ABSTRACT

Raven biology and predation on sheep were studied on Saltspring Island, B.C. between January and May 1985. At least 28 lambs (about 1% of those born) and three adult ewes were killed by ravens, apparently a lower than average rate of loss. Numbers of ravens were monitored by regular roadside counts and regular counts at the Blackburn Road garbage dump. The island population was estimated at roughly 300 ravens, being somewhat higher in winter. Between 20 and 120 ravens were regularly present at the dump, and probably consisted mainly of immatures and non-breeding adults. At least 31 pairs of ravens were believed to have bred on Saltspring Island, resulting in a higher breeding density (26 pairs per 100 km2) than any reported elsewhere. Three active nests were found; all were located in concealed positions, high in trees in dense conifer forest. Cliff nests have also been reported on the island. Eleven ravens were trapped, marked with plastic wing-tags and released, but this number of tagged birds was insufficient to yield much information on movements.

It is concluded that the severity of the depredation problem resulted largely from the extremely high density of ravens, and a number of recommendations for alleviation of the problem are made.

Introduction

The problem of Common Raven (<u>Corvus corax</u>) depredation on newborn lambs has been a contentious issue on Saltspring Island for over ten years. As a result of information received from questionnaires sent out to a sample of Saltspring Island sheep producers since 1982, it was estimated that up to 100 lambs were killed by ravens each year. Attacks appeared to occur throughout the island, with different farmers suffering losses each year.

This project was designed to:

- determine the abundance and distribution of ravens on the island by regular counts at the Blackburn Road garbage dump and roadside surveys elsewhere on the island;
- 2. gain accurate information on the number and type of attacks on sheep during the 1985 lambing season;
- attempt to locate two or three raven nests and record information on breeding biology and diet;
- 4. catch and mark a number of ravens so that movements on Saltspring Island and possibly to and from the other Gulf Islands and Vancouver Island could be studied; and
- make recommendations to alleviate the raven depredation problem.

Lambing Season and Raven Attacks

In 1985, lambing took place mainly from January through March, with the peak in mid-February. Reports of attacks on sheep were received from Howard Byron (Dog Control Officer) and Ray Stewart (Farmers' Institute). These were followed by visits to the sheep producers concerned and details of each attack were recorded on a special form (Appendix 1).

Most lamb mortality occurred from the last week of January through the middle of February (Table 1). Thirty-one sheep (three ewes and 28 lambs) were reported to be killed by ravens. This is probably a minimum number as it is likely that other unrecorded losses occurred. One sheep producer, Mike Byron, had four ewes that lambed but the lambs were never found. Newborn lambs may have been killed by ravens and subsequently removed by other scavengers such as Bald Eagles (Haliaeetus leucocephalus). Sheep producers who have free-ranging animals may lose some lambs without ever knowing the exact cause.

Raven attacks occurred throughout the north and central parts of the island. Two of the sheep producers with the greatest losses, Mervin Walde (7) and Jack Webster (7), were located in the central area in close proximity to the Blackburn Road garbage dump, where large numbers of ravens were constantly seen.

Lambs were evidently killed by pecks to the eyes, top of head, mouth (especially tongue) and anal area. Post-mortem examination can determine exactly when and how each animal died (McFarlane, 1965) but such examinations were not possible during this study. However, external examination of the wounds can show whether the animal was alive before attack or was a scavenged carcass. Attacks made on a lamb while it is still alive can be clearly identified by haemorrhages around the wound site and there is usually considerable bleeding from the wound, whereas attacks made after death show no hemorrhages and little bleeding (Houston, 1977). On Saltspring Island, some of the lambs that survived raven attacks had to be destroyed. The first lamb of twins appeared to be the more vulnerable because the ewe was unable to defend her first offspring while giving birth to the second. Lambs more than three days old were rarely attacked unless sick. The three ewes that were killed later in the season all had their eyes pecked out while unable to get up after falling over.

Questionnaire results indicated that approximately 2000 breeding ewes were present on Saltspring Island in 1985 and that a maximum of 3000 lambs would be born. The loss of 28 lambs by raven predation was about 1% of the expected lamb crop, which was smaller than that reported in previous years. It is likely that a higher percentage of lambs was lost to other causes such as hypothermia, disease and dog predation.

Raven Trapping

A modified Australian crow trap, similar to that described by Kluge and Weber (1984), was used to capture ravens during the period of this study. Four captive ravens were used as decoys in the trap set up in Mike Byron's field on Stark Road. A total of 11 wild ravens were caught between January 31 and February 14 (Appendix 2). These ravens were banded, marked with white plastic wing tags (see Stiehl, 1983) bearing individual alpha-numeric codes and released (Table 2). Unfortunately on February 18, an animal (probably a raccoon) entered the trap and the captive birds subsequently escaped. Trapping was discontinued as no more captive ravens were immediately available.

It had been hoped that at least 25 tagged ravens would be released on Saltspring Island so that their movements could be observed. Four of the 11 ravens captured were released on Vancouver Island and were not seen again. There were several reports of the seven remaining ravens at Ruckle Provincial Park, Blackburn Road garbage dump, the vicinity of capture on Stark Road and at the Cupples farm on North End Road. However, without the aid of a spotting scope, the individual identification of these tagged birds was almost impossible. Two birds, A3 and A4, were identified by me; A3 was regularly seen at the garbage dump and A4 was identified once at the Cupples farm on March 5, where a group of up to 20 ravens was seen feeding in a grass field recently spread with manure. However, these observations were insufficient to give any general idea of raven movements on Saltspring Island.

Abundance and Distribution of Ravens

According to several people who have lived on Saltspring Island for most of their lives, ravens were not recorded on the island until the mid 1940s. They were seen infrequently until the late 1960s when the numbers began to build up. Data from the Provincial Museum in Victoria indicate that a similar population increase occurred over most of coastal British Columbia. Until the late 1960s, records of over ten ravens at one place at one time were rare, with the exception of some counts at the Comox garbage dump by Theed Pearse (Pearse 1938). From the 1960s onward, records of groups of ravens became regular.

To determine the abundance and distribution of ravens on Saltspring Island, six roadside surveys were conducted at three-week intervals. A route that covered most of the major roads on the island was chosen. Stops were made at each mile along this route and the numbers of ravens and Northwestern Crows (Corvus caurinus) seen or heard in a three minute period were recorded. This method followed that of the North American Roadside Breeding Bird Survey (Robbins and Van Velzen, 1967) except that the intervals between stops were one mile instead of half a mile. A total of 51 stops were used (Figure 1), one of these being the Blackburn Road garbage dump (stop 41). Eighty to 100 ravens were recorded on each survey except the last, with the number of crows always exceeding that of the ravens (Table 3a, Appendices 3-8). The number of ravens was fairly stable from January to the end of April and then decreased in May. The number of crows decreased over the study period. The majority of crows was observed at the garbage dump until the May count, when their distribution was more uniform throughout the island.

