Additional Context:

- May 6: Doctor Henry announced that BC has recorded its first case of Vaccine-Induced Thrombotic Thrombocytopenia (VITT) today. The affected person was a woman who was in her 40s and she is now stable. She is receiving treatment at a hospital in the Vancouver Coastal Health Region. The woman noticed her symptoms five or six days after receiving her first dose of AstraZeneca and went to her doctor. The doctor conducted a diagnostic blood test that revealed low platelet counts.¹
- At a media briefing on May 5, Doctor Henry said that health officials are working on a plan for immunization of kids ages 12 and up following Health Canada's approval for use of the Pfizer vaccine for this cohort. Dr. Henry stated kids aged 12 and older could be fully immunized with two Pfizer doses before the next school year, although younger children may have to wait until the end of the year because clinical trials for those ages are still ongoing.²
- May 5: Health Canada authorized the use of Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine in children ages 12-15 years.³
- The BC Government introduced amendments to the Employment Standards Act that provide workers with up to three hours of paid leave to get each dose of their COVID-19 vaccine. It came into force on Wed., Apr 28.4
 - On May 5, AB pledged to open COVID-19 vaccine eligibility to all Albertans over the age of 12 by Mon, May 10.5

Agenda Item #4: 3rd wave actions and vaccine roll-out efforts, including approaches to hotspots and vaccine hesitancy

- o For discussion: Ministers will engage in a discussion on 3rd wave actions and vaccine roll-out efforts, including approaches to hotspots and vaccine hesitancy.

- Potential Key Messages/Speaking Points for Minister Consideration (copied from Tab 4a, BC Bullets):
 - BC is now moving much faster through its age-based COVID-19 vaccine program; immunization of the most vulnerable in the first quarter of 2021 has resulted in a reduction in mortality.
 - However, infection rates remain relatively high in certain communities and settings, especially among the working-age adult population, resulting in high case counts, hospitalizations, and increases in the number of people in critical care.
 - Modelling in BC clearly illustrates that immunizing settings-based and local area sub-populations experiencing high transmission leads to the most rapid decrease in both morbidity and mortality; this has also been demonstrated in real life at the community level in Vancouver's Downtown Eastside and in Prince Rupert, where cases of COVID-19 infections have decreased post-vaccination, despite increases in cases in surrounding areas.
 - In the context of continued vaccine scarcity, larger communities cannot be vaccinated at once; however, vaccines can be targeted to high risk occupational settings (e.g., education, child care, farm and food processing operations, etc.) to provide indirect protection to the broader community. In a similar fashion, public health experts have recommended implementing a parallel program to target immunization of populations living and/or working in high transmission areas alongside the age-based program and clinically extremely vulnerable program. This additional, complementary approach was announced publicly on April 19, 2021 and is informed by public health surveillance that can identify high transmission areas in the province down to the local level.
 - This additional approach will slow age-based vaccination to some extent in some regions but the overall impact on COVID-19 transmission in BC will be significant. The addition of this specific approach to hotspots to the existing immunization strategy

- deployed so far is expected to be the most effective way to reduce the impact of COVID-19 in BC.
- More vaccine continues to arrive in larger shipments during the second quarter of 2021, and this will allow us to offer everyone who is eligible in British Columbia to receive their first dose of vaccine by early to mid-June (based on estimated vaccine uptake of 85%).

2021 FEDERAL BUDGET SUMMARY NOTE: HEALTH CARE-RELATED HIGHLIGHTS ISSUE

On April 19, 2021, Finance Minister Chrystia Freeland tabled the federal Budget, *A Recovery Plan for Jobs, Growth, and Resilience*.

HEALTH HIGHLIGHTS

- \$3 billion over five years, starting in 2022-2023, to "support provinces and territories in ensuring standards for long-term care are applied and permanent changes are made" (p. 65).
- \$2.2 billion over seven years to support the bio-manufacturing and life sciences sector.
- \$116 million over two years, starting in 2021-22, for the Substance Use and Addictions Program to support a range approaches to harm reduction, treatment, and prevention at the community level. This is in addition to \$66 million invested in the 2020 Fall Economic Statement.
- \$45 million over two years (starting 2021-22) to Health Canada, the Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) and the Canadian Institutes for Health Research to develop national mental health service standards.
- Health Canada will receive \$20 million over three years, beginning in 2021-22, to construct eight plasma collection sites across the country (operated by Canadian Blood Services).
- \$13.2 million over five years, beginning in 2021-22, with \$2.6 million per year ongoing, to Health Canada to ensure that Canada's medical assistance in dying framework is implemented consistently and with appropriate safeguards.

