PURPOSE: For DECISION of the Attorney General (AG)

ISSUE: Legal Services Society's (LSS) 2015/16 budget management plan.

SUMMARY:

 It is recommended that the AG send the attached letter (Attachment 4)to the LSS Board Chair (Chair) and approve LSS' 2015/16 budget management plan with a modification to the plan that was presented by the Chair in his letter and revised submission dated February 13, 2015 (Attachment 2).

BACKGROUND:

- LSS submitted the first version of their 2015/16 budget management plan on January 16, 2015.
- The AG sent a letter to the Chair on January 26, 2015, requesting resubmission of the budget management plan by February 17, 2015, to include:
 - forecast information and revisions to format, for analysis and comparability purposes; and
 - confirmation that LSS would continue to adhere to the guiding principles established last year for the management of LSS' 2014/15 budget:
 - the LSS Board will manage government funding to the bottom line and not to the individual tariff line items in the budget; and
 - the LSS Board will prioritize delivery of tariff services over administrative and operation costs, and among tariff services—the relative priority would be as follows: child protection; family; and criminal.
- On February 13, the Chair sent a letter accompanying the revised version of their 2015/16 budget management plan to the AG. The letter confirms agreement with the principles and priorities as requested by the AG, and included an attachment reflecting the forecast and formatting adjustments.
- On February 26, LSS staff indicated to ministry staff that their interpretation of the
 direction in the budget approval letter for fiscal year 2014/15 to manage to the bottom
 line applies to the \$2 million funding for Justice Transformation (JT). Wording is
 included in the recommended letter for 2015/16 to clarify that this is not the case.
 Dedicated funding envelopes (for major cases, federal high cost cases, immigration,
 drug court, community court as well as JT) must be directed to the purposes for which
 they are intended.

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 LSS continues to advise of risks associated with its proposed budget management plan (e.g., amortization costs of a new technology system); however, ministry staff consider these to be relatively minor risks and will continue to monitor and work with LSS to manage these risks.

OTHER MINISTRIES IMPACTED/CONSULTED:

- Government's Budget 2015 has now been tabled in the House, confirming budget decisions related to LSS to be as anticipated by ministry staff and as approved by Treasury Board Staff's review of LSS's budget as presented in its Service Plan released on Budget Day.
- As such, the 2015/16 budget management plan that LSS submitted on February 13, 2015 now conforms to the conditions required for approval.
- Ministry staff recommend that the AG approve the budget, provided the \$2 million in JT funding is 'ring-fenced' and sign the attached letter to the Board Chair indicating her approval.

Thank you for your letter dated January 16, 2015, and the budget management plan for 2015/16. As you know in accordance with Section 18 of the Legal Services Society Act (the Act), the Attorney General has 30 days to either approve that budget or return it and require the Legal Services Society (LSS) to prepare and submit a revised budget.

The budget cannot be approved at this time because we have not yet received the full set of final budget decisions and directives for the ministry from Treasury Board (TB). As such, pursuant to Subsection 18(2) of the Act, I am returning the budget submitted on January 16, 2015, and asking LSS to re-submit this budget by February 17, 2015.

Assuming the ministry budget is maintained for 2015/16, I will approve the resubmitted budget if the following revisions are made to the plan:

- Amend the principles for the 2015/16 budget management plan set out in the attachment to the budget submitted to reflect the language as agreed by the LSS Board in 2014/15 which stated that LSS would:
 - manage the LSS hudget to the bottom line and not to the individual tariff line items in the budget; and
 - prioritize tariff services ahead of administrative and operational spending, with the relative priority as follows:
 - · child protection;
 - family;
 - criminal.

Legal Services Society 2015/16 Amended Budget Management Plan Principles, Assumptions, Key Cost Drivers and Sudget Process

Principles for 2015/16:

This budget differentiates government and non-government funded services.

This budget has been developed within the framework and principles established by the Legal Services Society Act, the Mamorandum of Understanding mandated by section 21 of that Act, and the LSS commitment to braneperency and accountability to all its funders. The management of the budget through the year occurs within that framework and is further guided by the direction and priorities established by the LSS Board of Directors.

That direction and those priorities are:

- LSS will provide services to the amount of the available government funding
- LSS will continue its practice of managing government funding to the bottom line and not to the individual tariff line items within the budget
- LSS will prioritize services over administrative and operational expenditures to the extent that this can
 be done without compromising the origing effectiveness of the society
- LSS will prioritize services in the following order;
 - a) Child protection
 - b) Family
 - c) Criminal
- Subject to Board approval, LSS will make any necessary tariff service adjustments on the basis of the mitigation strategies included with this document.

Key Assumptions:

- Revenues from the Provincial Government will remain at 2014/15 levels other than additional funds
 received under the Economic Stability Mandate.
- 2. Law Foundation funding was decreased by \$845K based on new funding levels.
- Referral volumes will remain constant with 2014/15 levels, unless indicated otherwise.
- The society will manage services to the total available budget.
- Justice Indovation Transformation Initiatives ("JiTi") projects will be fully operational on or before April
 1, 2015.
- Client information System ("CIS") goes five in 2015/16 and amortization costs will start once it's brought into production. The annual amortization is expected to cost up to \$430K per year on a full year basis.

Key Cost Drivers:

- All tariff budgets were calculated based on a fee code analysis rether than an estimate of the average case cost. This process is consistent with 2614/15. See Budget Development Process below for further details on the process followed.
- Referral volumes were calculated using actual applications and referrals for each month over the past four and a half years.
- The Child, Family and Community Service Act ("CFCSA") budget has been increased by \$350k due to higher number of referrals compared to prior years and higher average case costs.

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- 4. The amortization budget includes an additional \$430k for CIS amortization.
- 5. Does not include any amounts for salary increases, other than step increases for unionized staff and excluded non-management staff.
- Included is a 2% increase in the cost of employee benefits.
- Included is an additional 5200k for Family Duty Counsel (to maintain 2014/15 service levels).
- 5. Included in the budget is an increase of \$67k for premises due to higher lease costs.

Risks Not Budgeted For:

- 1. The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for any changes to government policy, or new initiatives that may impact the society.
- 2. The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for higher volumes due to the Ministry of Children and Family Development ("MCFD") hiring 200 additional social workers.
- 3. The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for any potential shortfall in cessation/vacation matters as it relates to immigration.
- 4. The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for any potential CtS or JTT impacts.
- The tariff budgets were not adjusted for any referrals related to significant one-time events (eg. the anti-pipeline demonstration contempt proceedings).

Budget Development Process

Historical Budget Preparation using the Average Case Cost Model:

In prior years the society calculated a tariff budget by multiplying the number of cases expected in a particular tariff by the expected average case cost for that tariff.

We first reviewed the historical applications and referral rates for each teriff. We then estimated volumes by looking at application trends and anticipated referral rates for the coming year.

