Regional Economic Indicators

General Economic Strengths

Highlights:

- BC's employment recovery is 102.9% since the start of the pandemic, third among provinces (behind PEI at 104.8% and Alberta at 103.9%). Since January 2022, the Province has been among the top 5 provinces in employment recovery; however, it has not ranked first for the last four consecutive months
- BC has the second lowest unemployment rate (4.8%) among provinces (behind QC at 4.5%)
- BC's employment was down by 28,100 in August
- August's employment losses were distributed across industries – the only industries with gains were agriculture (+700); construction (+2,300); finance, insurance, real estate, rental and leasing (+600); other services (+5,500); and public administration (+400)
- Median employment income in BC increased 19.8% between 2015 and 2020, from \$31,713 to \$38,000

Visible minorities:

- Visible minority employment in August was up slightly, by 700 compared to July
- BC's visible minority unemployment rate is 5.7%, up 0.4 percentage points from last month, and remaining well below the national average of 6.9%.

Regional Economic Indicators

Prince George

- Prince George's population was 82,326 in 2021, up 0.2% from the previous year.
- Prince George-specific unemployment data is unavailable, but the unemployment rate for the Cariboo economic region was 6.2% in Aug 2022, a decrease from 6.3% the previous month
- Median employment income in Prince George increased 22.6% between 2015 and 2020, from \$36,545 to \$44,800
- In 2021, the City of Prince George issued 508 new business licenses, down 1.6% from 518 in 2020
- From January to July 2022, the city issued commercial building permits worth \$39.2 million, up 334.6% compared with the same period in 2021
- The city issued 222 residential building permits from January to July 2022, down 53.8% from the same period in 2021, valued at \$84 million (down 25.8%)
- There were 535 housing starts in Prince George between January to August 2022, up 130.6% from 232 in the same period in 2021

Kelowna

- The population of Kelowna was 149,687 in 2021, up 2.2% from the previous year
- The unemployment rate was 4.1% in Aug 2022, an increase from 3.7% the previous month
- In 2021, Kelowna issued 369 business licenses, up 14.2% from 2020
- Median employment income in Kelowna increased 38.6% between 2015 and 2020, from \$30,025 to \$41,600

- From January to July 2022, the city issued commercial building permits worth \$147.7 million, down 29.7% compared with the same period in 2021
- The city issued 1,624 residential building unit permits from January to July 2022, down 23.5% from the same period in 2021, valued at \$618.4 million (down 1.7%)
- There were 2,260 housing starts in Kelowna between January to August 2022, up 13.3% from the same period in 2021.
- The number of airport passengers at YLW reached 159,517 in July 2022, up 63.9% from 97,335 in July 2021.

Kamloops

- The population of Kamloops was 97,902 in 2021, up 0.6% from the previous year.
- Kamloops-specific unemployment data is unavailable, but the unemployment rate for the Thompson-Okanagan economic region was 5.0% in August 2022, stable from 5.0% the previous month
- Median employment income in Kamloops increased 30.5% between 2015 and 2020, from \$33,091 to \$43,200
- In 2021, Kamloops issued 92 business licenses, down 59.6% from 2020
- From January to July 2022, the city issued commercial building permits worth \$36.4 million, up 273.1% compared with the same period in 2021
- The city issued 282 residential building unit permits from January to July 2022, up 17% from the same period in 2021, valued at \$87.2 million YTD (up 19.5%)
- There were 289 housing starts in Kamloops between January to August 2022, down 42.9% from the same period in 2021.

Surrey

- The population of Surrey was 568,322 in 2021, up 9.7% from the previous year.
- Surrey-specific unemployment data is unavailable, but the unemployment rate for Metro Vancouver was 5.2% in August 2022, up from 4.9% the previous month.
- Median employment income in Surrey increased 22.1% between 2015 and 2020, from \$30,804 to \$37,600
- In 2021, Surrey issued 2640 business licenses, down 0.9% from 2020
- From January to July 2022, or year-to-date (YTD), the city issued commercial building permits worth \$260 million, up 53.4% compared with the same period in 2021
- The city issued 3,573 residential building unit permits from January to July 2022, down 2.8% from the same period in 2021, valued at \$1.1 billion (up 11.7%)
- There were 2,175 housing starts in Surrey between January to August 2022, down 53.1% from the same period in 2021.

Please see attached for the first delivery of the LFS Highlight Tables.