The average number of ravens per stop recorded on the survey route, excluding those at the garbage dump, decreased from 1.38 in January to 0.52 in May, whereas the number of crows remained more stable (Table 3b). Ravens were recorded at least once at 45 of the 51 stops, with the largest numbers seen at one time around the Cupples farm, Mt. Belcher, Mt. Bruce, Mt. Maxwell and the garbage dump. Three of the stopping points (15, 16 and 31) with no ravens included a large proportion of salt water within 1/4 mile. The distribution of crows was mainly concentrated at the coastal stopping points with large numbers always seen at Long Harbour, Ganges, Fulford Harbour, northwest of Vesuvius and at Cusheon Lake (Appendix 9). Although a simple habitat distribution survey, similar to that of Weber and Theberge (1977), was conducted on May 9 and 10 (Appendix 10), no obvious relationship between raven distribution and habitat was found.

The average number of ravens per stop was compared to that of the Roadside Breeding Bird Surveys conducted at several locations on Vancouver Island over the past nine years (data provided by the Vertebrate Zoology Section, Provincial Museum, Victoria). It was shown that the number of ravens recorded on Saltspring Island was always considerably higher than elsewhere (Table 4).

Where possible, daily counts of ravens were made at the Blackburn Road garbage dump. It was originally intended that the time of day at which the counts were made should be varied. In this way, daily fluctuations in number might be determined. However, vehicles entered the dump at 5 to 10 minute intervals from 10:00 to 16:30 each day so that the birds were constantly disturbed and counts became difficult. Early morning counts were therefore most useful, but these became less regular as the breeding season progressed as this time of day was also best for observing breeding activity.

More than 20 ravens were always seen at the garbage dump with no notable increase or decrease in numbers over the study period (Appendix 11). Most ravens spent their time either circling around in the air, spotting and harassing crows with food, or resting in the surrounding conifers in the middle of the day. Ravens were seen feeding on the ground in large numbers only in the early morning. It is likely that most of the ravens at the dump were either first-year birds that had not yet come into breeding condition or non-breeding adults. For example, A3, a tagged bird regularly seen at the dump, was a subadult. Members of the breeding population may have visited the dump periodically when natural food sources were scarce or unavailable.

The number of crows observed feeding at the dump peaked in January and February when 500 birds were seen on most days. This number declined to 50 to 100 in April and May, and it would appear that the winter population moves off the island when the breeding season begins. The crows were only minimally disturbed by regular vehicle activity at the dump and were always the first to return after such disturbance.

The raven count data collected from the roadside surveys, the garbage dump counts and pairs on territory suggest that the total population of ravens on Saltspring probably exceeds 300 birds in winter, dropping to just below this number when the breeding season begins. However, once the breeding adults scatter to form pairs on territory, it becomes more difficult to give a population estimate.

Nesting Biology

Ravens usually begin nest-building in late February to early March and lay 3 to 7 eggs which are incubated for 21 days (Holyoak, 1967; Goodwin, 1976; Stiehl, 1985). The period from hatching to fledging is 40 to 45 days (Stiehl, 1985).

Nests can be located in trees (mostly conifers), cliff ledges and occasionally buildings. Despite making contact with several local naturalists, no exact locations of raven nests were obtained for Saltspring prior to the breeding season. This lack of specific knowledge meant that finding nest sites became very time-consuming because an abundance of suitable nest sites appeared to be available.


Spring was slightly later than average this year, judging by the first appearance of many spring flowers and the beginning of breeding activity for many common birds. The earliest signs of ravens nest-building was on March 14, although pairs had been seen on territory prior to this. By April 10, three nest sites had been located (Figure 2, Appendix 12). No more active nests were found after that date. Later in April, three other nests that had been in use in previous years were shown to me: one on Stark Road and two on the Patterson property south of the Fulford Harbour ferry terminal. All of these nests were in trees, four in Douglas-firs (Pseudotsuga menziesii), one in a grand fir (Abies grandis) and one in broadleaf maple (Acer macrophyllum). These sites occupied average-sized trees, often in small valleys, which could be easily observed from the tops of surrounding trees but which a human observer could only see from directly below. Two other nest sites on cliff ledges on Mount Belcher were reported by Alan Best to have been in use in 1983, but these were not readily accessible so they were not investigated.

Of the three occupied nests observed in 1985, two were abandoned before hatching while the third produced two or three young which fledged about June 20 (Appendix 12). The reasons for nest abandonment were unknown but one nest (Mt. Belcher) was extremely close to the Blackburn Road garbage dump and other ravens regularly invaded the pair's territory. Interference or nest predation may have taken place.

Altogether, 31 raven territories were located on the island, excluding the area of Mt. Bruce, Mt. Tuam and Mt. Sullivan (Figure 2). This produced a minimum density of 26 nests/100 km 2 . When compared to the highest recorded density in Europe, of 17 nests/100 km 2 in mid-Wales (Newton et al., 1982), where the habitat type is very similar to that of coastal British Columbia, the breeding density of ravens on Saltspring is very high.

Concluding Discussion

As no studies have been done on the ecology of the raven in western British Columbia, the reasons for the recent increase in raven abundance can only be surmised. The fact that ravens are consistently observed at landfill garbage dumps and that the growth of human populations has increased the need for these dumps is probably no coincidence. Other corvid species, such as the Black-billed Magpie (Pica pica), American Crow (Corvus brachyrhynchos) and Northwestern Crow, have been shown to readily adapt to urban environments. In its more traditional wilderness environment, the raven is a natural scavenger and, along with birds of prey, helps to clean up bird and mammal carcasses. It is only a small step to take advantage of livestock farming and garbage dumps. The adult raven has no natural predators except man; it outcompetes other corvids and is extremely aggressive towards birds of prey, such as the Bald Eagle, Turkey Vulture (Cathartes aura) and the Red-tailed Hawk (Buteo jamaicensis), during the breeding season when these may be perceived as a threat to eggs and young.



It is apparent, from this study, that the raven population on Saltspring Island is high in comparison to other nearby localities on Vancouver Island. The reasons for this high population density are probably related to food supply.

The numbers of sheep on Saltspring Island have apparently remained stable for several decades, whereas the husbandry practices in many instances have markedly improved. Many of the small-scale farmers (with up to 50 breeding ewes), whose main income does not come from sheep, now have barns or some kind of shelter for lambing. In these cases, the lambs are protected for the first few days and attacks by ravens occur rarely and only when the lambs are free to roam outdoors. Crows regularly enter buildings to take animal feed but ravens are not known to do this. Therefore, it is unlikely that sheep farming has been responsible for an increase in raven numbers.

