste operations within our territory. We would like to remind you that it is the duty of our leadership to protect our people and our land and water by whatever means necessary when an activity, project and/or development threatens to negatively impact our title and rights.

We would also like to remind you that the Supreme Court of Canada continues to re-affirm that the Crown has continually applied a false and impoverished view of aboriginal title and that our title includes the exclusive right of our people to manage the land and resources in a manner that fits our vision for the territory. Therefore please be aware that when the Crown proceeds with decisions that infringe on our constitutionally protected title and rights without our consent, that subsequent outcomes may be cancelled or reversed with damages owed.

Based on our current understanding of bio-waste operations we cannot continue to allow this activity to occur within our territory. We the Chiefs demand that all current activities cease and that no new notifications proceed until the Crown and ministry regulators establish a meaningful dialogue resulting in our support for such activities.

Be clear that should any of the bio-waste facilities continue operation or new notifications be allowed to proceed without consultation, that we will take every action available to us to ensure that our interests are protected.

Hi, I just got off the phone with the ADM at Environment. As you can imagine the centre is fully engaged in this situation and everything is being very carefully planned. Environment is spending the weekend pulling together a strategy for consideration next week by the premier's office which may include a 60 – 90 day pause on biosolid permits in the area, initiation of a science panel to review the situation, and some consideration at what additional monitoring and/or consultation could or should be put in place in the future. None of this is approved yet, but I provide this info as an indication of what may be in the plan.

Obviously, lots of implications in getting this wrong (liability issues related to bonefide businesses operating in accordance with the regulation, <u>Right to Farm Act</u>, importance of biosolids as a fertilizer, etc. etc.) and as you are all aware, very little risk to human health. If IHA can wait before any communication with the FNs for this to play out in the next week, that would be helpful.

Perry, I understand that IHA will be invited to the meeting on Wednesday with FNHA and the chiefs but it sounds like the expectation is that they will send the letter or explain what will be in the letter?

MoE is happy to meet with Environmental Health Policy Advisory Committee to work through the various issues MHO's and Health Protection Directors have – so we'll arrange that and hopefully that's a better place for Rob to have the discussion than encouraging a UBCM committee.

Lynn, we put together some info in the document attached, a bit more than was in Perry's earlier note, but might be helpful for your IHA meeting on Tuesday.

Biosolid Land Application - General Information

- The Organic Matter Recycling Regulation (OMRR), under which these facilities and the land application of biosolids are permitted is administered by the Ministry of Environment.

 - (3) The prohibitions in subsection (1) and (2) do not apply

- (b) if the introduction or activity is authorized or required under an enactment or the person is otherwise acting with lawful authority, or
- (c) in relation to an activity prescribed by regulation that is undertaken in accordance with any conditions prescribed by regulation.
- The land application plan for Sunshine Valley was received and there are no restrictions for the application of Class A biosolids or Class A compost within a watershed.
- The Class A biosolids will be applied as per the land application plan submitted by the Qualified Professional as required by section 7 of OMRR.
- IH also reviewed the Source Water Protection Plan completed by Kala Geosciences Ltd. (qualified professional) in April 2013. This information details that are the two groundwater wells servicing the Nooaltch Indian Band are both considered not to be under the direct influence of surface water.
- The Source Water Protection Plan recommends that the source water protection areas are set at a specific area, and both the composting facility and biosolids land application are located outside of these areas.
- Finally, IH does recommend the wells providing water to Nooaitch Indian Band be evaluated for Groundwater at Risk of Containing Pathogens as per the provincial guidelines. It also recommends that a long-term water quality program be developed for the water system that includes both microbiological and chemical parameters, which is best practice for water source protection and the safety of public health.

This letter is provided in response to the request from the Nooaitch Indian Band for an investigation of a threat to drinking water under section 29 of the *Drinking Water Protection Act (DWPA)*, received March 23, 2015.

