

Re: Solid Waste - Salt Spring Island

Your letter of June 21, 1984 to Mr. Eric Simmons, Chairman, Sanitation and Water Committee, was referred to the July 4, 1984 meeting of that committee. The contents of your letter were discussed by the committee and it was requested that the Engineering Department respond to your letter.

You mention the concern of the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee about the continuation of a solid waste landfill within the watershed of Cusheon Lake. At the present time, this department knows of no other acceptable location for a landfill on the Island although we appreciate the concerns of Island residents about the location of the landfill within the watershed. Monitoring results submitted to us by the Waste Management Branch indicate that the landfill is not contributing to degradation of water quality in Cusheon Lake.

A member of the Sanitation and Water Committee reminded the Committee that Islands Trust is responsible for planning on the Island, and suggested that Islands Trust be invited to recommend possible landfill sites which meet planning criteria of acceptability. We extend that invitation to Islands Trust and to the members of the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee and advise you that we would be prepared to recommend to the Sanitation and Water Committee that an engineering study of the acceptable sites be undertaken. The only alternative to landfilling on Salt Spring Island is collection of refuse at a suitable transfer facility and transport of the refuse to the Hartland Road landfill. It is the opinion of this department that the alternative of hauling refuse to Hartland Road landfill would be considerably more expensive than landfilling.

With regard to recycling, the Capital Regional District Board encourages recycling efforts by citizens' groups and has continued to support the operation of the Capital Regional District Recycling Depot and the recycling grant to the Salt Spring Island Community Society over the years. However, research by this department indicates that the success of any recycling operation depends on a heavy commitment of volunteer labour by concerned citizens, and that the range of materials which can be successfully recycled is limited. Therefore, this Department is not prepared, at this time. to recommend that the CRD expand its monetary support for recycling.

With regard to the procurement of land for recycling depots, we recommend that the Trust Committee, or the Salt Spring Island Community Society, investigate the availability of Provincial Government land. If suitable government land is available, it may be possible to obtain a Crown Grant of a parcel of land for the operation of a recycling depot. Perhaps Islands Trust, as an agency of the Provincial Government, can assist the committees with the identification and procurement of suitable land.

Regarding the recommendation by the Trust Committee that a sign be erected at the Blackburn Road dump which forbids deposit of toxic materials, the Sanitation and Water Committee has instructed the Engineering Department to arrange for such a sign to be erected. At the present time, however, there are no funds available to erect a building at the landfill site for deposit of toxic materials. In any case, we question the wisdom of accepting such materials at an unmanned facility because of the high potential for misuse of the materials.

Please do not hesitate to call if you have any further concerns about solid waste disposal on Salt Spring Island.

- 1. Once only P.C.B. and Dioxin levels
- Annually in October/November depending on rainfall parameters such as specific conductance, chloride, nitrogen and coliform levels to indicate potential flow of leachate from the landfill. Based on the results obtained, a decision will be made to add other parameters.

The Committee also questioned whether the detailed monitoring carried out by you in December 1982 could be repeated at regular intervals, perhaps annually. We are passing that request along to you for your consideration. It appears that regular monitoring might help to allay the fears of members of the public about the effects of the landfill on drinking water supplies.

- 3. Explosives
- Liquid and Gaseous Flammables.



The site slopes towards North-East and East and provides sunshine only during the first few hours of the day, a poor condition for a swimming area. -

Before any more natural land will be developed into yet another source of pollution around Cusheon Lake, we all should carefully of the present state of this lake as the only available drinking water supply for an increasing number of residents.

Let us start at the dump on Blackburn Rd., surrounded by hills towards W, N, and E, with a gentle slope towards Blackburn Lake.

Please see my sketch. All kinds of poisons are dumped there, some containers still half full, the lid tight, which means, they will release their poison slowly lateron. Anything can and is being dumped there without restrictions, even if there were any, nobody could fully enforce them. To name only one very dangerous example: batteries of digital watches, calculators i.a. which contain a high percentage of mercury. In spite of special warnings, spent batterie are not returnable and go to a dump.


Two outer Islands also use this as their disposal site. Thanks to our former Regional Director continuous burning of plasti has been eliminated and the management of the dump has improved greatly.


Still this does not stop dumping of various poisons, and as pointed out on my sketch with photographs, the seepage from cans immersed in murky ponds runs down towards Blackburn Rd. crosses underneath through a culvert and into Blackburn Lake. 



Dear Sir,

Initially claimed to be due to fires set by unknown youths, burning the garbage on this dump now has become the rule rather than the exception, especially during hot and dry summers as in 1981. This last fall the fires smoldered on and off for several months. Regardless as to the cause of these fires, the situation is now intolerable due to this smoke blanketing most residences in the Blackburn and Cusheon Lake Valley with increasing frequency and duration.

We need immediate reprieve from the toxic fumes.

Since this dump is surrounded by ridges and hills, the cool air during the evenings draws those emissions down the valley. No smokestacks will overcome this downdraft, which causes these fumes to linger in the trough of Blackburn and Cusheon Lake Valley especially during night hours. Headaches, nausea and dizziness are the results.

It is incomprehensible to see as large a Community as Salt Spring Island deal with ever increasing refuse disposal in such a primitive and hasardous way. Since this dump lies within the boundaries of a watershed area it is time to change this practice.

After several complaints we had a few weeks relief from this condition, evidently in consequence of your more stringent supervision and hope very much that a final and satisfactory solution will be found.

In the absence of the Honourable Robert Williams, your latter of December 28, 1973, has been referred to me for reply.

The Director of Pollution Control advises me that an order was given to Mr. Twa to apply for a permit to operate the registered site to which you object. However, no permit was issued as there was no undertaking to upgrade the operation. Mr. Twa's position was that he would close the site, thus leaving Salt Spring Island residents with no facility, if upgrading were made a condition of continued discharge. Meanwhile, the Capital Regional District assured the Director that they would actively seek a refuse disposal site on Salt Spring Island which they would operate once the study they had in hand on refuse disposal was complete and they had obtained the necessary Letters Patent.

Under these circumstances, it was determined that Mr. Twa's application be held pending until the outcome of the study was known. Copies of this letter and of yours, are being sent to the Regional District, and I am asking them to advise me (with a copy to yourselves) of progress.

Dear Mr. Filkow:

The operation of the Twa landfill has not been satisfactory to the Waste Management Branch for some time. A considerable effort has been made, together with staff of the Engineering Department of the Capital Regional District, to bring the permit into compliance. At a meeting held on May 6th, with the landfill operator, the following terms were agreed to:-

- That the landfill would be covered weekly.
- That the discharge would be confined to the smallest possible working face.
- That no refuse would be burned.
- That the burning of stumps, demolition waste and cardboard would be permitted as described in the permit.
- That should the landfill catch on fire, it would be extinguished as soon as possible.
- That the Capital Regional District would pay a subsidy to the operation, based upon satisfactory performance.
- 7. That staff of the Waste Management Branch would monitor the operation of the landfill until December 31, 1983, at which time a decision would be made to allow continued operation, or to suspend the permit.

RE: Operation of the Twa Landfill

A meeting was held at the C.R.D. offices on May 6, 1983, Those present were: Mr. N. Twa (Landfill Operator), Mr. R. McKellar (Islands Trust), Messrs. C. Sommerville and R. Warman (Capital Regional District), and Mr. K. Austin (Waste Management Branch).

Mr. Sommerville stated that on the basis of Waste Management Branch reports on the operation of the landfill during 1982, he was prepared to recommend to the C.R.D. Board that a payment of \$3,500.00 be made as a subsidy. He also suggested that effective May 1, 1983, Mr. Twa start again to operate the landfill according to the terms of the permit, and the Engineering Department would make recommendations on the subsidy based on Waste Management Branch reports. Waste Management Branch agreed to try to inspect the landfill six times during the next year.