All data are updated, except for Indigenous Peoples. I'll send an updated file with these data as soon as we have them, ~6.15-6.30.

Highlights:

- BC's employment recovery is 104.1%, **second** among provinces (behind Alberta at 104.4%). This is the fifth consecutive month that BC has not ranked first among provinces in recovery.
- BC's employment is up by 32,900 in September.
- BC has the second lowest unemployment rate (4.3%) among provinces (behind Saskatchewan at 4.1%).
- September's employment gains are driven by the private sector – private sector employment is up by 30,200.

Visible minorities:

- Visible minority employment in September is down by 4,200 compared to August.
- BC's visible minority unemployment rate is 5.4%, down 0.3 percentage points from last month, and remaining well below the national average of 6.7%.

Hi Sarah – please see below, along with comparisons to Alberta migration. YTD is also Q1 + Q2.

- BC's total net migration year to date for 2022 was 69,731 – up 55.0 per cent (+24,757) compared to the same timeframe in 2021.
- BC's 2022 year to date net interprovincial migration of 7,110 was the third highest in the country, behind only Alberta (14,707) and Nova Scotia (8,894). Ontario (-33,125), Manitoba (-4,592) and Saskatchewan (-3,273) were the only provinces with negative net interprovincial migration in the first two quarters of 2022.
- For 2022 YTD, the net interprovincial migration flow of people is from BC to Alberta; 19,780 people moved from Alberta to BC, and 20,647 people moved from BC to Alberta – for a net flow of 867 people from BC to Alberta.
- BC's 2022 year to date net international migration was 62,621 – the highest first two quarters on record (records kept since 1961). BC's first two quarters of 2022 net international migration is 78.4% higher than the previous first two quarter record of 35,096 in Q1 and Q2 2019.

- BC was second in Canada, behind only Ontario (194,534) and ahead of Quebec (56,654), Alberta (36,997), and all other provinces.

Please see attached for the first delivery of the LFS Highlight Tables.

All data are updated, except for Indigenous Peoples. I'll send an updated file with these data as soon as we have them, ~6.15-6.30.

Highlights:

- BC's employment recovery is 104.1%, **second** among provinces (behind Alberta at 104.4%). This is the fifth consecutive month that BC has not ranked first among provinces in recovery.
- BC's employment is up by 32,900 in September.
- BC has the second lowest unemployment rate (4.3%) among provinces (behind Saskatchewan at 4.1%).
- September's employment gains are driven by the private sector – private sector employment is up by 30,200.

Visible minorities:

- Visible minority employment in September is down by 4,200 compared to August.
- BC's visible minority unemployment rate is 5.4%, down 0.3 percentage points from last month, and remaining well below the national average of 6.7%.

Highlights:

- BC's employment recovery is 104.1%, **second** among provinces (behind Alberta at 104.4%). This is the fifth consecutive month that BC has not ranked first among provinces in recovery.
- BC's employment is up by 32,900 in September.
- BC has the second lowest unemployment rate (4.3%) among provinces (behind Saskatchewan at 4.1%).
- September's employment gains are driven by the private sector – private sector employment is up by 30,200.

Visible minorities:

- Visible minority employment in September is down by 4,200 compared to August.
- BC's visible minority unemployment rate is 5.4%, down 0.3 percentage points from last month, and remaining well below the national average of 6.7%.

