City proposes framework to regulate marijuana-related businesses

Next week City Council will hear a proposal put forward by City staff to create a new business licence category as well as clear zoning requirements that all retail marijuana-related businesses would need to adhere to. The City has no jurisdiction to regulate the sale of marijuana but it does have clear jurisdiction to regulate how and where businesses operate in our city.

In the last two years, the City has seen a rapid growth rate of 100 per cent per year in marijuana-related businesses, including from 60 to 80 in the last four months alone. The proposed framework looks to achieve a careful balance between ensuring adequate availability for those in need and ensuring community health, safety, security, aesthetics, equity and enjoyment of property. Up to now there has been a lack of a clear and transparent regulatory framework from the Federal Government.

The City is proposing a balanced approach based on best practice research and input from key partners such as the VPD, Vancouver School Board, Vancouver Coastal Health, business improvement areas and several key stakeholders in the industry.

Key points under the proposed framework for marijuana-related businesses, include:

- 300m distancing from schools, community centers and neighbourhood houses
 - o (Existing practice is 1000ft as established in WA and CO states)
- 300m distancing from other marijuana-related businesses
 - o (Existing practice is 1000ft as established in WA and CO states)
- Implement a licensing fee (\$30,000) to recover costs from the significant burden across the City to manage and enforce new regulatory framework
- · Operators must sign a Good Neighbour Agreement
- Operators require a Development Permit which would include a standard community notification process
- Geographic restrictions specific to unique areas in the city, limiting them to commercial areas

Applicants will be required to go through a three stage review process, which includes a point-based evaluation criteria, in order to obtain a business licence.

Staff will work with the sector over the coming weeks to ensure an understanding of the regulatory framework prior to enactment and implementation.

Council may refer this proposal to a Public Hearing at a yet-to-be determined date where interested parties will have an opportunity to speak.

CITY OF VANCOUVER

MANDATE: Ensure B.C. law is upheld.

TOP MESSAGES:

- I am aware of a recent proliferation of marijuana-related businesses and that the City of Vancouver is proposing a regulatory framework for them.
- My understanding is that the proposal has not yet been presented to Council. I am not going to speculate on Vancouver's proposal before having had a chance to study it.
- For now, what I can say is that possession of marijuana falls under federal legislation. It is prohibited under the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act, though there are exceptions for medicinal use.
- This is a complex issue and I look forward to receiving further details.

If asked whether government will tax marijuana sales:

 Again, this is a complex issue. I will defer to the Minister of Finance on questions related to taxation.

If asked about police enforcement of marijuana:

- The Province doesn't make operational decisions for police, who decide independently on investigations.
- They have the ability to use discretion in their day-to-day operations as they work in the best way possible to uphold the law.

I was following up a wire story that moved a day or so ago saying,

Crown spokesman Gordon Comer said 285 of the 300 people charged pleaded guilty, seven were convicted, and one was acquitted. Charges were not approved against 66 others. He said charges were stayed against four others, a decision against two people will be announced in September and that a warrant remains outstanding against a woman who returned to Australia. There are 11 people awaiting sentencing and there are two people who are awaiting a verdict, he said. The branch has not received any reports since last October from police recommending charges, and Comer said he's not expecting any more. He said a substantial number of Crown lawyers have worked full time on the files for a few years, and the branch has spent nearly \$4.5 million pursuing prosecutions stemming from the riot.

The \$4.5 million seems high to me — that's \$15,000 a piece for the 300 cases that they proceeded with — 285 were guilty pleas, there were eight trials, seven convictions and an acquittal. They didn't proceed with 66 cases. How did the Crown spend \$15,000 on average per case when almost all were guilty pleas? None of the costs included court time, legal aid or judicial costs, apparently.

Are the figures quoted correct and is there a breakdown of that \$4.5 million, which incidentally I believe is more than the damage caused by the riot.
