

#### Joint statement on Province of British Columbia COVID-19 response and latest updates

Adrian Dix, Minister of Health, and Dr. Bonnie Henry, B.C.'s provincial health officer, have issued the following joint statement regarding updates on the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) response in British Columbia:

"Today, we are announcing 165 new cases, including two epi-linked case, for a total of 7,663 cases in British Columbia.

"There are 1,705 active cases of COVID-19 in the province, 2,949 people who are under active public health monitoring as a result of identified exposure to known cases, and 5,719 people who tested positive have recovered.

"Currently, 57 individuals are hospitalized with COVID-19, 22 of whom are in intensive care. The remaining people with COVID-19 are recovering at home in self-isolation.

"Since the start of the pandemic, there have been 2,714 cases of COVID-19 in the Vancouver Coastal Health region, 3,937 in the Fraser Health region, 196 in the Island Health region, 489 in the Interior Health region, 241 in the Northern Health region and 86 cases of people who reside outside of Canada.

"There has been one new COVID-19 related deaths, for a total of 220 deaths in British Columbia. We offer our condolences to everyone who has lost their loved ones during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"There have been one new health-care facility outbreaks at Delta Hospital in the Fraser Health region. In total, 11 long-term care or assisted-living facilities and four acute-care facilities have active outbreaks.

"There have been no new community outbreaks, although there continue to be community exposure events.

"Alerts are posted on the BC Centre for Disease Control's (BCCDC) website, as well as on health authorities' websites, providing details on where the potential exposure occurred and what actions to take - whether you need to self-isolate or monitor for symptoms.

"For schools, public health teams will contact individuals through contact tracing, and schools will continue to issue alerts when a school exposure has occurred and action is required. Supporting these protocols, the BCCDC website and health authorities are also publishing notifications.

"COVID-19 requires compromise and give and take. Today our focus is to have as much as possible open and functioning in our communities – our essential services, our workplaces and our schools – while limiting our exposure to higher risk activities and locations.

"This give and take is a sacrifice for all of us, but is one that will keep us safe in the weeks and months ahead. While we all do our part, supporting all of us has been B.C.'s research and scientific community, who have been at the forefront of our B.C. response.

"Containing the spread of the virus in our communities is core to our COVID-19 response and that is why getting tested as soon as you have symptoms is so important.

"Today, a new made-in-B.C. sample collection program has been launched for all K-12 students across the province. One of the first of its kind worldwide.

"For school-aged children, four to 19, a mouth rinse gargle is now available at COVID-19 collection centres around B.C. Unlike the nasopharyngeal swab method, this new saline method doesn't require a health care professional to collect the sample.

"Taking the step to get tested is how you protect your friends and loved ones, and for K-12 students there is now an easier alternative.

"Not only is the new method more comfortable for younger people, a B.C. company will provide the collection tube, reducing the province's dependency on the global supply chain for this sample method.

"The restriction on gatherings to no more than 50 people is another protection layer to contain the spread. It important to remember that 50 people is an upper limit that needs to scaled down based on the space you are in.

"As we have seen, many businesses are only be able to safely accommodate just a few people, and the same applies for our homes – inside or out. Regardless of our location, when socializing with others, smaller is always safer.

"The compromise to keep ourselves and our loved ones safe, also includes seeing fewer friends and family members, for now.

"Our small groups need to be the same small groups. Spending time with different friends on different days significantly increases our personal risk and is a continued source of transmission in our province.

"So, when planning our activities, whether is a play date for your kids, or a weekend dinner party, ask yourself if the people are part of your 'safe six'?

"The restrictions and precautions are not forever, but they are needed right now. By stepping back now, we can protect those who are most vulnerable and keep the people we care about safe.

Bonnie Henry: So for today, September 17, we have a new high of 165 people who have been diagnosed with COVID-19 here in BC, including two who are epidemiologically linked, and that brings our total number of cases to 7,663 in BC. That includes 2,714 people in Vancouver Coastal Health, 3,937 in Fraser Health, 196 people on Vancouver Island Health, 489 people in Interior Health, 241 in the Northern Health region, and 86 people who normally reside outside of Canada.

We now have 1,705 active cases in BC in all health authorities, of whom 57 are now in hospital, 22 of whom are in critical care or ICU. We, unfortunately, have one additional death to report today. One of our seniors in long term care in Vancouver Coastal, bringing our total number of people who've died from COVID-19 to 220, and our condolences go to the family of this person, to his care providers and to his community, and we mourn his loss.

There are now 2,949 people under active public health monitoring and 5,719 who have recovered from COVID-19. We have a two new health care-related up breaks, both of them in acute care units, one at the Delta Hospital and the other at the rehab unit at the Peace Arch Hospital in Fraser Health. That brings our total number of active outbreaks now to 15 in the health care sector with 802 active cases; 478 residents and 324 staff.

We have no new community outbreaks to report, but we do continue to have exposure events and I would like to remind families and parents that for any potential case in our school, any exposure events in our school, public health teams will be contacting you if you need to. We'll contact the public as part of our contact tracing if and when self isolation or monitoring is required.

Schools will also continue to post information on school exposures, if there are any cases in schools, and supporting these protocols. The BC CDC website and health authorities are now publishing, as we indicated yesterday, school notifications. We have no outbreaks in our schools anywhere in BC at this point. We have had, and not unexpectedly, some staff and some students who had been in a school setting during a time where they may have been infectious to others. None of these have an high risk exposures and everyone has been notified who needs to monitor for symptoms.

On a positive note as well, we have some exciting new testing that we're able to provide for students in BC. Containing the spread of the virus in our communities is, of course, core to our

COVID-19 response and that's why getting tested as soon as anybody has any symptoms is incredibly important. While we all do our part, supporting all of us has also been our research and scientific community and we have been incredibly proud of the work that has been done by our research and scientific community here, across BC, and at the BC CDC with our postsecondary institutions and the private sector -- they have been supporting our BC response from the very beginning.

Taking the step to get tested is how you protect your friends, your family, and your community. And now for K-12 students we have an easier alternative than the nasopharyngeal swabs that has been the standard that we've been using. Today, a new made-in-BC sample collection program has been launched for all K-12 students across the province and it is one of the first of its kind around the world.

For school aged children in BC, so this aged four to 19, a mouth rinse gargle is now available at the COVID-19 collection centres or assessment centres around BC; so across the province. Unlike the nasopharyngeal swab, this is a new saline gargle where you put a bit of normal saline -- sterile water -- in your mouth, you swish it around a little bit and you spit it into a little tube, and that's an easier way to collect it for young people.

And you don't need to have it done by health care provider. This is something that you can do with the help of your parents, if needed, or by yourself. So not only is this new method more comfortable, particularly for our younger children, it's a BC company that is going to be providing the collection tubes, and this reduces our dependency as a province on the global supply chain which we know has been one of the challenges, particularly around our lab testing.

We're quite excited about this news and a huge congratulations and thank you to our scientists across BC and at the BC CDC. This is a really important thing for making testing accessible for our children and supporting keeping them in the all-important school environment.

We know now that living with COVID-19 requires all of us to consider that we need some give and take. We need to compromise. I can appreciate, as much as anyone, how difficult this can be, but it is essential for the wellbeing of all our communities and it recognizes the fact that we are going to be living with this virus in our communities for some time. It is not either/or. We must continue for our community wellbeing, both the economy and our health.

The BC Restart Plan is the focus of public health and many, many people supporting these efforts, and it is to have as much as possible opening and functioning safely in our communities. And we know that we've had essential services going through this entire period of time, whether it's in health care, our food system, our grocery stores, our pharmacies, there are many different essential services and we've adapted. We know how important it is to have work places, grocery stores, restaurants, and schools open for the wellbeing of our community.