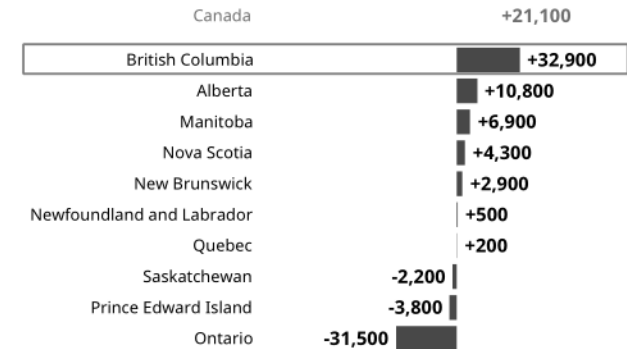

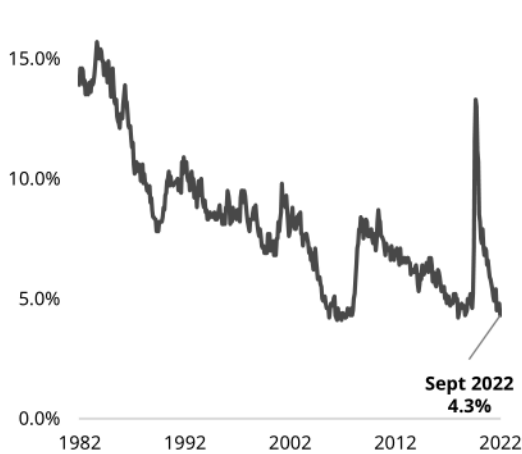

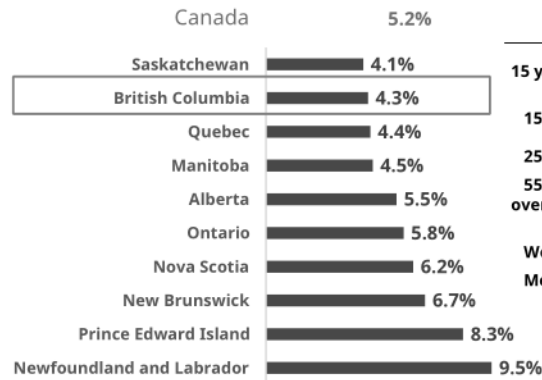
MONTHLY EMPLOYMENT CHANGE BY PROVINCE



B.C. UNEMPLOYMENT RATE



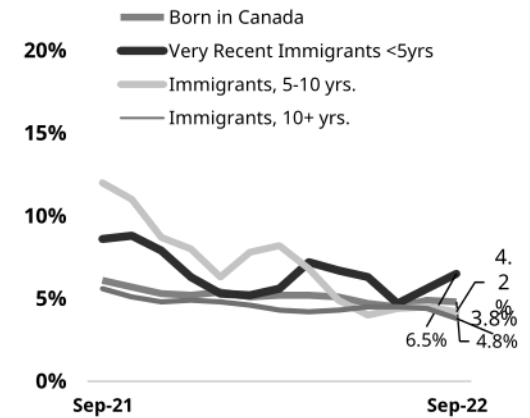
UNEMPLOYMENT RATE BY PROVINCE

Here are the Labour Force Survey Highlights for September 2022, and the briefing is attached:

- The results released today reflect conditions during the survey reference week of September 11-17, 2022.
 - Employment in B.C. increased by 32,900 in September, erasing last month's losses (28,000).
 - B.C.'s unemployment rate dropped 0.5 pct pts to 4.3% and remains below Canada's (5.2%) this month.
- Both part-time (22,400) and full-time (10,500) work had gains in September.
 - Private sector led the gains (30,200) followed by the public sector (5,400), while self-employment (2,700) decreased.
 - Employment increased by 9,000 for females and 24,000 for males.
 - The most recent EI Beneficiary data (June 2022) shows there were 44,020 EI Beneficiaries, slightly above February 2020 (41,740).
 - The most recent job vacancy data shows there were 153,060 vacancies in July 2022. August data will be released on October 27, 2022.
- Youth (age 15-24) employment increased by 6,400. The youth unemployment rate decreased by 0.8 percentage points, to 8.6% in September. The pre-pandemic youth unemployment rate in February 2020 was 9.4%.
- In September, the participation in the labour market in B.C. was 68.6% for visible minorities, and 63.7% for non-visible minorities. The unemployment rate was 5.4% for visible minorities, and 4.5% for non-visible minorities.
 - In Canada, the participation in the labour market was 71.2% for visible minorities, and 63.4% for non-visible minorities. The unemployment rate was 6.7% for visible minorities, and 4.8% for non-visible minorities.
 - Note, these are seasonally unadjusted numbers. The comparable seasonally unadjusted provincial average unemployment rate for B.C. was 3.9%.
 - StatsCan uses the Employment Equity Act definition, that visible minorities are "persons, other than Aboriginal peoples, who are non-Caucasian in race or non-white in colour."
- Sectors leading the gains in September: Educational services (12,300), Professional, scientific and technical services (10,500), Finance, insurance, real estate, rental and leasing (6,300), and Accommodation and food services (5,500). Sectors leading the losses were Manufacturing (5,900), Other services (except public administration) (3,100), and Public administration (2,900).
 - Cumulative employment gains since February 2020 in the sectors are led by Professional, scientific and technical services (50,700), Health care and social assistance (46,700), Educational services (28,300) and Information, culture and recreation (26,500).
 - Cumulative employment losses since February 2020 in the sectors are led by Accommodation and food services (21,200), Business, building and other support services (19,500), Other services (except public administration) (11,600), and Construction (10,900).

