#### Dear Premier Horgan:

CC. NDP Cabinet Members, Green Party, Distribution Lists

Your explanation for continuing Site C was quite inadequate. How can terminating a project that has cost 2.1 billion plus remediation at 1.8 billion be more costly than completing it for a total of 10.7 billion? The 2.1 billion has already been spent. Your ability to carry out social programs should be aided by not needing to spend another 8 billion (or more) to complete another mega dam that is not needed.

You argue that cancelling construction would immediately add to the provincial debt. Jan Slomp (2017) of the National Farmer's Union writes: "BC Hydro is a provincially owned Crown Corporation, with net earnings that contribute to the annual provincial budget. If the Horgan government wanted to shut down Site C, BC Hydro's net earnings, debt and equity would allow for an internal schedule to recover the costs already incurred on Site C. These payments would affect BC's budget very marginally and it would definitely save BC residents in the long term, whether in taxes or hydro rates. From a strict financial perspective, cancelling a project with a \$2.1 billion sunk cost would be more prudent than locking BC residents into an open-ended juggernaut, with a budget exceeding \$10 billion and more unforeseen construction costs down the road."

Continuing the project, even though it is not fully justified, requires a certain degree of stubbornness and inability to recognize when to change happens. It's a phenomenon in which people stick with something because they've already invested so much time, money or energy, even if it's not the best decision. "Just because you've lost money on something or spent some money on something doesn't mean you should keep doing it." The financial term for this is the 'sunk cost fallacy' (Azpiri 2017).

The estimated debt of 1.8 billion for remediation is an estimate in the mid-range of a wide range of guesses. There is no existing remediation plan, so the reasonable thing to do would be to form a land planning group consisting of Peace Valley residents, First Nations, and government. There would be basic remediation such as bank stabilization, trees, shrubs and ground cover. A certain amount of fill in would be accomplished by natural regeneration. The cost would certainly be less than 1.8 billion, perhaps between 0.3 to 0.5 billion. This could be covered by the same internal schedule as the sunk costs.

Unfortunately, you ignored all the good economic advice you got, and you followed Christy Clark's decision, based primarily on BC Hydro recommendations with no second expert review by BCUC. You ignored the recent BCUC review and Deloitte's review, and expert opinions by Harry Swain, Marc Eliesen, Robert McCullouch, and others, and you gave greatest weight to economic elites, business and labor organizations, entrenched civil servants, and a Crown Corporation whose main objective is maintenance of its authority and control of BC electricity.

You did not take account of other economic factors, environmental impacts and social impacts by the dam: loss of thousands of hectares of highly productive agricultural land and economic potential for increased agriculture and food supply; loss of land and livelihoods of landowners and farmers; loss of ecosystem services from the Peace River watershed, vegetation and wildlife diversity; lost Carbon Capture and Sequestration by destroyed vegetation; migrations of mammals and birds with international implications, and fish movements in the river; impacts on the downstream water supply for wetlands in Wood Buffalo Park in Alberta, a UNESCO World Heritage Site (Nikiforuk 2017); and critically, infringement on the Treaty 8 rights of the First Nations on the Peace River--hunting, fishing, trapping, protection of grave and sacred sites, etc.

How are you going to establish good relations, nation-to-nation, and an accord on Indigenous Rights, if you and developers keep unilaterally taking away or degrading the land and water? And more philosophically, is it morally right to destroy a river passage that is like none other in western Canada, cutting deeply through low mountains and plains, with unique microclimates and innumerable ecosystems and species such as exist nowhere else. This land and water is the birth-right of the FN who have lived here for millennia. When are we going to develop an honest Land Ethic in which we honor and respect the Rights of Nature? (Leopold 1949; David Boyd 2017).

The most important thing you forgot, in my view, is the impact this mega-dam will have on Climate Change. The news now regularly contains items on climate change, and we know the big changes in climate and weather patterns--temperature, glacier and ice cap melting, ocean rise, increasing ocean acidity, increases in storm strengths (hurricanes, typhoons), extreme precipitation and drought, increasing incidence of wildfires -- the impacts go on and on. This means that in all our development actions, we must consider the impacts of each action on climate. And we need to save ecosystems for their carbon capture and sequestration (CCS) abilities, and forest and agricultural production.

Why did you not consider what climate impacts the damming of a large river and creation of a large reservoir would have on the environment and climate? What would its carbon footprint be? Several decades of study have shown that mega-dams are not clean energy—they release both CO2 and methane(CH4) from soil disturbance and flooded decomposing vegetation. Further, a high amount of CO2 is produced in the manufacture of cement, steel and other components (Schindler 2017). And the scores of excavators and trucks give rise to tonnes of CO2, NOx, and black carbon. In the present crisis of climate change, any development activity <u>must</u> take into account the carbon footprint (impact of GHGs causing heating of the atmosphere).

I understand that you will soon travel to the far east to visit Japan, Korea and China. A major topic will be LNG. So again you follow the path of Christy Clark. I suspect that extracting LNG and fracked natural gas was a big factor in your decision to complete Site C, and also those who influenced you. Perhaps you were thinking to complete the dam to give the possibility for supplying more water and electricity to support fracking and LNG plants?

Fracked natural gas and LNG is the wrong path for BC, and for the world. Fracked natural gas, predominantly composed of methane (CH4) is not a bridge to a cleaner atmosphere. CH4 is a full-fledge fossil fuel! Experts peg fracked natural gas with a Global Warming Potential higher than oil or petrol, and similar to that of coal, sometimes depending on coal grade even greater (Howarth 2014). Fracked natural gas loses considerable CH4 during its extraction, processing, pipeline transportation, LNG liquefaction, shipping, regasification, distribution, and final burning. Christy and her 'clean energy' was only talking about the final burning of the gas at the end of the life cycle. LNG liquefaction also has significant emissions. Liquefaction is usually done by burning incoming natural gas; electricity can be used in combination with gas.

In fracking, huge volumes of water containing a wide range of possible chemicals, sand and other agents are forced under great pressure down vertical then horizontal bore pipes, emerge from exploded holes in the horizontal pipe, and are forced into a system of cracks in adjacent geologic layers. After a period of time fracking is stopped and gases and wet organics flow back into the pipe and upwards to the surface, where the gases and organics are collected and separated, and wastewater held in containment ponds.

It is well documented that not all of the 'slickwater' containing the gases moves back into the bore pipes. Some escapes and travels outside of the pipes, some reaching the ground surface. Cement caps and encasements around the vertical bores are supposed to stop this upward flow, but cracks develop over time in the cement, maybe from earthquakes. Some of the fracked gas-liquid may even move considerable distances away from the drilling site in natural faults, and pollute aquifers and surface waters. It is documented that escape of gasses and organics have tainted water wells of houses and farmsteads, rendering the water undrinkable. The most spectacular effect is tap water that can be ignited! As well, studies in the US have shown that proximity to fracking operations, has influenced adult health and birth defects in infants.

The Pembina Institute and Pacific Institute for Climate Solutions published a report in 2014 on the use of LNG in B.C (Horne & MacNab 2014). The Clark government's claim that LNG exports offer the "greatest single step British Columbia can take to fight climate change" is inaccurate [actually wrong!] in the absence of stronger global climate policies. The Report states that "Natural gas does have a role to play in a world that avoids two degrees Celsius in global warming, but only if strong emissions reduction policies are put in place in the jurisdictions that produce and consume the gas."[my emphasis]

By going the natural gas route we simply slow down the rate of adoption of truly clean alternative energies. Even if we manage to get CAPP and oil companies to act responsibly to reduce the fugitive losses of CH4 (they say by 2025, but this is doubtful; they will not do this until the US-EPA mandates it, which is highly unlikely under Trump and Pruitt) we may only achieve a reduction of 40 to 45% of the present losses of CH4. CH4 is 108 times more powerful in Global Warming Potential than CO2 over a time-frame of 10 yrs; 86 times over 20 yrs; and 34 times over 100 yrs (Howarth 2014). We are so far along in climate change, with air temperature increase over 1.0 °C (since ca. 1900), that we must work for much faster reductions of green house gas (GHG) emissions, and much sooner.

The UN climate program and the world's top climate scientists and activists urge levelling off and reduction of GHG emissions in the next 3 years (Figueres et al. 2017). In my reading, fracked natural gas will <u>not</u> provide a

bridge to zero-carbon clean energy before we reach 2  $^{0}$ C. Canadian and provincial government actions to reduce fugitive emissions are dreadfully slow.

Carbon capture and storage (CCS) is a possibility, but so far no fully effective techniques have been developed (Hawken 2017). The only fully effective CCS so far seems to be the natural CO2 capture by green plants, especially forests and grasslands, transfer and storage as underground carbon. Agricultural land if managed correctly can be quite effective for CCS in soil.

If you have dreams for natural gas and LNG, I think you should abandon them, and leave the gas in the ground. If we can stabilize at 2.0 °C or less, we can always come back to natural gas, it will still be there. It seems to me that the Asian countries will be buying LNG and natural gas cheaper from producers closer to them than Canada. Besides, China and India are moving rapidly along paths of alternative clean energies, and other countries know they should move away from fossil fuels, including natural gas. If you try to play the LNG export game, you will be hindered by the tax- and subsidy-favorable deals that Clark cut with Petronas, which is embedded in B.C. legislation for years. So we would end up selling the LNG at bargain basement prices. (This would be comparable to selling electricity from Site C at far less than its cost to generate.) And we will be wasting our time and money on the fossil fuel energies of the previous industrial revolution, when we should be transitioning rapidly into the clean energies industrial revolution.