The amount of the subsidy reflects the portion of unused capacity at the Hartland Landfill, which is paid for by the residents of Saltspring Island. Mr. Twa stated that the landfill received a daily average of 4 cubic yards of refuse from Mayne Island, and 1 cubic yard from Pender Island. He was advised to bring the matter of the amount of subsidy to the attention of the Regional Director, Mrs. Valcourt.

The Waste Management Branch position was stated as follows:-

- 1. The landfill is to be covered weekly.
- 2. The discharge is to be confined to the smallest possible working face.
- 3. No refuse is to be burned.
- 4. Any fires at the landfill shall be extinguished as soon as possible.
- 5. Stumps, demolition waste and cardboard can be burned in accordance with the directions in the permit.
- 6. Waste Management Branch will review the operation of the landfill for the balance of 1983. If the operation is not satisfactory, it will be recommended that the permit be suspended.

Re: Raven Depredation Problem - Saltspring Island (Twa Landfill - Blackburn Road)

Further to the letter dated April 12, 1983 (Weber/Agriculture to Prouse) which you referred for comment, please be advised as follows:

- Waste Management is presently in discussion with Capital Regional District and Mr. Twa regarding improving the unacceptable operation at the landfill.
- 2. Mr. Weber's point on Page 4 of his letter is basically correct - the present Permit requirement is for weekly covering and it is unlikely that this frequency would be increased. Indeed, if weekly covering was now being practiced, a significant improvement in the overall dump operation would be realized.
- 3. We are pressing for improvements to the operation (i.e. Permit compliance) and for minimizing the size of the working face of the dump, and this may help somewhat with the raven problem in the dump area. It is unlikely, however, that even full compliance with the Permit requirements would have any significant impact on the general raven population and destruction of some of the birds will probably be necessary.
- 4. A meeting with CRD/Twa to discuss the dump operation, etc. has been scheduled for May 6, 1983, 11:00AM in Victoria (contact Ken Austin for details). You may wish to have staff representation at the meeting.

On a somewhat related matter, and as you are aware, problems are being encountered with the masses of glaucous winged gulls "residing" at the Hartland Road landfill in Victoria. Improvements to the covering practices at the landfill are expected in the near future

and this <u>may</u> result in bird mortality through reduced availability of food material. I understand Federal and Provincial approval may be required for such a program and would appreciate your comments on the matter.

At the suggestion of Doug Janz, Regional Wildlife Biologist, I am writing you with regard to the serious problem of Raven depredations on newborn lambs on Saltspring Island and adjacent areas. In particular, I would like to make two requests:

(1) I wish to formally request a meeting of the Vancouver Island Region Problem Wildlife Advisory Committee, as soon as possible, to discuss the Raven problem and proposals for Raven control. I understand that this committee has not met since May 27, 1980, and a meeting is long overdue. I would like to attend the next meeting, as would Dr. Steve Mason, our Provincial Sheep Specialist. However, I do not wish to sit as the official representative of the Ministry of Agriculture and Food on this committee, as my responsibilities are province-wide rather than regional.

On behalf of 36 sheep producers on Saltspring Island (list attached), I would like to recommend the issuance of kill permits for Ravens between December 1, 1983 and April 15, 1984 (which includes nearly all of the lambing season). I wrote Mr. Janz on January 24, 1983 to request that similar permits be issued for the latter part of the 1982-1983 lambing season; the response from Doug Turner was forwarded to me by Mr. Janz on February 7, 1983 (copies attached). I have interpreted this response as a refusal to issue such permits. I realize that, under the Wildlife Act, no permit is needed to kill Ravens or other Wildlife which are actually attacking or threatening newborn lambs, providing that such action is taken on the landowner's own property. However, what I am recommending is that permits be issued to allow shooting (with shotguns) or trapping of Ravens throughout the lambing season, not just when newborn lambs are present on a particular farm. The latter practice (shooting Ravens during attacks only) has been carried on by sheep producers for years, and seems to be quite ineffective.

