ISSUE:

Organizational alignment of Indigenous-specific initiatives.

DECISION REQUIRED / RECOMMENDATION:

Option One: Transition leadership of corporate cross-sector Indigenous-specific strategic initiatives, including the Draft 10 Principles implementation and secretariat responsibilities to the Indigenous Justice Strategy Secretariat (IJSS) and the PSSG indigenous lead by March 31, 2020. Leadership and coordination of AG materials for the annual BC Cabinet and First Nations Leaders Gathering will also transition exclusively to the IJSS.

SUMMARY:

- Branches in AG, PSSG and EMBC are leading significant policy and program initiatives related to Indigenous justice and public safety. This work is aligned with both the Indigenous Justice Strategy and the *Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act*.
- In order to support our sector's strategic alignment with government's reconciliation commitments, senior management representatives from each branch were identified to form a Draft 10 Principles Champions Table.
- Shortly afterwards, an Executive Director of Indigenous Justice Strategy Secretariat
 was hired to facilitate the collaborative development of the IJS between the BC
 Aboriginal Justice Council (now BC First Nations Justice Council (BCFNJC)) and the
 ministries of AG and PSSG.
- As work evolves, it has become increasingly clear that the *Declaration on the Rights* of *Indigenous Peoples Act*, the Draft 10 Principles and the Indigenous Justice
 Strategy are intricately connected both substantively and operationally. There are
 numerous benefits of formally integrating key sector Indigenous-specific initiatives
 within the IJSS and through the PSSG lead for Indigenous initiatives.

Based on recent milestones, including the passing of the *Declaration on the Rights* of *Indigenous Peoples Act*, the submission of a draft Indigenous Justice Strategy by
 the BCFNJC, and shifting capacity and resource requirements in AG and PSSG,
 formal changes to branch roles that clearly outline accountabilities and
 responsibilities, are recommended.

 IJSS is now staffed with six FTEs including a new Band 3 (reclassified from a prior Band 2 temporary assignment) whose job profile includes supporting ministry-wide mandate commitments and priorities related UNDRIP, the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action (TRC) and the Draft 10 Principles.

BACKGROUND:

- The BCFNJC, Attorney General and Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in September 2017, to commit to jointly developing an Indigenous Justice Strategy.
- In response to the release of the Draft 10 Principles in May 2018, AG, PSSG and EMBC each assigned an executive lead and formed a "Champions Table" comprised of senior management representatives from all branches. To date, the secretariat function, which supports cross-ministry strategic development and working group activities, has resided within the Strategic Planning, Performance and Reporting Division (SPPRD) of the Justice Services Branch (JSB), MAG.
- In November 2018, the IJSS, which also resides within the JSB MAG, was created
 to facilitate the relationships between government and Indigenous partners in the
 development of an Indigenous Justice Strategy, and to identify alignment between
 the IJS and complementary initiatives.
- In November 2019, BC became the first Canadian jurisdiction to pass legislation to implement the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP). The Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act will provide ministries with a mandate and guidance to engage Indigenous peoples in the development and implementation of programming, policies and legislation that are consistent with the UN Declaration. This includes alignment with existing government commitments, such as the Indigenous Justice Strategy.
- Justice and public safety sector leads have worked closely with MIRR and other ministries to lead the development of resources and tools related to the implementation of the *Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act*.
- First Nations and partners have raised concerns that there is no clear central point of contact within the justice and public safety sector to establish relationships and discuss broad Nation-specific challenges and priorities. This concern is exacerbated

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by limited community and organizational capacity to engage, which further promotes the need for streamlined communications processes.

DISCUSSION:

- Since government's commitment to a New Relationship in 2005, cross-government initiatives that focus on socio-cultural Indigenous reconciliation have increased significantly. The development of these initiatives; however, has historically been organic - nation by nation and/or ministry-based. With government's recent commitment to implement the UN Declaration, there is an evident need to articulate a more cohesive approach to reconciliation that aligns existing commitments.
- Similarly, the justice and public safety sector, supported by leads and Champions, has been working to identify a more consistent and rigorous structure and alignment across branches. This includes identifying roles, responsibilities and overall capacity/resources to effectively respond to the Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act. These efforts must also complement and align with government's commitment to implementing the Indigenous Justice Strategy.
- To that end, in spring 2019, the ADM of JSB directed a transition of all Indigenousspecific work within JSB to the IJSS to ensure greater alignment and coordination.
- At the time of this announcement, several of the current IJSS FTEs had only recently been hired and the IJSS expressed that their resourcing pressures inhibited them from effectively assuming additional responsibilities.
- In the summer of 2019, a Band 3 position was created in IJSS to lead and support strategic justice initiatives and priority projects including coordination across ministries and with stakeholders.
- In subsequent months, the IJSS division has continued to onboard their exiting complement of six FTEs and has become increasingly engaged with work related to the implementation of the Draft 10 Principles. Several natural transition points related to Indigenous-specific justice and public safety matters will be merging on the immediate horizon, including:
 - The Draft 10 Principles Champions Table and Working Groups have recently completed and presented a draft Indigenous Cultural Safety and Humility Strategy and draft Partnerships and Engagement Framework to sector Joint Executive.
 - o s.12; s.14

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 These milestones and natural transition points provide the optimal opportunity for the Ministry of Attorney General to realign leadership responsibilities for Indigenousspecific strategic initiatives under the single IJSS division whom will works directly with the PSSG Indigenous lead.

- While the ultimate intent to transition Indigenous-specific work within MAG to the IJSS remains, interim day-to-day functions continue to reside within SPPRD.
- This realignment will allow SPPRD to focus on the direction it has received from the Justice and Public Safety Council to design, engage-on and implement an alternative Justice Summit Process in addition to supporting increased stakeholder relations.

OPTIONS:

Option 1 - Recommended

Transition leadership of corporate cross-sector Indigenous-specific strategic initiatives, including the Draft 10 Principles implementation and secretariat responsibilities to the Indigenous Justice Strategy Secretariat (IJSS) and the PSSG indigenous lead by March 31, 2020. Leadership and coordination of AG materials for the annual BC Cabinet and First Nations Leaders Gathering will also transition exclusively to the IJSS.

Pros:

- Positions the sector to more strategically engage with internal and external partners and achieve greater alignment across Indigenous-specific initiatives.
- IJSS has developed relationships with key indigenous partners and leads that deliver Indigenous programming and is seen as a conduit for information sharing.
- Provides cohesive guidance and input to the sector on engagement and partnership with Indigenous peoples.
- IJSS has hired and onboarded their full staffing complement of six FTEs.



PURPOSE: For **INFORMATION** for David Eby, QC, Attorney General **and** Mike Farnworth, Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General.

ISSUE:

Release of the Ministry of Attorney General (AG) and Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General (PSSG) Indigenous Work Inventories (Appendix 1 and Appendix 2) to the BC First Nations Justice Council (BCFNJC) and Métis Nation BC Justice Council (MNBCJC).

SUMMARY:

- The purpose of the inventories is to provide a high-level overview of AG and PSSG initiatives that have a substantive Indigenous focus and/or deliver customized services for Indigenous peoples to assist the sector in collaboratively identifying, defining and implementing priorities of mutual importance in partnership with Indigenous organizations.
- In total, 71 projects/initiatives are included in the inventories; 29 from AG, 37 from PSSG and 5 cross-sector items.
- The following information is provided for each inventory item:
 - High-level description of the work;
 - Stage of development (i.e. the work is currently in the development phase, piloting phase, execution phase, or is part of ongoing operations);
 - o General resourcing commitment for fiscal years 2019/20 − 2021/22;
 - Indigenous partners that were/are involved in the design, development or delivery of the policy, legislation, project or program/activity, and;
 - Branch contact information.
- The inventories may be of use to the BCFNJC and MNBCJC during consultations with the Province on the First Nations Justice Strategy and Métis Justice Strategy, as the inventories could reveal gaps or opportunities that warrant targeted discussion.

BACKGROUND:

- The BCFNJC has requested an inventory of Indigenous justice initiatives that are planned or underway across the justice and public safety sector through the Indigenous Justice Strategy Leadership Circle.
- The request from BCFNJC and an identified information need by the AG/PSSG Sector Draft Principles Champions Table prompted the development of the AG and PSSG Indigenous Work Inventories.

Date Prepared: December 18th, 2019

 As evidenced by the *Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act*, creating more transparency, predictability and certainty in the work government and Indigenous peoples do together is a government priority.

