KEY MESSAGES:

- Congratulations on receiving a Strengthening Communities' Services Program grant for \$317,651. Thank you for your commitment to addressing the impacts of homelessness and working to keep your community safe and healthy.
- I understand the City completed a Housing Needs Assessment in 2019, which showed a
 need for seniors' housing in your community. The province is committed to working
 with local governments to address housing needs. BC Housing offers several housing
 programs specifically addressing housing for seniors.
- I understand there are challenges to encouraging development to meet housing targets.
 The City has excellent incentives in place to help encourage the development of multi-unit housing. I would encourage you to contact Tara.Faganello@gov.bc.ca, ADM of Local Government Division, Ministry of Municipal Affairs, to learn more about tax incentives and planning tools to encourage housing development
- I understand that you will be meeting with my colleague, Minister Conroy, on November 4 to discuss labour market issues and some of Quesnel's major initiatives related to social and economic development.
- I would like to congratulate the City of Quesnel on being selected to host the 2024 BC Winter Games. Your community will gain direct economic opportunities as well as the opportunity to engage residents in a celebration of community pride.
- I understand the City has concerns regarding the Municipal and Regional District Tax (MRDT). UBCM is drafting a report entitled *Priorities for Action on Short-Term Rentals*, which will include comments from industry stakeholders regarding the opt-in design and its varied tax rates. I encourage you to share your concerns with Minister Robinson, Minister of Finance, who, in considering any recommendations regarding the MRDT, would also want to hear from other municipalities and tourism stakeholders. If you would like to discuss challenges with obtaining the support of local accommodation providers, please contact Destination BC.



BACKGROUND:

The City met with Minister Eby, Attorney General and Minister responsible for Housing at UBCM in September 2021 to discuss housing development in Quesnel, including partnerships available through BC Housing.

The City of Quesnel will be meeting with Minister Conroy on November 4 to discuss labour market issues.

The City of Quesnel is located in Cariboo Regional District and has a population of 9, 879. The city is situated on the traditional territory of the Lhtako Dene Nation (Red Bluff Band). The Lhtako Dene Nation and the City of Quesnel entered a Memorandum of Understanding on June 20, 2017 to attest to their mutual commitment to promote cooperative relationship building.

The City completed a Housing Needs Assessment in October 2019.

The City currently offers multi-unit housing incentives to help encourage the development of multi-unit housing projects. These include a 10-year tax exemption; Development Cost Charge (DCC) Waiver for Non-Profit Housing Units; Reduced DCCs for Low Environmental Impact units, and; the Northern Housing Incentive via Northern Development. The City also allows secondary suites.

The City is dedicated to engaging with their residents and this year, despite COVID-19 related setbacks, they introduced their online engagement tool, "Let's Connect!".

The City is exploring levying a Municipal and Regional District Tax (MRDT). The MRDT is an up-to 3% tax on short-term rentals (STRs) (e.g. hotel stays, or Airbnb). It applies in parts of the province that have requested the tax and revenues collected by the government are directed back to the "designated recipient" (may be a municipal or regional government or a community destination marketing organization). MRDT does not contribute to provincial government revenues. Designated recipients, and the local areas they represent, are given 5-year mandates once they provide evidence that a majority of accommodation providers, representing a majority of the units in the area, support the tax being imposed.

Applications to participate in the MRDT program are made through Destination BC and are ultimately reviewed and approved by Cabinet, with the tax taking effect after an order-in-council is made. The Ministry of Finance (Tax Policy Branch) manages this process and makes recommendations on applications to the Minister of Finance. There are spending restrictions under the program. Designated recipients can only spend MRDT revenues for tourism marketing, programs, and projects, and initiatives respecting affordable housing.

The City is expanding its tourism capacity and was recently named host community for the BC Winter Games in 2024. They are exploring the development of tourism opportunities with the Lhtako Dené Nation, Nazko First Nation, ?Esdilagh First Nation, and Kluskus First Nation.

DISCUSSION:

The Housing Needs Assessment indicates that the community will see a net demand of nearly 450 housing units by 2031. The majority of this demand is in the senior demographic and includes demand for housing such as duplexes and townhomes; seniors housing including smaller, one-



bedroom units for those wishing to downsize and accessible units; in-fill housing such as carriage houses and suites; and a need to retrofit and renovate, especially to house seniors in place.

The Assessment indicates a quarter of residents fail the affordability criteria for a 2-bedroom rental, and about 45% of Quesnel residents cannot afford a single-family detached home. Rising rents will likely put pressure on the housing market. Although the City has incentive programs listed above, there is difficulty attracting developers, and a lack of serviced, desirable lands.

Homeless and mental health continue to be a growing problem in Quesnel. In 2021 the City received a grant of \$317,651 through the Strengthening Communities' Services Program which aims to support unsheltered homeless populations.

The UBCM report *Priorities for Short-Term*

Rentals is being drafted with an advisory of nine local governments (Quesnel not included). The advisory has made 13 requests in different areas including requests to investigate changes to the MRDT that would expand the uses of tax revenue to offset the impacts of STRs on housing and neighbourhoods.

Quesnel is focusing on re-branding themselves by diversifying from a mainly resource based economy to include a tourism-based economy. Their website lists 32 major initiatives. For example, in 2019 they completed a robust Waterfront Plan for eight kilometers of waterfront along the Fraser and Quesnel rivers in the city's core. Another example is the North-South Interconnector project, which includes a new 3.7 km section of highway that would allow commercial vehicles to avoid the downtown core.

Quesnel has experience working through crises (mill shutdowns, wildfires, flooding). They have leveraged this experience and the regional connections they have with Cariboo RD, their three Business Improvement Associations, and other organizations to support COVID-19 challenges.

GBA+ OR DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION IMPLICATIONS:

The Housing Needs Assessment indicates that housing shortages are disproportionately affecting seniors. The number of residents experiencing core housing need is expected to increase between 2021 and 2031, with renters experiencing the highest increase.

Purpose: To provide an update on GBA+ analysis conducted to date, as well as ongoing

considerations for the BC PNP.

BACKGROUND:

Gender-based Analysis Plus (GBA+) is an analytical tool used to assess how diverse groups of people experience policies, programs and initiatives, taking into account gender and other identity factors. Under the British Columbia Provincial Nominee Program (BC PNP), the government obtains applicant data on the following identity factors: self-identified gender (male/female/X), country of nationality, highest level of education, date of birth, and proficiency in a Canadian official language. Additional identity factors – such as ethnicity, sexual orientation, ability, and Indigeneity – are not collected by the BC PNP.

In July 2020, the Immigration Programs Branch (IPB) conducted an internal report on "Gender and the BC PNP: A GBA+ Statistical Overview". The report provided a gendered analysis of PNP registration, application and nomination statistics; national and regional gender balances of the top 20 source countries; gender balances across occupations and skill levels; and the wage gap. The report illustrated that participation in the BC PNP is heavily tilted toward male participation; however, there is little evidence of administrative or procedural barriers to the success of female applicants. Instead, the analysis of program data suggests various potential reasons for this imbalance, including cultural and social differences between source countries, occupational choices, and the wage gap. Some of the key take-aways from the internal report are:

- 1. The BC PNP receives far more applications from male-dominated occupations than female-dominated occupations.
- 2. Only the lowest skill occupation level (NOC D) features a majority of female applicants.
- 3. The use of wage data in the BC PNP point system may be deterring female applicants from using the program as their wages tend to be lower.
- 4. Most (but not all) of the wage gap on a program-wide level is coming from lower-paid occupations being more commonly staffed by women. The wage gap still exists when men and women are compared within the same occupation, but it is much narrower.

This internal report has informed the ongoing review of Skills Immigration Stream within the BC PNP – jointly conducted by the Immigration Programs Branch and Immigration Policy Unit in collaboration with the Labour Market Information and Evaluations Office. An 82-page policy analysis has been drafted to inform the program re-design and includes a sub-section for GBA+ considerations within each chapter. As the project moves to implementation, the Review Team continues to explore the GBA+ implications of **proposed** program changes, with a particular focus on reducing barriers for female applicants and those from refugee backgrounds.



DISCUSSION:

Based on current research, the Review Team determined that the BC PNP may be able to further maximize the long-term potential of immigrants by placing greater emphasis on human capital attributes – education, work experience and language – that are more resilient in an increasingly complex labour market and knowledge-based economy. As such, the re-design could include raising minimum language requirements and providing additional points for official language proficiency. Increasing the language requirements for the BC PNP could result in a possible shift towards English/French-speaking source countries, potentially reducing diversity within the program. However, at present, temporary residents are eligible for informal language practice through BC Settlement and Integration Services (BCSIS). As such, immigrants in BC looking to transition from temporary to permanent resident status can use these services to increase their language ability.

