

(MTW & MNY mentioned); MLA Yap hopes the redevelopment of Richmond Hospital's North Tower can be completed during his next term in office; S.U.C.C.E.S.S. & CIJA held election forum. NDP's Chow, Liberal's Lee, and Green's Markwick debated issues of housing, seniors service and ethnic harmony; Seth Klein with the CCPA says current welfare rates have created a social assistance system that leaves recipients dependent on food banks and other charities to meet their basic needs.

Fairchild Radio/CHMB Radio: ICBC says it is working to expand its specialty plate program to include support for charities and not-for-profit organizations; Vancouver police have arrested one person and identified thousands more new individual who may have been victims of a massive PharmaNet privacy breach; Abbotsford police are investigating racist graffiti found at a school; FINTRAC has decided to cut the reference to "ethnic communities" in warning to real estate industry as the Canadian Real Estate Association expressed grave concerns that the reference could result in human rights violation;

South Asian Media:

RED FM: Harjinder Thind reports BC Green leader Weaver is shining in BC politics - Weaver is asking BC Liberals where their empty gas cylinder with 200,000 jobs has gone; In an interview with Thind, Harry Bains slams BC Liberals for delaying transit projects in the South of the Fraser, saying the 40% funding should have had been announced a long time ago - government is trying to make rich people happy but truckers, cabbies and construction people are crying. People dying in hospitals, forestry jobs gone and thousands of kids in portables (MPF &MMdJ mentioned); Jordan Bateman with the Canadian Federation of Taxpayers thinks MLA pensions are too high – MLA term limits, severance and pay is discussed; Truckers and taxi drivers have decided to defeat Christy Clark's BC Liberals in May 9 election - members of Unifor, United Truckers Association and Vancouver Taxi Association met yesterday to throw their support behind the NDP; Police in Abbotsford are investigating after racist graffiti was found at a school; IIO is looking into an in-custody death in Kelowna on Saturday; One person was killed and 10 others injured in a series of collisions that closed Coquihalla Highway Sunday.

Positive Coverage

Abbotsford Hospital – The province announced \$15M to expand the emergency room at Abbotsford Regional Hospital. MMdJ clipped. An unidentified nurses says it's a band-aid solution. Michael Marchbank says Fraser Helath will increase staffing levels to accommodate the extra space. (Global)

Primary Care – MoH is investing \$90m over next three years to support more team-based primary care that will be better integrated with specialized community services. MTL also launched the new IHA facility in the North Hills Mall for seniors. MTL clipped (CHNL, CFJC) / 'Province to add \$90 million for team-based health care' – (Van Sun)

McLeod – McLeod Lake Indian Band reached a government to government agreement with the province. The agreement creates a consultation process for natural resource development and wildlife management. MMM clipped (CKPG)

CNC – The College of New Caledonia is expanding in Quesnel with a \$4M investment from the provincial government. MCO clipped (CKPG)

Ongoing / Emerging / Potential Issues

Liberal Donors – 'Major Liberal donor administers \$46-million incentive program' – (Van Sun) The New Car Dealers Association of BC has overseen millions of dollars in provincial government electric car incentives since 2011. They are

the third-largest donor to the Liberals contributing \$1.3 million between 2005 and 2016. Among the top 50 donors, the group is the largest beneficiary of transfers from the BC government. There was no bidding process for the right to manage the electric car incentive and it was given through a direct award. **Dermod Travis, Integrity BC** says the transfer agreement with the car dealers group is an "immense" problem in party because a private enterprise is providing a government incentive program through a third level bureaucratic process. **MBB** says a financial review of the program will take place this year. "It is probably right that it is not normal to do this with a for-profit organization...that makes it doubly, triply important for it to pass the smell test."

Foreign Donors – 'BC Liberals have been given a lot of foreign cash' – (Prov) Editorial – Dermod Travis, Integrity writes political fundraising has given rise to a murky practice of raising campaign cash from 'some dark corners of the world'; cites G&E Studio (mentions MTW), Petronas, Kinder Morgan, Edison Power, Princess Cruises and Holland America Line donations. Travis questions 'when a party has a few scruples about who it will take money from and where they will raise it, you're left to wonder what's on the table when the cheques are handed over?'

Advertising – 'Ad policy change due after election' – (TC) MAW says changes are needed to toughen government advertising guidelines, but that won't happen before voters head to the polls.

Health Firings - Long awaited report in health firing scandal is expected sometime this week.

- Baldrey: "The buzz is, that it's a very lengthy report and therefore you may want to arrange for a way for people
 to absorb all the information in it rather than just putting out a news release." Baldrey says he's be surprised if it
 became a dominant issue in provincial election because there are so many other issues 'crowding the
 plate'. (CKNW)
- Rob Shaw: "I would expect [Graham Whitmarsh] will be the central figure in this report."; "The DM in charge of
 communications at the time was Athana Mentzelopoulos, who is now the DM of Finance... issue of how did the
 government press release get RCMP put into it, that's a question that may end up coming back." (CKNW)

GCPE Photographers – 'Premier Clark has spent nearly \$1M on photography' – (Prov Online) BC government spent \$923K for salaries and travel expenses for two full-time photographers to take photos and videos for government. That includes \$5,413 to send photographer to Paris for the UN climate change conference. 'Government says all the spending is out in the open and reported in public budget documents, and government is also promising to more fully disclose the expenses of PCC and cabinet ministers'; Smyth suggests PCC should drastically cut her photography budget while she's at it.

