### **Event: Community visit to Malahat Nation**

- Community visit by Minister Fraser to Malahat Nation, with no media invited.
- The visit is to celebrate the Provincial purchase of land in Malahat Lands (formerly Bamberton), as well as Malahat's purchase of the majority of Malahat Lands lands, as backed by the First Nations Finance Authority.
- The Province has purchased approximately 230 hectares of private land for \$9 million. The
  parcels are intended to become part of Malahat Nation's treaty lands when a treaty is
  concluded and comes into effect.
- The purchase has helped Malahat Nation complete its purchase of a number of properties in Bamberton, a former cement quarry and forestry lands on the Saanich Inlet, located about 40 kilometres north of Victoria.
- There is no gift exchange for the visit; however, Malahat Nation will present Minister Fraser a plaque to signify the Nation's appreciation of the ministry's extraordinary efforts to purchase the land in order to help Malahat meet its financial obligations. No gift is expected or should be presented in return Malahat views the provincial land purchase as the gift.
- Malahat Nation now owns a majority of the site, which is providing economic benefits to members of the First Nation through rents earned from businesses on the site.
- A news release will be issued in conjunction with the community visit in regard to the Provincial land purchase of land in support of advancing treaty negotiations with the Malahat Nation.
- The news release will also note that Malahat Nation has renamed "Bamberton" as "Malahat

Lands."

Last year I made a statement in the House about the rapid decline of BC Steelhead and the leadership role governments should play. I'm writing to you today because this issues continues to be of great concern to myself and people across BC.

BC Steelhead salmon has been described as "hurtling towards extinction" because of disappearing and damaged habitats, coupled with polluted oceans. If there was ever a time to take a leading role in conservation efforts it is now.

Our government has made commitments to renewing a Wildlife Management Strategy as well as rebuilding relationships with the DFO to address this issue. As spawning numbers continue to drop, saving our steelhead must remain a priority and many groups are ready to support you in taking additional steps to help conserve this species.

For example, the Seymour Salmonid Society in North Vancouver has been overseeing the Seymour Hatchery for three decades. With the help of hundreds of volunteers they have been working to enhance salmon populations and encourage sustainable management of fisheries in the Seymour River. This dedicated group of people are eager to work with the provincial government on initiatives to save declining Steelhead populations.

In addition, salmon habitat and population recovery programs are important not only to the fish species but also as a part of our work towards reconciliation with First Nations. A constituent of mine, Barry Cordocedo of the Squamish Nation, suggests that federal community economic development programs aimed at protecting and rehabilitating fish populations can also be used by First Nations to bring jobs to families, develop skills and capacity within their people, and empower young Indigenous peoples to take control of their lives, connect with their land, and bring economic prosperity to their communities. I am writing to support your consideration of the kinds of initiatives that people like Mr. Cordocedo are suggesting. Protecting our BC Steelhead is a far reaching issue that combines environmental justice with that of justice for BC's First Peoples.

Thank you for your work on this important issue.

Thank you for your email of December 4, 2017, which was also addressed to the Honourable John Horgan, Premier, and the Honourable Lana Popham, Minister of Agriculture, regarding effluent discharges from fish processing plants on Vancouver Island fish farm tenure renewals. As Minister of Environment and Climate Change Strategy, I am taking the lead to respond to issues you have raised that fall under my ministry's purview and I apologize for my delay in doing so.

First, I would like to assure you that I share your concerns and I take any potential risks to the environment, including potential risks to wild salmon, very seriously. For this reason, I instructed staff to inspect the two fish processing facilities where underwater observations were made in late 2017. I was troubled that, under the previous government, these facilities had not been inspected in many years. Effluent samples collected by ministry staff in December returned positive for Piscine Orthoreovirus, which was consistent with your own sampling. Our data has been shared with you at your request.

On December 20th of last year, I announced that my ministry will immediately begin a review of the fish processing sector, which will include audits of 28 facilities. This review will inform the development of a comprehensive set of measures to ensure waste materials produced from these operations do not threaten our wild salmon stocks and that provincial regulations and permits governing waste discharge from fish processing are informed by the best available science and practices.