We then looked at the historical average case cost for each tariff and adjusted them for known changes to the tariff

Eg. Number of Applications x Referral Rate = Number of referrals Number of referrals x Average Case Cost = Tanif Budget

Disadvantages of the historical process:

- Did not allow for any material changes in volumes from one year to the next
- Dig not consider the cost pattern of cases at different stages of the process
- 3. Did not allow for analysis of what was causing the average case cost to change until the cases were 18 months old (not proactive; it was reactive)

To overcome these disadvantages, the society changed the budgeting process in 2014/15 and beyond to include the following:

- Referrals from prior years and a projection for the opcoming year
- Base the budget on tariff fee codes per case
- 3. Reviewed the age of outstanding cases

<u>Current Sudget Development Process by Fee Code:</u>
The 2015/16 Tariff Budgets have been developed based on fee items rather than the Average Case Cost model, in some cases a teriff might have over 290 separate fee codes that may apply, in order to do this the society analyzed all fees and disbursements for all invoices submitted for 3 years. Approximately 900,000 lines of data were consolidated and analysed to determine budgets by fee codes.

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Fee Code Analysis Example:

To determine the budget for Family general prep fees, the cost for this fee item was consolidated based on actual invoices received from lawyers over a 3 - 12 month period, starting with September 1 through August 31, for the years 2012, 2013 and 2014. The data included total fees, total hours, the number of cases that billed general prep, and the total number of cases that billed during the 12 month period. This data is used to calculate:

- Average Hourly Rate
- The % of cases that biffed that biffed General Prep.
- The average units per case that billed General Prep.

- = (6,000 × 89.1%) × 11.6 × \$87.00
- = 5,350 x 11.6 x \$87.00 = \$5,399,220 (rounded to \$5,399,280)

This exercise was repeated for all major fee code items representing at least 90% of the total costs of the tariff. All other costs were consolidated into one group and budgeted as one item.

All budgeted fee codes and the other consolidated codes were totaled to determine the total budget for the tariff.

Review Process:

The above analysis was used to allocate the 2015/16 budget by fee code. This data is incorporated into a reporting structure and tested on a monthly basis if the actual results are consistent with the budget. From time to time we adjust services to clients based on actual results.

Testing now includes over 1.1 million rows of data.

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BUDGET PRESSURES, COST DRIVERS AND MITIGATION STRATEGIES FAMILY

To manage family law expenditures to budget, LSS restricts services to situations where safety is at risk or there is a persistent denial of access to children. The society further limits expenditures by restricting discretionary services. A consequence of this is that LSS currently retuses more than 60 per cent of applicants for family representation services. Family services are not expected to be a fiscal pressure in 2015/2016. Should costs and demands fluctuate, this document outlines LSS's mitigation strategies to further contain expenditures.

Legal Services Society 2015/16 Amended Budget Management Plan Principles, Assumptions, Key Cost Drivers and Budget Process

Principles for 2015/16:

This budget differentiates government and non-government funded services.

This budget has been developed within the framework and principles established by the *Legal Services Society Act*, the Memorandum of Understanding mandated by section 21 of that *Act*, and the LSS commitment to transparency and accountability to all its funders. The management of the budget through the year occurs within that framework and is further guided by the direction and priorities established by the LSS Board of Directors.

That direction and those priorities are:

- LSS will provide services to the amount of the available government funding
- LSS will continue its practice of managing government funding to the bottom line and not to the individual tariff line items within the budget
- LSS will prioritize services over administrative and operational expenditures to the extent that this can be done without compromising the ongoing effectiveness of the society
- LSS will prioritize services in the following order:
 - a) Child protection
 - b) Family
 - c) Criminal
- Subject to Board approval, LSS will make any necessary tariff service adjustments on the basis of the mitigation strategies included with this document.

Key Assumptions:

- Revenues from the Provincial Government will remain at 2014/15 levels other than additional funds received under the Economic Stability Mandate.
- 2. Law Foundation funding was decreased by \$645K based on new funding levels.
- 3. Referral volumes will remain constant with 2014/15 levels, unless indicated otherwise.
- 4. The society will manage services to the total available budget.
- 5. Justice Innovation Transformation Initiatives ("JITI") projects will be fully operational on or before April 1, 2015.
- 6. Client Information System ("CIS") goes live in 2015/16 and amortization costs will start once it's brought into production. The annual amortization is expected to cost up to \$430K per year on a full year basis.

Key Cost Drivers:

- All tariff budgets were calculated based on a fee code analysis rather than an estimate of the average case cost. This process is consistent with 2014/15. See Budget Development Process below for further details on the process followed.
- 2. Referral volumes were calculated using actual applications and referrals for each month over the past four and a half years.
- The Child, Family and Community Service Act ("CFCSA") budget has been increased by \$350k due
 to higher number of referrals compared to prior years and higher average case costs.

- 4. The amortization budget includes an additional \$430k for CIS amortization.
- Does not include any amounts for salary increases, other than step increases for unionized staff and excluded non-management staff.
- Included is a 2% increase in the cost of employee benefits.
- 7. Included is an additional \$200k for Family Duty Counsel (to maintain 2014/15 service levels).
- 8. Included in the budget is an increase of \$67k for premises due to higher lease costs.

Risks Not Budgeted For:

- 1. The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for any changes to government policy, or new initiatives that may impact the society.
- 2. The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for higher volumes due to the Ministry of Children and Family Development ("MCFD") hiring 200 additional social workers.
- 3. The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for any potential shortfall in cessation/vacation matters as it relates to Immigration.
- 4. The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for any potential CIS or JITI impacts.
- 5. The tariff budgets were not adjusted for any referrals related to significant one-time events (eg. the anti-pipeline demonstration contempt proceedings).

Budget Development Process

Historical Budget Preparation using the Average Case Cost Model:

In prior years the society calculated a tariff budget by multiplying the number of cases expected in a particular tariff by the expected average case cost for that tariff.

We first reviewed the historical applications and referral rates for each tariff. We then estimated volumes by looking at application trends and anticipated referral rates for the coming year.

We then looked at the historical average case cost for each tariff and adjusted them for known changes to the tariff.

Eg. Number of Applications x Referral Rate = Number of referrals Number of referrals x Average Case Cost = Tariff Budget

Disadvantages of the historical process:

- 1. Did not allow for any material changes in volumes from one year to the next
- 2. Did not consider the cost pattern of cases at different stages of the process
- 3. Did not allow for analysis of what was causing the average case cost to change until the cases were 18 months old (not proactive; it was reactive)

To overcome these disadvantages, the society changed the budgeting process in 2014/15 and beyond to include the following:

- 1. Referrals from prior years and a projection for the upcoming year
- 2. Base the budget on tariff fee codes per case
- 3. Reviewed the age of outstanding cases

Current Budget Development Process by Fee Code:

The 2015/16 Tariff Budgets have been developed based on fee items rather than the Average Case Cost model. In some cases a tariff might have over 200 separate fee codes that may apply. In order to do this the society analyzed all fees and disbursements for all invoices submitted for 3 years. Approximately 900,000 lines of data were consolidated and analysed to determine budgets by fee codes.

Fee Code Analysis Example:

To determine the budget for Family general prep fees, the cost for this fee item was consolidated based on actual invoices received from lawyers over a 3 - 12 month period, starting with September 1 through August 31, for the years 2012, 2013 and 2014. The data included total fees, total hours, the number of cases that billed general prep, and the total number of cases that billed during the 12 month period. This data is used to calculate:

- Average Hourly Rate
- The % of cases that billed that billed General Prep.
- The average units per case that billed General Prep

This exercise was repeated for all major fee code items representing at least 90% of the total costs of the tariff. All other costs were consolidated into one group and budgeted as one item.

