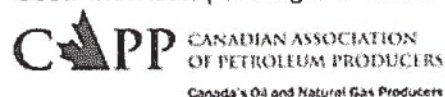

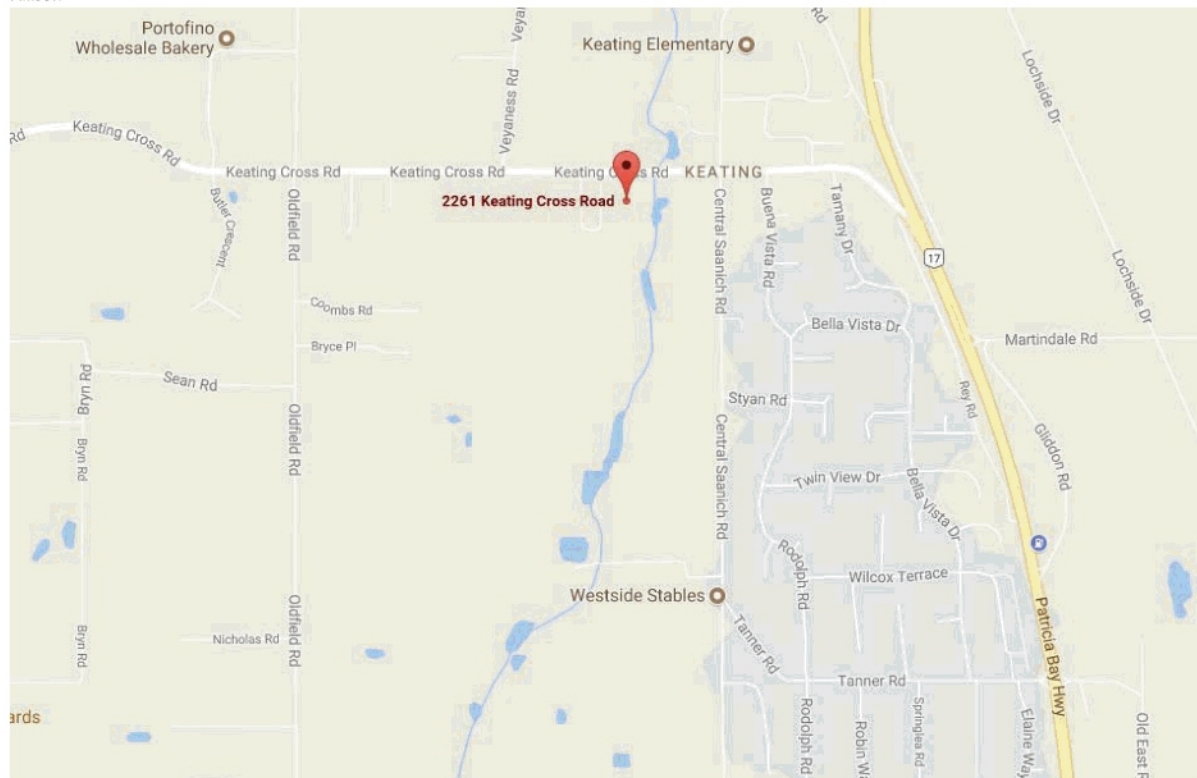

Setting carbon reduction targets and meeting them (p. 56)

- We will renew the Climate Leadership panel within our first 100 days, and work towards implementing their full suite of recommendations under our core principles for climate action.
- We will put BC on a path to meeting BC's legislated 2050 greenhouse gas emission reduction target of 80 per cent below 2007 levels and will set a new legislated 2030 reduction target of 40 per cent below 2007 levels.

Making new carbon taxes predictable, fair and effective (p. 57)

- We will phase in the federally mandated \$50/tonne carbon price by 2022 over three years, starting in 2020.
- We will create a new climate action rebate cheque for low and middle income families. This cheque will go to 80 per cent of BC households, with a majority receiving more back from this rebate than they pay in new carbon taxes. The rebate will be issued at the start of each year, so families aren't out of pocket.
- We will provide certainty to stimulate investment and protect trade exposed businesses, maintaining our competitiveness, by establishing separate sectoral reduction goals and sectoral reduction plans for transportation (30 per cent reduction by 2030), industry (30 per cent reduction by 2030), and buildings and homes (50 per cent reduction by 2030).

Banning the grizzly trophy hunt (p. 58)

- We will ban the grizzly bear trophy hunt.
- We will make permits for other kinds of hunting more fair for BC residents.

Protecting species at risk (p.59)

- We will bring in an endangered species law and harmonize other laws to ensure they are all working towards the goal of protecting our beautiful province.
- We will work with the federal government, South Okanagan communities, and local First Nations to create a plan to protect the large number of endangered species in that area, as the federal government develops a new national park.

Investing in parks and camping (p.59)

- We will restore funding for BC parks.
- We will hire additional park rangers and conservation officers.
- We will build new campsites to catch up with current demand.
- We will put BC residents first in line for campsite bookings.

Improving wildlife management (p.59)

- We will ensure dedicated funding for wildlife and habitat conservation, give wildlife and habitat priority, and engage concerned groups to work collaboratively towards short and long term plans for our wildlife resources.
- We will put all funds from hunting licenses and tags into a dedicated fund for wildlife and habitat conservation.
- We will bring people who rely on our wildlife resources together and ensure they all participate in and contribute financially to conservation. This way we will not only ensure dedicated funding for habitat conservation but have the funds required to do the work needed.

