RECOMMENDED RESPONSE:

- For too long, support for Indigenous language revitalization has been neglected.
- We're supporting the important work of the First Peoples' Cultural Council so that Indigenous communities can reclaim connections to their language and culture.
- All Indigenous languages in B.C. are severely endangered.
- There was a concerted effort by the state to extinguish Indigenous language and culture through the residential school system.
- Many of the challenges communities face are systemic and are founded on our colonial past. By investing in Indigenous languages and culture, we start to address those systemic social challenges at community level, connecting people to their communities, land and cultures.
- It is critical to their identity and the key to reconciliation.

Secondary responses:

- The First Peoples' Cultural Council is an internationally recognized Indigenousled B.C. Crown agency heading up this important and urgent work.

- This new funding is additional to other funding and Indigenous language initiatives supported by the Province. The First Peoples' Cultural Council will co-ordinate their work through partnerships with Indigenous communities and organizations, and other provincial ministries and agencies.
- This will ensure that the council's work will complement and build from current work underway on Indigenous language revitalization.
- Ministry of Education is working closely with First Nations Education Steering Committee to develop an Indigenous Language Learning policy for the K-12 system.
- There are 17 First Nations languages that have developed approved curriculum to be taught in B.C. schools. And there are six more in development.
- Last year, the ministry provided an extra \$190,000 to support resource development for Indigenous language curricula of the 17 languages.
- The Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills training is currently working with academic and Indigenous partners to develop and Indigenous Language Fluency Degree.
- Public post-secondary schools in B.C. offer a range of Indigenous language courses and programs, all the way up to Masters level, and the ministry also supports language programs through the Aboriginal Community-Based Training Partnerships Program.

KEY FACTS:

- The Feb. 20, 2018 provincial budget announced \$50M for the First Peoples' Cultural Council of one-time year-end funding to support language preservation and revitalization. The funding from 2017/18 is being provided through three-year funding to address the current crisis of languages that may disappear forever.
- B.C. and the First Peoples' Cultural Council are also seeking federal support for this effort.

- MLA Mike Morris has <u>publicly criticized the funding</u>, saying that it would be better spent providing additional policing to deal with crime in First Nations communities.
- In 2017/18, the Province is contributing \$1.75 million in annual operating funding to the First Peoples Cultural Council.

BACKGROUND:

- The 2017/18 2019/20 First Peoples' Cultural Council (FPCC) Service Plan noted the organization faces challenges with existing resources, primarily meeting the language and cultural revitalization needs of all 203 First Nations and 34 languages.
- FPCC receives funding from the Province of British Columbia, the Government of Canada, the New Relationship Trust, the BC Arts Council and various non-governmental agencies.
- FPCC has asked for greater funding from the Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation (MIRR). The minister's mandate letter priorities include supporting Indigenous communities seeking to revitalize connections with their languages.
- Part of the council's funding comes from the First Citizens Fund. In recent years, earned revenue from the fund had declined. Despite the decline, MIRR maintained funding levels of \$1,051,000 per year in 2015/16 and 2016/17. (\$600,000 of this comes from the First Citizens Fund).
- Canada, through the Department of Canadian Heritage has increased funding to Indigenous languages nationally through the Aboriginal Language Initiative. Canadian Heritage has contributed \$2.6M to FPCC in fiscal 2017/18 (an increase from \$800,000 in previous years). This level of funding should sustain until 2020 when the national Indigenous legislation process has completed and resulted in clarity in how Canada will fund Indigenous languages.

B.C. investment in Indigenous language revitalization puts reconciliation into action

VICTORIA - First Peoples' Cultural Council will work in partnership with First Nations communities to develop and implement revitalization plans for each of the living Indigenous languages in B.C., to reverse the disruption to Indigenous languages from Canada's history of colonization and residential schools.

"Language is critical for connecting Indigenous peoples to their culture, spirituality, identity and land," said Scott Fraser, Minister of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation. "For too long, Indigenous language has been under threat. The time has come for us to support First Nations in exercising their human right to speak and pass on their language and culture."