We should be moving toward a sustainable economy based on the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) enunciated by the UN. It is essential to rapidly switch off the fossil fuels with high GHG emissions, and move to affordable clean energy, SDG 7. This can be done developing local grids and distributed energy, which can be linked to the existing hydro grid of BC Hydro. First Nations and local communities have much interest in local clean energy systems (mostly run-of-river, solar, wind). Several have already have built or are interested in community energy systems, and these could be promoted.

BC already has plenty of electricity to last for decades. Any shortfalls can be supplemented by several sources we already own—Columbia River entitlement, Burrard Inlet natural gas plant, adding generation capacity to dams already in the BC system, and actually using existing run of river facilities. Wind and solar prices are falling rapidly, and are comparable to hydro, even cheaper. Geothermal, although more expensive, could readily be geared up, drawing on existing expertise in fracking. Low periods of production by solar and wind can be augmented by storage in our hydro reservoirs, pumped storage, and developing big battery storage technology (e.g. Elon Musk, European battery systems). There are numerous potential jobs in clean renewable energy, as well as immediate jobs in energy conservation programs, new housing and energy retrofits.

I urge you to abandon the LNG idea, and to focus on Clean Energy. I hate the idea that my children and grandchildren, and BC citizens, will be paying for un-needed hydro from Site C for generations, especially since we don't need it AND because <a href="hydro is not the cleanest of energies">hydro is not the cleanest of energies</a>. You should stop Site C <a href="now">now</a>, it was Christy Clark's project and you and your party should not have to assume the blame for it. You should get with the new age of Sustainable Development, first by whole-heartedly adopting Clean Energy alternatives, then working on your progressive, socially-orientated programs that would make Tommy Douglas, and David Lewis and Jack Layton proud.

Please reverse your decision on Site C, it will drag you and the NDP down. But worse, it will unnecessarily burden all of us, the rate and tax payers, the Greens, <u>and</u> the Liberals, and slow up the inevitable conversion to Clean Energy and Sustainable Development. <u>Adopt sustainable development and establish yourself as a champion of climate action and clean energy!</u> Then of course, work on critically needed social and sustainability programs – indigenous rights, housing, efficient mass transportation, electric vehicles, child care, health care, poverty and living wages, bikes-ridesharing, education, and so on. Lots of jobs will be

produced by clean energies, new housing, energy conservation in new and retrofit building, sustainable forestry and agriculture, etc.

I believe the majority of people of BC are ready and anxious for these changes. Your government should help to make these changes happen!

Your decision to continue Site C dam construction is very disappointing and directly contradict the findings of a recent independent review by the BC Utilities Commissions which found that despite the money already spent on Site C, there are still affordable, less destructive alternatives.

It is sad to see Canadian politicians continuing to justify violation of Indigenous peoples' rights for short-term cost savings.

As a citizen I call on you, a representative of the government, to keep its promise to respect Indigenous rights and promote reconciliation, not just in some places, but everywhere in BC including the Peace River Valley. You have previously acknowledged that flooding the Peace River Valley would violate rights protected by Treaty 8 and the Canadian Constitution, and that this issue has never been addressed or resolved. I also urge you to at least ensure that no further harm is done while the issue of Treaty rights obligations remains unresolved.

As Canadian settlers on these lands we must begin to live true reconciliation, which means honouring land title and rights of Indigenous Nations and creating respectful relationships in keeping with the *United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples* (UNDRIP) and *free, prior and informed consent.* 

Indigenous peoples should not have to continually go to court to make governments uphold their rights - governments should do so a fundamental principle of responsible government.

The provincial government should live up to the principles of reconciliation and human rights protection that it promised when it was elected.

Also, ensure that no further harm is done to vital animal habitat, cultural sites and multi-generation family farms while the the outstanding issue of Treaty rights is resolved.

Dear Premier John Horgan and the BC NDP,

After taking some time to try to absorb the news that your government has approved continued construction on the Site C dam, I am writing you now to let you know how deeply upset I am about this decision.

I have been a supporter of the NDP all my life. s.22

we often discussed the rift that has emerged in Canada between the country's many vibrant grassroots social movements – from Occupy, to Idle No More, to the climate justice movement, to anti-poverty and migrant justice movements – and its Left political party. Activists of my generation do not tend to get involved in electoral politics because it is considered a waste of energy. Many feel that we simply do not have a political party in Canada that reflects our aspirations for economic and ecological justice.

I usually argue against this abandonment of electoral politics. I devote time and energy to supporting NDP candidates and participate extensively in the political process. However, your government's recent decision on Site C does make me wonder if I have been wasting my time. To say that you have alienated your base with this decision is a profound understatement.

I felt jubilant when your government managed to form a coalition with the Greens, in part because I trusted you to say no to devastating extractive projects like the Site C Dam. I thought reconciliation with Indigenous peoples might actually gain some traction under your leadership. To begin with, I was disgusted that the BCUC was exclusively tasked with assessing the economic case for or against the Site C Dam, as though the political process were reducible to a financial calculation. However, attending the hearings in Vancouver and listening to all of the articulate and informed submissions from the academic community and from the public, I felt confident that the political process would deliver protection for the Peace River. The economic case against continuing with the dam was too strong to leave any room for doubt. When the BCUC report came out, I thought we were done. I celebrated.

I've appended below the letter that I sent to you in October regarding this issue.

I believe that you are good people, and I am left with the impression that perhaps you simply do not have the power to protect the lands, waters and peoples of this province from processes of extraction and exploitation. I wish that you did.

Dear Premier Horgan, Minister Mungall, Minister Heyman, Minister Fraser, and Minister Popham, I am writing to you with a great sense of hope and urgency regarding the possible termination of on the Site C dam project. I am devastated that this project has been allowed to proceed this far. My main objections to the project are as follows:

First, Canada signed a treaty with the Cree and Dene people of the Peace River region. As a party to Treaty 8, Canada has an obligation to honour the hunting and fishing rights of Indigenous peoples on Treaty 8 territory. BC Hydro blatantly violated this treaty and then proceeded with construction on Site C while court cases related to treaty rights were still in process. The Site C project has been a rude and naked exercise of dispossession and colonial violence. This is something that needs to be roundly condemned and remedied immediately.

Secondly, the Site C Dam is unnecessary. Hydro's own reports indicate that BC can meet its future energy needs through conservation. [11] Conservation initiatives such as the construction of net zero buildings and subsidies for energy-efficiency retrofits would reduce demand and would be a far better use of taxpayer money. Moreover, in its report on Site C, the Joint Review Panel recommended that the province investigate other energy production options, including geothermal power, before moving forward with Site C. The province has failed to follow this recommendation. Geothermal would provide cheaper electricity without the environmental devastation of Site C. Canada is the only country around the Pacific Ring of Fire that does not produce geothermal power on a commercial scale.

Thirdly, I believe the Site C Dam constituted a highly corrupt \$9 billion public subsidy to the oil and gas industry, as the hydro from the project would have provided power to hydraulic fracturing operations in the region. In addition to depleting surface and groundwater, causing earthquakes, and contaminating water sources with known neurotoxins such as tolulene and exylene, hydraulic fracturing operations release significant methane emissions – a greenhouse gas 86 times more potent than CO2. These projects produce natural gas that is more greenhouse gas intensive than coal or crude oil, and have no place in an era of rapid climate change.

Fourthly, the Peace River Valley is a rich and unique habitat. The dam would flood a critical migratory corridor for caribou and an important staging areas for migratory birds. The Peace Daisy and the Persistent-Sepal Yellowcress grow only in the Peace River Valley. The dam would eliminate them from the world entirely. [3]

Finally, the Site C Dam threatens food security in BC by flooding approximately 30,000 acres of the best farmland in the province. The class one farmland in the Peace River Valley could feed one million people per year. This arable land is even more precious in the North, given the high price of imported food in that part of our province. In the context of the recent drought in California and the pressures of climate change on water supplies in key food producing regions like the Okanagan and the prairies, preserving BC's capacity to produce food locally must be a top priority. The loss of farmland from the dam would include not only the flooded area, but erosion in adjacent areas.

Construction on the Site C project must stop now. Workers who were depending on wages from its construction should be compensated, as should the Treaty 8 First Nations and local residents who were forced to incur legal fees trying to protect their territories and homes from this project. Damaged lands and waters should be fully remediated.

Moreover, I would like to see a thorough investigation into possible corruption surrounding the development of this dam project to date. The sheer expense of the project; its aggressive backing by the Liberal government; the short-circuiting of review processes, of environmental regulations, and of commitments to reconciliation with Indigenous peoples; the lack of documented justification for its

construction in a context of flat energy demand – all of these together raise serious suspicions about the actual motivations behind the project.

I look forward to hearing from you.

