Hi Andrea,

I apologize for the delayed response.

We support initiatives that encourage safe and proper disposal of sewage, however the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy (ENV) does not have funding for this type of initiative.

The Environmental Management Act prohibits the discharge of sewage waste from recreational vessels into lakes. It does not require the pump-out facilities to be authorized via permit or registration as there is typically no treatment or discharge occurring at the site

Owners and operators of pump out facilities usually take the sewage to a facility approved to accept, treat and discharge the waste. Many municipalities have septage receiving facilities for this type of waste to be brought in and combined with the larger waste stream from the community

Alternatively, owners may consider obtaining a permit from either ENV or the applicable Health Authority, depending on specific circumstances, if they wish to manage and discharge the waste themselves.

Hi Dulcy,

Here's our response:

- The provincial government has requirements for the regulation of contaminated sites under the *Environmental Management Act* (EMA). The Act prescribes processes and standards to identify, assess, and remediate sites in BC. The Contaminated Sites Regulation (CSR) includes provisions that further define the process and the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy (Ministry) administers the legal requirements.
- Under the provincial environmental framework, a contaminated site owner is required to submit a Site Risk Classification Report. If the site is classified as high risk, the Ministry directly oversees remediation.
- The property at 4575 W. 10th was classified as a high risk site under the CSR; therefore, the Land Remediation Section of the Ministry has been directly involved with monitoring and site remediation planning, since 2011.
- The site owner (SunLife) has hired an environmental consultant to investigate and monitor impacts to soil and groundwater at the accessible areas on the site, and on the adjacent, affected properties.
- Specifically, impacts are caused by elevated chlorinated hydrocarbons, primarily tetrachloroethylene (PERC), sourced from multiple, historical and current on-site dry cleaning facilities. The contaminants are in groundwater and have migrated off-site to adjacent municipal roadways and private properties.
- SunLife's objective is to remediate the site to facilitate redevelopment. In-situ thermal remediation (ISTR) technology has been identified as a remediation option for the site. In the proposed remediation plan, existing tenants must vacate the site and the existing buildings are to be removed. Sunlife is in the process of obtaining demolition permits from the City of Vancouver.
- An initial estimate of the time required to complete the proposed remediation is approximately 3 to 4 years, excluding long-term monitoring or engineered measures that may be identified to manage the risk, following the implementation of the ISTR.
- At this time, there are no public health or safety concerns, as the contamination at the site is
 in the groundwater and there is no current use of this groundwater for public
 consumption. Implementing the proposed remediation is contingent on the property
 remaining vacant.
