REGARDING: Signing of the K'omoks Treaty Revitalization Agreement (Agreement)

SUMMARY:

- Canada and K'omoks signed the Agreement on June 25th, 2019 on the understanding that
 British Columbia would sign it at a later date; Minister Fraser was unable to attend the signing due
 to scheduling conflicts.
- The purpose of the Agreement is to:
 - revitalize the treaty negotiations in order to achieve a negotiated understanding of the treaty within 2 years; and
 - establish a new approach to K'omoks Treaty negotiations, including restructuring the treaty to include only core or essential elements and relying more heavily on appendices or operational agreements to address operational issues.
- The Agreement reflects the approach also being taken at the Ktunaxa and Metlakatla treaty tables to explore a core treaty model.
- Of key importance to K'omoks is to have Canada's commitment to develop the core treaty concept prior to the federal election as K'omoks and its Chief Negotiator, Mark Stevenson, are strong advocates of the approach.
- The Agreement was approved by the Focused Agreement Board and is consistent the Area Based Approach and BC's approach to treaty revitalization.

REGARDING: Ktunaxa Nation Recognition Agreement – Status and Approval Timelines

SUMMARY:

- In November 2018, British Columbia (BC), Canada and the Ktunaxa Nation signed the Core
 Treaty and Rights Recognition Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), which commits the
 parties to transition to Stage 5 treaty negotiations, explore a Core Treaty approach, and
 negotiate a Ktunaxa Nation Recognition Agreement (KNRA) prior to Treaty effective date. The
 KNRA will recognize the Ktunaxa Nation as the s.35 collective rights holder, with jurisdiction
 over certain internal Ktunaxa governance matters, to be exercised by its government.
- The KNRA is a stepping stone to Core Treaty and will enable Ktunaxa to meet its Nation rebuilding objectives, as set out in their vision statement. It also supports Articles 3 and 4 of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP), that "Indigenous peoples have the right to self-determination", and "Indigenous peoples... have the right to autonomy or self-government in matters relating to their internal and local affairs...".
- The KNRA meets BC's interests to clarify which entity is the Ktunaxa Nation's collective rights holder, reveals BC's commitment to Ktunaxa's pre-treaty governance capacity development, and is a direct expression of BC's Treaty Transformation Implementation Roadmap.

REGARDING: With Celeste Haldene, BC Treaty Commission, 2018 Annual Report

SUMMARY:

- The BC Treaty Commission's work encompasses three main roles across a broad range of activities: facilitating negotiations; allocating negotiation support funding to First Nations, and educating the public about treaty negotiations
- The Commission's 2018 Annual Report provides an overview of treaty negotiations and treatyrelated policy work advanced in 2018. This includes the federal government's commitment to loan forgiveness and negotiation support funding, the transition from Stage 4 to Stage 5, and core treaties.
- Chief Commissioner Haldene references ten treaty negotiation tables in advanced stages and that these negotiations can be concluded within government's first term. s.13;s.16 s.13;s.16

- The Tripartite Treaty Negotiation Policy will support the negotiation of treaties by bringing the negotiations in line with UNDRIP and a rights recognition approach.
- The process of treaty-making, which is overseen by the BCTC, should be reviewed along with the content of treaties. The BCTC should take a leadership role in thinking through this approach.

KEY MESSAGES:

- Treaties form a key part of how we implement UNDRIP and reconciliation.
- We are focussed on trying to get to achieve key deliverables where they are achievable, such as with Kitselas/Kitsumkalum, Te'mexw and Ktunaxa – and to advance new and innovative approaches.
- We are moving the Tripartite Treaty Negotiation Policy through approvals by all Parties, and I'm
 confident we will land this important work. It has been critical for us that we find the right
 balance and ensure the policy lands well such that it does not create or further division amongst
 First Nations.
- We are committed to meeting Nations whether they are, regardless of the reconciliation process they choose to pursue.



Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation

- Overlaps and shared territories are an important issue that impact treaty and non-treaty nations alike, and we need concerted effort to work towards resolving this issue.
- I would encourage the BCTC to consider how they might evolve their process, and how they work, to support treaty transformation.
- I am aware of the significance of long term forest tenure to several advanced treaty tables and Minister Donaldson and I are working to find solutions to this issue.

SUMMARY:

Transformative Change Agreement

- The Province, Canada and the Tŝilhqot'in Nation Government (TNG) will complete a tripartite *Transformative Change Agreement (TCA)* that advances commitments in the provincial *Nenqay Deni Accord* and the federal *Pathway* letter shortly following June 26th, the five year anniversary of the *Tŝilhqot'in* Supreme Court of Canada decision.

New Prosperity Mine

- On June 13th the TNG's application for leave to appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada a lower court decision upholding the validity of a Mines Act Permit authorizing a drilling program in the Fish Lake area was dismissed.
- Taseko Mines has started moving equipment into the project site, and building access routes and staging areas. They intend to begin their drilling program commencing sometime after July 2nd.
- TNG has indicated that it will continue to protest/resist the authorized drilling program s.16

Transformative Change Agreement

- I recognize the significant effort that went into the negotiation of the tripartite Transformative Change Agreement.
- I also recognize the significant pressure that exists to make visible progress in regard to management of the declared title lands.
- We are pleased that Canada has now come to the table. Bringing the Tŝilhqot'in Nation, Canada and Province together has been a long term goal and is an important next step in the reconciliation process. The tripartite approach will help us address the pressures for change in the title lands.

SUMMARY:

 In 2013, Snuneymuxw First Nation (Snuneymuxw) and the Province signed a Reconciliation Agreement (RA), which included several parcels of land that were transferred in fee simple to Snuneymuxw. In 2017, a subsequent RA (phase 2) proposal by Snuneymuxw entitled the "Mid-Island Regional Forestry Initiative" focused on the Nanaimo River Estuary, forest licensee partnerships and additional fee simple land transfers s.16

• The land parcels being considered in both RA discussions s.16 are complex and require careful review and consideration. Engagement work with stakeholders, the public and neighbouring nations is currently underway and will take some time to complete.
