

The Health Emergency Coordination Centre (HECC) was established in 2011, based on lessons learned during the H1N1 influenza pandemic, to respond to emergency incidents for the MoH. The HECC operates at one of four response levels, depending on the scale of the response required. HECC Level 1 consists of the 24/7 Provincial Health Duty Officer on-call function maintained by the MoH's Emergency Management Unit (EMU). The HECC is activated to a higher response level if multiple health partners are involved or if an event has exceeded the response capacity of one or more regional health partners.







Health Authority Structure Example







COVID-19 Lessons Learned

Guidance for Provincial Ministry and Agency

Internal Assessment

Aim

This document has been created to guide provincial ministries and agencies through internal assessment of their response actions taken to mitigate the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. The project team will be holding information sessions with Ministry COVID Working Group members and other ministry staff to address any questions about these internal assessments.

Context

COVID-19 was first identified in late 2019 and was declared a global pandemic by the World Health Organization on March 11, 2020. Since early 2020 the government of British Columbia's response to the pandemic has dominated policy making and operational approaches. The BC Provincial Health Officer declared a provincial health emergency on March 17, 2020, and on March 18, 2020, the provincial government declared a provincial state of emergency, which together provided initial authority for the government's response.

Over the past two years, every ministry and agency was affected by and played important roles in mitigating and managing the pandemic's effects. Assessment of these actions is essential to understand what worked well and what could be improved upon as the government prepares for future pandemics and other disasters. This will be done through both internal assessments by ministries and agencies, and through public outreach and engagement with government stakeholders.

Every aspect of the government response was undertaken in a very uncertain world, not only in terms of the rapidly changing science about the virus, its treatment, and its evolution, but also in terms of how feasible, effective, and efficient government responses would be. The stakes were very high, with the lives and the well-being of many at stake. Rapidly unfolding events required timely response, with high costs associated with delays or inaction. The emergency itself affected the availability of resources and the ability to continue using normal ways of doing business internally and externally. It is within this context that ministries and agencies are being asked to assess their role in government's pandemic response, because uncertainty, high stakes, pressure to move quickly and a difficult operating environment will also characterize the next disaster.

Purpose

The purpose of the COVID Lessons Learned assessment is to identify lessons from what happened during government's response to this pandemic that can be applied in preparing for and responding to the next pandemic or other disaster.

Scope

As set out in the Terms of Reference, the scope of work for the project includes a review of the operational response to the pandemic by the provincial government since January 2020. Specifically, the Terms of Reference defines the scope of the review as follows:

This review is focussed on operational response to the pandemic by the BC government since January 2020 . The term "operational response" is chosen to focus the review on cross-government efforts to identify the implications of the pandemic, to make timely and informed decisions, and to implement those decisions in accordance with public health guidance and government policy direction.

The scope of the review excludes an assessment of the public policy decisions made by government to deal with the consequences of the pandemic and decisions made by the independent Provincial Health Officer. The review will, however, look at how these decisions were made.

The review seeks to find what can be learned from how government agencies responded and worked together to directly address the effects of a public health emergency that affected everything, changed rapidly, and created a high level of uncertainty. And what aspects of preparedness, engagement, communication, and execution worked well, what changes were made to enhance operational effectiveness as the pandemic evolved, and what improvements can be made to be better prepared for the next emergency.

Generally, the intention is to look at the process that led to decisions (timeliness, quality of information, objectives, options considered, implications understood) and the implementation of those decisions.

Operational responses include:

- · actions taken directly by the ministry or agency because the action falls within the ministry or agency's mandate, whether or not another ministry or agency is also involved. "Action" includes communications, implementation of policy decisions and the decision-making process.
- · provision of information and advice to central agencies, other ministries, and elected decision makers,
- · communications, both internally and externally, and
- · responses to direction resulting from policy decisions taken and regulatory requirements imposed by other bodies.

Out of Scope

The decisions themselves are excluded from the scope because effectiveness of specific decisions taken under the specific circumstances at the time will not help prepare for a pandemic with a different pathogen, or another type of disaster. That includes not only public health decisions and other response decisions taken by government and the Provincial Health Officer, but also recovery decisions such as financial and economic supports.

Internal assessments are not expected to include assessments of service delivery changes made to conduct regular business given public health restrictions, such as mask-wearing, safety dividers, physical distancing, and working remotely, unless there is a clear link to future disaster preparedness.

Deliverable

Provincial ministries and agencies are responsible for submitting an internal assessment report to the project team leading the COVID-19 Lessons Learned initiative. The report will be subject to due diligence by the team, who may request clarifications or additional information. Internal assessment reports are due by April 22, 2022.

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COVID-19 Lessons Learned

Terms of Reference

The COVID-19 pandemic has affected all aspects of the BC government and the broad BC public sector throughout 2020, 2021 and into 2022. The provincial government intends to undertake a review of government's operational response to the pandemic to capture lessons learned to date. Not only will this help to inform preparations for and the response to the next pandemic, which will inevitably occur in the future, but also contribute to planning and operational readiness for responses to the full range of risks of disasters and emergencies, which include earthquakes, climate change-induced extreme weather and wildfires, and many other situations that may affect large areas of the province.

Scope

The objective of this review is to improve the provincial government's ability to respond to future emergencies of all kinds.