All budgeted fee codes and the other consolidated codes were totated to determine the total budget for the tariff.

Review Process:

The above analysis was used to allocate the 2015/16 budget by fee code. This data is incorporated into a reporting structure and tested on a monthly basis if the actual results are consistent with the budget. From time to time we adjust services to clients based on actual results.

Testing now includes over 1.1 million rows of data.

On behalf of the Government of British Columbia I write to advise you that I approve the 2015/16 three-year budget management plan for Legal Services Society (LSS) as submitted on February 13, 2015, with the conditions and principles agreed upon and confirmed by your letter of the same date, but with clarification of item (2) in your letter:

"2. LSS will manage its government funding to the bottom line and not to the individual tariff line items with the budget."

Managing to the bottom line, consistent with our discussion last year, means prioritizing service delivery over administrative expenditures and not managing to individual tariff line items within the budget. It also means directing dedicated funding envelopes (such as those for Justice Transformation, major cases, federal high cost cases, immigration, drug court, community court) to the purposes for which they are intended.

Legal Services Society 2015/16 Budget Management Plan Principles, Assumptions, Key Cost Drivers and Budget Process January 9, 2015

Principles for 2015/16:

The final budget differentiates government and non-government funded services.

The final budget assumes LSS will provide services to the amount of the available budget. To accomplish this, LSS will:

- Monitor and, if necessary, adjust tariff budgets using the mitigation strategies included with this budget;
- · Prioritize services in the following order: CFCSA, Family and Criminal; and
- Adjust referral volumes to provide services to the available budget.

Key Assumptions:

- 1. Revenues from the Provincial Government will remain at 2014/15 levels other than additional funds received under the Economic Stability Man-date.
- 2. Law Foundation funding was decreased by \$645K based on new funding levels.
- Referral volumes will remain constant with 2014/15 levels.
- 4. The society will manage services to the total available budget.
- 5. No additional services will be provided by the society, other than additional Family Duty Counsel (see 7 below).
- 6. Justice Innovation Transformation Initiatives ("JITI") projects will be fully operational on or before April 1, 2015.
- 7. Client Information System ("CIS") goes live in 2015/16 and amortization costs will start once it's brought into production. The annual amortization is expected to cost up to \$430K per year on a full year basis.

Key Cost Drivers:

- All tariff budgets were calculated based on a fee code analysis rather than an estimate
 of the average case cost. This process is consistent with 2014/15. See Budget
 Development Process below for further details on the process followed.
- 2. Referral volumes were calculated using actual applications and referrals for each month over the past four and a half years.
- 3. The Child, Family and Community Service Act ("CFCSA") budget has been increased by \$350k due to higher number of referrals compared to prior years and higher average case costs.

- 4. The amortization budget includes an additional \$430k for CIS amortization.
- 5. Does not include any amounts for salary increases, other than step increases for unionized staff and excluded non-management staff.
- 6. Included is a 2% increase in the cost of employee benefits.
- Included is an additional \$200k for Family Duty Counsel (to maintain 2014/15 service levels).
- 8. Included in the budget is an increase of \$67k for premises due to higher lease costs.

Risks Not Budgeted For:

- 1. The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for any changes to government policy, or new initiatives that may impact the society.
- 2. The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for higher volumes due to the Ministry of Children and Family Development ("MCFD") hiring 200 additional social workers.
- The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for any potential CIS or JITI impacts.
- 4. The tariff budgets were not adjusted for any referrals related to significant one-time events (eg. the Kinder Morgan anti-pipeline demonstrations)

Budget Development Process

Historical Budget Preparation using the Average Case Cost Model:

In prior years the society calculated a tariff budget by multiplying the number of cases expected in a particular tariff by the expected average case cost for that tariff.

We first reviewed the historical applications and referral rates for each tariff. We then estimated volumes by looking at application trends and anticipated referral rates for the coming year.

We then looked at the historical average case cost for each tariff and adjusted them for known changes to the tariff.

Eg. Number of Applications x Referral Rate = Number of referrals

Number of referrals x Average Case Cost = Tariff Budget

Disadvantages of the historical process:

- Did not allow for any material changes in volumes from one year to the next
- 2. Did not consider the cost pattern of cases at different stages of the process
- 3. Did not allow for analysis of what was causing the average case cost to change until the cases were 18 months old (not proactive; it was reactive)

To overcome these disadvantages, the society changed the budgeting process in 2014/15 and beyond to include the following:

- 1. Referrals from prior years and a projection for the upcoming year
- 2. Base the budget on tariff fee codes per case
- 3. Reviewed the age of outstanding cases

Current Budget Development Process by Fee Code:

The 2015/16 Tariff Budgets have been developed based on fee items rather than the Average Case Cost model. In some cases a tariff might have over 200 separate fee codes that may apply. In order to do this the society analyzed all fees and disbursements for all invoices submitted for 3 years. Approximately 900,000 lines of data were consolidated and analysed to determine budgets by fee codes.

Fee Code Analysis Example:

To determine the budget for Family general prep fees, the cost for this fee item was consolidated based on actual invoices received from lawyers over a 3 - 12 month period, starting with September 1 through August 31, for the years 2012, 2013 and 2014. The data included total fees, total hours, the number of cases that billed general prep, and the total number of cases that billed during the 12 month period. This data is used to calculate:

- Average Hourly Rate
- The % of cases that billed that billed General Prep.
- The average units per case that billed General Prep.

This exercise was repeated for all major fee code items representing at least 90% of the total costs of the tariff. All other costs were consolidated into one group and budgeted as one item.

All budgeted fee codes and the other consolidated codes were totaled to determine the total budget for the tariff.

Review Process:

The above analysis was used to allocate the 2015/16 budget by fee code. This data is incorporated into a reporting structure and tested on a monthly basis if the actual results are consistent with the budget. From time to time we adjust services to clients based on actual results.

Testing now includes over 1.1 million rows of data.

Further to letter of January 9, 2015 from Mark Benton, QC, enclosed is the Legal Services Society's budget for 2015/16 as approved by the board of directors.

As you will know from previous correspondence and our December 17, 2014 meeting, the Legal Services Society requested deficit authorization to balance the budget by withdrawing \$430,000 from the society's accumulated surplus.

Upon receiving the Ministry's advice that the request would not proceed to Treasury Board, the board directed the society to find the necessary savings within the tariff budget without reducing services.

Accordingly, the society has reassessed and amended its initial projections for the 2015/16 criminal tariff budget by \$430,000. This assumes a lower volume of referrals for indictable offences and a lower average case cost for summary offences.

While this reassessment is not unreasonable given prior years' experience, the board remains concerned that it erodes the society's ability to address tariff fluctuations and significantly increases the society's financial risk. This risk is of particular concern given that most, if not all, fiscal pressures are outside the society's control.

We will continue to work with your Ministry to contain tariff costs and should it be necessary will address any pressures in accordance with the mitigation strategies previously identified and the Memorandum of Understanding.

Also enclosed is the 2015/16 Mandate Letter that I have signed on behalf of the LSS Board and will forward the letter signed by the full board as soon as this is available. I look forward to receiving a signed copy of the 2015/16 Mandate Letter in due course.

Legal Services Society 2015/16 Budget Management Plan Principles, Assumptions, Key Cost Drivers and Budget Process

Principles for 2015/16:

The final budget differentiates government and non-government funded services.