In Budget 2018, B.C. allocated a \$50-million grant to the First Peoples' Cultural Council (FPCC) to help revitalize Indigenous languages in British Columbia, and address the current language crisis. Fewer than 6,000 people speak one of the 34 Indigenous languages in B.C.

"We are taking action now to support Indigenous communities' work to preserve and revitalize endangered languages - languages that are cornerstones of cultural and social identities across our province," said Carole James, Minister of Finance. "By investing in Indigenous languages, we invest in the future of Indigenous communities. I am proud our government is making this historic commitment."

As a result of the funding, the First Peoples' Cultural Council will expand community immersion programs that support the development of fluent speakers of Indigenous languages. These include the Mentor-Apprentice program, which pairs fluent speakers with apprentices for one-on-one immersion training, and the Pre-school Language Nest program, which supports the creation of language and culture immersion environments for children and their parents. The pilot Silent Speakers program will become permanent. Silent Speakers helps those who understand, but do not speak their language, overcome challenges with using it in their communities.

"We sincerely thank the B.C. government for its strong leadership and new investment in the revitalization of Indigenous languages across B.C., and for recognizing the importance of Indigenous languages to the well-being of Indigenous peoples," said Cynthia Callison, FPCC board chair. "This funding is essential to restore and continue the unique diversity of Indigenous languages in B.C. It is a concrete example of implementing the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's calls to action toward reconciliation."

The language revitalization plans will be developed with Indigenous communities and tailored to their individual needs. The First Peoples' Cultural Council will also provide funding to increase the number of words and phrases uploaded to the FirstVoices online oral dictionary, and expand the online resources available for language learners and speakers.

"Urgent action is needed as many Indigenous languages are in danger of becoming extinct," said Melanie Mark, Minister of Advanced Education, Skills and Training. "One of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's key priorities is revitalizing language. That's what this work is about not just giving lip service to reconciliation, but taking action."

FPCC will work in collaboration with communities and partners to support additional priority actions to revitalize languages. These include creating new speakers and developing new language resources that will support communities to build skills and capacity for language mobilization.

"The First Nations communities we have been working with are seeing clear and measurable results, creating fluent language speakers as new knowledge keepers and documenting languages for future generations," said Tracey Herbert, CEO of the FPCC. "This new funding will help us to build on our strong track record of success, and expand our work to all Indigenous communities in B.C., to help their mother-tongue languages flourish again."

BACKGROUNDER

First Peoples' Cultural Council

The First Peoples' Cultural Council is a unique organization in Canada. As a First Nations-run Crown corporation with a mandate to support the revitalization of Indigenous languages, arts, culture and heritage in British Columbia, First Peoples' Cultural Council provides funding and resources to communities, monitors the status of Indigenous languages and develops policy recommendations for First Nations and government.

New funding

The B.C. government has committed a significant investment of \$50 million to support Indigenous language. This funding is the result of many years of advocacy, educating policy makers, and developing investment models by First Peoples' Cultural Council and community partners.

Why Indigenous language revitalization matters

Restoring connections to Indigenous language and culture builds resilience and supports healthy individuals and communities. The Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada: Calls to Action report outlines the need to protect and invest in the restoration of Indigenous languages as a

concrete step toward reconciliation. Knowing and being able to speak one's language is recognized as a human right for Indigenous peoples. The United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples identifies that Indigenous peoples have the right to revitalize, use, develop and transmit to future generations their histories, languages, oral traditions, philosophies, writing systems and literatures, and to designate and retain their own names for communities, places and persons. First Peoples' Cultural Council has been working with the Assembly of First Nations and the federal government to advance the recognition and protection of Indigenous language rights in federal law.

How the funding will be used

The new funding will be used for language preservation and revitalization activities, including community grants, community language planning, and documentation and training aimed at rebuilding community-based language supports. The funding will also be used to expand language immersion programs and learning resources to support Indigenous languages in communities throughout the province.