COMMENTARY AND ANALYSIS

- Health care particularly non COVID-related items was not a major area of focus for the federal Budget. For example, there was no new funding or announcements related to national pharmacare or the 10-year funding agreement on home care and mental health.
- Additionally, the budget does not include financial enhancement to the Canada Health Transfer (CHT), as requested by the Council of the Federation (CoF). CoF has repeatedly requested an increase to the federal share of health funding to 35% of the provincialterritorial spend via an uplift to the CHT.
- There was a focus, however, on the development of national standards in key areas of health policy, including for long-term care and mental health.
 - The new \$3 billion funding for long-term care standards noted above is in addition to the \$1 billion previously announced in the Fall Economic Statement for the Safe Long-Term Care Fund.

- The Budget reiterates the federal government's interest in establishing national universal pharmacare, with an initial focus on the development of a program for High-Cost Drugs for Rare Diseases (including ongoing funding of \$500 million; this work is currently in progress).
- The Budget document references that home care and mental health transfers are projected to be \$1.3 billion in 2020-21, stabilizing at \$1.2 billion starting in 2022-2023.

HEALTH CARE PROGRAMS AND FUNDING

Canada Health Transfer (CHT)

In 2021–22, the federal government will provide \$43.1 billion through the CHT to provinces and territories, an increase of ~\$1.3 billion over the previous year.

The federal government will proceed with the March 25th proposal to provide \$4 billion through the CHT to help PTs support clearing health system backlogs caused by the pandemic (together with \$1 billion as a one-time payment to PTs to ensure the COVID-19 vaccine roll-out continues).

COVID-19 Pandemic Support

- \$100 million over three years, starting in 2021-2022, to the Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) to support projects for innovative mental health interventions for populations disproportionately impacted by COVID-19.
- \$50 million over two years, starting in 2021-2022, to support a trauma and post-traumatic stress disorder stream of mental health programming for populations at high-risk of experiencing COVID-19 related trauma.
- \$57.6 million in 2021-2022 to extend the Mandatory Isolation Support for Temporary Foreign Workers Program.
- Up to \$375 million, in 2021-22, to Global Affairs Canada to support Canada's international COVID-19 response, with a focus on addressing the health needs of developing countries.

Sickness and Caregiving Benefits

Budget 2021 proposes legislative amendments to provide authority for additional potential extensions of the Canada Recovery Benefit and its associated suite of sickness and caregiving benefits, as well as regular EI benefits until no later than November 20, 2021, should they be needed.

Long-Term Care (LTC)

\$3 billion investment, starting in 2022-2023, to Health Canada to support PTs in ensuring standards for long-term care are applied and permanent changes are made.

 The federal government welcomes news that the Health Standards Organization and Canadian Standards Association are launching work on national standards for LTC.

\$41.3 million over six years, and \$7.7 million ongoing, starting in 2021-2022 for Statistics Canada to improve data infrastructure and collection on supportive care, primary care, and pharmaceuticals.

\$90 million will be invested over three years, starting in 2021-22, to Employment and Social Development Canada to launch the Age Well at Home Initiative. The initiative is intended to help low-income and otherwise vulnerable seniors age in place through practical support.

National Pharmacare

The Budget reiterates the federal government's commitment to proceed with its plan to provide \$500 million for a program for high-cost drugs for rare diseases. The Budget also notes that the federal government will engage directly with "willing partners on national universal pharmacare," along with other priorities that can be advanced at the provincial-territorial level.

Safe Reopening of Borders

\$82.5 million in 2021-22 to Transport Canada to support major Canadian airports in making investments in COVID-19 testing infrastructure.

\$105.3 million over five years, starting in 2021-2022, with \$28.7 in remaining amortization and \$10.2 million per year ongoing to Transport Canada to collaborate with international partners to advance the Known Traveller Digital Identity pilot project, which will test advanced technologies to facilitate touchless air travel.

\$6.7 million in 2021-2022 to the Canadian Air Transport Security Authority (CATSA) to acquire and operate sanitization equipment. \$271.1 million in 2021-22 to the CATSA to maintain operations and enhanced screening services at the 89 airports where it works.

Bio-manufacturing and Life Sciences

\$2.2 billion will be invested over seven years, starting in 2021-22, towards growing a vibrant domestic life sciences sector; to help build Canada's talent pipeline and research systems, and support the growth of Canadian life sciences firms.

Antimicrobial Resistance

\$28.6 million over five years, beginning in 2021-2022, with \$5.7 million per year ongoing to PHAC, Health Canada and the Canadian Food Inspection Agency to help address antimicrobial resistance.