And on the other side of the equation, we need restrictions and, at times, closures, are in place to limit the exposures to known higher risk activities and locations. And we've had to modify those over the last few weeks as we have seen cases increase. This give-and-take is not easy, but it is what will keep us safe and functioning in the months and weeks ahead. And I've said it many times, it is not forever, but it is what we need to do together now.

And this is going to be our most challenging year, but as we work together we build that resilience together and that's what will keep us safe and help us through this and help us bounce back.

One of the things that is really important at this point in time is that the restrictions we have on gatherings. And we have maintained a constant, consistent approach of no more than 50 people. This is another protective layer to contain the spread. It means [audio dropout at source] numbers of

people that when somebody inadvertently brings the virus into your collection of people, that group, it can't spread too widely.

But, we are seeing it spread, even in smaller groups, and we all need to take a step back and reassess.

remember that 50 people is an upper limit and only where you have the space to do that to maintain safe distances.

We need to scale down based on the space that you were in, and I need everybody to understand that now. Whether it is inside or outside, maintaining safe distances, is important. Keeping your numbers small is important.

Just because you can fit 50 people into your small back garden does not make it safe, and that is where we see transmission, and we see transmission to people we care about and now we are seeing spillover into people like grandparents, like elders, who are more susceptible to having severe illness from COVID-19.

We're in a global pandemic and these are the sacrifices we need to make. As we have seen, many businesses are only able to safely accommodate a few people. The same applies for our homes, inside and outside. Regardless of our location, when we are socializing with others, smaller is always safer.

The compromises we have made to keep ourselves, our loved ones, our communities safe means of seeing fewer friends and family members. For now.

The compromises -- our small groups also need to be the same small groups. Spending time with different friends on different days, significantly increases our personal risk, and means that we are now exposed to many more potential chains of transmission and is a continued source of transmission that we are seeing, in our communities now.

So when planning our activities, whether it is a play date for your kids, a weekend dinner party, a group of friends getting together, ask yourself if the people are part of your safe six. Your group of people. Our grandparents, our aunties, our workplaces, our communities depend on this.

Social connection, we all know, is essential. We are social creatures, we need that connection in our life for our mental and emotional well-being. But now is the time to stick with six, to keep our groups small and only spend time with the people we know, with our safe six.

The restrictions and precautions that we have put in place here are not forever but they are needed right now. By stepping back now, we can protect those most vulnerable --

-- that way, we can step forward with the routines that will keep our communities and loved ones safe. And course, we must remember, more than ever, as we get frustrated, as we get tired, as we get into respiratory season, we need to remember to be kind, remember to be calm. We will get through this storm.

And remember to be safe.

Adrian Dix: Thank you very much Dr Henry and on behalf of the Premier and the government and the people of BC, I want to extend my condolences to the family of the person who passed away in Vancouver Coastal Health in the past 24 hours from COVID-19 in long-term care. This is in particular, a difficult time for everybody, dealing with COVID-19, particularly those who lose a

loved one. It is impossible, to the same extent as we ordinarily do to have celebrations of life in the same way. And so that makes the grieving process all the more difficult and we want to stay to those who passed away, to the person yesterday, the 220 families who lost people, during this COVID-19 pandemic, to pass on our condolences and to hear their grief, understand their grief and be with their grief.

I wanted to note we have 165 cases as Dr Henry has said, overnight. We currently have 57 people in acute care hospitals, 23 in Fraser Health, one in Island Health, seven in the Northern Health authority and 26 in Vancouver Coastal Health. I note that this is down three from yesterday. We have 22 in critical care, and so obviously that is important work for people in our acute care system.

In addition, the people in public health or been doing a next ordinary job with extraordinary effort.

Just to put this in context, yesterday, 7,674 tests which is the highest that we had done in British Columbia since the beginning of the pandemic. 2,949 people who are contacts, who were under public health surveillance and in self isolation. And 1,705 active cases and I add to that 3,641 responses to 8-1-1 calls which is a significant number as well.

Everyone in public health is working very hard, working with people who are dealing with COVID-19 in BC directly. Supporting them and helping them to get well and I want to acknowledge their extraordinary work.

This being Thursday I also want to provide the weekly update on our surgical renewal commitment and the number of patients contacted about their surgery, has increased to 90,897. Between May 18th and September 13th, we competed one 102,598 surgeries. 78,437 of those rescheduled surgeries, 24,161 were unscheduled or emergency surgeries. That is 19,220 and Interior Health, 28,491 in Fraser Health, 23,829 in Vancouver Coastal Health, 20,848 in Vancouver Island Health, 5,941 Northern Health and 4,269 in the provincial health services authority.

Last week we reported 5,868 surgeries completed from August 31st to September 6th, health authorities have verified that data and the total number of surgeries completed was actually 6,085.

This past week that included Labour Day, in the count we completed 5,503 surgeries which is a significant amount, more than comparable to the past year at this time.

A key surgical renewal commitment is to add capacity by extending daily hours of operation, adding Saturdays and Sundays at the schedule and opening new operating rooms where available.

This week, Vancouver General Hospital opened two new operating rooms. Already on Vancouver Island from Campbell River to the Saanich Peninsula, surgical days are being expended and added in hospitals, including Campbell River, Comox Valley, Cowichan District, Royal Jubilee and Saanich Peninsula Hospitals.

Starting September 28th, Royal Columbian Hospital will extend hours in four operating rooms, gaining 6.5 hours per day in each OR.

Private contracts been expanded across all regional health authorities, in accordance with the Canada Health Act.

The health authorities have taken tremendous steps throughout the summer to add surgical capacity. The results have been reflected in our weekly updates where we have marked progress showing that we've caught up to pre COVID-19 surgery levels and beyond, and then we surpassed them.

Health authorities are continuing to add capacity, and will do so throughout the fall and into the spring.

From June 15th of this year to March 31st of next year, surgical capacity will increase by 16 percent. Moreover, this will increase by 24 percent and the year following.

We said we would catch up to surgeries lost to COVID-19 within 15 to 22 months when we announced the surgical plan. The Premier did, in May. We're on track to do exactly that.

All health authorities are projected to be caught up on surgeries lost to COVID-19 by the end of next year, as doing all of the surgeries that come forward.

Vancouver Island Health will be caught up by February 2021; Interior Health by May; Northern Health by June 2021; Vancouver Coastal and Provincial Health Services Authority by August; and Fraser Health by December 20121.

As we wrote in the surgical renewal commitment, on page 11, many factors will help shape success, including the potential for a second wave or a surge in COVID-19 in the fall and winter.

With that, and the other listed factors in mind, we will adjust our target timelines if circumstances require it.

I want to thank everyone involved in this extraordinary work by our health care system -- and it truly is extraordinary -- in the past months and in the coming months, to increase and improve services to people for surgery in a time of pandemic.

I also want to report on our contact tracing recruitment initiative as we have. We did last week. Just to note that to date, as you know the Premier announced 608, what are now 608, contact tracing positions.

To date, 153 people have been hired, and a further 137 are currently in the interview stage, with a further the 24 in the offer process. We have had 718 individuals who meet the qualifications referred to regional health authorities and the Provincial Health Services Authority, as required.

We are making extraordinary progress in hiring the contact tracers, as announced by the Premier.

In addition, and finally, the health care access program that was announced last Wednesday as part of the Premier's announcement of the health sector plan for the fall-winter management of COVID-19, we announced a major recruitment and training strategy [audio and video drop out at source].

The response to the announcement has been extraordinary. In just one week to the end of yesterday, 5,656 individuals have completed an online expression of interest. Intake will continue and the expressions of interest will be reviewed and screened against the program's required qualifications. The process is in full swing.

We're at Thursday and this is our last briefing for this week.

We are reminded yet again of cause and effect, how wildfires along the US coast unexpectedly caused significant health outcomes here, and forced us to quickly learn and adapt.

Indications are that in a few days the smoke will clear. And when it does, let's see COVID-19 more clearly for what it is; a complex virus, for its impact on our health and our lives, but one we've

learned we can push back by taking what are, I think we might agree, just a few basic steps to keep us all safe.

Stick to physical distancing. Stick with regular hand washing. Stick to staying home if we are not feeling well. Stick with wearing a mask when it's the right thing to deal. Stick to six. Make six the maximum number of people we socialize with outside of our household bubble -- our safe six.

And stick with the guidance Dr Henry provides us to bend the curve, not the rules.

This weekend, and as we plan for Thanksgiving and the fall months ahead, let's again close ranks on COVID-19 and change its course, through what we've learned about the virus and ourselves, and how we've adapted. Let's stick together in our effort. Let's stick with what works and let's stick with it to stop the spread.

### **QUESTIONS and ANSWERS**

Reporter: Thank you for taking my question.

Pretty much every day that you've had a briefing in the past month, probably, you've said keep your social interactions low, and stick to six people.

Within my pier group, I see people not following those rules, and some people are doing it on purpose and some people may be just don't understand where that distinction lays.

Do you think the stick-to-six thing is a little ambiguous for some demographics right now? Why do you think that message isn't getting across?

Bonnie Henry I think you said it yourself. Some people are frustrated and they feel that they have suffered a lot through this. And I particularly feel for young people -- young people who graduated this year from high school and missed out on all those important social interactions and who are going to universities that are mostly remote. It's a very challenging time.

I think some of what we are seeing is a reflection of that. I think some of it, as well, is what you say also, that people aren't realizing that if you have a different group of people every night, then you are exposing yourself to an exponential increased number of potential contacts, because every person you are exposed to, you're being exposed to their risk that they bring with them from where they have been before.

It's a challenging concept, I know, but what we have to realize is this is how we are seeing spread happen now. We were seeing it, certainly, in some large events and people having parties inside and outside where they were defying the rules. We are still seeing some of that. But, we all need to do the right thing and try to influence our friends, our peers, to make sure that they do take this seriously.

We are seeing now, spillover into hospitals. We are seeing where our elders, our grandparents, our seniors -- the people in our life who are most susceptible to ending up in hospital or dying from this virus -- are getting it.

And sometimes they are getting it because we are not being careful enough as young people, and we are bringing it home unintentionally and spreading it to those we love.

We have to make it real for all of us. We all have people in our life that are susceptible. We may not realize it. Not everybody you can tell how old they are, and not everybody you understand what

their own immune system may be doing. The more people get sick, the more chances are that we're going to have people infected who are going to get really sick from this.

And we have seen that around the world. We're not alone in what we are seeing right now. It is happening in France. It is happening in Spain. We know it is happening in the United States, and we have been watching that carefully.

We all need to do our bit. We can do it here and we can get through this. We have had a summer where we have had the opportunities to do some travel, to do some social interaction.

But as we move into respiratory season, as we do the necessary things to get children back into schools, to get our workplaces moving again and working again, we have to pull back on the social side.

Dix: And just to say that one of the very encouraging things we have seen in the last number of weeks is a number of young people who are part of our influencer efforts. So it's not just the Minister of Health, the provincial health officer, medical health officers, the system of government, delivering these messages, but young people speaking to young people.

We can all influence one another. And I really encourage people to be a part of this. So it's not going to be one slogan or statement or phrase -- stick to six -- that has all the answers for everybody. But we all have to, in our own ways, in our voice, deliver these messages.

Today, I reported on the extraordinary success that we're having in delivering surgeries in our public health care system. And that is people delivering above and beyond what they would normally do in a pandemic. And they need all of our support.

I think it's an inspiring story for everybody. And so, what we need is for everyone to be an influence, everyone to speak to. And if stick to six doesn't work for you, there are lots of other things you can say in addition to that, and that people can say in their own discussion in their own voices that can assist in this cause. We can all be leaders in the COVID-19 pandemic. And I encourage everyone to do that.

Reporter: Ontario has taken the next step to bring back some of those restriction on gatherings. And I think they have reduced them to 25 for outdoor gatherings. Going forward, if numbers don't go down, are you looking at imposing stricter restrictions?

Henry: The short answer is no. We have tried to pick a reasonable number, and to give people advice about what that actually means. And we have closed down places where it's not possible for them to be viable without people breaking the rules. So we are sticking with our numbers, but we also are -- as we just talked about -- appealing to people to make it fit. It doesn't mean that 50 is okay. If you're in a small place, it may mean that six is okay, or two, or having a small number of people over.

If it's outside you still need to maintain those safe distances, because what we're seeing is when you have lots of people together -- inside or outside -- and when they're close together, and talking together, and dancing, or kissing, or sharing food, we see this virus take hold. And it can spread very quickly in those settings. So people were concerned -- where are we seeing transmission? And that's what we're seeing now.

The places that we can modify, most importantly, are those social interactions where we're speaking loudly, where we're having close conversations, especially if they're indoors. And that is where this virus can spread really quickly.

Reporter: I was just wondering if you could tell us a little bit more about this test. Is it going to be self-administered? And also, is this because you want to get more children tested? Or is it because the swab test is particularly difficult for children, or a mixture of both? And how do you rate the mental health of children right now?

Henry: Two very good questions. So this test is kind of cool. It's something we have had in the works for a while. And it is a way that we have tried to make it more efficient so we don't have as long lineups, and it doesn't take as long to do. But we have had limited supplies.

So to start with, we focused on children because we know, right now, it's going to be very critical for children, if they start showing symptoms of COVID-19, and they're in a school setting, many of them will need to get tested. So it's a way to try and facilitate that and make that easier right now.

And yes, it can be done -- it needs to be done at an assessment centre, but it is done by the parent or the child themselves, rather than a heath care worker. So it's a combination of wanting to test more children, knowing that more children are going to need to be tested now that we're back in the school setting, and making it easier.

Ideally, and this is our plan as we're ramping up our testing, is making this type of a saliva test, or gargle test, it's just a different way of collecting it that makes it easier, without needing a health care worker. We want to have it available for everybody. Right now the focus is on children for the reasons of supply.

In terms of children's mental health, these are challenging times. And we have been working, as I have talked about a number of times, looking at the unintended consequences of the effects of the measures that we have put in place. And we know, for one, that suspension of in-class school very dramatically affects the mental health of children, and their wellbeing.

We know that there have been challenges around substance use, around violence, around interfamily violence that we know goes up when schools are not in session. So it is incredibly important. And we, as a community, and as a province, need to prioritize those school settings for our children for that reason. We do have some information, both from the survey that we did, and from data that we have collected, that shows that the mental health supports for many children have decreased, and it's not spread evenly.

Some of that information I presented a few weeks ago, and it is available on the BCCDC website. We know there have been challenges. And the one challenge I will bring up where the stats are still at the top of mind is, across the board, parents said -- about 80% of parents said -- that their children struggled with the online learning with classes being closed. So that's across all strata, all different race and ethnic groups, and all socioeconomic groups as well.

Reporter: This is going on a slight tangent, Dr Henry. With a lot of stores and coffee shops closing their restrooms, we are seeing more and more alleyways being used as toilets. Are you concerned that this might give rise to any other kinds of diseases? And what are you doing about that? Henry: That's not something that I had heard a lot of recently. Certainly early on there was concern that there was lack of access to facilities, particularly for people who are living on the street, or are under housed. I know communities across the province are looking at how they can address that, and it really is an issue that is being addressed at the municipal level and regional level.