The First Peoples' Cultural Council has served First Nations in B.C. for 28 years. The First Peoples' Cultural Council has mapped and documented Indigenous languages in B.C.; built tools and programs in community and online that support language learning; created partnerships with communities throughout the province; and worked with leaders in Indigenous languages around the globe to share their pioneering and proven approaches to language reclamation, documentation and revitalization.

Their efforts have been recognized as establishing British Columbia and Canada as leaders in Indigenous language revitalization. Limited resources have meant that the First Peoples' Cultural Council were able to touch only a handful (10% or less) of the Indigenous languages in the province. With this new provincial funding, it will work with the Indigenous language groups and communities that belong to the same cultural groups and speak the same language throughout the province. The program will be flexible in order to respond to the needs of the community. First Peoples' Cultural Council works collaboratively with communities, supporting leading language work led by Elders and other knowledge keepers of the land.

Language programs supported in communities include:

- * The Mentor-Apprentice program pairs a fluent language speaker (mentor) with a language learner (apprentice) to transfer language knowledge and increase fluency.
- * FirstVoices is the internationally recognized online Indigenous language archiving and teaching resource that allows Indigenous communities to document their language for future generations. FirstVoices provides state-of-the-art technologies, training and technical support to community language champions. Teams of fluent Elders and technically savvy youth upload dictionaries, alphabets, songs, stories, words and phrases, as well as audio and video to their community archives. FirstVoices keyboards includes apps for Apple and Android mobile devices, and more.

- * The Silent Speaker program is for people who understand, but do not speak, their First Nations language. The course is based on a successful program that was developed in Norway and Sweden for, and by, Indigenous Sami people. The model uses cognitive behaviour therapy (CBT) to support silent speakers in overcoming barriers to using their Indigenous language in their communities.
- * The Pre-School Language Nest program creates language and cultural immersion environments for pre-school children and their parents. In addition to creating an immersion environment with staff, volunteers and Elders, Language Nests allow young parents to learn the language and bring it back into their homes and daily lives, which is necessary for revitalizing a language.
- * First Peoples' Cultural Council partners with Google.org on the Endangered Languages project, whose governance First Peoples' Cultural Council chairs.

Indigenous Languages Support

RECOMMENDED RESPONSE:

- First Nations languages, culture, arts and heritage are integral to the health of all members of First Nations communities.
- B.C. is home to 60% of First Nations languages in Canada, with 34 languages and over 61 dialects.
- One of my key mandate priorities is to support Indigenous communities seeking to revitalize connections with their languages.
- B.C. is the only province in Canada with a Crown corporation that leads the revitalization of First Nations languages, culture, arts and heritage.

FIRST PEOPLES' CULTURAL COUNCIL PROJECTS WITH ROYAL BC MUSEUM:

- The First Peoples' Cultural Council has a strong partnership with the Royal BC Museum (RBCM) and in 2016 signed a memorandum of understanding to work together on language and culture-related projects.
- This includes working collaboratively with First Nations communities in B.C. on the repatriation of ancestral remains and cultural belongings.
- Since 2014, the ground-breaking "Our Living Languages" exhibition has used interactive technologies, original artwork, video, audio and live engagement to showcase the history and diversity of First Nations languages in B.C.
- FPCC is represented on RBCM's newly formed First Nations Advisory Council
 which will give advice on matters of cultural protocols, policies, exhibitions,
 program and the curation of collections related to First Nations in B.C.

FEDERAL INDIGENOUS LANGUAGES ACT:

- In 2016, the federal government announced that they would be co-developing an Indigenous languages Act with Indigenous peoples to preserve, protect and revitalize Indigenous languages.
- The First Peoples' Cultural Council held five regional engagement and information sessions in 2017 to inform people of the proposed legislation and provide the opportunity to provide input to the federal government.
- We look forward to hearing more about federal plans for an Indigenous

Confidential Issues Note - ADVICE TO MINISTER Languages Act and how it can enhance ongoing work in B.C.