Reproductive Health

\$45 million over three years to Health Canada, starting 2021-22, to fund community-based organizations that improve access to information and services related to sexual and reproductive health.

\$7.6 million to Statistics Canada over five years, starting 2021-22, to develop and implement a national survey on sexual and reproductive health to capture data on race, household income and sexual orientation.

Addressing the Opioid Crisis and Problematic Substance Use

An additional \$116 million to be invested over two years, starting in 2021-22, building on \$66 million invested in the 2020 Fall Economic Statement, for the Substance Use and Addictions Program to support a range of innovative approaches to harm reduction, treatment, and prevention at the community level.

National Institute for Women's Health Research

\$20 million over five years, starting in 2021-22, to the Canadian Institutes of Health Research to support a new National Institute for Women's Health Research.

National Autism Strategy

\$15.4 million over two years, starting in 2021-22, to the PHAC to work with partners to create a national autism strategy.

Pediatric Cancer Research

\$30 million over two years, starting in 2021-22, to the Canadian Institutes of Health Research to fund pediatric cancer research.

Diabetes

\$25 million over five years, starting 2021-22, to Health Canada for additional investments for research on diabetes, surveillance, and prevention and to work towards the development of a national framework for diabetes developed in consultation with provinces and territories, Indigenous groups and stakeholders.

\$10 million over five years, starting 2021-22, to the PHAC for a Diabetes Challenge Prize to help develop approach to diabetes prevention and promote the development and testing of new interventions to reduce the risks of Type 2 diabetes.

Palliative Care

\$29.8 million over six years, starting in 2021-22, to Health Canada to advance the government's palliative care strategy and support coordinated action on long-term care and supportive care needs and improving access to quality palliative care.

Pan-Canadian Genomics Strategy

\$400 million over six years to support a Pan-Canadian Genomic Strategy. This funding would provide \$136.7 million over five years, starting in 2022-2023, for programming delivered by Genome Canada.

Clinical Trials

The Canadian Institutes of Health Research will receive \$250 million over three years, starting in 2021-2022 to implement a Clinical Trials Fund to help lead to the development of new scientifically proven treatments and cures, and improved health outcomes for Canadians.

Regulatory Cooperation with International Partners

The budget notes that the federal government is committed to enhancing Canada's drug approval process by promoting alignment and collaboration with trusted regulators in other countries. No funding has been announced for this commitment.

Canadian Armed Forces (CAF)

\$134.3 million over five years, starting in 2021-2022 and \$28.2 million per year ongoing to ensure CAF members receive timely access to health care.

INDIGENOUS HEALTH

- \$597.6 million over three years, starting in 2021-22, for a distinctions-based mental health and wellness strategy with First Nations, Inuit, and the Métis Nation.
- \$1.2 billion in 2021-2022 to support the COVID-19 response in Indigenous Communities.
- \$1.4 billion will be invested over five years, beginning in 2021-22, and \$40.6 million ongoing, to maintain essential health care services for First Nations and Inuit, continue work to transform First Nations health systems, and respond to the health impacts of climate change, including:
 - \$774.6 million over five years, beginning in 2021-22, to ensure continued care through the Non-Insured Health Benefits Program, which supports First Nations and Inuit people with medically necessary services not otherwise covered, such as mental health services, medical travel, and medications.
 - \$354 million over five years, beginning in 2021-22, to increase the number of nurses and other medical professionals in remote and isolated First Nations communities;
 - \$107.1 million over three years, beginning in 2021-22, to continue efforts to transform how health care services are designed and delivered by First Nations communities, building on the government's commitment to improve access to high-quality and culturally relevant health care for Indigenous peoples.
 - \$125.2 million over four years, beginning in 2022-2023, to continue to support First
 Nations communities' reliable access to clean water and help ensure the safe delivery of
 health and social services on reserve.
- \$31.5 million over two years to support the co-development of an Action Plan with Indigenous partners to implement the legislation on the *United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples*.

TAX MEASURES

Taxation of Vaping Products

The federal government intends to introduce a taxation framework for the imposition of excise duties on vaping products in 2022.

Taxation of Tobacco

The tobacco excise duty will be increased by \$4 per carton of 200 cigarettes, along with corresponding increases to the excise duty rates for other tobacco products. This measure took effect on April 20, 2021.