As support for the above requests, I would like to present some information about the Raven depredation problem for your review. A memo sent by Mr. Kluge to Al Pelter, Director of our Livestock Branch (copy attached), summarizes some of this information.

What are hanges in heep pop?

The Raven problem on Saltspring Island is not new, but has been gradually increasing in severity for many years. Long-time residents of Saltspring assure me that Ravens were rare on the island 20 years ago, but that the incidence of attacks on lambs has increased along with the Raven population. The Christmas Bird Count data, quoted in Mr. Kluge's memo, document a particularly dramatic increase in Raven numbers in the last five years. Raven numbers are abnormally high on Saltspring Island throughout the year, and this undoubtedly accounts for much of the problem. I would estimate that 100 or more lambs per year are killed by Ravens on Saltspring Island alone, in addition to other lambs and full-grown ewes which are injured but not killed. This amounts to an economic loss of more than \$10,000 per year.

To provide more specific data, I have appended copies of a questionnaire about Raven attacks on lambs to this letter. These give details of the problems experienced by individual sheep producers.

The usual pattern of Raven attacks on lambs seems to be that a group of 5 to 20 birds will attack a lamb as soon as it is born, attempting first to peck out the eyes. If they are successful in this, the lamb becomes quite helpless and is easily killed by the birds unless the mother is very protective. Attacks are commonest when a ewe has twin lambs (which is the rule in some flocks), because the ewe is unable to protect both lambs at once. If the birth is difficult and the ewe shows signs of weakness, such as failing to stand up afterward, the Ravens will often attack her as well, causing severe and sometimes fatal injuries.

Raven depredations are by no means confined to Saltspring Island, although the problem is worst there, probably because of the large number of sheep. I have heard reports of Raven attacks on lambs from Mayne Island, Saturna Island, the Saanich Peninsula, the William Head area west of Victoria, and the Comox area, as well as from the B.C. interior. As you may know, a year-round open season on Ravens has been established in parts of Region 4 (Kootenay) because of complaints of depredations by both sheep ranchers and cattle ranchers.

Sheep are not the only domestic animals attacked. As suggested above, calves are sometimes attacked. Mr. Kluge's memo mentiones a loss of about 300 piglets in the Lumby area in 1982 to Raven predation, and piglets have also been killed on Saltspring and Vancouver Islands. Many people to whom I have spoken have reported losses of duck nests or newly-hatched ducklings or chicks to Ravens. In short, nearly all domestic animals small or helpless enough to be vulnerable are potential prey for Ravens, although the loss of lambs is of greatest significance.

In addition to domestic animals, wildlife may have suffered considerably from the high Raven populations on Saltspring Island. Predation on Blue Grouse and California Quail chicks has been reported, and several island residents believe, perhaps correctly, that Ravens have been responsible for a sharp drop in Blue Grouse numbers. A Great Blue Heron colony was thought to have been abandoned because of Raven predation, and Raven attacks in the heronry have been reported in its present location near Ganges.

Other than simply issuing shooting/trapping permits, a possible approach to the problem of Raven predation would be to establish an open season on Raven in all or part of Region 1, as has been done in Region 4. Another approach, which support, would be to remove the Raven from the list of protected birds throughout B.C. The depredation problems are certainly widespread enough that removal of protection merits serious consideration. This subject is one which should properly be dealt with by the Provincial Problem Wildlife Committee, and in fact, it was mentioned by Mr. Kluge at the last Provincial Committee meeting in December 1982. Mr. Kluge and I will be preparing a detailed submission in support of removing the Raven

from the protected list for consideration by the Provincial Problem Wildlife Committee. In view of the recent increase in Raven populations throughout much of British Columbia, and of the difficulty of shooting this wary bird, it seems unlikely that lack of protection would cause a province-wide decrease in numbers, any more than it has done with the Common or Northwestern Crows. However, it would make things easier for the rancher or farmer faced with the necessity of protecting his livestock, by eliminating the need of going through the red tape of applying for a permit every year.