The final budget assumes LSS will provide services to the amount of the available budget. To accomplish this, LSS will:

- Monitor and, if necessary, adjust tariff budgets using the mitigation strategies included with this budget;
- Prioritize services in the following order: CFCSA, Family and Criminal; and
- Adjust referral volumes to provide services to the available budget.

Key Assumptions:

- Revenues from the Provincial Government will remain at 2014/15 levels other than additional funds received under the Economic Stability Mandate.
- 2. Law Foundation funding was decreased by \$645K based on new funding levels.
- 3. Referral volumes will remain constant with 2014/15 levels.
- 4. The society will manage services to the total available budget.
- 5. Justice Innovation Transformation Initiatives ("JITI") projects will be fully operational on or before April 1, 2015.
- 6. Client Information System ("CIS") goes live in 2015/16 and amortization costs will start once it's brought into production. The annual amortization is expected to cost up to \$430K per year on a full year basis.

Key Cost Drivers:

- All tariff budgets were calculated based on a fee code analysis rather than an estimate
 of the average case cost. This process is consistent with 2014/15. See Budget
 Development Process below for further details on the process followed.
- Referral volumes were calculated using actual applications and referrals for each month over the past four and a half years.
- The Child, Family and Community Service Act ("CFCSA") budget has been increased by \$350k due to higher number of referrals compared to prior years and higher average case costs.
- 4. The amortization budget includes an additional \$430k for CIS amortization.
- 5. Does not include any amounts for salary increases, other than step increases for unionized staff and excluded non-management staff.
- 6. Included is a 2% increase in the cost of employee benefits.

- 7. Included is an additional \$200k for Family Duty Counsel (to maintain 2014/15 service levels).
- 8. Included in the budget is an increase of \$67k for premises due to higher lease costs.

Risks Not Budgeted For:

- The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for any changes to government policy, or new initiatives that may impact the society.
- 2. The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for higher volumes due to the Ministry of Children and Family Development ("MCFD") hiring 200 additional social workers.
- 3. The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for any potential CIS or JITI impacts.
- 4. The tariff budgets were not adjusted for any referrals related to significant one-time events (e.g. anti-pipeline demonstration contempt proceedings).

Tariff Budget Development Process

Historical Budget Preparation using the Average Case Cost Model:

In prior years the society calculated a tariff budget by multiplying the number of cases expected in a particular tariff by the expected average case cost for that tariff.

We first reviewed the historical applications and referral rates for each tariff. We then estimated volumes by looking at application trends and anticipated referral rates for the coming year.

We then looked at the historical average case cost for each tariff and adjusted them for known changes to the tariff.

E.g. Number of Applications x Referral Rate = Number of referrals

Number of referrals x Average Case Cost = Tariff Budget

Disadvantages of the historical process:

- 1. Did not allow for any material changes in volumes from one year to the next
- 2. Did not consider the cost pattern of cases at different stages of the process
- 3. Did not allow for analysis of what was causing the average case cost to change until the cases were 18 months old (not proactive; it was reactive)

To overcome these disadvantages, the society changed the budgeting process in 2014/15 and beyond to include the following:

- 1. Referrals from prior years and a projection for the upcoming year
- 2. Base the budget on tariff fee codes per case
- 3. Reviewed the age of outstanding cases

<u>Current Budget Development Process by Fee Code:</u>

The 2015/16 Tariff Budgets have been developed based on fee items rather than the Average Case Cost model. In some cases a tariff might have over 200 separate fee codes that may apply. In order to do this the society analyzed all fees and disbursements for all invoices submitted for 3 years. Approximately 900,000 lines of data were consolidated and analysed to determine budgets by fee codes.

Fee Code Analysis Example:

To determine the budget for Family general prep fees, the cost for this fee item was consolidated based on actual invoices received from lawyers over a 3 - 12 month period, starting with September 1 through August 31, for the years 2012, 2013 and 2014. The data included total fees, total hours, the number of cases that billed general prep, and the total number of cases that billed during the 12 month period. This data is used to calculate:

- Average Hourly Rate
- The % of cases that billed that billed General Prep.
- The average units per case that billed General Prep.

This exercise was repeated for all major fee code items representing at least 90% of the total costs of the tariff. All other costs were consolidated into one group and budgeted as one item.

All budgeted fee codes and the other consolidated codes were totaled to determine the total budget for the tariff.

Review Process:

The above analysis was used to allocate the 2015/16 budget by fee code. This data is incorporated into a reporting structure and tested on a monthly basis if the actual results are consistent with the budget. From time to time we adjust services to clients based on actual results.

Testing now includes over 1.1 million rows of data.

Thank you for your letter dated January 16, 2015, and the budget management plan for 2015/16. As you know in accordance with Section 18 of the Legal Services Society Act (the Act), the Attorney General has 30 days to either approve that budget or return it and require the Legal Services Society (LSS) to prepare and submit a revised budget.

The budget cannot be approved at this time because we have not yet received the full set of final budget decisions and directives for the ministry from Treasury Board (TB). As such, pursuant to Subsection 18(2) of the Act, I am returning the budget submitted on January 16, 2015, and asking LSS to re-submit this budget by February 17, 2015.

Assuming the ministry budget is maintained for 2015/16, I will approve the resubmitted budget if the following revisions are made to the plan:

- Amend the principles for the 2015/16 budget management plan set out in the attachment to the budget submitted to reflect the language as agreed by the LSS Board in 2014/15 which stated that LSS would:
 - o manage the LSS budget to the bottom line and not to the individual tariff line items in the budget; and
 - o prioritize tariff services ahead of administrative and operational spending, with the relative priority as follows:
 - child protection;
 - family;
 - criminal.

PURPOSE: For INFORMATION for Richard Fyfe, Deputy Minister

ISSUE: Lawyers' Rights Watch Canada Report — "The Right to Legal Aid: How British Columbia's Legal Aid System Fails to Meet International Human Rights Obligations."

SUMMARY:

- On October 1, 2014 Lawyers' Rights Watch Canada released a report titled "The Right
 to Legal Aid: How British Columbia's Legal Aid System Fails to Meet International
 Human Rights Obligations" (the "Report"). A compendium report was released at the
 same time titled "The Right to Legal Aid: A Handbook on International Law Rights to
 Legal Aid."
- The Report asserts that BC's legal aid system, including its statutory regime, fails to meet the international obligations by which BC is bound.
- The Report summarizes the services provided by the Legal Services Society in contrast to the articles of several international treaties and conventions, leading to the assertion that BC's legal aid system does not meet international obligations.
- The Report canvasses the various attempts at litigation around the issue of the
 "inadequacy" of legal aid funding/services in BC. It notes that litigation has failed to get
 any traction, and draws a link between the failed litigation and the fact that international
 obligations have not been asserted as a line of argument.

