Good morning Minister,

I believe it is time to officially declare a public health emergency. Attached is the Notice of Event (declaration of public health emergency) that we have developed with legal advice. I recommend this be issued because the Notice protects me from having to address reconsiderations, it allows me to make oral Orders and authorize health officers to work in other regions, it provides the Minister (you) with regulation making powers and ability to vary the Public Health Act if needed. Declaration of a public health emergency also underscores the very serious nature of the current situation.

This can be done in concert with a declaration under the Emergency Programs Act and I know Minister Farnworth and you are discussing that or as a first step and invoking the EPA in the coming days. We should make a decision this morning and can announce this afternoon?

On the basis of the information that has been reported to me in my capacity as the Provincial Health Officer, I reasonably believe that the following criteria found in section 52 (2) *Public Health Act* exist:

- (a) the regional event could have a serious impact on public health;
- (b) the regional event is unusual or unexpected;
- (c) there is a significant risk of the spread of an infectious agent; and
- (d) there is a significant risk of travel or trade restrictions as a result of the regional event.

The purpose of providing this notice is to enable the exercise of the powers in Part 5 of the *Public Health Act* in responding to the event.