So I don't have any specific information about that in the last few weeks. But I do know that that the city of Vancouver, Victoria, other places, have been looking at how they can support access to washroom facilities for people who need them.

Reporter: The group that represents bars and restaurants are asking to amend the public health order to allow liquor sales in the restaurants and bars until midnight instead of 10:00 pm. They say those two hours are just, they make up a huge chunk of their revenue, and it will be the difference between some of those shops surviving, or going bankrupt. And so now they're asking for those hours to be extended, and they're also asking for better consultation.

Henry: Okay. Yes. I received a letter from them, I think yesterday, with some of their concerns. And let's be very clear here. We do not make these decisions lightly. We have been working with the restaurant association, we have been working with bars, we have been working with industry from the very beginning.

And we put in the restrictions when it became clear that there were challenges meeting the safety requirements. And so we tried to be as specific as possible, and as supportive as possible as we can. So it was clear, from my colleagues, from the environmental health officers who were doing inspections, from the issues that we were seeing in communities around the province, that there comes a time of the night when things become liquor-forward, and we knew that there were ongoing issues with transmission.

And it was becoming unsafe; it was unsafe. We had transmission events documented in several places around the province. And it was becoming increasingly challenging for public health to try and identity and get on top of those places who were breaking the rules.

We were also hearing from WorkSafe and from employees in many of these restaurants and bars where things became out of hand, later at night, that they felt that they were at risk. So we took measures that we felt were reasonable.

We know that restaurants -- most of them close by ten or eleven o'clock. Most of them have perfect safety; they have very good safety plans in place. And they are working. But it is the late night, when they turn into a lounge-type environment where they were having challenges.

So we have consulted with industry. We have consulted with my colleagues who are trying to maintain our contact tracing, and ensure that places are able to maintain the safety measures. And we were still seeing transmission. So these orders were done with thought, and with the realization that these were places, right now, that cannot safely operate. And we're not alone in this. It's not like we have made this up.

If we look in countries who are dealing with this everywhere else, very similar restrictions are in place. We're looking at Ontario, Quebec, Alberta. The fact that some of these nightclubs were open in the first place was a challenge. And they were -- it has to do with the way the liquor licence laws are here in BC. So I appreciate that this is a very challenging time for people in that industry.

I also know that this virus is transmitted by people. And it's those environments where we're close to others indoors, where we're doing things without masks on, that are most risky. And this is the challenge that we face. So I think there needs to be things in place to support those restaurants, those bars, and nightclubs, and banquet halls that are affected by this. But these are the things that we need to do now so that we can get our communities through this next few months, maybe years.

Reporter: I just wanted to clarify another point that they made. They were hoping for better guidance on the orders, saying it's been more than a week since the verbal orders were issued, but they've not seen a written version yet. So they're having issues figuring out what actually is allowed.

So, I'm wondering when the written orders will be available.

Henry: The written orders, the legalese that goes into the written . . . The orders come into effect when they are given verbally, and we have answered many questions from the field who have sent it in to myself. I know that most of the questions have been answered and the details are there, but they need to be put through the legal phrasing to make sure that we are being as minimal as possible to address the issues that were concerns.

I'm hopeful they'll be up by tomorrow at the latest.

Dix: Thank you very much.

Clearly for the question, clearly the decisions made by medical health officers reflected the evidence on the ground, the evidence of transmission. And again, as Dr Henry has said, this is a profound challenge that everyone is facing in every jurisdiction about a virus that doesn't pay attention to our best wishes. It requires in many cases action.

In this case the decisions taken by public health were the right decisions based on public health and in the interests of everyone. They're absolutely, I believe, the right decisions to have made.

Reporter: Dr Henry, in terms of the record breaking cases today, why do you think this has happened? Is this testing that's been increased or is it the fact that we are seeing more incidents of people enlarging their social bubble?

Henry: It's a combination. Testing has certainly increased and that's partly awareness. It's partly the contact tracing that we're doing, and most of the cases that we're seeing still are links. So we know where the exposure events have happened.

Remember that today's cases are people who have been exposed over the last two weeks, so we're still dealing with those issues of transmission events that were happening ten days to two weeks ago, and these are people who for the most part are in isolation and then developed symptoms and are getting tested.

You can see the number of contacts is actually down a little bit and that reflects as well that sort of progression of what we're seeing.

So, this is us catching up with the events that have happened prior to basically about ten days ago.

Reporter: I'd like to ask about Langley Lodge. Fraser Health has provided some details on that leaked document around nurse and staff breaching protocols. Do you have a reaction to that and why wasn't the documents made public, and then why did we have to wait until a week to find out about this investigation at Langley Lodge?

Henry: I can't answer that second question. I was not aware of this document, but it is something that we do after every outbreak, every event. At least in public health we do. This was done apparently by the Lodge and it is so that we can learn. We learn from every single outbreak that we've had. You remember the first care home outbreak we had in Lynn Valley. We learned a tremendous amount from that. With each one we learn different things sometimes.

This was a very challenging outbreak, and you'll remember when we talked about it when we were going through that time, you know, the challenges that it was on at an Alzheimer's ward and how difficult it was to manage and how challenging it was for staff.

I think there are some very good learnings in that document and, to me, what it highlights is the challenge and how difficult it is once this virus gets into a long-term care home and how we must focus our efforts, as I've talked about several times today, on making sure that we're doing what we

need to do to try and keep it out of our care homes, to protect people who are living in those communal settings who are the most vulnerable in our community, to having severe illness and to dying from this virus.

This report reflects that in my mine more than anything.

Dix: In response to your direct question, I believe this is . . . As you know, Langley Lodge is a private, non-profit provider and this is an internal report to them. As I understand it, it was then distributed to the media in some way. So I think that's the reason, in response to your initial question.

I think there's two things to emphasize here. One is that because we've taken a team BC approach, because there was early and free access earlier on in the pandemic, earlier than everyone else to the PPE supply chain and the single site initiative and all the initiatives taken by the province, we saw dramatically lower levels of mortality in BC in long-term care than other places.

So that's the first thing to say. In fact, the lowest levels in North America and a lot of that has to do with the combined approach of our care providers, of our health care workers, of public health working together. So that's the first thing to say.

The second thing to say, and yet we've had significant numbers of people pass away or be affected in long-term care and the life of long-term care being profoundly affected by this, and it's why we continue to make improvements, working with care providers in a team BC approach. That's why we are investing \$160m more to support infection control and visitations. It's why we invested \$165m in the single site proposal. It's precisely because of the vulnerability of people in long-term care.

So we are going to constantly learn. We're going to learn all the time. We're going to do better. We're going to work in partnership. We're not going to work in a context of blame, but we're going to work in a context of getting better all the time because the stakes are very high in long-term care.

I just want to say finally that it reflects a broader societal question -- one of the reasons we have to work together to stop the spread, to stick to six. Whatever you want to say about it, is because people in long-term care and other places are vulnerable and health care workers who may themselves test positive or become sick with COVID-19 are so important to us, and we all have to be part of this effort to keep our long-term care homes safe.

We've done well relative to other jurisdictions, but every single day the first thing that I look at, I think the first thing Dr Henry looks at is issues of outbreaks and what's going on in our long-term care homes. We are focused on, and I know everyone in public health and everyone in long-term care is. It's a huge focus of us and we'll be continuing to work to get better every day.

Reporter: I know it's been a long afternoon. I appreciate your time here.

Dr Henry, I just want to circle back on enforcement. Not so much about the numbers, because you were pretty clear there, but just about the fines. I know you're a fan of carrots, not sticks. It's been pretty clear from day one. The Ontario fines are going up. \$10,000 for organizers. Up to \$750 for those who attend.