## Dear Premier Horgan,

Before your announcement, I wrote and asked for a complete explanation of your decision when you made it. Your explanation was quite inadequate. How can terminating a project that has cost 2.1 billion be worse than completing it at a total of 10.7 billion? And remediation was estimated at 1.8 billion, but this could be done for a lot less. Others say large debt can be paid back over long periods, 30 or 70 years. How will this influence your ability to undertake your social programs? How will your move to remove bridge tolls, over 3.0 billion+ lost from your intake, influence new social programs? In the end BC Hydro and the government decide when and how much to raise hydro rates, and tax rates. What about subsidies and tax breaks to big corporations, especially oil and gas? Some economic techniques to disadvantage fossil fuels in favor of clean energy are carbon pricing of all GHG emitters, and lowering subsidies and taking away tax breaks. These bring in money that could be partially returned to the taxpayers, and also used in government programs.

Unfortunately, you ignored all the good economic advice you got, and you followed Christy Clark's original

decision, based primarily on BC Hydro recommendations, with no expert assessment by BCUC. You ignored the recent BCUC review and Deloitte's review of that, and opinions by Harry Swain, Marc Eliesen, Robert McCullouch, and many others. You did not take much account of factors, economic, environmental and social impacts by the dam--loss of highly productive agricultural land and economic potential for increased agriculture and food supply; loss of land and livelihoods of landowners and farmers; loss of ecosystem services for the Peace River watershed, ecosystem and wildlife diversity, carbon capture and sequestering by vegetation, migrations of mammals and birds with international implications; impacts on the down stream water supply to the Wood Buffalo Park in Alberta, a UNESCO World Heritage Site (Nikiforuk 2017); and critically, impacts on the Treaty 8 rights of the First Nations on the Peace River--hunting, fishing, trapping, grave and sacred sites. How are you going to establish good relations, nation-to-nation, if developers keep unilaterally taking away or degrading their land and water?

But the most important thing you forgot to consider, in my view, is what impact of this mega-dam will have on climate. The news regularly reports on climate change, and we know the changes in weather patterns-temperature, ice cap and glacier melting, ocean rise, increasing ocean acidity, increases in storm strengths (hurricanes, typoons), extreme precipitation and drought, increasing incidence of wildfires, etc. etc. This means that in all our development actions that relate to changes in temperature, we must consider the impacts of each action on climate. Why did you not consider what climate impacts the damming of a large river and creation of a large reservoir would have on the climate? What would its carbon footprint be? Several decades of study show that hydroelectric is not clean energy—it releases both CO2 and methane from soil disturbance and flooded decomposing vegetation. Further, there is a high amount of CO2 produced in the manufacture of cement, steel and other components (Schindler 2017). In the present crisis of climate change, any development activity must take into account what the carbon footprint is (impact of CO2 and all other gases causing heating of the atmosphere).

I understand that you will soon travel to the far east to visit China, India, Japan, and possibly other countries about trade. I am guessing that a major topic will be LNG. This will also be a path similar to Christy's. This is the wrong path for BC, and for the world. Fracked natural gas, predominantly composed of methane (CH4) is not a bridge to a cleaner atmosphere, it it a full fledge fossil fuel and looses a lot of methane (CH4) during its extraction and distribution. Experts peg fracked natural gas with a Global Warming Potential similar to that of coal, sometimes even larger. By going the natural gas route you simply slow down the adoption of truly clean alternative energies. Even if you manage to get CAPP and oil companies to reduce the losses of CH4 (they will not do this until the US-EPA mandates it, and this is unlikely under Trump and Pruitt) you still will only achieve a reduction of 40 to 45% of the losses of CH4. CH4 is 108 times more powerful than CO2 (time frame over 10 yrs; 86 times over 20 yrs; 34 times over 100 yrs) in Global Warming Potential! We are so far along in climate change impacts, with air temperature increase (since ca. 1900) now over 1.0 deg C, that we must work for much faster reductions of green house gas (GHG) emissions. The UN climate program and many of the world's top climate scientists and leaders urge levelling off and reduction of GHG emissions in the next 3 years (Figueres et al. 2017).

If you have ideas about LNG, I think you should abandon them. It seems to me that the big Asian countries will be buying LNG and natural gas cheaper from suppliers closer than Canada. Besides, China and India are moving rapidly along paths of alternative clean energies, and will be aiming to move away from fossil fuels, including natural gas. Besides, if you try to play the LNG export game, you will be hindered by the incredibly industry-favorable deal that Clark cut with Petronas, which is embedded in legislation for 25 or more years. So we would end up selling the LNG at bargain basement prices. This would be comparable to selling electricity from Site C at far less than its cost to generate.

We should be moving toward a sustainable economy based on the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) enunciated by the UN. It is essential to rapidly switch off the fossil fuels with high GHG emissions, and move to affordable clean energy, SDG 7. This can be done using local grids and distributed energy, which can be linked to the large hydro grid of BC Hydro. First Nations have much interest in local clean energy systems. Several First Nations already have built community energy systems, and more of these could be promoted. BC already has plenty of electricity to last for decades. Any shortfalls can be supplemented by several sources we already own—Columbia River entitlement, Burrard Inlet natural gas plant, adding generation capacity to dams we already have in the BC system, and using existing run of river facilities. Wind and solar prices are becoming comparable to hydro, even cheaper and geothermal could readily be geared up, because of existing expertise on drilling and pipefitting from fracking companies. Low periods of production by solar and wind can be augmented by storage in our large hydro reservoirs. There are numerous jobs in clean renewable energy, as well as energy conservation programs such as new housing and energy retrofits.

I encourage you to get off the LNG idea and focus on clean energy. I hate the idea that my children and grand children, and BC citizens for generations, will be paying for un-needed hydro from the Site C decision for generations, especially since we don't need it, AND hydro is not the cleanest of energies. You should stop Site

C now, it was Christy Clark's project and you should not have to assume the blame for it. You should get with the New Age of Sustainable Development, first by whole-heartedly adopting clean energy alternatives, then working on progressive, people-orientated programs that would make Tommy Douglas, and David Lewis and Jack Layton etc proud.

There have been scores of letters and articles and assessments against Site C. I attach three excellent articles that you may care to re-read and reflect upon: 1) Comment\_ Reverse direction on Site C, or pay the price--VICKY HUSBAND Times Colonist 21Dec2017; 2) Opinion\_ Decision to approve Site C undermines reconciliation with Indigenous peoples and long-term action on climate change--David Schindler & Faisal Moola, Van Sun 20Dec2017; 3) PAST TIME TO TAKE FIRST NATION CONSENT ON DEVELOPMENTS SERIOUSLY--Judith Sayers, First Nations in BC Knowledge Network, December 21, 2017.

Please reverse your decision on Site C, it will drag you and the NDP down. But worse, it will unnecessarily burden all of us, the rate and tax payers, and slow up conversion to clean energy and sustainable development. Adopt sustainable development and establish yourself as a champion of climate action and clean energy! Work on the other highly needed social and sustainability programs – indigenous rights, housing, health care, poverty and living wage, efficient mass transit, bikes-ridesharing-electric vehicles, education, etc etc. Lots of jobs will be produced by clean energies and technologies, energy conservation in new and retrofit building, sustainable forestry and agriculture, etc. I supported both NDP and Greens before your announcement, and would like to continue to do so, but if you go ahead with the highly unjust, unneeded and destructive Site C, I must withdraw my support of you and the NDP, and go full strength to the Greens.



I'd like to remind you that you have previously acknowledged that flooding the Peace River Valley would violate rights protected by Treaty 8 and the Canadian Constitution and that this issue have never been addressed or resolved.

I urge you to at least ensure that no further harm is done while the issue of Treaty rights obligations remains unresolved.

We do not accept the justification offered by you for continuing the construction of Site C.

As a consequence and in consideration of the public outrage over your decision, we are planning an open accountability summit to be held over the last weekend of January 2018 in Victoria.

Our intention is to review the rationale for your continuation decision and the consultation/decision-making processes mandated by your government in reaching your decision. We will decide on action plans and new directions.

We request your attendance at this summit and that of Cabinet members who played key roles in this decision-making.

Many members of the public participated in good faith in the process you established with the BC Utilities Commission to review the Site C project but your decision does not reflect their findings or conclusions.

Our interest in your participation in this summit would be to learn more from you about the basis of your decision and your thoughts about improving decision-making processes designed for public input to achieve open, fair and transparent decisions.

To be clear, during the time provided for your presentation, we will ensure a respective dialogue in terms of audience participation.

Thank you for consideration of this request. I will be in touch soon with further details as our planning progresses and to confirm arrangements.

Under separate cover, we have requested the public release of all the information and advice your Government received that led to your December 11th announcement for continuation of this project.

Dear Premier Horgan,

I write to you as Chair of the Peace Valley Solidarity Initiative ("PVSI"). On December 11, 2017, your Government announced it will be supporting the completion of the Site C dam and the flooding of the Peace River Valley, including the West Moberly First Nations territory, Prophet River First Nation territory and the homes of many others.

On November 1, 2017, the British Columbia Utilities Commission ("BCUC") submitted its Final Report to your Government's inquiry into Site C. This report concluded BC Hydro's forecast for

future energy needs to be "excessively optimistic." It found that "increasingly viable alternative energy sources such as wind, geothermal and industrial curtailment could provide similar benefits to ratepayers as the Site C project." And it held the costs of termination and remediation to be approximately \$1.8 billion in addition to the costs of providing alternative sources of energy.