The concerns that warranted this request were the possible impacts from the existing Class B composting facility and the Class A biosolids land application plan located at 2988 Sunshine Valley Rd., Merritt BC. The Nooaitch Indian Band is concerned that both the composting facility and land application activities will negatively impact their drinking water, which is supplied by two groundwater wells.

Both the composting facility and biosolids land application project are regulated by the *Organic Matter Recycling Regulation (OMRR) (B.C. Reg. 18/2002)*. The composting facility was constructed and is operating as per the requirements outlined in Section 24 of the *OMRR*, and as such, the provisions of Sections 23 of the DWPA do not apply. The evidence provided has, therefore, been reviewed in terms of likelihood of causing a drinking water health hazard under Section 25 of the DWPA.

The biosolids land application project is limited to the application of Class A biosolids and Class A compost. The Class A biosolids will be applied as per the land application plan submitted by the Qualified Professional as required by section 7 of the *OMRR*. Under section 13 of the *OMRR* there are no volume restrictions for the distribution of Class A compost. Additionally there are no restrictions for the land application of either Class A biosolids or Class A compost within a watershed.

The Source Water Protection Plan (SWPP) completed by Kala Geosciences LTD., in April of 2013 was also reviewed. In this document it is stated that the two wells being used (PW2 and PW3), are both considered not to be under the direct influence of surface water (Non-GWUDI). There was also chemical sampling conducted for the purposes of this report, and all parameters are within those set by the Canadian Drinking Water Guidelines. The SWPP recommends that the source water protection areas be set at an area of 100m around PW2, and 50m around PW3. Both the composting facility and biosolids land application project are located outside of these areas. The wells were not evaluated for Groundwater at Risk of Containing Pathogens (GARP) at this time, and it is recommended that this evaluation be conducted as per the Provincial guideline. It is also recommended that a long-term water quality monitoring program

Attendees from IH were Jessy (?) and Ivor Norlin. Casey was in person representing FNHA with Fionna Gorman, Sylvia Struck, and Peter Masey by phone. Nooaitch staff took minutes, but IHA has not received them yet.

Did the Nooaitch accept the information that was given to them or did it sound like their concerns were not adequately addressed and they were not listened too?

If by "accept" that means the Nooaitch had their concerns fully addressed, no - it was clear they are not satisfied that they have been listed too and had their concerns fully addressed. They discussed the Section 29 and DWPA in context of the broader issues of healthy communities and sustainable water and air sheds. Although IHA believes they understood (but didn't agree with) where IHA was coming from.

They would like to know if IH has done any testing in the past 4 years. I would need it in chronological order.

The section 29 investigation request is in context of a First Nations water system. IHA does not have jurisdiction over First Nation water systems and, as such, has not undertaken direct testing of the water systems over the past four years (or to their knowledge ever).

Do regional Surface Water protection plans fall under the health authorities? No. Source water protection is a multi-jurisdiction, multi-stakeholder responsibility depending on who is doing what on the land. Under the Drinking Water Protection Act, it is the water suppliers responsibility to assess and understand the risks in the watershed, and to provide treatment to mitigate those risks.

In the letter that IH did not send it talks about Section 25. What is a section 25. Section 25 of the Drinking Water Protection Act says that a drinking water officer may make an order if the drinking water officer has reason to believe that a drinking water health hazard exists, or if there is a significant risk of an imminent drinking water health hazard.

The band was calling for an investigation under the Drinking Water Protection Act. That is section 29 of the Drinking Water Protection Act (noted below). Section 29 is a request that anyone who has evidence of a threat to drinking water can request the health authority investigate.

Info form IHA suggests that after reviewing the request from the Nooaitch Band, applicable submissions and the legislation, the Environmental Health Officer concluded that the evidence and facts do not warrant a Section 29 Investigation of a threat to drinking water at this time.

MOE says that they would not be in charge of testing. This seems strange as they approved?

Generally, proponents of an activity are required to test. For biosolids, it would be the proponent that would be required to do testing of the compost. See above, IHA did not test nor does the drinking water system fall under their jurisdiction.

How the meeting went and a summary, who attended, what their reactions were?