You talked a lot about transmission and contact tracing and where things are happening. My question for you is is the stick part working effectively in BC? We had that group camping event in the Interior. It's been a few weeks with enforcement here and awareness here. What do you make of it?

Henry: As you say, enforcement is a last resort and orders are a last resort if we aren't able to do things collectively together.

I do think there is a role for it and I think what we put in place is working. It certainly has made a different for some people. There will always be people that no matter what will try and squirt the rules. We've talked about that from the beginning. When you have a lot of rules a lot of people get frustrated with them and want to try and get around them.

So we've tried to keep the rules as minimal as possible and make it so that people are engaged in the process themselves. We've seen that. It works here in BC for the most part. Yes, we get frustrations. Yes, there are people who are bending the rules intentionally, and that's where enforcement can come in.

I did see . . . I think it was Premier Ford saying they would have the highest fines in the country. I think that's fine. I think what we need to do is target those people who are intentionally doing things and all of us use our influence to make sure that doing the right thing is the easiest thing for everybody to do and is supported.

Dix: I think we need a little bit of both, but the reality is that what we need is for people for the safety of themselves and the safety of their families is to follow the guidance and the rules. The rules and the guidance. Everything we do depends on that. The things that we're doing right now. The opening up and the renewal plans and everything else is dependent on our continued success in dealing with COVID-19 and so all of us need to be part of this.

Some of that you can deal with with enforcement, and we are increasing enforcement in the province, but a lot of it we need to do it by convincing people, one another of all being leaders and ensuring that within our own homes and in our own daily activities we follow the guidance of Dr Henry and the guidance [inaudible].

I think on balance British Columbians have done a good job of that, but we've got to dig in and continue to do it because unfortunately the COVID-19 pandemic is going to continue now for years into the future, and this is something we've said consistently. Through this year, probably through next year, and that means the things we have to get used to doing and enjoying life with the new guidance of our lives, the new normal that we call it, is going to be with us for a long time. And so we have to learn to deal with it together, support ourselves in this, not be too ready to cast aspersions or blame and, of course, where rules are violated we need to have means to do that.

So, it's a combination of both.

Reporter: Just briefly on the Langley Lodge report that came out. A couple of the details in there. A worker who avoided the pre-shift screening protocol on two different shifts was in contact with 16 different residents I think the number is, and then an audit finding things like fresh linens and garbage next to each other in the same storage space.

Minister, I take your point. We're learning. We can do better. My question though is could things like this still be happening in long-term care? How do you kind of reassure the kids and the relatives and the children and the grandchildren of people in long-term care? What can we do to make the weakest links in those systems stronger?

Henry: That is the question that we look at all the time. As somebody who has worked in infection prevention and control in health care settings for a long time, you know, these things don't unfortunately surprise me. There's always challenges in how things are physically made up, and putting the dirties next to the cleans is something that inadvertently happens frequently.

I think the other thing we need to recognize is that nobody goes into work saying oh, I'm going to give COVID to everybody in this care home that I work in. It is not like that. There's a whole lot of things that we do to ourselves. We think oh, we're so short staff. I can't possibly stay away. That my staff, that my colleagues need me. You know, the people I care for need me and this is just a little cold.

That's the challenge that we have. Health care workers are like the rest of us. We're like everybody else. We minimize things and we often feel that we have this obligation to go into work and we want to just believe that it's not COVID that we're bringing in. I think we have to recognize that and recognize that we don't always make it easy for health care workers to take time off when they're not feeling well.

That is something we're trying to shift in terms of culture. Part of the single site order helps with that in that there were people who were contracted and working at multiple places, making a minimum wage and could not afford not to be at work.

So those are the things that from a systems point of view we have taken some steps and we need to continue to take steps to address so that people are able to stay away when they're not feeling well and they're able to get tested frequently and quickly and efficiently. Those are the things that come up to me.

Dix: Just so say, finally, that a lot of the steps we've taken, the raising of staffing levels significantly since 2017, the single site order, bringing PPE into the supply chain, some of the care homes that have had the highest staffing levels have had significant outbreaks. Some of the care homes that have had the best, who have the highest levels of pay, have had some outbreaks as well.

What it tells us is that COVID-19 is a very, very challenging enemy in long-term care -- and it is. It requires every day to keep following the rules, every single day. In the case of Langley Lodge, and I believe the report indicates this, the spread had happened significantly by the time it was recognized that it was in the facility. The consequences are significant there.

This is not blame for people at Langley Lodge. This is a reality, that COVID-19 is very, very difficult in long-term care. Its consequences can be profound. We've seen this more significantly in other jurisdictions around the world and across Canada than here. That doesn't mean there's nothing but a humble response here to what we need to continue to do, absolutely continue to do, with all of the measures and all of the investment and all of the new workers.

We've got to continue to do that every single day on the ground. I'm so full of admiration for everybody who works in health care, who struggled during this pandemic to support people. They've done exceptional things. We have to, unfortunately, because the pandemic's ongoing, keep doing those things. All of us have to continue to be part of it.

Reporter: I'm just wondering about the new gargle rinse and spit test. Is this the same test that's being used other ways, other places as the saliva test? What is the accuracy of this test compared to the swab test?

Henry: Actually, the test is the same. We're still using a PCR test that is done at the laboratory. It's just a different method of collection. It's been validated at the BCCDC lab. We've also got a saliva test that was validated at the St Paul's lab. It is our scientists and researchers and lab folk here in the province who've looked at this as a method and a way to make it easier. We're hoping to make it more broadly available as we go forward.

We have a domestic supplier from BC who's making -- it's a cute little funnel thing that you swish into. The test itself has been validated. The collection method has been validated and compared to

an NP swab. It works just as well. We're really proud of this. I think it's a great step forward for our lab.

Reporter: What is the name of the local company that's providing the material for this? How long will it be before it is more broadly used? Why are we starting with just children at this point?

Henry: I don't have the name but I can get it to you. We're starting with children because that's the focus right now with back to school, to making sure that we can support children safely being back in the school system. We will be looking in the coming months to expanding that if we can. Particularly for the next few weeks to months, we'll be focusing on children. I will get you the name. 

Program is telling us that the UPCC will likely not be in Port Moody but in the Tri-Cities. Mandating Port Moody may result in delays. I wanted to check in with you to see if you wanted to do this regardless.

The following is NOT APPROVED by program yet. But gives you an idea about general messaging:

#### **Urgent and Primary Care Centre coming to Tri-Cities**

TRI-CITIES – People living in the Tri-Cities will soon have better access to same-day health-care services when and where they need it with a new urgent and primary care centre (UPCC).

The temporary location will open by February 2021 and a Request for Proposals for a permanent location is underway.

"The new UPPC will allow people in the Tri-Cities including Coquitlam, Port Coquitlam, and Port Moody to access the everyday health-care services they need closer to home, while also taking the demand off the emergency department" said Adrian Dix, Minister of Health. "We are working in partnership with local communities and health-care providers to deliver on our primary care strategy throughout the province." **NOT APPROVED.** 

The UPCC will be operated by Fraser Health, with the support of the xx First Nation, the Fraser Northwest Division of Family Practice and the Tri-Cities.

"I am very happy for the communities in the Tri-Cities that will benefit from this new urgent and primary care centre to help meet their daily health-care needs when and where they need care," said Rick Glumac, MLA for Port Moody-Coquitlam. "Urgent primary care centres are an excellent solution for people to get their health-care needs met, and they alleviate the demand on hospital emergency departments."

Approximately X full-time equivalent health-care providers will join the team, including general practitioners, nurse practitioners, registered nurses, social worker, physiotherapist and medical office assistants.

Once fully staffed, the centre will provide care for more than x patient visits annually. Patients will be seen by the team of health-care providers and will be able to self-refer to the UPCC for care.

