Fairchild Radio/CHMB Radio: Acorn BC protest; amendments to Citizenship Act; medically assisted dying; Mayor Robertson tells Park Board chair Sarah Kirby-Young that the marijuana protest is not a city sanctioned event and at no point did the city direct the protest organizers to move to Sunset Beach. Robertson tells Kirby-Young that if she has any concerns she should stop directing them to City Hall, instead take it up with the protest organizers directly.

RED FM: Premiers of all Canadian provinces and territories are meeting PM in Vancouver on March 3, where Trudeau may encourage the premiers to sign on a climate change strategy; scrapping of a proposed BC LNG project; Export Development Canada is setting aside \$750 million to help ailing oil and gas firms make it through the industry's worst downturn in decades – Vice President for Western Canada, Mark Senn, says the focus will be on small and medium-sized companies; physician-assisted dying, Providence memo, opposition is accusing the Liberal government of delaying the rule process in doctor-assisted dying as health care regulations fall under the provincial jurisdiction; tent city; two BC companies top the Forbes' list of Canada's 25 best employers - BC Hydro is in first place, followed by VanCity in second; changes to Citizenship Act; Surrey RCMP talked about crime strategy and crime prevention during a neighbourhood safety meeting; SPICE Radio: physician-assisted dying; stolen Honda Civics; annual pot protest relocation.

Positive Coverage

Farmers' tax credit – The MoA announcement of a 25% tax credit for farmers and other fresh food producers donating otherwise unmarketable food, is welcomed by non-profit organizations. The incentive is to offer farmers some financial compensation for their time, resources and transport of the second grade produce, instead of letting it rot in the field as compost or go into landfills. MNL (clipped), "The credit is available for the next three years, so 2016, 2017, and 2018, the 25% tax credit to registered charities is available. After the three-year initial period we'll do a review" – Global, CBC, CKNW, CHNL, BC1, Prov-A11.

'BC Winter Games' – opening ceremonies start Thursday evening and over 1,200 young athletes from across BC will compete in 17 different sports in Penticton – Global, CHBC

Ongoing / Emerging / Potential Issues

Report from the Special Joint Committee on Physician-Assisted Dying 'Physician-assisted suicide' — a new report from a special committee of MPs and senators makes recommendations that would give Canada some of the most wideranging laws in the world. The committee made 21 recommendations allowing for those who want medical help when dying to get it, going beyond dealing with just terminally ill people and include advanced directives for those with approaching dementia or Alzheimer's, and even the potential to include minors at some point, but not yet. The deadline for making these recommendations into legislation is June 6.

- MTL asserts recommendations contained in the federal report on physician-assisted suicide are consistent with work BC has already done on the right-to-die issue, the province will work with the feds to ensure an integrated system, but will wait for more direction from Ottawa before developing more at the provincial level CBC, Global, CHBC, TC-A04, Prov-A03. MTL urges caution and encourages debate in pursuing this legislation for minors CTV.
- Rankin calls for an immediate study of the issues to be brought forward in 3 years to see how the system is working – Global.
- A Providence Health Care memo has been leaked, which states physician assisted suicide violates its Catholic tenets, but Dying with Dignity (Gokool) insists that publically funded health institutions must provide physican assisted dying on their premises CKNW, CP. MTL suggests patients receiving care in faith based health facilities and wishing to die with their doctor's assistance could potentially be moved to nearby health care facilities and that patient rights should be universal, however health care providers facing ethical moral dilemmas must also be supported. MTL (clipped) "I would say that we all have our own belief systems and I think it would be better to have providers that have a similar belief system providing health care service at the end of life to a patient.

And I think within our system, and within the period of reflection, that we will be able accommodate both sides of this highly emotional and deeply held system of beliefs that accompanies the policy around physician-assisted dying". BCCLA (Pastine) says they represent the rights of the critically ill as well as the religious rights and freedoms of doctors, but call on gov to force Providence to respect patient's rights on this. On the Providence memo, (clipped) "What that essentially means is that for those doctors within the institution that are willing to provide this compassionate end of life care for their patients, they'll be barred from doing that. We think that this is absolutely the wrong approach" – CBC, CKNW, VS-A01 &A06, G&M-A05

- Darcy, "It's up to the government to set those regulations, and to pass legislation, and then to ensure that all
 health authorities that receive public money respect the law". Providence says it will review the
 recommendations from the committee CBC.
- BC Civil Liberties Association (Patterson) is encouraged by the report and sees it as clear the report aims to make this a constitutional right for all Canadians – CFAX.
- Roman Catholic Arch Archdiocese of Vancouver (Schratz) says he would expect doctors who object to assisted
 dying to be able to opt out CKNW.