BACKGROUND:

Report summary

- The Report opens by canvassing the last 15 years of legal aid in BC funding reductions in 2002, leading to service reductions and a wholescale restructuring of legal aid provision.
- The authors cite the <u>Doust Report</u> and others, noting that the service reductions have had the greatest impact on women and marginalized people; further that "...the provincial and federal government are at risk of legal challenges that they are failing to meet their statutory, common law, constitutional, and international obligations."
- Various articles of treaties and conventions are cited as a contrast to the legal aid services available in BC. For example, the <u>International Covenant on Civil and Political</u> Rights (ICCPR) states:

Article 14(3) In the determination of any criminal charge against him, everyone shall be entitled to the following minimum guarantees, in full equality:

(d) – To be tried in his presence, and to defend himself in person or through legal assistance of his own choosing; to be informed, if he does not have legal assistance, of this right; and to have legal assistance assigned to him, in any case where the interests of justice so require, and without payment by him in any such case if he does not have sufficient means to pay for it. [emphasis added]

 The UN Human Rights Committee has confirmed that the right to counsel guaranteed by Article 14 of the ICCPR applies to the determination of both criminal charges and to "rights and obligations" in civil proceedings. The report is silent as to whether the determination of "rights and obligations" is solely in respect of the state or whether it applies in purely private civil matters.

- In May 2006, the Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (CESRC) noted an "inadequate availability of civil legal aid," particularly for economic and social rights. The CESRC expressed particular concern with cuts to civil legal aid in BC, concluding, "This leads to a situation where poor people, in particular single women, who are denied benefits and services to which they are entitled under domestic law, cannot access domestic remedies."
- The Committee on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination has determined that the International Convention on the Elimination of all forms of Racial Discrimination also imposes a duty to provide legal aid when it is necessary to do so to ensure the enjoyment by all of protected rights.
- A 2012 report commissioned by the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees found that recent changes to Canada's asylum procedures, together with cuts in legal aid funding across Canada, have resulted in an increase in unrepresented claims by persons seeking asylum in Canada. The report notes that this has a major impact on the fairness of the proceedings.
- The UN Basic Principles on the Role of Lawyers (1990) includes the following:
 - All persons are entitled to call upon the assistance of the lawyer of their choice to protect and establish their rights and to defend them in all stages of criminal proceedings.
 - 2. Government shall ensure that efficient procedures and responsive mechanisms for effective and equal access to lawyers are provided...without distinction of any kind, such as discrimination based on...property, birth, economic or other status.
 - Governments shall ensure the provision of sufficient funding and other resources for legal services to the poor and, as necessary, to other disadvantaged persons.
 - Governments shall ensure that all persons are immediately informed by the competent authority of their right to be assisted by a lawyer of their own choice upon arrest or detention, or when charged with a criminal offence.
- United Nations Principles and Guidelines on Access to Legal Aid in Criminal Justice Systems (2013) represent the first international instrument dedicated exclusively to the provision of legal aid. Drawn from international standards and recognized good practices, the Principles and Guidelines are intended to provide guidance to states on "... the fundamental principles on which a legal aid system in criminal justice should be based..." and "... outline the specific elements required for an effective and sustainable national legal aid system, in order to strengthen access to legal aid." The Principles and Guidelines have been interpreted as fully applicable to civil and administrative law cases.
- Noting that the aim of legal aid is "to contribute to the elimination of obstacles and barriers that impair or restrict access to justice," the Special Rapporteur of the Human Rights Council called for the broadest definition of legal aid possible, which should include not only the right to free legal assistance in criminal proceedings, but also the

provision of effective legal assistance in any judicial or extrajudicial procedure aimed at determining rights and obligations. It is unclear whether this is intended to apply to all civil proceedings, or simply the ones involving the state.

- The Report goes on to canvass the Rowbotham jurisprudence in Canada and notes that the rights under Canadian law do not go nearly as far as the International Law Requirements.
- With respect to the statutory scheme, the authors note that the statutory framework in BC does not enshrine a right to legal aid, the eligibility requirements for legal aid, or any appeal provisions for decisions from the legal aid provider. The International Principles and Guidelines suggest that states should have national legislation codifying these things. Apart from the absence of a "right" to legal aid, BC's statute empowers the legal aid provider to establish these things independent from government.
- The Report makes 20 recommendations for amendments to the Legal Services Society Act [SBC 2002 c. 30], and four other recommendations for the government generally. (see Appendix 1)

Although BC's statute does not create a right to legal aid, and there is a lack of
representation services for civil matters in BC's legal aid scheme, by and large BC
provides the majority of services that the international conventions and treaties require.
Qualifying individuals can select any lawyer they like as long as that lawyer takes legal
aid files; lawyers are available at all stages of a criminal proceeding for qualifying
individuals; BC provides legal aid in immigration and refugee matters; and while the
argument can be made that service reductions disproportionately affect women and
marginalized people, the scheme itself does not discriminate on the basis of gender,
religion, or nationality.

Thank you for your letter of 19 December 2014 acknowledging receipt of the LRWC publications on the international law rights to legal aid.

We would like to meet with you and Attorney General Anton to further discuss the international law obligations outlined in the LRWC reports and how these obligations affect individual rights and government obligations in the Province of British Columbia. While there are differences as to the exact nature of government duties to provide legal aid in BC, there is consensus and considerable evidence that the inadequacy of the present system has reached a crisis point.

We believe it would be useful for you to meet with LRWC members Michael Mulligan and Catherine Morris. Catherine Morris, who assisted with the editing of the LRWC publications, is an adjunct professor at the University of Victoria Faculty of Law specializing in international human rights law. Michael Mulligan is a leading advocate for fair legal aid in BC and is very informed about the mounting problems arising from inadequate legal aid coverage for both criminal and civil litigants in BC. Ms Morris will contact your office to arrange a meeting.

ISSUE: Legal aid tariffs, and lawyers accepting legal aid referrals.

SUMMARY:

- Legal aid tariff rates in BC have been the same since 2005 with the exception of the creation of the Exceptional Responsibility Premium (ERP) in 2010.
- Legal Services Society (LSS) tracks the number of lawyers accepting referrals by geographical areas of BC.

 Tariff rates in Alberta, Manitoba and Saskatchewan are not designated in a manner close enough to BC's legal aid tariff system to allow for easy or equitable comparison. Information on those systems is outlined below, with reference sources:

o Alberta:

In February 2008, Legal Aid Alberta launched a new tariff, for civil and criminal cases, that allowed roster lawyers to bill hours within a block without being restricted by a compartmentalized tariff. (See examples in Appendix A). The tariff has proven to be a useful and popular resource among roster lawyers.

Manitoba:

- Legal Aid Manitoba (LAM) uses a mixed system, with about half the cases handled by lawyers on staff (57 in fiscal 2013/14) and half by lawyers from the private bar.
- In fiscal 2013/14, LAM approved 81% of the total applications of 33,063, up slightly from the prior year at 77% of 33,286 applications.
- Tariffs: see Appendix A for examples.
- Saskatchewan: Legal Aid Saskatchewan currently offers two different billing options for criminal cases - an hourly rate or a fixed fee amount; for civil cases, the rate is hourly only. (See Appendix A for examples)

 - A lawyer is considered active if he:
 - submitted an invoice to LSS in the past four years; or
 - had a referral since April 1, 2008; or
 - had a system 'id' created for him by LSS; and
 - has not been blocked in their system.
- LSS policy and practice: LSS normally refers clients to the lawyer of their choice if the lawyer practices with 80 kilometres of the court in which the matter will be heard, provided the lawyer is willing to take the case.
 - Criminal cases: clients may choose a lawyer from outside the community where the case will be heard under certain conditions (eg: possibility of life imprisonment).
 - Family cases: counsel is appointed from the community where the case is being heard. If no local counsel is available, a lawyer from a different community may be appointed.
 - Other situations: clients may be referred to a lawyer of their choice from outside the community where the case will be heard only if that lawyer agrees to waive travel fees and expenses.