Other Issues

Resource Development / Forestry / Agriculture:

Shawnigan – 'Hard line puts soil dump in dire straights' – (TC) Cobble Hill Holdings wrote MMP last month after government revoked its operating permit. "The resulting impact is yet to fully crystallize, but we expect it will be catastrophic on our company, employees and ourselves."; The company has until April 17 to either take action to ensure the long-term safety and stability of the soil in the landfill or must develop and implement a plan to remove the soil from the site.

Site C – Harry Swain, former chair of federal-provincial review panel looking at the economic benefits of the Site C dam says the project should be scrapped. Swain says the \$9B project could bankrupt BC Hydro and taxpayers will become responsible for the debt. (CBYG)

Wilfire Season – BC Wildfire Service says the fire risk is rising and will continue to climb as the weather warms. "There are firefighters that have come in for the season and there will be more firefighters joining in May. Right now, we do have a lot of initial attack crews and unit crews are on the ground ready to go in case there's a fire." (CHNL) / 'BC wildfire season underway with 2 small blazes' – (TC) – Small fires sparked in the Stein Valley, west of Fraser River and another one south of Prince George. Both were knocked down quickly.

Petronas – 'Petronas considers Shell site for BC project' – (Van Sun) Petronas may be looking at building a US\$27 billion LNG export terminal at site of Shell's abandoned Ridley Island site. Petronas is carrying out a "total review" before deciding. If built, the terminal would be the largest private investment in BC history.

Log exports – "BC forest policies need to add up' – (Black Press) Tom Fletcher writes we'll be hearing a lot of talk about "raw logs" in the weeks leading up to election. BC Stats produced its annual export trade figures showing steep increase in log exports to China. Lumber exports to China climbed helping to keep BC sawmills running after the collapse of the US housing market. BC Liberals say much of the increase in log exports is from remote locations with no mill option available. 'Economist will tell you that more jobs have been lost from new technology, in the bush and in the mill, than from log exports.'

Federal Marine Disposal Site – 'The great dump of Point Grey' – (Van Sun) – Vast amounts of dredged and excavated material are dumped each year six kilometres west of Wreck Beach. A 2015 sediment survey showed concentrations of arsenic, copper, nickel, barium, cobalt, manganese, and vanadium exceeded allowable levels, although they couldn't be ascribed to disposal activities. Environment Canada said it permitted at least 204.923 cubic meters of material to be dumped at the site last year.

Education / Health / Social Services:

PharmaNet Breach – 'Man arrested in relation to PharmaNet privacy breach' – (Van Sun) / 'Arrest made in PharmaNet breach' – (TC) Vancouver police arrested a man they believe gained unauthorized access to the information system and used patients' personal data for fraudulent purposes. Health Ministry characterized the breach as a product of 'cybercrime' that targeted doctors and medical clinic officers and PharmaNet service vendors. MoH: "This inappropriate access to PharmaNet is not because of a direct hack into the system. It is suspected that access was obtained through impersonation of physicians and other methods." Government is providing free credit monitoring to affected individuals.

Walk-In Clinics – Walk-In Clinics of BC Association will officially launch a petition at its summit meeting in Burnaby Friday. The petition calls for government to train, recruit and re-train more family doctors. The Association wants BC government to remove the cap of 50 patients a day. (CHNL)

Ambulance Wait Times – A 86-year old woman broke her femur in a fall but it took hours for paramedics to arrive and she died the next day due to complications. The family has learned there were other ambulances closer, sitting outside Ridge Meadows hospital waiting for patients to be admitted. NDP candidate Maple-Ridge Pitt Meadows clipped. BC government has recently pledged to add 60 more paramedics and 20 ambulance dispatch staff. (Global)

Seniors Care — 'Private seniors' care facilities, opponents draw battle lines' — (G&M) Opponents of a proposed residential care facility run by a for-profit operator on the Sunshine Coast are gearing up for a public meeting on April 30, saying they aren't convinced the project is the best way to provide more seniors' care in their region. Protect Public Health Care Coalition: "This proposal will do nothing to rectify the chronic shortage of long-term care beds on the Sunshine coast. We have concerns also about the quality of care in for-profit facilities compared with public facilities." VCH says Silverstone would provide "a great improvement in quality of life over the aging Totem an Shornecliffe sites" which are around 30 year old and feature shared bedrooms with little privacy and make infection control more difficult; says private contractor will have to meet same standards. HEU has concerns over potential job losses and there are about 200 members who work at the Totem and Shorncliffe sites.