This review is focussed on operational response to the pandemic by the BC government since January 2020. The term "operational response" is chosen to focus the review on cross-government efforts to identify the implications of the pandemic, to make timely and informed decisions, and to implement those decisions in accordance with public health guidance and government policy direction.

The scope of the review excludes an assessment of the public policy decisions made by government to deal with the consequences of the pandemic and decisions made by the independent Provincial Health Officer. The review will, however, look at how these decisions were made.

The review seeks to find what can be learned from how government agencies responded and worked together to directly address the effects of a public health emergency that affected everything, changed rapidly, and created a high level of uncertainty. And what aspects of preparedness, engagement, communication, and execution worked well, what changes were made to enhance operational effectiveness as the pandemic evolved, and what improvements can be made to be better prepared for the next emergency.

Structure

The review is a cross-government initiative. A senior external project team will conduct the review and prepare the public report. They have extensive experience in government operational management and knowledge of how public sector service delivery is structured in BC. The client for the report is the Deputy Minister to the Premier. The consultants will be supported by Emergency Management BC, which will be the lead agency in government for this initiative.

There are three aspects to the review:

- How were the implications of the pandemic identified?
- How timely and informed were decisions made in response to the pandemic?
- How were those decisions communicated and implemented, consistent with public health guidance and government policy?

CONFIDENTIAL DRAFT for DISCUSSION

The project team will research best practises and engage extensively, including:

- Reviewing internal assessments of the operational response undertaken by all ministries and select provincial government agencies. These will build upon any lessons-learned reviews already completed to avoid duplication of effort and be guided by a common statement of scope, objective, and questions to be addressed.
- s.13 First Nations, Indigenous organizations, external stakeholders, partners and independent regulators that played a role in delivering the response or were affected by the response. These s.13 will ensure input on the operational response by government agencies is considered in identifying lessons learned. Appendix A is an initial list of groups that will be s.13 with additional groups added as necessary during the process. MLAs from all parties will also be s.13
- Engaging the public through an online portal where individuals and organizations will have the
 opportunity to submit written input.

Other Reviews

Given the scope of the COVID-19 response, and the number of public organizations and agencies that contributed to the overall response, there will likely be a variety of reviews undertaken by independent entities. \$13

report will be informed by these reviews and best efforts made to avoid duplication and overlap.

Timing and Report

The final report to be submitted to government by September 30, 2022.

The final report will be a comprehensive summary of findings developed from best practices research, the internal operational assessments and stakeholder/public input and is intended for public release. It will not make recommendations.

TITLE: COVID-19 Lessons Learned Process

PURPOSE: Endorse the Ministry of Health COVID-19 lessons learned approach.

BACKGROUND:

COVID-19 has affected all aspects of BC since its onset in 2020 through 2022. In August 2021, the province signaled a review on the operational response to the pandemic to capture lessons learned to date. The intention is to improve the provinces' ability to respond to future emergencies of all kinds.

Emergency Management BC (EMBC) is the lead agency responsible and supports a senior external project team appointed to prepare a public report. The final report will be directed to Cabinet by September 30, 2022. The external project team will undertake three key functions: To conduct an independent analysis of information gathered through interviews, documentation, information meetings and analysis of Ministry/Sector documentation and reports. Completion of internal assessments by Ministries and their sectors to help guide and inform the project team and public engagement through a survey mechanism.

To support the cross-government initiative, EMBC has prepared guidance for completion of Ministry internal assessments due April 22, 2022. The Ministry of Health (MoH) and several health system partners have been engaged since August 2021 in support of EMBC and the project team as and when required. As a tentative announcement is anticipated for Ministry internal assessments to commence in March 2022, MoH has developed an approach to address the anticipated request.

DISCUSSION:

The following approach is proposed for consideration and endorsement of the Deputy Minister, as supported by the Senior Leadership Team.

- Facilities and Corporate Services (FCS) through the Emergency Management Unit (EMU) will lead the MoH contribution to the cross-government lessons learned review.
- FCS will leverage contractors to undertake engagement, interviews, and writing of the Ministry's internal assessment.
- The EMU will work with identified leads from Ministry program areas to complete work with the contractor and to answer follow-up questions.

Good afternoon Kevin, as discussed, please see the proposed one page approach to developing the report content and writing. I have also attached a draft report outline with sources identified for sections. As noted in our call, I recommend a review of existing documentation (with assistance from FCSD supply chain resources – Wendy/Kirsten?) and two working sessions with EDs/ADMs (one the week of March 22 and one the week of March 28) to populate the sections of the report as outlined in the documents attached. In addition, we would share a draft report with VP's Pandemic to provide feedback after we have a draft reviewed by Philip and Steve (aim for week of April 11?). Note the final draft would be ready on Monday April 18 which is a stat holiday but my plan is to complete it over the Easter weekend to give Philip, Steve, Bonnie and the Minister 5 days to edit before sending to EMBC.

ADMs can identify the key EDs to attend and if they also intend to participate in the working sessions. I can meet with the Office of the Public Health Officer separately (Bonnie and Hailey as needed if they cannot attend the sessions). Most of the public facing story is already documented so I would meet to confirm assumptions and operational decision making detail before Steve sees a draft.

Potential times for two virtual working sessions with EDs/ADMs are noted below (if necessary I can also meet virtually 1:1 with ADMs where needed). We would need admn support to organize the working sessions internally and to collect documentation. I would prepare some templates for

each session to guide the discussions and then collate the results and share back with teams for feedback. If you think we need a third session with VPs pandemic only, we can try to hold this the week of March 28 as well. The turnaround times are very tight for this. Also please let me know if Steve plans to take this to LC or other committees which can change the timelines.

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

PURPOSE: Endorse the Ministry of Health COVID-19 Lessons Learned approach.

BACKGROUND:

COVID-19 has affected all aspects of BC since its onset in 2020 through 2022. In August 2021, the province signaled a review of the operational response to the pandemic to capture lessons learned to date. The intention is to improve the provinces' ability to respond to future emergencies of all kinds.

Emergency Management BC (EMBC) is the lead agency responsible, providing support to a senior external project team appointed to prepare a public report. The final report will be directed to Cabinet by September 30, 2022. The external project team will undertake three key functions: To conduct an independent analysis of information gathered through interviews, documentation, information meetings and analysis of Ministry/Sector documentation and reports. Completion of internal assessments by Ministries and their sectors to help guide and inform the project team and public engagement through a survey mechanism.

To support the cross-government initiative, EMBC has prepared guidance for completion of Ministry internal assessments due April 22, 2022. The Ministry of Health (MoH) and several health system partners have been engaged since August 2021 in support of EMBC and the project team, as and when required. As a tentative announcement is anticipated for Ministry internal assessments to commence in March 2022, MoH has developed an approach to address the request.

COVID-19 Lessons Learned

Guidance for Provincial Ministry and Agency Internal Assessment

Aim

This document has been created to guide provincial ministries and agencies through internal assessment of their response actions taken to mitigate the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. The project team will be holding information sessions with Ministry COVID Working Group members and other ministry staff to address any questions about these internal assessments.

Context

COVID-19 was first identified in late 2019 and was declared a global pandemic by the World Health Organization on March 11, 2020. Since early 2020 the government of British Columbia's response to the pandemic has dominated policy making and operational approaches. The BC Provincial Health Officer declared a provincial health emergency on March 17, 2020, and on March 18, 2020, the provincial government declared a provincial state of emergency, which together provided initial authority for the government's response.

Over the past two years, every ministry and agency was affected by and played important roles in mitigating and managing the pandemic's effects. Assessment of these actions is essential to understand what worked well and what could be improved upon as the government prepares for future pandemics and other disasters. This will be done through both internal assessments by ministries and agencies, and through public outreach and engagement with government stakeholders.

Every aspect of the government response was undertaken in a very uncertain world, not only in terms of the rapidly changing science about the virus, its treatment, and its evolution, but also in terms of how feasible, effective, and efficient government responses would be. The stakes were very high, with the lives and the well-being of many at stake. Rapidly unfolding events required timely response, with high costs associated with delays or inaction. The emergency itself affected the availability of resources and the ability to continue using normal ways of doing business internally and externally. It is within this context that ministries and agencies are being asked to assess their role in government's pandemic response, because uncertainty, high stakes, pressure to move quickly and a difficult operating environment will also characterize the next disaster.

Purpose

The purpose of the COVID Lessons Learned assessment is to identify lessons from what happened during government's response to this pandemic that can be applied in preparing for and responding to the next pandemic or other disaster.

Scope

As set out in the Terms of Reference, the scope of work for the project includes a review of the operational response to the pandemic by the provincial government since January 2020. Specifically, the Terms of Reference defines the scope of the review as follows:

This review is focussed on operational response to the pandemic by the BC government since January 2020 . The term "operational response" is chosen to focus the review on cross-government efforts to identify the implications of the pandemic, to make timely and informed decisions, and to implement those decisions in accordance with public health guidance and government policy direction.

The scope of the review excludes an assessment of the public policy decisions made by government to deal with the consequences of the pandemic and decisions made by the independent Provincial Health Officer. The review will, however, look at how these decisions were made.

The review seeks to find what can be learned from how government agencies responded and worked together to directly address the effects of a public health emergency that affected everything, changed rapidly, and created a high level of uncertainty. And what aspects of preparedness, engagement, communication, and execution worked well, what changes were made to enhance operational effectiveness as the pandemic evolved, and what improvements can be made to be better prepared for the next emergency.

Generally, the intention is to look at the process that led to decisions (timeliness, quality of information, objectives, options considered, implications understood) and the implementation of those decisions.

Operational responses include:

- actions taken directly by the ministry or agency because the action falls within the ministry or agency's mandate, whether or not another ministry or agency is also involved. "Action" includes communications, implementation of policy decisions and the decision-making process.
- provision of information and advice to central agencies, other ministries, and elected decision makers,
- communications, both internally and externally, and
- responses to direction resulting from policy decisions taken and regulatory requirements imposed by other bodies.

Out of Scope

The decisions themselves are excluded from the scope because effectiveness of specific decisions taken under the specific circumstances at the time will not help prepare for a pandemic with a different pathogen, or another type of disaster. That includes not only public health decisions and other response decisions taken by government and the Provincial Health Officer, but also recovery decisions such as financial and economic supports.

Internal assessments are not expected to include assessments of service delivery changes made to conduct regular business given public health restrictions, such as mask-wearing, safety dividers, physical distancing, and working remotely, unless there is a clear link to future disaster preparedness.

Deliverable

Provincial ministries and agencies are responsible for submitting an internal assessment report to the project team leading the COVID-19 Lessons Learned initiative. The report will be subject to due diligence by the team, who may request clarifications or additional information. Internal assessment reports are due by April 22, 2022.



