Hunting closures will help protect moose in the Cariboo

VICTORIA – Two areas of the Cariboo Region that were severely impacted by wildfires this summer will be closed to moose hunting for the Oct. 15-31 and Nov. 1-15, 2017, seasons.

Zones A and C of management unit 5-13 in the Cariboo contain high-quality moose habitat that was severely affected by the Chilcotin Plateau Fire. In addition, the area is important to First Nations for sustenance hunting.

Closure of these zones applies to all licensed hunting, including resident and guided hunters. The moose hunting closure announced today is for an area immediately north of Highway 20 and west of Williams Lake and Quesnel.

The closure was recommended by ministry biologists. It comes on the heels of a ban on motor vehicles for the purpose of licensed hunting within the Chilcotin Plateau and Hanceville-Riske Creek area last week.

These measures were a first step to mitigate wildlife vulnerability to hunters as a result of increased access and sight lines following the burning of major tracts of forest this past summer.

The areas impacted by today's hunting ban will be assessed over the winter to determine what levels of sustainable hunting opportunity will be available in the coming years.

As requested:

Rationale to close the moose hunt in LEH zones 5-13A and 5-13C only for the 2017 season only.

- These are areas of moderate to high moose habitat that have been most impacted by wildfire. They have also seen significant declines in moose density, and so are most vulnerable to any potential increase in human harvest.
- Certain areas in the Chilcotin have seen considerable declines in moose density over the past 15 years. While the added impact of the extensive wildfires of 2017 is not known, cumulative effects work indicates that previous disturbance from mountain pine beetle salvage logging and wildfire has significantly reduced the availability of adequate cover for moose in portions of these MUs.
- The decline in moose density is particularly acute in MU 5-13A (survey done in 2016), which also experiences considerable First Nations' harvest pressure. Wildlife biologists predict a similar decline in moose density has occurred in MU 5-13C.
- This is a precautionary approach as it is not possible to quantify the effect this action would have on moose populations. Also, as fire impacts to available cover can persist for up to 10 years or more, this closure could create questions from First Nations and stakeholders precedence for closures in future years.

 The timing of this closure would be problematic given that moose hunting in 5-13A opens Oct 1 and is currently open in 5-13C (next LEH draw starts Oct1). Questions from LEH holders and guide outfitters around compensation would need to be addressed.

The timelines for the Wildfire Act closures is included in the website. I cut and paste the portion below:

Forest Use Restrictions

On September 2, 2017, area restrictions were expanded around several fires in the Cariboo Fire Centre. A campfire ban remains in effect and the off-road vehicle prohibition that was implemented throughout the Cariboo Fire Centre's jurisdiction on Aug. 4, 2017, is still in effect. For more information, please visit: http://ow.ly/LVRt30eCGIM

The area restriction order applies to all Crown land within the geographic boundaries as outlined on the associated maps, but it does not include the foreshore or Crown land covered by water (i.e., public use of lakes and rivers that

are not under an evacuation order is not restricted). The area restriction order also does not include private land, garbage dumps and transfer stations.

The following area restrictions will remain in effect until noon on Oct. 31, 2017, or until the area restriction order is otherwise rescinded.

Also as stated in Mike Pedersen's letter to Chief Joe Alphonse (attached):

"Should the Wildfire Act area restrictions be lifted before the end of 2017 hunting season, the situation will be reassessed in consultation with the Cariboo Fire Centre and the Tsilhqot'in Nation to ensure appropriate regulations are in place to protect wildlife. Beyond the 2017 hunting season, the Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development (FLNRORD) is committed to work with the Tsilhqot'in Nation on understanding the specific impacts to wildlife from the 2017 wildfires and ensuring that hunting in the Cariboo region is managed sustainably."

So, yes. A commitment has been made to work with the TNG if they come off before the end of hunting season.

