As a guideline this would be when temperature is over 25 or humidity is high. Residents do not need to pack around belongings all daythey know can come change clothing part way through day if they like or drop off belongings. Gatorade, water and juice are given to residents as they leave the facility or upon request. Snacks and fruit are available if residents lose appetite for meals due to heat – staff will make a peanut butter sandwich for residents if that is more appealing than a hot meal. Dinner is between 5 and 7 but staff will still warm up leftovers or snacks when it cools off later in the evening as well. Sunscreen is available and provided in a small disposable cup. Most residents have hats, but donated hats can be made available as needed. Rooms are air conditioned and cool showers and baths can also be used to cool off. Staff are aware of signs of heatstroke, so that they can make residents aware if necessary, or seek medical assistance. The intent is to prevent this outcome with our plan. Residents are reminded or encouraged to hydrate, wear a hat, use sunscreen and stay in the shade. (Seek, Slip, slap, slop message promoted with attached poster)