COVID-19 Lessons Learned

Guidance for Provincial Ministry and Agency Internal Assessment

Aim

This document has been created to guide provincial ministries and agencies through internal assessment of their response actions taken to mitigate the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. The project team will be holding information sessions with Ministry COVID Working Group members and other ministry staff to address any questions about these internal assessments.

Context

COVID-19 was first identified in late 2019 and was declared a global pandemic by the World Health Organization on March 11, 2020. Since early 2020 the government of British Columbia's response to the pandemic has dominated policy making and operational approaches. The BC Provincial Health Officer declared a provincial health emergency on March 17, 2020, and on March 18, 2020, the provincial government declared a provincial state of emergency, which together provided initial authority for the government's response.

Over the past two years, every ministry and agency was affected by and played important roles in mitigating and managing the pandemic's effects. Assessment of these actions is essential to understand what worked well and what could be improved upon as the government prepares for future pandemics and other disasters. This will be done through both internal assessments by ministries and agencies, and through public outreach and engagement with government stakeholders.

Every aspect of the government response was undertaken in a very uncertain world, not only in terms of the rapidly changing science about the virus, its treatment, and its evolution, but also in terms of how feasible, effective, and efficient government responses would be. The stakes were very high, with the lives and the well-being of many at stake. Rapidly unfolding events required timely response, with high costs associated with delays or inaction. The emergency itself affected the availability of resources and the ability to continue using normal ways of doing business internally and externally. It is within this context that ministries and agencies are being asked to assess their role in government's pandemic response, because uncertainty, high stakes, pressure to move quickly and a difficult operating environment will also characterize the next disaster.

Purpose

The purpose of the COVID Lessons Learned assessment is to identify lessons from what happened during government's response to this pandemic that can be applied in preparing for and responding to the next pandemic or other disaster.

Scope

As set out in the Terms of Reference, the scope of work for the project includes a review of the operational response to the pandemic by the provincial government since January 2020. Specifically, the Terms of Reference defines the scope of the review as follows:

This review is focussed on operational response to the pandemic by the BC government since January 2020 . The term "operational response" is chosen to focus the review on cross-government efforts to identify the implications of the pandemic, to make timely and informed decisions, and to implement those decisions in accordance with public health guidance and government policy direction.

The scope of the review excludes an assessment of the public policy decisions made by government to deal with the consequences of the pandemic and decisions made by the independent Provincial Health Officer. The review will, however, look at how these decisions were made.

The review seeks to find what can be learned from how government agencies responded and worked together to directly address the effects of a public health emergency that affected everything, changed rapidly, and created a high level of uncertainty. And what aspects of preparedness, engagement, communication, and execution worked well, what changes were made to enhance operational effectiveness as the pandemic evolved, and what improvements can be made to be better prepared for the next emergency.

Generally, the intention is to look at the process that led to decisions (timeliness, quality of information, objectives, options considered, implications understood) and the implementation of those decisions.

Operational responses include:

- actions taken directly by the ministry or agency because the action falls within the ministry or agency's mandate, whether or not another ministry or agency is also involved. "Action" includes communications, implementation of policy decisions and the decision-making process.
- provision of information and advice to central agencies, other ministries, and elected decision makers,
- communications, both internally and externally, and
- responses to direction resulting from policy decisions taken and regulatory requirements imposed by other bodies.

Out of Scope

The decisions themselves are excluded from the scope because effectiveness of specific decisions taken under the specific circumstances at the time will not help prepare for a pandemic with a different pathogen, or another type of disaster. That includes not only public health decisions and other response decisions taken by government and the Provincial Health Officer, but also recovery decisions such as financial and economic supports.

Internal assessments are not expected to include assessments of service delivery changes made to conduct regular business given public health restrictions, such as mask-wearing, safety dividers, physical distancing, and working remotely, unless there is a clear link to future disaster preparedness.

Deliverable

Provincial ministries and agencies are responsible for submitting an internal assessment report to the project team leading the COVID-19 Lessons Learned initiative. The report will be subject to due diligence by the team, who may request clarifications or additional information. Internal assessment reports are due by April 22, 2022.



TITLE: COVID-19 Lessons Learned Government Project

PURPOSE: To provide information and advice on how the Office of the Provincial

Health Officer will engage with the project

BACKGROUND:

In 2021, Cabinet issued direction to review the government's operational response to the COVID-19 pandemic to capture lessons learned to date. The intention is to improve the ability to respond to similar future emergencies. An independent project team with secretariat support from Emergency Management BC will conduct an analysis of information gathered through interviews, internal assessment reports, and a public survey. A public report capturing this information will be released in September 2022.

DISCUSSION:

The project team has requested the following information from the Office of the Provincial Health Officer:

- An internal assessment report (see Appendix A)
- A comprehensive list of partners / stakeholders that were engaged throughout the pandemic and contact information for members

The requested information is due to the project team on April 22, 2022. The internal assessment report will not be released publicly, but it is subject to Freedom of Information requests.

COVID-19 Lessons Learned Project

This report has been developed to support the independent review of the province's response to the COVID-19 pandemic. This report is a snapshot in time as the Office of the Provincial Health Officer and regional health authorities continue to actively respond to the pandemic.