In addition to the LSIB briefing bullets we provided for MSF briefing on Monday, please find the bullets prepared for the other two topics identified below. Given the sensitivity of topic 1, we have provided much more context. There are also numerous attachments I'd like to provide to Doug S for his understanding and reference. Please let me know if you may need anything further in advance and we can get to it promptly.

1. TNG: Chilcotin Moose Harvest Post-Wildfire

Context

- Following BC's Aug.31, 2017 response (attached) to TNG's Aug.11, 2017 letter requesting a full moratorium on moose harvest post-wildfire, TNG issued a press release on Sept 26, 2017 (attached), asking the province to put an immediate moratorium on moose hunting. In their view, it cannot be "business as usual" for moose amidst wildfire recovery. s.16
- On September 27, 2017 the remaining restrictions in place around wildfires in the Cariboo were rescinded. [BC News Release] In anticipation of the Wildfire Act Section 11 Order being fully rescinded, FLNR prepared options for Minister Donaldson's consideration, about how to manage impacts to moose from hunting post wildfire.
- Immediately after the Section 11 Order was lifted on September 27th, regional MIRR (Manager) and FLNR (FW Section Head) spoke to TNG representatives; in addition, ADM Rick Manwaring left a message for Chief Joe Alphonse. s.16 s.16

Given the prompt timing of the order being

lifted, staff will now be working with the Tsilhqot'in on preparing to collaborate on implementation of the minister's decision.

Connection to the Accord

- Under the Accord, there is a distinct moose management arrangement between BC and the TNG (sub sections 12.33 to 12.41). The TNG sit on the Fish & Wildlife Panel, where there is a commitment to develop a moose management plan.
- In the February 2016 Letter of Intent with TNG,BC provided TNG with \$200K (under the SFE) to support TNG participation in the joint development of a moose management plan. Also under the LOI, BC provided the TNG with funding out of the SFE to develop a "First Nation Sustenance Hunting Policy that includes actions

to reduce the reliance on cow moose. The policy, to be endorsed by the Tsilhqot'in leadership, will describe policies for governance of community wildlife harvest practices including matters such as (but not limited to) wildlife harvest reporting, use of ATVs, and harvest of antierless moose". This was a TNG accountability that they said was needed and committed to doing.

 Section 18 of the Accord (Dispute Resolution) sets out a clear process to follow when either party is not satisfied with Accord progress.

Go-Forward

- MIRR will be working with FLNRORD and MJAG to ensure a coordinated effort is made to de-escalate this
 issue. BC needs to confirm our commitment to the collaborative moose management work in the Accord, as
 well as confirming our commitment to the role and influence of the Fish & Wildlife Panel. MIRR will is
 coordinating a call with key agency reps for early next week.
- The Fish and Wildlife Panel discussed impacts on wildfire on moose and wildlife at the September 12th Panel
 meeting. The Tsilhqot'in expressed the need to protect wildlife, by closing or limiting the hunt, or by
 managing access particularly around burnt areas, particularly if the Wildfire Act Section 11 was removed.
- FLNR committed to discuss access management options through the coming weeks, in hope of having a plan
 in place before the Wildfire Act Section 11 was removed. Options are currently in front of Minister
 Donaldson, and including these concerns and ideas discussed at the Panel meeting.
- The Fish and Wildlife Panel produced a joint recommendation on Annual Allowable Harvest (AAH) for four species, including moose; we are currently in Year 1 of the five year allocation cycle. The Harvest Allocation Policy allows for annual evaluation of populations, and hunter success rates, to determine whether adjustments in hunting authorizations (LEH) are required to avoid exceeding the AAH. The Province will be working with the Tsilhqot'in to collect and review information about populations and habitat; if changes are required to maintain the AAH, the Policy provides the tool for adjusting the number of hunting authorizations.
- The Limited Entry Hunt season for moose starts October 1. Any change in regulations, or access restrictions for resident hunters would need to be effectively communicated and an enforcement strategy considered.
- Regional FLNR and MIRR staff are engaging First Nations in the Cariboo on wildfire recovery and
 rehabilitation. A meeting is being planned for October 17 at the Cariboo Fire Centre. Each community will
 be offered funding from the Strategic Forestry Envelope, to participate in discussions with FLNR on this date
 and onwards. Tsilhqot'in communities will be represented at these discussions.