Tent city — 'Victoria homeless camp stages block party on planned eviction day' - extensive coverage continues as today is the deadline for eviction from the courthouse camp. Many campers are reported as taking the some 230 spaces of temporary shelter provided by the province and social services agencies, but others have said they will remain at the camp until a permanent solution is developed. MRC (clipped) "what we will see now is that the people that need housing will leave and take the housing and there will be people that will still be there that will not. It won't be an issue of housing. They'll be there for just a protest". The province will wait a few days before it seeks a court injunction for those who remain - CTV, Global, CHEK, CBC, VS-A11, G&M-S02. Campers also hosted a block party including those who traveled from the Lower Mainland to join the protest, as a show of defiance for the eviction deadline and to demand low-cost housing and land – TC-A01. MRC reiterated his focus to help those needing it the most – those with mental health and addiction issues – CP. Several campers have mentioned they can't afford the accommodation fees of \$375/month with no food provided at Mount Edwards Court – CFAX.

LNG project delays - Kitimat LNG shelved - AltaGas is shelving the development of its Douglas Channel LNG plant near Kitimat. The company says the decision was made due to adverse economic conditions and worsening global energy prices. This project was a joint venture that included four companies. MRC does not take this as a sign the industry isn't viable, (clipped) "I think we've got some significant FID discussions taking place in the next 60 to 90 days on a couple of projects. Obviously there's been two that have told us that they want to get to their FID by the end of this particular year in December and they're much larger. This was a very small project" and says AltaGas does have plans to expand other energy projects elsewhere in the province. Haisla Chief (Ross) is disappointed with the news also, as the FN community would have benefited significantly from the influx of development and jobs – CBC, CTV, VS-B04&D01, G&M-S03, TC-B02.

'Home cannabis production' – continued coverage on reaction from the federal court ruling allowing users to grow their own marijuana at home for medical use. Surrey Fire Chief (Garris) reiterates his concerns for community safety and Landlord BC (Huntiak) agrees the ruling could be a challenge for landlords and tenants BC College of Pharmacists (Nakagawa) doesn't support the idea of London Drugs and Shoppers Drug Mart dispensing medical marijuana if it becomes legal – Global, TC-B05, Prov-A01.

Other Issues

Resource Development / Forestry / Agriculture:

Mount Polley spurs regulations - 'B.C. brings in new oversight rules for mining after tailings pond collapse' - government is imposing more oversight on the mining industry by boosting potential penalties for prosecutions to \$1 million in fines and three years in prison. **MBB** says the changes provide his ministry with more tools for compliance and enforcement, to build an even safer and more sustainable industry and his goal is to ensure the province has a regulatory regime for health and safety on mine sites that is the best in the world – CP, CHNL. **MBB** – "There will be some administrative penalties for non-compliance that can ensure that some of the weak practices we saw at that mine site don't happen

again"- G&M-S03. **Macdonald** skeptical penalties will mean greater safety, "This is a government deeply beholden to these mining interests, and their record over time has been a record of leniency and a lack of proper oversight". Mine Watch Canada sees these regulations as 'useful but a small piece of the overall picture' and MABC (**Brino**) is not surprised by the new penalty powers but would like to be consulted as regulations are developed - VS-D02.

Education / Health / Social Services:

Transit subsidy - 'disability assistance' - Over 50 members from BC ACORN rallied at the Burrard SkyTrain station to protest against the government's \$77 monthly increase in benefits for people with disabilities - the first such increase in nine years. Acorn wants the government to raise the rate to \$800 more a month. **MMdj** wishes more could have been provided and as the economy grows more will be done for those with disabilities – CHEK.

Medical marijuana – 'pot advocates say 'next fight' is legalizing dispensaries' given the federal ruling on growing medical marijuana for personal use, advocates encourage government to legalize dispensaries, which have grown dramatically recently, as more patients eschew the mail-order system. **Conroy** "the great majority of patients would like to be able to go to something like that. And that needs to happen as the government needs to look at the [medical marijuana rules] and the [licensed producers] and the dispensaries and come up with a regime that takes all them into account", SFU criminology prof (**Boyd**) agrees that storefronts are a better venue as mail-order is too restrictive and not a good delivery model for medicine. In the federal decision Justice Phelan said "dispensaries are at the heart of cannabis access" and suggested the growth of such illegal storefront shops is connected to the restrictive nature of the current medical marijuana system. – G&M-S01.

Closure postponed - 'Mountain View facility' — Fraser Health has decided to not close the mental health facility but will not be filling any future vacancies. **Hammell** cites a deficit in mental health beds in the region — Global.

Shawingan Lake water quality – 'Site manager defends landfill site' – Hume tours the soil remediation site near Shawingan Lake to clarify Lot 21 from Lot 23 and covers the triple screen filtration system- VS-A09.

Dog fighting in the North - 'Missing animals' -pet owners in Northern BC suspect the spike in missing animals is due to organized dog fighting rings, in which pets are used as bait for fighting dogs. Over 1,300 people have signed a petition asking for more resources for RCMP and the SPCA to investigate. MMM (clipped) "Looking for lost pets is probably not high on their (RCMP) radar at this particular time. Until somebody can show us that there's some activities involved by nefarious people that are perhaps stealing pets, the police probably won't be taking any action on them – CBC.