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GENERAL

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE OFFICE OF THE PROVINCIAL HEALTH OFFICER

The Provincial Health Officer (PHO) is the senior public health official for BC and is responsible for monitoring the health of the population and providing independent advice to ministers and public officials on public health issues. The responsibilities of the PHO are outlined in the *Public Health Act*, including:

- · Providing independent advice to the Ministers and public officials on public health issues;
- Monitoring the health of the population of British Columbia and independently advising the ministers and public officials on public health issues and on the need for public health related legislation, policies and practices;
- Recommending actions to improve health and wellness in BC;
- Delivering reports that are in the public interest and annual reports on the health of the population and government's progress in achieving population health targets;
- · Establishing standards of practice for, and conducting performance reviews of Medical Health Officers; and
- Working with the BC Centre for Disease Control and BC's Medical Health Officers to fulfill their legislated mandates on disease control and health protection.

It is the responsibility of the Deputy Provincial Health Officers (DPHOs) to assist with the execution of the duties of the PHO. The PHO has accountabilities to the Minister of Health and Minister of Mental Health and Addictions. For more information on the Office of the Provincial Health Officer, please visit:

OBJECTIVES OF PANDEMIC RESPONSE

The objective of the pandemic response was initially to prevent the virus from spreading through containment strategies. Once community transmission was occurring regularly, focus shifted to mitigating the risk of transmission to protect those most vulnerable to severe illness, hospitalization, and death, while protecting the health of the broader population through established communicable disease prevention and mitigation strategies.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE PLAN

A pandemic coordination plan developed after the 2009 H1N1 pandemic in BC. Pieces of this pandemic plan were followed in the initial stages of the COVID-19 pandemic, including communication strategies. Elements of the plan were amended to meet the needs of the COVID-19 response in February 2020. MAJOR STAKEHOLDER GROUPS

The initial response in January 2020 involved the development of a standing committee led by the PHO and Deputy Minister of Health, with public health and operational representation from all regional health authorities, health emergency management officials, ministry staff, and the BC Centre for Disease Control. These meetings were held in person and via teleconference.

The Ministry's Health Emergency Coordination Centre (HECC) was activated in the initial months of 2020 to support coordination of activities across health authorities, the Office of the Provincial Health Officer, and Ministry of Health. The HECC involved multiple daily meetings, following an incident command structure, and engaged with public health emergency operations centres in the province, including Emergency Management BC, the Provincial Emergency Coordination Centre, and Joint Information Coordination Centre.

Regular meetings with Chief Medical Officers of Health and Vice Presidents of Pandemic Response continue to be held to address specific response issues. Due to the mandate of the PHO and the linkage to Medical Health Officers, the connection between the PHO and public health officials in the province was a strength throughout the pandemic response.

Additional stakeholder groups include:

- All provincial government ministries, and independent offices (e.g., Chief Coroner, Senior's Advocate, Representative for Children and Youth);
- Federal agencies, including the Public Health Agency of Canada, Health Canada, Transport Canada, Immigration and Refugee Services Canada, and Public Safety Canada;
- All provincial and territorial senior public health officials;
- Local government;
- Industries, sectors, and populations impacted by public health measures;
- Parents, school staff, and child-care staff;
- · Environmental health officers;
- Faith leaders; and
- International agencies, including the World Health Organization and federal governments.

STRUCTURAL CHANGES TO SUPPORT RESPONSE

The Office of the Provincial Health Officer contracted public health physician consultants to assist with the operational needs of the Office. Additional team members were temporarily appointed to support response activities, manage specific projects, and engage with internal and external stakeholders.

IMPLICATIONS OF THE PANDEMIC

The most important implication of the pandemic for the Office of the Provincial Health Officer was the protection of public health. The Office, in collaboration with the BC Centre for Disease Control and regional health authorities were well-prepared, even in the absence of data and evidence, as long-standing communicable disease prevention measures are regularly implemented in BC.

GAPS IDENTIFIED

The public health measures implemented by the PHO have had reaching implications for society and the economy. A dedicated team in the Office in collaboration with the BC Centre for Disease Control is producing public-facing reports of these unintended consequences to better understand the impact of public health measures on specific outcomes and to inform future actions and mitigation strategies. Due to the novel and dynamic nature of the pandemic, sectors that normally do not engage with public health were looking to the PHO for any and all advice and recommendations on safe operations. While the PHO and public health officials supported these sectors as much as possible throughout the pandemic, the reliance on the PHO was at times overwhelming for staff and timely engagement was sometimes not possible. It was identified that a liaison for the Office was required to engage with internal and external stakeholders, as was the need for a dedicated communications officer to support public briefings and responses. Capacity in the Office continues to be stretched due to the specific legal and clinical expertise required.

POLICY DECISION-MAKING PROCESS

DECISION-MAKING PROCESS FOR PUBLIC POLICY DECISIONS

Public health measures have been implemented in response to the dynamic nature of the pandemic and the emergence of both evidence and variants of concern along with the development and distribution of vaccines and treatment options. The decision-making process for these public health measures involves significant consideration of emerging and generally accepted evidence, effective prevention measures (e.g., vaccination) and epidemiology, and seeks to strike a balance between the least restrictive measures possible while meeting the objective of protecting the health of the population.

