



Sharing the summary of the Chinese-language media coverage on health:

• Omni TV- Richmond North Centre MLA Teresa Wat is criticizing the B.C. government for not making any progress on the redevelopment of the Richmond Hospital. Wat says that "I've asked Minister Dix whether the business plan has been approved, but he did not answer the question. What is strange is that the Premier said the business plan has been approved." The province had said in July 2020 that the business plan of the Richmond Hospital Acute Care Tower will be completed by the end of September 2020.

· Ming Pao-

- Health experts are monitoring the "Delta plus" variant- a new version of the Delta variant first detected in India. This variant has appeared in many countries including Canada. The Delta Plus variant is more transmissible than the Delta variant, and the vaccines may not be able to protect people against it.
 According to Public Health England's report on June 18, there has been one case of the Delta Plus in Canada.
- The CDC says vaccination with the mRNA shots could cause heart inflammation. The latest data shows there have been at least 53 cases of myocarditis or pericarditis reported to Health Canada or the PHAC as of June 11, with most cases happening after vaccination with a mRNA vaccine.
- Fairchild Radio- While health officials have said it is safe to mix the Pfizer and Moderna doses, some first dose Pfizer recipients are cancelling their second shot booking when they know they'll be given a Moderna shot. Mike Benusic with Island Health has confirmed that There have been some cases where people decided not to receive their Moderna second dose at the clinic.
- Sing Tao Daily- The province's seven-day rolling average of daily cases dropped to below 80 for the first time since August 29. Hospitalizations decreased by 14% from last Thursday, and ICU number is down by 23% from a week ago. Dr. Henry calls on people to "get vaccinated as soon as you are eligible; this is important and is your ticket to travel and safe social connections."
- Fairchild TV- As many communities in the country are still seeing a lower vaccination rate, the federal government launched a program to encourage people to get vaccinated, including an online platform that helps address the issues and improve access to vaccines for people who are vulnerable. Hedy Fry, Member of Parliament, announced that the Dr. Peter Centre in Vancouver will receive over \$537,000 to support the implementation of the program.

Joint statement on Province of British Columbia COVID-19 response and latest updates

VICTORIA—Dr. Bonnie Henry, B.C.'s provincial health officer and Adrian Dix, Minister of Health, have issued the following joint statement regarding updates on the COVID-19 response in British Columbia:

"Today, we are reporting that 77.6% of all adults in BC and 76.2% of those 12 and older have now received their first dose of a COVID-19 vaccine. In addition, 26.9% of all adults in B.C. and 25.2% of those 12 and older have received their second dose. In total, 4,703,549 doses of Pfizer-BioNTech, Moderna and AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccines have been administered in B.C., 1,167,117 of which are second doses.

"There have been 72 new cases of COVID-19 for a total of 147,418 cases in British Columbia.

"Of the new cases, 24 are in the Vancouver Coastal Health region, 29 are in the Fraser Health region, four are in the Island Health region, 13 are in the Interior Health region, and two are in the Northern Health region.

"There are currently 1,096 active cases of COVID-19 in the province and a further 144,554 people who tested positive have recovered. Of the active cases, 108 individuals are currently hospitalized, 37 of whom are in intensive care. The remaining people with COVID-19 are recovering at home in self-isolation.

"There has been one new health-care outbreak at Laurel Place (Fraser Health).

"There have been two new COVID-19 related deaths, for a total of 1,749 deaths in British Columbia. Our condolences are with the family, friends and caregivers of the people who have died as a result of COVID-19.

"This weekend, with the anticipated extreme hot weather throughout the province, we remind everyone in British Columbia to stay cool and hydrated – whether you will be going to a vaccine clinic or spending time with friends and family outside.

"Our mass clinics are indoors and many pop-up clinics have moved to cooler, indoor locations. If you have a vaccine appointment at a pop-up clinic, or are planning to drop-in, check the location before you go, wear a hat and sunscreen and bring water.

"Just as we have taken care of our neighbours, seniors and Elders during the COVID-19 pandemic, they may also need some assistance this weekend. Let's continue to support each other with kindness and compassion, and help our friends and family get their vaccines, safely.

Dear Dena Coward, Friends of Victoria Basketball

Thank you for submitting your FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament Public Health Protocols document and requests for the following variances to the Provincial Health Officer *Gatherings and Events Order*:

Part E.1.a): A one-time tournament-long variance to the *Gathering and Events* order to allow for more than 50 persons to participate in a sport event (which includes coaches, managers, trainers, and other persons involved in an official capacity).

Part E.1.b) A one-time variance to the *Gathering and Events* order to allow for spectators to be present for an indoor sporting event on July 1, 3 and 4.

I have reviewed the public health protocols and spectator plan, and these have been reviewed by medical health officers and public health staff at Island Health. I have taken into consideration their input and expect that you are open to continuing to work with the local public health staff on any further details. In particular I note that the zoned approach ensures there is little interaction between athletes, support staff, and media from different zones, as well as strict testing protocols, distancing, and other well thought out public health measures.