KEY FACTS:

- In 2014, the First Peoples Cultural Council (FPCC) released its "Report on the Status of B.C. First Nations Language," providing statistics on 185 out of 203 First Nations communities.
- The report states the number of fluent speakers declined since 2010 to slightly more than 4% (down from 5%). At the same time, language revitalization efforts are paying off with the next generation as the number of semi-fluent speakers is increasing to slightly more than 9% (up from 8%).
- The FPCC is due to update this report in 2018. Support for language, culture, arts and heritage are
 integral parts of the Truth and Reconciliation 94 Calls to Action as language loss is a direct result of
 the residential school system, as well as part of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of
 Indigenous peoples (UNDRIP).
- The FPCC is a provincial Crown corporation established to assist B.C. First Nations with revitalizing and protecting their languages, arts, cultures and heritage.
- FPCC offers grants for language and arts programs. In 2016/17, the council provided \$978,000 to 75 Indigenous artists and arts projects. A call for language grants closed on June 16, 2017.
- While provincial funding has remained stable, FPCC funding has increased from other sources, including the federal government as a result of a provincial effort to secure increased federal support for languages.

FIRSTVOICES UPGRADE:

- In 2014/15, MIRR provided \$300,000 for the council to upgrade FirstVoices.
- Upgrades to the database and front end have taken place and an additional \$300,000 of in-kind development services was provided through the Ministry of Advanced Education. The council also received funding for the upgrade from the New Relationship Trust (\$250,000), First Peoples' Cultural Foundation (\$100,000) and the federal government (\$1M 2017/18 funding).
- FirstVoices will be relaunched on Jan. 29, 2018 at an event at the FPCC offices in Brentwood Bay.
- FirstVoices is the council's internationally recognized online Indigenous language archiving and teaching resource that allows Indigenous communities to document their language for future generations. Teams of fluent Elders and youth upload dictionaries, alphabets, songs, stories, words and phrases, and audio and video to their community archives.
- Other components of FirstVoices include a keyboard app for mobile devices, language lab, and language tutor. Twelve interactive dictionaries have been developed for ipad and iPhone with more in development.

FEDERAL INDIGENOUS LANGUAGES ACT:

- In December 2016, the Prime Minister announced a commitment to implement an Indigenous Languages Act.
- The <u>2017 federal budget</u> allocated \$69 million over 3 years to substantially enhance the Aboriginal Language Initiative. This is part of an overall \$89.9 million federal investment over the next three years to support Indigenous languages and cultures.
- The FPCC held a series of regional sessions in May and June 2017 to discuss the proposed Indigenous language legislation and compiled a <u>report</u> based on the information. Sessions took place May 17 in Kelowna, May 25 in Prince George, May 31 in Richmond, June 2 in Nanaimo, and June 12 in Terrace.
- A presentation by Chief Dr. Ron Ignace at the Union of BC Indian Chiefs Annual General Assembly in September 2017 suggested that the federal government is targeting June 2018 to introduce the proposed legislation to the House of Commons, however given the scale of work (a co-development working group starts work in Jan 2018) this seems unlikely.

B.C. investment in Indigenous language revitalization puts reconciliation into action

VICTORIA – First Peoples' Cultural Council will work with Indigenous communities to develop and implement language revitalization plans for all 34 Indigenous languages in B.C., to reverse the disruption to Indigenous languages from Canada's history of colonization and residential schools.

"Language is critical for connecting Indigenous people to their culture, spirituality, identity and land," said Scott Fraser, Minister of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation. "For too long, Indigenous language was under state-sponsored attack. The time has come for us to support First Nations in exercising their human right to speak and pass on their language and culture." [draft]

In Budget 2018, B.C. allocated a \$50-million grant to the First Peoples' Cultural Council (FPCC) to help revitalize Indigenous languages in British Columbia and address the current language crisis. Fewer than 6,000 people speak one of the 34 Indigenous languages in B.C.