ER – 'Moved out of ER due to lack of space' – Bill Tieleman writes how he was suffering from pericarditis and was asked to leave Vancouver General Hospital's emergency room because they were out of space. HEU says ER crisis is largely due to lack of provincial funding. Jennifer Whiteside: "Our per capita spending on health care in BC used to be number two and now we're number eight. One of the results is overburdened emergency rooms." VCH 'agrees that moving patients in hospital gowns into the lobby is wrong.' "Certainly it's never appropriate for anyone to be put in a position of lacking dignity."

MSP Coverage (specific case) – CTV's McLaughlin on Your Side - Vancouver man had a heart attack in UK and received a bill for about \$12,000, but was only refunded \$225. MSP brochure states 'MSP will help pay for unexpected insured services you receive while outside Canada.' NDP Darcy: "It says very, very clearly in the MSP rules that they will be covered for unexpected medical costs. Government should work with them to help solve this problem rather than throwing up barriers." MoH: "To process a claim, an itemized breakdown of services provided is required. If the individual is able to provide a more detailed list of expenses and services provided by phsyicains, we can look at this request again."

Rent Bank – New Westminster is creating a rent bank where people struggling to make rent can apply for a small loan. NDP Darcy: "What they really need and what we need across the province, not just in New Westminster, is a provincial government that's going to step up to the plate with an affordable housing strategy that spans the wide array of needs out there for affordable housing." (CBC TV)

Assisted Death/MAID – 'BC ahead of the curve on assisted death' – (Van Sun) / 'BC system of access to assisted dying praised' – (Prov) While other provinces try to piece together programs co-ordinating care for patients who want medical health ending their lives, BC's health authorities have quietly created a system that's winning praise from advocates. Each HA has a MAID patient care coordinator whose job it is to provide information about the process and connect people with doctors. Dying with Dignity, Sue Hughson: "While there are still areas, particularly within Providence, that I'd like to see improved, I have to say that we've had some very successful interactions on behalf of our patients."

Shelters Close – 'Camps sprout as shelter beds close' – (TC) Advocates say small homeless camps will pop up more often in region as shelters reduce beds and hours until next fall. Grant McKenzie, Our Place Society says may people sleeping in parks are young. "There are not many places for youth, especially ones that are low-barrier [accept those who use drugs and alcohol]". McKenzie hopes when My Place, a transitional shelter on Yates Street closes in May, it might be used as a day shelter for the city's homeless.

Aboriginal Children – 'Funding hurts indigenous kids' – (TC) Editorial – 'funding for aboriginal children doesn't match the need and doesn't provide the resources to do the job.'; 'the goal of effective child protection should be to make sure children don't have to go into care unless it's unavoidable...but funding works against that goal.'

Galloway – 'UBC subject to critical missive for handling of Galloway case' – (G&M) Author Brian Brett is calling on UBC to apologize for the suffering it caused over the Steven Galloway case (fired as chair of creative writing program), saying UBC should consider staging a "truth and reconciliation commission" to allow students, staff and professors to publicly express concerns about the handling of the situation. Brett writes: "The University's incompetent governance made everyone into victims of one kind or another and it still refuses to admit that."

Justice / Public Safety:

MMIW Inquiry – National inquiry into missing and murdered women is set to start work next week in Whitehorse, with meetings in Prince George scheduled for May. BC's Coalition on Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls is concerned only 100 family members /survivors have been identified and it says the inquiry should be more proactive in reaching out to families who have lost loved ones. (CBYG, CKNW, Global) / 'Missing, murdered women's inquiry not reaching out to families' – (TC) / 'Advocates find inquiry's reach inadequate' – (G&M)

Distracted Driving – Surrey RCMP's latest enforcement blitz is showing distracted driving is still a big problem. Last month it issued 350 violation tickets – up slightly from 324 last year. (CKNW)

Gangs – 'Crime Stoppers campaign urges gangsters to snitch on rivals' – (Van Sun) / 'Rat out other gang: Crime Stoppers' – (Prov) Metro Van Crime Stoppers has launched campaign encouraging calls from anyone, even rival gangs. Tipsters may be eligible for up to \$2000.

Dial-a-Dope – '5-year term for serious dealer' – Greater Victoria man [Zachary Matheson] who was the mastermind behind a sophisticated dial-a-dope enterprise has been sentenced to five years in prison (TC)

Graffiti – 'Cops probe swastikas' – (Prov) – Abbotsford police are investigating after racist and misogynist graffiti was sprayed outside the School of Integrated Arts.

Jobs / Economy / Skills Training / Labour:

High Earner Taxes – 'Expect NDP to increase taxes for top earners' – (Van Sun) Vaughn Palmer writes the NDP will surely propose to pay for some of their election promises by restoring a \$250 million-a year-tax on higher incomes that the Liberals phased out two years ago. NDP James: "It would surprise no one that we're going to take a look at taking that tax break back. That's a billion dollars over four years. That will pay for a lot of programs and services." Vaughn mentions if tax is restored it won't cover all the big ticket items announced in election platform, such as \$10/day child care, MSP elimination. 'If past NDP practice is any guide, that would translate into balancing the operating budget over a multi-year economic cycle, not annually.'