Attendees from IH were Jessy (?) and Ivor Norlin. Casey was in person representing FNHA with Fionna Gorman, Sylvia Struck, and Peter Masey by phone. Nooaitch staff took minutes, but IHA has not received them yet.

Did the Nooaitch accept the information that was given to them or did it sound like their concerns were not adequately addressed and they were not listened too?

If by "accept" that means the Nooaitch had their concerns fully addressed, no - it was clear they are not satisfied that they have been listed too and had their concerns fully addressed. They discussed the Section 29 and DWPA in context of the broader issues of healthy communities and sustainable water and air sheds. Although IHA believes they understood (but didn't agree with) where IHA was coming from.

They would like to know if IH has done any testing in the past 4 years. I would need it in chronological order.

The section 29 investigation request is in context of a First Nations water system. IHA does not have jurisdiction over First Nation water systems and, as such, has not undertaken direct testing of the water systems over the past four years (or to their knowledge ever).

Do regional Surface Water protection plans fall under the health authorities?

No. Source water protection is a multi-jurisdiction, multi-stakeholder responsibility depending on who is doing what on the land. Under the Drinking Water Protection Act, it is the water suppliers responsibility to assess and understand the risks in the watershed, and to provide treatment to mitigate those risks.

In the letter that IH did not send it talks about Section25. What is a section 25.

Section 25 of the Drinking Water Protection Act says that a drinking water officer may make an order if the drinking water officer has reason to believe that a drinking water health hazard exists, or if there is a significant risk of an imminent drinking water health hazard.

The band was calling for an investigation under the Drinking Water Protection Act. That is section 29 of the Drinking Water Protection Act (noted below). Section 29 is a request that anyone who has evidence of a threat to drinking water can request the health authority investigate.

Info form IHA suggests that after reviewing the request from the Nooaitch Band, applicable submissions and the legislation, the Environmental Health Officer concluded that the evidence and facts do not warrant a Section 29 Investigation of a threat to drinking water at this time.

MOE says that they would not be in charge of testing. This seems strange as they approved? Generally, proponents of an activity are required to test. For biosolids, it would be the proponent that would be required to do testing of the compost. See above, IHA did not test nor does the drinking water system fall under their jurisdiction.

Biosolids in Merritt and Nicola Valley

ISSUE

Concerns rasied by the First Nation's Chiefs of the Nicola Valley regarding the application of biosolids within the Nlaka'pamux Territory

KEY FACTS

- The Ministry of Environment oversees the legislation covering biosolids. This includes the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation (OMRR) and the Environmental Management Act.
- Since December 2014, Interior Health (IH) has been involved in significant public and political
 attention regarding the use of biosolids in the Merritt and Nicola Valley areas. This attention has
 included media interviews, presenting at a public forum on January 26, and briefing elected officials
 at the Thompson Nicola Regional District.
- On January 12, IH received a letter from the First Nation's Chiefs of the Nicola Valley regarding the
 application of biosolids within the Nlaka'pamux Territory. The letter requested that all current
 activities cease and that no new notification proceed until the Crown and ministry regulators
 establish a meaningful dialogue. This letter references the Supreme Court of Canada's decision
 regarding the rights of aboriginal title to manage the land and resources in a manner that fits the
 vision for the territory.
- The community and local First Nations continue to protest and lobby various levels of government, and recently occupied Premier Christy Clark's office in Kelowna.
- Interior Health Authority, Health Protection staff attended a meeting with the Environment Minister and local First Nation representatives on Feb. 2 to discuss their concerns further.
- On March 23, Interior Health received a request from the Nooaltch Indian Band for an investigation
 of a threat to drinking water under section 29 of the Drinking Water Protection Act (DWPA). The
 request was in regards to the Class B composting facility and biosolids land application plan located
 at 2988 Sunshine Valley Road near Merritt. The Nooaltch band is concerned that both the
 composting facility and land application activities will negatively impact their drinking water, which
 is supplied by two ground water wells.
- When these requests are received, Interior Health designates a statutory decision maker (Environmental Health Officer) to review the complaint and available information to determine the next steps.
- After reviewing the request from the Nooaitch Indian Band, applicable submissions and the legislation, the Environmental Health Officer concluded that the evidence and facts do not warrant a Section 29 investigation of a threat to drinking water at this time.
- Health Protection staff met with the Nooaitch First Nation on May 15 to verbally communicate this
 decision.
- During this meeting Interior Health also recommend the wells providing water to Nooaitch Indian
 Band be evaluated for Groundwater at Risk of Containing Pathogens as per the provincial guidelines.
 It also recommends that a long-term water quality program be developed for the water system that
 includes both microbiological and chemical parameters, which is best practice for water source
 protection and the safety of public health.
- The Province is developing an internal strategy to fund the First Nations' reasonable costs for participation in a scientific review of biosolids in the Nicola Valley.