But while your Government has held the BCUC up to be an independent, impartial regulator and source of information for determining the future of Site C, your decision does not reflect their findings or conclusions. In contrast, despite a stated commitment to transparency, your Government's decision is based on information and advice to which no member of the public has access.

Indeed, in a blog post released on December 11, the Attorney General, David Eby, stated that after receiving BCUC's Final Report, your Government received "unambiguous advice" from financial experts that suggested concerns about BCUC's conclusions. Mr Eby goes on to state that your Government was told that the accounting models used by BCUC for determining the costs of alternatives to Site C were "dramatically different," and that abandoning Site C would actually cause hydro ratepayers or BC taxpayers to incur an immediate \$3-4 billion public charge. Along these lines, members of your Government have, since Monday, expressed concerns about the sacrifices that would have needed to have been made in order to cover this public charge.

With respect, without access to the information and advice you received, and in the face of significant amounts of contrary information and data received by your Government during its inquiry into Site C, we do not accept the justification offered for continuing with construction of Site C.

As such, we request that your Government release to the public by January 5th, 2018 all information and advice it received that led to your December 11th announcement, including but not limited to:

- -the financial advice and analyses you received in response to BCUC's Final Report;
- -the accounting models used by your advisors to question BCUC's findings;
- -your analyses of the consequences of these accounting models on taxpayers and ratepayers;
- -the methods by which you incorporated the value of the Peace River Valley, First Nations territory, and homes that will be flooded into your decision and the above analyses; and -any other analysis, opinions, advice or data considered in reaching the final decision to continue construction of the Site C dam.

The construction of Site C represents regressive decision-making at a time when climate change, food security, and reconciliation should be top of mind for all British Columbians and our government. As such, we see the release of this information as integral to the accountability you owe to our province and its citizens.





# Re: Present and Future Financial Impact on BC Ratepayers and Taxpayers of Completion vs. Cancellation of Site C

We are writing you on behalf of the Peace Valley Landowner Association and the Peace Valley Environment Association to request that you initiate an urgent examination pursuant to Section 13 or other applicable provision of the *Auditor General* Act to answer the following questions:

- 1. Is the attached December 11th, 2017 memorandum prepared by McCullough Research correct? (Attached, below.)
- 2. Is it true that if the BC government abandoned the Site C project, British Columbia would have no alternative but to incur an immediate \$3-4 billion public charge on either BC Hydro ratepayers or BC taxpayers? Please refer to the attached statement of Attorney General David Eby. (Attached, below.)
- 3. What is the likely minimum cash impact on present and future BC Hydro ratepayers and BC taxpayers of completing Site C vs. cancelling Site C?
- 4. What mitigation measures are available through policy, legislation or regulation to minimize the cashflow impact of cancellation of Site C on BC Hydro ratepayers or BC taxpayers?
- 5. What viable options does the British Columbia government have to ameliorate the accounting (as opposed to cashflow) treatment of Site C cancellation costs?
- 6. Is the best practice to exclude or include sunk costs when deciding whether or not to complete a project such as Site C?
- 7. Should accounting treatment be the decisive factor when considering whether or not to complete a project such as Site C?
- 8. Other questions you deem relevant to determining whether or not the BC government is acting in an effective, economic and efficient manner with respect to Site C.

This requested examination is in the public interest because the now \$10.7 billion Site C project is the largest capital infrastructure project in the history of BC and there is a fundamental difference of opinion on the potential financial impacts of moving forward with Site C vs. cancelling Site C.

These questions fit well within the overall terms of reference for your Site C dam review which we understand was placed on temporary hold pending the outcome of the British Columbia Utilities Commission Site C Inquiry. The purpose of your review is summarized in the following way, "...explain to the legislature and the people of British Columbia the information and analysis provided to government, the progress and costs to date, and the potential impacts moving forward". In order to fully understand the potential financial impacts moving forward it is necessary to be able to compare those financial impacts to that of cancelling the project.

As an independent officer of the legislature, *all* British Columbians rely on your examinations and reports to be assured the British Columbia government is achieving its objectives effectively, economically and efficiently. At its core, the BC government is asserting that the only effective, economic, and efficient way to meet demand for electricity in the 2030's is to spend a further \$8.6 billion (assuming no further cost overruns) to complete Site C. And that effective government decision making requires that the accounting treatment of project costs is and should be the decisive factor.

Respectfully, we request that this matter be treated on an urgent basis. While this project is only 20 per cent complete, we understand that costs are incurred to the tune of \$60 million per month. Given the scope of the questions, the previous work completed by your office, and the inquiry recently completed by the British Columbia Utilities Commission, we are hopeful the interim results of your examination and responses to some, if not all, of the above questions will be publicly available in January 2018.

Thank you for considering our request. We look forward to your early response. Please contact me if you have any questions or require further information.



I'm not convinced you even realize what it is you are saying, because your (again, not you personally) actions are in direct opposition to your words. Try to step outside the role of "simply going through the motions because its what you're obligated to do" and try actually understanding the meaning of reconciliation, before you spout off sentences that devalue your word as a representative of the Legislative assembly. I have to wonder did the new forecasted 10.7 billion figure factor in the legal costs that will result from the court case that First Nations people are saying they will bring? Or is that not accounted for and will be later "blamed" on them as though they should not have had the nerve to stand up for their inherent right and title to the land that is protected by Treaty 8.

You say: we will honour and respect the commitment demonstrated by those who oppose Site C and share in their determination to move British Columbia to a better future. Again, phrases that are meaningless without action, and certainly made moreso when the action in question is the exact opposite of what those who oppose Site C were trying to show.

Governments everywhere seem to misunderstand their purpose. The NDP was not elected because we like the "people" within the party better, it was elected because it campaigned on a platform of remembering the whole purpose of government, which was a government that works for you (as in, the people that it's supposed to be representing.) Dear Premier Horgan and members of cabinet,

I am very disappointed that you made the decision to proceed with the Site C dam. With its limited scope and expedited timelines, the BCUC's review was a poor substitute for the full review to which Site C should have been subject before it was approved in the first place. The Joint Review Panel's environmental assessment of Site C found that justification for the dam would require both an unambiguous need for the power and analyses showing its financial costs to be sufficiently attractive as to make tolerable the bearing of substantial environmental, social, and other costs. These factors incontrovertibly tip the balance in favour of cancelling the project outright:

#### Jobs

Greater job creation opportunities exist through demand-side management and by
deploying an appropriate mix of smaller-scale renewable power sources, which could be
commissioned to better match potential changes in B.C.'s power demands as they occur.
Both approaches have the benefit of spreading jobs benefits more evenly on a geographic
and temporal basis, avoiding the boom and bust cycle that inevitably comes with extremely
large capital projects.

# Treaty Rights

Proceeding with Site C violates the treaty rights of Treaty 8 First Nations and would put your
government at odds with its commitment to the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of
Indigenous Peoples. More than 330 documented archaeological sites would be inundated
by flooding, and land currently used for hunting fishing and medicinal purposes would be
lost forever. [i]

#### **Food Security**

• The farmland that would be flooded by the Site C reservoir will seriously harm B.C.'s future food security, which is increasingly imperilled by the mounting impacts of climate change. Approximately 70 per cent of B.C.'s fruits and vegetables are imported from California, a source that may literally dry up due to worsening and persistent droughts. Significant portions of Fraser Valley farmland is at risk of flooding due to sea level rise. In this context, your government is ensuring B.C.'s food security is compromised. The Site C dam will flood 3,816 hectares of prime farmland that could grow fruits and vegetables sufficient for a million British Columbians, such is the agricultural potential of the Peace River Valley.

#### **Environmental Impacts**

 Site C will cause numerous adverse environmental impacts, including mercury poisoning of fish; downstream impacts on the Peace-Athabasca Delta (the largest freshwater delta in the world); and adverse effects on many species of fish, birds, bats, vertebrates, and plants, as well as sensitive ecosystems. The cumulative environmental impacts of the petroleum/natural gas and forestry industries in the region will be exacerbated by the Site C dam.

#### Greenhouse Gas Emissions

Contrary to B.C. Hydro's claims, Site C will not deliver power with lower greenhouse gas
emissions than other renewable sources of energy. To call Site C the "cleanest" power
option, as many of its proponents have done, is simply false. In large part, this is because of
methane emissions from the reservoir—which will be front-end loaded in the early years of
Site C's lifecycle, making it even more problematic in the fight against climate change.

#### Alternatives Exist and More will exist in the Near-Future

 British Columbians would be much better served by a more ambitious and expanded version of the Power BC initiative that was announced before your government assumed power. Cancelling the Site C dam and building upon the ideas in Power BC would offer your government an opportunity to position B.C. as an environmental and climate leader, accelerate the transition to a post-carbon economy, and provide the kind of good, wellpaying jobs we need for the future.

While the issues at the heart of the BCUC review are critical, the limitations placed upon the BCUC by virtue of the review's expedited timelines means that the evidence has likely not received the required level of scrutiny. Throughout the history of the Site C proposal, B.C. Hydro has failed to demonstrate the need for the power. The multiple adverse impacts of this proposed dam demand more serious consideration. Cabinet's decision on this matter has determined your government is not genuine about respecting treaty rights and supporting British Columbians with good green jobs that don't undermine the environment we all depend on.