Tech Sector — 'Vancouver tech sector lags rivals: report' — (G&M) New reports finds Vancouver's tech sector has two major strikes against it when it comes to competing with Seattle and San Francisco for in-demand workers: sky-high property prices combined with relatively low wages (\$72K/year average vs \$142K in Seattle and \$145K in San Francisco). The report points out Vancouver does have the cheapest average rent and most affordable public transportation and groceries of the three cities. Local tech firms and PCC have been lobbying Ottawa to streamline the immigration process so BC firms can more readily recruit top foreign talent.

Fintrac – 'Fintrac removed reference to specific ethnic communities from draft document' – (Van Sun) Canada's money-laundering watchdog drafted a document warning the real estate sector to be on guard for "specific ethnic communities" dealing with terrorism and warm, before removing the reference at the behest of the Canadian Real Estate Association. CREA: "Our lawyers would have rightly pointed out or reminded Fintrac that no Canadian can discriminate against another or any access to a service based on where they're from"

Transportation:

Highway Lines – 'BC drawing the lines on safety' – (Van Sun) MTS says crews will soon begin blanketing the provincial highway system with new, thicker, more reflective paints that the ministry has developed after more than a year of testing. Ministry normally repaints almost 30,000 km of roads a year at a cost of almost \$11 million. The new paints are 30 per cent more expensive, meaning BC will have to bump up its line painting budget by \$1 million.

Coquihalla – The Ministry of Transportation describes Sunday's road conditions as being bare to treacherous in a matter of minutes and says crews were all out salting and sanding. MTS clipped. (Global) / 'Sudden snow squall causes Coquihalla crashes' – (TC)

Cables Bridges – 'Winter on the cable-stayed bridges' – (Prov) – Port Mann and Alex Fraser were in the headlines numerous times this winter because of troubles caused by the prolonged and unusual cold and snowy weather. Bridges were fully closed for approximately 22 hours. 8,640 collars used to clear ice. \$6M spent to maintain bridges this winter. 248 claims to ICBC.

Transit Service – 'Ridership up in Tri-Cities' – (Prov) / 'Transit ridership up in Tri-Cities, on SeaBus' – (24 Hrs) - More Tri-Cities residents than ever are using transit since the Evergreen SkyTrain extension opened last year, according to preliminary figures from TransLink (combined rail and bus ridership in Metro Van's northeast sector is up 20 per cent). Evergreen sees about 30,000 boardings on an average weekday. WestCoast Express ridership is slightly down.

Government / Politics

Greens – 'Could Weaver throw BC election for a loop?' - (Prov) Mike Smyth writes the Liberals are suddenly attacking Weaver, slamming the leader in a pair of news releases last week. Smyth suggests perhaps Greens are getting to popular for the Liberal's liking and cites Mainstreet Research poll.

Vancouver Island Polling – NDP Horgan isn't putting too much stock into poll conducted by Mainstreet/Postmedia which found Greens gaining ground. Horgan: "On VI, we took six of seven federal seats not that long ago. The last provincial election, we took 11 of 14. I'm fairly confident with NDP support on VI. But again, you just can't take these things for granted." (CFAX)

(CKNW/Global) / 'NDP throws Clark under the bus' — (G&M) BC's spring election campaign has taken on a dark tone before it event begins, as the opposition New Democrats rolled out their campaign bus a week early, with fresh attacks against the Premier; NDP Horgan: "The wealthy have had their premier. It's time we had a premier that was working for you." "I am out spending money that was raised by the NDP to talk to people about the issues that matter to them"; On Sunday, NDP launched three new TV ads attacking Liberal record on housing, and increasing costs of services and nothing the RCMP has launched an investigation into political contributions. The ads feature the tagline: 'Christy Clark. Not Working For You.'

Election – Digital Data/Advertising — 'With election near, will big data shove your vote into another party's hands?' — (Van Sun) Nudging or digital paternalism is advertising tailored and targeted and delivered based on individual personality profiles, which are compiled using massive amounts of data that are scooped from anywhere — including social media likes and clicks; 'Politicians, their advisers and even the companies who did this work won't speak openly about it but they acknowledge it has been commonly used...some even acknowledge it is very intrusive and likely oversteps the privacy rules and regulations.'; Daphne Bramhan writes 'it's not surprising the BC government's advertising budget more than doubled on the eve of the campaign or that the Liberals have been loathe to put limits on party fundraising, third-party advertising or spending outside the campaign period'; 'Be aware if you spend time online at all, you may be a target during this election period and ask candidates what they plan to do postelection about election financing and ask what they are willing to do to protect citizens from being manipulated by the use of big data' Party Donors — 'Liberal donor called for ouster of vehicle sales authority head' — (Van Sun) The New Car Dealers Association, a top donor to the BC Liberal Party, asked the BC government in 2010 — in a letter to then SG Mike de Jong - to remove the chief executive of the agency that regulates vehicle sales disputes with buyers (Ken Smith). MSC Statement: "We have been making changes to address workloads by adding staff, changing how we do our work, and taking some of the administrative duties out of the hands of front-line workers so they can focus on direct services to clients." (Global)



