Request

There are some numbers in the report about the water testing. Is there someone who can put those in context? I'm wondering if the numbers are high? What are the allowable limits?

I was also wondering if the inspection dealt with the waste transfer part of the business as well. The report only mentions the auto wrecker. Would the waste transfer area also have been inspected?

Background

This is a follow-up to a media request from January 3, 2019.

REQUEST:

working on a story about a dump in Abbotsford that might be leaching into a fish-bearing stream. (I'm not certain if it is or not. Someone contacted us with concerns.) I was wondering if the Ministry was aware of the dump and whether or not there have been any impacts on the stream.

The business is Capt'n Crunch Auto Recycling at 34314 Vye Rd in Abbotsford.

There is a stream nearby called Szeliga Brook. I think there is actually a watercourse that runs right behind the dump, which drains into Szeliga Brook.

I was wondering if the Ministry has ever spoken to the business about possible impacts to the stream? Has the Ministry assessed the stream to see if the dump is causing issues? Are there fish in Szeliga Brook (what kind)? Has anyone complained about this business?

RESPONSE:

Provided Statement

The facility is a refuse transfer station licensed by the Fraser Valley Regional District

under their solid waste management plan.

- The Facility holds registration #100363, under the Vehicle Dismantling and Recycling Industry Environmental Planning Regulation.
- Based on complaints, Environmental Protection staff inspected this facility and its operations on May 3 and June 8, 2018.
- The inspection resulted in a warning letter of non-compliance with the Environmental Management Act Section 6 (2), "a person must not introduce or cause or allow waste to be introduced into the environment in the course of conducting a prescribed industry, trade or business" (attached).
- As a result of this Warning, this facility will be prioritized for follow-up inspection during the winter of 2019 to evaluate storm-water runoff impacts from the overall operation (transfer station and vehicle dismantling).
- Any corrective measures taken by the facility owner/operator will be reviewed by an Officer as part of the next inspection.

Recommendation

- The sample results exceeded the respective BC Water Quality Guidelines (https://www2.gov.bc.ca/gov/content/environment/air-land-water/water-quality/water-quality-guidelines/approved-water-quality-guidelines) resulting in a Warning being issued to Capt'n Crunch.

- The waste transfer station does not have an authorization from the Ministry because waste transfer stations that do not discharge to the environment do not require authorization.
- ENV staff did attempt to determine if there was an illegal discharge of leachate from the facility but due to access and dry weather conditions were unable to confirm a discharge from the transfer station operation.

- The Ministry is currently coordinating with the City of Abbotsford to inspect the waste transfer station this winter, during the wetter time of the year.
- Ministry compliance actions are guided by the Compliance and Enforcement Policy and Procedure:

Request

Reporter is looking for any kind of policy about burning yard waste. He understands jurisdiction lies with municipalities but it's mostly done through bylaws to curb the number of days/hours you can burn.

He's seeking any research that points to local levels of smoke at which is becomes a health concern much like the scales used for forest fires but locally.

Seems his column will focus on the hazards of burning versus composting or mulching yard waste.

Background

The area of interest is likely "domestic burning of leaves, weeds and foliage" which is both unregulated under EMA and incredibly common outside of major urban areas. as a matter of practice, our conservation officers will not respond to or enforce against small fires on private property unless they involve prohibited materials.

Recommendation

- Burning of plastic, garbage, demolition debris and a list of other materials (found in the attached fact sheet) is prohibited
- Burning of land-clearing and logging debris is governed by the Open Burning Smoke Control Regulation
- Local governments (both municipalities and regional districts) are empowered to regulate or prohibit burning of yard waste (backyard burning)
- The ministry has compiled information on backyard burning bylaws in BC as a resource for local governments. Ministry staff also assist local governments in

- developing bylaws on this issue
- Many local governments provide pickup of yard waste or free drop off of yard waste. These options provide homeowners with an alternative to burning. Collected yard waste is often chipped for mulch or compost.

The Air Quality Management system established Canadian Ambient Air Quality standards which was implemented in BC in 2014. As part of the AQMS, BC was delineated into 7 air zones. More information on:
