

TITLE: Medical Services Plan (MSP) Wait Period for Babies born in British

Columbia to Non-Residents

PURPOSE: To provide an overview of the current MSP wait period policy for babies

born in BC to parents who do not have resident status in British Columbia

and propose recommendations for updates to this policy.

BACKGROUND:

Section 7.2 (Enrolment of Beneficiaries) of the *Medicare Protection Act* (the Act) outlines the accountability of the Medical Services Commission to enrol an applicant and dependents, if applicable, after confirming identify and residency. The Act defines a "Resident" as "a person who

- (a) is a citizen of Canada or is lawfully admitted to Canada for permanent residence,
- (b) makes his or her home in British Columbia, and
- (c) is physically present in British Columbia for
- (i) at least 6 months in a calendar year, or
- (ii) a shorter prescribed period,

and includes a person who is deemed under the regulations to be a resident but does not include a tourist or visitor to British Columbia;"

New and returning residents are required to complete a wait period, consisting of the balance of the month in which residence in British Columbia is established, or reestablished, plus two months, before provincial health coverage can begin. As per Medical Services Commission Minute of the Commission #13-118, there are a number of specified groups that are granted an exemption from the wait period including children either born to or adopted by Canadian residents. For those babies that are not born to or adopted by Canadian residents, there is an existing structured and well-defined process by which the wait period can be reviewed and waived if there are significant medical costs incurred during the period.

The wait period is in place for the protection of the publicly funded healthcare system, discouraging individuals that are non-residents from seeking medical treatment in BC and returning to their usual place of residence. This includes child birth and newborn healthcare for individuals who are not residents of BC. It is the responsibility of government to ensure the fair and consistent application of legislation and policy to residents and non-residents to uphold the integrity and sustainability of the public system.

It should also be noted that there are broader inclusion criteria for MSP beyond what is defined under the Act. Part 2 Section 6 of the Medical and Health Care Services Regulation (the Regulation) outlines those who may not meet the eligibility criteria laid

out under the Act but may be deemed residents. These individuals are included under the definition of "resident", as such they are eligible for enrolment in MSP and will have date of birth coverage for their newborns.

The provincial government has been asked to provide date of birth coverage for babies born in BC to parents who are not MSP beneficiaries and whose resident status in BC is unknown. These requests have come through the formal waiver of the wait period process for specific individuals, but also by advocacy groups on behalf of this broader group of parents with unknown immigration and/or resident status. It is expected that these requests will continue.

DISCUSSION:

The Beneficiary Services and Strategic Priorities (BSSP) Branch has engaged with stakeholders that represent individuals with unknown immigration and/or resident status in BC, with the objective of simplifying the process of MSP enrolment for babies born to these individuals. For these stakeholders, the wait-period requirement for babies has been identified as an ongoing concern. It has been identified through this work that other provinces, including Ontario and Alberta, offer date of birth health coverage for all babies born in the respective province. There are corresponding processes in place in those provinces to review residency requirements at the time of application and at regular intervals after coverage is provided.

In BC, date of birth MSP coverage is provided for babies born in BC to parents who are eligible for enrolment. For a baby born to parents where neither parent is eligible for enrolment in of MSP, the child will receive Canadian citizenship at birth, but MSP coverage will be effective after the wait period. The baby is considered a new resident to BC and will be enrolled as such after the wait period, provided the birth certificate and the MSP application form are provided.

In most instances, the parent or guardian of the baby must complete the MSP application form using the baby's information. The parent or guardian must sign the form, which includes a section clarifying the baby will meet the residence requirements to maintain provincial health care benefits. The system is honored-based and Health Insurance BC (HIBC) will enrol the baby as a new resident based on the information provided in the application form. If a baby's eligibility for health care coverage is in question, the Enforcement, Compliance and Eligibility Unit within the Ministry of Health has the authority to conduct an investigation to ensure residency has been established and maintained.

There may be an opportunity to re-visit definitions in legislation or application of the definition in regulation or policy if a decision is made to further broaden the inclusion criteria for those who do not require a coverage wait period. However, there must be consideration to both the fair application of legislation and policy to all groups seeking health care coverage and the greater consequences.