Please cancel this outrageously expensive, environmentally destructive and socially disastrous project.

More things you should have known about regarding alternative energy potential in BC that casts great doubt on the wisdom of your decision to proceed with Site C - the potential for Geothermal Power.

BC has similar potential for Geothermal power as Alberta and needs similar policy and regulatory frameworks to make it come to fruition. #### Dear Premier Horgan,

Allow us to introduce ourselves. We are New Democrats for Leap, and passionate proponents of climate justice, with supporters across the country. When our party was elected to government in British Columbia, we were thrilled and assumed that this stunning victory would be a big boost to the reframing of the NDP as the party of ecological and climate justice.

We are well aware of the ecological and financial mess that the very right wing Liberal government left you with. But we anticipated that you would act courageously to renounce the wrong-headed and destructive path of Christy Clark. While campaigning in the provincial election, you made serious criticisms about the negative effects of building the Site C dam. You challenged Clark's support for this project noting huge financial overruns and worrisome geotechnical challenges (tension cracks where the dam is being built)—neither of which has gone away.

Please understand our outrage over the claim that accepting the logic of having to continue with this project because of money already spent by a corrupt Liberal government could ever justify the violation of Indigenous rights. The UN Committee on the Ending of Racial Discrimination expressed its concern over the violation of First Nations rights when it recommended the halting of the dam project until a full review of its effects on Indigenous land, in this case, treaty land, could be carried out. The panel urged Canada to "identify alternatives to irreversible destruction of Indigenous lands." The area to be flooded, over 80 kilometres of forest and 7000 acres of highly productive agricultural land, also contains the burial grounds of First Nations people. Moreover, the dam site has been a fruitful source of ancient archaeological finds that remain to be explored. That valuable historical information will be lost forever with the flooding of the valley.

It is wrong to accept the advice of KPMG, which typically places private sector profits before considerations of social and ecological harm. It is our understanding that the independent review carried out by the BC Utilities Commission confirmed that there are less destructive alternatives for energy generation which, despite the money already spent, may still prove cheaper in the long run. We also appreciate the huge financial consequences of proceeding with a project, plagued with cost overruns, that appears to be heading to a bill that would exceed \$11 billion. This expense would deplete the

provincial treasury and divert investment from cheaper renewable energy sources such as geothermal, solar, and wind. The City of Richmond already exploits geothermal energy resulting in considerable generation. These alternatives would not only be more cost effective, they would generate thousands of new jobs, jobs which would not destroy waterways, fish, bird, and animal habitat, and the traditional lands of indigenous peoples. B.C. needs employment opportunities but it is faulty thinking to assume Site C is the only choice for jobs in the renewable sector. In fact, it's the worst choice. The 2500 jobs now offered by this project come with a formidable price-tag, not only to the public, but to the integrity of a government that pledged to protect the environment and indigenous rights.

We are aware that some First Nations have signed impact benefit agreements with B.C. Hydro over Site C, and we respect that they have negotiated items they deem important to their communities. But we have to ask—in this relationship of asymmetrical power—how much choice do communities lacking resources actually have? Why would an NDP government give credence to agreements that inherently ravage indigenous land when much better arrangements can be developed over smaller, gentler, truly green energy projects that leave traditional use of the land intact?

Flooding a massive area of land used for farming and First Nations cultural use, including burial plots, is surely a Faustian bargain, which will cause us to lose our soul as social justice folks in the end.

What you do has an impact on our party across provinces and at the federal level. When you act well on behalf of Indigenous people and environmental protection, you inspire all of the Party. When you fail, we all fail.

We are aware and we do not forget that you, as Premier, have previously acknowledged that flooding the Peace River Valley would violate rights protected by Treaty 8 and the Canadian Constitution. This issue has never been addressed or resolved. This is no small matter. We are deeply disheartened that you have failed to part ways with the disgraceful traditions of previous and current governments which routinely violate the rights of Indigenous peoples. We urgently need our party to break with this horrible history, and pattern of betrayal.

We call on you and your government to keep its promise to respect Indigenous rights and promote reconciliation, not just in some places, but everywhere in BC including the Peace River Valley. We also call on you and your government to guarantee uninterrupted employment for workers already employed in the dam construction and for new First Nations workers by turning to investment in renewable energy sources which do not destroy the Peace Valley ecology.

On December 11, BC Premier John Horgan announced that his government intends to turn its back on the human rights of Indigenous peoples in the Peace River Valley.

Before being elected as Premier, John Horgan publicly stated that "constitutional rights to practice hunting and fishing" would be "violated by this dam." As Premier, he publicly stated that this issue has never been resolved and may ultimately end up before the Supreme Court.

Despite these public statements, Premier Horgan now says construction must continue. And, he says, it's not his fault. The Premier says too much money has already been spent, making it too expensive to stop construction.

But that claim directly contradicts the findings of the recent independent review by the BC Utilities Commissions which found that - despite the money already spent on Site C - there are still affordable, less destructive alternatives.

Amnesty has called the Premier's decison outrageous and cynical. What's worse, he seems to be suggesting that it's ok to violate Indigenous rights if doing so might save the province money.

Despite what the Premier said, Site C is not past the point of no return. There's still time to stop construction and repair the harm.

The West Moberly and Prophet River First Nations have announced that they will continue their fight in court. A court victory could halt the dam, regardless of the Premier's decision.

But this is an unfair burden for First Nations to bear. Indigenous peoples should not have to go to court to make governments uphold the rights - governments should do so a fundamental principle of responsible government.

The provincial government should live up to the principles of reconciliation and human rights protection that it promised when it was elected. If it doesn't have the courage or conviction to stop the dam outright, it must ensure that no further harm is done to vital animal habitat, cultural sites and multi-generation family farms while the the outstanding issue of Treaty rights is resolved. It would be fundamentally unjust for the courts to rule in favour of the First Nations after the harm had already been done.

You are wrong to ignore the human rights of Indigenous peoples.



Dear Premier Horgan,

- During the election campaign, you criticized the building of the Site C dam, even going so far as to carry a placard saying "SITE C SUCKS." Although I had decided not to vote NDP again after our experience with Glen Clark, I changed my mind because I was, once more, stupid enough to believe a politician. Like many other voters, I was convinced that you would end Liberal follies and irresponsible spending. I thought you would protect the environment and respect First Nations' rights. You acknowledged that flooding the Peace River Valley would violate Treaty 8 rights and section 35 of the Constitution! Regardless, your decision to ignore the BCUC report on Site C and to surrender to pressure from unions and party insiders verified that it's business as usual with the NDP. It didn't take long for you to turn. Your government is the same as the previous Liberal one, except that you represent slightly different special interests. Most politicians pose as principled persons during election campaigns and then expose their lack of leadership while in office; you are certainly no exception.
- Your claim that a short-term cost saving could ever justify the violation of indigenous rights is outrageous and reveals the meagre value you attach to indigenous lives. Although there is no shortage of employment in the province, you have chosen to continue Site C jobs at the expense of First Nations' homes, heritage, culture, and traditional way of life. You didn't want to disappoint Site C workers who had settled in the area, so instead, you have decided to sacrifice the homes of indigenous people and farmers; invite the condemnation of Amnesty International; destroy the best remaining farmland in the province; drive endangered bullhead trout into extinction; drown or otherwise kill ungulates, predators and migrating birds that rely on the Peace Valley; demolish the wildlife corridor that runs north from American reserves; endanger the Wood Buffalo National Park in Alberta; push British Columbia into enormous debt and lower its credit rating; create 100% surplus energy with nowhere to sell it; and make BC residents and businesses pay for it well into the future. You decided on those ruinous measures, despite confirmation by the BC Utilities Commission that we have less destructive alternatives that may be cheaper in the long run, despite Site C cancelation costs. Do you really have any idea of the damage you are causing?
- It isn't good enough for you to apologize to the Peace Valley indigenous people for turning them out of their homes and wrecking their lives. It isn't enough to promise them that your government will somehow make up for the racism, cruelty and displacement of the past--I believe you used the term "previous governments" to refer to such injustices, but I remind you that now it is *your* government and *your* decisions that are causing injustice. Show some respect to indigenous people by being honest about your own contribution to their cultural genocide.
- I am in good company in calling for your government to keep its promise to respect indigenous rights and promote reconciliation, not just in some places, but everywhere in BC, including in the Peace Valley. Considering the damage you have brought to your reputation through your broken promises and flouting of the law, I urge you at least to ensure that no further construction takes place while the issue of Treaty rights obligations remains unresolved.

Mr. Eby stated that "that if we abandoned the Site C project, we would incur an immediate \$3-4bn public charge on either hydro ratepayers or BC taxpayers." It is unfortunate that Mr. Eby received incorrect information, but Mr. Eby's best path would have been to check with the BCUC for guidance on standard regulatory practice.

I gather that Mr. Eby was unaware that the BCUC calculations had set amortization periods for the sunk costs and the reclamation expenses. The analysis assumed a seventy-year amortization period for the sunk costs of \$2.1 billion. They also assumed a thirty-year amortization period for the reclamation costs. In passing, their estimate of the reclamation costs was quite a bit higher than the evidence. Both BC Hydro and Deloitte forecasted costs in the \$1 to \$1.2 billion range.