Justice / Public Safety:

'GPS tracking' - Continued coverage of the suggestion by the city of Williams Lake to medically imbed GPS tracking devices into serious and prolific offenders. BCCL (Vonn) says this would not withstand a legal challenge for breaching bodily integrity and pre-crime surveillance, but concedes the city's concerns over the rise in crime by a select few still should be addressed – CBC, CTV, TC-A02. Two Kamloops councillors (Wallace & O'Fee) say this motion overreaches the mandate of the city council – CHNL. Nelson (clipped): "These are the people that we need to make sure that we've got our eyes and our ears on 24/7. These are the people that are doing 80% of our crime in our communities" and hopes the province and the federal government will help fund the initiative but if not, Williams Lake plans to fund it on its own – CBC PG. MMM said he is not familiar with the technology being proposed by the council, but his ministry is working on a safety pilot project for the city – CP. Mayor Cobb clarifies the resolution does not mention microchips and references monitoring bracelets with GPS purchased by the province. MMM said they are exploring a community safety partnership with the city and will continue to work with them - G&M-S01.

Jobs / Economy / Skills Training / Labour:

'Mayors urge BC to leave film, TV tax credits intact' mayors from Surrey and Vancouver are urging **MMdj** to be cautious about his plans to pare back production sector tax credits the minister has deemed unaffordable. **Hepner** emphasises benefits to both the province and specific municipalities and encourages consultation. **Robertson** says the low dollar has skewed the situation and has boosted the spending power of Hollywood producers and cites the tax credits are a strong part of building and supporting the industry in BC –G&M-S01, Global.

Shadow flipping- 'real estate panel risks failure'-Eby wrote a letter to the panel sharing his concerns that current personnel and financial resources are not adequate to effectively investigate the issue, "You will require a team of auditors and investigators to do this legwork on your behalf and for many reasons those staff members cannot come from the council or from the superintendent's office" and urged the panel to resist the demands of MoF for a quick turnaround, noting the issues "are entrenched, took years to develop and participants in fraud or predatory practices are often expert in concealing their activities". A final report is expected by the end of May. Rogers says the panel will take Eby's concerns under advisement but will not hesitate to request any resources needed to do the job correctly—G&M-S01.

Government / Politics:

'Citizenship Act & refugees' - McCallum introduced legislation to amend the Citizenship Act, that would repeal many of the controversial changes the previous Conservative government made to how someone gets or loses their Canadian citizenship. Immigration lawyer (Wong) welcomes the changes to the Act, saying it will be easier for ethnic minorities to become citizens and have the right to vote. Wong says it will help the country develops policies that protect better ethnic minorities. Critics say this is poorly thought through and lacks cohesive policy – CBC, CKNW, AM 1320.

University politics - 'No-confidence vote for UNBC chairman' - Senators at UNBC in Prince George say they have lost confidence in the chair of the board of governors over how former Conservative cabinet minister James Moore was appointed chancellor - the body passed a motion of non-confidence related to board chair, Ryan Matheson, late Wednesday – VS-A08, CJCI, CBC.

Weaver private member bill – criminal notoriety act – Weaver's private member bill to ensure that there is no ability for a convicted criminal to actually profit from retelling the story of their crime in BC – BC1.

News You Can Use: Increased Investment in Forest Stewardship through New Forest Enhancement Society of B.C.

Minister Steve Thomson has announced details about the new Forest Enhancement Society of B.C., which will focus its efforts on wildfire risk reduction to complement government's existing forest stewardship programs and world-class wildfire suppression capabilities.

Key Messages:

- This new Forest Enhancement Society of B.C. will allow government to make new investments in our province's forest and protect the investments that have already been made.
- The new Forest Enhancement Society of B.C. is being created through a new \$85 million investment and will focus its efforts on:
 - Wildfire risk reduction fuel management activities such as thinning, pruning and removing woody debris
 from forests (especially those impacted by the mountain pine beetle infestation) to reduce wildfire risks in
 key areas.
 - Forest rehabilitation clearing stands damaged by wildfire (or at high risk from wildfire) and reforesting them.
 - Wildlife habitat restoration designing fuel management and forest rehabilitation activities to promote desired wildlife habitat characteristics.
 - FireSmart program raising awareness among local governments and rural property owners about steps they
 can take to protect their homes from wildfire.
- Local forest products businesses will have opportunities to purchase the timber, roadside debris and other forest fibre resulting from these activities, at market prices. This will in turn support rural employment.
- The society's activities will complement B.C.'s existing forest stewardship programs and world-class wildfire suppression capabilities. Examples of existing programs include Forests for Tomorrow, the Land Based Investment Strategy and integrated silviculture strategies.
- The Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative, administered by the Union of B.C. Municipalities, focuses on reducing
 the wildfire risk in the two-kilometre wildland-urban interface surrounding communities. With its latest \$10 million
 commitment, government has provided \$78 million to this initiative since 2004.
- The Forest Enhancement Society of B.C. will complement the efforts of the Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative by supporting critical wildfire prevention work outside of interface areas and providing a landscape-level approach to wildfire risk reduction.

Forest Enhancement Society of B.C. Frequently Asked Questions February 26, 2016

Where is funding for the new coming from?

 The \$85 million in 2015-16 funding will be provided Forest Enhancement Society of B.C. under the Wildfire Act.

What is Forest Enhancement Society of B.C.?

 A society, incorporated under the Society Act, at arm's length from government that will advance the proactive management of wildfires through prevention and rehabilitation activities.

