 - Once an inquiry officer is appointed, the Attorney General has no further control over

the inquiry and its timeline.

- 2. How long would it take the inquiry officer to complete the task?
 - Section 12 of the Act states that an inquiry must occur within 21 days of the appointment of the inquiry officer by the AG.
 - Under Section 17, a report must be issued within 30 days of the first day of an inquiry.
 - Historically it usually takes an inquiry officer close to the full 30 days to complete and deliver their report.
 - Therefore, the entire timeline is a maximum of 72 days from start to finish (21+21+30).