Any change to the wait period requirement for babies of non-residents will have significant system level consequences. Canada, and BC in particular, is often the destination of choice by foreigners for baby delivery due to legislative requirement

Canadian born babies to obtain citizenship, regardless of the parent's resident or immigration status. Changes to the wait period requirement for babies born in BC to ineligible parent or where immigration and/or resident status unknown will provide greater incentive for this practice and the misuse of the public system by individuals who would current be ineligible. This group of ineligible non-residents may grow considerably if the newborn, in addition to obtaining Canadian citizenship, would also be eligible for date of birth MSP coverage. It would be assumed that the incentive would be even greater if the baby is known to be unwell and immediate medical care is required. These consequences, and other including implications to interprovincial agreements, must be considered prior to any changes to the wait period for babies of non-residents.

A decision is required to either uphold or update current legislation, regulation and/or policy. The decision must be communicated to the MSC and reflected in an update to the Wait Period Committee Terms of Reference and BSSP Branch Policy Manual.

OPTIONS:

Option 1: Status Quo

Pros:

- Protects the sustainability of the publicly funded system.
- Ensures all new residents are treated fairly and equitably.
- Ensures that only those who are intending to make BC their home are enrolled.

Cons:

- Negative perception by advocacy groups and by some members of the public.
- May create a financial barrier to access for babies in the wait period.





KEY MESSAGES

- Clarify that babies born to parents on precarious immigration status are eligible to enroll.
- To enroll a child on their own MSP account, the following documentation is required:
 - MSP Application for Enrolment form (HLTH 102) using only the child's personal information and signed by the parent;
 - o A copy of the child's birth certificate; and
 - o Parent or Guardian contact information.
- HIBC requires parental or guardianship information in order to communicate information regarding minor account holders.

STRATEGY AND TACTICS

The strategy of this plan is to engage stakeholders for the purpose of informing and educating them on the changes made to the enrolment process for babies born to parents on precarious immigration status and to provide as wide access to this information as possible.

The three main channels for communication are:

This Minute of the Commission (MOC) replaces MOC 15-013 and 13-118.

In order to ensure equitable access to insured services, and to provide guidance to and consistent in the administration of the Medical Services Plan, the Medical Services Commission (MSC) hereby affirms the following policy with respect to the commencement of eligibility for benefits.

New and returning residents to British Columbia must apply for coverage and meet the definition of resident in the *Medicare Protection Act.* As a general rule, coverage under the Medical Services Plan will be effective for those arriving:

From outside of Canada:

After a wait period consisting of the balance of the month in which residence was established, plus two months (the "wait period"). If the applicant is absent from Canada for more than 30 days during the wait period and does not make his or her home in British Columbia during that absence, coverage will not be available until the applicant returns to the province, becomes resident and completes a new wait period.

From elsewhere in Canada:

In accordance with the portability provisions of the Agreement on Eligibility and Portability (normally, the balance of the month in which residence was established, plus two months).

1. Introduction

The Medicare Protection Act (Act) provides administrative discretion to the Medical Services Commission (MSC) to assign an effective date of coverage subsequent to the date of residency but no later than three months after the receipt of the application for coverage. This allows the MSC to consider individual circumstances in the assignment of the effective date. Since December 2004 there has been a formal process for doing so.

This document provides guidelines and a formal administrative process for reviewing individual requests for a waiver of the "wait period" assigned by Medical Services Plan (MSP). The process is administered by the Coverage Wait Period Review Committee.

2. Purpose

The purpose of the Coverage Wait Period Review Committee is:

To evaluate requests and render decisions to waive the wait period for individuals, who
have met the eligibility requirements (under Section 7(2) of the Medicare Protection Act)
for enrolment as a beneficiary.

3. Mandate

The Commission Minute on Commencement of Enrollment (originally #98-070) states the Commission may, subject to submission of an application for enrollment, grant exemptions to the wait period policy. The Minute also establishes a wait period for both new and returning residents as the balance of the month in which residence was established, plus two months. During this period the MSP will not pay for insured medical services; the applicant is responsible for these costs. The Minute also sets out some circumstances in which the Commission may grant exemptions to the wait period.

Through an amendment to Minute #98-070 on January 28, 2005, notation of this formalized administrative process for reviewing individual requests for a waiver of the wait period was documented. The Chair of the Coverage Wait Period Review Committee is accountable to the Medical Services Commission.

Note: Minute 98-070 was amended and replaced with Minute 05-002 on January 28, 2005, Minute 05-064 on December 7, 2005, and Minute 07-111 on December 17, 2007. Minute #07-111 has been replaced with Minute 08-025. Minute #08-025 was replaced with Minute #13-118. Minute #13-118 has been replaced by Minute 15-013 on February 13, 2015.