Studies have also found a direct correlation between prior Canadian work experience (if skilled) and/or Canadian higher education and strong labour market outcomes. For this reason, the BC PNP should continue to award points for work experience and higher education obtained in BC and Canada. The Review Team recognizes that in doing so, overseas applicants (including women, skilled refugees, and other diverse groups) would continue to be disadvantaged. These impacts would be mitigated by new "priority draw strategies" that by-pass barriers in the points system for workers in priority occupations. Three new priority-draw strategies are expected to increase the diversity of candidates within the program:

<u>Healthcare</u>: Proposed changes would allow any worker with a nomination from a BC Health Authority to by-pass the points system. In addition, those with a job offer in an eligible health occupation outside of a Health Authority would be targeted and prioritized for an invitation to apply. This would provide a new policy lever for hiring workers with diverse cultural and linguistic skills to better serve the BC public and to help the Ministry of Health deliver on its commitment to 'prioritizing the hiring of a healthcare workforce that better represents B.C.'s diverse communities'.

<u>Skilled Refugees</u>: Refugees belong to a rights-bearing group (under the 1951 Refugee Convention) but are unable to travel to Canada and/or obtain work visas due to their displacement and are therefore systemically disadvantaged in the BC PNP points system due to a lack of in-Canada experience/education. Other provinces, such as Ontario, have addressed this barrier by allowing skilled refugee candidates to bypass their points system and allow those who meet the base criteria to apply directly. The BC PNP will pilot a similar approach starting in Fall 2021 as part of the broader Economic Mobility Pathways Project.

<u>Priority Occupations</u>: The Review Team recognizes that policy decisions concerning which occupations will be eligible for priority draws will impact the gender balance of the program. To date, the BC PNP has far more male-dominated occupations than female-dominated occupations. The use of priority draws for BC's caring economy will likely promote greater female participation in the BC PNP, given the higher prevalence of female professionals in early childhood education, K-12 education, senior care, and health care. We recognize that many occupations in these sectors are lower paying than in male-dominated sectors such as technology. As such, this approach is unlikely to mitigate the overall wage gap within the BC PNP. However, moving forward, a gender



analysis of wages *within* occupations will be conducted to ensure that employers are not contributing to the gender pay gap in the BC PNP.

GBA+ OR DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION IMPLICATIONS:

GBA+ analysis can help shape program design to influence outcomes but ultimately the BC PNP is a largely employer-driven program and employer biases will inform which applicants are nominated for the program at the outset. The BC PNP points system awards applicants for having strong human capital; the idea being that investing in education, language ability and career training results in improved career outcomes with respect to lifetime earnings, occupational choice, and occupational status. However, in reality, the labour market is not completely meritocratic, and educational achievements and credentials are negotiated through the perceptions of employers. In this negotiation process, ethnicity, gender, and immigration status play a role and impact the career outcomes of immigrants and temporary foreign workers.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

Any provincial staffing or financial resources required to pursue additional GBA+ related analysis or program implementation will be scaled as necessary to be manageable within existing resources under the PNP's cost-recovery model.

BACKGROUND:

In 2018, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs (MUNI) initiated the Development Approvals Process Review (DAPR) to identify opportunities for making local government development approval processes more effective and efficient. MUNI led an initial consultation with local governments and stakeholders from December 2018 – May 2019. Following the consultations, MUNI released a report summarizing the challenges identified in local government development approvals processes and opportunities to address them. Moving forward, areas of focus for MUNI include initiatives that look at streamlining approvals; development finance; public hearings and input; and official community plans and zoning.

To date, two key DAPR initiatives have been released publicly: the Local Government Development Approvals Program (LGDAP), a \$15 million funding program administered by the Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) to support projects that streamline local development approval processes, and Bill 26 – the *Municipal Affairs Statutes Amendment Act (No. 2)*, 2021 which received 3rd Reading on November 3, 2021. The bill includes proposed amendments to the *Local Government Act*, which would remove the default requirement for local governments to hold public hearings for zoning bylaw amendments consistent with official community plans and would enable municipalities and regional districts to delegate decisions on minor development variance permits to local government staff.

As further initiatives are developed and rolled out, MUNI's continued engagement and collaboration with local governments and stakeholders will be critical to their success. s.13; s.17

BACKGROUND:

The Strengthening Communities' Services (SCS) Program provides \$100M in funding to help B.C. communities address the impacts of homelessness, support people and strengthen community health and safety. The program was developed as part of the Safe Restart Agreement, which is funded equally by the province and the Government of Canada.

The application-based program, open to all local governments and to First Nations in B.C with modern treaties, is administered by the Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM). UBCM adjudicates the application process and serves as the point of contact for all questions from applicants. The first intake of the SCS program ran from February 18 to April 16, 2021 with successful applications announced on August 12, 2021. In total, over \$76M was awarded to 50 applications encompassing 64 local governments (see full list in Appendix 1).

GBA+ OR DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION IMPLICATIONS:

Projects undertaken with funding from the SCS Program provide direct and indirect benefits to some of society's most vulnerable members, who face challenges that have worsened in the context of COVID-19. This includes groups that are more likely to experience homelessness and are more vulnerable to the health and safety risks associated with living unsheltered, such as

Indigenous people, women, and gender diverse people. These health challenges include mental health and substance abuse issues, and higher vulnerability to COVID-19.

Upholding the province's commitment to reconciliation with Indigenous people, including the spirit of the *United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous People* and the *Calls to Action from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission* continues to be a priority during the delivery of funding under this program. First Nations in B.C with modern treaties are eligible to apply for SCS program funding. Tla'amin Nation, who partnered in a regional application with the City of Powell River and qathet Regional District, received funding in the first intake of the SCS program.

Activities funded under the SCS program have the potential to improve the health and safety of Indigenous persons, who are over-represented in the homeless population (38 percent) as compared to their proportion of the provincial population (6 percent), and are particularly vulnerable to COVID-19. Funded activities could also increase the capacity of local governments to coordinate with Indigenous leadership, including working towards culturally safe and trauma-informed responses. Local governments may also partner with First Nations or Indigenous organizations in the design and delivery of funded programs.

BACKGROUNDER

Local projects supported by Strengthening Communities' Services Program

The Strengthening Communities' Services Program is a \$100-million grant program that helps local governments and modern Treaty Nations respond to the impacts of homelessness and keep their communities safe and healthy. The program is part of the Safe Restart Agreement, which provides \$540 million in Safe Restart relief to local governments. The agreement is equally funded by the Province and the Government of Canada.

The projects represent a wide range of services that local governments have said will help them meet the needs of their communities, such as expanding shelter capacity and supports for outreach teams, improving public health and safety information, connecting people to services, and providing training to support culturally safe and trauma-informed responses.

Topic: Metro Vancouver Regional Growth Strategy Update

Purpose: Update on *Metro 2050* regional growth strategy, provincial involvement to date, and

next steps.

BACKGROUND:

The Metro Vancouver Regional District (Metro) is far along in the process of updating its Regional Growth Strategy (RGS). The current RGS, *Metro 2040*, was adopted in 2011. The comprehensive RGS update process, which began in 2019, builds on the strengths of *Metro 2040* and addresses identified policy gaps. It also responds to emerging trends and shapes future growth with refined land use policies built around the regional transit network. If approved, the updated RGS will be known as *Metro 2050*.

Throughout the update process, Metro has worked closely with TransLink to align *Metro 2050* with the next Regional Transportation Strategy (RTS), *Transport 2050*. Provincial responsibility for the RGS resides with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs (MUNI) while the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MOTI) is the lead ministry for the RTS.

As required by legislation, Metro created an Intergovernmental Advisory Committee (IAC), which meets regularly to provide input to the RGS update. The IAC includes planning staff from member municipalities, Tsawwassen First Nation, other local First Nations, TransLink, and other agencies. Staff from MUNI's Planning and Land Use Management Branch (PLUM) represents the province.

Separately, the Policymakers Coordination Forum (PCF), an advisory committee of elected representatives from TransLink, Metro and the province, and a staff-level Provincial Working Group (PWG) have both been working to support coordination and provincial input into the strategies. Reflecting the breadth of provincial interests relevant to the RGS and RTS, the PWG brings together policy and program staff from at least 16 ministries and agencies.

Released in June 2021, a <u>draft of *Metro 2050*</u> is open for comment until November 26, 2021. MUNI staff are coordinating final comments from PWG members. Despite some delays due to COVID-19, Metro remains committed to completing the RGS by late 2021 with full adoption by July 2022.

DISCUSSION:

As drafted, *Metro 2050* retains and builds on most of the core elements of *Metro 2040*, including focusing 98 percent of growth within the Urban Containment Boundary, and directing most population and jobs to Urban Centres and Frequent Transit Development Areas (FTDAs). Key new policies and content in *Metro 2050* include:

 Policies supporting more transit-oriented, affordable rental housing, housing diversity, renter protection, and support for people experiencing or at risk of homelessness and others with very low incomes. The RGS also calls on the province and Canada to fund and enable local governments to take stronger action on housing.