Sustaining aquaculture and commercial and recreational fishing (p.60)

- We will ensure that the salmon farming industry does not endanger wild salmon by implementing the recommendations of the Cohen Commission, keeping farm sites out of important salmon migration routes, and supporting research and transparent monitoring to minimize the risk of disease transfer from captive to wild fish.
- We will also provide incentives to help the aquaculture industry transition to closed containment where possible.

Environmental decisions you can trust (p.61)

- We will update our environmental assessment legislation and processes to ensure that they respect the legal rights of First Nations, and meet the public's expectation of a strong, transparent process that results in the best outcomes as part of a made in BC assessment process.
- We will improve environmental assessments to provide certainty to project proponents, First Nations, and all British Columbians, faster.
- In partnership with First Nations and communities, we will modernize land-use planning to effectively and sustainably manage BC's ecosystems, rivers, lakes, watersheds, forests and old growth, while accounting for cumulative effects. We will take an evidence-based scientific approach and use the ecosystem-based management of the Great Bear Rainforest as a model.

Good jobs and a sustainable economy (p. 62)

Most of BC's natural gas is produced using hydraulic fracturing, a process that has been used in north eastern BC for decades.

With the potential of a significant expansion of gas production in the years ahead, we will appoint a scientific panel to review the practice to ensure that gas is produced safely, and that our environment is protected. This will include assessment of impacts on water and, given recent minor earthquakes in the area, what role gas production has in seismic activity.

We will use every tool in our toolbox to stop the Kinder Morgan pipeline project from going ahead.

Clean, safe drinking water and healthy communities (p.63)

- We will commit to and recognize the right to clean, safe drinking water through a renewed environmental assessment process that works with First Nations and communities to address the cumulative effects of development on ecosystems and watersheds.
- We will work with the federal government to improve drinking water quality in BC communities and ensure our permitting process prioritizes local drinking water needs.
- We will review the Water Sustainability Act to ensure that high volume water users are paying for access fairly, and that drinking water sources are protected.
- We will keep cancer-causing chemicals off of our lawns, and out of our parks, gardens and places where children play by banning cosmetic pesticides.

Mining (p.75)

- We will expand the role of the BC Geological Survey (BCGS) and use GeoScience and BCGS data to inform land use planning initiatives in partnership with First Nations.

LNG (p. 78)

To ensure BC benefits, we will require LNG projects meet four conditions:

- Projects must offer jobs and training for British Columbians, especially jobs for local people.
- The people of BC must get a fair return for our resources.
- Projects must secure full partnerships with local First Nations
- Projects must complete a made-in-BC environmental assessment, and achieve the highest environmental standards while respecting our commitments to combating climate change.

BC Green Party Platform Summary

Strategy for a Green Economy (p. 43) A BC Green Government will:

Capitalize on the Opportunities Presented by a Changing Climate

- Promote investment in clean energy and transportation, and clean/green initiatives that create jobs and economic activity without increasing greenhouse gas emissions.

Grow the Clean Technology Sector

- Invest \$120 million over four years in partnerships with industry, academic institutions and other levels of government to support research, development and commercialization of climate friendly technologies and implement innovative ways to achieve desired environmental outcomes.

Utilize Economic Instruments

- Initiate the use of economic instruments to promote greening of the economy and protect key environmental values that support health and wellbeing.

Implement Green Regulations

- Review the environmental legislative framework and its application, to ensure the regulatory environment promotes adoption of green technologies and practices.

Maximize Economic Benefits from Waste Streams

- Promote the use of clean technology to derive the maximum economic benefit from waste streams.

Promote Green Business

- Use government procurement to encourage the greening of businesses, products and processes and allocate \$20 million per year to support the adoption of green technology.

Resilient Communities (p.46) A BC Green Government will:

Coordinate Approach to Climate Adaptation

- Provide \$31 million to fund climate adaptation initiatives, and work with other levels of government to develop a coordinated approach to disaster risk reduction related to a changing climate.

Invest in Mapping and Data Gathering

- Invest in mapping, modelling and data gathering to facilitate climate risk planning, and strengthen platforms for public access and utilization of new information for planning purposes, particularly for local government and private sector.
- Establish requirements for climate risk and emergency preparedness planning in government agencies; and report annually on progress.

- Work with communities to develop climate resilience plans that manage development in floodplains and other high risk areas.
- Support further research into the health impacts of a changing climate in BC, and accelerate the development of risk mitigation plans.

Natural Resources (p.49) A BC Green Government will:

Implement Resilience Planning

- Make the resilience of our natural asset base a priority and work with industrial sectors that will be impacted by climate change to develop integrated climate risk management and resilience plans to preserve long term economic and environmental sustainability, and promote best practices. Sectors affected by climate change include forestry, mining, tourism, aquaculture, fisheries, agriculture, and energy. The plans will not only be internal to the industry, but will consider competing interests of the different industries.