Premier Clark's statement on centennial of Vimy Ridge

VICTORIA - Premier Christy Clark released the following statement in honour of the centennial of Vimy Ridge:

"In the early morning hours of April 9, 1917, after meticulous planning, Canadian soldiers stormed Vimy Ridge. For the first time, all four divisions of the Canadian Expeditionary Force fought together, under the command of a Canadian.

"The objective was to capture strategically important high ground, and they succeeded more than they knew. The battle came to define Canada's newly independent place on the world stage.

"That proud moment came at a terrible cost. More than 10,000 soldiers were killed and wounded in conditions we can scarcely imagine today. British Columbia, which had the highest per-capita enlistment in the young nation, eventually lost more than 6,200 throughout the war - every single one a beloved father, son, brother, or friend.

"To help honour their legacy, the Province is contributing \$350,000 to the Vimy Foundation to support the creation of a Centennial Park at the site of the battle, including the planting of 100 Vimy Oak trees. These trees are direct descendants of acorns collected following the battle, and they will be planted in a circular pattern four deep to represent the four divisions.

"As we honour such great bravery and sacrifice, we should honour the brave men and women of the Canadian Forces, who risk their lives to carry on this proud tradition of service - and keep us all safe.

"We will never forget."

B.C. doubles investment in Rocky Mountain Trench

CRANBROOK - The Province has awarded \$110,000 to the Rocky Mountain Trench Natural Resource Society to help restore grasslands and forests in the East Kootenay and Columbia Valley, Bill Bennett, MLA for Kootenay East, announced today on behalf of Minister of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations Steve Thomson.

The funding more than doubles last year's \$52,000 grant and will go toward the restoration of low-elevation grasslands and open forest ecosystems on Crown land from Radium Hot Springs to the U.S. border.

Ecosystem restoration in the province's dry forests involves logging, thinning and slashing excess trees from grassland and previously open forest sites. Once the tree density is reduced, the area can then be carefully burned to replicate natural wildfire and creates the environmental conditions that encourage the growth of native grasses and shrubs.

The Rocky Mountain Trench Natural Resource Society is working with government, forestry companies, First Nations, ranchers, and guide outfitters to restore and maintain 118,500 hectares of rangeland and open forest in the southern Rocky Mountain Trench.

This year, B.C. is investing a total of \$270,000 to ecosystem restoration programs in the Kootenays, Cariboo and Northern B.C.

B.C. invests \$7.7 million to advance wood use and grow global markets

VANCOUVER - The Government of British Columbia is investing \$7.7 million to promote the use of B.C. wood, advance wood building systems and products, and expand global markets, Premier Christy Clark announced at the Council of Forest Industries annual convention today.

Premier Christy Clark made the announcement in her keynote speech, which spoke to government's actions on the softwood lumber file. Diversifying markets and reducing reliance on the United States market continues to be a key part of government's strategy to keep B.C.'s forest sector strong.

"Forestry will always play a crucial role in communities throughout B.C.," said Premier Clark. "By growing international demand, we are decreasing our reliance on a single market, creating more opportunity, and supporting the tens of thousands of British Columbians who rely on forestry."

The annual funding is being made available to 14 different industry trade associations and research institutes that deliver market development programs on behalf of government and industry. B.C.'s contribution is being managed through Forestry Innovation Investment, the Province's market development agency for forest products.

"Over 90% of B.C.'s forest products are exported, making international trade vital to the success of the forest economy," said Minister of International Trade Teresa Wat. "Market development and diversification not only safeguard against global uncertainties, but also create new, higher-value opportunities for B.C. producers."

Of the \$7.7 million, \$5.9 million will be made available for activities targeted at expanding markets for B.C.'s wood products, with investment priorities that reflect evolving market opportunities in Asia and North America. The remaining \$1.8 million will be made available for activities delivered through the Wood First program, which fosters the innovative use of wood and wood building systems in B.C. through research, education, marketing and capacity building.

Advancing wood use and growing international markets is a collaborative effort. The Province will cost-share these activities, with additional funding being provided by industry and the federal government through Natural Resources Canada.

"B.C. is internationally recognized as a leader in sustainable forest management," said Minister of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations Steve Thomson. "As the benefits of building with wood become more widely recognized - including its lower carbon footprint, its cost-effectiveness and its versatility - our reputation will continue to position us as a preferred supplier of environmentally friendly forest products."

Building international markets for B.C.'s natural resources is a component of the BC Jobs Plan. The B.C. forest sector employs more than 60,000 British Columbians and supports over 7,000 businesses.