What will the funding support?

- The Province is funding the society as an investment in activities that prevent and mitigate the impact of future wildfires such as:
 - Wildfire (fuel) Management: thinning, pruning and removing woody debris from forests (including those impacted by Mountain Pine Beetle) to reduce risk from wildfire to communities, infrastructure, timber and non-timber values;
 - Forest Rehabilitation: clearing stands damaged by fire or at high risk from fire and restocking them;
 - Wildlife Habitat Restoration: designing fuel management and fire rehabilitation activities to account for wildlife needs to promote desired wildlife habitat characteristics;
 - Delivery of the FireSmart program: educating local governments and rural property owners on steps they can take to protect their homes and businesses from wildfire and assisting in the implementation and monitoring of those activities.

Why has the government elected to deliver these activities through a third party like the Forest Enhancement Society of B.C., rather than delivering it in-house?

Given the strong connection with communities, this structure ensures a broader range of
perspectives are involved in the management of the fund and a more-direct link with communities
and stakeholders. It also creates opportunities for the society to leverage the funds received by the
Province to expand its reach and impact by accessing additional funds external to government.

How does this funding (and the activities it supports) relate to other existing programs, including Forests for Tomorrow, Land Based Investment Strategy and Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative?

- The Forest Enhancement Society of B.C. will provide a landscape-level approach to wildfire risk
 reduction in high-risk areas and restoring severely impacted forests to ensure healthy, resilient
 forests for the future. It links and builds upon existing activities delivered through other programs
 such as Forests for Tomorrow, Integrated Silviculture Strategies and the Land Based Investment
 Strategy.
- The Forests for Tomorrow program is funded at approximately \$40 million per year and uses that funding, in an average year, to rehabilitate of 20,000 hectares and plant 28 million seedlings.
- The Land Based Investment Strategy invests in all stewardship activities across Crown land, ranging from forest health activities to wildlife inventories.
- The Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative is designed to reduce wildfire risk to communities by funding community wildfire prevention planning and treatments within the two-kilometre wildlandurban interface buffer surrounding communities. The Forest Enhancement Society will undertake

activities complementary to the Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative by supporting critical wildfire prevention work outside of the community interface areas and providing a more landscape approach to wildfire risk reduction.

Many of the existing investment programs have been aimed at ecosystem restoration. The society's
activities also engage in restoration but as a part of a larger wildfire prevention strategy.

What kind of activities will be funded under the Forest Enhancement Society of B.C.?

- Treating forests to decrease fire risk and improve wildlife habitat attributes.
- Rehabilitation and replanting of deteriorated mountain pine beetle killed stands that represent a significant fire risk.
- Supporting the delivery of the FireSmart program.

What kind of activities will NOT be covered by Forest Enhancement Society of B.C.?

- Activities within municipal boundaries or on First Nation reserve or title lands (these activities are covered by the Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative).
- Harvesting and silviculture activities that would be economically feasible to pursue without the Forest Enhancement Society of B.C.

Can you give us an example of sample projects?

- There are areas with complex resource management objectives and very high fire risk in the Interior and on the Coast which have been identified as initial candidate for treatments.
- There is a fire risk reduction pilot project in Williams Lake that would be a good candidate project as
 it involves treatment of forests with high wildfire risk, near a community, in a variety of tenure types
 that covers a mosaic of forest values including:
 - Timber
 - o Recreation (sanctioned mountain bike trails)
 - Wildlife (mule deer winter range)
 - Old growth management areas
- Likewise, in the Cariboo, there are over 900 hectares of overgrown Interior Douglas fir that are at
 high risk of burning. These stands, if treated, are important wildlife habitat. They are also an
 important part of the mid-term timber supply for the region. Treating them now will improve their
 performance as habitat and help to protect the long-term timber supply for the province.
- BC Timber Sales has identified high wildfire risk stands in the Sunshine Coast that are not
 economically available for treatment without intervention. Treating these stands would help protect
 the investment that the Province has made in BC Timber Sales and generate useful data regarding
 contract costs and market pricing that could inform other parts of the program.

Statement on 2016 national roundtable

VICTORIA – Attorney General and Minister of Justice Suzanne Anton and Minister of Aboriginal Relations and Reconciliation John Rustad marked the conclusion of the 2016 National Roundtable on Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls with the following statement:

"Ensuring the safety of Indigenous women and girls is one of the defining issues of our time. Families in our province and across the country have been deeply affected by the loss of loved ones. A key component of the 2016 National Roundtable was to hear and share what families are telling us and examine the actions we are taking to prevent, respond to and support healing from violence against Indigenous women and girls.

"Families of missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls have shared with us powerful stories of their experiences and their recommendations for ending violence and achieving justice. Much of what we heard at the B.C. Family Gathering in Prince George was echoed in discussions here in Winnipeg, where we listened to what family members and Indigenous leaders told us about their grief, their concerns and their hopes for the future.

"We heard about racism and how the portrayal of Indigenous people in the media perpetuates stereotypes and violence. We heard about the need for education about the history of Indigenous people in British Columbia and across our country. We heard about the need to focus on respect of Indigenous people.