The centre will serve two purposes. First, it will focus on providing ongoing, long-term primary care, as well as urgent care to people with non-life-threatening conditions who need to see a health-care provider within 12 to 24 hours, but do not require an emergency department. The centre will offer services to people with minor cuts or burns, headaches, sprains, mental health and substance use challenges.

The second purpose will be to attach X patients over the next X years to a regular primary care provider at the centre or in the community. Attachment will be provided with the collaboration of the Fraser Northwest Division of Family Practice. Once the centre opens, patients will be able to see a primary care provider from 11:30 a.m. to 8:30 p.m.

This is the 21<sup>st</sup> urgent and primary care centres announced under the government's primary care strategy. The UPCC in the Tri-Cities will be the sixth centre in the Fraser Health region, including two in Surrey, and one each in Burnaby, Maple Ridge and Abbotsford.

Attached for posting are the final versions of the proposed orders – an updated *Gatherings And Events* order and newly titled *Food and Liquor Serving Premises* order (replaces the *Restaurants, Coffee Shops, Cafes, Cafeterias and Licensed Premises, including Pubs, Bars, Lounges, Nightclubs and Tasting Rooms* order).

Please post the attached orders to the PHO website.

The main changes are as follows:

- 1. All "events" are now in the Gatherings and Events order. Previously events were in both orders which was leading to uncertainty and inequitable application.
- 2. Nightclubs must cease operating as nightclubs. They could change their business model to operate as a restaurant, pub or bar.
- 3. Background music or other background sounds, such as from televisions, must be no louder than the volume of normal conversation.
- 4. Liquor sales for onsite consumption must cease by 10:00 pm. Off-sales could still happen.
- 5. Unless a full meal service is provided, premises must close by 11:00 pm and all patrons must vacate the premises. If a full meal service is provided, premises may stay open, but liquor must not be served until 11:00 am the following day.
- 6. Liquor must not be consumed on premises by owners, operators or staff after 11:00 pm
- 7. The Gatherings and Events order does not apply to voting places.
- 8. Banquet halls are defined and ordered not to hold events, but voting is explicitly allowed. They could also do other things like have daycares.
- 9. The definition of "event" is further clarified to indicate it applies to a "trade fair, agricultural fair, seasonal fair and episodic indoor event that has as its primary purpose the sale of merchandise or services e.g. Christmas craft markets, home shows, antique fairs and the like."
- 10. The definition of "a place" is clarified to include "a private residence and other premises not ordinarily open to the public" now that police can enforce the event order wrt parties.
- 11. The requirement for both event organizer and owner to hold lists of event attendees was removed as thought to be unnecessary duplication.

- 12. Liquor service at events must cease at 10 pm.
- 13. If food or liquor serving premises hold private events like wedding receptions, the same rules that hotels and other venues must follow apply to these premises. But if it is a public event like live music performance all the extra rules e.g. no singing, dancing, no-self serve bar, must remain seated apply.

## Period 2 EquipCare BC applications to start on September 28th

**Burnaby, B.C.** (September XX, 2020): The celebrated <u>EquipCare BC</u> program begins accepting applications for its period 2 funding allocations beginning Monday, September 28th. The \$10 million program is a partnership between the Province of B.C. and the BC Care Providers Association (BCCPA) announced on April 4th, 2020 was established to support seniors living in long-term care and assisted living residences.

In response to British Columbia's emergency novel coronavirus (COVID-19) response plan, EquipCare BC's period 1 funding concentrated on infection prevention and control (IPC), and the application intake for this period ends September 25th. Period 2 will have IPC items for all assisted living and long-term care homes primarily serving seniors apply for a second round of funding with eligible items expanded to improving safety and quality for publicly funded applicants.

"Seniors and residents of long-term care and assisted living homes are the most vulnerable due to complications associated with COVID-19," said Adrian Dix, Minister of Health. "Our goal is to ensure that both residents and health-care workers are protected to the maximum extent possible."

Period 1 / IPC funds were used to purchase PPE including outbreak carts, medical screening devices, mobile hand-hygiene sinks, touch-less towel and soap dispensers, environmental cleaning products, and safe handling equipment for food, waste and laundry. Funds in Period 2 will open up further eligible items for publicly funded applicants primarily serving seniors to include such items as lifts, beds, urgent response systems, and quality of life items such as Snoezelen rooms, sensory equipment, lighting and visual aids, music therapy, and ergonomic furniture.

"We are committed to protecting our seniors and elders during this critical time of COVID-19," said Ronna-Rae Leonard, Parliamentary Secretary for Seniors. "This program will further equip long-term care and assisted living residences with the tools to enhance safety measures for seniors and caregivers in these residences."

"We are pleased to be opening a second round of funding that continues to support much needed infection prevention and control resources and also continue to enhance the safety and quality needs of seniors and those providing care," says Terry Lake, CEO of BCCPA and EngAge BC.

Oversight for EquipCare BC is provided by a group of industry stakeholders and government, including representatives from BCCPA, SafeCare BC, Denominational Health Association and the Ministry of Health. Expert advice in infection prevention and control is also provided by ministry staff.

### Period 2 EquipCare BC applications to start on September 28th

**Burnaby, B.C.** (September XX, 2020): The celebrated EquipCare BC program begins accepting applications for its period 2 funding allocations beginning Monday, September 28th. The \$10 million program is a partnership between the Province of B.C. and the BC Care Providers Association (BCCPA) announced on April 4th, 2020 was established to support seniors living in long-term care and assisted living residences.

In response to British Columbia's emergency novel coronavirus (COVID-19) response plan, EquipCare BC's period 1 funding concentrated on infection prevention and control (IPC), and the application intake for this period ends September 25th. Period 2 will have IPC items for all assisted living and long-term care homes primarily serving seniors apply for a second round of funding with eligible items expanded to improving safety and quality for publicly funded applicants.

"Seniors and residents of long-term care and assisted living homes are the most vulnerable due to complications associated with COVID-19," said Adrian Dix, Minister of Health. "Our goal is to ensure that both residents and health-care workers are protected to the maximum extent possible."

Period 1 / IPC funds were used to purchase PPE including outbreak carts, medical screening devices, mobile hand-hygiene sinks, touch-less towel and soap dispensers, environmental cleaning products, and safe handling equipment for food, waste and laundry. Funds in Period 2 will open up further eligible items for publicly funded applicants primarily serving seniors to include such items as lifts, beds, urgent response systems, and quality of life items such as Snoezelen rooms, sensory equipment, lighting and visual aids, music therapy, and ergonomic furniture.

"We are committed to protecting our seniors and elders during this critical time of COVID-19," said Ronna-Rae Leonard, Parliamentary Secretary for Seniors. "This program will further equip long-term care and assisted living residences with the tools to enhance safety measures for seniors and caregivers in these residences."

"We are pleased to be opening a second round of funding that continues to support much needed infection prevention and control resources and also continue to enhance the safety and quality needs of seniors and those providing care," says Terry Lake, CEO of BCCPA and EngAge BC.

Oversight for EquipCare BC is provided by a group of industry stakeholders and government, including representatives from BCCPA, SafeCare BC, Denominational Health Association and the Ministry of Health. Expert advice in infection prevention and control is also provided by ministry staff.

#### Connecting people with mental health challenges to vital supports

VICTORIA – People living with serious mental health challenges in B.C. will have increased access to ongoing community-based supports and services through six new Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) teams throughout province.

The new teams will be located in XX and will provide flexible, individualized support – including community living, psychosocial supports, and recovery - for adults with serious, complex and often persistent mental health challenges that make it difficult to manage day-to-day activities. Most ACT clients have not responded well to traditional outpatient mental health services.

