- November employment grew by 23,900 (1.0%) and the unemployment rate fell by 0.9 pct pts to 7.1%, now 2.1 pct pts above the February rate.
- Employment gains were led by full-time work (+42,100) as part-time (-18,200) decreased, yet full-time work remains 59,800 lower than one year ago.
 - Compared to one year ago, employment for women was down 21,300, while employment for men was down 25,500.
- The youth unemployment rate fell by 1.5 pct pts to 14.1%, from a peak of 29% in May and June.








EMPLOYMENT GAINS/LOSSES BY PROVINCE



UNEMPLOYMENT RATE BY PROVINCE







COVID Supplement - November 2020 (Dec 4 release).docx

Good morning,

Statistics Canada released November 2020 Labour Force Survey (LFS) estimates this morning for the reference week of November 8th to November 14th.

Along with the standard LFS summary, attached is a COVID supplement which includes comparisons to February 2020 for the province with provincial rankings.

COVID impacts

- TOTAL EMPLOYMENT in BC was 2,444,300 in November up 1.0% (+23,900) from October and combined with gains of 35,200 from May to October, BC employment now totals 98.5% of it's pre-COVID February level;
- Since February, FULL-TIME employment in BC decreased by 2.9% (-56,900) while PART-TIME employment in BC increased by 3.6% (+19,500).
- The number of British Columbians who were employed but worked less than half their usual hours for reasons likely related to COVID-19 dropped by 20,500 (-12.0%) in November;
- Combined with declines recorded from May to October, this left COVID-related absences from work at 29,900 (+24.9%) above February levels;

Presented below are a few provincial comparisons for the <u>year-over-year</u> change from **November 2019 to November 2020**:

- TOTAL employment in BC decreased by 1.8% (-46,800) from 12 months ago. All but two provinces
 posted decreases in employment with Ontario posting a decline of 2.9% and Alberta a decrease of
 5.2%.
- FULL-TIME employment in BC decreased by 3.0% (-59,800). Full-time employment dropped in all except two provinces with Ontario down 1.9% and Alberta down 7.6%.

- PART-TIME employment in BC increased by 2.4% (+13,000). Nearly half of the provinces posted declines in part-time employment, including Ontario (-7.5%). Part-time employment grew in Alberta (+5.5%).
- PRIVATE SECTOR employment in BC decreased by 1.8% (-29,000). All provinces saw private sector employment decline with Ontario dropping by 2.8% and Alberta down 7.2%.
- SELF-EMPLOYMENT in BC decreased by 8.6% (-39,600). Self-employment in Alberta was down by 2.2%, and Ontario was down 4.0%.
- PUBLIC SECTOR employment in BC increased by 4.7% (+21,800). Alberta decreased by 0.9% and Ontario decreased by 2.5%.
- The UNEMPLOYMENT RATE in BC now stands at 7.1%. Nova Scotia (6.4%) had the lowest unemployment rate, while it was 9.1% in Ontario, and 11.1% in Alberta.
 - Since November 2019, BC's unemployment rate has increased by 2.1 percentage points (from 5.0%). Over the period November 2019 to November 2020, Alberta's unemployment rate increased by 3.9 percentage points (from 7.2%), and Ontario's increased by 3.6 percentage points (from 5.5%).
- The AVERAGE HOURLY WAGE in BC was \$29.94 in November, while in Alberta it was \$32.93 and in Ontario it was \$30.08.
 - o AVERAGE HOURLY WAGES in BC increased by 5.0% (+\$1.42) since November 2019. Similarly, wages were up 4.8% in Ontario and 4.7% in Alberta.

Presented below are a few provincial comparisons for the change from January 2020 to November 2020:

- TOTAL employment in BC decreased by 1.7% (-43,900) from January 2020. All but two provinces posted declines with Ontario down by 3.4% and Alberta down 4.4%.
- FULL-TIME employment in BC decreased by 2.7% (-53,500) since January 2020. Full-time employment was lower in all except one province, with Ontario falling 2.6% and Alberta decreasing by 6.4%.
- PRIVATE SECTOR employment in BC decreased by 1.9% (-31,500) compared to January 2020. Private sector employment dropped in all provinces with Ontario down by 3.7% and Alberta declining by 5.4%.
- AVERAGE HOURLY WAGES in BC increased 3.9% (+\$1.11) since January 2020. Similarly, wages grew in Alberta (+3.6%) and Ontario (+3.3%).
- Compared to January 2020, BC's unemployment rate increased by 2.6 percentage points (from 4.5%). Over the period January 2020 to November 2020, all but one province reported increases in their unemployment rates with an increase of 3.8 points (from 7.3%) for Alberta and 3.9 points (from 5.2%) for Ontario.