- Strengthened policies and monitoring to direct more growth into designated Urban Centres
 and FTDAs (located in Major Transit Growth Corridors). These centres, areas and corridors
 are aligned with TransLink's Major Transit Network, supporting greater coordination of
 growth and services along the region's key transit lines, appropriate uses and density, and
 improved transit-oriented housing choice.
- New greenhouse gas monitoring actions for member jurisdictions to demonstrate how they
 will contribute to the regional target of carbon neutrality by 2050. Transportation demand
 management measures are included to reduce driving, encourage the acceleration of active
 transportation buildout, and support transit expansion.
- Support for greater social equity in the region, particularly related to housing affordability, tenant protection, the expansion of green infrastructure, the provision of childcare, climate change resiliency, and the development of complete communities.
- New content and maps showing Indigenous reserve and treaty lands, as well as new
 policies supporting coordination, collaboration, data and information sharing, and
 supportive planning research with First Nations in the region.

Starting in summer 2020, PLUM staff worked closely with MOTI staff to initiate the PWG and organize regular meetings with updates and opportunities for provincial staff to provide input as the draft RGS and RTS evolved. Teams from multiple ministries provided input during this time, on topics ranging from active transportation to housing to ecosystem protection. MUNI consolidated provincial comments before conveying them to Metro.

Most recently, PLUM staff have been working with PWG members to review the final draft of *Metro 2050* and provide any remaining feedback not captured in earlier rounds of review. Since June, the Ministries of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries (AFF), Energy, Mines, and Low Carbon Innovation (EMLI), and MUNI have provided additional feedback on matters such as: RGS policies on the use of more energy efficient ways of getting and shaping growth; the role of migration and settlement on the future demographic profile and growth potential of the region; and policies and guidelines that reduce conflict between residential areas and nearby agricultural uses.

The current RGS draft is closely aligned with and supports a range of key provincial priorities, including housing, economic development, healthy communities, mode shift, and climate action. The parallel RGS and RTS updates have been a unique and timely opportunity for the province to help shape the region's future. Given the emphasis on coordinating land use and transportation planning, this work is seen as an early example of integrated transportation and development planning in action. It also aligns with provincial work on Supportive Policies Agreements (SPAs) along new SkyTrain lines.

The PWG approach has included a greater level of involvement, coordination, and resource commitment from the province than other recent RGS updates. However, it has better supported Metro and TransLink's update processes, advanced integrated planning, ensured the province has contributed consistently with one "voice" to both updates, and broadened understanding of regional planning and issues across ministries. It has also underlined the wide array of shared local, regional, and provincial interests and the shared understanding that these can be best advanced by fostering more complete, compact communities.



Next Steps:

In late November, MUNI will provide the final round of staff-level provincial feedback on the *Metro 2050* draft to Metro. In December, Metro staff plan to further refine the RGS based on feedback received from the PWG, First Nations, member jurisdictions, the public, and others.

In early 2022, Metro's board will consider giving the RGS bylaw first and second readings. After second reading, the bylaw will be circulated to the councils of member jurisdictions (TransLink, all 21 municipalities, and the Tsawwassen First Nation) for acceptance. If accepted by all members, the board will vote on third reading and adoption (planned for July 2022).

Following RGS acceptance, member jurisdictions will have a two-year window to update the regional context statement (RCS) in their Official Community Plans (OCPs). The RCS describes how OCP policies and objectives relate to the RGS policies and objectives and demonstrates how the OCP will become consistent with the RGS over time.

While there is no provincial approval role, the Minister typically sends a congratulatory letter on full adoption of the RGS bylaw. However, the Minister does have a statutory role in helping to resolve a situation should a member jurisdiction not accept the RGS bylaw. MUNI staff will provide future updates as Metro moves through the RGS acceptance/adoption process.

GBA+ OR DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION IMPLICATIONS:

In developing the draft *Metro 2050* RGS, Metro has completed additional engagement, analysis and policy development to better support equity and inclusion. For example, the <u>Social Equity and Regional Growth Study</u> used geospatial data and analysis to quantify inequity in the region across 50 indices, incorporated findings from listening sessions with equity-denied groups, and made recommendations that were inputs into both the RGS and RTS. *Metro 2050* also includes strengthened measures to support rental tenure and affordable units near the existing and future rapid transit network, intending to mitigate displacement driven by transit investment.

Topic: 2022 Local General Elections

Purpose: 2022 local government elections education program, including role of the Minister.

BACKGROUND:

Context for Local Government Elections

Local elections are held every four years for the offices of mayor, councillor and electoral area director (as well as specified park board member and commissioner, advisory council member, regional trustee and Islands trust local trustee). School trustee elections are also held during local general elections. The date of the next general local elections will be Saturday, October 15, 2022.

Local government elections are a shared responsibility involving local governments (who manage and administer elections) and the following local government system partners: the Ministry of Municipal Affairs (MUNI); Elections British Columbia (EBC); the Local Government Management Association (LGMA); the Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM); the B.C. School Trustee Association (BCSTA); and the Ministry of Education (EDUC).

MUNI is responsible for the core local government system and its legislative framework. In so doing, MUNI plays a key role in providing education, advice, and support to local governments, and may exercise specific provincial intervention authorities when needed. EBC enforces rules governing campaign financing and advertising of candidates, elector organizations and third-party advertisers under the *Local Elections Campaign Financing Act* (LECFA). Together the local government election partners meet regularly as the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) to discuss common issues, develop information, and provide advice to help elections run more smoothly. A summary of the Elections Education Work Plan for the 2022 general local elections is attached as Attachment 1.

Legislative Framework

The *Local Government Act* (LGA) provides rules for the administration of local government elections including appointing election officials, receiving nomination documents, declaring candidates, administering voting opportunities, counting ballots, and declaring election results. Local governments also adopt their own election bylaw in which they may make choices about matters such as the number of advance voting opportunities and whether to offer mail ballot voting (which, since the enactment of Bill 10 in 2021, has expanded eligibility to all electors under the LGA), and the removal of the 30-day residency requirement to support broader participation in local elections.

Meanwhile, LECFA – which separates the rules that regulate advertising and campaign finance from the more procedural rules that apply generally to local elections administration – was further amended in 2021 (by Bill 9) in response to learnings from the 2018 general local elections. These amendments will apply to the 2022 general local elections and involve the registration of elector organizations (with EBC), the establishment of a 60-day pre-campaign period in the year of



the general local election, and the sponsorship contribution limits for third party advertising sponsors.

MUNI Involvement in Local General Elections

MUNI is currently updating election-related materials in advance of the 2022 general local elections to educate candidates and other election participants on elections processes and rules. We are aiming to have these materials available to election participants in spring 2022. New education materials for the 2022 elections will include a recorded webinar for prospective candidates, along with materials on topics informed by the 2018 general local elections and postmortem (for instance, a brochure describing voting for electors living on-Reserve).

The materials will also reflect recent legislative changes – including the <u>Municipal Affairs Statutes Amendment Act, 2021</u> (Bill 10) and the <u>Local Elections Statutes Amendment Act, 2021</u> (Bill 9) – and corresponding guidance. Wherever relevant, the written and online educational materials developed by MUNI will also incorporate responsible conduct principles (for instance, the *Candidate Guide to Local Elections in B.C.* and *What Every Candidate Needs to Know* documents).

A summary of Ministry of Tourism, Arts and Culture and MUNI-led responsibilities is included in Attachment 1. For the 2022 elections education program, MUNI's responsibilities include:

- o producing written material for candidates and the public including a candidate's guide, voter's information (in six languages), and brochures.
- developing online material for prospective candidates and declared candidates (e.g., prospective candidate webinar and Powtoon videos).
- providing information and legislative-based advice by phone and email to candidates, local government staff, election participants and the public about local government election administration; and,
- o actively participating in the formal education program for local government election officials, delivering presentations, and workshops and providing input to LGMA's election manual.

MUNI is also responsible under LECFA for providing EBC with the expense limits for election participants by April 30, 2022, which EBC must make publicly available by May 31, 2022. Staff expect that this information will be available well in advance of the of the April 30th deadline.

During the election period (starting in September 2022) the Minister exercises a formal intervention role as needed. Under LGA section 101, the Minister has authority to approve the withdrawal of a candidate past the withdrawal deadline, while LGA section 167 enables the Minister to make a Ministerial Order (MO) in special circumstances to ensure the continuation of the election process.

In 2018, nine MOs were requested to allow for late withdrawal of candidates and four MOs were requested and issued for unique circumstances that arose (e.g., to extend the nomination period, invalidate an election, and notify the public about the availability of the list of resident electors). s.13



DISCUSSION:

Within MUNI, the Governance and Structure Branch leads the elections work, which becomes more resource-intensive and time-sensitive in the summer 2022 and onward.

The development of new information and platforms (e.g., webinar) and incorporating feedback on previous written materials requires early attention in the election cycle. The elections team then moves to more reactive work, answering inquires and problem-solving with local government election officials, prospective candidates and the general public as the cycle moves closer to voting day.