"There is no one, single way to help someone who is living with a serious mental health challenge," said Judy Darcy, Minister of Mental Health and Addictions. "Some people need help with daily activities while others are struggling with housing, social supports, or substance use. The addition of six new ACT teams in the province means that more people will get just the right combination of mental health supports and services which benefits the whole community." <NOT APPROVED>

ACT services are delivered by a team of mental health practitioners from a variety of disciplines including who tailor the support to the unique needs of each client. ACT teams are mobile and deliver services in the community – meeting clients where they are rather than in a traditional office setting.

ACT services differ by community but can include: Crisis assessment and intervention, housing supports, psychiatric/psychological treatment, medication management, supports for substance use disorder, work-related services, family support, healthy lifestyle choices and social/recreational activities.

Developing seamless and integrated mental health and substance use care is a key pillar of government's actions outlined in *A Pathway to Hope*, B.C.'s roadmap for making the system of mental health and addictions care better for people in B.C. Implementing *A Pathway to Hope* is a shared priority with the BC Green Caucus and is part of the Confidence and Supply Agreement.

Thank you for your fax of June 17, 2020 with a request for reconsideration of the Provincial Health Officer Order with respect to *Mass Gatherings*, dated 22<sup>nd</sup> day of May 2020, pursuant to section 43 of the *Public Health Act* (the Act – excerpt below). In short, you are requesting that banquet hall facilities in the lower mainland listed in the request be allowed to hold gatherings and events larger than 50 people. You propose options and include a number of proposed safety measures that may mitigate the risks of having larger gatherings. You have indicated that extensive financial hardship and significant financial losses are being experienced.

Your request has been forwarded to me for response.

We have reviewed your request for reconsideration and on behalf of Dr. Bonnie Henry I am writing to confirm that we will not be varying the Order to accommodate your request for reconsideration, pursuant to section 43 (3) (c) of the Act. A review of the decision of the provincial health officer under the Act is not available.

The reasons for this decision is that large social gatherings that you propose, particularly indoors and for prolonged periods of time, carry a high risk of resulting in many people becoming infected with the SARS-CoV-2 virus that causes COVID-19, and subsequently passing it along to many other people, thereby sustaining and amplifying transmission of the virus in our communities.

Since entering phase 3 of the BC Restart Plan we have seen a steady and concerning increase in virus transmission, especially in the lower mainland. Holding larger gatherings as you propose would increase the risk of transmission of virus to even greater levels.

It is our preference that gatherings be kept very small, even though the Order, and subsequent similar orders, has allowed a limit of 50 people for events.

While physical distancing and other measures are important to implement in such events, transmission can still occur. The limit of 50 patrons allows public health officials to efficiently and effectively trace the contacts of COVID-19 cases in the event of an exposure to slow or stop subsequent transmission of the virus and reduce illness, hospitalizations and deaths.

We recognize that your proposal contained many measures that could potentially reduce the risk of transmission of disease at events that would include more than 50 people. However, in spite of these measures, allowing hundreds of people to gather in indoor banquet halls for up to six hours at a time, particularly if alcohol is also being serve, is just too risky. This could result in large outbreaks, and potentially contribute to overwhelming our public health and health care systems with people who are sick with COVID-19.

In conclusion, any events held in banquet halls must follow the current Provincial Health Officer Order with respect to *Gatherings and Events*, dated the 7<sup>th</sup> day of August 2020 (see

https://www2.gov.bc.ca/gov/content/health/about-bc-s-health-care-system/office-of-the-provincial-health-officer/current-health-topics/covid-19-novel-coronavirus). Please be aware that these orders do change.

It is critically important that banquet halls do their part in limiting the spread of COVID-19 by adhering to these requirements. Please inform you members of this decision and please remind your members of the importance of not holding any events that include more than 50 patrons, follow the other rules in the Order, and follow other general measures for reducing virus transmission as described on the BC Centre of Disease Control website (at <a href="http://www.bccdc.ca/health-info/diseases-conditions/covid-19">http://www.bccdc.ca/health-info/diseases-conditions/covid-19</a>).

As is stated in the Order, failure to comply with the Order could result in enforcement actions being taken against those who violate the Order.

#### **Reconsideration of orders**

- **43** (1) A person affected by an order, or the variance of an order, may request the health officer who issued the order or made the variance to reconsider the order or variance if the person
  - (a) has additional relevant information that was not reasonably available to the health officer when the order was issued or varied,
  - (b) has a proposal that was not presented to the health officer when the order was issued or varied but, if implemented, would
    - (i) meet the objective of the order, and
    - (ii) be suitable as the basis of a written agreement under section 38 [may make written agreements], or
  - (c) requires more time to comply with the order.
- (2) A request for reconsideration must be made in the form required by the health officer.
- (3) After considering a request for reconsideration, a health officer may do one or more of the following:
  - (a) reject the request on the basis that the information submitted in support of the request

    - (ii) was reasonably available at the time the order was issued;
  - (b) delay the date the order is to take effect or suspend the order, if satisfied that doing so would not be detrimental to public health;

- (5) Following a decision made under subsection (3) (a) or (c), no further request for reconsideration may be made.

Joint statement on Province of British Columbia COVID-19 response and latest updates

Adrian Dix, Minister of Health, and Dr. Bonnie Henry, B.C.'s provincial health officer, have issued the following joint statement regarding updates on the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) response in British Columbia:

"Today, we are announcing 139 new cases, including seven epi-linked cases. We are also reporting 40 historic cases that were tested between August 11 and September 16 for people who had not provided personal health numbers. This brings our total to 7,842 cases in British Columbia.

"There are 1,803 active cases of COVID-19 in the province, 3,075 people who are under active public health monitoring as a result of identified exposure to known cases, and 5,797 people who tested positive have recovered.

"Since the start of the pandemic, there have been 2,817 cases of COVID-19 in the Vancouver Coastal Health region, 4,007 in the Fraser Health region, 196 in the Island Health region, 492 in the Interior Health region, 244 in the Northern Health region and 86 cases of people who reside outside of Canada.

"There have been three new COVID-19 related deaths, for a total of 223 deaths in British Columbia. We offer our condolences to everyone who has lost their loved ones during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"There have been no new health-care facility outbreaks, and the outbreak at Royal Arch Masonic Home long-term care facility (second outbreak) has been declared over. In total, 10 long-term care or assisted-living facilities and five acute-care facilities have active outbreaks.

"There have been no new community outbreaks, although there continue to be community exposure events."

"Alerts are posted on the BC Centre for Disease Control's (BCCDC) website, as well as on health authorities' websites, providing details on where the potential exposure occurred and what actions to take - whether you need to self-isolate or monitor for symptoms.

"For schools, public health teams will contact individuals through contact tracing, and schools will continue to issue alerts when a school exposure has occurred and action is required. Supporting these protocols, the BCCDC website and health authorities are also publishing notifications.

"We need to push the COVID-19 curve back down and we have the knowledge, the tools and resources to do just that. Always using your layers of protection and choosing to stick with your 'safe six' will help all of us this weekend and every weekend ahead.

Thank you for your fax of June 17, 2020 with a request for reconsideration of the Provincial Health Officer Order with respect to *Mass Gatherings*, dated 22<sup>nd</sup> day of May 2020, pursuant to section 43 of the *Public Health Act* (the Act – excerpt below). In short, you are requesting that banquet hall facilities in the lower mainland listed in the request be allowed to hold gatherings and events larger than 50 people. You propose options and include a number of proposed safety measures that may mitigate the risks of having larger gatherings. You have indicated that extensive financial hardship and significant financial losses are being experienced.

Your request has been forwarded to me for response.

We have reviewed your request for reconsideration and on behalf of Dr. Bonnie Henry I am writing to confirm that we will not be varying the Order to accommodate your request for reconsideration, pursuant to section 43 (3) (c) of the Act. A review of the decision of the provincial health officer under the Act is not available.

