Because providing services in remote rural areas tends to be more expensive, eighty percent of the \$10 million in funding is being allocated by rural populations in a regional district, while the remaining 20% will be allocated by total population (i.e. rural and municipal population). This will ensure larger regional districts receive more total funding, while smaller and rural regional districts receive higher per capita funding.

In November 2020, we provided support for regional districts (\$21 million), but most of the funding (\$394 million) was focused on municipalities because they were facing the bulk of the revenue risks and expenses. It is clear there continues to be a need in regional districts to support the necessary services people count on, so this additional \$10 million in funding will go directly to them. All local governments will benefit from this boost because regional districts provide projects and services to the municipalities in their boundaries as well as rural areas.

Regional districts can use this funding for eligible services and operations impacted by COVID-19, such as facility reopening and operating and protective services like firefighting. Each regional district must annually report on their use of the funds until the funds are fully utilized. The \$10 million represents the last allocation of the \$540 million Safe Restart grants to local governments for COVID-19 related supports and recovery. Funding continues to be used in communities to make sure people have the services they rely on.