- Sharing the inventories with our partners aligns with the Province's commitment to increase government transparency and demonstrates our ministries' commitment to better understanding the Indigenous work underway across the sector and exploring opportunities to more closely coordinate and collaborate on social initiatives and investments that serve all Indigenous people of BC.
- Indigenous leaders may use the inventories to identify initiatives of significant interest or concern and apply this information to support further discussions with the Province on how to create decision-making opportunities for Indigenous governments on matters impacting their citizens.

The aim of the Indigenous Work Inventories is to support further opportunities for collaboration on initiatives of mutual importance.

In total, 71 projects and initiatives are included in the inventories; 29 from AG, 37 from PSSG, and five that are cross-sector initiatives.

The inventories include the following information for each item, which is current to Fall 2019:

- High-level description of the work;
- Stage of development (i.e. the work is currently in the development phase, piloting phase, execution phase, or is part of ongoing operations);
- General resourcing commitment for fiscal years 2019/20 2021/22;
- Indigenous partners that were/are involved in the design, development or delivery of the policy, legislation, project or program/activity, and;
- Branch contact information.

During the summer of 2019, the ministry supported critical community engagement related to the emotional, psychological and physical safety of Indigenous women and girls in the province. Path Forward Women and Girls Safety Community Sessions were held in 12 communities, with over 300 participants, across the province to inform strategy development while ensuring that information sharing was done in a manner that considered culture and protocol and supported healing. The aim of the Indigenous Work Inventories is to support further opportunities for collaboration on initiatives of mutual importance.

In total, 71 projects and initiatives are included in the inventories; 37 from PSSG, 29 from AG, and five that are cross-sector initiatives.

As of September 2019, over 650 participants have registered in the online course. After completing the TIP curriculum participants will be able to: Recognize and understand trauma and its possible effects on victims and witnesses, and have a clear understanding of how violence and abuse may shape victim responses; Assess their own practices and processes with a trauma informed lens; and, Incorporate trauma informed learnings to reduce potential re-traumatization experienced by victims and witnesses participating in the justice system. While TIP is not an Indigenous-specific initiative, one of the six modules focuses on trauma and diversity and includes content on intergenerational trauma and Indigenous peoples. The opportunity to address issues related to trauma and Indigenous peoples in more depth will be explored during the next phase of the TIP project: the development and implementation (in 2019/20 and 2020/21) of a TIP Community of Practice (CoP). The CoP will include the delivery of webinars and virtual classrooms on priority topics selected in consultation with the TIP Project Steering Committee.

The B.C. Assembly of First Nations (BCAFN), Union of BC Indian Chiefs (UBCIC), and the First Nations Summit are all in support of this initiative. The BCAFN and the UBCIC have each shared resolutions on this issue, titled "Fair and Equitable Access for First Nations to Credit Rating System". The resolutions highlight systemic challenges facing B.C. First Nation individuals who live on reserve related to credit ratings, economic development and access to capital. First Nation individuals living on reserve have limited credit lines as they often pay the Band government for rent, utilities and loans. While there is a high degree of financial activity between individuals and the Band government, none of this activity is collected by the national credit bureaus for credit reports. The Province supports the resolutions and is examining how to move forward with capturing lines of credit for First Nation individuals living on reserve.

The MPI Standards require police to have access to a means for obtaining advice or assistance during these investigations, which may include: • An Aboriginal liaison officer; or • An officer from a federal First Nations Policing Program Community Tripartite Agreement or Quadpartite Agreement; or • Local Indigenous leaders or organizations, through written protocol or agreement. Provincial Policing Standards for Major Case Management Standards for Major Case Management (MCM) and Inter-Agency Cooperation and Coordination were completed in January 2017 and began to take effect in January 2019. These standards were established to help ensure appropriate police response to serious incidents and include a requirement that all police agencies enter into a protocol regarding multi-jurisdictional major case investigations. The MCM Standards enhance consistency in investigations for major cases through various requirements. In addition, the standards also acknowledge that major cases may involve significant interest by victims, their families, the media, and the public in general, uphold victim's rights/legislations, and require that the impact of investigative strategies and decisions on public trust and safety is evaluated.