"The Government of British Columbia is taking action on what we have heard from grieving Aboriginal families in our province. It is why we are targeting anti-violence funding toward Aboriginal communities. In the past year, we provided \$1 million in Civil Forfeiture Grant funding to support Aboriginal communities in their anti-violence initiatives, \$2.5 million in ongoing annual funding for services and supports to victims of crime and women who have experienced violence in Northern British Columbia, and \$1.5 million for anti-domestic violence programs selected by Aboriginal agency partners. We are committed to taking this kind of partnered approach to identify and implement future actions. We will strive to improve cultural competency and safety within and across our government. We will work with Aboriginal leaders and the federal government to ensure that the National Inquiry builds on these actions.

"Across Canada momentum is building. The topic of missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls is increasingly getting the attention and leadership it deserves. Each province and territory, as well as the federal government, is pursuing projects and measurable initiatives that will make real progress to resolve this crisis. In British Columbia, we are committed to achieving generational change with solutions to an unacceptable situation that affects us all."

You may recall that we worked together on a short letter (attached below) from the Premier in support of the Canadian Gas Association's bid for LNG2022 - a major global LNG conference held every three years in different jurisdictions involved in the LNG industry. Also we had excellent support from Fazil Mihlar at a site visit meeting back in September which was very very helpful.

I'm pleased to report that, Canada has been selected to proceed to the last stage of this whole selection process - a presentation of our bid at a Committee meeting in April 2016 at the LNG18 Conference being held in Perth, Australia. Three other countries were also selected to present bids. A final decision will be made on the winning bid at this meeting in Perth.

You may recall that we worked together on a short letter (attached below) from the Premier in support of the Canadian Gas Association's bid for LNG2022 - a major global LNG conference held every three years in different jurisdictions involved in the LNG industry. Also we had excellent support from Fazil Mihlar at a site visit meeting back in September which was very very helpful.

I'm pleased to report that, Canada has been selected to proceed to the last stage of this whole selection process - a presentation of our bid at a Committee meeting in April 2016 at the LNG18 Conference being held in Perth, Australia. Three other countries were also selected to present bids. A final decision will be made on the winning bid at this meeting in Perth.

I was wondering about two other things that would greatly help support our bid:

1. We are working with Tourism Vancouver to prepare our final formal presentation of our bid. A short video (3-4 minutes) will be part of our presentation to profile the City of Vancouver and to

- The Ministry of Health takes the use of any antipsychotic medications seriously, and we are committed to protecting the health, safety and dignity of seniors receiving care. In 2012, we developed a province-wide guideline for antipsychotic drug use in residential care facilities, to ensure clinicians have guidance on how and when to use antipsychotic medications. (http://www.health.gov.bc.ca/library/publications/year/2012/bpsd-guideline.pdf)
- Throughout B.C., the Ministry, health authorities and care facilities have taken steps to reduce the reliance on
 antipsychotic medications in residential care. We are working with the BC Patient Safety and Quality Council on
 a voluntary quality improvement program, CLeAR (Call for Less Antipsychotics in Residential care), that works to
 reduce the inappropriate use of those drugs in residential care homes. The first wave of this program showed a
 steady decline in the use of any antipsychotic in facilities from 38 percent in October 2013, to just under 32
 percent in December 2014.
- Facilities participating in CLeAR reported improved communication, teamwork and culture, which set the stage
 for further improvements. Over 90% of respondents agreed that they had built new skills and knowledge for
 improvement and over 80% indicated that they were now comfortable leading and carrying out quality and
 safety initiatives in their organization.



Prescribed burn scheduled in Monck Provincial Park

KAMLOOPS - BC Parks is planning to conduct an eight-hectare prescribed burn in Monck Provincial Park, northeast of Merritt, in an effort to restore the area's ecosystem and reduce wildfire risks.

The BC Wildfire Service will conduct the burning operations in mid-March or late March. The exact timing of the burn will depend on weather and site conditions. The project will proceed only if fire behaviour conditions are suitable and will allow for quick smoke dissipation and low-to-moderate fire intensity. Trained wildfire crews will be onsite to carefully monitor the fire.

Smoke will be visible from Nicola Lakeshore Estates and residences west of the park near Monck Park Rd. Smoke may also be visible from Highway 5A, but no highway closures are planned as a result of this burn.

The goal of these burns is to mimic naturally occurring ground fires and reduce the level of dead and combustible material in grassland and open forest areas. Introducing fire to the park will also help protect a number of values, including riparian areas, trail beds and park facilities, as well as nearby residential communities and infrastructure.

The removal of forest fuels helps reduce the threat of interface wildfires. Prescribed fire can also discourage insect infestations and help fire-adapted plant species reproduce.

Cycling and pedestrian safety improved along Stanley Park Causeway

VANCOUVER - The \$7-million project to improve safety for cyclists and pedestrians travelling along the Stanley Park Causeway is now complete.