- The unemployment rate is now 7.1%, down 0.9 percentage points from October (8.0%);




COVID-19 Overall Impacts to Date













Duration of Unemployment










Full-time/Part-time Employment

(Change since February)




Employment by Education Level

(Percentage change since February)





Unemployment Rate by Age








Labour Force Characteristics by Sex

Unemployment Rate by Sex







Here are the Labour Force Survey Highlights for November 2020, and the briefing is attached:

- The November results released today reflect conditions during the survey reference week of November 8-14th.
 - On Nov 7th there were restrictions applied to the Fraser and the Vancouver Coastal Health Regions, limiting socialization between households, restricting gatherings and advising against non-essential travel. These restrictions were extended across the Province on Nov 19th.
 - Additional measures were implemented on November 23rd for high-intensity fitness activities, along with the mandatory mask requirement for indoor spaces. Any impacts from these would not appear in the November 2020 Labour Force Survey as they were implemented after the survey reference week.
- The recovery in BC continued at a slower pace in November with employment increasing by 23,900 (1.0%), building
 on strong gains in September (54,800) and October (33,500). Employment in November was 37,400 (-1.5%) below
 pre-COVID (February 2020) levels.
- Employment levels were still lower than the same time last year: there were 46,800 fewer people employed in British Columbia in November 2020 than in November 2019.
- There were strong gains in full-time (+42,100) coupled with losses part-time (-18,200) employment in November. Full-time employment remains lower than one year ago, down 59,800, whereas part-time work (+13,000) has increased from one year ago.
- Employment for men increased by 26,500 and employment for women decreased by 2,600. Although men experienced employment gains in November, they still have a higher unemployment rate (7.9%) than women (6.3%).

- Compared to one year ago, employment for women in November 2020 was down 21,300, while employment for men was down 25,500.
- The number of unemployed declined by -10.5% (-22,600) in November, remaining up 57,900 from one year ago. The unemployment rate fell for the sixth consecutive month, down 0.9 percentage points in November to 7.1%, but is still 2.1 percentage points above the February unemployment rate.
 - o BC's unemployment rate (7.1%) is below Canada's (8.5%).
- Youth (age 15-24) employment increased by 5,300 in November, building on the moderate gains in October (5,000). The youth unemployment rate decreased by 1.5 percentage points, to 14.1% in November from a peak of 29% in May and June, yet it is still up 5 percentage points since February.
- Sectors that had been hard hit by the Pandemic were leading the gains in November: Accommodation and food services (+7,300), Transportation and warehousing (+6,300), Wholesale and retail trade (+6,200) and Construction (+5,700). Sectors leading the losses were Manufacturing (-4,700), Information, culture and recreation (-4,400), and Agriculture (-2,300).
 - Cumulative employment losses since February 2020 in the sectors are led by Construction (-34,400), Wholesale and Retail Trade (-26,600), Other services (except public administration) (-11,900) and Transportation and warehousing (-7,600).

Canada:

- In November, employment rose by 62,000 (0.3%), following an increase of 2.31 million between May and September after the drop of over three million in March and April.
- The unemployment rate was 8.5% in November, a drop of 0.4 percentage points from the previous month (8.9%). In February, prior to the COVID-19 economic shutdown, the unemployment rate was 5.6%.

Statistics Canada released November 2020 Labour Force Survey (LFS) estimates this morning for the reference week of November 8th to November 14th.

Along with the standard LFS summary, attached is a COVID supplement which includes comparisons to February 2020 for the province with provincial rankings.