The reasons for this decision is that large social gatherings that you propose, particularly indoors and for prolonged periods of time, carry a high risk of resulting in many people becoming infected with the SARS-CoV-2 virus that causes COVID-19, and subsequently passing it along to many other people, thereby sustaining and amplifying transmission of the virus in our communities.

Since entering phase 3 of the BC Restart Plan we have seen a steady and concerning increase in virus transmission, especially in the lower mainland. Holding larger gatherings as you propose would increase the risk of transmission of virus to even greater levels.

It is our preference that gatherings be kept very small, even though the Order, and subsequent similar orders, has allowed a limit of 50 people for events.

While physical distancing and other measures are important to implement in such events, transmission can still occur. The limit of 50 patrons allows public health officials to efficiently and effectively trace the contacts of COVID-19 cases in the event of an exposure to slow or stop subsequent transmission of the virus and reduce illness, hospitalizations and deaths.

We recognize that your proposal contained many measures that could potentially reduce the risk of transmission of disease at events that would include more than 50 people. However, in spite of these measures, allowing hundreds of people to gather in indoor banquet halls for up to six hours at a time, particularly if alcohol is also being serve, is just too risky. This could result in large outbreaks, and potentially contribute to overwhelming our public health and health care systems with people who are sick with COVID-19.

In conclusion, any events held in banquet halls must follow the current Provincial Health Officer Order with respect to *Gatherings and Events*, dated the 7<sup>th</sup> day of August 2020 (see

https://www2.gov.bc.ca/gov/content/health/about-bc-s-health-care-system/office-of-the-provincial-health-officer/current-health-topics/covid-19-novel-coronavirus). Please be aware that these orders do change

It is critically important that banquet halls do their part in limiting the spread of COVID-19 by adhering to these requirements. Please inform you members of this decision and please remind your members of the importance of not holding any events that include more than 50 patrons, follow the

other rules in the Order, and follow other general measures for reducing virus transmission as described on the BC Centre of Disease Control website (at <a href="http://www.bccdc.ca/health-info/diseases-conditions/covid-19">http://www.bccdc.ca/health-info/diseases-conditions/covid-19</a>).

As is stated in the Order, failure to comply with the Order could result in enforcement actions being taken against those who violate the Order.

Please note that no further requests for reconsideration may be made, pursuant to section 43 (5) of the Act.

## Public Health Act excerpt

## **Reconsideration of orders**

- **43** (1) A person affected by an order, or the variance of an order, may request the health officer who issued the order or made the variance to reconsider the order or variance if the person
  - (a) has additional relevant information that was not reasonably available to the health officer when the order was issued or varied,
  - (b) has a proposal that was not presented to the health officer when the order was issued or varied but, if implemented, would
    - (i) meet the objective of the order, and
    - (ii) be suitable as the basis of a written agreement under section 38 [may make written agreements], or
  - (c) requires more time to comply with the order.
- (2) A request for reconsideration must be made in the form required by the health officer.
- (3) After considering a request for reconsideration, a health officer may do one or more of the following:
  - (a) reject the request on the basis that the information submitted in support of the request
    - (i) is not relevant, or
    - (ii) was reasonably available at the time the order was issued;
  - (b) delay the date the order is to take effect or suspend the order, if satisfied that doing so would not be detrimental to public health;
  - (c) confirm, rescind or vary the order.
- (4) A health officer must provide written reasons for a decision to reject the request under subsection (3) (a) or to confirm or vary the order under subsection (3) (c).
- (5) Following a decision made under subsection (3) (a) or (c), no further request for reconsideration may be made.

## **Urgent and Primary Care Centre coming to Tri-Cities**

TRI-CITIES – People living in the Tri-Cities will soon have better access to same-day health-care services when and where they need it with a new urgent and primary care centre (UPCC).

The temporary location will open February 2021 and a Request for Proposals for a permanent location is underway.

"The new UPPC will allow people in the Tri-Cities including Coquitlam, Port Coquitlam, and Port Moody to access the everyday health-care services they need closer to home, while also taking the demand off the emergency department" said Adrian Dix, Minister of Health. "We are working in partnership with local communities and health-care providers to deliver on our primary care strategy throughout the province." **NOT APPROVED.** 

The UPCC will be operated by Fraser Health, with the support of the Fraser Northwest Division of Family Practice, Indigenous Partners and the Tri-Cities on the ancestral, traditional and unceded territories of the Kwikwəðam (Kwikwetlem), Qiqéyt (Key-Kayt) and Coast Salish Nations.

A team of health-care workers will join the centre, including family physicians, nurse practitioners and registered nurses, as well as allied health providers (pharmacist, social worker and clinical counsellor) and support staff.

"I am very happy for the communities in the Tri-Cities that will benefit from this new urgent and primary care centre to help meet their daily health-care needs closer to home," said Rick Glumac, MLA for Port Moody-Coquitlam. "Urgent and primary care centres are an excellent solution for people that may not have a regular family doctor, and they can also help patients secure a primary care provider."

The centre will focus on providing ongoing, long-term primary care, as well as urgent care to people with non-life-threatening conditions who need to see a health-care provider within 12 to 24 hours, but do not require an emergency department. The centre will offer services to people with minor cuts or burns, headaches, sprains, and experiencing mental health and substance use challenges.

"Today's action speaks to the future - in particular the ability to deliver improved cardiac care services in the North. This has been a goal for a long time and I am proud to be party of making it happen. Congratulations to the Northern Health Authority, the Prince George community and the entire region for this breakthrough."

The current hospital is outdated and too small to safely accommodate the needs of a growing and aging regional population. Local leaders have specifically identified cardiac care as an important service gap for a new facility to address.

Northern Health submitted a concept plan to the provincial government in December 2017, which was amended in February 2020. Treasury Board subsequently approved that concept plan – securing funding for the project in the government's ten-year capital plan.

The business plan phase will now get underway and will finalize details, such as scope of the new facility and budget. This includes providing details for a variety of acute care services for the facility including new mental health, surgical and cardiac units. This stage takes approximately 12 to 18 months. Upon approval of the business plan, the project will proceed to procurement and then construction.

Today's action at UHNBC builds on this government's investments in the North including new and expanded hospitals in Terrace, Fort St. James, Dawson Creek and Quesnel, delivering public health-care in state-of-the art centres.

UHNBC was built in 1958 and was originally called Prince George Regional Hospital. Additions were completed in 1978 and 2003. There are ten additional buildings that make up the 216-bed UHNBC site.

#### **Exercise of Discretion:**

The Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (FOIPPA) contains both mandatory and discretionary exceptions to disclosure. Sections 13 to 20 are the discretionary exceptions. Where Information Access Operations (IAO) has advised the head that a discretionary exception may apply, it is important that the head consider the possibility of releasing the information despite the fact that an exception may apply.

## Factors relevant to the exercise of discretion include:

- the general purposes of the legislation: public bodies should make information available to the public; individuals should have access to personal information about themselves;
- the wording of the discretionary exception and the interests which the section attempts to balance;
- whether the individual's request could be satisfied by severing the record and by providing the applicant
- with as much information as is reasonably practicable;
- the historical practice of the public body with respect to the release of similar types of documents;
- the nature of the record and the extent to which the document is significant and/or sensitive to the public body;
- · whether the disclosure of the information will increase public confidence in the operation of the public body;
- the age of the record;
- whether there is a sympathetic or compelling need to release materials;
- whether previous orders of the Commissioner have ruled that similar types of records or information should or should not be subject to disclosure; and
- · when the policy advice exception is claimed, whether the decision to which the advice or recommendations relates has already been made.