GBA+ OR DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION IMPLICATIONS:

MUNI's election education and capacity-building program has been designed to be inclusive to all British Columbians participating in the electoral process. This includes ensuring that all references in the guidance and educational material uses non-binary terms (e.g., he/she) and that any written material are written at a suitable level for the target audience – e.g., plain language. This also involves producing key materials such as the Voter's Guide to Local Election in B.C. in seven languages (Chinese-Simplified, Chinese-Traditional, English, French, Farsi, Korean and Punjabi) and providing targeting information resources in several formats for those who learn best visually (e.g., PowToon videos, webinar, prospective candidate videos). MUNI is also developing new materials that respond to inclusion gaps that were noted in prior elections, such as the *Local Elections Guidance for Voters Living on Reserve* which raises understanding about entitlement to vote for eligible Indigenous and non-Indigenous voters as well as local government chief election officers and presiding election officials.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

Yes. The elections education program requires the production of brochures, guides, webinar/videos, and online material.s.13; s.17 s.13; s.17



In addition, there are costs associated with MUNI staff travel to give presentations, sit as panelists, or support other election partners (e.g., TAC). With COVID-19 recovery underway, staff anticipates that there will be a mixture of virtual and in-person events (as many as 13 events in total, with up to five in-person), which will be reflected in the travel costs.

KEY MESSAGES:

The meeting with UBCM Executive is a good opportunity for engagement on provincial/local government topics of mutual interest/concern. See topic-specific key messages below.

BACKGROUND:

The Minister of Municipal Affairs attends quarterly meetings with the UBCM Executive. The agenda is populated by both UBCM and the Province on issues of key interest and mutual concern.

UBCM Executive will attend this meeting in person at the Fairmont YVR. The Minister and Local Government Division ADM, and incoming Local Government Division Strategic Advisor will also attend the meeting in person. The current Strategic Advisor, and Director, Operations and Client Relations will be attending the meeting remotely via Zoom.

The next quarterly meeting with the UBCM Executive will be February 18, 2022.

INTRODUCTIONS/MINISTER'S OPENING REMARKS

- Good morning, it's my pleasure to join you this morning.
- I would like to begin by acknowledging that the land on which we are gathered is the traditional territory of the Coast Salish Peoples.
- I would like to recognize the incredible amount of work that has been happening
 over the past few months and how local governments, UBCM and the province have
 been working together to make things happen.
- Together we are collaborating to protect our environment, achieve reconciliation with First Nations peoples, improve our mental health, protect our communities from COVID, and improve the lives of citizens in all regions of the province.
- We also had another successful UBCM Convention this year thanks to all the work by the UBCM staff and Executive, as well as Ministry staff. I was able to meet and collaborate with many delegates through our one-on-one calls with communities, and I know my Minister colleagues also enjoyed that opportunity.
- I appreciated the meeting with Premier Horgan and the new UBCM Executive at the conclusion of Convention and look forward to hopefully being in person for these meetings and Convention next year.
- Regional calls started up again with local government representatives in October, and I would like to express my gratitude to UBCM President Laurey-Anne Roodenburg for joining me on these calls. Thank you, Laurey-Anne.
- The October regional calls were a valuable opportunity to hear the thoughts of local government leaders across the province especially around the issues and opportunities they would be focusing on in their communities over the next year.
- I appreciate being invited to join you at your Executive meeting again today and look forward to hearing from you and talking about matters of interest to us all.



AGENDA ITEMS

- 1. UPDATE BILL 26
 - Codes of Conduct
 - Local Government Public Notices
 - Public Hearings (land use amendments)

Speaking Points

- Bill 26, the Municipal Affairs Statutes Amendment Act No. 2, makes important changes on a number of matters of interest to local governments generally and to address some specific issues.
- The legislation passed 3rd Reading November 3. Once the legislation receives Royal Assent, some of the amendments will come into effect right away and others will come into effect later by regulation.
- I understand that you were particularly interested in the amendments related to codes of conduct, public notice, and land use.

Codes of Conduct

- Responsible conduct of local elected officials is a cornerstone of the function and trust that is vested in all locally elected officials – be that the municipal council or regional district board.
- As elected representatives for citizens, how elected officials engage with and treat
 each other, staff and the public is critical to successful governance. Once these
 amendments are brought into effect by regulation, I look forward to seeing all
 elected officials engaging in regular and meaningful dialogue about how they will
 govern together while demonstrating their accountability to the public.
- Codes of conduct enable elected officials to set shared expectations for behaviour; that's why these amendments add a new requirement for all municipal councils and regional district boards to publicly consider the development of a code of conduct for their council or board members.
- I want to thank the joint Working Group on Responsible Conduct of Ministry, UBCM and Local Government Management Association staff for their work on this approach.
- I am also pleased that the amendments respond to calls for more tools to strengthen local government responsible conduct as outlined in the special resolution (SR3) endorsed at UBCM Convention in September.
- Staff will now be doing the work needed to bring these new measures into force and prescribe the responsible conduct principles by regulation. In partnership with UBCM and LGMA, there will also be a focus on developing guidance and using



educational opportunities – such as the Local Government Leadership Academy Forum in February -- to support elected officials and staff regarding the new legislative requirements.

Local Government Public Notices

- We heard from local governments on numerous occasions (including multiple UBCM resolutions) that the existing notice requirements under local government legislation no longer fully meet community needs and the realities of modern electronic communication.
- The legislation creates a new flexible, "local choice" option for local governments to determine and specify, by bylaw, the means of public notice that will have the broadest reach in their communities.
- Where the existing rules are working well for communities, there is no requirement to change. They can continue to use their local newspapers for notice.
- The amendments will also bring public notice requirements for regional districts and the Islands Trust into line with those in municipalities by requiring them to post all public notices in the public notice posting places identified in their procedure bylaws.
- The public notice changes respond to what we have heard from local governments about giving them more flexibility in how they can best reach their citizens about civic engagement opportunities; at the same time, the approach will ensure that the important principles associated with the public notice requirement are preserved. Staff will now be working to bring these amendments into force by regulation, hopefully for early 2022.

Streamlining Development Approvals – General DAPR Comments

- Increasing housing supply is a priority for government. The province initiated the Development Approvals Process Review (DAPR) in December 2018 to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of development approvals given the challenges of housing supply.
- What we heard in the DAPR review included that:
 - local governments are too often holding public hearings for all zoning bylaws, regardless of whether they are required, and,
 - some decisions are coming to councils and boards for consideration that could be dealt with appropriately by staff.
- The amendments to the Local Government Act come into force right away when Bill 26 gets Royal Assent – that will start the work of simplifying and shortening approval processes, supporting a greater and timelier supply of housing, while continuing to ensure fairness and certainty for the public and development industry.



 These legislative amendments are not a 'silver bullet' solution to delays in development approval processes; however, they are two early actions that government can take, with more legislation, policy, education, and technical solutions in the future.

Public Hearings

- The amendment in regard to public hearings removes the current default requirement to hold public hearings on zoning bylaws where they are consistent with an Official Community Plan, thereby responding to development process delays that can arise in that situation.
- This means that local governments will be able to proceed without a public hearing more easily - because they will no longer need to go through the additional step of "waiving" or "opting out" of the public hearing.
- To ensure continued transparency, local governments will be required to provide public notice that the zoning bylaw will be proceeding to the council or board for consideration at first reading.
- As well, local governments will still be able to opt in to holding a public hearing for those bylaws where they feel it would benefit the community to hold the public hearing.

Delegation of Authority for Development Variance Permits

- The second amendment targeted at streamlining development approval processes will enable delegation of authority to make decisions on minor development variance permits to local government staff.
- Currently, such minor decisions are not included in ones that can be delegated to staff, contributing to delays in approvals processes.
- Minor variances from existing rules that could be delegated include variances from certain aspects of zoning, parking, sign or landscaping and screening regulations. Not having such decisions go to the council or board means freeing up time on agendas for consideration of more complex matters.

Background

Code of Conduct

- The amendments establish a new requirement for all local governments to publicly consider the development of a code of conduct.
- This is a next step in ongoing work that the province, UBCM and LGMA have committed to doing together, and the approach was supported by a special resolution endorsed at the Union of BC Municipalities Convention in September 2021.



- Once the provisions are in force, within six months of a general local election all municipal
 councils and regional district boards will have to consider, at an open meeting, whether to
 establish a new code of conduct or revise an existing one. Principles to guide these
 discussions will be established by regulation.
- If a local government decides not to establish or revise a code of conduct, they will need to make their reasons for this decision publicly available upon request. They will also have to reconsider their decision before January 1 of the year of the next general local election.
- These changes take effect by regulation likely in spring 2022. Additional guidance material will be provided when the changes are brought into force.
- In addition, the Working Group on Responsible Conduct is continuing to collaborate in
 other areas identified in resolution SR3, including reviewing the oath of office regulation
 and having further dialogue about the intended outcomes for a continuing education
 module for elected officials.