"More than 2,200 cyclists and about 200 pedestrians travel along the Stanley Park Causeway each day during the busy summer months, and this widening and safety upgrade will greatly improve safety for them, as well as encourage people to walk or cycle instead of driving," said Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure Todd Stone. "The Stanely Park Causeway Improvement Project was a component of B.C. on the Move, and we are happy to be upgrading safety and efficiency for cycling enthusiasts and pedestrians along this key corridor connecting Vancouver and the North Shore."

The project included widening the east sidewalk to 3.6 metres to accommodate both cyclists and pedestrians, with a separated cycling lane and a walking lane. The west sidewalk has been widened to ensure added safety for southbound cyclists that includes two cycling passing lanes to accommodate different cycling speeds.

A new safety fence has been installed separating cyclists and pedestrians from vehicle traffic on both sides of the Stanley Park Causeway, a 2.2-kilometre segment of Highway 99 that provides direct access to Stanley Park and Vancouver's downtown core.

"The causeway is a key route connecting Vancouver to the North Shore communities and bicycle and pedestrian traffic continues to increase in popularity," said North Vancouver-Lonsdale MLA Naomi Yamamoto.
"This project aims to improve the safety for all who travel along the Stanley Park Causeway, while maintaining the natural beauty of Stanley Park and the surrounding area."

The ministry worked in close collaboration with the Vancouver Park Board, the City of Vancouver, the Stanley Park Ecological Society, HUB Cycling and local First Nations on this important safety improvement project. New signs clearly show where cyclists and pedestrians should be on the pathway. Etiquette signs have also been installed, asking cyclists to signal before passing.

"At the Vancouver Park Board, our mission is to advocate for and

preserve parks and recreation services to benefit all people, communities, and the environment. The preservation of Stanley Park was critical to us during this project," said Vancouver Park Board chair Sarah Kirby-Yung. "We are pleased the impact to the environmental footprint was very minimal here as the ministry worked with our team to deliver a safer and more efficient roadway for cyclists and pedestrians, while preserving the ecology and natural beauty of our park."

Construction on the project began on Sept. 13, 2015. The east sidewalk work was completed in December 2015, and work on the west sidewalk has recently wrapped up. The work schedule was extended due to inclement weather and additional mitigation measures that were undertaken in collaboration with the Vancouver Park Board to protect the health of trees along the corridor.

"The completion of this project is good news for people who cycle and those who want to start cycling more, because the safety fence and the designated cycling spaces make it safer and easier to navigate this route," said HUB Cycling executive director Erin O'Melinn. "The provincial government included HUB Cycling in the coordination and collaboration on this project, and although there remain a few spots we still have highlighted for further safety considerations, most of our input was valued on the concept and design of these necessary safety improvements to the Stanley Park Causeway."

B.C. on the Move is government's new 10-year plan for the improvement of the province's transportation network. Over the next three years, the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure will invest up to \$2.7 billion to improve British Columbia's transportation network.

As part of this plan, the B.C. government will increase the costshared funding available to communities to improve local cycling infrastructure. The government is committing \$18 million over the next three years to this program - a 50% increase over previous years. This will help fund municipal and regional projects such as multi-use paths, bike lanes, overpasses and shoulder bikeways.

As a result, the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure is no longer pursuing its application for a boundary adjustment.

The Park Use Permit, which is currently being reviewed by BC Parks, will enable the ministry to achieve its goals on Cosens Bay Road while reducing the potential impact to Kalamalka Lake Provincial Park that a boundary adjustment would have presented.

The ministry thanks the public for its engagement during this consultative process. The feedback collected was extremely valuable in shaping the outcome of this proposal.

The ministry will continue to work closely with BC Parks staff to ensure that all necessary environmental mitigation works are addressed and First Nations consultation is followed as per conditions of the Park Use Permit. If approved, a permit could be in place in early 2016.

B.C. increases investments in forest stewardship

VANCOUVER - The new Forest Enhancement Society of B.C., supported by \$85 million in government funding, will focus its efforts on wildfire risk reduction to complement the ministry's existing forest stewardship programs and world-class wildfire suppression capabilities.

Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations Minister Steve Thomson provided details of the society in his keynote speech at the Association of BC Forest Professionals annual general meeting.

The new society will concentrate its activities on the following:

- * Wildfire risk reduction: Fuel management activities such as thinning, pruning and removing woody debris from forests, especially those impacted by the mountain pine beetle infestation, to reduce wildfire risks in key areas. The recently updated Provincial Strategic Threat Analysis will provide guidance for potential treatments.
- * Forest rehabilitation: Clearing stands damaged by wildfire, or at high risk from wildfire, and reforesting them.
- * Wildlife habitat restoration: Designing fuel management and forest rehabilitation activities to promote desired wildlife habitat characteristics.
- * FireSmart program: Raising awareness among local governments and rural property owners about steps they can take to protect their homes from wildfire.

The Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative, administered by the Union of BC Municipalities, focuses on reducing the wildfire risk in the two-kilometre wildland-urban interface surrounding communities. With its latest \$10-million commitment, government has provided \$78 million to this initiative since 2004. The Forest Enhancement Society of B.C. will complement the efforts of the Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative by supporting critical wildfire prevention work outside of interface areas and providing a landscape-level approach to wildfire risk reduction.