2. Xeni Gwet'in: dynamics with tourism operators in Cariboo Chilcotin

- Xeni Gwet'in and the Cariboo Chilcotin tourism operators are in conflict over existing tourism operations
 that were under Provincial licence or lease and are located within the aboriginal title area, granted in June
 2014.
- Xeni Gwet'in are members of the Tsilhqot'in National Government (TNG). Marilyn Baptiste is now Acting Chief while Roger William is on administrative leave.
- The Xeni Gwet'in have sent letters to operators to stop activities immediately and the operators are looking to the Province of British Columbia and Canada for more certainty.

- Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC) have meetings scheduled to discuss land use, tourism activities, as well as other issues with the operators, Xeni Gwet'in and TNG on October 2nd, 3rd and 4th respectively. Representatives from the Province of British Columbia may also be in attendance depending on the scope of discussion.
- The Nenday Deni Accord, signed in 2016, commits to negotiate operating arrangements for tourism companies. The original two year bridging agreements for crown land and parks have expired and new agreements have not been signed. In addition, recommendations in the Aboriginal Tourism Association of Canada (ATAC) 'Xeni Gwet'in Mediation Project – Final Report' June 2017, have not yet been implemented.
- Numerous elected officials in the Cariboo Chilcotin area have requested Minister-level meetings to voice constituent concerns. IGRS requested a BN from MIRR in order to inform internal briefings and potential meetings (attached), with the Mediation Project Final Report as a an appendix (also attached).

Dear Chief Alphonse:

Thank you for your letter of August 11, 2017, requesting a big game hunting ban in the Chilcotin region for the 2017 hunting season. Minister Donaldson has asked that I reply on his behalf.

The Government of British Columbia takes the Tsilhqot'in National Government's concerns seriously. We recognize that hunting is an important activity for First Nations and licensed hunters alike and we share your interest in maintaining sustainable wildlife populations now and in the future.

Wildlife staff has undertaken an assessment of the wildfire impact on wildlife by management unit sub-zone. Our regional staff met with your Executive Director on August 24 to discuss this analysis. It will be some time before ministry biologists will be able to accurately assess impacts to wildlife populations and ecosystems.

While direct mortality is expected to be low, given the latest fire perimeter information and fact that these fires continue to burn uncontrolled there are specific wildlife management units where Cariboo region wildlife staff recognizes the potential for impacts to wildlife.

Factors taken into account were potential impacts to ungulate habitat and winter range, landscape alterations that may alter hunter success rates or effort and general population health.

As you are aware certain areas in the Chilcotin have seen considerable declines in moose density over the past 15 years. A high degree of management actions are already in place for the Cariboo moose hunt (bull moose only, a limited licensed harvest and a closure of the September moose hunt in a portion of the Chilcotin). While the added impact of extensive wildfire is not known, cumulative effects work indicates that previous disturbance has significantly reduced the availability of adequate cover for moose in portions of these MUs prior to the 2017 wildfires. The decline in moose density is particularly acute in MU 5-13A, which also experiences considerable First Nations' harvest pressure. Wildlife biologists predict a similar decline in moose density has occurred in MU 5-13C.

For moose, wildlife staff undertook a risk analysis to determine what actions would be appropriate to protect populations. Moose hunting was reviewed based on licensed hunter success rates in areas hardest hit by the fire (5-13A, 5-13C and 5-14), modeling harvest impact at varying degrees of increased hunter success.

Mule deer impacts were also assessed. Mule deer in the Cariboo region are abundant and managed on General Open Season. While mule deer will be impacted by loss of some winter range, closing the hunt in the Chilcotin is not expected to provide any measurable benefit to the population and will not reduce deer mortality over the fall and winter.