Ensure Compliance

- Implement new guidelines for the use of qualified professionals that eliminates the potential for conflict of interest, and work with professional bodies to ensure that codes of conduct for their members are fully enforced.
- Re-establish the integrity of the Environmental Assessment process and establish clear criteria for decisions that fully factor in sustainability and cumulative impacts.
- Establish a natural resource sector wide compliance and enforcement (C&E) unit that will be responsible for the continuum of C&E activities from inspections to prosecutions. An additional \$20 million will be allocated to enhance monitoring, compliance and enforcement.
- Establish a Natural Resource Commissioner who will lead a Natural Resources Board that is responsible for establishing sustainable harvest and extraction levels and reporting on the state of BC's environment and natural assets. The NRB will conducting cumulative impact assessments, and oversee the professional reliance model.
- Rebuild the scientific and technical capability of the BC Public Service
- Reform the governance of the oil and gas sector to remove conflicting interests within the Oil and Gas Commission.

Collaborative management with First Nations (p.51) A BC Green Government will:

Commit to Collaborative Stewardship of Resources

- Recognize First Nations as equals in land management and establish a co-management stewardship model with Indigenous People for the development of provincial resources. This could include a review of regional resource management structures in cooperation with the First Nations Leadership Council to incorporate First Nations effectively into decision making; and funding to train First Nations people in resource management trades and professions.
- Collaborate with First Nations and the Federal government to renew and reinvigorate the treaty process. Ultimately the treaty process will be much more successful once a respectful collaborative relationship is established with First Nations on resource management.

Forestry (p.53) A BC Green Government will:

Sustainably Manage Forests and Rangelands Legislations

- Enact a modern, evidence-based, multi-objective *BC Forest and Range Ecology Act*

The legislation will implement global best practices in forestry, and be focused on restoring wildlife habitat, improving forest productivity, reforestation, and addressing priority forest health issues. Among other things, it will address First Nations rights, resilience planning and cumulative effects. The legislation will also balance stakeholder interests in the management of rangelands.

Protect Old Growth Forests from Further Logging

Develop a BC Old-Growth Forest Inventory that will determine reserves and protect BC's old-growth forests.

- Improve the sustainable logging of second-growth forests, which now constitute the majority of forest lands in southern BC.
- Utilize new technologies and the latest science and apply the precautionary principle to timber supply reviews to direct sustainable resource management.
- Develop a comprehensive and updated forest inventory that accommodates changing climate, migration of forest ecosystems, incorporate cumulative effects, and develop future-oriented management strategies to improve productivity and update the comprehensive forest inventory of the province.

Water (p.56) A BC Green Government Will:

Develop Resilient Water Infrastructure

- Work with professional associations and local governments to ensure that the design of stormwater, wastewater and drinking water infrastructure fully accounts for the risks of a changing climate.

Ensure a Sustainable Water Supply

- Review the water allocation and licensing provisions of the Water Sustainability Act to ensure that they fully protect BC's water quality and quantity, so that it is sustainable for future generations.
- Initiate comprehensive, province-wide water and watershed planning in collaboration with local governments, First Nations, and other government agencies, stewardship organizations, water use sectors and community stakeholders. The plans will address water supply and demand, protecting drinking water quality, integration of land use planning and water and watershed planning, conflicting water use demands.
- Enhance data gathering and analysis of water quantity and quality to enable science based decision-making.

Strategy for Climate Action (p.61) see appendix 1 of the platform for more details

The central pillar of our strategy is putting a price on carbon that maintains the impetus to reduce consumption of fossil fuels. We are also proposing actions for each of four pathways to achieving reductions:

1. Behaviour change; 2. Efficiency; 3. Low carbon fuels and materials; 4. Sinks.

A BC Green Government Will:

Set Achievable Targets

Amend the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Targets Act to reflect an interim target of 40% reduction below 2007 levels by 2030.

Establish an emissions reduction target for carbon neutral government and allow public sector agencies to invest in internal emissions reductions, rather than requiring the purchase of external offsets to achieve carbon neutrality for government.

Update the Carbon Tax

Progressively increase the carbon tax:

- By \$10 per year for four years beginning January 1, 2018;
- Starting on January 1, 2018, extend the carbon tax to fugitive and vented emissions.
- The initial rate will be \$10 per tonne rising to \$50 per tonne by 2021;
- Starting on January 1, 2020, apply the fugitive rate for the carbon tax at \$36 per tonne to forest slash pile burning.

Facilitate Behaviour Change

- Expand the provision of public information regarding ways to reduce carbon emissions; and, direct existing communications resources to make information and advice available to support the identification of low carbon options, their costs and benefits.
- Promote choices with a lower carbon footprint.
- Facilitate modal switching.

Promote Efficiency

- Require commercial and industrial operators to ensure the efficient operation of equipment and vehicles.
- Ensure that new buildings are energy efficient; and, introduce measures to ensure that the upfront cost of an energy efficiency upgrade does not form a barrier to retrofitting existing homes and commercial facilities.
- Promote efficient community design by enhancing requirements for integrated regional planning, and the consideration of the cumulative impacts on GHG emissions of regional and local government plans.

Support the Transition to Low Carbon Fuels and Materials

- Revisit the mandate of B.C. Hydro to optimise support for clean energy development, including grid storage for community or privately generated power.
- Work with neighbouring jurisdictions to expedite the phase out of thermal electricity generation.
- Introduce progressively more stringent requirements to adopt low carbon fuels.