Local forest products businesses will have opportunities to purchase the timber, roadside debris and other forest fibre resulting from these activities, at market prices. This will, in turn, support rural employment.

The work of the Forest Enhancement Society of B.C. will help meet the goal of a sustainable and reliable timber supply under the Forest Sector Competitiveness Strategy and aligns with the ministry's other programs designed to enhance B.C.'s forests, most notably Forests for Tomorrow, Land Based Investment Strategy and integrated silviculture strategies.

The inaugural board meeting of the society will take place in March. The society's immediate goals will be to set short-term priorities and engage with stakeholders.

As part of Budget 2016, the ministry's Land Based Investment Strategy will see an increase of \$12 million for 2016-17. Most of the increase will go toward Forests for Tomorrow, translating into increased fertilization of 8,000 to 20,000 hectares and providing for additional surveys and site preparation to plant 28 million seedlings annually by 2019-20.

BACKGROUNDER 2 Provincial Strategic Threat Analysis

The 2015 Provincial Strategic Threat Analysis (Wildfire Threat Analysis), and an accompanying series of maps, were produced using geographic analysis and a wide range of data to assess various wildfire threat elements, including vegetation types, historical wildfire data, forest fuel classification, fire behaviour patterns, geography and other factors.

The maps indicate potential wildfire threats throughout the province, using a scale of 10 Fire Threat Classes (with 1 being the lowest risk and 10 being the highest risk). These 10 levels represent estimates of relative fire threats, taking into account fire occurrence history, derived fire intensity under severe fire weather conditions and the impacts of fire "spotting" (where embers are blown ahead of the main fire and start new fires).

In the wildland-urban interface - the two-kilometre buffer areas surrounding communities - about 1,347,000 hectares are considered to be high-risk.

The Wildfire Threat Analysis presents these relative wildfire threats at a provincial scale only. In an area where a high risk is indicated, a qualified professional should confirm the actual rating at the forest stand level.

B.C. increases investments in forest stewardship

VANCOUVER - The new Forest Enhancement Society of B.C., supported by \$85 million in government funding, will focus its efforts on wildfire risk reduction to complement the ministry's existing forest stewardship programs and world-class wildfire suppression capabilities.

Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations Minister Steve Thomson provided details of the society in his keynote speech at the Association of BC Forest Professionals annual general meeting.

The new society will concentrate its activities on the following:

- * Wildfire risk reduction: Fuel management activities such as thinning, pruning and removing woody debris from forests, especially those impacted by the mountain pine beetle infestation, to reduce wildfire risks in key areas. The recently updated Provincial Strategic Threat Analysis will provide guidance for potential treatments.
- * Forest rehabilitation: Clearing stands damaged by wildfire, or at high risk from wildfire, and reforesting them.
- * Wildlife habitat restoration: Designing fuel management and forest rehabilitation activities to promote desired wildlife habitat characteristics.
- * FireSmart program: Raising awareness among local governments and rural property owners about steps they can take to protect their homes from wildfire.

The Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative, administered by the Union of BC Municipalities, focuses on reducing the wildfire risk in the two-kilometre wildland-urban interface surrounding communities. With its latest \$10-million

This toolkit is another component of the five-year hosting strategy that was announced by the Province last year to promote British Columbia as a world-class hosting destination.

The resource will include important tools to assist sport, art and cultural event organizers through the various stages of event management.

Some of the resources found in the toolkit include:

- Self-Assessment Checklist A simple checklist to provide potential event organizers with areas to consider prior to creating and submitting a bid.
- 2. Sport Event Bid Package Preparation Tools Tips to consider when developing a bid package that will attract sport events.
- 3. Sponsorship Tools Basic tips to help event organizers attract and maintain sponsors for an event.
- Volunteer Management Tools Resource includes tips to consider when managing volunteers on topics such as recruiting, training, deploying and recognizing volunteers.
- 5. Inventory of Facilities Discover the sport and recreation assets of B.C. communities that can assist organizations in finding the perfect venue for an event.
- Marketing, Media and Communication Tools Resources that will help promote the
 event, and provide guidance on working with the media to communicate with
 participants, volunteers and partners.

Future additions to the hosting toolkit will include an Economic Impact Assessment Tool that is currently under development. Once completed, it will provide organizers with the ability to predict and evaluate the economic impact of events, both before and after.

Community Sport Hosting Network:

The Ministry of Community, Sport and Cultural Development will also reinvigorate the Community Sport Hosting Network. This network will help organizations:

- Work together to continue building an event hosting culture throughout the province and promote British Columbia as the event hosting destination of choice.
- Strengthen the working relationship between the Government of British Columbia and communities and organizations interested in event hosting.
- Develop collaborative relationships across the Province to share best practices and

facilitate knowledge transfer as appropriate.

commitment, government has provided \$78 million to this initiative since 2004. The Forest Enhancement Society of B.C. will complement the efforts of the Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative by supporting critical wildfire prevention work outside of interface areas and providing a landscape-level approach to wildfire risk reduction.

Local forest products businesses will have opportunities to purchase the timber, roadside debris and other forest fibre resulting from these activities, at market prices. This will, in turn, support rural employment.