Regulatory practice puts the amortization of prudently undertaken utility investments as an issue in the purview of the regulatory commission. An Order in Council can direct the BCUC to choose different amortization periods, but this would simply be an exercise in self-inflicted pain.

If an asset is recognized by regulators as an earning asset, the usual policy would be to write it down on the same schedule as that set by the regulatory commission. Again, the Cabinet can choose to accelerate the depreciation of an earning asset, but this would be a second way to cause their constituents injury.

It appears from Mr. Eby's letter that he believes that the financing of the

\$2.1 billion sunk costs has been held in abeyance. This is a curious belief. British Columbia has a continuous financing program designed to balance cash requirements and cash inflows. These needs drive the province's issuance of bonds. The province has already spent the \$2.1 billion dollars and the cash has been disbursed. The cash is found through taxes and the sale of bonds. For a long-term capital asset like Site C, the province would nor-mally issue thirty-year bonds which, indeed, is what the province has done.

Mr. Eby has also raised a concern that Moody's (the only bond rating firm that has ex-pressed concerns about BC Hydro's unusual finances) would react negatively to the re-covery of the \$2.1 billion. Regulatory recovery of the costs of termination is a very common practice in the utility business and is addressed in every utility's annual report. However, the proposed solution is to propose spending \$8 billion more an asset that could be replaced for only \$4 billion. This,

indeed, may concern the bond raters and has been a factor in the downrating of the two provinces - Manitoba and Newfoundland - who have followed the proposed path.

### As I concluded recently:

BC's triple A rating was just confirmed and will not be downgraded by cancelling Site C. BC is already financing the \$2.1 billion in sunk costs with 30-year bonds at a cost of \$57 million per year, not \$300-400 million per year. Even if the inflated \$1.8 billion in termi-nation costs are added, cancelling Site C will save ratepayers at least \$266 million/year or \$123/household in 2024.

Thank you for taking the time to share your views with me about the future of the Site C dam. I appreciate the active participation from British Columbians on this issue and want to assure you that I listened and heard your concerns.

As you are most likely aware, we have made the difficult decision to proceed with Site C. The project should never have been started, but we cannot change the previous government's mistakes. To do anything but move forward would require British Columbians to take on \$4 billion in debt that would have to result in massive cuts to the services people count on us to deliver. After witnessing the legacy of BC Liberal cuts, I can't allow that to happen again. I understand that this may not have been the outcome you hoped for, and want to assure you that as this project continues, we will honour and respect the commitment demonstrated by those who oppose Site C and share in their determination to move British Columbia to a better future. Not to mention the BCUC use of a 30 year amortization period in their assessment of termination costs and effects on ratepayers.

I expect you and the government to respond to these critiques and to provide substantive evidence to support the government's rather incredible conclusions regarding the impacts and costs of cancellation and remediation.

My disappointment in you and in the BC NDP has caused me to fear for all the major files that will cross your paths during your tenure.

In light of this, I want you to know that if you vote in favour of continuing with site C when this comes before the legislature I shall not renew any monetary support towards you or your campaign. I have been an BCNDP member for most of my 80 years s.22

s.22 , I have now cancelled my membership and financial contributions.

The reason is Site-C.

During the last election, BCNDP promised to stop Site-C to avoid major damage to the environment, agriculture, and undertakings to First Nations, provided only that the BC Utilities Commission determined Site-C power could be replaced with alternative energy sources at no higher cost. With the

usual caveats, the BCUC report confirmed that to be the case.

To everyone's surprise, however, your government held yet more consultations, and decided to complete Site-C for a *new* reason, namely, that the increased Government debt from cancellation would crowd out resources needed for promised social expenditures.

This is nonsense. To take the most egregious example, your government is keeping its promise to eliminate tolls on the Fraser bridges. This will have about the same "crowding out" effect as cancelling Site C. Worse, eliminating the bridge tolls will yield *zero* benefits to the economy, First Nations or employment, and will incur *certain, significant and long-term environmental costs* (more sprawl, less resources and incentive for public transport).

Paraphrasing Einstein, I would be insane to waste my remaining years working within the party and expect better future decisions. My past efforts are indeed "sunk." Your unprincipled Site-C decision, has, however, freed what time and resources remain to explore ways that may just help leave the world a better place.

The following is my reply to a long letter from Michelle Mungall and another from David Eby. It is intended as well for you, and all members of the NDP cabinet and caucus.

Dear Minister Mungall,

Thank you for your lengthy reply. (Ref. 103182)

That said, I must forewarn you that I shall do my very best as a long-time NDP supporter and as a decent human being, to avoid responding with abusive language. It won't be easy. Your letter was itself an abuse of logic from start to finish. It reads like it was assembled by a mediocre political PR consultant out of a bucket of tired phrases and party-approved talking points, not out of anyone's personal convictions. Did you write it? I hope to confine my remarks to the points your letter raised pretty much in the order you presented them.

Yes, you *can* change the previous government's mistakes. Much of the estimated \$4 billion dollars final cost to cancel and remediate the barely-started Site C project will go to pay companies and workers already on site and who will be so for some considerable time into the future. Taxes upon their high incomes would return some revenue to government and almost nobody now working would be put out of a job.

You say cancellation would have caused massive cuts in services? I never heard that objection raised when the NDP cancelled bridge tolls (foregoing \$3.5 billion). If you think you can't change the previous government's mistakes, then you can change your own government's mistake right there. That would anger some urban commuters but would negate most of the predicted \$4 billion cancelled dam cost.

As to your respect for the commitment of we who opposed the dam to "move B.C. to a better future"? Lovely and meaningless generality. Better future for whom? More words upon the subject of empty generalities will follow in this letter.

Government will address concerns with "a number of conditions"? As you have seen in other contexts, companies will agree to *any* conditions in order to get permits. It looks good on TV for them and for government. Then they will prematurely and unilaterally declare that they have fulfilled the conditions (See Kinder Morgan) while simultaneously appealing to government to exempt them from the very conditions they agreed to. (Kinder Morgan again - demonstrating the immense meaninglessness of gov't's "conditions".)

Your letter promised "initiatives".

The Project Assurance Board will have a "mandate" to get projects done on time and on budget? (In future, of course, just not for this one last time) How does that mandate work? When contractors screw up, when materials costs rise, when unforeseen circumstances and tension cracks pop up - will this admirable Board take off their suits and put on hard hats to personally finish the job on time? Will they sell their houses to finance the cost over-runs? "Mandate" my left foot. That mandate must exist prior to beginning any project or why even sign or honour the contract?

Community Benefits Programs. The "community' is a big temporary work camp. Soon it will be gone. Likewise some small indigenous nations and farmers who will lose all that is of value to them. They won't have any community left to receive benefits. I heard one First Nation leader on CBC yesterday, one whose nation has signed on to the project and who is making big bucks right now working for the man. He was unabashedly happy about the prospect of becoming the third-largest construction company in BC. Good for him. Unprompted, he smugly boasted that the compensation his people will receive from government for loss of their land and culture will be "in excess of nine figures". Sigh. How many other small nations will be similarly bribed? More billions gone. And where will they go when this construction is done? Where can they call home?

Peace River Legacy Fund An unfortunate name. This reminds me of nothing so much as other "legacy" projects. Here's how they work. First destroy a community and its culture. Next issue grants to establish a museum to honour their memory. Noble sentiments are expressed. Tourists are attracted. The premier comes to cut the ribbon along with local MLA. Example: the Doukhobor Village and Museum (and gift shoppe) in Castlegar. Here in Victoria we are today considering a sculpture to "honour" the starving orcas who will soon be extinct, another part of our "legacy". Legacy funds are hush money. Legacy projects are grave markers - reeking of hypocritical nostalgia. They ooze crocodile tears for the intentional erasure of human or natural communities who were perceived as inconvenient

pests by gov't, industry, and the banks which rule them all with little flicks of their credit ratings whip.

**Food Security Programs.** Nice try. "based upon site C revenues?" What revenues are those? There will be NO revenues. John Horgan himself said it would take seventy years just to pay down the \$4 billion dollar charge to cancel the dam, never mind the optimistic \$11 billion to complete it. Seventy years! Electricity for which there is no great demand will be sold at a loss. On this galactic scale 20 million dollars to enhance Peace River Valley food production is, pardon the expression, a fart in a windstorm.

Treaty 8 and First Nations in general. I hesitate to comment on this unspeakable mess. I see you promise to hold meetings, to "work with", to "address concerns" etc etc. Personally I'd be surprised if First Nations would deign to meet with government at this point. It sticks in my craw to see the word "Honourable" attached to Scott Fraser or to any government minister sent in to do this dirty work. I see that you plan to "ask" BC Hydro to "consider" doing some good for the community. "Ask"? Why not "tell"? Why not "order"? Why not "require" BC Hydro to act with consideration upon those stolen lands? Who governs this Province, our government or BC Hydro?