Enhance our Carbon Sinks

- Implement a forest carbon strategy to take full advantage of the opportunities created by forest sinks.
- Invest \$29 million over four years to enhance the scientific understanding of the effects of climate change in B.C.; and, to support forest carbon management initiatives as part of the greenhouse gas emissions reduction strategy

Public Assets, infrastructure and transportation

Invest in Clean Technology (p.69)

- Promote investment in clean transportation initiatives and technology that creates jobs and economic activity without increasing greenhouse gas emissions.

Integrate Sustainability into Planning (p.70)

- Develop sustainability criteria, including consideration of cumulative impacts, that will be applied to all future capital projects including transportation infrastructure investments.

Enhance our Natural Assets (p.71)

- Invest up to \$28 million over four years for recreation and tourism facilities in BC's parks and on public land.
- Invest \$52 million over four years to maintain the productivity and usability of land, including: conservation, reclamation, agriculture and range and dykes.

Appendix 2: The Indicators (there are 6)

#5 is Environment. By measuring our ecological footprint we can target policies to ensure that we are only using as many resources as the environment can sustainably provide. Greenhouse gas emissions are a major component of our ecological footprint and require special attention. The Province publishes comprehensive reports on environmental indicators (Environmental Reporting BC): air, climate change, land and forests, plants and animals, sustainability and water. However, successive governments have failed to use this information to set targets and craft policies to meet those targets.

2017 Confidence and Supply Agreement between the BC Green Caucus and the BC New Democrat Caucus

This agreement between the BC Green Caucus and the BC New Democrat Caucus is effective _____, 2017, for four years, or until the next fixed date election as set by the *BC Constitution Act*.

Section 1 – Foundation of Relationship

This agreement establishes the basis for which the BC Green Caucus will provide confidence in a BC New Democrat Government. It is not intended to lay out the full program of a New Democrat Government, nor is it intended to presume BC Green support for initiatives not found within this agreement.

Both the BC New Democrats and the BC Greens campaigned for a government that put people at the centre of their decision-making. Our policy proposals included many points of agreement, including:

1. Making democracy work for people
2. Creating jobs, acting on climate change, and building a sustainable economy that works for everyone
3. Fixing the services people count on
4. Making life more affordable for people

This agreement sets out a new relationship between the two parties, founded on the principle of “good faith and no surprises”.

Both parties agree that the legislature works best when all MLAs are able to put forward good ideas – and come together – to support those that advance the public good.

Subject to the terms of this agreement, we undertake that:

1. Should the Lieutenant Governor invite the Leader of the BC New Democrats to form a new government, this agreement will continue until the next scheduled election.
2. The Leader of the New Democrats will not request a dissolution of the Legislature during the term of this agreement, except following the defeat of a motion of confidence.
3. The BC Green MLAs will neither move, nor vote non-confidence during the term of this agreement, so long as the principle of good faith and no surprises has been observed.
4. Both parties will ensure that they have all their elected members at all sittings of the House as reasonable, and will vote in favour of the government on confidence motions.
5. While individual bills, including budget bills, will not be treated or designated as matters

of confidence, the overall budgetary policy of the Government, including moving to the committee of supply, will be treated as matters of confidence.

6. BC Green support for policy and legislation which does not relate to confidence or supply is not subject to this agreement and will be decided on an issue by issue basis.

This agreement establishes a dispute resolution process (see Appendix A).

Both caucuses recognize that, in order to promote greater stability, the government must be able to negotiate with the three BC Green Party MLAs as a single, recognized caucus. Similarly, to be a credible partner and fulfill the responsibilities that will be required of them, the BC Green MLAs require access to legislative tools that are only available to recognized political parties and sufficient support staff.

A foundational piece of this relationship is that both caucuses support the adoption of the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission calls-to-action and the Tsilhqot'in Supreme Court decision. We will ensure the new government reviews policies, programs and legislation to determine how to bring the principles of the Declaration into action in BC.

This agreement shall only be amended by mutual consent.

Section 2 – Consultation Arrangements

Consultation will occur in a timely fashion to ensure BC Green Caucus views can be incorporated into final decision-making. Formal consultation will be managed between the Premier's Office and the BC Green Caucus office. Regular meetings will also be established between the Premier and the BC Green Party Leader.

1. Overall Consultation

The BC New Democrat Government will consult the BC Green Party Caucus on:

- Broad outline of the government's legislative programme;
- Legislation to be introduced in the House;
- Major policy issues;
- Broad budget parameters;
- Events/policy changes with provincial or budgetary implications.

To ensure that the BC Green Party Caucus is informed about the policy agenda of the government, the BC New Democrat Government agrees to provide access to key documents and officials.

Both parties agree to establish a process to manage and coordinate the external communication of policy initiatives covered in this agreement, ensuring the principle of good faith and no surprises is maintained through communications.

2. Budget

The BC New Democrat Government will ensure the BC Green Caucus is afforded meaningful consultation on provincial budget priorities in advance of being finalized.

3. Confidentiality

Where briefings or other consultations have been provided to the BC Green caucus in respect to legislation, policy or budgetary matters, all discussions shall be confidential unless otherwise agreed, subject to the provisions of the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act*.