The work of the Forest Enhancement Society of B.C. will help meet the goal of a sustainable and reliable timber supply under the Forest Sector Competitiveness Strategy and aligns with the ministry's other programs designed to enhance B.C.'s forests, most notably Forests for Tomorrow, Land Based Investment Strategy and integrated silviculture strategies.

The inaugural board meeting of the society will take place in March. The society's immediate goals will be to set short-term priorities and engage with stakeholders.

As part of Budget 2016, the ministry's Land Based Investment Strategy will see an increase of \$12 million for 2016-17. Most of the increase will go toward Forests for Tomorrow, translating into increased fertilization of 8,000 to 20,000 hectares and providing for additional surveys and site preparation to plant 28 million seedlings annually by 2019-20.

BACKGROUNDER 2 Provincial Strategic Threat Analysis

The 2015 Provincial Strategic Threat Analysis (Wildfire Threat Analysis), and an accompanying series of maps, were produced using geographic analysis and a wide range of data to assess various wildfire threat elements, including vegetation types, historical wildfire data, forest fuel classification, fire behaviour patterns, geography and other factors.

The maps indicate potential wildfire threats throughout the province, using a scale of 10 Fire Threat Classes (with 1 being the lowest risk and 10 being the highest risk). These 10 levels represent estimates of relative fire threats, taking into account fire occurrence history, derived fire intensity under severe fire weather conditions and the impacts of fire "spotting" (where embers are blown ahead of the main fire and start new fires).

In the wildland-urban interface - the two-kilometre buffer areas surrounding communities - about 1,347,000 hectares are considered to be high-risk.

The Wildfire Threat Analysis presents these relative wildfire threats at a provincial scale only. In an area where a high risk is indicated, a qualified professional should confirm the actual rating at the forest stand level.

B.C. increases investments in forest stewardship

VANCOUVER – The new Forest Enhancement Society of B.C., supported by \$85 million in government funding, will focus its efforts on wildfire risk reduction to complement the ministry's existing forest stewardship programs and world-class wildfire suppression capabilities.

Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations Minister Steve Thomson provided details of the society in his keynote speech at the Association of BC Forest Professionals annual general meeting.

The new society will concentrate its activities on the following:

- Wildfire risk reduction: Fuel management activities such as thinning, pruning and removing woody debris from forests, especially those impacted by the mountain pine beetle infestation, to reduce wildfire risks in key areas. The recently updated Provincial Strategic Threat Analysis will provide guidance for potential treatments.
- Forest rehabilitation: Clearing stands damaged by wildfire, or at high risk from wildfire, and reforesting them.
- Wildlife habitat restoration: Designing fuel management and forest rehabilitation activities to promote desired wildlife habitat characteristics.
- FireSmart program: Raising awareness among local governments and rural property owners about steps they can take to protect their homes from wildfire.

The Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative, administered by the Union of BC Municipalities, focuses on reducing the wildfire risk in the two-kilometre wildland-urban interface surrounding communities. With its latest \$10-million commitment, government has provided \$78 million to this initiative since 2004. The Forest Enhancement Society of B.C. will complement the efforts of the Strategic Wildfire Prevention Initiative by supporting critical wildfire prevention work outside of interface areas and providing a landscape-level approach to wildfire risk reduction.

Local forest products businesses will have opportunities to purchase the timber, roadside debris and other forest fibre resulting from these activities, at market prices. This will, in turn, support rural employment.

The work of the Forest Enhancement Society of B.C. will help meet the goal of a sustainable and reliable timber supply under the Forest Sector Competitiveness Strategy and aligns with the ministry's other programs designed to enhance B.C.'s forests, most notably Forests for Tomorrow, Land Based Investment Strategy and integrated silviculture strategies.

The inaugural board meeting of the society will take place in March. The society's immediate goals will be to set short-term priorities and engage with stakeholders.

As part of Budget 2016, the ministry's Land Based Investment Strategy will see an increase of \$12 million for 2016-17. Most of the increase will go toward Forests for Tomorrow, translating into increased fertilization of 8,000 to 20,000 hectares and providing for additional surveys and site preparation to plant 28 million seedlings annually by 2019-20.

Provincial Strategic Threat Analysis

The 2015 Provincial Strategic Threat Analysis (Wildfire Threat Analysis), and an accompanying series of maps, were produced using geographic analysis and a wide range of data to assess various wildfire threat elements, including vegetation types, historical wildfire data, forest fuel classification, fire behaviour patterns, geography and other factors.

The maps indicate potential wildfire threats throughout the province, using a scale of 10 Fire Threat Classes (with 1 being the lowest risk and 10 being the highest risk). These 10 levels represent estimates of relative fire threats, taking into account fire occurrence history, derived fire intensity under severe fire weather conditions and the impacts of fire "spotting" (where embers are blown ahead of the main fire and start new fires).

In the wildland-urban interface – the two-kilometre buffer areas surrounding communities – about 1,347,000 hectares are considered to be high-risk.

The Wildfire Threat Analysis presents these relative wildfire threats at a provincial scale only. In an area where a high risk is indicated, a qualified professional should confirm the actual rating at the forest stand level.