The Section 11 Wildfire Act area restrictions in place around the wildfires in the Cariboo region encompass a large portion of the management units that you requested be closed in your letter. This Wildfire Act restricts access for hunters to large portions of 5-3, 5-4, 5-12, 5-13 and 5-14.

This Wildfire Act area restriction applies to all people, and restricts both licensed and First Nations hunters from accessing all Crown land within these areas. This restriction goes beyond what wildlife biologists believe to be required for sustainable wildlife management and eliminates the need for specific hunting closures in wildfire impacted areas. This Wildfire Act area restriction and its implications for hunting in the area will be communicated to hunting stakeholders around the province.

Wildfire can have a mixed effect on wildlife. Beneficial effects include increased vegetation growth for forage. However, burned areas remove screening and thermal cover for ungulates, and fire suppression activities, such as fire guards, increase hunter access and harvest success rates.

Should the *Wildfire Act* area restrictions be lifted before the end of 2017 hunting season, the situation will be reassessed in consultation with the Cariboo Fire Centre and the Tsilhqot'in Nation to ensure appropriate regulations are in place to protect wildlife. Beyond the 2017 hunting season, the Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development (FLNRORD) is committed to work with the Tsilhqot'in Nation on understanding the specific impacts to wildlife from the 2017 wildfires and ensuring that hunting in the Cariboo region is managed sustainably.

FLNRORD and the Conservation Officer Service will be available to partner with the Tsilhqot'in to assist with the enforcement of any communal hunting closures Tsilhqot'in leadership may want to enact for your members.

ISSUE: Moose harvest management following wildfire disturbance in the Cariboo Region.

BACKGROUND:

- Management Unit (MU) 5-13 (west of Quesnel) was heavily disturbed during the unprecedented wildfire disturbances of 2017.
- MU 5-13 (sub-zones 5-13A and 5-13C) is moderate to high value moose habitat. Cumulative
 effects assessment indicates that disturbance from salvage logging and previous wildfire has
 significantly reduced the supply of suitable habitat for moose in MUs 5-13A and 5-13C.
- Active road density approaches the highest ratios (km/km²) in the province. Road density has direct positive correlation to increased vulnerability of moose to human-caused mortality, and decrease in effective use of habitat.
- Past moose population surveys indicate declines in moose density across the Chilcotin and south Omineca sub-regions by 50-70%.
- In MU 5-13A, 2016 surveys revealed significant decline in moose density. Wildlife biologists predict a similar decline in moose density has occurred in MU 5-13C (2016 survey was not completed). Overall, bull to cow ratios in the Cariboo are consistently above provincial minimum targets, with some sign of population recovery in the South Chilcotin. However, calf to cow ratios in several Chilcotin MUs is lower than required to maintain stable populations, and will require future monitoring. (see Attachment 1 for 2017 late winter/early spring survey results)
- Wildfires generally benefit wildlife in the long-term; however, short-term (decade) impacts
 can be acute (direct mortality caused by wildfire, insufficient winter forage and thermal cover)
 or indirect (ineffective use of habitat, increased vulnerability to natural predation and hunting
 pressure due to increased access and improved sight-ability).
- To mitigate the increased vulnerability of wildlife, a regulation has been established
 prohibiting use of motor vehicles for hunting within the Chilcotin Plateau and HancevilleRiske Creek fire perimeters from September 1 to December 10 annually. Wildlife staff is
 expecting a decrease in hunter success rates.
- Collaboration with First Nations has revealed that the Tsilhqot'in Nation and the Southern Dakelh Nation Alliance rely heavily on wildlife from MU 5-13. Strong representation has been made to the Province about closure of moose hunting to protect aboriginal rights, and to encourage recovery of moose densities.
- The Province places high priority on strengthening strategic relationships with the Nations.
 Benefits of a strong relationship include secure access to land and resources; a matter of high importance after pine beetle and fire disturbance impacts to natural resource assets in the

region. The Nations' representations indicate high tensions and serious implications for the Province's strategic interests.