Any amendments to the Terms of Reference require the prior review and approval of the Chair, Medical Services Commission.

4. Adjudication Guidelines

The Minute on Commencement of Enrollment sets out the circumstances when the Commission may grant exemptions to the wait period in order to provide immediate coverage to an applicant. It should be noted that residency of the individual requesting a review of the wait period must be established through an application for enrollment.

The circumstances for exemption established by Minute #08-025 include:

- 1. a new-born child, of whom either parent is a resident on the date of birth;
- 2. a child adopted, or in the process of adoption, by resident, on the later of the date of adoption or the date of arrival in Canada;
- 3. a member of the Canadian Forces who is discharged in BC or arriving in BC for discharge, on the date of discharge,
- 4. the spouse or child of a Canadian Forces member if the family has been stationed outside BC, on the date of arrival;
- 5. an inmate released or paroled in BC from a penitentiary or prison, on the date of release or parole; and
- a Convention refugee holding a Permanent Resident Card/Confirmation of Permanent Residence (previously a Record of Landing) or Temporary Resident Permit (previously a Minister's Permit) who moves to BC from outside of Canada, on the date of arrival; and
- 7. in such other circumstances as the Commission may determine to be appropriate.

To ensure the policy is administered in a fair and consistent manner, the latter circumstance (#7 - "other") has been further defined. The following criteria were used in developing the "other" circumstances:

- protects the integrity of the publicly funded health care system;
- mitigates the impact on the applicant of physician and hospital costs incurred during the wait period which could constitute financial hardship;
- · addresses the impact of administrative error by MSP or its agents; and
- facilitates the application of the Medicare Protection Act and its Regulations.

Examples of "Other" Circumstances

- 7a. Applicants who:
 - have had the effective date of coverage changed as a result of verifiable administrative errors or misinformation by MSP that results in physician treatment/hospital services being provided during an uninsured period.
- 7b. Applicants who during the wait period:
 - I. are diagnosed with a condition, illness or injury that requires immediate treatment or the applicant's condition would deteriorate to the point where it ultimately costs MSP more to treat the applicant's condition (i.e. it would be less expensive in the long run to waive the wait period); and
 - II. do not have or are unable to obtain private insurance; and
 - III. would endure financial hardship as a result of the financial burden of paying the medical costs.

- 7c. Applicants, spouse and child(ren), who during the wait period:
 - I. are diagnosed with a life, limb or major-organ threatening illness; or
 - II. are diagnosed with a terminal illness; and
 - III. are unable to obtain private insurance; and
 - iV. would endure financial hardship as a result of the financial burden of paying the medical costs;
- 7d. Applicants who, during the wait period:
 - I. are beneficiaries; and
 - are applying for benefits for their spouse, who is or becomes pregnant and where the spouse and/or child may be at risk if they do not receive medical care; and
 - III. are unable to obtain private insurance; and
 - IV. would endure financial hardship as a result of the financial burden of paying the medical costs.
- 7f. Applicants who, during the wait period:
 - a. Are involuntarily committed to hospital under the *Mental Health Act or the Health Act Communicable Disease Regulation*.

In most situations, if an applicant (and spouse, if applicable) is currently sponsored for status in Canada, a Financial Statement from the sponsor (and spouse, if applicable) must also be provided.

Verification of all reported monthly income/expenses; including verification of reported bank balances (inside and outside Canada) via bank statements, paystubs, government cheque stubs, must be attached to the completed financial statement in order to determine financial hardship.

The Hospital Insurance Act states that "resident" means a resident as defined in the Medicare Protection Act. The policy is intended to entitle bona fide residents of British Columbia to medical coverage at the same time as eligibility commences for hospital benefits.

Under the authority of the Commission, the Coverage Wait Period Review Committee was struck to provide a formal administrative process for reviewing individual requests for a waiver of the wait period. Terms of Reference for the Coverage Wait Period Review Committee are attached.

5. Membership

The Coverage Wait Period Review Committee will consist of a minimum of three members including the Chair. All members will be from the Medical Beneficiary and Pharmaceutical Services Division.

June 2015

Members will be appointed by the Medical Services Commission to serve on the Committee for two years. Terms may be renewed.

Advisors from other program areas, as well as, medical consultation, may be added to the committee on a case-by-case basis to provide expert advice as determined by the Chair.