Canada:

- Employment increased by 21,100 in September.
- Employment gains were led by British Columbia followed by Alberta, Manitoba, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, while there were fewer people working in Ontario and Prince Edward Island.
- After increasing 0.5 percentage points to 5.4% in August, the unemployment rate dropped to 5.2% in September.
- The unemployment rate in B.C. was the second lowest of Canadian provinces (Sask 4.1%, BC 4.3%).

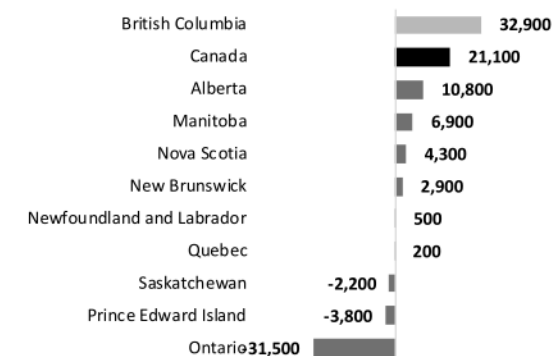

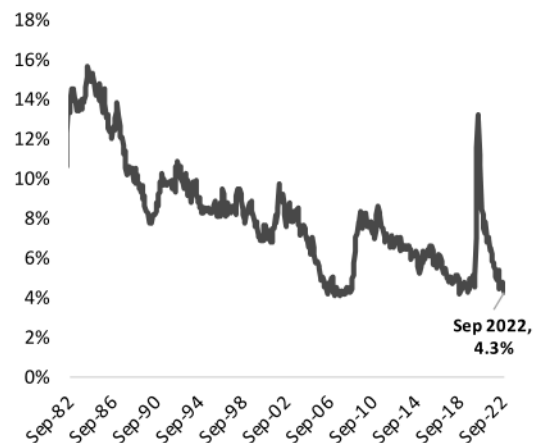

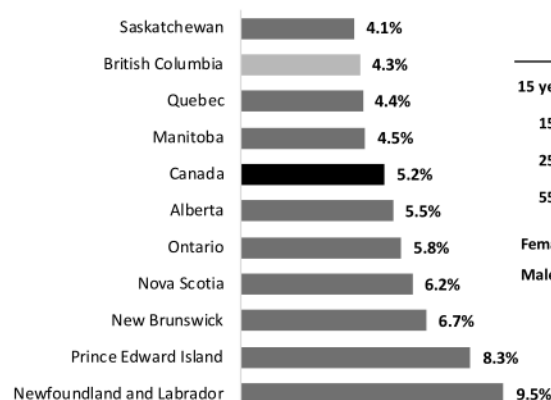
MONTHLY EMPLOYMENT CHANGE BY PROVINCE



B.C. UNEMPLOYMENT RATE



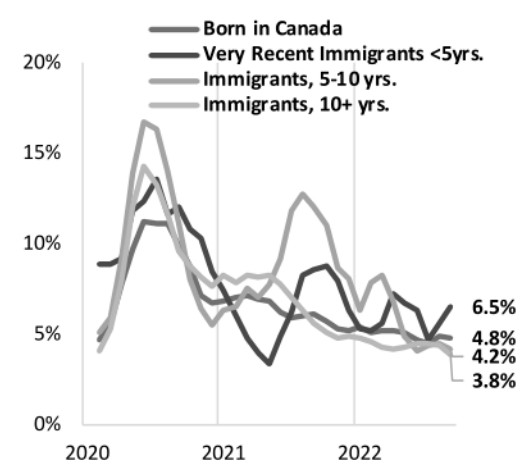
UNEMPLOYMENT RATE BY PROVINCE

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B.C. Highlights

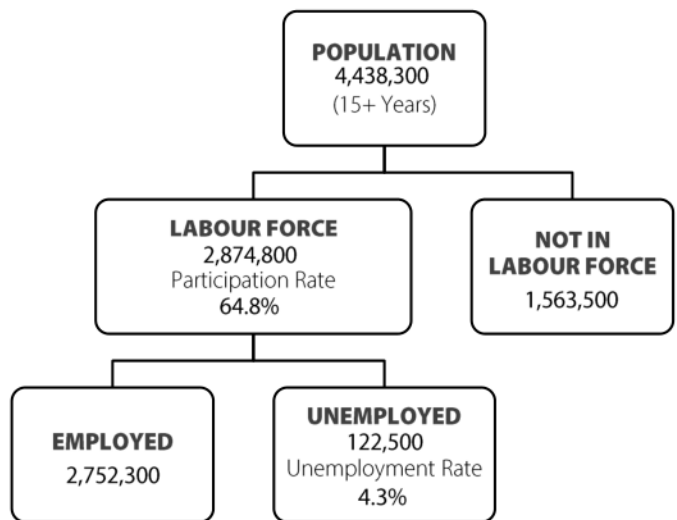
The unemployment rate in British Columbia was 4.3% in September, down 0.5 percentage points from August and down 1.6 percentage points from 12 months ago. In September, the labour force increased (+18,100) from August, and the number of jobs grew (+32,900). Employment was up by 72,600 from 12 months ago, and the labour force grew by 26,900.

Compared to August, there were 10,500 more full-time and 22,400 more part-time jobs in September. Full-time employment increased for those aged 25 to 54 (+17,600) and decreased for those aged 15 to 24 (-3,800), and 55 and over (-3,400). There were more part-time positions for those aged 15 to 24 (+10,200), 25 to 54 (+1,900), and 55 and over (+10,200).

In September, employment increased in both the private (+30,200) and public (+5,400) sectors. The number of self-employed individuals was down (-2,700) compared to August.

Provincial Comparisons

At 4.3%, British Columbia's unemployment rate was the second lowest in Canada during the month of September. The lowest unemployment rate was in Saskatchewan (4.1%), followed by British Columbia



(4.3%), Quebec (4.4%), and Manitoba (4.5%). Alberta (5.5%) had the fifth lowest rate.