- Residents are managed through a Limited Entry Hunt (LEH) for moose in MUs 5-13A and 5-13C. The season is split up in 2 week openings. A total of 243 LEH authorizations were granted and 110 moose were expected to be harvested based on estimates of success rate (see Attachment 2).
- Nine guiding territories occur within the wildfire area that support guided non-resident hunters. Two territories are completely within MUs 5-13A or 5-13C while the other territories include another management unit or sub-zone. The moose quota for the entire area of these nine guide territories is 51. These territories have already been subject to wildfire access restrictions (Wildfire Act Section 11). Guiding operations may have been severely limited even before a hunting closure is considered.
- Based on the Province's Allocation Policy, conservation is the first priority when managing
 populations. If a portion of the population is available for harvest, First Nations needs are
 accounted first, then resident and non-resident opportunity in that order. Hunts may be closed
 in reverse order.

DISCUSSION:

- The additional influence of 2017 wildfire disturbance on moose is not yet known. It is
 expected that the abundance and distribution of moose will have been altered and winter
 habitat supply reduced through loss of forest cover and forage. The benefits of wildfire
 disturbance for moose may not be realized for several years.
- It will be some time before ministry biologists can reasonably determine 2017 wildfire impacts to ecosystems and wildlife populations. Recovery assessment and determining management actions are currently underway or planned.
- The Conservation Officer Service advises that enforcement of the motor vehicle prohibition
 will be a challenge due to the density of roads and trails, the limited number of Conservation
 Officers, the difficulty in hunters knowing their location on the landscape, and sparse uptake
 on notice of the regulation.
- First Nations do not accept that motorized vehicle restrictions will address their concerns that
 the intensity and broad extent of wildlife disturbance has put the moose at increased risk, with
 population recovery substantively compromised. Provincial assurances about moose
 resiliency have not been accepted.
- First Nations have been steadfast and vocal in asking for closure of moose hunting across the Chilcotin sub-region. MUs 5-13A and 5-13C are areas where a hunting closure would be of highest relevance, and would align with First Nations interests.
- Closing these zones to licenced moose hunting would be a precautionary approach as it is not
 possible to quantify the effect this action would have on moose populations.

- A decision to close MUs 5-13A and 5-13C will not be in place until after October 15, 2017 (halfway through the season). As such, we would only expect a harvest reduction by resident hunters of 43 moose (39% of forecast harvest) with negligible population impacts given the licensed harvest is of bulls only.
- Timing a moose hunting closure will be problematic given that moose hunting opened
 October 1, 2017 in MU 5-13A, along with the second LEH season in MU 5-13C. Questions about compensation will arise from LEH holders and guide outfitters.
- Impact on non-resident harvest by a MUs 5-13A and 5-13C closure is difficult to determine. The sector may legally harvest their quota at any time during the moose season.
- Regional stakeholders (Cariboo Chilcotin Guide Outfitters Association and the local British Columbia Wildlife Federation) supported the access restrictions.
- The British Columbia Wildlife Federation, representing resident hunters across the province, have indicated support of a closure if based on conservation needs and applying to First Nations. The British Columbia Wildlife Federation reacted strongly against the access closures once they were in place.
- The Tsilhqot'in National Government (TNG) have not responded to the August 31, 2017 letter from Mike Pedersen, Cariboo Region Executive Director, where ministry and Conservation Officer Service offered to partner with the Tsilhqot'in to assist with the enforcement of any communal hunting closures Tsilhqot'in leadership may want to enact for their members.
- None of the proposed actions will meet the expectations of the TNG. The TNG would support the closure of MUs 5-13A and 5-13C, but would expect the other MUs they named (MUs 5-03, 5-04, 5-05, 5-12, 5-14) to also be closed.