It is more probable that the landfill garbage dump, which has been operational for approximately 20 years, attracted ravens to Saltspring Island. The capacity of the dump has enlarged with the increase in population of the island, currently estimated to be about 6000. Many landowners deal with their own household garbage onsite but the residents of Ganges, in particular, make heavy use of the garbage dump. The garbage dump is situated inland at an altitude of 500 feet and, as gulls do not frequent the dump, the ravens have a virtual monopoly, being dominant to crows. The garbage dump provides the ravens with food throughout the year except in periods of heavy snow cover, which are rare on Saltspring.

The results of questionnaires sent out to sheep producers indicated that up to 100 sheep per year were killed by ravens, but losses in 1985 were small in comparison. Improved sheep husbandry practices have helped reduce the predation problem but two other factors may also have been important. First, the total lambing season was condensed into only two to three months in 1985, with most individual flocks lambing in three to four weeks. Second, several people, especially Chris Wooldridge (SPCA officer) and Alan Best (retired curator of birds and mammals at Stanley Park Zoo), have suggested that a heavy winter mortality among the local black-tailed deer population provided extra food for scavenging birds. These people have also suggested that numbers of ravens in 1985 appeared to be smaller than in previous years.

It must be stressed that, although losses to ravens in 1985 were low, annual fluctuations will occur and sheep producers may experience more serious raven depredations in future years. Further counts of ravens would be useful in determining a pattern of annual fluctuations in numbers. In this study, it has not been possible to provide much information concerning the population dynamics of the raven on Saltspring Island. If, as I believe, the major cause of the raven problem is the high raven population rather than poor animal husbandry, then more information on ravens is necessary to deal with the problem effectively.

Recommendations

The raven population on Saltspring Island has become too high for the safety of local livestock populations. Control measures must be taken to reduce the population to an acceptable level. The lack of knowledge about the population dynamics of the raven complicates the decision as to which methods to use to reduce numbers and for how long. Unless more details of the raven's ecology on Saltspring Island are known, no one type of control measure will be effective. However, a combination of measures, over a number of years, may offset this lack of knowledge.

Although most sheep producers are taking reasonable steps to protect their animals, two possible improvements in sheep husbandry, as suggested by provincial sheep specialist Dr. Steve Mason¹, could be made. The onsite disposal of carrion (entrails of slaughtered lambs, afterbirths and carcasses of dead animals) could attract ravens. Deep burial combined with a wooden cover over the burial pit would discourage dogs and ravens from digging up carrion. In addition to this, it may be possible to protect newborn lambs by ensuring that ewes in labour are placed under cover and that they remain there until the lambs are at least two days old. Such facilities are already being provided by many of the Saltspring Island sheep producers and others may find that confining only a few animals at a time is cost-effective. However, these recommendations would have much less effect on raven predation than a reduction in raven numbers.

The Regional Problem Wildlife committee recommended in January 1985 that a legal open season on shooting ravens (on private land only) take place on Saltspring Island. Regulations to permit this open season were approved by the Ministry of Environment in June. If this method is to be effective, the shooting effort must be increased from past years (20 to 30 ravens were shot in early 1985). A concentrated effort at a place where ravens congregate in large numbers, such as the garbage dump, could help to reduce the population. Ravens are notoriously wary of guns, however, and this method may prove difficult.

Trapping ravens is possible, as proven by this year's efforts with a modified Australian crow trap. Captive ravens may be needed as decoys and the traps should be checked daily. In order to capture large numbers of ravens in a short time, several traps should be in operation at the same time. Other trapping methods such as drop-netting require considerable time and effort; cannon-netting also requires specialized training and experience. Trapping and shooting would be most effective in November and December when the population is likely to be at a peak and before the lambing season begins. However, a reduction of the Saltspring Island raven population could be temporary if other ravens readily move in from the other Gulf Islands and Vancouver Island.

As the garbage dump is a major source of food for ravens, its removal from Saltspring Island would probably result in a rapid decrease in raven numbers. By removing access to this major food source, other ravens would be deterred from migrating to Saltspring. Better management of the existing site or relocation on the island may reduce the raven population but probably only over a long period of time unless other control measures are used simultaneously. The operation of the Blackburn Road landfill site is currently being reviewed by the Waste Management Branch for reasons other than raven depredations.

Finally, it must be said that there are still too many unknowns concerning the raven population to make more specific recommendations. More information is needed on breeding numbers, breeding success, movements, mortality rates, possible seasonal changes in numbers and when and how natural mortality occurs. This would make a very suitable study for a Master's thesis, particularly as some actual breeding sites are known and a few birds have been tagged. Until this study is possible, some of the above control measures should be implemented in 1985-86 and the results carefully monitored.

It is my understanding that you are concerned about:

odours originating from the landfill;

lack of cover material;

nuisance vectors such as crows, cats and deer;

level of inspection.

Although I understand your concerns, the Region is not in a position to undertake any work at the landfill for the following reasons:

- 1. Although the CRD is a Joint Permittee with Mr. N. Twa, the Region does not own the land, nor does it have access to the landfill without Mr. Twa's permission.
- 2. The Region has no means of correcting the deficiencies mentioned above as there is no mechanism in place for the Region to recover costs from users of the facility. The Region is therefore unable to effect any changes to the operation of the landfill.
- 3. The landfill is operated under Permit No. PR-1839 and is inspected by Waste Management Branch on a periodic basis. It is the role of Waste Management Branch to ensure that the landfill is operated in accordance with the Waste Management Act and records of inspections should be available from the Nanaimo Regional District office (John Finnie, P.Eng., 758-3951).

As I mentioned on the telephone to you, it is the Ministry of Environment's intention to close Blackburn Landfill on 31 December 1991.

Thank you for your letter regarding the Blackburn Road landfill on Saltspring Island.

I can understand your concern about the disposal of various household hazardous wastes at the landfill site. The Ministry of Environment has challenged all British Columbians to reduce solid waste fifty percent by the year 2000. Part of this program includes removing household and other hazardous wastes from the waste stream for acceptable alternate disposal. In this regard, the Ministry of Environment, the British Columbia Hazardous Waste Management Corporation and the Capital Regional District are jointly sponsoring Household Hazardous Waste Collection Events for the Capital Regional area. The first very successful event was held in June, 1990, and a second was held on September 29 and 30, 1990.

Monitoring of surface and groundwater in the vicinity of the landfill is being conducted by the Ministry's Waste Management staff in Nanaimo. Two of the sampling sites are located on Salt Spring Centre property. Monitoring results to date indicate that Canadian and provincial drinking water standards are being met at both of these sites.