We will continue conducting compliance inspections of fish processing facilities in the province to ensure that environmental requirements are met and harmful substances are not entering our marine environment.

With regard to accepting applications to renew all fish farm tenures in the Broughton Archipelago, our government recently met with Chief Robert (Owa'di) Chamberlin and leaders from four Nations to discuss the issue. The basis for the meeting was to jointly honour the implementation of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and to confirm a commitment to a consent-based government-to-government process. It is important to note that licences for operation of aquaculture facilities off the coast of British Columbia are within the jurisdiction of the federal government. Subject: Tenure renewal / Bloodwater

Dear Premier John Horgan, and Ministers George Heyman and Lana Popham:

I am writing in regards to two matters:

- 1. you have accepted applications to renew all fish farm tenures in Musgamagw and Namgis territories
- 2. you have not followed up on public statements that you are reviewing bloodwater samples

As you are aware, Musgamagw and Namgis members have occupied salmon farms and the surrounding areas for over 100 days with the clear message that salmon farms must be removed from their territories. They have been saying this for 30 years and have not signed any agreements with the industry. They have no food fish and the science increasingly supports their position that salmon farms are a large factor in destruction of their fisheries.

**Premier Horgan,** you stated in the Big House in Alert Bay that the industry should not restock farms where the tenure is going to expire *before* the fish can be harvested. Minister Popham, you sent Marine Harvest a letter advising them they are not guaranteed to have tenures in the Broughton Archipelago renewed.

And yet on October 16, 2017 your government accepted applications for all the salmon farms in these territories.

Attached is a screen shot in regards to Swanson Island. I would like you to explain why your website states "Status Reason - Accepted" and gives an "Effective Date." This is particularily concerning because you have refused to set a follow-up meeting with the Nations as promised in the Big House. Marine Harvest is restocking Midsummer Island, appears to be preparing to restock Swanson and Upper Retreat and has restocked Port Elizabeth, while Cermaq is actively restocking Sir Edmund - despite your warnings to the industry.

You do not appear to have any control over this industry which is violating First Nation rights.

**Minister Heyman,** you have appeared in the media several times stating that your ministry is examining the samples of bloodwater taken from the farm salmon processing plant effluent pipes near Campbell River and in Tofino. As I submitted those samples to the lab, they are my samples and yet neither Tavish Campbell, myself or the lab has been contacted by your ministry. You are *not* actually reviewing these samples.

We well know that this is an aggressive Norwegian industry, what we don't know is whether your government is capable of controlling them or whether you are honestly committed to reconciliation and protection of wild salmon. These developments certainly concern us.

This issue is not going to die down quietly. In just the past 21 hours, over 1.5 million people have viewed bloodwater pouring into the waters of BC on the National Geographic Instagram site. There are over 3,000 comments wondering how BC could be so reckless to allow this. The wilderness tourism industry is twice as big as salmon farming and yet you show no willingness to support it.

How did piscine reovirus get into the bloodwater pipe? You have the lab implicated in this under review and we have the internal communications from this lab suggesting they have known since 2008 that piscine reovirus is causing disease in BC, while publishing science which flatly states the opposite. The Minister of Fisheries has relied on this information to exempt this virus from testing prior to farm salmon transfer into marine pens. As a result, tens of millions of infected fish have poured into the Broughton Archipelago as recently as on October 16 - the day you accepted Marine Harvest's application to renew the licence at Port Elizabeth.

The Heiltsuk, Haida and other nations traveled south to support the Musgamagw / Namgis fight to remove salmon farms and to announce that the Heiltsuk have cancelled their agreement with Marine Harvest.

Wild salmon stocks are are in far too critical critical condition for us to let up for a moment.

We are here for you and we will support you, but you have to deny Marine Harvest, Cermaq and Grieg renewal of any farm salmon tenures in the Broughton Archipelago or you make it clear to the 100,000 people who recently marched in the streets of Vancouver demanding reconciliation with First Nations - that you are not the government who can deliver.


One culture cannot reconcile with another culture while destroying their most important food resource and disrespecting their territory. You are the landlords of the salmon farming industry, this is your decision.