Section 3 – Policy Initiatives

A BC New Democrat Government agrees to advance the following legislative and policy initiatives identified as a condition of support by the BC Green Caucus. These objectives are not an exhaustive list of the policy initiatives the BC New Democrat Government or BC Green Caucus will advance, but are areas where we agree on shared values and outcomes for the people of British Columbia.

1. Making democracy work for people

- a. The Legislature shall be recalled within one month of the swearing in of a BC New Democrat Government.
- b. Proportional Representation
 - i. Both the BC New Democrat Government and the BC Green Caucus are committed to proportional representation. Legislation will be introduced in the 1st sitting of the next session of the BC Legislative Assembly with a BC New Democrat Government establishing that:
 - (1) A referendum on proportional representation will take place in the fall of 2018, concurrent with the next municipal election; and
 - (2) The form of proportional representation approved in the referendum will be enacted for the next provincial election.
 - ii. The parties agree that they will work together in good faith to consult British Columbians to determine the form of proportional representation that will be put to a referendum.
 - iii. The parties agree to both campaign actively in support of the agreed-upon form of proportional representation.

c. Electoral Finance

- i. The parties agree that legislation will be introduced in the 1st sitting of the next session of the BC Legislative Assembly with a BC New Democrat Government to:
 - (1) Ban corporate and union donations and contributions from non-residents of British Columbia;
 - (2) Place limits on individual contributions;
 - (3) Accept loans only from banks or recognized financial institutions;
 - (4) Eliminate any other means by which individuals or entities may wield undue influence over government; and
 - (5) Conduct a review of campaign finance and the Elections Act.

d. Lobbying Reform

- i. The parties agree that legislation will be introduced in the 1st sitting of the next session of the BC Legislative Assembly with a BC New Democrat Government to:
 - (1) Institute a multi-year prohibition on lobbying for former Senior Public Office Holders;
 - (2) Increase penalties for violations of the *Lobbyists Registration Act*;
 - (3) Initiate a comprehensive review of the *Lobbyists Registration Act*, including the Office of the Registrar of Lobbyists' mandate, to ensure our democratic institutions and the interests of British Columbians are adequately protected from the influence of special interests.

e. Respect the integrity and independence of a professional public service.

f. Ensure more public input into decision-making by making more effective use of committees of the legislature and allowing MLAs an opportunity to have input on policy decisions.

g. The parties agree that legislation will be introduced in the 1st sitting of the next session of the BC Legislative Assembly with a BC New Democrat Government to shift the formula for the fixed election date from May, to a date in the fall of 2021, and every 4 years after that to provide a more transparent budget process and the passage of a budget prior to an election.

h. Require Spring and Fall sittings of the legislature every year.

2. Jobs, climate and a sustainable economy that works for everyone

a. Climate Action

- i. Implement an increase of the carbon tax by \$5 per tonne per year, beginning April 1, 2018 and expand the tax to fugitive emissions and to slash-pile burning.
- ii. Deliver rebate cheques to ensure a majority of British Columbians are better off

- financially than under the current carbon tax formula.
- iii. Implement a climate action strategy to meet our targets.
- b. Immediately refer the Site C dam construction project to the BC Utilities Commission on the question of economic viability and consequences to British Columbians in the context of the current supply and demand conditions prevailing in the BC market.
 - c. Immediately employ every tool available to the new government to stop the expansion of the Kinder Morgan pipeline, the seven-fold increase in tanker traffic on our coast, and the transportation of raw bitumen through our province.
 - d. Improve fairness for workers, ensure balance in workplaces, and improve measures to protect the safety of workers at work so that everyone goes home safely and that workers and families are protected in cases of death or injury.
 - e. Immediately establish an at-arm's-length Fair Wages Commission that will be tasked with establishing a pathway to a minimum wage of at least \$15 per hour and overseeing regular rate reviews. The commission will bring forward recommendations regarding strategies to address the discrepancy between minimum wages and livable wages. The commission will make its first report on a new minimum wage within 90 days of its first meeting.
 - f. Act immediately to improve transit and transportation infrastructure in cooperation with the Mayors' Council and the federal government to reduce emissions, create jobs and get people home faster.
 - g. Work with the Mayors' Council consultation process to find a more fair and equitable way of funding transit for the long term.
 - h. Invest over four years to support co-op, apprenticeship and work experience programs for high-school and undergraduate students.
 - i. Establish an Emerging Economy Task Force (EETF) to address the changing nature of business over the next 10 to 25 years. The EETF will be charged with developing "made-in-BC" solutions that keep our government, our policies and our thinking on the cutting edge. The task force will report to the government within one year of the 1st sitting of the next session of the BC Legislative Assembly with a BC New Democrat Government.
 - i. The mandate and funding of the EETF will be jointly established by representatives of both the BC Green Caucus and the BC New Democrat Government.
 - j. Establish an Innovation Commission to support innovation and business development in the technology sector, and appoint an Innovation Commissioner with a mandate to be an advocate and ambassador on behalf of the BC technology sector in Ottawa and abroad.