Decisions on public health measures during a public health emergency allow for immediate implementation through verbal Orders when required; otherwise, the same components of consideration and consultation apply that would occur during "normal" (i.e., non-pandemic) operations. Consultation and presentation to senior public health officials, health authority CEOs, impacted sectors where possible, and to members of Cabinet and the Premier are established procedures to implement public health measures. Uncertainty, while rampant throughout the pandemic, has been and continues to be mitigated by caveats to Orders, regular review of evidence and amendments, and daily updates on the epidemiology in the province. Data flowed from health authorities and the BC Centre for Disease Control through established procedures to the Office of the Provincial Health Officer; data analysis capacity at the BC Centre for Disease Control and the Office of the Provincial Health Officer was dedicated to ensure current conditions were accurately captured.

Engagement and consultation with external partners informed some public health measures, such as those imposed on worship services in consultation with faith leaders. Presentations and engagement by the PHO at industry tables allowed for feedback, ideas, and concerns to be captured as part of the decision-making process.

Each PHO Order provides the basis and rationale for the implementation of restrictions or limitations in a preamble, with respect to a variety of considerations as to why the measures are being Ordered. An excerpt from the Gathering and Events Order of the PHO is provided in the box below as an example of the considerations that go into decisions regarding public health measures:

WHEREAS:

On March 17, 2020, I provided notice under section 52 (2) of the Public Health Act that the transmission of the infectious agent SARS-CoV-2, which has caused cases, clusters and outbreaks of a serious communicable disease known as COVID-19 among the population of the Province of British Columbia, constitutes a regional event, as defined in section 51 of the Public Health Act;

A person infected with SARS-CoV-2 can infect other people with whom the infected person is in contact;

Vaccination is safe, highly effective, and the single most important preventive measure a person can take to protect themselves, their families, and other persons with whom they come into contact from infection, severe illness and possible death from COVID-19. In particular: (a) the vaccines available in British Columbia, in company with other protective and preventive measures, provide protection against infection and are highly effective in protecting against severe illness, hospitalization, intensive care unit (ICU) admission and death across all eligible age groups, with illness being mostly milder in vaccinated people who become infected than in unvaccinated people; b) most British Columbians who have received their primary course of vaccine (two doses) have strong and durable protection against severe illness from SARS-CoV-2 resulting from the extended interval between dose one and dose two that is being utilized in British Columbia; in addition, a vaccine is being offered which only requires one dose to be effective, and booster doses are being implemented in order to reinforce the protection afforded by vaccination; and (c) a full course of vaccine provides more effective and durable protection against infection and severe illness than natural immunity from prior COVID-19 infection alone, or natural immunity in combination with a single-dose of vaccine;

Vaccines, which prevent or reduce the risk of infection with SARS-CoV-2, have been and continue to be readily available in British Columbia and while substantial progress has been made in vaccinating the population of British Columbia 12 years of age and older, and children aged 5 to 11 years of age are now being vaccinated, a portion of the public remains unvaccinated and there are communities where vaccination rates are low;

Communities with low vaccination rates have experienced rapid spread of SARS-CoV-2, causing serious illness and increases in hospitalizations and ICU admissions, primarily in unvaccinated people. By contrast, communities with high vaccination rates have seen corresponding less serious illness and lower per capita hospitalization, ICU admission and death rates;

Unvaccinated people are at greater risk than vaccinated people of being infected with SARS-CoV-2, and unvaccinated people who are infected, experience significantly higher rates of hospitalization, ICU-level care and invasive mechanical ventilation, complications and death when compared with vaccinated people. Unvaccinated people are also at higher risk of transmitting SARS-CoV-2 to other people, including vaccinated people;

People who are vaccinated can be infected with SARS-CoV-2, but experience less severity of illness than unvaccinated people, especially in younger populations. Vaccinated persons who contract COVID-19 can transmit SARS-CoV-2 but since they are generally contagious for shorter periods of time, and are less symptomatic, they are less likely to transmit SARS-CoV2, when compared to unvaccinated infected persons;

The ongoing incidence of COVID-19 and serious health consequences that result has been exacerbated over time, first by the arrival of the highly transmissible Delta variant of SARS-CoV-2, which caused significantly more rapid transmission and increased severity of illness, particularly in younger unvaccinated people, than earlier variants, and now by the arrival of the even more transmissible Omicron variant, which has been responsible for a surge in infections, and is now the dominant strain of SARS-CoV-2 circulating in the province;

Absent vaccination, British Columbia would be in a far more challenging situation than the fragile balance our current immunization rates have provided, but the transmissibility of the Delta and Omicron variants means that higher vaccination rates than previously expected are now required to maintain this balance, mitigate transmission, reduce case numbers and serious outcomes, and most importantly, given the high case rates experienced with Omicron, reduce the burden on the healthcare system, particularly hospital and ICU admissions going forward;

The emergence of the Omicron variant, which has led to significant surges in infection and hospitalizations in British Columbia and in other jurisdictions worldwide, underlines the importance of vaccination in protecting the population and in removing the conditions which foster the development of variants which pose ever greater threats to public health;

Further, vaccinated people who are infected with SARS-CoV-2, including the Omicron variant, have been shown to have high levels of protection against severe illness and to experience shorter infectious and symptomatic periods, and to recover from COVID-19 faster than similarly situated unvaccinated people, which, in turn, reduces the risk of transmission to their close contacts and co-workers and minimizes the disruption caused by absenteeism, all of which supports the continued provision of essential services in particular, and the orderly functioning of society as a whole;