Description	Leveraging federal funding, the Province developed the <u>B.C. FILU</u> to work directly with families of missing or murdered Indigenous women and girls across the province to provide access to consistent, reliable and fulsome information related to the loss of their loved one. The B.C. FILU is a 'one-stop' information service for families. B.C. FILU staff support family members by acting as a liaison to gather information they are seeking from government agencies and ensuring that this information is provided to them in a trauma-informed and culturally-sensitive manner. In addition, FILU staff support proactive referrals, based on the needs and wishes of the client, to community programs and resources that can promote wellness and healing. Family members can access B.C. FILU directly through a toll-free number or by email. They may also be referred to B.C. FILU by Commission staff, community service providers working with the family, or by FILUs located in other jurisdictions. While B.C. FILU has physical offices located in Prince George and Vancouver, it is designed to be provincial in scope – providing services to families of missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls wherever they reside within the province. Families are not required or expected to travel to one of the physical office locations to access FILU services. The B.C. FILU team is intended to be mobile, travelling to meet with families in their home communities, wherever appropriate. Travel supports can be provided in circumstances where families would prefer to meet with FILU staff outside of their home community. FILUs were developed to operate independently of the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls, complementing the work of the Commission on the broader systemic issues by providing direct support to the individual families to meet their informational and referral needs.

Description	The MWCI Report was released on December 17, 2012. The MWCI Report discusses the findings of the provincial Missing Women Commission of Inquiry and outlines two urgent measures and sixty-three recommendations for action. Since its release, a substantial amount of work has been undertaken to implement the MWCI Report recommendations and to enhance the safety and security of vulnerable women – including Indigenous women – in British Columbia. In November 2013, the B.C. government released a status report on activities underway that responded to the recommendations. In December 2014, a second status report highlighted recommendation-specific actions that had been initiated or completed since the previous update. The 2014 status report also focused on how the recommendations would be used more broadly to inform government reform and change initiatives, including those addressing violence against women. In 2016, the B.C. Office of the Auditor General (OAG) completed an examination to report on how the provincial government had responded to select recommendations made in the MWCI Report. The OAG included 21 recommendations and two urgent measures in their examination – verifying actions taken by the government and assessing to what degree the government had responded to the intent of each recommendation. The OAG report was released in December 2016, making one recommendation: that the provincial government report publicly each year on how its programs and initiatives are meeting the intent of the Missing Women Commission of Inquiry's recommendations. The Province has committed to implementing the OAG's recommendation and resumed annual reporting in 2018. It is hoped that this will support a common understanding of efforts taken to		
	address the MWCI recommendations and better demonstrate government's ongoing commitment to addressing the issue of violence against women, including Indigenous women.

The National Inquiry's purpose was to examine and report on systemic causes of violence experienced by Indigenous women and girls and their greater vulnerability to violence. Systemic factors that were considered by the commission include issues related to child welfare practices, policing, health, education and the justice and public safety sector. Each of the provinces and territories established its own commission of inquiry, with the same mandate and commissioners as the federal commission of inquiry, to participate in the National	

Inquiry. The British Columbia Commission of Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls was established in November 2016. The commission had until April 30, 2019 to deliver its final report, and operations concluded June 2019. The National Inquiry was conducted under the federal *Inquiries Act*, the British Columbia *Public Inquiry Act* and the respective public inquiry legislation of the other provinces and territories in Canada.

B.C. fully participated in the inquiry, and provided relevant files and records, as requested and as appropriate to BC's jurisdiction; participated as observers in community, institutional and expert hearings; and supported information-sharing and referral to families through the <u>B.C. Family</u> Information Liaison Unit.

B.C. prepared a written submission for the commission, which provided comprehensive, B.C.-specific information related to the commission's mandate to inform the commission's final report and recommendations.



Good morning,

On Tuesday, the Minister of Finance presented the <u>2020 Budget</u> which reflects the government's financial plan and specifies the spending for each ministry. The oversight responsibilities of the Ministry of Attorney General include: The Insurance Corporation of British Columbia (ICBC); BC Lottery Corporation (BCLC); and Liquor Distribution Branch (LDB).

