Hello Minister Donaldson;

I am writing to convey a few of my thoughts regarding the imminent auction of the 27 hectare Clack Creek Licence #A93884. I recently had the pleasure of hiking the subject forest with almost 60 mostly local Sunshine Coast residents, hosted by the local advocacy group Elphinstone Logging Focus. As a part-time resident of the Sunshine Coast for almost 45 years, I've had the opportunity to experience some of the best recreational activities the coast has to offer.

The Clack Creek forest in it's present condition has a number of attributes in it's favour. I observed many well established old growth characteristics that illustrate it is indeed, after a fire in the 1860's, two-thirds of the way to coastal old growth status. Roosevelt Elk droppings were evident in a number of locations, as were wildlife trails. In addition the importance of the connection between two blocks of Mt. Elphinstone Park cannot be overstated. It would be a shame to lose the potential to connect the two areas in the future. Clack Creek Licence #A93884 is also a low elevation old forest. The ability for the public to access examples of low elevation old forests without an arduous trek, has become uncommon. This forest is accessible to almost all.

s.22 , the valley bottoms and low elevation old growth forests (known in logging circles as 'the gravy'), were already heavily logged and some in the industry were questioning how long it could continue. But continue it does. Should we continue to chip away at it, at this location, in a cut and run style, while generating a few short term jobs that may not even be local, or should we use it as a local economic generator for visitors and residents in perpetuity. It is much more valuable standing.

I would also like to point to a recent article in The Local Weekly newspaper by Sechelt Mayor Siegers. The Mayor and Council have drafted seven strategic goals for Sechelt. Two of the goals fit with the need to preserve natural assets on the coast. One is the need to "focus on economic development opportunities with a special focus on initiatives that can improve our key industry, tourism". Second, revitalize downtown, "reduce vacancies in our downtown core". My own experience tells me one of the top priorities visitors to the coast want, is to hike and explore forests. It seems natural to me that to revitalize downtown we encourage more visitors with our natural assets.

Also, I understand there is a Modern Land Use Plan in progress at this time. It doesn't make sense to me to auction off Clack Creek Licence #A93884 while it is the subject of a future plan already in development.

In conclusion, I think the loss of this forest and the natural capital it has to offer the coast would be much more financially significant than the loss of the stumpage to the Province. I'm asking you to postpone the auction of this block of forest until the best course of action can be determined by the MLUP.

Elphinstone Provincial Park from 140ha to 2,000ha, to secure biodiversity and recreational values in our region, wouldn't you?

I'm firmly opposed to Blk A93884 being put up for auction, as you know, especially as it is currently under consideration for protection by the Province. This area is locally known as the Clack Creek Gallery Forest for good reason, as it's a beautiful natural forest exhibiting a host of mature and old-growth features with a wonderful hiking trail throughout. It's an opportunity to achieve connectivity between existing park parcels #2 and #3, which must be the goal of the province in correcting this poorly designed park configuration. The forest also contains the largest and highest density of snow bramble (blue-listed Rubus Nivalis) in the province. In addition, it retains a rare, mature western red cedar – sword fern plant community, that the Forest Practices Board recently recommended be moved up to red-listed status, which demands a protocol for protection. Moreover, protection of this forest respects the community of Roberts Creeks OCP and the SCRD's bylaw 641. The only sizeable parks we currently have are 3 mountaintop parks, not accessible for year round use nor are they close to where we live, work and play. 

Rubus Nivalis reproduction is not well understood and even though its been down listed (questionable) from red to blue to yellow its main threat remains logging. Its time to keep logging outside of sensitive and contentious ecosystems on Mt. Elphinstone.