I may be lacking in imagination but when I imagine myself in the position of First Nation people, thoughts of violence, despair, or suicide are among the things that come to mind. I'm sure they don't want that, nor do you, nor do I. But it is a real, live worry. Lie after lie, promise after promise, apology after apology, theft after theft - First Nations' continued patience and restraint is monumental. It is a wonder of the world, far more impressive than the dam. You think the Site C decision was "difficult"? Imagine yourself as a First Nations leader trying to decide whether to bother attending another meeting with government. *That* is what I would call a difficult decision. But you promise to "work in partnership" with folks whose fate has been sealed long before you go into the meeting house. Feh!

**Hydro rates.** John Horgan said dreadful things will happen if we cancel the project. He said we'd have a 12% rise of Hydro rates after eating the projected \$4 billion in sunk funds. Good grief! Do the math and tell me where our Hydro rates will be after \$11 billion has been spent. If you answer one question in this letter, answer that one.

Minister David Eby just sent out an impressively detailed "personal" letter of rationalization which rested heavily upon a lot of accounting arcana. I freely confess I do not fully understand macro-accounting principles so I cannot say whether there is any truth or necessity to his sad conclusions. Better-qualified people than myself say the numbers are wrong or wild guesses at unknowns. They say your accounting advice is nonsense. But at least some numbers and reasoning are now out where we have a chance to evaluate them, whether we are for or against Site C. What struck me was that Minister Eby presented so

much detail about the reasoning behind the decision. . . . Long pause. . . . . Why now? Why did government not offer that level of detail and insight long before now? Why must your rationale be explained only after the fact? All we got beforehand were empty generalizations. We were lulled and reassured that the decision would be "good for BC" or "the right thing". But no reasoning at all. None. I listened to "NDP insider" Moe Sihota boost the Site C dam on CBC radio the other day. He repeated the phrase "the right thing" so many times that I thought he was chanting a mantra or trying to hypnotize his listeners.

If the NDP, Liberals, Conservatives, or Greens were required to answer a skill-testing question before they could take office, for example, to add two plus two, they would all come up with the same number, four. But they wouldn't all govern in the same manner. The true nature of a party's principles is not found in the numbers they trot out but in moral choices, in whether they really do the right thing.

## Enough.

Now that you've had some practice at making one hard Site C decision, here is another difficult decision you must make. Apologize, change your minds, and do the right thing. I know you and your cohort are receiving a great deal of negative response to this decision. It is probably especially painful because much of it is coming not from the rejoicing Liberals, but from betrayed former NDP supporters. Many are in deep shock but they will get around to expressing their thoughts soon enough. It is only natural that you will feel personally slighted and hurt and probably resentful. I am truly sorry you have to endure this agonizing experience. If any of my own words have been hurtful I apologize. But I sure won't shut up.







To everyone's surprise, however, your government held yet more consultations, and decided to complete Site-C for a *new* reason, namely, that the increased Government debt from cancellation would crowd out resources needed for promised social expenditures.

This is nonsense. To take the most egregious example, your government is keeping its promise to eliminate tolls on the Fraser bridges. #### Dear George:

No doubt the positive Site 'C' decision was difficult for the Horgan cabinet to make given the pressures on both sides, your own understanding of environmental losses, the near certainty of significant cost over-runs and the uncertainty of future demand and prices for electricity.

For all that, I remain concerned that the government's choice will be undermined by events as they unfold. I was reminded of this earlier today with the announcement that:

"The Alberta Electricity System Operator has set up a Renewable Electricity Program to encourage the development of 5,000 MW of utility-scale renewables by 2030. This first round of the program was a competitive process where renewable developers bid for 20-year contracts. Four projects, totalling 595 MW, won with a weighted average price of \$37/MWh (equivalent to 3.7 ¢/kWh). This is lower than the cost of gas-fired electricity, even at today's very low natural gas prices. And of course it is cheaper than coal with CCS (estimated at 14 ¢/kWh for Boundary Dam in Saskatchewan."

As noted, Alberta's projected cost/prices are lower than would result from natural gas generation and lower than the likely cost of Site 'C' electricity. Moreover, this development adds weight to the argument that if Alberta and adjacent US markets are successful with their alternative energy projects, any BC surplus electricity will either have no export market or will be sold at a significant loss.

Rapidly changing technology and markets also lend credibility to concerns that as other jurisdictions forge ahead with 21st century energy technologies and the development of the associated highly-skilled human capital, BC will be held back by over-investment in 19th Century technology (and a possible white elephant) and a relatively under-skilled energy sector labour force.

As you know, a lot of BC citizens share these concerns and are anxious to see whether our government will be flexible enough to respond creatively to events as they unfold.

#### Letter from NDP4LEAP

## Dear Premier Horgan,

Allow us to introduce ourselves. We are New Democrats for Leap, and passionate proponents of climate justice, with supporters across the country. When our party was elected to government in British Columbia, we were thrilled and assumed that this stunning victory would be a big boost to the reframing of the NDP as the party of ecological and climate justice.

We are well aware of the ecological and financial mess that the very right wing Liberal government left you with. But we anticipated that you would act courageously to renounce the wrong-headed and destructive path of Christy Clark. While campaigning in the provincial election, you made serious criticisms about the negative effects of building the Site C dam. You challenged Clark's support for this project noting huge financial overruns and worrisome geotechnical challenges (tension cracks where the dam is being built)—neither of which has gone away.

Please understand our outrage over the claim that accepting the logic of having to continue with this project because of money already spent by a corrupt Liberal government could ever justify the violation of Indigenous rights. The UN Committee on the Ending of Racial Discrimination expressed its concern over the violation of First Nations rights when it recommended the halting of the dam project until a full review of its effects on Indigenous land, in this case, treaty land, could be carried out. The panel urged Canada to "identify alternatives to irreversible destruction of Indigenous lands." The area to be flooded, over 80 kilometres of forest and 7000

acres of highly productive agricultural land, also contains the burial grounds of First Nations people. Moreover, the dam site has been a fruitful source of ancient archaeological finds that remain to be explored. That valuable historical information will be lost forever with the flooding of the valley.

It is wrong to accept the advice of KPMG, which typically places private sector profits before considerations of social and ecological harm. It is our understanding that the independent review carried out by the BC Utilities Commission confirmed that there are less destructive alternatives for energy generation which, despite the money already spent, may still prove cheaper in the long run. We also appreciate the huge financial consequences of proceeding with a project, plagued with cost overruns, that appears to be heading to a bill that would exceed \$11 billion. This expense would deplete the provincial treasury and divert investment from cheaper renewable energy sources such as geothermal, solar, and wind. The City of Richmond already exploits geothermal energy resulting in considerable generation. These alternatives would not only be more cost effective, they would generate thousands of new jobs, jobs which would not destroy waterways, fish, bird, and animal habitat, and the traditional lands of indigenous peoples. B.C. needs employment opportunities but it is faulty thinking to assume Site C is the only choice for jobs in the renewable sector. In fact, it's the worst choice. The 2500 jobs now offered by this project come with a formidable price-tag, not only to the public, but to the integrity of a government that pledged to protect the environment and indigenous rights.

We are aware that some First Nations have signed impact benefit agreements with B.C. Hydro over Site C, and we respect that they have negotiated items they deem important to their communities. But we have to ask—in this relationship of asymmetrical power—how much choice do communities lacking resources actually have? Why would an NDP government give credence to agreements that inherently ravage indigenous land when much better arrangements can be developed over smaller, gentler, truly green energy projects that leave traditional use of the land intact?

Flooding a massive area of land used for farming and First Nations cultural use, including burial plots, is surely a Faustian bargain, which will cause us to lose our soul as social justice folks in the end.

What you do has an impact on our party across provinces and at the federal level. When you act well on behalf of Indigenous people and environmental protection, you inspire all of the Party. When you fail, we all fail. We are aware and we do not forget that you, as Premier, have previously acknowledged that flooding the Peace River Valley would violate rights protected by Treaty 8 and the Canadian Constitution. This issue has never been addressed or resolved. This is no small matter. We are deeply disheartened that you have failed to part ways with the disgraceful traditions of previous and current governments which routinely violate the rights of Indigenous peoples. We urgently need our party to break with this horrible history, and pattern of betrayal. We call on you and your government to keep its promise to respect Indigenous rights and promote reconciliation, not just in some places, but everywhere in BC including the Peace River Valley. We also call on you and your government to guarantee uninterrupted employment for workers already employed in the dam

construction and for new First Nations workers by turning to investment in renewable energy sources which do not destroy the Peace Valley ecology.

Mr Horgan,

I was very disappointed to hear of your government's approval of the continued construction of the Site C Dam on Monday!! While I recognize that it was a very difficult decision to make given the position you were put in by the previous government your government clearly made the wrong decision. In fact, your decision during the last election campaign to not declare your intention to cancel the project if elected, appears to be a distinctly cynical, jaded political move designed to avoid opposition from the Liberals and people working on the dam while giving the appearance that you would consider the findings of the Utilities Commission and act on them.

Well, on Monday afternoon I listened to Robert McCullough, a member of the expert advisory panel which presented to your caucus recently on the BCUC report, on CBC Radio. He stated that in your announcement of the continuation of the Site C project, you, "almost completely ignore" recommendations made by the panel. So much for evidence-based decision making! McCullough went on to state that the BCUC found there was "no cost advantage to proceeding" with the dam. In fact, the cost of equivalent renewable energy compared to the remaining cost of the dam, according to Mr. McCullough, is about half (and continues to decrease). Perhaps most importantly, he told listeners, that, contrary to your statements, a large Hydro rate increase would not result from cancellation of the project, because the amortization period of the loan to finance the dam is 70 years. 