I should note that, despite suspending my reconsideration of Orders on April 21, this variance is being considered in view of the fact that I was aware that variances for this tournament would need to be considered prior to my suspension of the reconsideration process.

Based on our review I am satisfied that adherence to your proposed plan, and adherence to further conditions required by the medical health officer will meet the objectives of the order to help against exposure and transmission of the SARS-CoV-1 virus. Therefore it is my opinion that the FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament can proceed for all tournament games, with the following conditions and as long as the safety plan is implemented and on the condition that the Public Health Agency of Canada provides a *Quarantine Act* exemption for the proposed 3-day modified quarantine. The conditions of this variance are:

- 1. There may be up to 10% of the available seats occupied by spectators on July 1, 3 and 4, subject to also being able to meet the physical distancing requirements in condition 2 below. The available seat count does not include seats that are not allocated for spectator use.
- 2. All spectators, unless they are in the same party, must maintain 2m distance from each other. This would mean two (2) empty rows between occupied rows, and four (4) empty seats between groups in the same party.
- 3. All spectators, unless they are in the same party, should maintain 2m distance from each other when out of their seat.
- 4. Spectators must maintain physical distance and separation from event staff, as per the event plan.
- 5. Organizers must ensure sufficient staff are present to prevent congregation in areas, such as the gate entrance, concessions, washrooms, general seating, and on exit of the venue
- 6. Masking is required at all times while in venue, except when eating and drinking, or unless individuals have an exemption per the EPA mask mandate order.
- 7. Health screening measures as proposed undertaken prior to entering event. Temperature checks are not recommended.
- 8. No alcohol containing beverages may be sold or served at the event, including to spectators in box suites

Please note that this variance may be amended or withdrawn at any time by the Provincial Health Officer should conditions exist that warrant doing so in the interests of protecting public health. In addition, the local medical health officer may recommend additional conditions to this variance that I may impose.

For certainty, this variance will remain in effect and apply to the FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament as an order of the Provincial Health Officer, notwithstanding any subsequent changes to the Gatherings and Events Order.

In conclusion, pursuant to section 43 (3) (c) of the *Public Health Act* (excerpt below), I am varying the order to allow the FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament to proceed as proposed, according to the above conditions. The other conditions of the order, as applicable, continue to be in force.

Public Health Act excerpt

Reconsideration of orders

- **43** (3) After considering a request for reconsideration, a health officer may do one or more of the following:
 - (a) reject the request on the basis that the information submitted in support of the request
 - (i) is not relevant, or
 - (ii) was reasonably available at the time the order was issued;
 - (b) delay the date the order is to take effect or suspend the order, if satisfied that doing so would not be detrimental to public health;
- (c) confirm, rescind or vary the order.

British Columbia hits one million virtual health visits

Vancouver— Virtual health visits are not new to British Columbia, but once the COVID-19 pandemic hit, the number of virtual patient visits shot up from 1,500 to 20,000 per week, passing the one millionth mark last week.

In a recent survey conducted by Provincial Health Services Authority (PHSA) and its partners, patients gave virtual health visits high praise. Patients felt that virtual health visits made it easier and faster to access care, allowed the inclusion of family members, and saved them travel time and travel costs.

the transformation in health care delivery in B.C. has been remarkable. Virtual health visits have become essential for delivering care to people to keep them safe and healthy at home during COVID-19," said Adrian Dix, Minister of Health. "Beyond the pandemic, virtual health visits will continue to be available to B.C. citizens as virtual health evolves in innovative and new ways." TBC

Based on a recent analysis, it is estimated that the one million virtual health visits have saved patients in B.C. over 800,000 hours of travel time, over 22,000,000 kilometres traveled, and reduced the carbon footprint of our health care system by an estimated 8,000 tonnes.

For health care providers, the experience of offering virtual health visits to patients was also positive. Over 90 per cent of surveyed health care providers felt virtual health visits were an effective way to deliver care during a pandemic, that they could effectively communicate with patients, and that they would continue to use virtual health visits in the future.

"A key to having these virtual health visits available to citizens is the collaboration of leaders from the B.C. health sector who embarked on a provincially coordinated response in the early days of the pandemic,' said David Byres, interim president and CEO of PHSA. "Their partnerships.13 ways to keep providing s.13" TBC

For the Palmers and the Juttens, two B.C. families living outside the Lower Mainland, virtual health has been a game changer for their children's health care needs.

"I felt like we lived at BC Children's prior to the pandemic, honestly. [Virtual health visits] have reduced her [Charlotte] stress one hundred per cent because she doesn't have to travel," said Christina Palmer, mother of Charlotte, a BC Children's Hospital patient. "I'm very thankful that we have the opportunity to do the virtual appointments and we would continue virtual care in a heartbeat. We get the same level of care for Charlotte's treatment that we would in person but we save a 14-hour round trip drive."