"A strong forest sector requires the co-operation of industry and government," said Susan Yurkovich, president and CEO, Council of Forest Industries. "Given the current challenges we face, the importance of working together to diversify offshore markets for B.C. forest products has never been greater."

Long-term water management plan approved for Mount Polley

WILLIAMS LAKE - The long-term water management plan for the Mount Polley mine site has been approved by an independent statutory-decision maker from the Ministry of Environment.

The long-term water management plan is expected to be fully in place by fall 2017 and will replace the short-term water management plan that has been in place since Nov. 30, 2015.

Mount Polley Mining Corporation submitted its formal permit amendment application which included the long-term water management plan, and supporting Technical Assessment Report in October 2016. The documents were subject to extensive public consultation, including First Nations and local communities. The application also underwent a full technical review from the Cariboo Mine Development Review Committee (CMDRC) which includes representatives from provincial and federal agencies, First Nations, local governments (City of Williams Lake and Cariboo Regional District), and the community of Likely.

PORT COQUITLAM - The Province is providing \$1.746 million for palliative and hospice care in British Columbia to support patients and caregivers.

"The end-of-life journey touches each of us at some point," said Port Moody-Coquitlam MLA Linda Reimer, on behalf of Health Minister Terry Lake. "The Province understands that patients and loved ones need to be supported during an emotional time and today's announcement will help strengthen hospice and palliative services in communities around British Columbia."

Funding will support hospice and palliative locations in British Columbia and be used for patient care quality and caregiver support; patient and health-care worker safety; education, tools and resources; improved continuity of patient care and, equipment to support delivery of patient care. Examples include renovating patient treatment spaces and purchasing new equipment, such as a transport van.

"BC Hospice Palliative Care Association is very grateful to the Province and the Ministry of Health for this latest investment in hospice palliative care," said Lorraine Gerard, BC Hospice Palliative Care Association executive director. "Some of BCHPCA's organizational members - not-for-profit societies that operate residential hospices - have received funding directly and other member hospice societies are affiliated with the publicly operated palliative-care programs that are receiving funding. With an aging population, quality, responsive hospice palliative care will need to be supported and available in all settings, not only hospital palliative-care units and residential hospices but in long term care facilities and where most people would say they would prefer to die - at home."

This investment builds on an announcement in January 2017 of \$7.125 million from the Province to create new hospice beds in communities around British Columbia and make improvements to current spaces as well as supporting best practices in the palliative approach to care as well as advance care planning, working through the BC Centre for Palliative Care.

In addition, the Province provided \$4 million in February 2017 to Canuck Place Children's Hospice for pediatric, palliative medical care and to support children and families in British Columbia.

VICTORIA - Twenty-three of British Columbia's top business leaders have come together to achieve one common goal - to support and encourage meaningful employment opportunities for people with disabilities throughout the province.

With close to one million job openings expected in B.C. over the next decade, people with disabilities - 334,000 British Columbians, aged 15 to 64 - represent an important employee talent pool.

The Presidents Group, a change-driven network of business leaders, was appointed in 2013 to help increase employment opportunities for people with disabilities and create a more accessible consumer marketplace. To further support the goals of the group, 11 new members came on board today, bringing the total number of members to 23 highly-regarded B.C. business leaders.

Members work with the business community to encourage employers in a number of different sectors to hire more people with disabilities and commit to sharing their collective learnings on the recruitment, hiring and retention of employees with disabilities with other employers.

To support the work of the Presidents Group and help identify potential solutions to help employers to hire and retain qualified employees with disabilities, two Accessibility and Inclusion Consultants have been hired, funded through the Vancouver Foundation.

The consultants - Marco Pasqua and Mahin Rashid - will work with the business and disability communities to research, pilot and develop a toolkit of resources, approaches and processes that support increased success rates in the recruitment, hiring and employment of people with disabilities in B.C. The work of the consultants will help employers to better identify and eliminate barriers and make positive changes to make their workplace more accessible and inclusive.

The Presidents Group is part of the Accessibility 2024 Leadership Team, working with government and the disability community to deliver on Accessibility 2024, B.C.'s 10-year action plan to become the most progressive province for people with disabilities in Canada.

- * The unemployment rate for people with disabilities is 4.5 percentage points higher than for people without disabilities 11.6% vs. 7.1% despite the fact that people with disabilities are highly educated, with skills that are comparable to people without a disability.
- * It is well documented that workers with disabilities perform just as well or better than their co-workers in punctuality, attendance, work quality, task consistency and overall proficiency.
- * The Accessibility 2024 action plan, released in June 2014, is in response to the thousands of British Columbians who took part in a public consultation on what society can do to reduce barriers and increase accessibility for people with disabilities.

There are 84 WorkBC Service Centres throughout the province delivering the Employment Program of BC, including a range of supports and services to help people with disabilities find employment. B.C., Tsartlip First Nation sign interim reconciliation agreement

VICTORIA - The Province of British Columbia and the Tsartlip First Nation have reached an interim reconciliation agreement, setting the stage for comprehensive reconciliation negotiations over the next two years.