"We are taking action now to support Indigenous communities' work to preserve and revitalize endangered languages – languages that are cornerstones of cultural and social identities across our province," said Finance Minister Carole James. "By investing in Indigenous languages, we invest in the future of Indigenous communities. I am proud our government is making this historic commitment.

As a result of the funding, the First Peoples' Cultural Council will expand community immersion programs that support the development of fluent speakers of Indigenous languages. These include the Mentor-Apprentice program, which pairs fluent speakers with apprentices for one-on-one immersion training, and the Pre-school Language Nest program which supports the creation of language and culture immersion environments for children and their parents. The pilot Silent Speakers program will become permanent, helping those who understand but do not speak their language overcome challenges with using it in their communities.

"We thank the B.C. government for its strong leadership and investment in the preservation and revitalization of Indigenous languages across B.C., and for recognizing the importance of Indigenous languages to the well-being of our first peoples," said FPCC board chair, Cynthia Callison. "This funding is essential to protecting our shared cultural heritage and B.C.'s unique diversity of Indigenous languages and is a concrete example of reconciliation."

The language revitalization plans will be developed with Indigenous communities and tailored to their individual needs. The First Peoples' Cultural Council will also provide funding to

increase the number of words and phrases uploaded to the FirstVoices online oral dictionary, and expand the online resources available for language learners and speakers.

"Urgent action is needed as many Indigenous languages are in danger of becoming extinct," said Melanie Mark, Minister of Advanced Education, Skills and Training. "One of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's key priorities is revitalizing language. That's what this work is about; not just giving lip service to reconciliation but taking action."

FPCC will work in collaboration with communities and partners to support additional priority actions to revitalize languages, including initiatives to create new speakers and new language resources that will support communities to build skills and capacity for language mobilization.

"The First Nations communities we have been working with are seeing clear and measurable results, creating fluent language speakers as new knowledge keepers and documenting languages for future generations," said Tracey Herbert, CEO of the FPCC. "This new funding will help us to build on our strong track record of success and expand our work to all Indigenous communities in B.C to help their mother tongue languages to flourish again."

BACKGROUNDER

First Peoples' Cultural Council

The First Peoples' Cultural Council is a unique organization in Canada. As a First Nations-run Crown Corporation with a mandate to support the revitalization of Indigenous languages, arts, culture and heritage in British Columbia, First Peoples' Cultural Council provides funding and resources to communities, monitors the status of Indigenous languages and develops policy recommendations for First Nations and government.

New funding

The B.C. Government has committed a significant investment of \$50 million to support Indigenous language. This funding is the result of many years of advocacy, educating of policy makers, and the development of investment models by First Peoples' Cultural Council and their community partners.

Why Indigenous language revitalization matters

Restoring connections to Indigenous language and culture builds resilience and supports healthy individuals and communities. The Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada: Calls to Action Report outlines the need to protect and invest in the restoration of Indigenous languages as a concrete step towards reconciliation. Knowing and being able to speak one's language is recognized as a human right for Indigenous peoples. The United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples identifies that Indigenous peoples have the right to revitalize, use, develop and transmit to future generations their histories, languages, oral traditions, philosophies, writing systems and literatures, and to designate and retain their own names for communities, places and persons. First Peoples' Cultural Council has been working with the Assembly of First Nations and the federal government to advance the recognition to protection of Indigenous language rights in federal law.

How the funding will be used

The new funding will be used for language preservation and revitalization activities, including community grants, community language planning, and documentation and training, aimed at rebuilding community-based language supports, as well as to expand language immersion programs and learning resources to support Indigenous languages in communities throughout the province.

The First Peoples' Cultural Council has served First Nations in B.C. for 28 years. The First Peoples' Cultural Council has mapped and documented Indigenous languages in B.C.; built tools and programs in community and on-line that support language learning; created partnerships with communities across the province; and worked with leaders in Indigenous languages around the globe to share their pioneering and proven approaches to language reclamation, documentation and revitalization.