Situational Update on Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19)

- As of May 06, 2021, (10:00AM PST), there have been 133,619 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in B.C., with 1,595 total deaths.
- There were 694 new cases in the last 24 hours.
- 457 individuals are hospitalized including 154 in critical and intensive care, and 125,025 have recovered.
- B.C.'s provincial state of emergency, first declared on March 18, 2020, was extended on April 27, 2021 for an additional two weeks until end-of-day on May 11 2021.¹

Recent Border Measures/Risk Management of Borders (last updated April 22)

Summary of key federal border measures and risk management developments:

- Apr 22: The GoC issued two new travel restrictions for those seeking to enter Canada from India and Pakistan:
 - As of 11:30pm on April 22, there is a ban on direct flights to Canada from India and Pakistan for 30 days (subject to adjustment as conditions evolve).
 - Travellers originating in India and Pakistan who would otherwise be permitted to enter Canada may do so if travelling via a third country. However, they must show proof of a negative PCR test obtained from the third country prior to boarding a flight to Canada.
- April 20: Non-essential travel restrictions between Canada and the U.S.A. have been extended by 30 days – until May 21. Non-essential travel prohibition for travellers from other countries continues until May 21.
- Feb 22: The following border control measures are in effect, in addition to existing mandatory pre-boarding and health requirements for air travellers:
 - All travellers (arriving by both land and air) have to take a COVID-19 molecular test on arrival, plus a second test on day eight of their 14-day quarantine;
 - Air travellers are now required to reserve, prior to arrival, a 3-night stay in a government-authorized hotel at their own expense; and
 - All travellers arriving to Canada by land, with some exceptions (e.g., commercial truck drivers, and residents of Point Roberts) are required to provide proof of a negative COVID-19 molecular test result taken in the United States within 72 hours of prearrival, or a positive test taken 14 to 90 days prior to arrival.²

<u>Key Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and other Equipment Supply Issues for British</u> Columbia (updated May 3, 2021)

- Cumulative product received between March 2020 and April 26, 2021 in the province included:
 - Almost 9,500,000 N95 or equivalent respirators
 - Just over 187,100,000 surgical or procedure masks
 - Just over 4,500,000 pieces of eye protection, including goggles and face shields
 - o Almost 487,300,000 pairs of gloves
 - o Almost 28,900,000 gowns
- BC continues to source and test PPE to make sure product meets or exceeds safety requirements before use in our healthcare system. We continue to work hard to pursue any and all credible leads for safe and effective products for our health system.

Health System Preparedness (last updated May 06)

 As of May 05 (11:59PM PST), the total hospital occupancy rate is running at 73.9% of capacity and the critical care hospital occupancy rate is operating at 62.4% of capacity.

PHO Orders and Prevention and Containment Measures (last updated April 30)

- Apr 28: The BC Government pronounced the Employment Standards Act amendments into force. These amendments provide workers with up to three hours of paid leave to get each dose of their COVID-19 vaccine.
- Apr 23: Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General, Mike Farnworth, issued a new order (under the Emergency Program Act) to prohibit non-essential travel between three regional zones in the province, using health authority boundaries. The order is in effect until May 25, 2021. The Province is working with RCMP to establish periodic road checks at highway corridors that connect different regions to remind travellers of the order. The regional zones are:
 - Lower Mainland and Fraser Valley (Fraser Health and Coastal Health regions);
 - Vancouver Island (Island Health region); and
 - Northern/Interior (Interior Health and Northern Health regions).
- Apr 19: The "circuit-breaker" amendments to the Public Health Orders have been extended for five weeks, until the end of the May long weekend (May 25 at 12:00 AM).
- Apr 8: Dr. Bonnie Henry announced a new workplace closure order that will allow WorkSafe
 to operate under the *Public Health Act*. When three or more employees at a workplace test
 positive for COVID-19, it will be closed down for at least 10 days.
- Mar 30: The PHO implemented a series of "circuit-breaker" amendments to Public Health Orders:
 - All food and liquor-serving premises must only provide take-out or delivery service, and dine-in service is prohibited, except for outdoor patios;
 - o Indoor, adult group fitness activities of any kind are paused. Gyms and fitness centres are restricted to individual or one-on-one activities only, e.g. one-on-one personal training;

FPT Health Ministers Meeting May 10, 2021

- The previously announced class variance for limited indoor worship services has been suspended. Outdoor worship services under the current variance may continue;
- Whistler-Blackcomb ski resort is closed through to April 19; and
- All staff, adult volunteers and visitors, and all Grade 4 to 12 students should wear a nonmedical mask or face covering at all times while indoors at school, subject to exceptions.
- Additionally, employers must suspend efforts to return workers to physical worksites. It is recommended that British Columbians curtail non-essential travel.