Preserving the ability of the public health and health care systems to protect and care for the health needs of the population, including providing care for health needs other than COVID-19, is critical. High incidence of transmission and illness in one or

more regions have spillover effects on health care delivery across the province, including in critical care and surgical services. Our public health and health care systems are currently experiencing severe stress, and are stretched beyond capacity in their efforts to prevent and respond to illness resulting from the transmission of COVID-19 in the population;

Both the public health and the health care systems are using disproportionate amounts of their resources in their efforts to prevent and respond to COVID-19 due to transmission of SARS-CoV-2 across the province, and to provide care for those who become ill with COVID-19, who can be quite ill, require high levels of care and be hospitalized for long periods of time, which situation is exacerbated by the care needs of unvaccinated people who comprise a substantial proportion of those who require hospitalization and ICU admission;

While people who have contracted SARS-CoV-2 may develop some natural immunity for a period of time following infection, the strength and duration of that immunity varies depending on a multitude of factors, including which variant they were infected with and severity of infection. The risk of reinfection and hospitalization is significantly higher in people who remained unvaccinated after contracting SARS-CoV-2 than in those who are 4 vaccinated post-infection. Vaccination, even after infection, remains an important measure to protect against reinfection by providing a stronger immune response that is known to be effective for a longer period of time than immunity arising from infection;

People over 70 years of age, and people with chronic health conditions or compromised immune systems, are particularly vulnerable to severe illness, hospitalization, ICU admission, and death from COVID-19, even if they are vaccinated;

Children under 12 are included among the members of the community who are more likely to be infected. This is because children in the 5-11 age group have only recently become eligible for their second dose of vaccine and children under the age of 5 will remain unprotected from infection until a vaccine is available for them;

Adults and children who are either particularly vulnerable to infection with SARS-CoV-2, or too young to be immunized, depend upon the people with whom they come into contact to protect them from the risk of infection;

Unvaccinated people in close contact with other people promotes the transmission of SARSCoV-2 to a greater extent than vaccinated people in the same situations, which in turn increases the number of people who develop COVID-19 and become seriously ill;

Programs that require proof of vaccination have been shown to increase vaccination uptake in populations, thereby reducing the public health risk of SARS-CoV-2 and the burden of COVID-19 illness on the public health system, health care system and society as a whole:

There are difficulties and risks in accommodating a person who is unvaccinated, since there is no other measure that is as effective as vaccination in reducing the risk of contracting or transmitting SARS-Co-2, and the likelihood of experiencing severe illness, hospitalization, ICU admission and death if infected;

I have considered and continue to consider based on the currently available generally accepted scientific evidence whether other measures, such as natural immunity, polymerase chain reaction (PCR) testing or rapid antigen testing, are as effective as vaccination in reducing the risk of transmission SARS-Co-2 and or the severity of illness if infected;

Routine COVID-19 testing of asymptomatic people is not recommended in British Columbia. PCR testing capacity is reserved for people who have symptoms of COVID-19 and are either at risk of more severe disease and currently eligible for treatment, or live or work in high-risk settings, such as health care workers. Rapid antigen testing requires higher virus levels in the sample to detect and report a positive result and, therefore, has a higher risk of providing a false negative result and is less accurate and reliable than PCR testing;

Rapid antigen testing is not a substitute for vaccination and is most useful when used for 5 symptomatic people in specific settings in which additional layers of protection are needed to protect people at higher risk of serious outcomes of COVID-19, such as in long-term care facilities, and then followed up with confirmatory PCR testing for positive tests, and when used in remote communities where obtaining results of PCR testing may be delayed;

There are clear, objective criteria for determining whether a person has a medical deferral to a COVID-19 vaccination, and very few people fall into this category;

Various options for establishing vaccine status, including in paper and online format, are readily available to members of the public;

The Omicron variant has resulted in a rapid rise in infection, hospitalization and ICU admission rates in British Columbia and has led me to conclude that measures continue to be needed to temper the extent of transmission, reduce severity of disease and continue to incentivize vaccination;

I recognize the societal effects, including the hardships, which the measures which I have and continue to put in place to protect the health of the population have on many aspects of life, and, with this in mind, continually engage in a process of reconsideration of these measures, based upon the information and evidence available to me, including infection rates, sources of transmission, the presence of clusters and outbreaks, the number of people in hospital and in intensive care, deaths, the emergence of and risks posed by virus variants of concern, vaccine availability, immunization rates, the vulnerability of particular

populations and reports from the rest of Canada and other jurisdictions, with a view to balancing the interests of the public, including constitutionally protected interests, against the risk of harm to public health created by the presence of unvaccinated persons at gatherings and events;

I further recognize that constitutionally protected interests include the rights and freedoms guaranteed by the *Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms*, including specifically freedom of religion and conscience, freedom of thought, belief, opinion and expression, and the right not to be deprived of life, liberty or security of the person, other than in accordance with the principles of fundamental justice. However, these rights and freedoms are not absolute and are subject to such reasonable limits prescribed by law as can be demonstrably justified in a free and democratic society, which includes proportionate, precautionary and evidence-based measures to prevent loss of life, serious illness and disruption of our health system and society;

When exercising my powers to protect the health of the public from the risks posed by COVID-19, I am aware of my obligation to choose measures that limit the Charter rights and freedoms of British Columbians less intrusively, and to balance these rights and interests in a way that is consistent with the protection of public health. I have concluded that the measures 6 which I am putting in place in this Order are proportionate, rational and tailored to address the risk, and are consistent with principles of fundamental justices; the measures are neither arbitrary, overbroad, nor grossly disproportionate in light of the need to protect public health at this time. In my view, any limits on constitutionally protected rights and freedoms arising from this Order, are proportionate and reasonable in the interests of protecting public health, and there are no other reasonable alternatives that would provide the same level of protection for the population;

In addition, I recognize privacy interests, informational privacy rights protected by the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act and the rights protected by the Human Rights Code, and have taken these into consideration when exercising my powers to protect the health interests of members of the public;

I am also mindful that the volume of requests for reconsideration of my Orders, and the time and expertise which considering them entails, has become beyond my capacity and that of my office and team of medical health officers to manage, and is using resources which are better directed at assessing and responding to the protection of the public as a whole.