National Highlights

In Canada, employment increased with 21,100 more jobs in September than in August. The unemployment rate was 5.2%, down 0.2 percentage points from August and down 1.8 percentage points from 12 months ago.

Gender

Compared to August, employment in British Columbia for men (aged 25 years and over) increased by 12,100, while the labour force expanded by 7,600. As a result,

the unemployment rate for men was 3.5% in September, down from 3.9% in August. For women (aged 25 years and over), there were 14,500 more jobs in September, and 6,900 women joined the labour force. The unemployment rate for women was 3.7%, down 0.6 percentage points from August.

Compared to September 2021, the unemployment rate for men was down 1.6 percentage points to 3.5%, while the rate for women decreased 1.6 percentage points to 3.7%. Jobs for men increased by 24,200 (+2.0%) from 12 months ago, while employment for women increased by 55,100 (+5.0%).

Youth Aged 15 to 24

The unemployment rate for youth aged 15 to 24 was 8.6% in September, down from 9.4% the previous month. Total employment for those aged 15 to 24 increased by 6,400, while the labour force increased by 3,600. Part-time positions (+10,200) increased while and full-time positions (-3,800) decreased from August.

Compared to September 2021, the unemployment rate for youth was down 1.7 percentage points to 8.6%.

Census Metropolitan Areas (CMAs)

In September, employment increased in Vancouver (+27,600 or +1.8%), Victoria (+6,400 or +3.0%), Abbotsford (+3,100 or +2.8%), and the areas outside CMAs (+1,100 or +0.1%). Kelowna was the only CMA with an employment decrease (-5,300 or -4.8%).

Industry

Employment in the goods-producing sector was down (-400 or -0.1%) from August. The construction (+2,100 or +0.9%), forestry, fishing, mining, quarrying, oil and gas (+2,100 or +4.6%), utilities (+1,000 or +6.4%), and agriculture (+100 or +0.4%) industries saw employment growth in September. Meanwhile,