Re: Section 29 Investigation Request for Nooaitch Community Water System

This letter is provided in response to the request from the Nooaitch Indian Band for an investigation of a threat to drinking water under section 29 of the *Drinking Water Protection Act (DWPA)*, received March 23, 2015.

The concerns that warranted this request were the possible impacts from the existing Class B composting facility and the Class A biosolids land application plan located at 2988 Sunshine Valley Rd., Merritt BC. The Novaitch Indian Band is concerned that both the composting facility and land application activities will negatively impact their drinking water, which is supplied by two groundwater wells.

Both the composting facility and biosolids land application project are regulated by the *Organic Matter Recycling Regulation (OMRR) (B.C. Reg. 18/2002)*. The composting facility was constructed and is operating as per the requirements outlined in Section 24 of the *OMRR*, and as such, the provisions of Sections 23 of the DWPA do not apply. The evidence provided has, therefore, been reviewed in terms of likelihood of causing a drinking water health hazard under Section 25 of the DWPA.

The biosolids land application project is limited to the application of Class A biosolids and Class A compost. The Class A biosolids will be applied as per the land application plan submitted by the Qualified Professional as required by section 7 of the *OMRR*. Under section 13 of the *OMRR* there are no volume restrictions for the distribution of Class A compost. Additionally there are no restrictions for the land application of either Class A biosolids or Class A compost within a watershed.

The Source Water Protection Plan (SWPP) completed by Kala Geosciences LTD., in April of 2013 was also reviewed. In this document it is stated that the two wells being used (PW2 and PW3), are both considered not to be under the direct influence of surface water (Non-GWUDI). There was also chemical sampling conducted for the purposes of this report, and all parameters are within those set by the Canadian Drinking Water Guidelines. The SWPP recommends that the source water protection areas be set at an area of 100m around PW2, and 50m around PW3. Both the composting facility and biosolids land application project are located outside of these areas. The wells were not evaluated for Groundwater at Risk of Containing Pathogens (GARP) at this time, and it is recommended that this evaluation be conducted as per the Provincial guideline. It is also recommended that a long-term water quality monitoring program

BACKGROUND REGARDING THE ISSUE:

- Biosolids are nutrient rich solid organic materials obtained from wastewater treatment processes and can be used for fertilizer.
- The application of biosolids is governed under the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation (OMRR), a joint regulation under both the Environmental Management Act and the Public Health Act.
- Proponents interested in applying biosolids greater than five cubic meters, are required to notify both a director with the Ministry of Environment (MOE) and a Medical Health Officer in the appropriate health authority. MOE reviews applications and develops land application standards for human health and ecological protection and Interior Health reviews the information for any additional human health concerns.
- On August 14, Interior Health (IH) was notified of a Petition to the Supreme Court of British Columbia requesting a review of the decision by Anita Ely, Environmental Health Officer, decision-under the OMRROMRR for the biosolids notification to proceed on the Dry Lake application, also known as Woodward Road.
- The petitioner, Elizabeth Dybikowski and Miller's Sunshine Valley Estates Society, is requesting the following orders:
 - "Set aside the June 4, 2015 decision of Anita Ely pursuant to section 22(4) of the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation, BC Reg 18/2002"
 - "An order remitting the Decision for further review and redetermination by the Medical Health Officer with jurisdiction in light of this Court's reasons and any directions"
 - "An order directing that the May 4, 2015 Biosolids Land Application Plan of AM-2 Ventures Ltd. not proceed pending the redetermination noted in item 2, above."
 - o "Costs."
- This comes after IH's Environmental Health Officer determined on June 4 that a
 proposal to apply bio-solids on a property above Woodward Road in the Merritt area
 would not cause a risk to human health, based on current evidence, and therefore,
 could proceed.
- Interior Health has secured counsel for this petition, and is formulating a response for the 21 day deadline of September 4.
- Biosolids are nutrient rich organic materials obtained from wastewater treatment (sludge) and can be used for fertilizer.
- The application of biosolids is governed under the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation, a joint regulation under both the Environmental Management Act and the Public Health Act.
- As a result, proponents interested in applying biosolids greater than five cubic meters, are required to notify both the Ministry of Environment, and Interior Health (through the Medical Health Officer). MOE reviews for environmental considerations, and Interior Health, from a human health perspective.

- At Interior Health, the authority to review these applications <u>has been is</u>-delegated from the Medical Health Officer to the Environmental Health Officer.
- Under OMRR, tThe Medical Health Officer (or delegated authority) may provide direction within 30 calendar days to the proponent that they of a may proceed, "must not proceed" or "may proceed subject to conditions specified by the MHO".
- When Interior Health receives an application, an Environmental Health Officer reviews whether the human health risks have been adequately considered by the Qualified Professionals preparing the plan, taking into account the type of material being applied and the detailed location of the application. This includes evaluating the hazardousness of the product (from a chemical, physical and microbiological perspective), the likelihood to move through the environment and enter into humans, the probable exposure concentrations to humans, and the likelihood of adverse health effects. Consideration is also given to the population at risk (vulnerable populations) and the length of exposure.
- Interior Health receives approximately 20 25 applications each year.
- The application of biosolids is not new, and has been ongoing in the Nicola Valley for some time.
- Since December 2014 there has been increasing public and media interest triggered by the <u>regulatory</u> application for Dry Lake (a.k.a. Woodward Road). This includes local residents of Miller Estates-raised, a group identified as The Friends of the Nicola Valley, and local First Nations who would all like to see an end to the use of biosolids in the Nicola Valley. The First Nations have gone further to request a moratorium on the application of biosolids on traditional lands.
- In July, the Suzuki Foundation also expressed concern about the human health impacts of biosolids and funded and completed testing of land applied biosolids in the area – this garnered significant media attention, IH received no media requests.
- Through this period of increased attention to the use of biosolids Interior Health has been involved in
 - o reviewing notifications of biosolid land applications under OMRR,
 - o responding to public health complaints under the Public Health Act
 - responding to requests for investigations under the Drinking Water Protection Act.
- The work described above has <u>all-predominately</u> been related to the Dry Lake (Woodward Road) Application, Sunshine Valley Class B composting site near Merritt, and most recently the Blackwell Dairy biosolids operation east of Kamloops.
 - Interior Health has also been sharing information with local governments, the First Nations Health Authority and the Ministry of Environment regarding IH's involvement in biosolids.

Advice and Recommended Response:

- I understand the Nooaitch Indian Band requested that Interior Health conduct an
 investigation of the impact of <u>applying the bio-solids to land composting facility</u>
 near in Merritt and <u>in the Nichola Valley on the quality of their drinking water</u>,

evidence of a drinking water health hazard no risk to human health, as well water is not affected by the bio solids operation; therefore, to warrant an further investigation at this timewas not warranted.