Both families have children who are under the age of 10 and live with rare conditions that suppress their immune systems. The stress of traveling from their communities to BC Children's Hospital for checkups exacerbated their symptoms. Being able to have checkups virtually from home has significantly reduced the children's stress, and saved the families significant travel time and costs.

"The stress that comes with the travel to the hospital – all of Nolin's health issues that happen during travel, the things we have to deal with when we get there – I don't think we realized how stressful the travel was until we didn't have to do it," said Darlene Schopman, mother of Nolin, a BC Children's

Hospital patient. "The change to using virtual health was a huge sense of relief. It also means Nolin's Dad and I can join and be there together for many of the appointments."

Throughout the pandemic, PHSA virtual and digital health teams have collaborated with the B.C. Ministry of Health, regional health authorities (First Nations Health, Vancouver Coastal Health, Fraser Health, Northern Health, Island Health and Interior Health), Doctors of BC, Rural Coordination Centre of BC and the s.13 to ensure citizens of B.C. have access to virtual health to keep them safe and healthy.

Arch Hospital Due to Pediatrician Shortage

ISSUE SUMMARY:

- July 8-19, Peace Arch Hospital in Fraser Health is expected to divert all maternity patients requiring pediatric services to other hospitals due to lack of pediatrician coverage.
- Patients will be diverted primarily to Langley Memorial Hospital and other Fraser Health sites if necessary.

BACKGROUND REGARDING THE ISSUE:

- Since 2019, Peace Arch Hospital has only had non-continuous pediatric maternity service, meaning 24/7 coverage is interrupted periodically due to pediatrician shortage.
- Emergency coverage to patients without a pediatrician is provided by a pediatrician group through a Medical On-Call Availability Program (MOCAP) contract.
- On June 14th, Fraser Health was notified pediatrician coverage will not be available at Peace Arch Hospital July 8-19, except for a 12-hour period. Fraser Health could not secure coverage from other pediatricians in the region.
- Patients will be notified by their physicians or midwives to discuss their birth plan and ensure continued high-quality care during the diversion.
- Expectant mothers arriving in labour at the Peace Arch Hospital emergency department will be assessed before being transferred to another location.
- Children requiring emergency care at Peace Arch Hospital will be cared for by emergency department physicians and transferred to a site with pediatric services if required.
- Historically low pediatric patient volumes at Peace Arch Hospital contributes to the difficultly recruiting pediatricians who can find work elsewhere with higher compensation.
- Peace Arch Hospital had approximately 800 deliveries last year, and approximately 1,000 the year before.

ADVICE AND RECOMMENDED RESPONSE:

 We know it's challenging for parents when hospitals are put on maternity diversion – people want to give birth as close to their home as possible.

- However, we must put the safety of those that are pregnant and their babies foremost in our planning - so there are times - for staffing and other reasons, that hospitals must go on maternity diversion.
- Temporary diversions are a regular operating procedure used when there is a gap in service that can be filled using BC's extensive network of hospitals and health care services.
- The ministry is continuing to work with health authorities and other partners to align the number, type and location of health-care workers to meet patient and population needs across the province.
- The ministry is specifically working with FH and Peace Arch Hospital Pediatrics department to stabilize services with a physician contract that will support a full pediatric service.
- Our government is working to address the needs of patients and care providers through our new primary health-care strategy.
- At the heart of the strategy is a new focus on team-based care. Working in teams, health-care providers can:
 - Offer longer or more convenient hours for patients.
 - Deliver additional services like patient education,
 - Provide patients with support in self-managing their health care,
 - Offer maternity care that transitions into family health care; and
 - Be responsible for coordinating their patients' care as a team.

In the interest of having the Mills Memorial Hospital go out at our preferred date, we can go with option 2 which requires a little less support on the Events side.

- Virtual Zoom event, with live broadcast on Youtube. Media invited for QA.
- Visuals to include: 1 screen for Minister; 1 screen for folks outside of the Mills Memorial Hospital; plus additional screens for each speaker if they are not joining the people at Mills Memorial Hospital. (Is the Heiltsuk announcement format with Minister Murray Rankin possible if we can get Minister Dix into VCO?)

Option 2

Virtual Zoom meeting, with everyone invited to the Zoom call, including media.

- Similar to the CGM community engagement/announcement, everyone who wishes will have an
 opportunity to speak and ask questions. This time, including media as they will be invited. However,
 we'll have a more structured agenda and delineate time for FN Blessing, and time for key speakers
 to say a few words.
- As media is invited and able to ask questions at this zoom meeting, I don't anticipate the need to pitch our validators... but if you think it's a good idea, I would be inclined to agree
- Support required: I understand that the week of July 5 may be a busy one for events. If we go with this option, MO is able to organise the meeting. As for moderating media QA, perhaps NH comms can provide assistance with that.