Attachment 1 - 2017 late winter / early spring survey results

- In the Cariboo surveys were conducted in five management units, with mixed results.
- In Alexis Creek (MU 5-13A), moose densities were down 30% compared to the previous survey conducted in 2003, which was consistent with declines in neighbouring areas surveyed over the past two to five years. The bull to cow ratios were adequate at 39 bulls per 100 cows, but the calf to cow ratio was low, at only 14 calves per 100 cows.
- In Big Creek (MU 5-04) estimated moose density increased over 50% from when last surveyed in 2012, although 2012 survey conditions were considered poor and the percentage increase should be interpreted with caution. Estimated bull to cow ratio was 45 bulls per 100 cows and estimated calf to cow ratio was 30 calves per 100 cows, which were both considered adequate.
- Composition surveys conducted in MUs 5-12A, 5-13B and 5-13C (North Chilcotin) found bull/cow ratios ranging from 33 to 56 bulls per 100 cows and calf/cow ratios ranging from 21 to 30 calves per 100 cows.
- Overall, bull to cow ratios in the Cariboo are consistently above provincial minimum targets, with some sign of population recovery in the South Chilcotin.
- However, calf to cow ratios in several Chilcotin MUs is lower than required to maintain stable populations, and will require future monitoring.
- Surveys of the Nazko area of the North Chilcotin are planned for this coming winter to better understand status and trends in North Chilcotin moose populations

As requested. It was a busy day yesterday on this topic, and continues today. I can provide updated bullets after our meeting with TNG after 4pm.

Date of Drafting - September 28, 2017

Chilcotin Moose Harvest Post-Wildfire

^{*}Small correction was brought to my attention. Further updates after 4pm.

- On September 27, 2017 the remaining restrictions in place around wildfires in the Cariboo were rescinded. In
 anticipation of the Wildfire Act Section 11 Order being fully rescinded, FLNR prepared options for Minister
 Donaldson's consideration, about how to manage impacts to moose from hunting post wildfire. Options before the
 minister include a range from full hunting closure, limited area closures, and access management focused
 strategy. A decision is pending.
- Immediately after the Section 11 Order was lifted on September 27th, regional MIRR (Manager) and FLNR (FW Section Head) spoke to TNG representatives; in addition, ADM Rick Manwaring left a message for Chief Joe Alphonse. On September 28, 2017 (today) MIRR and FLNR staff will have a follow up meeting with TNG representatives. Tsilhqot'in leadership and staff are frustrated by the optics of a 'unilateral' decision being made by the minister; BC staff reinforced that the minister's office is aware of the Tsilhqot'in' views on the matter, as well as the Fish and Wildlife Panel's discussions. Given the prompt timing of the order being lifted, staff will now be working with the Tsilhqot'in on preparing to collaborate on implementation of the minister's decision.
- The Fish and Wildlife Panel discussed impacts on wildfire on moose and wildlife at the September 12th Panel meeting. The Tsilhqot'in expressed the need to protect wildlife, by closing or limiting the hunt, or by managing access particularly around burnt areas, particularly if the Wildfire Act Section 11 was removed. FLNR committed to discuss access management options through the coming weeks, in hope of having a plan in place before the Wildfire Act Section 11 was removed. Options in front of Minister Donaldson reflect concerns and ideas discussed at the Panel meeting.
- The Fish and Wildlife Panel produced a joint recommendation on Annual Allowable Harvest (AAH) for four species, including moose; we are currently in Year 1 of the five year allocation cycle. The Harvest Allocation Policy allows for annual evaluation of populations, and hunter success rates, to determine whether adjustments in hunting authorizations (LEH) are required to avoid exceeding the AAH. The Province will be working with the Tsilhqot'in to collect and review information about populations and habitat; if changes are required to maintain the AAH, the Policy provides the tool for adjusting the number of hunting authorizations.
- The Limited Entry Hunt season for moose starts October 1. Any change in regulations, or access restrictions for resident hunters would need to be effectively communicated and an enforcement strategy considered.
- Regional FLNR and MIRR staff are engaging First Nations in the Cariboo on wildfire recovery and rehabilitation. A
 meeting is being planned for October 17 at the Cariboo Fire Centre. Each community will be offered funding from
 the Strategic Forestry Envelope, to participate in discussions with FLNR on this date and onwards. Tsilhqot'in
 communities will be represented at these discussions.