- Health authorityInterior Health-drinking water officials have met with the Band representatives and provided a letter to explaining this position.
- The Ministry of Environment is establishing a Technical Working Group to conduct a scientific review on the use of biosolids in the Nicola Valley, which includes representatives from Interior Health.
- The scientific review will focus on:
 - Developing a monitoring and testing regime for biosolids in Nicola Valley
 - Reviewing the effectiveness of the current requirement for a Land Application Plan; and
 - Reviewing research on how biosolids impact <u>humans and</u> wildlife and determine if any monitoring or testing is required.
- Recommendations stemming from the review are expected later this fall and will be made public.
- I know that Interior Health and the First Nations Health Authority will continue to work with the Band to help resolve any outstanding concerns they may have.

Merritt Biosolids – Organic Matter Recycling Regulation and Drinking Water Protection Act Investigation Request Denied

BACKGROUND REGARDING THE ISSUE:

- Biosolids are nutrient rich solid organic materials obtained from wastewater treatment processes and can be used for fertilizer. The application of biosolids is not new and has been ongoing in the Nicola Valley for some time.
- The application of biosolids is governed under the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation (OMRR), a joint regulation under both the Environmental Management Act and the Public Health Act and administered by the Ministry of Environment.
- Proponents interested in applying biosolids greater than five cubic meters are required to notify both a director with the Ministry of Environment (MOE) and a Medical Health Officer in the appropriate health authority. MOE reviews applications for compliance with OMRR standards related to human health and ecological protection and the health authority reviews for any additional human health concerns.

WOODWARD ROAD/DRY LAKE (NICOLA VALLEY)

- In June 2015, Interior Health determined that based on the evidence, a proposal to apply biosolids on a property above Woodward Road in the Merritt area would not cause a risk to human health, and therefore, can proceed.
- However, in recognition of ongoing community concern about the application of biosolids in the
 region, Interior Health has recommended to the proponent to initiate a dialogue with the
 community. This would be in keeping with best management practices that support a healthy
 community.
- The proposal is to apply biosolids from July until December, 2015. This application has now expired.
- In August 2015, IH was served a petition in the Supreme Court of BC requesting a judicial review of the decision by Environmental Health Officer (EHO) Anita Ely on this notification. The petition challenges the EHO's authority, the fact the decision was evidence based, as well as her professional conduct as she has provided guidance to biosolids companies in the line of her work.
- Interior Health is disputing these claims in court with legal counsel, no date has been set.
- Since the filing of the petition, Interior Health has received a request from the Sunshine Valley
 Estates Society for an investigation of a threat to drinking water under section 29 of the
 Drinking Water Protection Act (DWPA). The responsible Drinking Water Officer continues to
 consult with the Sunshine Valley Estates Society regarding their concerns articulated in the
 section 29 request.
- Note: the application that generated the Sunshine Valley Estates Society's concerns expired without the application of biosolids. A homeowner's group purchased property above Woodward Road and plans to prevent application of biosolids.

BLACKWELL DAIRY FARM (KAMLOOPS)

- In August 2014, Interior Health determined that based on the evidence, a proposal to apply biosolids on property at Blackwell Dairy would not cause a risk to human health, and therefore, can proceed.
- In August 2015, Interior Health received complaints from Kamloops residents of health
 concerns related to the biosolids application. Interior Health has been in further contact with the
 residents and to date has not found any evidence of adverse health effects from the operation.
 Blackwell Dairy relocated a sawdust pile on site under the direction of the City. No further
 complaints have been received.
- In November 2015, Interior Health received notice of proposal to continue applying biosolids to the Blackwell Dairy property.

SUNSHINE VALLEY ROAD COMPOSTING FACILITY (NICOLA VALLEY)

- In March 2015, Interior Health received a request from the Nooaitch Indian Band for an
 investigation of a threat to drinking water under section 29 of the DWPA. This related to a
 Class B composting facility and biosolids land application plan located at 2988 Sunshine Valley
 Road near Merritt. The First Nation expressed concerned that both the composting facility and
 land application activities would negatively impact their drinking water, which is supplied by two
 ground water wells.
- Interior Health reviewed the information, and it was determined that the evidence and facts did
 not warrant a Section 29 investigation of a threat to drinking water. This information was
 relayed to the First Nation in a face-to-face meeting in May and a subsequent letter dated
 August 10, 2015.