In addition to issuance of kill permits, establishing an open season, or removal from the protected list, I believe that a specific control program is needed on Saltspring Island. The number of Ravens there is amazingly high, even in summer, when large concentrations are not expected. During a brief visit on June 24, 1982, Mr. Kluge and I saw more than 40 Ravens, of which about 30 were in the immediate vicinity of the Blackburn Road dump. The dump itself certainly has much to do with the high Raven numbers on the island, and some of the heaviest losses of lambs have occurred on farms near the dump. I understand that there have been problems in the operation of the dump, such that garbage has been left uncovered for several weeks, attracting large numbers of Ravens. However, it seems doubtful that any action short of requiring daily compaction and covering of garbage would do much to discourage Raven concentrations. Unfortunately, Waste Management Branch guidelines apparently require daily covering of garbage only for disposal sites serving 10,000 people or more, which would not apply to Saltspring Island.

If improvements in the operation of the dump are not possible or are ineffective, the only alternative would seem to be control of Ravens by lethal methods, such as trapping or netting. Provided that the birds can be trapped, population reduction should be feasible, because Ravens have a relatively low reproductive potential and are non-migratory birds which usually do not move long distances. Possible approaches include use of a modified Australian Crow Trap (which has been used successfully elsewhere) and attracting birds to a bait such as a carcass, and then capturing them with a camouflaged cannon net or rocket net. (I would not recommend poisoning because of the hazard to non-target species such as eagles.) Control measures such as these are likely to be unpopular with some naturalist or animal protection groups, and should be thoroughly discussed and approved by the Regional Problem Wildlife Committee before being implemented.

In summary, I feel that the problem of Raven attacks on domestic animals is serious enough to warrant removing the species from the protected list, establishing an open season in part of Region 1, or at the very least, issuing liberal permits which would allow individual sheep producers to kill Ravens throughout the lambing season. In addition, I believe that a population reduction program on Saltspring Island is called for to alleviate the particularly severe problems there. I request that a meeting of the Regional Problem Wildlife Committee be called as soon as possible to discuss this and other problems, to decide whether a control program is needed, and to suggest preferred control methods, if a control program is deemed necessary.

I enclose previous correspondence written on behalf of my client relative to the above matter. My client's observations that this dump is not being operated in accordance with the provisions of its permit is confirmed by the recent report of Mr. Richard McKellar planner for the Islands Trust. It is my client's position that:

- 1. The operation of the dump is an immediate health hazard and a danger to neighboring property; and
- 2. The Department of the Environment has been negligent in failing to enforce the provisions of the permit under which the dump operates.

My client therefore demands that your department take immediate steps to ensure that the terms of the permit are strictly adhered to without any further delay and that, failing such compliance, the permit be revoked. My client also request that the terms of the permit be reviewed as they are, in the opinion of my client, inadequate to ensure protection of health and property.

Failure of your department to enforce the provisions of the permit may result in legal action by my client to force your department to carry out its duty. Further, should any loss or damage occur to my client due to the inadequate operation of the dump my client will hold your department responsible therefore.

I would appreciate an early reply to my letter advising me of your intentions in this regard.

A meeting was held at the Capital Regional District offices on March 23, 1983. Those present were Mrs. Y. Valcourt, Mr. N. Twa, Mr. C. Sommerville, Mr. R. Warman, and Mr. K. Austin.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the non-compliance status of the permit, and payment of a subsidy to Mr. Twa by C.R.D.