COVID impacts

- TOTAL EMPLOYMENT in BC was 2,444,300 in November up 1.0% (+23,900) from October and combined with gains of 35,200 from May to October, BC employment now totals 98.5% of it's pre-COVID February level;
- Since February, FULL-TIME employment in BC decreased by 2.9% (-56,900) while PART-TIME employment in BC increased by 3.6% (+19,500).
- The number of British Columbians who were employed but worked less than half their usual hours for reasons likely related to COVID-19 dropped by 20,500 (-12.0%) in November;
- Combined with declines recorded from May to October, this left COVID-related absences from work at 29,900 (+24.9%) above February levels;

Presented below are a few provincial comparisons for the <u>year-over-year</u> change from **November 2019 to November 2020**:

- TOTAL employment in BC decreased by 1.8% (-46,800) from 12 months ago. All but two provinces
 posted decreases in employment with Ontario posting a decline of 2.9% and Alberta a decrease of
 5.2%.
- FULL-TIME employment in BC decreased by 3.0% (-59,800). Full-time employment dropped in all except two provinces with Ontario down 1.9% and Alberta down 7.6%.

- PART-TIME employment in BC increased by 2.4% (+13,000). Nearly half of the provinces posted declines in part-time employment, including Ontario (-7.5%). Part-time employment grew in Alberta (+5.5%).
- PRIVATE SECTOR employment in BC decreased by 1.8% (-29,000). All provinces saw private sector employment decline with Ontario dropping by 2.8% and Alberta down 7.2%.
- SELF-EMPLOYMENT in BC decreased by 8.6% (-39,600). Self-employment in Alberta was down by 2.2%, and Ontario was down 4.0%.
- PUBLIC SECTOR employment in BC increased by 4.7% (+21,800). Alberta decreased by 0.9% and Ontario decreased by 2.5%.
- The UNEMPLOYMENT RATE in BC now stands at 7.1%. Nova Scotia (6.4%) had the lowest unemployment rate, while it was 9.1% in Ontario, and 11.1% in Alberta.
 - Since November 2019, BC's unemployment rate has increased by 2.1 percentage points (from 5.0%). Over the period November 2019 to November 2020, Alberta's unemployment rate increased by 3.9 percentage points (from 7.2%), and Ontario's increased by 3.6 percentage points (from 5.5%).
- The AVERAGE HOURLY WAGE in BC was \$29.94 in November, while in Alberta it was \$32.93 and in Ontario it was \$30.08.
 - AVERAGE HOURLY WAGES in BC increased by 5.0% (+\$1.42) since November 2019. Similarly, wages were up 4.8% in Ontario and 4.7% in Alberta.

Presented below are a few provincial comparisons for the change from January 2020 to November 2020:

- TOTAL employment in BC decreased by 1.7% (-43,900) from January 2020. All but two provinces posted declines with Ontario down by 3.4% and Alberta down 4.4%.
- FULL-TIME employment in BC decreased by 2.7% (-53,500) since January 2020. Full-time employment was lower in all except one province, with Ontario falling 2.6% and Alberta decreasing by 6.4%.
- PRIVATE SECTOR employment in BC decreased by 1.9% (-31,500) compared to January 2020. Private sector employment dropped in all provinces with Ontario down by 3.7% and Alberta declining by 5.4%.
- AVERAGE HOURLY WAGES in BC increased 3.9% (+\$1.11) since January 2020. Similarly, wages grew in Alberta (+3.6%) and Ontario (+3.3%).
- Compared to January 2020, BC's unemployment rate increased by 2.6 percentage points (from 4.5%). Over the period January 2020 to November 2020, all but one province reported increases in their unemployment rates with an increase of 3.8 points (from 7.3%) for Alberta and 3.9 points (from 5.2%) for Ontario.






EMPLOYMENT GAINS/LOSSES BY PROVINCE



UNEMPLOYMENT RATE BY PROVINCE







Sectors leading the losses were Manufacturing (-4,700), Information, culture and recreation (-4,400), and Agriculture (-2,300).
 - Cumulative employment losses since February 2020 in the sectors are led by Construction (-34,400), Wholesale and Retail Trade (-26,600),
 Other services (except public administration) (-11,900) and Transportation and warehousing (-7,600).

Canada:

- In November, employment rose by 62,000 (0.3%), following an increase of 2.31 million between May and September after the drop of over three million in March and April.
- The unemployment rate was 8.5% in November, a drop of 0.4 percentage points from the previous month (8.9%). In February, prior to the COVID-19 economic shutdown, the unemployment rate was 5.6%.

Job gains in November is the 7th consecutive months of job creation. This brought BC's employment to 98.5% of pre-pandemic levels. (Quebec 97.5, Ontario 96.7, Alberta 95.1)