The ministry budget is \$651.8 million, and some key priorities include the following:

- \$18.9 million to provide funding to Legal Aid Lawyers to help low-income British Columbians access justice services;
- \$10.1 million for an independent Commission of Inquiry into Money Laundering in the province, including real estate, gaming, financial institutions and the corporate and professional sectors;
- \$9 million to improve and expand court facilities to serve British Columbians for decades to come;
- \$5 million for the Civil Resolution Tribunal's increased mandate to handle ICBC minor incident claims up to \$50,000, moving civil disputes out of courtrooms;
- \$2.8 million for development of an Indigenous justice strategy.

Over the coming year, the ministry will be focusing on making progress on a number of priorities that are set out in the Attorney General's mandate letter and highlighted in the Ministry of Attorney General and Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General Service Plan 2020/21 – 2022/23 that was tabled in the House yesterday.

The <u>ICBC Service Plan</u>, <u>BCLC Service Plan</u>, <u>LDB Service Plan</u>, <u>Legal Services Society Service Plan</u>, and <u>BC Family Maintenance Agency Service Plan</u> were also released yesterday.

The budget and the goals of the Service Plan are important to everyone who works at the Ministry of Attorney General. Thank you for your continued commitment to our essential work.

On behalf of the Executive team I would like to thank everyone in the ministry who worked on *Budget 2020* and the Ministry of Attorney General and Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General Service Plan.

Dear Kurt and Colleen,

I celebrate your leadership on Indigenous access to justice strategy.

I have been keeping Richard informed on our efforts at the Human Rights Tribunal to develop an Indigenous Justice Initiative. In his absence, I wanted to reach out to you directly. s.22

s.22 Together, we have been working closely with Ardith Walpetko We'dalx Walkem, QC. I am happy to announce that, on Wednesday, I will be releasing a report addressing serious access to justice concerns for Indigenous peoples bringing human rights complaints to the tribunal. I am sharing the report with you on embargo in advance of its public release.

The report is entitled *Expanding our Vision: Cultural Equality and Indigenous Peoples Human Rights*. Ardith surveyed over 100 Indigenous People about their experiences with discrimination and the Human Rights Tribunal. Overwhelmingly those interviewed reported pervasive levels of discrimination. Many Indigenous People had no idea

that the Human Rights Tribunal existed, or how to access it. Many said that their experiences of racism as Indigenous Peoples were so widespread that they did not believe it would make any difference to file a complaint with the Human Rights Tribunal. Expanding our Vision makes nine recommendations. Removing barriers to access to the Human Rights

Tribunal is not enough. Structural change is needed to incorporate Indigenous definitions of human rights according to Indigenous laws. The main recommendations broaden the concept of human rights, including adding Indigenous Identity to the *BC Human Rights Code* and incorporating Indigenous legal traditions and international human rights principles as reflected in the *United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples*, which, as a result of your leadership, BC has recently committed to implementing through legislation.

This report is a positive call to action. In a decision to ensure that the report was implemented, and in keeping with our shared commitment to transformative change in the relationship with Indigenous Peoples, I have reached out to Indigenous, legal and human rights organizations and sought a commitment to implement the report. We have received an overwhelmingly positive response and preliminary commitments from a broad-based coalition of organizations committed to implementing the report. This will be reflected in our press release and backgrounder, which I am still finalizing, and will be sharing with your AG communications team as soon as it is ready. The Union of BC Indian Chiefs will be hosting the press conference on Wednesday. This is a great step forward, and I look forward to joining you on this journey, as we take the next step together.

On a related matter, I was excited to hear from Jane that the October Access to Justice Leadership Group meeting will focus on the significance of BC legislation endorsing UNDRIP on Indigenous access to justice in the context of the civil and family justice system. I understand that Ardith will join the planning group for this meeting. Exciting news all around.

I look forward to working together with you on these important issues.



Unfortunately, while there has been quite a bit of work done on the Indigenous Justice Strategy and the Indigenous Justice Centre, we don't have anything publicly facing because we haven't released the strategy yet nor are the centres ready to be open. However, we can use the following: Indigenous Justice Strategy and Indigenous Justice Centres:

- We continue to work with the First Nations Justice Council and the Metis Nation Justice Council to develop the BC First Nations Justice Strategy and the Metis Justice Strategy.
- Through these strategies, we will work towards addressing the overrepresentation of Indigenous Peoples in our correctional system.
- We will also work to develop Indigenous Justice Centres, using a legal clinic model, that will help deliver criminal and family justice services that are holistic and culturally appropriate.