Local Government Public Notices

- Bill 26 changes to section 94 of the Community Charter would add an option for local
 governments to adopt a bylaw to provide for alternative means of publication. Prior to
 adopting a bylaw, local governments must first consider principles of effective public
 notice -- those will be defined through regulation and may include considerations like
 accessibility, suitability, and reliability. Councils and boards will be able to choose two or
 more ways (e.g., local government website and newspaper) to meet their statutory public
 notice obligations.
- Where existing rules are working well for communities there is no need to change they
 can continue to use newspapers for notice. This method of publication will remain the
 default.
- These changes will be brought into force by regulation in early 2022. Additional guidance material will be provided to local governments when the changes are brought into force.
- There are also several consequential amendments including modernized public notice requirements for regional districts and the Islands Trust to post public notices in the public notice posting places identified in their procedure bylaws. This brings notice requirement for regional districts and the Islands Trust into line with what is currently required for municipalities. The alternative means of publication authority also applies to the Islands Trust, and the City of Vancouver.

Public Hearings

- Currently, the *Local Government Act* requires a local government to "waive" or "opt out" of holding a public hearing for zoning amendments that are consistent with the OCP.
- The Bill 26 changes to section 464 of the Local Government Act remove the default requirement for local governments to hold public hearings for zoning bylaw amendments



that are consistent with the official community plan (OCP). Instead, approval of such zoning bylaws would proceed by default without public hearings, thereby removing the need for local governments to go through the process of waiving these hearings.

- To maintain transparency in such cases, the amendments will require that a local government provide public notice of the zoning bylaw before the bylaw is considered at first reading by a municipal council or regional district board.
- Under the proposed changes, local governments will still have the option to hold a public hearing on a zoning bylaw that is consistent with the OCP, if they so choose.

Delegation of Authority for Development Variance Permits

- Proposed changes to sections 498 and 499 of the Local Government Act would enable local
 governments to delegate development variance permit (DVP) decisions to staff, if the
 proposed variance is minor and pertains to matters specified in legislation, including:
 - a) zoning bylaws respecting siting, size and dimensions of buildings, structures and permitted uses.
 - b) off-street parking and loading space requirements.
 - c) regulation of signs; and
 - d) screening and landscaping to mask or separate uses or to preserve, protect, restore and enhance natural environment.
- These changes are designed to support increased efficiency of decision making in development approval processes. Stakeholders who participated in DAPR consultations identified public hearings and delegation of authority to staff for certain matters as areas for action that could help streamline development approvals.
- Local governments that delegate the power to issue a DVP to staff will be required to include in their delegation bylaw:
 - a) Criteria for determining whether a proposed variance is minor
 - b) Guidelines that the delegate must consider in deciding whether to issue a DVP
- The choice of delegation is the council or board's, thereby respecting local government autonomy, while the requirements help retain a level of oversight of delegated decisions and establish a fair application process for all applicants

2. VACCINE MANDATES IN LOCAL GOVERNMENT SECTOR

Speaking Points

 On October 25, an updated Provincial Health Order (PHO) on gatherings and events removed capacity restrictions for indoor or outdoor gatherings including for local government meetings/hearings (unless specified in regional health orders). The mandatory mask Order has been extended to slow the transmission of COVID-19.



- Currently PHO Orders for the proof of vaccination requirement do not apply to local
 government business (including local government meetings/hearings). That means
 that council and board members, staff and the public are not required to show a
 vaccine card to attend these essential functions.
- Outside of health care settings, checking employee vaccination status is not currently a public health requirement.
- Local governments, as employers, set terms and conditions of employment on a range of measures related to employee and workplace health and safety. Within the current COVID-19 context, some local governments are implementing vaccination policies as part of their overall health and safety strategy.
- Local governments that choose to implement vaccination policies for employees may
 want to start by checking with other local governments who have taken this step.
 They will also want to seek legal advice, allow time for consultation, provide
 transparent communication with employees, and allow sufficient time for
 unvaccinated employees to become vaccinated before implementation.
- After considering the local context, if local governments adopt vaccination policies
 that apply to elected officials, the council or board will want to be certain that the
 members can continue to meet the legislated requirements of the local government
 legislation (e.g., required attendance at regular meetings).
- For example, any policy adopted needs to align with local government procedure bylaws – (e.g., some procedure bylaws do not allow electronic participation or may limit the number of meetings an elected official can attend electronically). Local government vaccine policies for elected officials will want to ensure they don't inadvertently exclude elected officials from decision making.

- The PHO Orders for the proof of vaccination requirement focus on public access to some
 events, services and businesses the public can voluntarily choose to attend if they are
 vaccinated. The Orders are in place until January 31, 2022 and may be extended. Local
 government business is exempt from those PHO Orders.
- There are a number of local governments across the province that have implemented policies requiring proof of vaccination for employees by a specific date as a condition of employment (e.g., Victoria, Kamloops, Vancouver, Capital Regional District, Columbia Shuswap Regional District, Creston). In a few cases, Ministry staff understand that the vaccination policies implemented by the council also apply to locally elected officials (e.g., Penticton). Where there is no requirement for elected officials to provide proof of vaccination because it is an employee policy, some councils have "self-declared" that all members are vaccinated (e.g., Victoria, Saanich, Prince George). UBCM is expected to be most interested in the application of vaccination policies to elected officials.



- Effective September 13, 2021, the B.C. Legislative Assembly requires proof of vaccination for all members of the legislative assembly, staff, and guests to access the legislature. This will be re-evaluated regularly.
- The proof of vaccination policy for BC Public service employees is effective November 22, 2021. The policy supports employee health and safety and aligns with the PHO mandate to increase vaccination rates.

3. OLD GROWTH STRATEGY

Speaking Points

- Our government is committed to making sure forest habitats are preserved for generations to come and our oldest and most ancient forests are protected.
- On November 2, the Province announced its intention to work in partnership with First Nations to defer the harvest of ancient, rare and priority large stands of old growth within 2.6 million hectares of B.C.'s most at risk old-growth forests.
- These logging deferrals are a temporary measure recommended in the Old Growth Strategic Review – to prevent irreversible biodiversity loss while the province, First Nations, and other partners, including local governments, develop new approaches to sustainable old growth forest management that prioritizes ecosystem health and community prosperity throughout British Columbia.
- As Minister Conroy and I discussed at our November 8 regional calls with forestry sector local governments, we are listening to communities, understanding their concerns, and working to find the best, feasible, long-term solutions.
- We will support people and communities affected by the upcoming temporary oldgrowth deferrals through a comprehensive suite of supports, including programs that connect forest workers with short-term employment opportunities, education, and skills training.
- Programs will include:
 - Connecting forest workers with short-term employment opportunities, education, and skills training.
 - Forestry workers 55 and older may receive supports to help transition to retirement.
 - A community rapid response team that will provide in-community support and will co-ordinate with ministries and organizations to ensure supports are in place for individuals and communities.
- As well, potential supports are still being developed in the areas of:
 - Supports for job creation in rural British Columbia through value-added forestry and other manufacturing.



- Supports for infrastructure and economic development projects that promote diversification and resilience in communities.
- I heard your concerns at the regional calls on November 8 with Minister Conroy regarding local governments perceiving a lack of consultation and opportunity to provide input or feedback during the decision-making process for deferrals.
- I want to assure you that I am here to support you. My ministry will continue to
 highlight issues and provide support to the Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural
 Resource Operations and Rural Development as it works to find the best solutions. I
 am very pleased that Sarah Fraser, Assistant Deputy Minister and David Muter,
 Assistant Deputy Minister from that Ministry has been able to join us today to
 provide more information and answer your questions.

- On Nov. 2, 2021, the Province (FLNR) announced its intention to work in partnership with First Nations to defer harvest of ancient, rare and priority large stands of old growth within 2.6 million hectares of B.C.'s most at-risk old-growth forests.
- The Province will provide resources to support First Nations in assessing new data and on deferrals and participating in the development of the Province's new approach to sustainable forest management.
- When the deferral period ends, the newly identified at-risk forests will either be added to B.C.'s 3.5 million hectares of old-growth forests already off-limits to harvesting or included within new forest management plans that demonstrate how and where development may be done in these forests.
- FLNR regional staff are available to answer questions and will engage with communities that may be impacted.
- FLNR's new release <u>Government taking action on old-growth deferrals</u> as well as more information and results from the Old Growth Technical Panel Draft Results are online.

4. UPDATE ON CLIMATE ACTION FUNDING

Speaking Points

- Local governments across B.C. continue to demonstrate leadership and commitment to taking action on climate change.
- Our government remains committed to working with local governments to reach our climate goals and make life better for people across British Columbia.
- The recently released CleanBC Roadmap to 2030 highlights the prominent role that communities have in reaching those goals.