Their efforts have been recognized as establishing British Columbia and Canada as leaders in Indigenous language revitalization. Limited resources have meant that they were able to touch only a handful (10% or less) of the Indigenous languages in the province. With this new provincial funding, they will work with the Indigenous language groups and communities that belong to the same cultural groups and speak the same language throughout the province. The program will be flexible in order to respond to the needs of the community. First Peoples' Cultural Council works collaboratively with communities, supporting leading language work led by Elders and other knowledge keepers of the land.

Language programs supported in communities include:

- The Mentor-Apprentice program pairs a fluent language speaker (mentor) with a language learner (apprentice) to transfer language knowledge and increase fluency.
- FirstVoices is the internationally recognized online Indigenous language archiving and teaching resource that allows Indigenous communities to document their language for future generations. FirstVoices provides state-of-the-art technologies, training and technical support to community language champions. Teams of fluent Elders and technically savvy youth upload dictionaries, alphabets, songs, stories, words and phrases as well as audio and video to their community archives. FirstVoices Keyboards includes apps for Apple and android mobile devices, and more.
- The Silent Speaker program is for people who understand but do not speak their First Nations language. The course is based on a successful program that was developed in Norway and Sweden for and by Indigenous Sami people. The model uses Cognitive Behaviour Therapy (CBT) to support silent speakers to overcome barriers to using their Indigenous language in their communities.
- The Pre-School Language Nest program creates language and cultural immersion environments for pre-school children and their parents. In addition to creating an immersion environment with staff, volunteers and elders, Language Nests allow young parents to learn the language and bring it back into their homes and daily lives, which is necessary for revitalizing a language.
- First People's Cultural Council partners with Google.org on the Endangered Languages project, whose governance First People's Cultural Council chairs.

First Peoples' Cultural Council Funding event March 16, 2018

Why is B.C. giving the First Peoples' Cultural Council this funding?

- Indigenous languages are in a state of emergency less than 6,000 people speak one of the 34 Indigenous languages in British Columbia.
- We're working with the First Peoples' Cultural Council on a plan to make significant strides to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.
- Language is a right under the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.
- The teaching of language strengthens the cultural and social health of a community, and connects children to their heritage, community values and the lands they come from.

2. Is \$50M for languages annual, ongoing funding?

- The \$50 million to support the revitalization of Indigenous languages is three-year funding to address the current crisis of languages that may disappear forever.

3. How much funding did Province provide the FPCC this year?

- In 2017/18, the Province is contributing \$1.75 million in annual operating funding to the First Peoples Cultural Council.
- The Province will continue to provide First Peoples' Cultural Council annual operating funding over and above \$50 million announced in budget 2018.

4. This is a significant budget increase the FPCC. Does the FPCC have the capacity to manage this budget increase?

- The First Peoples' Cultural Council has been working with Indigenous language experts throughout Canada and internationally for over 25 years, and is well-placed to undertake this work.
- First Peoples will work with a range of partners to develop a robust plan on revitalizing Indigenous languages across B.C.

5. Are organizations other than the FPCC receiving funding for language revitalization?

• The Province is providing \$50 million to the First Peoples' Cultural Council, and is working with the First Peoples on a plan to manage and allocate that funding in ways to make significant strides to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.

- The First Peoples' Cultural Council will be seeking to co-ordinate this work through
 partnerships with Indigenous communities and organizations, and other provincial
 ministries and agencies such as Advanced Education and Skills Training and Education –
 on the strategy to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.
- FPCC will work with a range of partners to develop a robust plan on revitalizing Indigenous languages across B.C.

6. How will Indigenous language support from the FPCC intersect with work underway with other BC government ministries?

- The First Peoples' Cultural Council will co-ordinate their work through partnerships with Indigenous communities and organizations, and other provincial ministries and agencies – such as Advanced Education and Skills Training and Education – on the strategy to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.
- This will ensure that the council's work will complement and build from current work underway on Indigenous language revitalization.

