The purpose of the TCG is, among other things, to define and protect Tahltan inherent aboriginal rights and title, to protect the eco-systems and natural resources of Tahltan Territory through pursuing sustainable economic development, and to strengthen the cultural wellness of the Tahltan Community by promoting traditional values based on the concepts of caring, sharing, cooperation, truth, honour, fairness and above all, respect. It represents a legal declaration of rights of Tahltan individuals to the Canadian government and British monarch. Tahltans have yet to extinguish their Aboriginal title by any other legal process.

Our objective is to protect 50% of the Sheslay Area (786,000 Ha) and the entirety of the Ice Mountain Area (4,800 Ha) and Klappan Sacred Headwaters Zone (286,580) under IPCAs. In addition to formally defining and implementing Tahltan stewardship for the IPCAs, we will consider other legal designations at the provincial and federal levels that align with Tahltan's objectives for long-term stewardship in each area. Many of these discussions

have begun through TCG's Government to Government relationship with the Province. The approach and process for developing IPCAs and related formal protection will differ in each area. The Sheslav Proposed IPCA is the least defined of the three areas. The scale of the designations within the Tahltan LUP is at approximately 1:1.000.000. We will further define the specific areas that require protection within the Sheslay area to a scale of 1:50,000, define and delineate boundaries, and develop management objectives specific to the ecological conditions and threats in the Sheslay Area. There is significant exploration pressure in the area, along with high cultural values and high quality caribou and salmon habitat. The Klappan Sacred Headwaters Zone Proposed IPCA was designated for protection under the Klappan Plan, jointly developed with the BC Provincial Government. Tahltan people have a longstanding spiritual, cultural, economic relationship with Klappan, and the lands and resources continue to sustain Tahltan people and communities to this day. The Klappan also includes the "Sacred Headwaters," an immense subalpine basin which is the birthplace of three salmon bearing rivers, the Skeena, Nass and Stikine, which in itself holds significant social, cultural, and environmental importance. We would like to work collaboratively with the Klappan Management Board and Klabona Keepers to further define management objectives and long-term Tahltan stewardship of the area through the framework already established in the Klappan Plan and Klappan Management Board. As part of the establishment of the IPCA, appropriate IUCN protected area management categories would be discussed, with 'wilderness area' or 'protected area with sustainable use of natural resources' currently considered the most applicable.

Project location description

The project encompasses the entirety of Tahltan Territory. TCG has chosen this area in order to align with the Tahltan Land Use Planning process and put Tahltan stewardship within Tahltan Territory into practice. Within the Tahltan ICPA, TCG will also consider other legal avenues and designations to ensure Tahltan stewardship and values are maintained over the long term. Specific areas within the Tahltan Territory have been identified as requiring more immediate and/or further protection. The Shesley, Ice Mountain and Klappan Sacred Headwaters Zone areas are three such regions within the Tahltan Territory which have high cultural, ecological, and sustenance values for the Tahltan people. It has been expressed by Tahltan membership both through the Tahltan Land Use Planning Process and through the Klappan Plan that these are areas which are important to be managed in a way that protects these key values, and where Tahltan members do not want to see industrial development. In recent decades, Tahltan Territory has seen unprecedented levels of resource development and exploration. By providing clear direction through and the Tahltan LUP, and subsequent establishment of the Tahltan IPCAs, it will decrease uncertainty for government agencies, industry, businesses, and resource partners while providing protection and conservation measures for areas outlined as having high cultural and ecological value (including sustenance areas, areas of particular environmental concern, and key habitat areas for important species). As stated above, the proposed Tahltan IPCA will consider the entirety of Tahltan Territory. The Nation's leaders have never ceded Tahltan rights and title to Tahltan lands, as outlined in the 1910 Tahltan Declaration. The majority of lands within the Tahltan IPCA are currently classified as crown lands. There are also designated provincial park lands, wilderness areas, ecological reserves as well as reserve lands and small amounts of private land. Current encumbrances include mining tenure and claim areas

Municipal, provincial/territorial and/or federal legal or other measures needed to establish a protected or conserved area, or an interim protected or conserved area

We will begin with developing the Tahltan IPCA as a result of the completion of the Tahltan LUP, and concurrently consider potential legal protection status under provincial and federal designations, as appropriate through the process. Our primary focus is on defining and putting Tahltan Stewardship of the land in to practice, while also considering potential to pursue legal avenues to ensure that Tahltan stewardship and values are maintained over the long term. In terms of timelines, protection will be established initially under the Tahltan LUP by March 31, 2020. Other agreements and interim protection measures will be determined and negotiated through the process. Establishment of an active Management Plan and structure for the Tahltan IPCAs is targeted for March 31, 2021. Establishment of permanent legal protection status for particular areas or regions within the IPCA will range as appropriate.