- i. The mandate and funding of the Innovation Commission will be jointly established by representatives of both the BC Green Caucus and the BC New Democrat Government.
- ii. The Innovation Commission will be created in the 1st provincial budget tabled by the BC New Democratic Government.
- k. Reinvigorate our forest sector to improve both environmental standards and jobs for local communities.
- l. Revitalize the Environmental Assessment process in BC and review and address failures in the professional reliance model in BC so that British Columbians' faith in resource development can be restored.
- m. Build needed hospitals, schools and other infrastructure that reduce emissions and increase energy efficiency throughout BC.

3. Fixing the Services People Count on

- a. Promote and protect the public healthcare system.
- b. Increase the emphasis on preventative health initiatives and services.
- c. In the first provincial budget tabled by the BC New Democratic Government, develop a proposal to implement an essential drugs program, designed to reduce the costs of prescription drugs and ensure the cost of drugs is not a barrier to health management.
- d. Provide seniors with the right care at the right time to improve health and reduce costs in hospitals.
 - i. Invest in home care to enable seniors and other people who need assistance to stay in their own homes.
 - ii. Ensure the staffing of public and private care homes meets government guidelines, and provide additional funding to address staffing levels in public facilities.
 - iii. Ensure that clear, measurable and enforceable staffing standards for residential care facilities are implemented. Standards will be supported by monitoring and enforcement to ensure they are being met, and there will be annual public reporting.
- e. Expand the use of team-based health care to ensure that people have better access to the type of care they need, including access to services from physiotherapists, nurse practitioners, midwives, dieticians, pharmacists and other health professionals.
- f. Respond to the crisis in mental health and addictions with a dedicated Minister

responsible for developing and implementing a Mental Health and Addiction Strategy and a Youth Mental Health Strategy.

- i. Ensure that the Ministry has sufficient funding to provide frontline services, including funding for early intervention, youth mental health initiatives, supervised injection sites, and community-based centres for mental health and rehabilitation.
 - ii. Develop an immediate response to the fentanyl crisis based on successful programs that invest in treatment-on-demand, drug substitution, early-warning monitoring systems, and coordinated response.
- g. Recognize that education is about lifelong learning and make post-secondary education more accessible and affordable.
 - i. Restore funding to Adult Basic Education and English language learning.
 - ii. Implement an agreed upon approach to improving access and reducing the cost of post-secondary education for students.
 - iii. Allocate funding for in-service skills training for workers in small and medium-sized enterprises, and for retraining for those displaced by automation or changing markets.
- h. Fast track enhancement to K-12 education funding to restore faith in public schools after a decade and a half of a government that shortchanged a generation of students.
 - i. Priorities for funding include early intervention and Healthy Starts programs.
 - ii. Review the funding model for the K-12 education system with a view to ensuring equitable access for students.
- i. Invest in childcare and early childhood education to improve quality, expand spaces, increase affordability and ensure childcare is accessible for all families, with a focus on early childhood education.
- j. Enhance and improve child protection services to ensure that all children grow up in safe and nurturing environments.
 - i. Invest in child protection to hire additional social workers and staff to support social workers, and to implement incentives to attract social workers to rural and underserved regions.
- k. Tighten the rules that protect good landlords and tenants and ensure the resources necessary exist to resolve disputes fairly and in a timely way.

4. Making life more affordable

- a. Design and implement a province-wide poverty reduction strategy that includes addressing the real causes of homelessness, including affordable accommodation, support for mental health and addictions and income security.
 - i. One aspect of the poverty reduction strategy is to design and implement a basic

income pilot to test whether giving people a basic income is an effective way to reduce poverty, improve health, housing and employment.

(1) This pilot should be funded in the first provincial budget tabled by the BC New Democratic Government.

- b.** Develop a genuine progress indicator for British Columbia covering a range of indicators.
 - i.** The indicators will be developed in consultation with business and industry, communities, not-for-profit organizations and individuals.
- c.** Eliminate regressive MSP premiums.
- d.** Make housing more affordable by increasing supply of affordable housing and take action to deal with the speculation and fraud that is driving up prices.

APPENDIX A - Consultation and Dispute Resolution between the BC Green Caucus and the BC New Democrat Government

This agreement is governed by the principle of good faith and no surprises found within the “2017 Confidence and Supply Agreement between the BC Green Caucus and the BC New Democrat Caucus”. In practice, this requires both parties to work together in good faith to:

1. Consult on policy initiatives detailed within the “2017 Confidence and Supply Agreement between the BC Green Caucus and the BC New Democrat Caucus” and other policy initiatives agreed upon by both parties. Consultation will:
 - a. Occur before final policy decisions have been made to ensure that the BC Green Caucus can contribute to the policy development process;
 - i) Notice of forthcoming issues requiring consultation is given through the Consultation Committee (see below for details regarding the Consultation Committee).
 - b. Commence with adequate time for the BC Green Caucus to review the necessary information and canvass the caucus for positions, taking into consideration the financial and human resource limitations of the BC Green office.
 - c. Include consultation on senior Order-in-Council (OIC) appointments.
2. Guarantee that the BC New Democrat Government will gauge support from the BC Green Caucus for proposed legislative action through the Consultation Committee before legislation is introduced.
3. Ensure that the BC Green Caucus is informed about the policy agenda of the government. The BC New Democrat Government agrees to provide access to:
 - a. Deputy minister and ministry staff briefings;
 - b. Executive summaries and full briefings on key issues as requested by the BC Green Caucus, and 30-60-90 briefing notes;
 - c. Adequate background documents and support information used in the preparation of initiatives;
 - d. Other resources as necessary to enable informed participation by the BC Green Caucus;

The BC Green Caucus and BC New Democrat Government establish three levels to consultation/dispute resolution under the broader “2017 Confidence and Supply Agreement between the BC Green Caucus and the BC New Democrat Caucus”.