Alberta

In February 2008, LAA launched a new tariff for civil and criminal cases that allowed roster lawyers to bill hours within a block without being restricted by a compartmentalized tariff. The tariff has proven to be a useful and popular resource among roster lawyers. Examples:

- Criminal:
 - Pre-trial conference: \$168 (or \$148 for a Student-at-Law);
 - Guilty plea: \$252 (or \$222 for a Student-at-Law)
 - Appeal file opening fee: \$100.
- Civil:
 - File opening fee: \$100;
 - Base civil coverage: \$84/hour (or \$74/hour for a Student-at-Law); maximum
 30 hours:
 - Immigration: \$84/hour (or \$74/hour for a Student-at-Law).

 - Appeal: \$88/hour, 25 hour maximum (for preparation and trial).

Quebec

Quebec provides legal aid services through a mixed model of staff and private bar lawyers. The tariff of fees for lawyers in private practice is set out in an agreement between the Minister of Justice and the Barreau du Quebec. The current agreement is in effect until September 2017.

The agreement provides for a fixed fee for all legal services; no other fees, travel expenses or other expenses are eligible for reimbursement. Examples:

- For all services rendered until a decision on an agreement between the parties submitted for review of the judgment; \$400;
- Where legal aid is withdrawn under section 4.11.1 of the Act or the beneficiaries renounce before filing at the Registry of an agreement between the parties, the lawyer is entitled to all services he rendered at a flat fee of \$ 100.

I write in response to your letter of December 4, 2014, addressed to LSS Board Chair, Tom Christensen and have enclosed a draft three year LSS budget plan.

As a result of our very productive meeting December 17, 2014, Mr. Christensen asked that I prepare a revised budget plan for consideration by the LSS Board of Directors at its meeting January 15, 2015. That draft budget together with the supporting documentation you have requested is attached; it includes the additional revenue detail provided by your Ministry staff to LSS on December 30, 2014. It is my understanding that subject to the advice of the LSS' Board Finance Committee Mr. Christensen will be recommending this budget to the board.

The budget will remain in draft form until adopted by the board. In the interim I am forwarding it to you in keeping with your request of December 4, 2014.

On a related matter you may be aware that a draft Mandate Letter dated October 24, 2014 was forwarded on your behalf to the LSS Board for its consideration with the expectation that it would be executed by each Board member. Because that letter includes a specific direction to LSS that its Client Information System costs be kept within the bounds of the approved budget, the board has determined that the Mandate Letter terms cannot be endorsed until the budget itself is finalized. Accordingly the LSS response to that draft will be delayed until the budget process with your Ministry is completed.

Legal Services Society 2015/16 Budget Management Plan Principles, Assumptions, Key Cost Drivers and Budget Process January 9, 2015

Principles for 2015/16:

The final budget differentiates government and non-government funded services.

The final budget assumes LSS will provide services to the amount of the available budget. To accomplish this, LSS will:

- Monitor and, if necessary, adjust tariff budgets using the mitigation strategies included with this budget;
- Prioritize services in the following order: CFCSA, Family and Criminal; and
- Adjust referral volumes to provide services to the available budget.

Key Assumptions:

- 1. Revenues from the Provincial Government will remain at 2014/15 levels other than additional funds received under the Economic Stability Man-date.
- 2. Law Foundation funding was decreased by \$645K based on new funding levels.
- 3. Referral volumes will remain constant with 2014/15 levels.
- 4. The society will manage services to the total available budget.
- 5. No additional services will be provided by the society, other than additional Family Duty Counsel (see 7 below).
- 6. Justice Innovation Transformation Initiatives ("JITI") projects will be fully operational on or before April 1, 2015.
- 7. Client Information System ("CIS") goes live in 2015/16 and amortization costs will start once it's brought into production. The annual amortization is expected to cost up to \$430K per year on a full year basis.

Key Cost Drivers:

- All tariff budgets were calculated based on a fee code analysis rather than an estimate
 of the average case cost. This process is consistent with 2014/15. See Budget
 Development Process below for further details on the process followed.
- 2. Referral volumes were calculated using actual applications and referrals for each month over the past four and a half years.
- The Child, Family and Community Service Act ("CFCSA") budget has been increased by \$350k due to higher number of referrals compared to prior years and higher average case costs.

For Budget Management Plan for JAG - Jan.9/15

- 4. The amortization budget includes an additional \$430k for CIS amortization.
- 5. Does not include any amounts for salary increases, other than step increases for unionized staff and excluded non-management staff.
- 6. Included is a 2% increase in the cost of employee benefits.
- Included is an additional \$200k for Family Duty Counsel (to maintain 2014/15 service levels).
- 8. Included in the budget is an increase of \$67k for premises due to higher lease costs.

Risks Not Budgeted For:

- 1. The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for any changes to government policy, or new initiatives that may impact the society.
- 2. The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for higher volumes due to the Ministry of Children and Family Development ("MCFD") hiring 200 additional social workers.
- The tariff budgets have not been adjusted for any potential CIS or JITI impacts.
- 4. The tariff budgets were not adjusted for any referrals related to significant one-time events (eg. the Kinder Morgan anti-pipeline demonstrations)

Budget Development Process

Historical Budget Preparation using the Average Case Cost Model:

In prior years the society calculated a tariff budget by multiplying the number of cases expected in a particular tariff by the expected average case cost for that tariff.

We first reviewed the historical applications and referral rates for each tariff. We then estimated volumes by looking at application trends and anticipated referral rates for the coming year.

We then looked at the historical average case cost for each tariff and adjusted them for known changes to the tariff.

Eg. Number of Applications x Referral Rate = Number of referrals

Number of referrals x Average Case Cost = Tariff Budget

Disadvantages of the historical process:

- 1. Did not allow for any material changes in volumes from one year to the next
- 2. Did not consider the cost pattern of cases at different stages of the process
- 3. Did not allow for analysis of what was causing the average case cost to change until the cases were 18 months old (not proactive; it was reactive)

For Budget Management Plan for JAG - Jan.9/15

To overcome these disadvantages, the society changed the budgeting process in 2014/15 and beyond to include the following:

- 1. Referrals from prior years and a projection for the upcoming year
- 2. Base the budget on tariff fee codes per case
- 3. Reviewed the age of outstanding cases

Current Budget Development Process by Fee Code:

The 2015/16 Tariff Budgets have been developed based on fee items rather than the Average Case Cost model. In some cases a tariff might have over 200 separate fee codes that may apply. In order to do this the society analyzed all fees and disbursements for all invoices submitted for 3 years. Approximately 900,000 lines of data were consolidated and analysed to determine budgets by fee codes.

Fee Code Analysis Example:

To determine the budget for Family general prep fees, the cost for this fee item was consolidated based on actual invoices received from lawyers over a 3 - 12 month period, starting with September 1 through August 31, for the years 2012, 2013 and 2014. The data included total fees, total hours, the number of cases that billed general prep, and the total number of cases that billed during the 12 month period. This data is used to calculate:

- Average Hourly Rate
- The % of cases that billed that billed General Prep
- The average units per case that billed General Prep

This exercise was repeated for all major fee code items representing at least 90% of the total costs of the tariff. All other costs were consolidated into one group and budgeted as one item.