DISCUSSION/ADVICE:

- Since December 2014, there has been increasing public and media interest triggered by the
 regulatory application for Dry Lake (a.k.a. Woodward Road). This includes local residents of
 Miller Estates, a group identified as The Friends of the Nicola Valley, and local First Nations
 who would all like to see an end to the use of biosolids in the Nicola Valley. The First Nations
 have gone further to request a moratorium on the application of biosolids on traditional lands.
- In July 2015, the Suzuki Foundation funded testing of land applied biosolids in the area and say they found at least 10 chemicals above provincial standards. This study garnered significant media attention.

ADVICE AND RECOMMENDED RESPONSE:

- I understand the Nooaitch Indian Band requested that Interior Health conduct an investigation of the impact of applying biosolids to land near Merritt and in the Nicola Valley on the quality of their drinking water, under the Drinking Water Protection Act.
- In reviewing the Nooaitch request, Interior Health determined that there is inadequate evidence of a drinking water health hazard to warrant further investigation at this time.
- Interior Health drinking water officials have met with the Band representatives and provided a letter explaining this position.
- The Ministry of Environment has established a Biosolids Scientific Review process to examine the use of biosolids in the Nicola Valley. The process includes a Principals Table, and Advisory Committee and a Technical Working group. Representatives from Interior Health Authority are on the Advisory Committee and the Technical Working Group.

ADVICE TO MINISTER

- The scientific review will focus on:
 - o Developing a monitoring and testing regime for biosolids in Nicola Valley
 - Reviewing the effectiveness of the current requirement for a Land Application Plan; and
 - Reviewing research on how biosolids impact humans and wildlife and determine if any monitoring or testing is required.
- Recommendations stemming from the review are expected this year and will be made public.
- I know that Interior Health and the First Nations Health Authority will continue to work with the Band to help resolve any outstanding concerns they may have.

Good afternoon.

MoE contacted IH late yesterday afternoon to advise of an accident near Big Bar (6.2 km north of Big Bar Ranch) that involved the rollover of a biosolids truck into Big Bar Creek. IH Health Protection has been monitoring the situation, with information from the company and environmental company supporting the clean up, IH does not have staff on site.

As of this morning, the company has advised that approximately 7 tonnes did enter the creek, 3 tonnes had been removed, and was still working on remediation plans for the remaining 4 tonnes.

At this time the risk to human health is low, as normal treatment to surface water sources should deal with the biological hazards and the chemicals would not be in high enough concentrations to pose a measureable threat to downstream users.

That being said, for public messaging purposes, it's important to be aware of the sensitivities around the risks of biosolids.

If you require anything further from IH, please don't hesitate to contact me. We have had no media requests at this time.

BACKGROUND:

- The Blackwell Dairy Farm in Kamloops is the site of several non-agricultural
 operations including a waste landfill (operated since 1993), gravel and rock operations
 and a Biosolids Growing Medium production facility using Class A biosolids
 (operated by Arrow Transportation Systems). In addition, Arrow has registered under
 the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation (OMRR) to apply Class B biosolids on
 Blackwell land.
- The application of Class B biosolids is for soil amendment/reclamation only at the Blackwell property and not for redistribution. Reclaimed soils contain up to maximum of 15% dry weight biosolids which is blended wet using sand, sawdust and existing soil mediums.
- A qualified professional inspected the operation 4 times in 2015 and determined that Arrow was managing the biosolids in accordance with the Organic Matter Recycling Regulation (OMRR). MoE inspects the landfill annually. The most recent inspection in June 2015 found that the operation was meeting authorized landfill requirements.
- During the summer of 2015, the facility received numerous complaints regarding stockpiled sawdust blowing on to residents below the property. In response, Arrow moved the stockpile and reduced its size and dust issues from the piles were resolved.
- Recently the province received numerous complaints from Barnhartvale citizens living below (Dallas Dr.) and adjacent to the dairy farm (Gardiner Rd.). Citizens are concerned about health impacts of biosolids from dust from the farm. Their concerns have been highlighted by several media stories.
- In April 2016, Interior Health issued a response to Barnhartvale citizens recommending they consult directly with their primary health care provider for a comprehensive clinical assessment of their symptoms. The documentation of the diagnosis and its potential association with biosolids could be used as part of a detailed investigation by Interior Health if deemed necessary.