Key elements include:

Consultation processes

The Province will provide \$100,000 to Tsartlip over two years, to enhance Tsartlip permitting referral capacity and processes.

Tsartlip First Nation history and culture

The Province will provide \$20,000 to Tsartlip to consult Elders, explore potential joint applications to change and/or add official place names through BC Geographical Names Office and develop a community cultural recognition strategy.

Heritage Protection

The Province will provide the First Nation with \$25,000 to support negotiations concerning heritage protection, and help the Nation complete an inventory of heritage sites and objects of spiritual, ceremonial or cultural value.

Park Management Plans

The Province and the Tsartlip will discuss Tsartlip interests, culture and history related to the park management plans for Gowlland Tod Provincial Park and Goldstream Provincial Park.

Environmental co-operation and wildlife

The Province, Tsartlip and other interested parties, will review standard foreshore leases and permit conditions within Saanich Inlet with the goal of promoting best boat-waste management practices.

Representatives of the federal government and other interested parties will also be invited to discuss strategies to address derelict boats and protect the waters of Saanich Inlet.

B.C. and Tsartlip also will seek to develop a communication protocol between the Conservation Officer Service and the Nation.

Tsartlip Economic Interests

The B.C. government and the Tsartlip First Nation have agreed to discuss the Nation's interests in acquiring lands, acquiring water lot leases in the Saanich Inlet, and acquiring a park-use permit for a portion of Gowlland Tod Provincial Park.

Province, Musqueam agree to collaborate on stewardship

VANCOUVER - The signing of a new collaborative management agreement between the Province and Musqueam Indian Band has strengthened their government-to-government relationship and will result in more effective decision-making on land and water authorizations and stewardship in the estuary and lower reaches of the Fraser River.

The agreement includes a framework that will guide land and water authorizations through improved engagement between Musqueam Indian Band and the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations, including a component addressing resource stewardship measures. These measures are a key focus of the agreement and will be defined through joint work planning and reporting.

Possible stewardship initiatives may include:

- * Updating best management practices;
- * Commissioning research;
- * Developing and communicating stewardship recommendations:
- * Monitoring in support of compliance and enforcement; and
- Rehabilitation measures, where the need is jointly identified.

A stewardship forum is also anticipated to be established to support input and participation with stakeholders and co-ordinate stewardship initiatives with other First Nations.

On Jan. 1, 2015, administration of head leases held by the Port of Vancouver on management of the foreshore of the lower reaches of the Fraser River reverted to the Province. As an interim measure, the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations issued two-year tenures to approximately 290 existing tenure holders while completing First Nation consultation. These are known as the Fraser River transition area tenures.

The collaborative management agreement builds on consultation done to date on the Fraser River transition area tenures. It has paved the way for enhanced consultation within Musqueam's traditional territory, will increase certainty by allowing for the issuing of longer-term tenures for tenure holders - where appropriate, and advances the Province's reconciliation efforts with Musqueam Indian Band.

Mapping their contribution - Province proclaims Sikh Heritage Month and recognizes South Asian historic places

SURREY - As part of the celebrations and proclamation today of April as Sikh Heritage Month, Premier Christy Clark announced today that 15 South Asian historic places are being added to British Columbia's Register of Historic Places.

The recognition celebrates B.C.'s diversity and multiculturalism and the significance of British Columbians of South Asian descent and their contribution to the province.

"We celebrate our diversity in British Columbia, because we know it's our greatest strength. Now more than ever - we need to continue being an example for the world," said Premier Clark. "There are communities in every corner of our province that British Columbians of South Asian descent have left their mark on, enriching us all."

"I am pleased that we have been able to identify Historic Places that show the important contribution of South Asian Canadians to the development of B.C.," mentioned Steve Thomson, Minister of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations.

In 2016, a public nomination process began and included an evaluation by sector and community experts. As a result, a total of 24 eligible places were nominated by British Columbians and 15 of those are now being provincially recognized for their high significance to South Asian Canadian history in British Columbia. Heritage BC was engaged to administer the nomination process and create an interactive map that features all 24 eligible nominated sites with expanded documentation for the 15 historic places, available online: https://secure.heritagebc.ca/maps/

The list paints a rich picture of the contributions that South Asian Canadians have made to the development and prosperity of B.C. since the mid-19th century.

"This project gives all British Columbians an opportunity to see B.C. places from the South Asian Canadian perspective, helping preserve, explore and share our province's multicultural heritage," said Royal BC

Museum chief operating officer and deputy CEO Angela Williams. "The Royal BC Museum looks forward to sharing stories about these places and their historical significance."