Select Highlights from Other Jurisdictions

Canada (data confirmed as of May 04 at 1900 PST)

- Ontario
 - 476,692 confirmed cases and 8,143 deaths (rate of active cases of 247 per 100,000 population)
 - Total Vaccine Doses administered: 5,378,249 as of May 03
 - O Apr 28: The Ontario government has announced a plan to provide three paid sick days through a temporary program ending in September 2021. The proposed Ontario COVID-19 Worker Protection Benefit Program would pay up to \$200 per day for workers who are sick, have symptoms, have a mental health issues or need to be vaccinated, and will be retroactive to April 19. The sick days would not need to be taken consecutively and no sick note is required.
 - Apr 28: In response to the rapid rise in hospitalizations and ICU admissions, the Ontario government has introduced an emergency order providing hospitals the flexibility to transfer patients to long-term homes without obtaining their consent.

Quebec

- 353,475 confirmed cases; 10,959 deaths (rate of active cases of 104 per 100,000 population)
- Total Vaccine Doses administered: 3,256,342 as of May 02
- Apr 29: Quebec has announced that everyone 18 and older will be able to book an appointment for COVID-19 vaccines by May 14 as the province begins to roll out its mass vaccination campaign to the general public.

Alberta

- 198,653 confirmed cases; 2,099 deaths (rate of active cases of 534 per 100,000 population)
- Total Vaccine Doses administered: 1,621,306 as of May 01
- May 04: Premier Jason Kenney announced that in light of new records set for COVID-19 infections and ICU admissions, Alberta is bringing in new measures:
 - All K-12 schools are moving to online learning from May 7 until May 25; post-secondary institutions must go online; retail services are limited to 10% of fire code capacity; and places of worship are limited to 5 people;
 - Workplaces with outbreaks must close for 10 days;

- Starting at midnight on Sunday, May 09, restaurant and bar patios must close (only takeout and delivery are allowed), personal services will close for the next 3 weeks, and outdoor sports/recreation are limited to households/close contacts; and
- The Province is doubling basic fines for violating public health measures (now up to \$2,000), and it will bring in tougher enforcement protocols for repeat offenders.
- Apr 29: Due to record numbers of active cases and hospitalizations, Premier Kenney announced that the Province is implementing targeted measures for hot spots (where there are at least 350 cases per 100,000 people and 250 active cases), starting on Friday, Apr. 30th such as:
 - Curfew will be implemented in municipalities with above 1,000 cases per 100k population, if the cities request it; and
 - People who do not comply with health measures risk not being able to renew their driver's license or complete other transactions at registry services if they do not pay their fines.
- Apr 27: Children between 12-15 with certain underlying health conditions, are able to receive the Pfizer vaccine. Additionally, the Province passed legislation which allows Albertans up of three hours of paid, job-protected leave to get a COVID-19 vaccine.
- O Apr 26: Starting May 10, Alberta will be easing visitor restrictions at long-term care homes. In care centres where the majority of residents agree, indoor social visits will be allowed with up to four visitors from the same household, provided physical distancing, masking and other health measures remain in place. Outdoor social visits in those facilities will be allowed to expand to up to 10 people, including the resident, double the previous limit of five.

Saskatchewan

- 42,006 confirmed cases; 499 deaths (rate of active cases of 196 per 100,000 population)
- Total Vaccine doses administered: 450,823 as of May 03
- Apr 27: Premier Moe and North Dakota Governor Doug Burgum signed a Memorandum of Understanding to vaccinate essential workers who are transporting goods across the United States and Canadian border. Under this agreement, approximately 2,000 Saskatchewan residents are eligible under this program.

Manitoba

- o 39,814 confirmed cases; 980 deaths (rate of active cases of 195 per 100,000 population)
- Total Vaccine administered: 489,580 as of May 03
- Apr 29: Premier Pallister says that an agreement announced the week of Apr. 20 that allows Manitoba truck drivers who regularly cross the border into North Dakota to get vaccinated in the U.S. will be extended to teachers and education system workers.