DISCUSSION:

- Recent discussions between MOE and Arrow Transport have confirmed that dust is
 occurring off the Blackwell property. Principles sources appear to be the gravel pit,
 gravel roads and springtime tilling of the soil. Arrow will be providing further
 information to MOE documenting dust sources.
- MoE does not have sufficient evidence to suggest that the biosolids as applied at Blackwell pose a significant health risk. The biosolids at Blackwell come from sewage plants that are carefully monitored for compliance with environmental and

- human health standards and, based on compliance reviews in 2015, Arrow is meeting all land application requirements under OMRR.
- It is also likely that biosolids application reduces dust at the farm given that the biosolid medium is damp, holds moisture and provides an organic layer for vegetative growth.

NEXT STEPS:

 MOE plans to inspect the property in May to verify the operation's compliance with OMRR, confirm potential dust sources and meet with complainants. MOE will follow-up with Interior Health with regards to findings.

Thank you for your email of March 15, 2016 outlining your health concerns and the biosolid operations in your area.

I welcomed the opportunity to meet on March 22, 2016 with several area residents to discuss the issues of concern and to view the local area firsthand. After that meeting, a conference call was held with Health Protection program managers and Medical Health Officer Dr. Kamran Golmohammadi to further discuss your concerns and what steps may be taken.

The handling and application of biosolids is governed under the Ministry of Environment Organic Matter Recycling Regulation, which falls under the *Environmental Management Act* and *Public Health Act*. This regulation sets standards for biosolids production and land application in British Columbia. Please note that Municipal and Regional authorities may also have varying degrees of jurisdiction in governing land use practices.

Ministry of Environment oversees operational issues. At this time we are not aware of any operational issues or non-compliance. Furthermore, it should be noted that from a regulatory standpoint, it is difficult to implement enforcement upon an operation that performs legally within the conditions of the respective governing legislation to date.

In regards to health concerns, to our knowledge while odour, and particulate matter in the air from organic matter recycling operations may result in respiratory irritation, transmission of infectious agents through air is extremely rare. Your group has expressed concerns with health effects. To identify individuals with adverse health effects, self-reporting is recognized as one of the most effective approaches. As a first step, concerned residents with clinical complaints should consult directly with their primary health care provider (doctor) for a comprehensive clinical assessment of their symptoms. Documentation of their diagnosis and its potential association with the biosolid operation should be provided to assist in our review. Should your doctor require further assistance in clinical assessment of complex symptoms and complaints, a medical consultation with a specialist doctor may be required as per standards of clinical practice and clinical guidelines. Once the initial review of the aggregate clinical data is complete, an assessment of exposure factors and potential associations to air quality could be carried out through more detailed investigations.

We acknowledge your concerns regarding air quality and health, and look forward to receiving the clinical assessments conducted by doctors on those individuals with medical complaints. On one hand our Mayor flies across the Country to assess what effects an operating mine has on populations living near the mine. Our Mayor will not drive the ten minutes out here to assess what is happening in real time from a real working operation, he will not even return an email?

This is wrong, not just on the Mayor's end! Last week there was interest in possible air quality testing during a severe wind event. Then the official spoke to the owner/operator, my next conversation with that official was as different as night and day. "No need to worry, they will do some testing on their own", etc., etc., etc., this happens every time any official begins to help? And we mean every time.

This is the only community in BC where Class B biosolids are shredded directly above populations with no concern for possible health issues, completely contrary to all the research on the dangers?

Again – This is wrong! We are British Columbians and deserve as much consideration for our health and well being as the Ajax issue has!