Some of the recognized sites include:

- * Punjabi Market, Vancouver a collection of small businesses and stores, which historically have catered to the Punjabi community, this historic location illustrates the evolution and development of South Asian businesses following their initial involvement with the B.C.'s lumber industry. The Punjabi Market was thriving in the 1970s when a large influx of Punjabi people settled in South Vancouver and became inextricably woven into the city's cultural fabric. It is also one of the gathering spots during Vaisakhi.
- * Golden Sikh Temple, Golden One of the earliest Sikh temples in B.C., though no longer standing, the gurdwara's significance is recognized in its original location. The temple was far outside the Lower Mainland, and demonstrates early Sikhs had settled into B.C.'s southeast region. The gurdwara was a place where people practised their faith, socialized with others of the same faith and received the emotional support they needed to work and live so far from their homeland.
- * Topaz Street Sikh Gurdwara, Victoria Originally established in 1912 followed by the construction of a new building in 1969, this historic place was built by pioneers of the community, who faced many hardships in their journeys to British Columbia. It served free meals and was a place for new immigrants to connect with the community.
- "South Asian century old history in B.C. is replete with province wide personal travels, subsequent settlements and socio-cultural investments in community spaces," noted Advisory Committee member, and Director, Centre for Indo Canadian Studies at the University of the Fraser Valley, Satwinder Bains. "A recognition of our unique and rich history is a significant milestone in British Columbia's historical trajectory of purposeful inclusion and acceptance of the impacts by diverse communities on our province."
- "All individuals need to feel included and a part of society. To date South Asian history in British Columbia has not been systematically documented from our South Asian perspective," added South Asian Canadian Historic Places Project Evaluation Team member, Dr. Balbir Gurm. "The South Asian Historic Places Project helps us recognize the physical spaces that are historically significant to our community. This is a step in recognizing the many diverse groups and more specifically those of South Asian heritage who are a part of British Columbia's history. I am thrilled to be a part of this important work."

This is a milestone in the Provincial Recognition Program's South Asian Historic Places Project. It marks the completion of a project designed to identify historic places and culturally important locations to help South Asian Canadians, and all British Columbians, honour this cultural history in perpetuity.

Quick Facts:

- * The B.C. Register of Historic Places lists more than 3,400 historic places that have been formally recognized or protected by the province or a local government.
- * One-quarter of people in B.C. are self-identified visible minorities, and 7.2% identify as South Asian Canadians.

* B.C. is the most ethnically diverse province in Canada and welcomes nearly 40,000 new immigrants as permanent residents every year.

BACKGROUNDER

Historic recognition process

Heritage BC, a not-for-profit, charitable organization, was contracted to administer the public nomination process for South Asian historic places. Its mandate is to support heritage conservation through advocacy, training and skills development, capacity-building in heritage planning and funding through the Heritage Legacy Fund.

Overall, 35 submissions representing 26 places to be considered for recognition, of which 15 have been recognized.

An evaluation team made up of community members, historians and others with subject matter expertise recommended 15 of the nominations for recognition under section 18 of the Heritage Conservation Act. This form of recognition is purely commemorative, acknowledging the values associated with the historic places nominated by members of the public.

"I was very pleased to receive the news today that the Passenger Transportation Board has approved the request by five Vancouver taxi companies to add 175 new vehicles, including 26 wheelchair accessible taxis, to Vancouver's taxi fleet.

"These new vehicles will go a long way to meet some of the current demand for passenger-directed vehicles and will help reduce the 45-minute wait times customers experience now. With the busy tourist season approaching, this decision will mean that more customers will be better able to access the many amenities and sights Vancouver and surrounding area has to offer.

Mount Polley long-term water management plan approved

WILLIAMS LAKE - The approval of the long-term water management plan for Mount Polley means the mine can continue to operate providing 350 well-paying jobs in the region, Minister of Energy and Mines Bill Bennett announced today.

"With the approval of its long-term water management plan, the Mount Polley Mine has met its requirements to government and it can continue operations," Bennett said. "I know this is welcome news for the communities of Likely, Williams Lake, 100 Mile House and the families that depend on the jobs the mine provides."

The long-term water management plan for the Mount Polley mine site was approved today by an independent statutory-decision maker from the Ministry of Environment. It is expected to be fully in place by fall 2017 and will replace the short-term water management plan that has been in place since Nov. 30, 2015.

"Continued operations at Mount Polley Mine means well-paying jobs for the hundreds of individuals employed at the mine and numerous indirect jobs and economic benefits for communities in the Cariboo," said Minister of State for Rural Economic Development and MLA for Cariboo-Chilcotin Donna Barnett. "This mine generates an enormous amount of economic activity that benefits numerous other businesses in our communities - everything from coffee shops, pubs and restaurants to car dealerships, home builders and plumbers."

Prior to approval, the company's permit application underwent extensive public consultation, including First Nations and local communities, as well as a full technical review from the Cariboo Mine Development Review Committee.

"The permit is good news for the employees of Mount Polley," said Paul French, president, USW Local 1-425. "I'm glad that the requirements for the permit were met. I want to thank Minister Barnett for pushing both management of Mount Polley and the government ministries to get the job done correctly."