Thank you for your letter regarding solid waste disposal for Saltspring Island. For your information, I have enclosed a copy of my letter dated June 19, 1990, to the Capital Regional District.

As you are aware, the Capital Regional District Solid Waste Management Plan had been conditionally approved subject to suitable alternative arrangements being made for refuse disposal for Saltspring Island. The defeat of the referendum to locate a transfer station on the island, which the plan had identified as the preferred option, has delayed satisfactory resolution of the issue.

It is the Ministry's intent that all municipal solid waste management facilities and programs, operate in accordance with an approved regional solid waste management plan. With regard to the establishment of privately owned disposal sites, the Ministry position is that regional districts shall have ultimate control over and be legally and financially responsible for all disposal sites. It is, therefore, inappropriate for the Ministry to consider proposed municipal refuse disposal sites that are not specified and approved of within a Regional Waste Management Plan.

Nevertheless, please note that the Plan itself may authorize the operation and/or administration of a site or program by a municipality, other local government entity, company, group or person. In this regard, you may wish to forward your proposal to the Capital Regional District for their consideration.

I am encouraged by your willingness to provide local collection, sorting, recycling and a transfer system for Saltspring Island. I greatly appreciate you taking the time to share your ideas on this matter with me.



Dear Sir,

As the owner of the land on which our local dump has been constructed, I was pleased to learn from a recent issue of the Victoria Times Colonist that you have instructed the CRD to honour their permit responsibilities with regard to the closure of the local dump. In addition, the December 31, 1991 deadline is helpful because it lets all of us know that we have arrive at a practical solution soon.

My family and I have operated the local dump for more than 25 years. The dump was set up to reduce the spread of garbage along our roadsides and from the ferries. This goal was achieved. In addition, regular tests of the current site and surrounding areas indicate no adverse effects caused by the dump.

However, I have realized for the past few years that the current situation cannot continue. To that end I have purchase a 160 Acre site between Mounts Bruce and Tuam in the south end of Salt Spring Island. A site that has been inspected as potentially satisfactory for a dump site by two environmental engineers. It is on this site that I wish to construct a local solid waste site using the latest technology such as impervious liners, to ensure a safe operation. I intend to finance this new site myself with no additional cost to the local taxpayer. I will continue to offer a offer a local pick-up and disposal service on a "User Pay" basis as I have in the past.

I am writing to you for two reasons:

- 1. The local population voted 90% to 10% in favour of a local disposal site. For that reason I ask you to insist that your staff allow me the same rights as the CRD in seeking approval for a disposal permit. I am not asking for any favours; just to be treated equally.
- 2. The local solid waste committee seems to want to ship our garbage to Hartland Road in spite of the recent referendum. They are making the same mistake as the previous committee did by ignoring public opinion. In order to establish a local collection and disposal system that

conforms to the wishes of islanders as expressed in the referendum, I propose to provide a joint recycling and garbage collection system. The household pick-up for garbage would be \$2 per bag and for recycling the rate would be \$1 per bag. These materials would be sorted at a joint transfer station and disposed of through the sale of recyclables or transfer of garbage to a local landfill. The ownership and operation of the landfill is an open topic as far as I am concerned, but I know that I can do a more economical job than the CRD.





Thank you for your letter regarding the Blackburn Road landfill on Saltspring Island.

The Capital Regional District is a joint Permittee with Mr. N. Twa for Waste Management Permit No. PR-1839. The issuance of the permit to both parties was a result of discussions that were held at the time between the Ministry and the Capital Regional District and subsequently confirmed in the enclosed letter dated December 18, 1978, to Mr. Twa and copied to the Regional District. No appeal was launched against the permit, as jointly issued, and the permit therefore stands.

As a joint Permittee, the Capital Regional District has responsibility with Mr. Twa for the past and present condition and operation of the site and for the reclamation or rehabilitation of the site and any post-closure requirements, such as monitoring.

I refer to the enclosed letter dated January 24, 1989, from my predecessor, the Honourable Bruce Strachan, which conditionally approved the Capital Regional District Solid Waste Management Plan subject to suitable alternative arrangements being made for refuse disposal on Saltspring. Island. At the time, it was anticipated that the matter would be resolved expeditiously. The defeat of the referendum for a transfer station on the island, however, which the plan had identified as the preferred option, has delayed the issue.

A closure plan for the site was to have been submitted to the Regional Waste Manager by March 31, 1990. I understand that island residents are working towards the development of a combined Recycling/Solid Waste Transfer Station for the island, and that the Saltspring Island Recycling and Solid Waste Disposal Society is preparing a closure plan for the landfill. I also understand that the Capital Regional

District has agreed to a grant to the Society to assess the environmental risk of the landfill and to prepare the closure plan. I am encouraged by this information, but reiterate my comments that the Capital Regional District has responsibility for the existing site, its operation and closure, and should therefore take an active role in coordinating these activities.

In recognition of the potential environmental risks associated with continued operation of this site, and to encourage movement towards resolving the matter, it is my intention to cancel Waste Management Permit PR-1839 by December 31, 1991. It is therefore imperative for the Capital Regional District to ensure that suitable refuse disposal procedures for Saltspring Island are in place, and a closure plan for the existing site has been approved and implemented, prior to that date.

If the long-term plan for the island calls for a Waste Reduction/Recycling/Transfer Station concept, this would concur with the Ministry's Solid Waste Management Strategy and with the approved Capital Regional District Solid Waste Management Plan. If alternate strategies or technologies for residual management are being considered, I would consider this to constitute a departure from the approved Plan which may necessitate preparing an amendment to the Plan. The Regional Waste Manager should be contacted about appropriate procedures should this be the case.

I am referring your letter and my reply to Mr. G.E. Oldham, Regional Manager, so that he is aware of your concerns and my position on this matter.

By his letter of January 24, 1989 the Minister of Environment approved the CRD's Solid Waste Management Plan dated November 1987.

Under Item 6 of his letter, the Minister directs that proposed measures to reclaim/rehabilitate the present Blackburn Road landfill site are to be submitted to you for approval.

As indicated in a letter dated August 16, 1988 the CRD's Board Chairman requested that the CRD's name be removed from the Blackburn Road landfill permit PR-1839. The Region still wishes its name to be removed from the permit and, indeed, believes that the use of the Region's name on the permit is an error.

Because the Region neither owns nor controls the Blackburn Road landfill, and for the reasons noted above, the Region is not prepared to accept any responsibility for the Blackburn Road landfill. A copy of a letter dated March 30 1990 from CRD Board Chairman to the Minister of Environment is attached.