Secretarial support will be provided by the Medical Beneficiary and Pharmaceutical Services Division.

6. Meetings

Meetings will be at the call of the Chair or the Chair's alternate.

All members (or alternates) must be present at all meetings.

Decisions of the Committee are rendered on behalf of the Medical Services Commission.

7. Reporting

The Chair will produce an annual report to be submitted to the Chair of the Commission.

Hello Everyone,

Thank you for your response, the following bullets address your questions. Also, as per your request I have attached the Minute of the Commission #15-1074.

- Section 1 of the *Medicare Protection Act* (the Act) defines a resident as a person who:
 - (a) is a citizen of Canada or is lawfully admitted to Canada for permanent residence,
 - (b) makes his or her home in British Columbia, and
 - (c) is physically present in British Columbia for
 - (i) at least 6 months in a calendar year, or
 - (ii) a shorter prescribed period,

and includes a person who is deemed under the regulations to be a resident but does not include a tourist or visitor to British Columbia.

- As per Medical Services Commission Minute of the Commission #15-1074, there are a number of specified groups that are granted an exemption from the wait period including children either born to or adopted by Canadian residents (see attachment).
- When a baby is born in BC and neither parent is eligible for enrolment in the Medical Services Plan (MSP) the newborn is considered a new resident to the province. Eligibility for the newborn will depend on whether the baby will remain in BC permanently.
- A baby born to non-resident parents is required to complete a wait period.
- New and returning residents are required to complete a wait period, consisting of the balance of the month in which residence in BC is established, or re-established, plus two months, before provincial health coverage can begin.
- Section 7.2 (3)(b) of the Act, authorizes the mandatory wait period for new and returning residents stating:
 - (3) Enrolment is effective on the date stated by the commission, that date being
 - (b) not more than 3 months after receipt of the application.
- While a process is in place to review appeals from persons who have received health care services during the wait period, waivers are only approved in the most extenuating circumstances.
- Each province and territory in Canada is responsible for determining its own minimum residence requirements with regard to an individual's eligibility for benefits under its provincial health insurance plan. The *Canada Health Act* gives no guidance on such residence requirements beyond limiting waiting periods to establish eligibility for and entitlement to insured health services to three months.

Thank you Kate for sharing this document with us. Below is our written response to this document including some requests for further information in **bold**:

Sanctuary Health response to Medical Services Plan (MSP) Wait Period for Babies born in British Columbia to Non-Residents as Defined by the Medicare Protection Act

Our conversations with the Ministry of Health have been premised on a common understanding that the babies we are speaking about are residents as defined under the *Medicare Protection Act* and that we are helping to ensure the accountability of the Medical Services Commission to enrol these applicants. We hope that with the coming training of Health Insurance BC staff and the improvements that we have discussed with the Ministry of Health that this will be the case.

With regards to the wait period, we are having trouble finding where it is embedded in British Columbia's *Medicare Protection Act* or *Medical and Health Care Services Regulation*. For example, Ontario's waiting period is clearly set out in sections 5-6.3 of R.R.O. 1990, REGULATION 552 under their Health Insurance Act. **We would appreciate if you could point us towards the equivalent law or regulation in British Columbia**.

We also once again would like to point your attention towards, section 6.1 of Ontario's regulation:

"6. (1) A newborn, who, on the date of his or her birth, meets the requirements to be a resident is exempt from the three-month waiting period for the three months immediately following the date of birth. O. Reg. 133/09, s. 3."

It is telling that BC has regulations like Part 2 Section 3.1 specifically so that people who can afford to travel for the majority of the year still have access to health coverage, but these babies who need to connect with a health care provider routinely for the first year of their life are denied access until the wait coverage expires.

We do not have access to the Medical Services Commission Minute of the Commission #13-119. **Could you please also share that with us as well?** It's hard for us to make sense of it without knowing what it says.

With regards to the "existing structured and well-defined process by which wait period can be reviewed and waived if there are significant medical costs incurred during the period," this process is clearly not working. One only need to look at the recent babies we have discussed with you to see how broken the system is. The Medical Services Commission's annual reports appear to indicate that they dismiss any application related to pregnancy and prenatal care immediately.