Discussion was protracted, but the following points were highlights:-

- 1) Mr. Twa stated that he needed a subsidy, or the dump would have to close. When questioned, he said that the dumping fee of approximately \$4.00 per cubic yard would have to double to break even. This might cause illegal dumping.
- Mr. Twa presented a budget that showed a monthly cost of \$3,706.67. 2) Upon examination, it was found that a cost of \$1,600 to \$2,000 was probably more realistic.
- 3) Some discussion ensued on alternative disposal sites on Saltspring Island, or disposal off-Island.
- C.R.D. has available \$7,521.00 per year as the cost of disposal at 4) Hartland Road, pro-rated to the Island population. The recycling depot has already been promised \$3,200.00 of this sum.
- 5) Mr. Twa owns the household collection service on the Island. a profitable operation and should obviously pay the major portion of the fixed costs.
- 6) It was suggested that the costs of the operation could be trimmed by confining the discharged refuse to a working face of 50 feet or less. This should give an area to be covered of about 1,000 square feet per week, which should require about 20 cubic yards of cover material. Reduction of the hours that the dump is open should also reduce costs.

- 7) It was suggested to Mr. Twa that if he operated according to the terms of the permit, particularly with respect to application of cover material and burning of refuse, the C.R.D. would then be able to pay a subsidy for the operation. The amount of any subsidy would be at the discretion of the elected Board.
- 8) It was agreed that Mr. Twa would get the dump into compliance, and try to operate within the terms of the permit. C.R.D. would then authorize a subsidy as applicable.

Apparently a Mr. Norman Kwa is hired by the Capital Regional District to operate the dump, but he has not been paid for three years (?) and is therefore reluctant to expend much effort at maintenance. Further, it appears that alternate methods of garbage disposal (incineration ?) for the above dump are being studied by the Capital Regional District.

Could you clarify this situation? In addition to raven problems, local residents view the present dump as a health hazard.

Thank you for your letter of November 5, 1982 regarding the Acheson Road septic lagoon facility and the Twa refuse site. In reference to the concerns raised in your letter, we advise as follows:

- The ground water monitoring wells at the Acheson Road site have recently been deepened such that they intercept the ground water table. There was water present in the north and east wells on a recent inspection, and samples of this water will be taken for coliform analyses at the next convenient opportunity.
- 2. A program for monitoring selected surface and ground water sites will be established to determine whether these waters are being affected by the Twa refuse site. Blackburn Lake, the Twa well, a stream south of the landfill, and water from the on-site excavations will be sampled. Blackburn Creek and/or an upland well will serve as control sites. Parameters for initial analysis will include organochlorines, heavy metals, pH and and conductivity. If no evidence of contamination is found, the program will be reduced accordingly.

We will advise you of our findings in due course.

Warman of the Capital Regional District phoned to inform us that the Twa garbage dump was on fire and that the health inspector was concerned about the health hazards. The C.R.D. have been withholding funds from Mr. Twa recently, but this does not seem to be effecting a better-run operation. Mr. Twa could not be reached by phone, but his wife (?) was contacted July 23, regarding the problem. She said the dump had caught fire on the weekend and the fire department had extinguished it earlier this week. I visited the garbage dump on July 23, and at that time, the garbage face along two-thirds of the site was smouldering, with no open flame evident. All visible garbage on the face was devoid of combustibles, so the fire must have been well established. The smoke from the smouldering face was only visible upon entering the site, and did not seem to carry any distance, discounting any need for further action. The centre of the fill has been recently covered, and dumping of fresh refuse was being carried out at both ends. Fresh refuse is being dumped beside the stockpile of stumps and combustible inert debris, which appears to have been set aside for burning. This is contrary to our objectives, which require a 50 foot break between the burning area and the refuse fill area. This poses a fire hazard should the fill area catch fire again, as the stockpiled debris may catch fire at a time when forest fire hazards are high. 1 mcharen D.