The CRD does, however, favour closure of the Blackburn Road landfill and the installation on Salt Spring Island of a Solid Waste transfer station, as indicated in the SWMP.

To bring about these two events, the Region held a referendum on Salt Spring Island in the Fall of 1989 to obtain approval for the operation of a transfer station. To assist the Islanders the Region has committed to fund the initial capital cost of transfer facilities provided the Islanders agree to pay the operating cost. The proposal was defeated.

Subsequently, Island residents have been working hard to produce an alternative plan for the management of solid waste on Salt Spring Island. Current thinking is for a combined Recycling Solid Waste transfer system. Discarded items would initially be transported to Hartland Road landfill pending other arrangements, if such can be made.

As well, at the request of Salt Spring Recycling and Solid Waste Society, the Region has agreed to provide a grant of up to \$20,000 to the Society for them to assess the environmental risk of the landfill and to prepare a closure plan. It is anticipated that you will receive a proposal from the Society in due course on this matter.

The Board has serious concerns on this matter and has directed that I write to you and advise you of the Board's position as follows:

- That the CRD is not a permittee under Waste Management Permit PR-1839.
- That the CRD has no intention of accepting any responsibility whatsoever, for the past or present condition or operation of the Blackburn Road, Salt Spring Island, Disposal Site and in particular, has no intention whatsoever of sharing any cost or responsibility for reclaiming or rehabilitating that Disposal Site.
- 3) That if the Minister of the Environment is sincerely interested in solving the most unsatisfactory condition of the Blackburn Road Landfill Site, as pointed out by the Ministry, only the Ministry can order that the Site be closed and Permit PR-1839 be cancelled.

- That the CRD has no intention of accepting any responsibility whatsoever, for the past or present condition or operation of the Blackburn Road, Salt Spring Island, Disposal Site and in particular, has no intention whatsoever of sharing any cost or responsibility for reclaiming or rehabilitating that Disposal Site.
- 3) That if the Minister of the Environment is sincerely interested in solving the most unsatisfactory condition of the Blackburn Road Landfill Site, as pointed out by the Ministry, only the Ministry can order that the Site be closed and Permit PR-1839 be cancelled.

4) That the CRD favours the closure of that Site and favours the installation on Salt Spring Island, of a solid waste transfer station and the removal of solid waste from Salt Spring Island, for disposal at the Regional District's Regional Landfill Site on Hartland Avenue.

Your early consideration and reply regarding the Board's concerns as described above will be appreciated.

of <u>The Gulf Islands Driftwood</u> (by phone, in person, other).
The information requested concerned:
Blackburn Road Landfill site on Saltspring Island

Questions asked:

- 1. What were the results of the Ministries recent sampling program at the landfill?
- 2. What are the definitions of Level A,B,C,E landfills? And what level of operation is the Blackburn site?
- 3. What concerns does the Ministry have about the site?

I provided the following information:

- 1. In January of 1990 samples were taken at several groundwater and surface water locations in and around the landfill site. The results indicated elevated levels of some parameters at the landfill site itself. There was no evidence that gross contamination was occurring down stream or downgradient of the landfill at that time.
- 2. Definitions are based on frequency of cover. For example, Level A requires daily cover, Level E once per 40 days. Based on the contributing population, the Blackburn Road Site is a Level C site and requires cover once per week.
- 3. Our primary concern is that the landfill is location within a watershed which is a domestic water supply. Although we do not have evidence that a problem exists, given that the there are no leachate control facilities at the landfill, the potential for contamination to occur is a major concern. A second concern is that the site has traditionally not been operated in an exemplary manner, however, in recent months operation has improved considerably.
- 4. The Ministry plans to repeat the sampling program twice per year for the next two years at least. The next sampling is planned for the fall of 1990.





Thank you for your letter to my predecessor, the Honourable Bruce Strachan, enquiring about the Ministry's position on the operation of the landfill at Blackburn Road.

Technical staff in the Ministry have reported to me that the existing waste disposal operation for Salt Spring Island is not an acceptable situation for the long term. The maintenance of a landfill in a watershed used by the adjacent population as a potable water supply, is patently inappropriate.

The Capital Regional District, in submitting its 30-year solid waste management plan, proposed a preferred alternative for a transfer station to serve the Island with transport of the wastes to the regional landfill at Hartland Road. This position was supported by the Ministry when the plan was approved. Further, that approval advanced the proposition of cancelling the permit once an acceptable alternative was in place. That procedure would satisfy the request of the Regional District not to be associated with the privately owned landfill, as co-permittee, because of the potential for environmental impact in the longer term.

While the ultimate solution to the Salt Spring issue has not been determined, there is no uncertainty, in the Ministry's view, that the planning of a prolonged use for the existing landfill in its watershed setting, is inappropriate.

Reference is made to your "Letter of Transmittal" which accompanied a copy of P.C.B. Permit No. PR-1839, issued in the joint names of the C.R.D. and Mr. N. Twa.

To the best of my knowledge the Regional District has not submitted an Application to you for a Permit, either jointly with Mr. Twa, or on its own account. Also, I am not aware that Mr. Twa has forwarded to you such an Application.

The Regional District is presently investigating the feasibility of providing financial assistance to Mr. Twa to assist him in operating the Saltspring Island landfill site in conformity with P.C.B. Guidelines. Mr. Twa has indicated that he will have to close down the site if he does not receive financial aid.

The Engineering Department's draft operating budget for solid waste includes an item of expenditure earmarked for the Saltspring landfill operation. However, this budget has not been reviewed by Committee or approved by the Regional Board. Pending Board and Ministerial approval of the budget, discussions with Mr. Twa have also been held in abeyance.

In view of the foregoing I have no alternative but to return your Permit No. PR-1839 for the Saltspring Island landfill operation. It is hoped that an Application can be made to your Department for a Permit for this facility later in the year, but this will, of course, depend on budgetary approvals and negotiations with Mr. Twa.



- 1. \$7.00 represents the existing yearly contribution from each household for operation of Hartland land fill. An additional \$0.60 per \$1,000 of converted assessment would be required to operate the transfer station and will remain constant for a period of 5 years. Thus, an average \$100,000 residence would pay \$67.00 per year.
- 2. The transfer station would accept sorted recyclables FREE. It would charge rates similar to the present dump, varying from \$0.50 per bag to \$2.00 per cubic yard to deposit waste. The user rates at the transfer station may increase after 1990 because of increased tipping fees at the Hartland landfill. A Salt Spring resident who brought his waste to a transfer station, all in bags, would pay about \$55.00 in 1990. On the other hand, a resident employing a collection company would, through that company, pay about \$15.00 user fees in addition to the \$57.00 estimated collection fee. (3)
- 3. The cost of the present bi-weekly collection and dump system is about \$72.00 per year for the average user. \$57.00 of the \$72.00 is collections fee and \$15.00 is the user fee. (2)
- 4. The direct haul cost is the approximate cost of hauling waste to Hartland, after it has been collected, plus the Hartland tipping fee. Each resident would be responsible for getting his own garbage to Hartland directly, or by contracting for the collection and delivery service to Hartland. This method shall be used if the referendum fails.
- 5. The present dump will be closed by the Ministry of Environment due to the environmental hazard it presents, and is, therefore, not an option. Figures presented are for comparison only.
- 6.* The transfer station will be the subject of a referendum to be held this fall. The CRD will pay the cost of constructing the facility (estimated at \$116,000) if Salt Spring residents agree to pay the ongoing operating costs.