Consultation and support from other parties

The Tahltan IPCA will build on years of work, engagement processes and partnerships made through the process of creating both the Klappan Plan and the Tahltan Land Use Plan. This includes engagement with technical expertise of Tahltan Territory as well as engagement with all three communities (Telegraph Creek, Iskut and Dease Lake) within Tahltan Territory. The 3 Nations (Tahltan, Kaska and Taku River Tlingit) have been working together to initiate a new approach to collaborative natural resource stewardship with the Province. The Collaborative Stewardship Framework (CSF) forum is intended to be a way of working with Indigenous governments and communities that supports the collaborative design and delivery of natural resources stewardship in the province, seeking to advance both environmental sustainability and reconciliation. Tahltan and Taku River Tlingit (TRT) currently have overlapping territorial claims in the Sheslay area. Tahltan has a working relationship with TRT. TRT is aware of the proposal and has provided Tahltan with a letter of support for this project which has been attached. The Kaska First Nation who also share an overlapping border with the Tahltan have also provided a letter of support to this project. Additional letters of support include the Klabona Keepers and the Tahltan Guide Outfitters Association. Additional consultation will occur with the Klappan Management Board, Trappers within the IPCA areas as well as higher level negotiations with Canada, BC and Mineral tenure holders.

Technical feasibility

Tahltan Central Government (TCG) is a fully operating governmental body that has successfully completed projects of similar scope and nature. It manages large annual budgets and has the capacity to undertake short and long term funding plans for the Tahltan IPCA. As a government, it has also demonstrated the capacity and authority to manage for conservation through multi-stakeholder projects such as the Klappan Plan and Tahltan LUP. The TCG has a working government to government relationship with the Province of British Columbia, and is therefore fully aware of the steps involved, time required, and technical work, including negotiations, required to establish protected areas of this nature. Between the TCG staff and team of Consultants, the Tahltan IPCA project has all the necessary expertise to fulfill the project goals and objectives, and ensure transparency and accountability throughout the process. Through the Tahltan Central Government, the Lands Department is responsible for the management of the environment, wildlife and resources in Tahltan Territory. This includes guidance on culturally significant and sensitive wildlife areas. The TCG, through its specific departments of Lands and Wildlife, has significant capacity to implement post-establishment Tahltan-led stewardship practices.

Tahltan Central Government (TCG) is the administrative governing body of the Tahltan Nation. The TCG will be leading this project based on our mandate to represent and advance the collective and inherent rights and title interests of the Tahltan Nation by:

- o Protecting the ecosystems and natural resources of Tahltan territory through the pursuit of sustainable economic development; and

TCG will involve Tahltan Fisheries in the development of the Protected Area; Tahltan Fisheries is keenly interested in the development of this area becoming protected since Tahltan Lake, a salmon spawning area, falls within the proposed protected area. Water quality is of high importance to Tahltan Fisheries (and Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) who works closely with Tahltan Fisheries); their data on water levels, water quality, and other water management aspects is extensive. We intend to use this historic data to ensure that the existing water quality parameters are kept and/or met with any future use of the area.

The Klappan Sacred Headwaters IPCA area includes ecologically sensitive drainages, including the majority of the Klappan and little Klappan Rivers, and the headwaters of the Skeena, Nass and Stikine Rivers. This area provides critically important wetland ecosystem services including peatland water filtration and flow regulation, natural storage base for carbon, natural flood reduction and control through water storage and retention, habitats for a wide range of waterfowel, flora, furbearers, reptiles and fish, refugia for rare and endangered species and nutrient source for connected waters.

Climate change adaptation and mitigation

Tahltan Elders and community members have indicated the concerns with the changing long-term distribution of wildlife, habitats, migration/movement patterns, and the presence/absence of culturally important species for our Nation. With wildlife adjusting to climate change, we can predict that our communities may have challenges when harvesting moose and caribou for sustenance needs. The proposed Sheslay protected area is home to the Level Mountain caribou herd, as well as critical moose habitat and calving areas, this area is a culturally high use area for the community of Telegraph Creek, most importantly for sustenance gathering. The TCG is planning to use other First Nations experiences and successes to develop community-led monitoring, education, and engagement studies in Tahltan territory. Strengthening community capacity and understanding of climate change through an approach that integrates scientific, traditional, and local knowledge will enable our communities to take immediate adaptation actions on the foundation of better knowledge.

The Klappan Sacred Headwaters area is an immense subalpine basin which is the birthplace of three salmon bearing rivers, the Skeena, Nass and Stikine Rivers. These rivers are fed by water purified and flow regulated by immense peat lands as part of the Klappan tributary system. Especially moving into a future with uncertainty regarding climate change, the protection of peat lands, immense regulators and carbon sinks, is important in longer term climate adaptation and mitigation strategies. The longstanding Tahltan relationship with this area continues to this day as it is home to many resources, including fish and wildlife, which sustain the Tahltan people and communities. The proposed area for the Klappan IPCA is a high use area for the community of Iskut for sustenance gathering of many highly valued animal species that either migrate through or call the Klappan area home.