CONTEXT DETAIL for MIRR STAFF (can be removed):

<u>August 23, 2017</u> the *Wildfire Act* Section 11 Order was updated from applying region-wide, to around fire perimeters.

August 31, 2017 Minister Response Letter under Michael Pedersen's signature (attached), highlights "wildfire can have a mixed effect on wildlife", and "should the Wildfire Act area restrictions be lifted before end of the 2017 hunting season, the situation will be reassessed in consultation with the Cariboo Fire Centre and the Tsilhqot'in Nation to ensure appropriate regulations are in place to protect wildlife". September 12, 2017 – FW Panel meeting, as Section 11 Order (fire perimeter) was still in place; discussed need to have a plan in place, and what access management might look like. September 27, 2017 – Full Section 11 order in the Cariboo was lifted. BC contacted TNG at two levels – regional, and ADM-Chief Joe.

<u>September 28, 2017 (2</u>-4pm) – TNG (Shawn Wiebe and Luke Doxtator) will meet MIRR (Devon) and FLNR (Dave Reedman, Mike Pedersen, Kai Peetoom, Ken Vanderburgh –additionally, a Branch

representative may be calling in). Details will be sorted today, as this was a decision of late yesterday. FW Director will be providing updated messages today.

Thanks Alexandra. A couple of observations:

• Under the Accord, there is a distinct moose management arrangement between BC and the TNG (sub sections 12.33 to 12.41). There are a number of actions identified in those sub-sections that someone needs to review and report out on in terms of whether both parties have met the obligations and, if they haven't been met, reasons why not. I think this will help reframe the rhetoric and link this issue back to agreements under the Accord (which is rarely raised in TNG correspondence that I've seen over the past several months).

The Fish and Wildlife Panel plays very heavily into this – which they sit on – including the development of a moose management plan. In the February 2016 Letter of Intent (attached) we provided them with \$200K (under the Strategic Forestry Envelope I believe) to support their participation in the joint development of this plan. I have no idea if that was completed.

Area restrictions around most Cariboo fires rescinded

Effective at noon on Wednesday, Sept. 27, 2017, area restrictions that are currently in place around many wildfires in the Cariboo will be rescinded, due to a return to seasonal weather conditions and reduced fire activity.

The only area restriction order affecting land within the Cariboo Fire Centre that will remain in place is the one around the Elephant Hill wildfire. For more information about this area restriction, please visit: http://ow.ly/7OJV30ft3qX

The BC Wildfire Service reminds members of the public that wildfires are active worksites with ongoing fire suppression efforts and rehabilitation planning underway. Hunters and recreationalists are urged to use extreme caution in areas where fires are still burning. Even if an area restriction has been rescinded around a fire, officials engaged in fire control (including firefighters) have the authority under the *Wildfire Act* and its regulations to order anyone to leave the area.

Before entering areas that have been affected by wildfire, members of the public should be aware that there may be significant safety hazards present. Trees that have been damaged by fire might be unstable and could fall down at any time. Ash pits can be hard to detect and can remain hot long after the flames have died down.

People can expect to still see smoldering ground fires and smoke within the perimeters of wildfires over the coming weeks. This is common with large wildfires and it may continue for some time. If you see smoke coming from well within a fire's perimeter and the area is surrounded by black, burned material, this is typically not a concern. However, smoke rising from green, unburned fuel or from outside a fire's perimeter should be reported immediately.