Salt Spring Island has itself yet one more problem which we are hoping your ministry will be able to help clear up. This problem is regarding the possible closure of our present garbage dump on Blackburn Road.

The Salt Spring Island Solid Waste Committee, struck by the Capital Regional District, has said, in a "householder" to be sent out to the public that: "The existing garbage dump by Blackburn Road will be closed by the Ministry of the Environment because it represents a serious threat to the health of those using potable water from the lake and wells within the Cusheon Lake watershed." I have tried to confirm this statement from various sources within the ministry, notably: Don Mclaren, Waste Management technician/inspector, John Finnie, Waste Management Municipal Section Head, and Ted Oldham, Waste Management Regional Manager (Nanaimo). None of these people are able to confirm the above quote.

Would you please inform us and the Solid Waste Committee of Salt Spring Island of your present stand and future plans for the Blackburn Road garbage site so we can pass on a clear message to the people of Salt Spring.





Thank you for your letter dated June 15, 1989, responding to our letter of June 7, 1989. You have asked a number of important questions.

With respect to the existing Blackburn Road landfill site, rehabilitation includes closure and restoration activities. These activities may include measures such as application of final cover; contouring and grading of the site; providing for final cover; contouring and grading of the site; providing for suitable landfill gas control; planting appropriate vegetation; and, if required, monitoring surface and ground water quality at and near the site. The necessity for any one of these measures will be determined during the cancellation of the existing Waste Management Permit and will be carried out to the satisfaction of the Regional Waste Manager.

While we do not have access to worldwide data upholding the undesirability of community dump site in potable water producing watersheds, the Ministry, in general, does not support landfilling at such locations. Therefore, this office supports any efforts toward closure of the existing Blackburn Road landfill.

. . .

If it is appropriate for representatives of the Ministry to participate in future public meetings about the landfill site issue, my staff will make every effort to attend and assist in the process.

Thank you very much for your very complete and detailed response to our letter of December 22, 1988.

We appreciate the support and interest the Ministry of Environment has for the Cusheon Lake watershed and the help we are getting to answer some of our major concerns for the future of Cusheon Lake as a reliable source of potable water for our community.

We still feel a more frequent and formal monitoring system of Cusheon Lake water and area well water testing would be advisable in view of the 20 years of solid waste collecting at the dump site in the watershed. We will follow up on your suggestion that individual householders be advised of the availability of water test kits at our local government office.

As you are aware a concept of a solid waste transfer station and recycling program is scheduled to go to referendum this fall. You mentioned in your letter that the present dump site will be "rehabilitated". What does that involve? And what will it cost? These are questions that the public will surely ask.

Do you also have access to worldwide data upholding the undesirability of community dump sites in potable water producing watersheds? We will need that information in support of our campaign to remove the dump site from the Cusheon Lake watershed. In addition we would be most appreciative if a representative from your Ministry could be at the public meetings this fall to help us inform the public about the possible dangers that the present dump site poses to public health.

Your letter of December 22, 1988, concerning contamination of Cusheon Lake, has been referred to this office for reply.

There are 21 individuals, a resort, and a water utility licenced to extract up to a total of $350~\text{m}^3/\text{d}$ of water from Cusheon Lake. Currently, the water quality of Cusheon Lake is assessed on the basis of annual nutrient levels and monthly coliform counts through the Public Health Inspection of the Ministry of Health.

Regarding your reference to industrial activity within the watershed, I offer the following comments:

- It is the experience of this Ministry, based on previous lake studies, that the potential for environmental impact originates from local residences, especially where failing or poorly operating tile fields are being used for sewage disposal, rather than any identified industry.
- 2. A recently completed Solid Waste Management Plan for the Capital Regional District recommends, subject to a public referendum, that a transfer facility be constructed on Saltspring Island with subsequent refuse disposal at the Hartland Road Landfill. Once an alternative solid waste disposal option exists for Saltspring Island residents, the Blackburn Road site could be closed and appropriately rehabilitated. Periodic monitoring of wells in close proximity to the landfill, as well as surface runoff reveal that water quality has not been impacted by this operation.

- 3. An investigation last fall into the discharge of fill material on the Reynolds property found that the fill deposited there in October, 1988, was not a concern. No monitoring results related to the historic quarry operation on Mr. Reynold's property are available.
- 4. Ministry staff have met with the sammill operator on Hovel Road and there are now discussions on waste management practices. No other monitoring is in place at this site.

There are no plans to expand the monitoring done in the Cusheon Lake area; however, some additional sampling of both ground and surface water will be done in the Blackburn Road site on the next inspection trip.

Should your Society proceed with a supplementary water quality program for Cusheon Lake, my staff would be available to assist at the design stage. In the meantime, it is suggested that any individual householders concerned about water quality should obtain water test kits from the local Government Agent.

The issue at this point in time is lack of covering, although the site has a history of non-compliance for lack of covering and open burning of putrescibles. I support my staff's recommendations that we proceed with the issuance of a ticket to Mr. N. Twa and/or Capital Regional District for an offence under Section 34(5) of the Waste Management Act, for failure to comply with the terms of PR-1839, ie. Section A(1.) of Appendix to Letter of Transmittal for PR-1839, which requires weekly covering of refuse.

Note that PR-1839 is an old permit (January 16, 1979-Pollution Control Branch). This, and the fact that there are joint Permittees, one being a Regional District with no desire to have anything to do with this landfill, may complicate the matter. Nonetheless, it is a non-compliance, politically and environmentally sensitive issue, and some appropriate action should be taken. I do not believe the situation with regard to the CRD Solid Waste Management Plan needs to be of concern, but in light of Mike Williams' letter of May 31, 1989 and the previous correspondence from CRD dated February 7, 1989, I recommend that Mr. Twa be issued the ticket. This may encourage co-operation in establishing an acceptable alternative facility on the Island.

BACKGROUND

Waste Management Permit PR-1839 (jointly issued to the Capital Regional District and Mr. N. Twa on January 16, 1979) authorizes a level "c" landfill operation (weekly coverage) with no burning of putrescible waste or nuisance causing combustibles. History of operation generally poor, with lack of covering and periodic open burning.

On several occasions the Capital Regional District has requested to be removed as a Co-Permittee. Evidently they have had little influence on their Co-Permittee, Mr. N. Twa. The Capital Regional District's Solid Waste Management Plan proposed, subject to public referendum (Fall 1989), that a transfer station be installed on Saltspring Island.

Waste Management has concerns about the location and operation of this landfill. It is located within the watershed of Cusheon lake which is a source of drinking water for many residences, and has been identified as an attractant for ravens with a resultant increase in lamb predation in the area.

EXISTING PROBLEM

In conjunction with previous poor operation of the landfill, the last two site inspections identify significant non-compliance. Inspections of the landfill on January 31, 1989 and April 27, 1989, reveal that inadequate cover material is being applied. The operation constitutes an extreme health and fire hazard.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that a ticket be issued to the Capital Regional District and Mr. N. Twa, under Section 34(5) of the Waste Management Act. Whether a single ticket or individual tickets is appropriate shall be determined by the Regional Conservation Officer. Note that the Capital Regional District has advised Waste Management that they have little control over Mr. Twa. Nevertheless, they are Co-Permittees and I recommend ticketing both.



We have been prompted to write in response to an inspection report dated 27 April 1989, and a letter by Mr. D.A. McLaren, Waste Management Technician, Municipal Section, Ministry of Environment, dated 10 May 1989, which recommends legal action be taken against the Permit holders (CRD and Mr. N. Twa).

The inspection report notes the unacceptable conditions at the Saltspring landfill, which is owned and operated by Mr. Norman Twa. The Capital Regional District (CRD) does not dispute or doubt the accuracy of Mr. McLaren's report, but we do disavow any responsibility for the state of this privately owned and operated landfill. The CRD has no control over the management of the landfill or right of access to the land and is not lawfully a joint permittee.

Prior to the preparation and approval of the CRD Solid Waste Management Plan (SWMP), the CRD contributed funds to assist in the operation of the Saltspring landfill, in the hope of effecting improvements to the operation. However, because the operation continued to be poor, and because the CRD SWMP calls for a transfer station on Saltspring Island to replace the landfill, funding to Mr. Twa was discontinuted on December 31, 1988.

The CRD and the Saltspring Island Solid Waste and Recycling Committee are presently actively working on selecting suitable sites for a transfer facility. These sites or a site will be named in a proposal call which will seek prices to operate a transfer facility and also to transfer solid waste from Saltspring to Hartland Landfill. A request for approval to call proposals has already been made and will be further considered by the CRD's Environment Committee on 7 June, 1989. With approval of the call for proposals the costs obtained from the selected proposer will be used in a referendum. The referendum will seek the assent of Saltspring Islanders to set up and operate a transfer facility. The CRD is vigorously working on the transfer facility and still wishes to have its name removed from permit PR-1839.

It is not clear to us how the CRD's name came to be added to the Permit alongside Mr. Twa's name. We can find no evidence in our files of an application for a permit or an amendment form signed by the CRD and Mr. Twa, nor of newspaper ads of such an application, nor of any written request by the CRD that a permit be issued to it. In fact by letter of 7 February 1979 copy attached we returned the Permit pointing out that the CRD had not applied and therefore refused to accept the permit.

In a letter dated 16 August 1988 (copy attached), the CRD Board Chairman, on the authority of the Board, requested of the Honorable Bruce Strachan that the CRD's name be removed from Permit PR-1839. This request was refused by the Minister in his January 24, 1989, approval of the CRD SWMP despite the fact that the CRD never did apply for a permit.

In summary, the CRD questions the legal basis for having its name on the Permit, and accepts no responsibility for a situation beyond its control.

Reference is made to your "Letter of Transmittal" which accompanied a copy of P.C.B. Permit No. PR-1839, issued in the joint names of the C.R.D. and Mr. N. Twa.

To the best of my knowledge the Regional District has not submitted an Application to you for a Permit, either jointly with Mr. Twa, or on its own account. Also, I am not awars that Mr. Twa has forwarded to you such an Application.

The Regional District is presently investigating the feasibility of providing financial assistance to Mr. Twa to assist him in operating the Saltspring Island landfill sits in conformity with P.C.B. Guidelines. Mr. Twa has indicated that he will have to close down the site if he does not receive financial aid.

The Engineering Department's draft operating budget for solid waste includes an item of expenditure earmarked for the Saltspring landfill operation. However, this budget has not been reviewed by Committee or approved by the Regional Board. Pending Board and Ministerial approval of the budget, discussions with Mr. Twa have also been held in absyance.


In view of the foregoing I have no alternative but to return your Permit No. PR-1839 for the Saltspring Island landfill operation. The Capital Regional District Board, at the meeting of November 25, 1987, approved a Solid Waste Management Plan for the Regional District. This plan has subsequently been submitted to your Ministry for approval and, I understand, is currently being examined by your staff.

The CRD plan refers to the Blackburn Road landfill, which is the current facility for disposal of refuse on Salt Spring Island. The continued operation of the Blackburn Road landfill to accept general municipal waste is undesirable. Both CRD staff and your own Ministry staff are concerned about the location of the landfill, which is in the watershed of Cusheon Lake. There is a risk of contamination of water supplies by leachate and, for this reason, the CRD would like to see the Blackburn Road landfill closed.

The CRD holds jointly, with Mr. Norman Twa, the permit for the operation of the Blackburn Road landfill. Since the CRD neither owns nor controls the landfill and wishes to see the landfill closed, I am writing on the authority of the Board given at the meeting of 10 August 1988, to ask you to have the CRD's name removed from the Blackburn Road Permit. (Number PR-1839).

If the Blackburn Road landfill is closed, the alternative that the CRD favours is a transfer station on Salt Spring Island from which to transfer refuse to the Hartland Avenue landfill. This alternative would considerably increase costs of refuse disposal for Salt Spring residents and, while the Blackburn Road landfill consitutes an alternative, it may be difficult for a referendum to pass to authorize the transfer station.

A. OPERATIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR LANDFILL

1. Covering

Maintain the works authorized in Appendix O1 as a Level "C" landfill operation in accordance with the "Pollution Control Objectives for Municipal Type Waste Discharges in British Columbia", dated September, 1975, or as otherwise ordered by the Director from time to time.

B. OPERATIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR REGULATED BURNING

1. Area

The operation shall be restricted to a portion of the site described as Lot 3, Section 14, Range IV E North Saltspring Island, located approximately as shown on Appendix A of the Permit. This area shall be fenced to restrict access to the burn area stockpile.