- The Roadmap also commits the province to establishing a new program to support local government climate actions through flexible, predictable funding.
- We look forward to engaging with UBCM through the Green Communities Committee and with local governments as this work progresses.
- We have also dedicated \$11 million to tackle the B.C. Climate Action Charter's third commitment of creating complete, compact energy-efficient communities.
- I look forward to being able to share more information on this soon.

- Both the Provincial CleanBC strategy (2018) and the recent CleanBC Roadmap to 2030
 (2021) outline ambitious greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction targets for 2030 and 2050. The
 Roadmap accelerates a transition to a net-zero future to ensure the province meets the
 current legislated GHG reduction target of 40 percent below 2007 levels by 2030.
- The *Roadmap* includes a commitment for a new funding program to support local government climate action.

5. MOU on Local Government Finance

Speaking Points

 As you are aware, "Ensuring Local Government Financial Resiliency: Today's Recovery and Tomorrow's New Economy" was endorsed during the September UBCM Convention. The report highlights the need for an effective partnership with the province to work towards solutions.



- As the Premier mentioned in his Convention address, the province would like a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with UBCM to solidify the province's commitment to collaboration.
- Both Minister Robinson and I have asked our staff to work on developing an MOU
 with UBCM to build this partnership. I understand this work is proceeding and a final
 version for consideration and signing should be in place in the near term. And then
 work will progress on developing a Terms of Reference for a provincial-UBCM work
 group.
- The province is reviewing the report and its recommendations and appreciates the chance for dialogue.

- At the 2021 annual UBCM conference, delegates adopted the report "Ensuring Local Government Financial Resiliency: Today's Recovery and Tomorrow's New Economy" (2021 Report) which contains 20 recommendations to reform local government financing. The province supported UBCM's Select Committee on Local Government Finance and with support from the Premier, Minister's Osborne and Robinson directed staff to work towards an MOU.
- The 20 recommendations are reflected in the three key cost drivers identified: attainable
 housing, community safety and climate change. There are a diverse range of issues from
 cybersecurity, new economy, mental health, climate adaptation and more covered by the
 recommendations. This range of topics reaches beyond the Ministry of Municipal Affairs
 and Ministry of Finance to other ministries.
- After the MOU being agreed to by both parties, a Terms of Reference for a provincial-UBCM
 working group will be established. The working group will focus on developing approaches
 to examine the recommendations, related data analysis and inform consideration for policy
 options.

DECLARATION ON THE RIGHTS OF INDIGENIOUS PEOPLE ACT (DRIPA)

If asked about further engagement with local governments beyond the Minister Osborne and Rankin December Regional Calls which will be a positive engagement approach – *issue has recently been raised at the staff level:*

• MUNI understands that local governments are looking for more information on their role in building relationships with their FN neighbours in the context of DRIPA. We are going to work with UBCM to try and provide some clarity knowing things are going to evolve over time. As part of this work, we would like to draw on examples and work local governments are already doing, and share best practices where relationships are positive and progressing. We will need to do this work in partnership with UBCM and First Nation organizations as well.

UPDATED INFORMATION/AGENDA ITEMS

1. MOU on Local Government Finance

Background

 UBCM staff have approved the latest changes to the MOU at the request of FIN/MUNI staff. UBCM staff will be presenting the draft MOU to UBCM's Presidents Committee on November 18th. However, the draft MOU still needs to go through provincial legal review before it can be finalized.

2. NEW - PROVINCIAL EMERGENCIES - FLOODING AND MUDSLIDES (if asked)

Speaking Points

- A provincial state of emergency has been declared in B.C. to support the
 provincewide response and recovery from the widespread damage caused by severe
 flooding.
- Keeping people safe is our government's number one priority, and we will do
 everything possible to make that happen.
- We ask people to keep any travel in impacted areas to only what is essential, so that
 safety of others with urgent needs isn't impeded. The Ministry of Transportation and
 Infrastructure is currently drafting travel plan restrictions and more information
 will be available shortly.
- We're working with local communities and emergency crews to make sure essential goods and supplies reach communities cut-off by the floods.
- Minister Farnworth has confirmed yesterday during the regional calls with local governments that supply chains are intact to the Northern, Central and Interior regions. Supplies are re-routed from Alberta and through the US and, therefore,



there is no need to horde. Local governments can help to get this message out to the residents in their communities. Please be patient and keep normal shopping habits.

- The province is also focusing on clearing, repairing and reopening roads to connect the Interior and the North to the Lower Mainland and Vancouver Island, to get commercial traffic moving and allow residents to return back to their homes.
- The federal government has responded to and accepted British Columbia's requests for assistance. Additional federal personnel and resources are being deployed to B.C. to assist. This includes Canadian Armed Forces ground and air support.
- The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure has been able to get a first-hand look at the impacts the worst weather storm in a century has had on our infrastructure.
- Provincial staff are putting together specific repair plans for those sites that have significant damage.
- The Ministry of Agriculture, Food, and Fisheries is currently assessing the devastating impacts the catastrophic flooding has had on farmers. Immediate assistance with grain feed and water is provided right now.
- Minister Popham encourages communities to reach out to her and her ministry staff through social media if they can provide support for farmers or if they know of farmers that "fell through the cracks" and need immediate assistance now.

Bylaw No. 132, which would amend the Saturna Island Official Community Plan to include wording in acknowledgement and reconciliation of First Nations place,

context and rights.

BACKGROUND:

Under section 27 of the *Islands Trust Act*, Ministerial approval is required for bylaws that establish or amend official community plans (OCPs) within the Islands Trust area. This approval ensures the Islands Trust does not enact bylaws that conflict with provincial interests (refer to **Appendix 1** for details on MUNI's role and scope of review).

The Saturna Island Local Trust Committee (LTC) proposes to amend the Saturna Island OCP by adding the following text to the beginning of the OCP document, immediately following the Introduction section:

Coast Salish Peoples, including the WSÁNEĆ, have lived and resided on or near Saturna Island since time immemorial.

The history of Coast Salish Peoples is sustained in the language, place names, village sites, cultural and sacred sites that encompass the whole of the Islands Trust Area. Coast Salish Peoples have seen and lived the transformation of their lands and waters since contact. This tide of change has greatly impacted the eco-system that sustained them, and the cultural heritage of the first peoples of the Salish Sea. Coast Salish Peoples have and will continue to be a thriving people, government, and community, connected to the lands and waters through spiritual, cultural, and traditional knowledge for generations to come.

The WSÁNEĆ Peoples speak a language called SENĆOTEN, and have a rich and vibrant economic, social, cultural, and spiritual life that is connected to these lands and waters. The lands and waters of the WSÁNEĆ Peoples is enriched with history, place names, village sites, cultural sites, and sacred sites and the islands and waters form the basis of their language, culture, and spiritual life within the Salish Sea.

Saturna Island is the location of the STÁUTW(Tsawout) First Nation and WSIKEM (Tseycum) First Nation reserve #7. The importance and inherent rights and jurisdiction that this area holds to the WSÁNEĆ Peoples continues now and into the future and the stewardship of these lands and waters for their children's children endures.



Islands Trust Planning staff report that this recognition and acknowledgement of First Nations place, context and inherent rights within the OCP is consistent with the reconciliation objectives of the Islands Trust and the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP); as well as Bill 41 *Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act* (DRIPA). The amendment follows on a May 2020, resolution from the Saturna Island LTC that staff should draft an OCP amendment in acknowledgement of reconciliation of First Nations place, context and inherent rights.



Ministerial Approval of Islands Trust Official Community Plan Bylaws

Islands Trust Background

- The Islands Trust is a special purpose local authority established by provincial statute in 1974
 to manage development on the islands between the mainland and southern Vancouver Island
 as far north as Courtenay.
- The Islands Trust area includes 13 major islands and more than 450 smaller islands covering approximately 5,200 square kilometers of land and water, with about 25,000 residents and another 10,000 non-resident property-owners (see map below).
- 12 Local Trust Committees (LTCs) and one Island Municipality (Bowen), are each responsible for one major island and several smaller islands, and developing, administering, and enforcing land use bylaws.
- Under section 27 of the *Island Trust Act*, Ministerial approval is required for LTC bylaws establishing or amending official community plans (OCP). Ministerial approval is also required for zoning bylaws in areas that are not already covered by an OCP (section 56). This approval role continues to be maintained because of the role of the Islands Trust in protecting a unique part of British Columbia.



OCP Bylaw Development Process



- During the development of an amendment bylaw, LTCs must consider which organizations and authorities to consult and engage with including provincial agencies and First Nations.
- Typically, MUNI encourages LTCs to engage with key agencies such as: TRAN (e.g. for subdivision and proposed development near controlled access highways); Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development (e.g. for Crown lands, resource use, wildlife/fish habitat protection, archaeology and heritage); and Ministry of Environment (e.g. for waste management).
- Other ministries and agencies, such as Transport Canada, the Department of Fisheries and Oceans, the Agricultural Land Commission, regional districts, harbour authorities, and health authorities, are consulted when their interests are affected.
- MUNI provides guidance for LTCs to follow, including supporting their engagement with First Nations. Engagement steps include determining which Nations may have an interest in a proposed bylaw; providing notice and opportunities for input; and following up and addressing concerns.