BC COVID-19 Immunization Plan 2021 - Recent Updates

- BC is currently in Phase 4 of the COVID-19 Immunization Plan.¹
- The current focus of the COVID-19 Immunization Plan is to protect as many people as possible with a first dose, as quickly as possible through an age based strategy.
- In Phase 4, British Columbia is offering immunization to people aged 59 and younger.
- In addition, we continue to offer the vaccine to people aged 74 to 16 years who are clinically extremely vulnerable, Indigenous people (First Nations, Métis, Inuit) aged 64 to 18 years, and prioritized front line workers.
- BC is currently sending booking invitations to people age 52 years and older, Indigenous people age 18 years and older, and clinically extremely vulnerable people.²
- In addition to the age-based strategy, BC continues to offer COVID-19 vaccines to front-line priority workers and communities where transmission is high and is impacting hospitalization and ICU admissions. BC also continues to use COVID-19 vaccines as an outbreak response measure.
- Based on guidance from Health Canada and the National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI), the Province is offering AstraZeneca/COVISHIELD vaccine to people 30 years of age and older to target high transmission areas, with a robust informed consent process to support decision making including the benefits and risks of the vaccine.
- Starting in April, AstraZeneca vaccine has been distributed to select pharmacies across all
 health regions in BC and is available for people aged 30 years and older. Following a robust
 informed consent process AstraZeneca vaccine is also being offered to people 30 years of
 age and older through targeted AstraZeneca public health clinics in high transmission
 communities.³, ⁴

Vaccine Supply Issues

- The supply of vaccine in Canada is rapidly increasing in May for Pfizer and Moderna vaccine.⁵
- It is anticipated that BC will also be receiving AstraZeneca vaccine (COVAX) in two shipments later in Q2 with allocations and shipments dates to be determined.⁶
- It is unlikely that Canada will be receiving COVIDSHIELD vaccine any time soon due to a need for this vaccine by the Government of India.⁷
- Canada currently has 304,800 doses of Janssen single-dose vaccine, but distribution is pending regulatory release/approval and therefore this supply has not yet been distributed to Canadian jurisdictions.⁸ The Janssen vaccine received regulatory approval by Health Canada on March 5, 2021. BC is expected to receive 40,550 doses of Janssen.⁹
- Approximately 4.5 million vaccine doses are expected to be shipped to BC for the rest of Q2, beginning in May 2021:
 - o 2.7 million doses from Pfizer in weekly shipments.
 - o 1.3 million doses from Moderna usually arriving in biweekly shipments.
 - ~500, 000 doses of AstraZeneca/COVISHIELD doses.

BC Background - Roll-out Update

- British Columbia began its COVID-19 vaccine program on December 15, 2020.
- As of May 4, 2021, BC has received 2,320,280 vaccine doses of all types:
 - o 1,568,580 of Pfizer vaccine.
 - 437,000 of Moderna vaccine.
 - o 314,700 of AstraZeneca/COVISHIELD/COVAX vaccine. 11
- As of May 4, 2021, 1,943,230 vaccine doses of all types have been administered, as follows:
 - 1,236,689 individuals have received the Pfizer vaccine.
 - o 351,789 individuals have received the Moderna vaccine.
 - 2,61,096 individuals have received the AstraZeneca/COVISHIELD vaccine.¹²
- As of May 4, 35.6 percent of all British Columbians have received their first dose.¹³
- Online, phone and in-person registration and appointment booking through the 'Get Vaccinated' system was successfully launched on April 6, 2021. Everyone in BC who is 18 years or older is able to register on the 'Get vaccinated' system.
- Evidence and experience in BC and internationally continues to show the vaccine has dramatically reduced the number of outbreaks and the number of cases in acute and long-term care (LTC) settings.

Approaches to Vaccination in Hotspots – for discussion

Ministers will engage in a discussion on approaches and experiences to date in targeting vaccinations to address hotspots.

Potential Key Messages/Speaking Points for Minister Consideration

- BC is now moving much faster through its age-based COVID-19 vaccine program; immunization of the most vulnerable in the first quarter of 2021 has resulted in a reduction in mortality.
- However, infection rates remain relatively high in certain communities and settings, especially among the working-age adult population, resulting in high case counts, hospitalizations, and increases in the number of people in critical care.
- Modelling in BC clearly illustrates that immunizing settings-based and local area subpopulations experiencing high transmission leads to the most rapid decrease in both
 morbidity and mortality; this has also been demonstrated in real life at the community level
 in Vancouver's Downtown Eastside and in Prince Rupert, where cases of COVID-19 infections
 have decreased post-vaccination, despite increases in cases in surrounding areas.
- In the context of continued vaccine scarcity, larger communities cannot be vaccinated at once; however, vaccines can be targeted to high risk occupational settings (e.g., education, child care, farm and food processing operations, etc.) to provide indirect protection to the broader community. In a similar fashion, public health experts have recommended implementing a parallel program to target immunization of populations living and/or working in high transmission areas alongside the age-based program and clinically extremely vulnerable program. This additional, complementary approach was announced publicly on April 19, 2021 and is informed by public health surveillance that can identify high transmission areas in the province down to the local level.
- This additional approach will slow age-based vaccination to some extent in some regions but the overall impact on COVID-19 transmission in BC will be significant. The addition of this specific approach to hotspots to the existing immunization strategy deployed so far is expected to be the most effective way to reduce the impact of COVID-19 in BC.
- More vaccine continues to arrive in larger shipments during the second quarter of 2021, and this will allow us to offer everyone who is eligible in British Columbia to receive their first dose of vaccine by early to mid-June (based on estimated vaccine uptake of 85%).