All budgeted fee codes and the other consolidated codes were totaled to determine the total budget for the tariff.

Review Process:

The above analysis was used to allocate the 2015/16 budget by fee code. This data is incorporated into a reporting structure and tested on a monthly basis if the actual results are consistent with the budget. From time to time we adjust services to clients based on actual results.

Testing now includes over 1.1 million rows of data.

PURPOSE: For DECISION of the Attorney General (AG)

ISSUE: Legal Services Society's (LSS) 2015/16 budget management plan.

SUMMARY:

 It is recommended that the AG send the attached letter (Attachment 4) to the LSS Board Chair (Chair) and approve LSS' 2015/16 budget management plan with a modification to the plan that was presented by the Chair in his letter and revised submission dated February 13, 2015 (Attachment 2).

BACKGROUND:

- LSS submitted the first version of their 2015/16 budget management plan on January 16, 2015.
- The AG sent a letter to the Chair on January 26, 2015, requesting resubmission of the budget management plan by February 17, 2015, to include:
 - forecast information and revisions to format, for analysis and comparability purposes; and
 - confirmation that LSS would continue to adhere to the guiding principles established last year for the management of LSS' 2014/15 budget:
 - the LSS Board will manage government funding to the bottom line and not to the individual tariff line items in the budget; and
 - the LSS Board will prioritize delivery of tariff services over administrative and operation costs, and among tariff services—the relative priority would be as follows: child protection; family; and criminal.
- On February 13, the Chair sent a letter accompanying the revised version of their 2015/16 budget management plan to the AG. The letter confirms agreement with the principles and priorities as requested by the AG, and included an attachment reflecting the forecast and formatting adjustments.
- On February 26, LSS staff indicated to ministry staff that their interpretation of the
 direction in the budget approval letter for fiscal year 2014/15 to manage to the bottom
 line applies to the \$2 million funding for Justice Transformation (JT). Wording is
 included in the recommended letter for 2015/16 to clarify that this is not the case.
 Dedicated funding envelopes (for major cases, federal high cost cases, immigration,
 drug court, community court as well as JT) must be directed to the purposes for which
 they are intended.

 LSS continues to advise of risks associated with its proposed budget management plan (e.g., amortization costs of a new technology system); however, ministry staff consider these to be relatively minor risks and will continue to monitor and work with LSS to manage these risks.

OTHER MINISTRIES IMPACTED/CONSULTED:

- Government's Budget 2015 has now been tabled in the House, confirming budget decisions related to LSS to be as anticipated by ministry staff and as approved by Treasury Board Staff's review of LSS's budget as presented in its Service Plan released on Budget Day.
- As such, the 2015/16 budget management plan that LSS submitted on February 13, 2015 now conforms to the conditions required for approval.
- Ministry staff recommend that the AG approve the budget, provided the \$2 million in JT funding is 'ring-fenced' and sign the attached letter to the Board Chair indicating her approval.

PURPOSE: For INFORMATION for Richard Fyfe, Deputy Minister

ISSUE: Lawyers' Rights Watch Canada Report – "The Right to Legal Aid: How British Columbia's Legal Aid System Fails to Meet International Human Rights Obligations."

SUMMARY:

- On October 1, 2014 Lawyers' Rights Watch Canada released a report titled "The Right
 to Legal Aid: How British Columbia's Legal Aid System Fails to Meet International
 Human Rights Obligations" (the "Report"). A compendium report was released at the
 same time titled "The Right to Legal Aid: A Handbook on International Law Rights to
 Legal Aid."
- The Report asserts that BC's legal aid system, including its statutory regime, fails to meet the international obligations by which BC is bound.
- The Report summarizes the services provided by the Legal Services Society in contrast
 to the articles of several international treaties and conventions, leading to the assertion
 that BC's legal aid system does not meet international obligations.
- The Report canvasses the various attempts at litigation around the issue of the
 "inadequacy" of legal aid funding/services in BC. It notes that litigation has failed to get
 any traction, and draws a link between the failed litigation and the fact that international
 obligations have not been asserted as a line of argument.

BACKGROUND:

Report summary

- The Report opens by canvassing the last 15 years of legal aid in BC funding reductions in 2002, leading to service reductions and a wholescale restructuring of legal aid provision.
- The authors cite the <u>Doust Report</u> and others, noting that the service reductions have had the greatest impact on women and marginalized people; further that "....the provincial and federal government are at risk of legal challenges that they are failing to meet their statutory, common law, constitutional, and international obligations."
- Various articles of treaties and conventions are cited as a contrast to the legal aid services available in BC. For example, the <u>International Covenant on Civil and Political</u> Rights (ICCPR) states:

Article 14(3) In the determination of any criminal charge against him, everyone shall be entitled to the following minimum quarantees, in full equality:

(d) – To be tried in his presence, and to defend himself in person or through legal assistance of his own choosing; to be informed, if he does not have legal assistance, of this right; and to have legal assistance assigned to him, in any case where the interests of justice so require, and without payment by him in any such case if he does not have sufficient means to pay for it. [emphasis added]

LAWYERS' RIGHTS WATCH REPORT 2014 Legal Aid Funding

MANDATE: Access to justice

VALUE: Our government recognizes the importance of supporting legal aid and is committed to encouraging innovation aimed at increasing access to justice.

TOP MESSAGES:

- We are aware of the report from Lawyers' Rights Watch Canada.
 Ministry staff is reviewing the report and considering its recommendations.
- As part of my mandate as Attorney General and Minister of Justice, I'm working hard to transform the system to ensure British Columbians have access to justice when they need it.
- We're increasing legal aid funding by an additional \$2 million in each of the next three years - bringing our total commitment to \$74.5 million in 2014/15.
- The extra \$6 million over the next three years will be used to fund five legal aid pilot projects:
 - Full-time family duty counsel at the Victoria Justice Access
 Centre
 - Provincial expansion of the Family LawLINE
 - An expanded criminal duty counsel pilot in two locations to be determined

 Implementation of a Parents Legal Centre for child protection matters

- o Testing of mediation referrals for family justice matters
- This extra funding will help increase access to family and criminal legal aid services, which will help support low-income British Columbians to find quicker resolutions with better outcomes.
- Access to justice, however, is more than access to court and legal representation. There are many situations – such as family law – where court is not the best option for resolving disputes.
- That's why government spends approximately \$30 million annually on access to justice services, such as family mediation at Family Justice Centres, Justice Access Centres and the Family Maintenance Enforcement Program.
- We are working on services to help prevent disputes, reach early resolutions and go to court only when necessary.

If asked about Canada's international human rights obligations:

- B.C. is fully aware of Canada's international human rights commitments.
- In fact, B.C.'s legal aid program provides legal representation in situations involving citizens' Charter rights, such as in criminal and child protection matters and in family situations where there is a risk of violence either to the applicant or his or her children.

If asked about enacting legislation:

 At this time we don't see the need to introduce a new law in this area. The Legal Services Society Act gives the LSS flexibility in determining how it can best deliver its services.