We have been quite clear that we do not believe the wait period meets its stated purpose: the protection of the publicly funded health care system. We are not the only organization to do so, West Coast LEAF has written

the Ministry about this before. (http://www.westcoastleaf.org/wp-content/uploads/2015/07/July-20-2015-ltr-to-Minister-of-Health.pdf) We have limited our discussion with the Ministry of Health to discussion of an exemption for newborns because we were initially told that this was all that was possible without changes to the Act, and we were planning on directing further advocacy towards the Minister. However, upon reading your explanation and our own examination of the Medicare Protection Act, it appears that while the three month wait period is allowed by section 7.2(3), it is not mandated. We therefore recommend abolishing the wait period. The three month wait period places individuals in limbo and forces them to delay seeking care until coverage is received. This is evidenced in the increased physician billing rates in the fourth month after an immigrant's arrival. The delay in seeking appropriate and adequate health care results in poorer health outcomes and increased costs as individuals run the risk of developing more complex health concerns, which places a greater burden on our health care system. In February 2010, New Brunswick joined the rest of the country in ending their three month wait period for people moving from outside the country. The Health Minister at the time stated that it "is the right thing to do." British Columbia, Ontario and Quebec are the only provinces with a three month wait for people moving from outside the country. As noted above, Ontario has an exemption for newborn babies.

Today Nov 20/19 at ~08:40 I called HIBC from 778-888-0980, and spoke to \$.22

Again for the record, he was very kind and competent. Unfortunately I was given the wrong information, and a few other barriers to note:

- 1. I was asked the status of the parents- and when I said it was "precarious" this wasn't clear to him. I clarified, and what he really wanted to know was if they had citizenship or PR.
- --> asking people for their status is very triggering and scary in many cases, and is a huge barrier
- 2. It took awhile, but he looked through his document, and ultimately I was told to a) get birth cert b) fill in the baby enrollment form, and leave the parents PHN blank
- --> this is incorrect, and doesnt work
- 3. When I asked if I can fill out the adult form, he said that yes that could work, but the process says to fill out the baby form
- --> again, incorrect.
- 4. He initially wasn't aware of three-month wait for babies- and had to look it up to confirm. when he first read from his document, he cited that care was established on the date of birth.

I called early, and didnt have to wait long on the phone. The first person I spoke to transferred me to "Level 3", both attendants made me feel it was *possible* to register the baby, but i was told all the wrong info...

Ingrid has called multiple times and has had the same experience, with the added frustration of long long wait times.

Thanks for escalating this issue to ensure HIBC is better supported and trained to register these babies, as it is an extremely time sensitive issue in many cases!

Medical Services Plan (MSP) Wait Period for Babies born in British Columbia to Non-Residents as Defined by the Medicare Protection Act

Section 7.2 (Enrolment of Beneficiaries) of the *Medicare Protection Act* (the Act) outlines the accountability of the Medical Services Commission to enrol an applicant and dependents, if applicable, after confirming identify and residency. The Act defines a "Resident" as "a person who

- (a) is a citizen of Canada or is lawfully admitted to Canada for permanent residence,
- (b) makes his or her home in British Columbia, and
- (c) is physically present in British Columbia for
- (i) at least 6 months in a calendar year, or
- (ii) a shorter prescribed period,

and includes a person who is deemed under the regulations to be a resident but does not include a tourist or visitor to British Columbia;"

New and returning residents are required to complete a wait period, consisting of the balance of the month in which residence in British Columbia is established, or re-established, plus two months, before provincial health coverage can begin. As per Medical Services Commission Minute of the Commission #15-1074, there are a number of specified groups that are granted an exemption from the wait period including children either born to or adopted by Canadian residents. For those babies that are not born to or adopted by Canadian residents, there is an existing structured and well-defined process by which the wait period can be reviewed and waived if there are significant medical costs incurred during the period.

The wait period is in place for the protection of the publicly funded healthcare system, discouraging individuals that are non-residents from seeking medical treatment in BC and returning to their usual place of residence. This includes child birth and newborn healthcare for individuals who are not residents of BC. It is the responsibility of government to ensure the fair and consistent application of legislation and policy to residents and non-residents to uphold the integrity and sustainability of the public system.

It should also be noted that there are broader inclusion criteria for MSP beyond what is defined under the Act. Part 2 Section 6 of the Medical and Health Care Services Regulation outlines those who may not meet the eligibility criteria laid out under the Act but may be deemed residents. These individuals are included under the definition of "resident", as such they are eligible for enrolment in MSP and will have date of birth coverage for their newborns.