Additional Context:

- May 6: Doctor Henry announced that BC has recorded its first case of Vaccine-Induced Thrombotic Thrombocytopenia (VITT) today. The affected person was a woman who was in her 40s and she is now stable. She is receiving treatment at a hospital in the Vancouver Coastal Health Region. The woman noticed her symptoms five or six days after receiving her first dose of AstraZeneca and went to her doctor. The doctor conducted a diagnostic blood test that revealed low platelet counts.¹
- At a media briefing on May 5, Doctor Henry said that health officials are working on a plan for immunization of kids ages 12 and up following Health Canada's approval for use of the Pfizer vaccine for this cohort. Dr. Henry stated kids aged 12 and older could be fully immunized with two Pfizer doses before the next school year, although younger children may have to wait until the end of the year because clinical trials for those ages are still ongoing.²
- May 5: Health Canada authorized the use of Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine in children ages 12-15 years.³
- The BC Government introduced amendments to the Employment Standards Act that provide workers with up to three hours of paid leave to get each dose of their COVID-19 vaccine. It came into force on Wed., Apr 28.4
 - On May 5, AB pledged to open COVID-19 vaccine eligibility to all Albertans over the age of 12 by Mon, May 10.5

- Potential Key Messages/Speaking Points for Minister Consideration (copied from Tab 4a, BC Bullets):
 - BC is now moving much faster through its age-based COVID-19 vaccine program; immunization of the most vulnerable in the first quarter of 2021 has resulted in a reduction in mortality.
 - However, infection rates remain relatively high in certain communities and settings, especially among the working-age adult population, resulting in high case counts, hospitalizations, and increases in the number of people in critical care.
 - Modelling in BC clearly illustrates that immunizing settings-based and local area sub-populations experiencing high transmission leads to the most rapid decrease in both morbidity and mortality; this has also been demonstrated in real life at the community level in Vancouver's Downtown Eastside and in Prince Rupert, where cases of COVID-19 infections have decreased post-vaccination, despite increases in cases in surrounding areas.
 - In the context of continued vaccine scarcity, larger communities cannot be vaccinated at once; however, vaccines can be targeted to high risk occupational settings (e.g., education, child care, farm and food processing operations, etc.) to provide indirect protection to the broader community. In a similar fashion, public health experts have recommended implementing a parallel program to target immunization of populations living and/or working in high transmission areas alongside the age-based program and clinically extremely vulnerable program. This additional, complementary approach was announced publicly on April 19, 2021 and is informed by public health surveillance that can identify high transmission areas in the province down to the local level.
 - This additional approach will slow age-based vaccination to some extent in some regions but the overall impact on COVID-19 transmission in BC will be significant. The addition of this specific approach to hotspots to the existing immunization strategy

- deployed so far is expected to be the most effective way to reduce the impact of COVID-19 in BC.
- More vaccine continues to arrive in larger shipments during the second quarter of 2021, and this will allow us to offer everyone who is eligible in British Columbia to receive their first dose of vaccine by early to mid-June (based on estimated vaccine uptake of 85%).

In the report leaked to the Vancouver Sun (https://www.scribd.com/document/506837378/2021-04-29-Final-BCCDC-Weekly-Data-Summary-2#from_embed), one slide (slide 8) shows a significant increase in the View Royal CHSA in the last week of April. I just want to clarify whether that dark purple section encompasses any other CHSA beyond View Royal?

Is there a known reason for why that particular South Island municipality had a spike in cases, when cases in all surrounding areas were lower than before?

Recommendation - from VIHA

- This map shows that between April 23 and 29, there was an increased rate of COVID in the View Royal Community Health Service Delivery Area.
- The average rate per 100,000 people was greater than 40 cases per day during this period.
- About 10,000 people live in this CHSA, so the actual average daily case count was 4 per day.
- There were some household COVID clusters during this time. Contact tracing occurred and all potential high-risk contacts were notified and followed-up with by our Public Health teams.