2. Quantity and Frequency

The average quantity of wastes to be treated is 76 cubic meters at each burn at a frequency not to exceed 6 times per year. Each burn will comprise one continuous period necessary to reduce the stockpiled wastes to ashes.

3. Nature of Wastes

Generally no waste shall be burned which is unacceptable for this purpose to our Regional Manager. Acceptable materials may include selected demolition refuse, stumps, trees and similar items, but excluding nuisance causing combustibles such as rubber, plastics, tars, insulation, etc. Materials shall be charged to the burning facility in a manner to promote best combustion and restrict the up-lift of lighter constituents. No putrescible refuse or objects containing 50% or more noncombustibles shall be burned.

4. Timing

Burning shall take place only when an attendant is on duty and when conditions promote rapid combustion with a wind direction that conveys the resulting gases away from residences. No burning shall take place during periods of extreme fire hazard nor when burning is prohibited by other government agencies.

5. Fire Control

Suitable devices approved by the Director shall be available for extinguishing fires to prevent them from spreading to surrounding areas. Such devices include a pressurized water supply, chemical type fire extinguishers, or an earth stockpile. Firebreaks shall be maintained and cleared of combustible materials at least twice per year. If an earth stockpile is contemplated for fire control, earth moving equipment shall be available at the site during burning.

6. Combusted Residue

The residue from combustion shall be incorporated promptly into the adjacent landfill.

7. General

Notify our Regional Manager prior to each intended burning. All aspects of the operation shall be to the Regional Manager's satisfaction.



The issue at this point in time is lack of covering, although the site has a history of non-compliance for lack of covering and open burning of putrescibles. I support my staff's recommendations that we proceed with the issuence of a ticket to Mr. M. Two and/or Capital Regional District for an offence under Section 34(5) of the Waste Management Act, for failure to comply with the terms of PR-1835, ie. Section A(1.) of Appendix to Letter of Transmittal for PR-1839, which requires weekly covering of refuse.

Note that PR-1839 is an old permit (January 16, 1979-Pollution Control Branch). This, and the fact that there are joint Permittees, one being a Regional District with no desire to have anything to do with this landfill, may complicate the matter. Nonetheless, it is a non-compliance, politically and environmentally sensitive issue, and some appropriate action should be taken. I do not believe the situation with regard to the CRD Solid Waste Management Plan needs to be of concern, but in light of Mike Williams' letter of May 31, 1989 and the previous correspondence from CRD dated February 7, 1989, I recommend that Mr. Twa be issued the ticket. This may encourage co-operation in establishing an acceptable alternative facility on the Island.



Re: Saltspring Island Permit PR-1839 Landfill Inspection Report



The inspection report notes the unacceptable conditions at the Saltspring landfill, which is owned and operated by Mr. Norman Twa. The Capital Regional District (CRD) does not dispute or doubt the accuracy of Mr. McLaren's report, but we do disavow any responsibility for the state of this privately owned and operated landfill. The CRD has no control over the management of the landfill or right of access to the land and is not lawfully a joint permittee.

Prior to the preparation and approval of the CRD Solid Waste Management Plan (SWMP), the CRD contributed funds to assist in the operation of the Saltspring landfill, in the hope of effecting improvements to the operation. However, because the operation continued to be poor, and because the CRD SWMP calls for a transfer station on Saltspring Island to replace the landfill, funding to Mr. Twa was discontinuted on December 31, 1988.

The CRD and the Saltspring Island Solid Waste and Recycling Committee are presently actively working on selecting suitable sites for a transfer facility. These sites or a site will be named in a proposal call which will seek prices to operate a transfer facility and also to transfer solid waste from Saltspring to Hartland Landfill. A request for approval to call proposals has already been made and will be further considered by the CRD's Environment Committee on 7 June, 1989. With approval of the call for proposals the costs obtained from the selected proposer will be used in a referendum. The referendum will seek the assent of Saltspring Islanders to set up and operate a transfer facility. The CRD is vigorously working on the transfer facility and still wishes to have its name removed from permit PR-1839.

It is not clear to us how the CRD's name came to be added to the Permit alongside Mr. Twa's name. We can find no evidence in our files of an application for a permit or an amendment form signed by the CRD and Mr. Twa, nor of newspaper ads of such an application, nor of any written request by the CRD that a permit be issued to it. In fact by letter of 7 February 1979 copy attached we returned the Permit pointing out that the CRD had not applied and therefore refused to accept the permit.

In a letter dated 16 August 1988 (copy attached), the CRD Board Chairman, on the authority of the Board, requested of the Honorable Bruce Strachan that the CRD's name be removed from Permit PR-1839. This request was refused by the Minister in his January 24, 1989, approval of the CRD SWMP despite the fact that the CRD never did apply for a permit.

In summary, the CRD questions the legal basis for having its name on the Permit, and accepts no responsibility for a situation beyond its control.

The Capital Regional District Board, at the meeting of November 25, 1987, approved a Solid Waste Management Plan for the Regional District. This plan has subsequently been submitted to your Ministry for approval and, I understand, is currently being examined by your staff.

The CRD plan refers to the Blackburn Road landfill, which is the current facility for disposal of refuse on Salt Spring Island. The continued operation of the Blackburn Road landfill to accept general municipal waste is undesirable. Both CRD staff and your own Ministry staff are concerned about the location of the landfill, which is in the watershed of Cusheon Lake. There is a risk of contamination of water supplies by leachate and, for this reason, the CRD would like to see the Blackburn Road landfill closed.

The CRD holds jointly, with Mr. Norman Twa, the permit for the operation of the Blackburn Road landfill. Since the CRD neither owns nor controls the landfill and wishes to see the landfill closed, I am writing on the authority of the Board given at the meeting of 10 August 1988, to ask you to have the CRD's name removed from the Blackburn Road Permit. (Number PR-1839).

If the Blackburn Road landfill is closed, the alternative that the CRD favours is a transfer station on Salt Spring Island from which to transfer refuse to the Hartland Avenue landfill. This alternative would considerably increase costs of refuse disposal for Salt Spring residents and, while the Blackburn Road landfill consitutes an alternative, it may be difficult for a referendum to pass to authorize the transfer station.

I request that you take the CRD's concerns about the Blackburn Road landfill and the CRD's wish to disassociate itself from the operation of the Blackburn Road landfill into consideration when you give us your reply to our request for approval of the CRD Solid Waste Management Plan.

For your information I enclose a copy of a staff report with attachments, submitted to the 3 August 1988 CRD Sanitation and Water Committee. This report gives further background information on the Salt Spring Island refuse disposal issue.