1. Where an issue is identified for consultation by the BC Green Caucus, a member of the BC Green Caucus will be identified to the BC New Democrat Government as the point person on the issue. Consultation on the issue occurs directly between the Minister and the BC Green Caucus point person.
2. A Consultation Committee will be established to consider any issues needing consultation, including parliamentary aspects that have not been dealt with in

consultations between the Minister and the BC Green Caucus point person. This committee will meet regularly and will have 3 members from each party, including at least one member of caucus.

3. Regular meetings between the Premier and the Leader of the BC Green Party will take place and can dispense of any remaining issues.

In addition to the process laid out above, the following access is provided to the BC Green Caucus:

Representatives from the BC Green Caucus and the BC New Democrat Government will meet frequently to establish the formal and informal methods through which consultation takes place. Both parties acknowledge that consultation will form the basis of ensuring that good relationships can be built, that the principle of good faith and no surprises can be followed, and that a strong, stable and effective minority government can exist.



For those new to MDEC Environment contributes to the wildfire efforts in four ways:

- We run the AQ monitoring networks and public 'smoky skies bulletins' in conjunction with health authorities
- Currently, we are publishing twice daily summaries of AQ for smoke affected areas that are used by other agencies to inform decisions on public and worker safety
- Just as an aside we experienced the worst AQ in BC history last week in WL and PM 2.5 levels were extremely high today as well in WL
- Early in this fire cycle we didn't see the media focussing on AQ but they have since been doing a good job on public education and awareness

- Second, we manage BC Parks
- Currently, we've closed and evacuated 71 parks mostly in the Caribou region
- We're also using parks outside the fire areas to house evacuees in campsites

- Third, our COs and Parks Rangers, which are peace officers are assisting RCMP with public safety duties. MoE is also contributing staff to work in the PREOCCs.