Indigenous Courts

 Our province is working with Indigenous communities to establish Indigenous courts throughout British Columbia.

- The most recent one is in Williams Lake.
- This court will help support better outcomes for people in conflict with the law and help reduce the over-representation of Indigenous Peoples in our jails.
- It also brings us one step closer to reaching one of our most important goals as a government—building a justice system that better respects and addresses the needs of Indigenous peoples

Another big piece is the Gaming Control Amendment Act:

- A new revenue-sharing agreement between B.C. and First Nations will support self-government and self-determination, strong, healthy communities and services that make life better for families.
- The provincial government has transferred \$194.84 million to the newly formed B.C. First Nations Gaming Revenue Sharing Limited Partnership, providing the first two years of shared gaming revenue committed to under Budget 2019.
- Our government is putting in place a 25-year revenue stream for First Nations as part of our commitment to support self-government.
- New funding will support First Nations' priorities for social services, education, infrastructure, cultural revitalization and self-government capacity.
- Like every government, First Nations need stable, predictable sources of revenue to fund their

- This revenue will mean First Nations can plan for the long-term and invest in the services they decide their communities need to thrive and prosper.

However, I'm also attaching something called the Indigenous Work Inventory which tallies everything that we have done/are doing on this file. I'd like to know what was actually signed? And what is a network of 15 regional First Nations Justice Centres? Jails, courts, classrooms? Thanks, Dirk.

Recommendation: Provide Background

Suggested Response:

The document that was signed was an endorsement of the actions contained in the BC First Nations Justice Strategy. The Strategy includes 25 actions (https://news.gov.bc.ca/files/First Nations Justice Strategy Feb 2020.pdf) organized into two tracks of change.

- 1) Reform of the existing justice system;
- 2) rebuilding First Nations justice systems and institutions, through their own legal orders and governments, consistent with the standards in the UN Declaration.

The strategy includes actions for all justice system actors to consider from a "presumption of diversion" perspective; that is, at every point in time, precharge, post-charge, post-plea, and post-conviction, actors should fully consider opportunities for culturally appropriate alternative responses to the existing justice system, with the presumption that, whenever appropriate, these alternative responses should be the first option pursued.

The strategy aims to increase the representation of Indigenous people working at all levels of the system.

By signing the document the BC First Nations Justice Council and the Government of BC have endorsed the strategy, and will now work together to develop a joint implementation plan. Both parties further agree to seek full engagement and participation of the federal government in the strategy.

Indigenous Justice Centres.

The BC First Nations Justice Council ("FNJC") and Province of BC recognize the difficulties Indigenous peoples have in accessing legal help to address their child protection and criminal law matters. These difficulties contribute to the increasingly disproportionate number of Indigenous children in care of the government and the over-representation of Indigenous peoples in the criminal justice system. The BC First Nations Justice strategy will assist Indigenous peoples by offering legal services and supports at Indigenous Justice Centres ("IJCs").

IJCs provide Indigenous peoples a culturally safe space where they can access legal help and get assistance with early resolution of their legal problems and access to support services for healing wellness.

One of the key aspects of IJC services is the provision of Indigenous Pro Bono Legal Services, aimed at improving Indigenous people's access to legal representation in child

protection and criminal law cases, along with other legal matters related to their resolution of those cases.

Three IJCs are operational they are located in Prince George, Merritt and Prince Rupert. The strategy calls for the establishment of 12 more over the next 4 years.

Recommendation / Background

Legal representation

Legal organizations from across BC along with First Nations leaders and Indigenous organization participated in the justice summits and regional engagement sessions that were the foundation of this strategy.

Federal Involvement

Representatives from the federal government were present at the announcement and at the engagement sessions which contributed to the strategy drafting. Any questions about the federal government's future role in the strategy can be directed to Minister Lametti's office.

Funding

Government has committed to spending \$2.8 million this year to develop an Indigenous Justice Strategy.

Government endorsed the strategy and will now work with the First Nations Justice Council to develop a joint implementation plan with affected government ministries. The plan will be brought back for approval by the parties and will be subject to government's ability to fund the directions in the strategy.

Gladue

Gladue reports are a priority for government. We are spending an extra \$700,000 this year to increase the number of these reports produced, and to build capacity in our system by helping more people obtain the appropriate training and qualifications to write these reports.