7. Will any of this new funding go directly to First Nations who are working on revitalizing their languages?

- Many individual First Nations have taken a lead role in teaching and preserving their respective languages, and we will continue to support those First Nations.
- First Peoples' Cultural Council's existing programming supports First Nations communities implementing language revitalization programs, as well as programs that create fluent speakers of First Nations languages in communities across B.C.
- FPCC will work with a range of partners to develop a robust plan and to manage and allocate the \$50 million in funding in ways to make significant strides to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.

8. What other Indigenous language revitalization work does government support?

- Ministry of Education is working closely with First Nations Education Steering Committee to develop an Indigenous Language Learning policy for the K-12 system.
- There are 17 First Nations languages that have developed approved curriculum to be taught in B.C. schools. And there are six more in development.
- Last year, the ministry provided an extra \$190,000 to support resource development for Indigenous language curricula of the 17 languages.
- The Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills training is currently working with academic and Indigenous partners to develop and Indigenous Language Fluency Degree.
- Public post-secondary schools in B.C. offer a range of Indigenous language courses and programs, all the way up to Masters level, and the ministry also supports language programs through the Aboriginal Community-Based Training Partnerships Program.

- 9. How do you answer people who say that the funding could be better used to address the many social challenges facing Indigenous communities such as increasing the level of policing?
- It's not an either/or situation. It's not language support or policing.
- Community safety in Indigenous communities is an important issue. Many of the challenges communities face are systemic and are founded on our colonial past. By investing in Indigenous languages and culture, we start to address those systemic social challenges at community level.
- Having a higher police presence is reactive and doesn't address root problems. By
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 these key social issues.

10. What are the priorities for the funding?

- The First Peoples' Cultural Council will be seeking to co-ordinate their work through
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- FPCC will work with a range of partners to develop a robust plan on revitalizing Indigenous languages across B.C.
- The funding will be targeted in a number of priority areas:
 - Programs and projects that will turn new speakers into fluent speakers;
 - Projects for documentation of languages;
 - Language planning across communities; and.
 - Develop high quality resources, tools and training to support language programs.

"We are taking action now to support Indigenous communities' work to preserve and revitalize endangered languages - languages that are cornerstones of cultural and social identities across our province," said Carole James, Minister of Finance. "By investing in Indigenous languages, we invest in the future of Indigenous communities. I am proud our government is making this historic commitment."

As a result of the funding, the First Peoples' Cultural Council will expand community immersion programs that support the development of fluent speakers of Indigenous languages. These include the Mentor-Apprentice program, which pairs fluent speakers with apprentices for one-on-one immersion training, and the Pre-school Language Nest program, which supports the creation of language and culture immersion environments for children and their parents. The pilot Silent Speakers program will become permanent. Silent Speakers helps those who understand, but do not speak their language, overcome challenges with using it in their communities.

"We sincerely thank the B.C. government for its strong leadership and new investment in the revitalization of Indigenous languages across B.C., and for recognizing the importance of Indigenous languages to the well-being of Indigenous peoples," said Cynthia Callison, FPCC board chair. "This funding is essential to restore and continue the unique diversity of Indigenous languages in B.C. It is a concrete example of implementing the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's calls to action toward reconciliation."

The language revitalization plans will be developed with Indigenous communities and tailored to their individual needs. The First Peoples' Cultural Council will also provide funding to increase the number of words and phrases uploaded to the FirstVoices online oral dictionary, and expand the online resources available for language learners and speakers.

"Urgent action is needed as many Indigenous languages are in danger of becoming extinct," said Melanie Mark, Minister of Advanced Education, Skills and Training. "One of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's key priorities is revitalizing language. That's what this work is about - not just giving lip service to reconciliation, but taking action."

FPCC will work in collaboration with communities and partners to support additional priority actions to revitalize languages. These include creating new speakers and developing new language resources that will support communities to build skills and capacity for language mobilization.