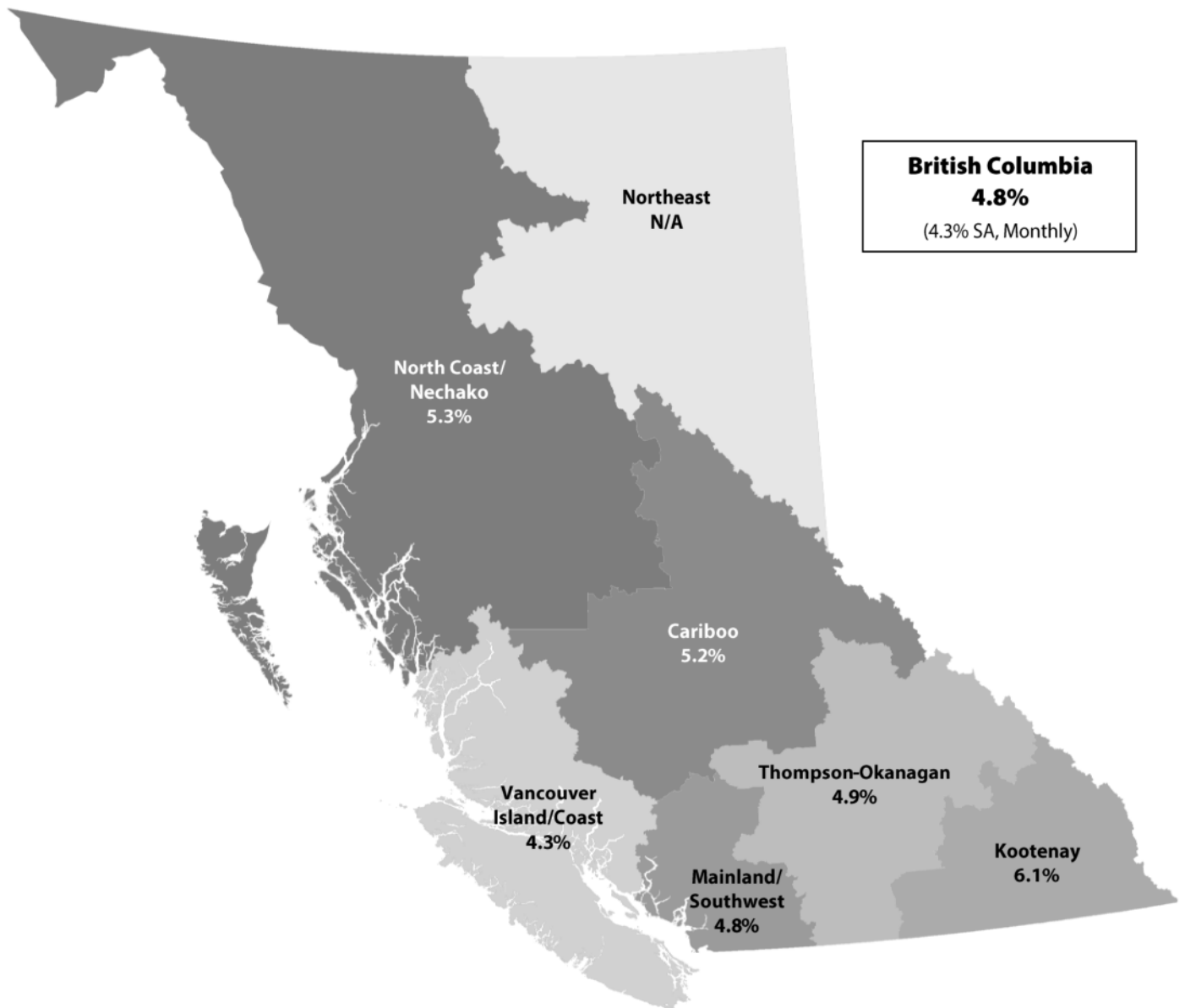
employment decreased in the manufacturing (-5,900 or -3.4%) industry. In the 12 months to September, employment in the goods-producing sector was up 11,000 (+2.3%).

In September, overall employment for the services-producing sector increased (+33,300 or +1.5%) from the previous month. The subsectors that added jobs in September were educational services (+12,300 or +6.3%), professional, scientific, and technical services (+10,500 or +4.0%), finance, insurance, real estate, rental and leasing (+6,300 or +3.9%), accommodation and food services (+5,500 or +3.1%), health care and social assistance (+5,400 or +1.4%), and wholesale and retail trade (+2,600 or +0.6%). There were fewer jobs in other services outside of public administration (-3,100 or -2.7%), public administration (-2,900 or -2.1%), transportation and warehousing (-1,900 or -1.4%), business, building and other support services (-1,100 or -1.1%), and information, culture, and recreation (-400 or -0.3%). On a year-over-year basis, the services-producing sector had 61,600 (+2.8%) more positions.