• Upon adoption of the bylaws, the LTC will send file closure correspondence to all the First Nations engageded.

Bylaw Review Process

- Ministry staff reviews every LTC bylaw submitted and makes recommendations to the Minister regarding approval. The primary consideration is ensuring there are no conflicts with significant provincial interests.
- Ministry staff also reviews the engagement between the LTC and First Nations and determines if there are unresolved concerns and if consultation by the ministry with First Nations is required.
- Ministry staff does not assess whether a bylaw is appropriate for a community this is fundamentally the responsibility of the local elected officials.
- Ministry staff also does not review bylaws to determine if they are valid or lawful as this is also a local responsibility.
- Ministerial approval does not represent or guarantee the legality of a bylaw or the process under which it is adopted, nor does it validate or legalize any provision of a bylaw.

Resolving Conflicts

- LTCs and provincial agencies are encouraged to resolve any concerns or objections before a bylaw is submitted for ministerial approval.
- Ministry staff maintains a working relationship with Islands Trust staff and sometimes facilitates discussions over bylaw concerns to help resolve conflicts.
- If significant provincial issues are unresolved, and a disputed bylaw is submitted for ministerial approval, ministry staff seeks clarification about provincial objections and prepares an analysis with recommendations for the Minister's consideration.
- In such cases, the Minister may choose to not approve the bylaw.

Topic: District of Saanich/City of Victoria Citizens' Assembly on Amalgamation

Purpose: Meeting with Mayors to clarify and come to a shared understanding of the

anticipated purpose and process of the proposed Citizens' Assembly.

Meeting With:

Mayor Haynes (Saanich) and Mayor Helps (Victoria) date of meeting - TBD.

KEY MESSAGES:

• Thank-you for providing the terms of reference for the Citizens' Assembly on amalgamation. The terms of reference reflect a collaborative approach for the project and provide progressive ways to seek community input on this initiative.

- Provincially we are interested in supporting robust and transparent processes for community members to understand the costs and benefits of any proposed change in their community and for community members to be heard on this issue.
- I am curious to hear your thoughts on the following areas that are important components for a successful project:
 - What are the pressing issues that are underlying the request to form an Assembly? I would be interested to hear if there are particular governance or services challenges that the Citizens' Assembly might be considering and where amalgamation might be perceived as alleviating those concerns?

- The province has a very limited budget for undertaking this work, the request for \$250,000 for the Assembly only covers part of the work needed for an amalgamation study, - what is the total budget for the project, and will more funding be requested of the Ministry?
- I look forward to having a productive meeting and hearing about the work your municipalities are doing to shape this process.

BACKGROUND:

The District of Saanich and the City of Victoria submitted a joint proposal to the Minister of Municipal Affairs (MUNI) in June 2021 for a Citizens' Assembly (Assembly) that would examine the advantages and disadvantages of amalgamation. The municipalities requested \$250,000 in provincial support, which they would each match. An interim response (Ref: 267586) indicated that MUNI would examine the submission and follow up later.



The proposal, including Terms Of Reference (TOR) negotiated between the municipalities, outlines a study process that would create the Assembly to analyse both technical information (such as cost and structure of services) and information gathered from the public engagement events. The analysis would be used to develop findings and recommendations for the two councils on next steps i.e., whether more information is needed or if there is enough information to ask the Minister to order an amalgamation vote. The TOR suggests the Assembly would be made up of 27 participants from Saanich and 21 participants from Victoria, led by a contracted moderator who will determine the sequencing of the work for the Assembly. The proposal calls for up to 12 inperson meetings and three public engagement events; this resembles the method used for the 2016 City of Duncan/District of North Cowichan amalgamation study.

The Assembly will be the face of the study process: led by a facilitator, participants will discuss, and debate issues related to the benefits, disadvantages and costs associated with amalgamation in key municipal areas such as service provision, land use planning and governance. The purpose of the Assembly is to draw conclusions on whether amalgamation is a viable option. The Assembly discussions are supported by technical consultants, who provide in-depth information on the key topics. The Assembly will host three public information sessions so that the public can weigh in on the matter. Municipal elected officials do not have an active role in the Assembly's work.

Since the proposal submission, the submission has been reviewed and MUNI staff have met with senior municipal staff to clarify issues such as roles of elected officials, timing, budget, engagement activities and problem statement for the project. Although significant information gaps have been resolved (see Attachment 1 for the updated TOR) there are still areas where input from municipal elected officials is needed e.g., problem statement, timing, and budget.

DISCUSSION:

The municipal restructure program is designed to support local proposals with funding and advice, while leaving the municipalities responsible for meeting study objectives and ensuring the local process meet their constituent's needs. The provincial role is to provide advice and support local governments in designing a process that supports citizens to understand the benefits and costs of the amalgamation, clarifies and works to build an understanding about what the future of the municipalities/region looks like.s.13; s.16; s.17

On November 30, media reported that the Saanich's chief administrative officer (CAO) and the District of Saanich "have parted ways". CAO had been the key staff point person for Saanich. MUNI staff have reached out to the interim CAO to determine who will now be leading the project. Impacts on timing is unknown at this time.

Overview of proposed work



The creation of the Assembly is in response to the 2018 ballot questions where the majority of the electorate agreed that they support the municipalities to spend money to study amalgamation. Although the TOR for the Assembly fulfills the outcome of the ballot question, it is unclear **what practical governance and services issues might be resolved by amalgamation**. One of the key reasons for holding the meeting with the Mayors is to better understand what are the key challenges and how the Assembly process might address those challenges including if amalgamation is not seen as a solution to one of the practical governance or service issues is the Assembly going to examine alternatives to amalgamation as a way forward?

Timing

Three years have passed since voters elected the councils with a mandate to explore amalgamation. s.13; s.16; s.17 s.13; s.16; s.17

It is anticipated that the meeting with the Mayors will facilitate further discussion with councils and staff to clarify the problem statement for the project, budget, and timing in a revised TOR.

GBA+ OR DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION IMPLICATIONS:

The municipalities have designed a robust and balanced process for the selection of participants for the Assembly. The selection process is based on demographic characteristics and includes a proportionate number of participants across age cohorts, home ownership/renters, urban/rural and Indigenous communities. This should ensure that the work of the Assembly reflects the myriad views of governance and service provision in the municipalities.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

The 2021/22 restructure budget is heavily subscribed and cannot accommodate a \$250,000 request. The amount could be accommodated in 2022/23 as several commitments targeted to specific tasks or disbursed in the second half of 2022/23 and the first half of 2023/24.

Under the *Local Government Grants* Regulation, MUNI can fund up to \$60,000 per component project per local government per year. Therefore, payments of \$125,000 in fiscal 2022/23 to each Saanich and Victoria or payments of \$60,000 in 2022/23 and \$65,000 in 2023/24 to the respective municipalities.

Scope of study, rationale for undertaking the study and description of processes.

Mandate of the Citizens' Assembly (Section 3 of the approved Terms of Reference)

The Assembly is tasked by the District of Saanich and the City of Victoria to explore the costs, benefits and disadvantages of the amalgamation between the District of Saanich and the City of Victoria.

Specifically, the Assembly will:

- Identify common aspirations for good local governance to provide a basis for evaluating costs, benefits and disadvantages of amalgamation and status quo of the municipalities relative to their current independent status.
- List the issues which the Assembly believes needs to be resolved for amalgamation to merit consideration, including issues related to the implementation and integration of the municipalities under amalgamation.

In satisfying their mandate and developing recommendations, the Assembly will be expected to consider and analyze the positive and negative impacts of amalgamation (at a minimum) the following:

- Assets and liabilities of Saanich and Victoria including any related impacts on local rate payers.
- Cultural and land use priorities and similarities and differences of the two municipalities. Balance of the issues of economy of scale with community identity and representation.
- Comparison of corporate structures and approaches to governance of the two municipalities.
- All analysis and recommendations of the Assembly are informed and mindful of the ongoing work with local First Nations towards Reconciliation.
- Neighbourhood level implications.
- Congruency and alignment of strategic and political priorities of the municipalities (as expressed in Strategic Plans, Official Community Plans, Urban Containment Boundary policies and other significant strategic and planning documents).
- Past investment in and future needs for capital assets, infrastructure replacement reserves including the analysis of anticipated impacts on an amalgamated municipality.