"The First Nations communities we have been working with are seeing clear and measurable results, creating fluent language speakers as new knowledge keepers and documenting languages for future generations," said Tracey Herbert, CEO of the FPCC. "This new funding will help us to build on our strong track record of success, and expand our work to all Indigenous communities in B.C., to help their mother-tongue languages flourish again."

BACKGROUNDER First Peoples' Cultural Council

The First Peoples' Cultural Council is a unique organization in Canada. As a First Nations-run Crown corporation with a mandate to support the revitalization of Indigenous languages, arts, culture and heritage in British Columbia, First Peoples' Cultural Council provides funding and resources to communities, monitors the status of Indigenous languages and develops policy recommendations for First Nations and government.

New funding

The B.C. government has committed a significant investment of \$50 million to support Indigenous language. This funding is the result of many years of advocacy, educating policy makers, and developing investment models by First Peoples' Cultural Council and community partners.

Why Indigenous language revitalization matters

Restoring connections to Indigenous language and culture builds resilience and supports healthy individuals and communities. The Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada: Calls to Action report outlines the need to protect and invest in the restoration of Indigenous languages as a concrete step toward reconciliation. Knowing and being able to speak one's language is recognized as a human right for Indigenous peoples. The United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples identifies that Indigenous peoples have the right to revitalize, use, develop and transmit to future generations their histories, languages, oral traditions, philosophies, writing systems and literatures, and to designate and retain their own names for communities, places and persons. First Peoples' Cultural Council has been working with the Assembly of First Nations and the federal government to advance the recognition and protection of Indigenous language rights in federal law.

How the funding will be used

The new funding will be used for language preservation and revitalization activities, including community grants, community language planning, and documentation and training aimed at rebuilding community-based language supports. The funding will also be used to expand language immersion programs and learning resources to support Indigenous languages in communities throughout the province.

The First Peoples' Cultural Council has served First Nations in B.C. for 28 years. The First Peoples' Cultural Council has mapped and documented Indigenous languages in B.C.; built tools and programs in community and online that support language learning; created partnerships with communities throughout the province; and worked with leaders in Indigenous languages around the globe to share their pioneering and proven approaches to language reclamation, documentation and revitalization.

Their efforts have been recognized as establishing British Columbia and Canada as leaders in Indigenous language revitalization. Limited resources have meant that the First Peoples' Cultural Council were able to touch only a handful (10% or less) of the Indigenous languages in the province. With this new provincial funding, it will work with the Indigenous language groups and communities that belong to the same cultural groups and speak the same language throughout the province. The program will be flexible in order to respond to the needs of the community. First Peoples' Cultural Council works collaboratively with communities, supporting leading language work led by Elders and other knowledge keepers of the land.

Language programs supported in communities include:

- * The Mentor-Apprentice program pairs a fluent language speaker (mentor) with a language learner (apprentice) to transfer language knowledge and increase fluency.
- * FirstVoices is the internationally recognized online Indigenous language archiving and teaching resource that allows Indigenous communities to document their language for future generations. FirstVoices provides state-of-the-art technologies, training and technical support to community language champions. Teams of fluent Elders and technically savvy youth upload dictionaries, alphabets, songs, stories, words and phrases, as well as audio and video to their community archives. FirstVoices keyboards includes apps for Apple and Android mobile devices, and more.
- * The Silent Speaker program is for people who understand, but do not speak, their First Nations language. The course is based on a successful program that was developed in Norway and Sweden for, and by, Indigenous Sami people. The model uses cognitive behaviour therapy (CBT) to support silent speakers in overcoming barriers to using their Indigenous language in their communities.
- * The Pre-School Language Nest program creates language and cultural immersion environments for preschool children and their parents. In addition to creating an immersion environment with staff, volunteers and Elders, Language Nests allow young parents to learn the language and bring it back into their homes and daily lives, which is necessary for revitalizing a language.
- * First Peoples' Cultural Council partners with Google.org on the Endangered Languages project, whose governance First Peoples' Cultural Council chairs.