 Ministry staff is reviewing the report, however, we will consider its recommendations as we continue to work to improve access to justice for vulnerable British Columbians.

BACKGROUND:

The Lawyers' Rights Watch Report, "The Right to Legal Aid: How British Columbia's Legal Aid System Fails to Meet International Human Rights Obligations," will be released Oct. 1, 2014. The report asserts that B.C.'s legal aid system fails to meet international obligations that the province is bound by.

The authors of the report cite various other reports that assert government cuts to legal aid services have had the greatest impact on women and marginalized people. The report alleges "the provincial and federal governments are at risk of legal challenges that they are failing to meet their statutory, common law, constitutional, and international obligations."

To date, despite several attempts at litigation, it has not been demonstrated that British Columbia is failing to meet its Charter obligations. The authors of the Report make the case that in these attempts at litigation, a breach of international rights has not been asserted.

The report makes a total of 24 recommendations, including enacting legislation that would significantly expand B.C.'s legal aid program to ensure all people, regardless of economic status, would receive legal aid for most matters before the courts. The report also recommends the province engage in various forms of public engagement and inter-governmental dialogue — most of which the province is already doing in some capacity.

Recommendations:

- legal aid is available to all people—regardless of economic, social, or any other status to access the courts in all matters—including civil, administrative and criminal cases to ensure a right to a remedy for protection not only of the civil and political rights and freedoms enshrined in the Charter, but also of internationally protected economic, social, and cultural rights;
- 2. legal aid is provided, regardless of a person's means, where the interests of justice so require;
- "legal aid" is defined broadly, including, inter alia, legal education, access to legal
 information and other services provided for persons through alternative dispute
 resolution mechanisms and restorative justice processes, and any judicial or
 extrajudicial procedure aimed at determining rights and obligations;
- 4. effective legal aid is provided promptly at all stages of the judicial process;

- particular attention is paid to the improvement of legal aid in the areas of family and poverty law;
- 6. particular attention is paid to the needs of marginalized, vulnerable and historically oppressed groups regarding effective access to the justice system—this includes an emphasis on ensuring meaningful access to legal aid for women, children, indigenous peoples, individuals subjected to torture, and groups with special needs;
- 7. leadership from an independent legal profession is involved in determining methods of delivery;
- 8. information on the right to legal aid is made available to the general public through all appropriate means;
- 9. legal aid is provided, where appropriate, to victims and witnesses of crime, including crimes of domestic violence.
- 10. persons are informed of their right to legal aid and other procedural safeguards prior to any questioning and at the time of deprivation of liberty;
- 11. persons urgently requiring legal aid at police stations, detention centres or courts are provided preliminary legal aid while their eligibility is being determined;
- 12. the right to a remedy is guaranteed in the event that access to legal aid is undermined, delayed or denied or if persons have not been adequately informed of their right to legal aid;
- 13. minimum qualifications and training of professionals and paralegals working for the legal aid system are established and maintained;
- 14. legal protection of the rights of women is guaranteed on the basis of functional equality with men and ensure effective protection of women against all forms of discrimination;
- 15. legal aid is accessible, age-appropriate, multidisciplinary, effective and responsive to the specific legal and social needs of children, and that children are always exempt from any "means test";
- 16. specific criteria are listed to determine eligibility for legal aid, particularly with respect to the limits of the financial means that trigger eligibility;
- sufficient budgetary and human resources are allocated to ensure the maintenance of a comprehensive legal aid system that is accessible, effective, sustainable and credible;
- 18. where responsibilities to provide legal aid are shared among government and nongovernment legal aid providers, appropriate mechanisms are in place to facilitate effective coordination:
- 19. individuals have the right to appeal to an independent tribunal a decision on legal aid; and
- 20. the effectiveness and comprehensiveness of the legal aid system in British Columbia is consistently monitored, regularly reviewed, and continually improved.

LRWC also recommends the following:

- British Columbia should fund efforts of non-government organizations providing human rights advocacy, especially those working in cooperation with an independent legal profession;
- 2. British Columbia should engage in national and international dialogue and expand public engagement on the topic of legal aid;

- 3. British Columbia should establish public-private and other forms of partnerships to extend the reach of legal aid; and
- 4. In future cases concerning the right to legal aid, counsel should make submissions on international treaties, customary international law, and other international law obligations in connection with the right to legal aid.

In 2014/15, the Legal Services Society is receiving an additional \$2 million per year for three years — a total of \$6\$ million — for legal aid initiatives in the areas of criminal and family law.

SUMMARY:

- Legal aid tariff rates in BC have been the same since 2005 with the exception of the creation of the Exceptional Responsibility Premium (ERP) in 2010.
- Legal Services Society (LSS) tracks the number of lawyers accepting referrals by geographical areas of BC.
- The Law Society Task Force on Legal Service Providers is looking at how legal services can be provided by non-lawyers in some circumstances.

 Tariff rates in Alberta, Manitoba and Saskatchewan are not designated in a manner close enough to BC's legal aid tariff system to allow for easy or equitable comparison. Information on those systems is outlined below, with reference sources:

o Alberta:

In February 2008, Legal Aid Alberta launched a new tariff, for civil and criminal cases, that allowed roster lawyers to bill hours within a block without being restricted by a compartmentalized tariff. (See examples in Appendix A). The tariff has proven to be a useful and popular resource among roster lawyers.

o Manitoba:

- Legal Aid Manitoba (LAM) uses a mixed system, with about half the cases handled by lawyers on staff (57 in fiscal 2013/14) and half by lawyers from the private bar.
- In fiscal 2013/14, LAM approved 81% of the total applications of 33,063, up slightly from the prior year at 77% of 33,286 applications.
- · Tariffs: see Appendix A for examples.
- Saskatchewan: Legal Aid Saskatchewan currently offers two different billing options for criminal cases - an hourly rate or a fixed fee amount; for civil cases, the rate is hourly only. (See Appendix A for examples)

 - Criminal cases: clients may choose a lawyer from outside the community where the case will be heard under certain conditions (eg: possibility of life imprisonment).
 - Family cases; counsel is appointed from the community where the case is being heard. If no local counsel is available, a lawyer from a different community may be appointed.
 - Other situations: clients may be referred to a lawyer of their choice from outside the community where the case will be heard only if that lawyer agrees to waive travel fees and expenses.

Non-Lawyer Services

The Law Society Task Force on Legal Service Providers (the Task Force) was
created to develop a framework to enable regulation of other existing, or new, legal
service providers. It has been focusing on the areas of public need and the types of
services that are required to meet that need and whether enabling a service provider
other than lawyers to provide legal services would address some access to justice

Quebec

Quebec provides legal aid services through a mixed model of staff and private bar lawyers. The tariff of fees for lawyers in private practice is set out in an agreement between the Minister of Justice and the Barreau du Quebec. The current agreement is in effect until September 2017.

The agreement provides for a fixed fee for all legal services; no other fees, travel expenses or other expenses are eligible for reimbursement. Examples:

- For all services rendered until a decision on an agreement between the parties submitted a joint request for review of the judgment: \$400;
- Where legal aid is withdrawn under section 4.11.1 of the Act or the beneficiaries renounce before filing at the Registry of an agreement between the parties, the lawyer is entitled to all services he rendered at a flat fee of \$ 100.