COMMUNICATIONS

Beginning in February 2020, the PHO and Minister of Health committed to regular briefings to the public and media to ensure that the situation in BC was being openly and transparently communicated. These briefings varied in frequency, from daily to weekly to less often, depending on the state of the pandemic. The Office of the Provincial Health Officer has historically shared the Ministry of Health communication resources. A dedicated communications team was established to support the PHO and Minister on these briefings; however, challenges in retention occurred with consistency suffering as a result. A contractor is currently retained in the Office of the Provincial Health Officer to provide ongoing support directly to the PHO as needed.

Where stakeholder tables existed, representatives from the Office of the Provincial Health Officer ensured attendance to communicate updates and answer questions; where stakeholder tables did not exist, these were developed on a time-limited basis and were supported by communication to individual stakeholders as needed. These tables were an effective and valued approach to communication from the Office; however, due to capacity, meetings could not always occur in a timely manner and did not always capture every sector impacted by PHO Orders.

The theme of uncertainty underpinned many communications both internally and externally. As a result, the dynamic nature of the pandemic is well-understood by the general population and the resulting shifts in public health measures to respond to new waves and Variants of Concern have been well-communicated.

OPERATIONAL RESPONSE AND IMPLEMENTATION

The most critical responses of the Office of the Provincial Health Officer was the declaration of a public health emergency in the province that allowed for the authority under the *Public Health Act* to support immediate and reaching public health measures (i.e., PHO Orders) to protect the health of British Columbians. The *Public Health Act* has been utilized over 150 times to declare and public PHO Orders since March 2020.

As previously noted, PHO Orders are reviewed regularly by the PHO and public health officials to ensure that they are continuing to provide a balanced approach between restrictions and reduction in societal disruption to protect public health. These PHO Orders have been amended a number of times throughout the pandemic, and continue to reflect the current evidence, effective preventive measures, and epidemiology in the province. 
Due to the legal nature of PHO Orders, verbal communication would often precede written Orders. Legal counsel has been actively engaged in the development of these written Orders to ensure that they are legally accurate and aligned with the authority outlined in the *Public Health Act*. The requirement to provide written Orders was often a constraint on timely communication due to the complex nature of the Order language.

CONCLUSION

As the COVID-19 pandemic continues to occur globally and in BC, the Office of the Provincial Health Officer continues to monitor and respond to protect the health of British Columbians and those who visit the province. After action reviews and quality improvement processes are ongoing in the Office, with the intention to inform future actions. It is anticipated that a report will be developed to provide a comprehensive review of the pandemic in BC, with recommendations on how to prepare, respond, and recover from the next pandemic.

We would also like your ministry's help in scheduling a meeting with the table(s) after the review is publicly announced. We would, however, like to meet with the tables without government officials in attendance.

Ministry of Health External Stakeholders Updated: March 17, 2022

Since January 2020, the Ministry of Health has had extensive engagement internally across the Ministry and externally with health partners and others. Example of stakeholder audiences the Ministry has been engaged with, include, but not limited to:

- Federal government agencies (e.g. Public Health Agency of Canada, Health Canada)
- Provincial government Ministries (e.g. Emergency Management BC)

Good afternoon Kevin, as discussed, please see the proposed one page approach to developing the report content and writing. I have also attached a draft report outline with sources identified for sections. As noted in our call, I recommend a review of existing documentation (with assistance from FCSD supply chain resources – Wendy/Kirsten?) and two working sessions with EDs/ADMs (one the week of March 22 and one the week of March 28) to populate the sections of the report as outlined in the documents attached. In addition, we would share a draft report with VP's

Pandemic to provide feedback after we have a draft reviewed by Philip and Steve (aim for week of April 11?). Note the final draft would be ready on Monday April 18 which is a stat holiday but my plan is to complete it over the Easter weekend to give Philip, Steve, Bonnie and the Minister 5 days to edit before sending to EMBC.

ADMs can identify the key EDs to attend and if they also intend to participate in the working sessions. I can meet with the Office of the Public Health Officer separately (Bonnie and Hailey as needed if they cannot attend the sessions). Most of the public facing story is already documented so I would meet to confirm assumptions and operational decision making detail before Steve sees a draft.

Potential times for two virtual working sessions with EDs/ADMs are noted below (if necessary I can also meet virtually 1:1 with ADMs where needed). We would need admn support to organize the working sessions internally and to collect documentation. I would prepare some templates for each session to guide the discussions and then collate the results and share back with teams for feedback. If you think we need a third session with VPs pandemic only, we can try to hold this the week of March 28 as well. The turnaround times are very tight for this. Also please let me know if Steve plans to take this to LC or other committees which can change the timelines.