BC Bid's webpage is linking visitors to the BC COVID-19 Supply Hub. This would be for the same duration as the Supply Hub has been selling PPE and critical goods (August 2020-to Present)

I'm wondering if the province had always intended on selling PPE and supplies to other organizations or if it stocked up for it own needs and then decided to sell some of it?

In response to disrupted supply chains as a result of COVID-19, the Province established the Provincial Supply Chain Coordination Unit (PSCCU) to take decisive and immediate action to ensure first responders, essential service providers, and communities had the critical supplies they needed to deliver services during COVID-19.

The PSCCU purchased inventory of PPE and cleaning supplies with the intent of ensuring that those delivering public services and serving vulnerable British Columbians would have access to the PPE and critical goods needed to operate.

Is it stored in more than one place?

The supplies are stored at a provincial facility and a third-party warehouse.

How much the province has spent acquiring the PPE/supplies?

The year end inventory reconciliation is still underway, and at this time an audited number can't be provided.

Do you have the value of what is available for purchase and if there's a mark-up at all, or if it is being provided at cost?

The reason I'm reaching out is also because she talks about how many times she reached out to the COVID-19 hotline for B.C. and kept being told her symptoms were normal with COVID and no one advised her to go to the hospital until her caregiver called the 3rd or 4th time.

We'd like your response as to why the hotline didn't provide her with the advice to go to the hospital, or what the threshold is on the hotline to make a decision like that, etc. and perhaps advice for people if they don't think the hotline has given them the guidance they need?

Recommendation

Although we are unable to confirm which medical call line was contacted, we can confirm that HealthLink BC provides reliable, non-emergency health information and advice any time of the day or night, by phone at 8-1-1 and online at www.healthlinkbc.ca. This includes health information for people who have tested positive for COVID-19. By calling 8-1-1, people can speak to a health service navigator, who can help them find health information and services; or connect you directly with a registered nurse, and other healthcare providers. HealthLinkBC 8-1-1 health professionals are registered/licensed in British Columbia and trained to provide advice by phone.

The experience and clinical judgement of the registered nurse, their extensive knowledge of provincial guidelines, clinical decision support tool that's supports patient triage, and information provided by the patient collectively ensure an 8-1-1 nurses provides appropriate, safe and quality health advice to British Columbians every day. A thorough clinical quality review will be completed of any calls the individual or her caregiver made to 8-1-1.

We are glad to hear this individual has recovered. It remains incredibly important that anyone who develops COVID-19 symptoms connects with public health and arranges to get tested immediately if advised to do so. It also remains critical that people reach out to healthcare providers when they are in need of medical services or healthcare advice, including but not limited to healthcare advice related to COVID-19.

Thank you for this. I was wondering if you could precise when someone registers, public health will let them know when it is their turn to be vaccinated.

From what I see, a new resident with NO Personal Health Number can't register online...so how can they keep track of when they should receive the second dose?

For example, if I get vaccinated today in Ontario & my second dose is set for September, will BC know that? How?

When would a new resident without a Personal Health Care number share that information...on the phone?

Recommendation:

If someone is moving to B.C. from another province, they should register through the online booking and registration tool. If they do not have a BC Personal Health Number they can call the Get Vaccinated Call Centre on 1-833-838-2323 and the call centre agent will be able to create a new PHN for them. They should also mention that they have received their Dose 1 out of Province. They should bring information with them to their appointment about the first dose of vaccine that they received.

Hi, I'm a reporter working on a story for Canadian Geographic about seasonal flu vaccines. I'm looking for some information about vaccine uptake in the 2020-21 flu season. I have heard anecdotally that uptake was higher this year, perhaps driven by messaging around the importance of the vaccine to reduce pressure on hospitals during the pandemic. Is there any data available yet to support this? If not, can anyone give me an idea of whether it is likely to be the case, given their preliminary impressions?

Background

There is interest in the uptake of flu vaccine this past flu season, as part of the comparison to the COVID vaccination rollout this year. Also apparently low flu numbers this year is getting strong interest.

Recommendation

While we can't provide a direct comparison because data was collected differently in 2019/2020, there is strong evidence of higher uptake of the influenza vaccine in BC this season. For example, community pharmacists administered 1,064,769 doses of influenza vaccine in 2020-21, compared with 724,256 doses in 2019-20. Similarly, physicians, nurse practitioners and registered nurses in community practices administered 259,757 doses of influenza vaccine in 2020-21, compared with 42,374 doses in 2019-20.

The Office of the Provincial Health Officer declared the official end of the 2020-21 influenza season as of March 4, 2021. Up to the end of the influenza season (March 4, 2021), a total of 1,492,318 doses of influenza vaccine were administered to British Columbians in 2020-21.