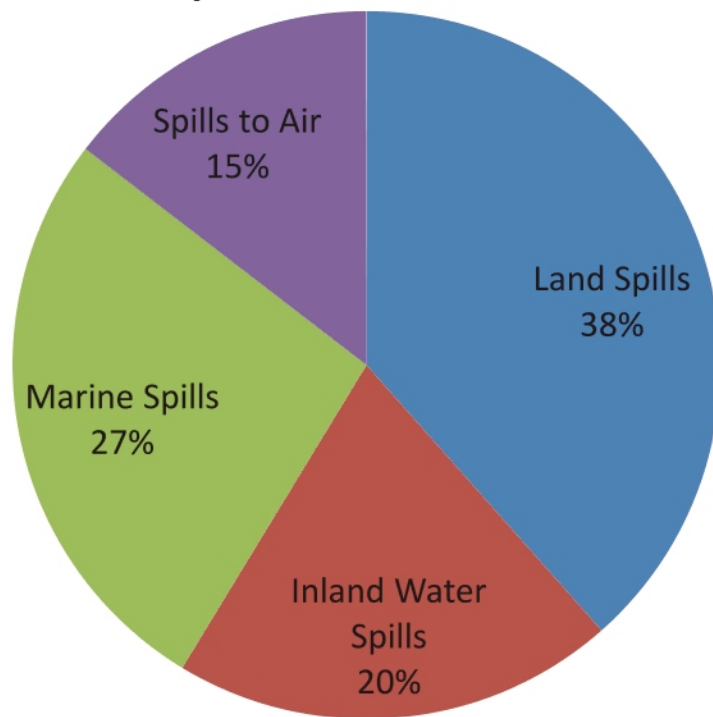

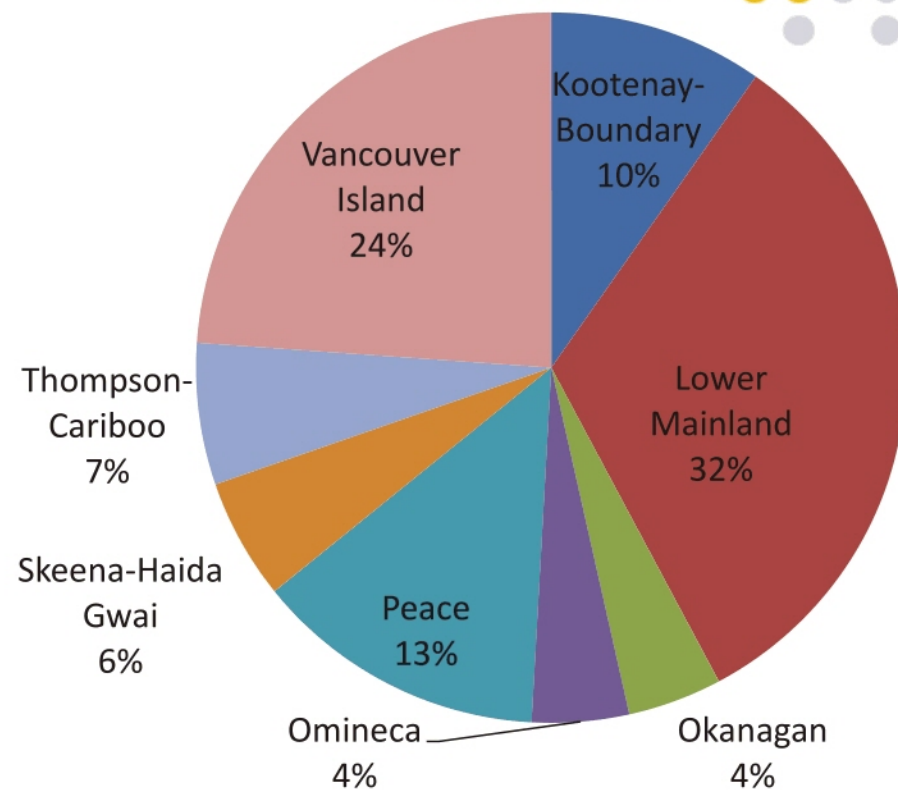

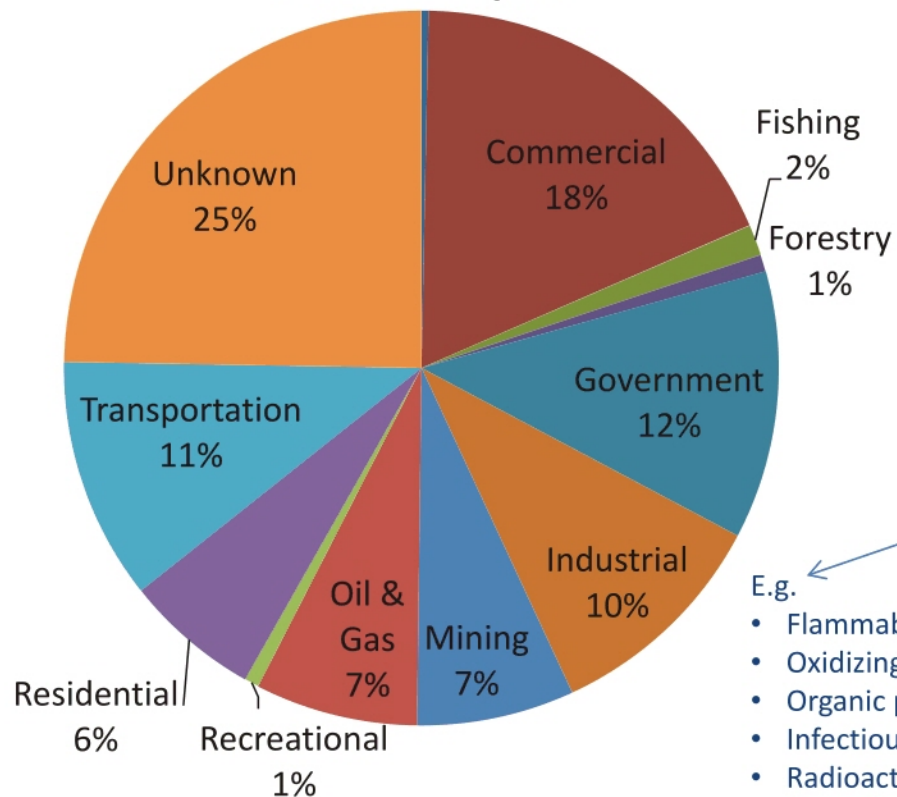

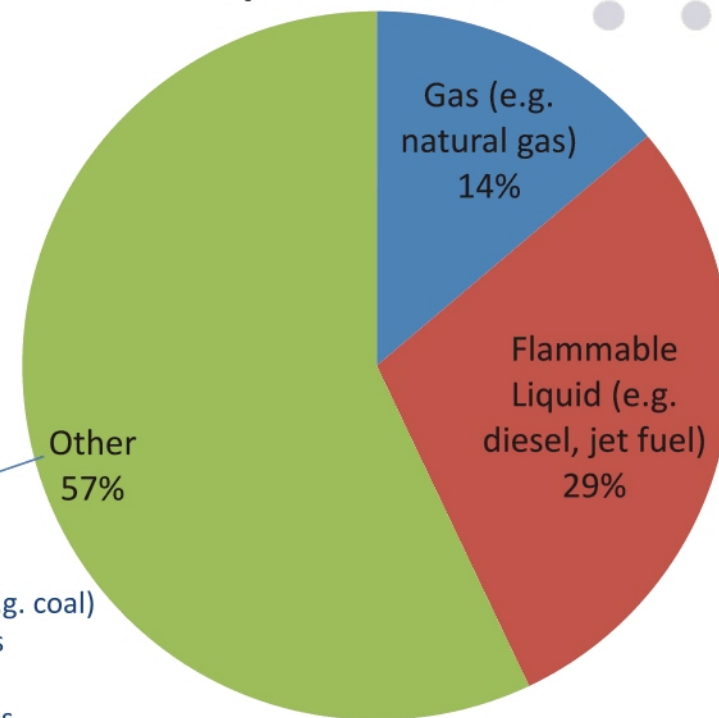