- Variations in levels of service of the two municipalities including the development of clear recommendations on aligning service levels in an amalgamated municipality.
- Clear delineation of advantages and disadvantages for the respective municipality in considering amalgamation versus those accruing solely to a combined municipality arising from amalgamation.
- To the extent possible, consideration of costs, benefits and disadvantages of amalgamation between the District of Saanich and the City of Victoria over both the short and long terms (i.e. over 5 year, 20 year, and 50 year horizons).
- Consideration of democratic representation and accessibility of elected officials to residents and other stakeholders.
- Commentary from the Assembly on other opportunities for service integration is considered part of the Assembly's mandate.
- If full amalgamation of Saanich and Victoria is recommended by the Assembly, commentary and recommendations from the Assembly on the integration of full municipal operations (both in the short and longer term) is expected as part of the Assembly's mandate.
- In meeting its mandate and the expectations outlined in the Terms of Reference, the Assembly will, to the greatest extent possible, represent the consensus view of the members. Divergent views of Assembly members will be included in the Citizens' Assembly's Final Report.

Stages of work

Stage 1

Once funding is secure, both municipalities will engage in a Request for Proposal for a consultant to oversee and facilitate the Citizens' Assembly process.

Stage 2

The Consultant will schedule the next steps in accordance with the approved Terms of Reference:

Schedule of the Citizens' Assembly (Section 5 of the approved Terms of Reference)

The Assembly will convene during 6-12 Saturday sessions beginning in 2019 (to be updated),* and concluding in 2020 (to be updated)*. Additional meetings of the Assembly may be scheduled at the discretion of the Chair of the Assembly (see 8.2 for roles and responsibilities of the Chair). Meetings of the Assembly will not allow the public to attend in person but will be viewable by the public through webcast. The Assembly will also host multiple public

roundtable meetings in both municipalities during the course of the Assembly schedule, with one of the meetings to discuss the technical report, which will be open to all local residents. The Assembly at the start of their process will set and define their schedule. *Note: Timelines were impacted due to both municipalities approving the Terms of Reference, COVID-19 and a By-Election conducted by the City of Victoria Stage 3 (will be concurrent with Stage 2) The consultant/facilitator will work concurrently with the Citizens' Assembly and another Request for Proposal will be issued to undertake a technical review. Once a firm has been selected the Citizens' Assembly will be in a position to make requests for particular technical information. The third party technical team will gather information for the assembly to review and deliberate on in making their final recommendations. This stage may have a natural pause in the process for the technical team to provide its findings to the Citizens' Assembly. Stage 4 The Citizens' Assembly provides its recommendations to both Council's. Council will then deliberate on the outcome and jointly accept, deny or provide other direction on the recommendations of the Citizens' Assembly. Stage 5 Depending on the outcome of Council deliberations on the Citizens' Assembly recommendations, Saanich and Victoria may request the Minister to approve a ballot question which will then initiate the Request for Proposal on an Implementation Plan. The amounts noted are based on feedback from a consultant's experience of conducting assemblies throughout Canada. The following is a breakdown based on conservative estimates:

Civic Lottery Process: \$20,000 - the process anticipates a 5% response rate on invitations sent out to the community. At a minimum 20,000 letters should be sent out from each municipality. Printing/postage: \$40,000 (\$2.00/letter) 3) Facilitated Sessions: \$230,000 - this would include 13 staff for a 75 member assembly for up to 12 meeting sessions and 3 public input/roundtable meetings. Important for Council to note that it is recommended a 1-6 ratio of member to staff based on a 75 member assembly (note these costs would be reduced if the number of participants was reduced). Venue Costs: \$60,000 - this is strictly for the cost of webcasting for the Victoria Conference Centre (host location). 5) Honorariums: \$90,000+ (based on 75 participants) 6) Refreshments/breaks: \$30,000 7) Technical Analysis - 250,000 - 350,000 The total costs are estimated in the range of \$720,000 to \$820,000 and both Councils initially approved a maximum budget of \$750,000. The total costs may need to be adjusted. Additional Information as requested for the Citizens' Assembly (CA) process:

*Note this information is being provided in response to an email from Ministry staff dated August 18, 2021.

Revised budget reflecting the new composition of the CA. And an indication of additional funding
requests for project work – i.e., oversight committee (not sure if this expenditure is a part of the
CA), implementation study, community consultation in advance of a vote. For the additional work,
a rough cost estimate would be appreciated so that we understand the magnitude of the total ask.

The understanding/expectation is that the current budget numbers stand for the work involved for the CA process as a whole including the Technical Study. The "oversight committee" is part of the CA process and would also be within that budget (expected to have minimal cost implications). The implementation Plan is not captured in the budget and remains an unknown until there is an understanding of the direction(s) arising from the CA, similarly the District of Saanich and City of Victoria would expect engagement as a requirement part of a referendum vote and any electoral event costs of a referendum if it occurs o/s an election cycle.

Future funding for implementation including the "Plan", engagement, referendum and actual implementation costs/budget are not captured in this process or budget and will have to be determined and considered by Councils at the appropriate time.

Revised table regarding who is doing what in relation to the procurement of consultants

As noted to MAH Staff at the meeting procurement for CA and Technical Study were to be undertaken with the City of Victoria fronting the processes but will be a joint procurement initiative.

• Impact of COVID-19: what happens to the project if there is another lock down or prohibition on in-person gatherings? What is the back-up plan?

This is not an aspect that has been discussed or planned for. In the event of some kind of wide shut down, staff would have to return to Councils with the CA consultant for discussion of alternative approaches and for additional funding support if required, or some other direction(s) as Councils see appropriate at the time.

 Problem statement – the materials speak to what the CA will do but is lacking a strong problem statement that tells why the work is being done.

The question of amalgamation between Saanich and Victoria has been asked in both municipalities for many years.

In the 2018 General Local Election, the District of Saanich and City of Victoria jointly asked the following community opinion question by ballot to its electors:

"Are you in favour of spending up to \$250,000 for establishing a Citizens' Assembly to explore the cost, benefits, and disadvantages of the amalgamation between the District of Saanich and City of Victoria?"

Both municipalities had a favourable response from its electors in establishing a Citizens' Assembly which lead to Saanich and Victoria working together to endorse and approve a Terms of Reference for a Citizens' Assembly.

Topic: Saanich/Victoria Amalgamation Study Proposal

Purpose: Provide an overview of the proposal for an amalgamation study and \$250,000 in

grant funding, and outline considerations for the funding decision process.

BACKGROUND:

On June 28, 2021 the Mayors of the District of Saanich and the City of Victoria wrote to Minister Osborne, submitting the terms of reference for the project, while respectfully asking for \$250,000 to support their proposal. Cliff 267586 is an interim response to their request. This briefing note sets out considerations of the request.

During the 2018 general local election, the District and the City asked its electors

"Are you in favour of spending up to \$250,000 for establishing a Citizens' Assembly to explore the cost, benefits and disadvantages of the amalgamation between the District of Saanich and the City of Victoria"

The community opinion polled passed by 55.94 percent in Saanich and by 66.47 percent in Victoria. Since 2018, the municipal councils have been working to come to agreement on terms of reference for the amalgamation project. The proposal submission has been delayed by several factors including a by-election in Victoria and the impact of COVID-19 on municipal operations.

During this time, Ministry of Municipal Affairs (MUNI) program staff have contacted municipal staff to talk about the potential steps forward. While general information was exchanged, the municipalities were responsible for drafting the terms of reference for the proposed project.

DISCUSSION:

The proposal broadly outlines how the municipalities designed a study process to answer the 2018 ballot question. At the centre of the process is a Citizens' Assembly, which will be charged with analysing whether the information gathered by the study's technical consultant supports amalgamation.

The Citizens' Assembly would be made up of 27 residents of Saanich and 21 residents from Victoria and would gather six to twelve times before releasing their findings. s.13; s.17 s.13; s.17

The Table appended to the letter dated June 28, 2021 outlines the subjects that the Citizens' Assembly will examine. It does not address broader matters, such as regional impact of amalgamation on the Capital Regional District or services provided by other arrangements on a regional level (e.g., Victoria Police Department also serves the Township of Esquimalt).

Public Engagement

Public engagement is one of the key activities during an amalgamation process, where the exchange of information that has the power to educate the electorate. While the Citizens' Assembly provides a means of gathering the views of a cross-section of the constituents, the terms of reference do not foreshadow broader public consultation in advance of an amalgamation vote. It is during this time that residents will learn of the results from the Citizens' Assembly report and learn the reasons why the councils have chosen to ask for a vote on amalgamation and what an amalgamated municipality would look like.

Timing

Timelines for the process are not provided in either the letter or the terms of reference. While this may in part be due to uncertainty about the timing of a funding decision, it will be needed to determine in which budget year municipalities require the funding, , and to understand how far advanced the work will be coming into the 2022 general local election.

Selection for the Citizens Assembly is based on demographic features of each municipality including a proportionate number of participants from age cohorts, renters/home owners, urban/rural and First Nations. An equal proportion of male and female members with the above characteristics will make up the Assembly.

Although impacts of amalgamation on Indigenous peoples are not expected to be extensive, if amalgamation appears likely MUNI will consult with Indigenous Nations to seek their views on how consolidation of Saanich and Victoria might affect their interests and members.