The government appointed environmental impact assessment concluded that the impact of allowing the Dam project to go forward would be severe, permanent and irreversible. So much would be irretrievably lost. **Please protect what is there and should remain.** 

There is no justification for the completion of the Dam.

Even considering the amount already spent, continuing the project offers little or no financial benefit to the province when compared with other, less destructive alternatives. This view is supported by the findings of the recent independent review by the BC Utilities Commission.

A new strategy for energy conservation and development is needed.

The Federal and provincial governments acknowledge that they never even considered whether the Dam was compatible with their Treaty obligations to First Nations under Treaty 8. Their approval was unjust.

Attorney General Eby and Environment Minister Heyman:

Given the urgency of this matter I am corresponding by e-mail.

Your collective Cabinet decision to complete Site C yesterday was justified primarily on the basis, "that if we abandoned the Site C project, we would incur an immediate \$3-4bn public charge on either hydro ratepayers or BC taxpayers."

This statement is not true.

Please refer to attached memorandum from Robert McCullough.

Our independent energy expert, Robert McCullough also addressed this matter in his presentation to you at Cabinet on November 30th, 2017.

You apparently received other technical analysis and/or legal advice (which we have never seen) that contradicts Mr. McCullough's expert advice to you.

Your Cabinet then proceeded to rely on this pivotal advice as the basis to complete Site C without first contacting Mr. McCullough to resolve this key difference.

Please note that Mr. McCullough offered after the cabinet meeting to meet

with your officials to review any questions they may have had regarding his presentation. They never did.

Accordingly, your collective Cabinet decision to complete Site C is without legitimacy and without justification.

We call on you and your colleagues in Cabinet and Caucus to publicly release the detailed, un-redacted, information and advice and analysis on which you based this finding regarding a \$3-4bn public charge on either hydro ratepayers or BC taxpayers from the cancellation of Site C.

Further, we call on you and your colleagues in Cabinet and Caucus to provide Robert McCullough a full, fair, open and transparent opportunity to meet with you and your colleagues to respond to this asserted, and unproven, reason for continuing Site C.

We request a response to the above forthwith and further that remobilization of Site C construction be placed on hold pending the requested meeting and further consideration by Cabinet and Caucus of this issue.

Mr. Eby stated that "that if we abandoned the Site C project, we would incur an immediate \$3-4bn public charge on either hydro ratepayers or BC taxpayers." It is unfortunate that Mr. Eby received incorrect information, but Mr. Eby's best path would have been to check with the BCUC for guidance on standard regulatory practice.

I gather that Mr. Eby was unaware that the BCUC calculations had set amortization periods for the sunk costs and the reclamation expenses. The analysis assumed a seventy-year amortization period for the sunk costs of \$2.1 billion. They also assumed a thirty-year amortization period for the reclamation costs. In passing, their estimate of the reclamation costs was quite a bit higher than the evidence. Both BC Hydro and Deloitte forecasted costs in the \$1 to \$1.2 billion range.

Regulatory practice puts the amortization of prudently undertaken utility investments as an issue in the purview of the regulatory commission. An Order in Council can direct the BCUC to choose different amortization periods, but this would simply be an exercise in self-inflicted pain.

If an asset is recognized by regulators as an earning asset, the usual

policy would be to write it down on the same schedule as that set by the regulatory commission. Again, the Cabinet can choose to accelerate the depreciation of an earning asset, but this would be a second way to cause their constituents injury.

It appears from Mr. Eby's letter that he believes that the financing of the \$2.1 billion sunk costs has been held in abeyance. This is a curious belief. British Columbia has a continuous financing program designed to balance cash requirements and cash inflows. These needs drive the province's issuance of bonds. The province has already spent the \$2.1 billion dollars and the cash has been disbursed. The cash is found through taxes and the sale of bonds. For a long-term capital asset like Site C, the province would normally issue thirty-year bonds which, indeed, is what the province has done.

Mr. Eby has also raised a concern that Moody's (the only bond rating firm that has expressed concerns about BC Hydro's unusual finances) would react negatively to the recovery of the \$2.1 billion. Regulatory recovery of the costs of termination is a very common practice in the utility business and is addressed in every utility's annual report. However, the proposed solution is to propose spending \$8 billion more an asset that could be replaced for only \$4 billion. This, indeed, may concern the bond raters and has been a factor in the downrating of the two provinces - Manitoba and Newfoundland - who have followed the proposed path.

### As I concluded recently:

BC's triple A rating was just confirmed and will not be downgraded by cancelling Site C. BC is already financing the \$2.1 billion in sunk costs with 30-year bonds at a cost of \$57 million per year, not \$300-400 million per year. Even if the inflated \$1.8 billion in termination costs are added, cancelling Site C will save ratepayers at least \$266 million/year or \$123/household in 2024.

If Mr. Eby and his colleagues wish amplification, I am a willing volunteer.

Three reasons why the BC government must stop Site C.

1. The social and environmental impacts will be devastating.

Because of the massive scale of other resource development in northeast BC, including mining, logging and oil and gas development, the Peace River Valley is one of the few remaining places in the region where Indigenous peoples can still practice their cultures and traditions. Flooding the Peace River Valley will have a devastating impact on First Nations hunting, fishing and the gathering of berries and plant medicines. These are activities that are central to Indigenous identity and which continue to play a crucial role in the health and sustenance of Dunne-Zaa and Cree families in northeast BC. The government-appointed environmental impact assessment concluded that the impacts would be severe, permanent and irreversible. This is in addition to the destruction of grave and numerous cultural sites dating back hundreds and thousands of years, as well as the loss of small farms that have been maintained for generations.

2. There's no justification for this needless destruction.

The province needs to invest in the long term needs of the people of northeast BC where social services and infrastructure have been neglected for too long. The SIte C dam is simply not the way to do it. On November 1, a government-appointed economic review concluded that even with the money already spent on Site C, continued construction offers little or no financial benefit to the province when compared with other, less destructive alternatives. Furthermore, in some scenarios, halting Site C could actually mean a considerable saving for the province, freeing up potential for more sustain investments in the province's future. Either way, it's clear that the destruction of Indigenous land and livelihoods is unnecessary and that the province could benefit Indigenous and non-Indigenous people alike through a new strategy for energy conservation and development.

3. Completing the Site C dam would be a blow to reconciliation with First Nations.

There's good reason why international human rights standards, including the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, require the free, prior and informed consent of Indigenous peoples on serious decisions such as resource development on their territories. History tells us that if Indigenous peoples don't have a real seat at the table, their rights will be swept aside. This is exactly what happened with the approval of the Site C dam. The federal and provincial governments have acknowledged that they never even considered whether the dam was compatible with their Treaty obligations, despite the many serious concerns expressed by Treaty 8 First Nations. Approval of the project under these circumstances was unjust. Allowing the decision to stand would be a further injustice. In contrast, stopping Site C is an important opportunity to send a message to all British Columbians and all Canadians that the lives, cultures and economies of First Nations matter.

## Statement from Grand Chief Stewart Phillip on Human Rights Day

(Unceded Coast Salish Territory / Vancouver, B.C. – December 10, 2017) December 10 is the day 70 years ago in 1948 when the United Nations adopted the Universal Declaration of Human Rights officially recognizing that "all human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights." In 2007 144 states voted in favour of the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UN Declaration). The Harper Government was one of four states to vote against the UN Declaration. The Trudeau Government formally endorsed the UN Declaration in 2010.

Grand Chief Stewart Phillip, President of the Union of BC Indian Chiefs (UBCIC) issued the following statement to mark the United Nations' Human Rights Day:

"Indigenous Rights are human rights. On the 70th Anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights we call on federal, provincial and municipal governments to truly commit to the true spirit and intent of the UN Declaration as a fundamental international human rights instrument to advance human rights for Indigenous peoples as a framework for justice and reconciliation.

"Canada's own legal and constitutional frameworks must adapt to the UN Declaration, especially Indigenous peoples' free, prior and informed consent (FPIC) based on our inherent and inalienable rights pursuant to our Indigenous laws and authorities. FPIC is the right to say yes and the right to say no to development on our lands and territories in order to safeguard the land and waters for future generations.

"It is crucially important our inherent Title, Rights and Treaty Rights are recognized and affirmed in all processes Canada and BC engages in with Indigenous peoples. When our inherent Title, Rights and Treaty Rights are entirely disregarded or domestically diluted, governments are liable.

"We gratefully acknowledge today is also the 5th Anniversary of the Idle No More movement and December 11 will be the 20th Anniversary of the historic Delgamuukw/Gisday'wa Supreme Court Decision. We raise our hands in appreciation to the leadership of the hereditary Chiefs and grassroots for their continuing fight for our human rights.

"In closing, we call on Premier Horgan to remember the members of Treaty 8 who are defending their land and way of life against BC Hydro's destructive Site C project. In the spirit of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the UN Declaration, their Treaty 8 rights are human rights."

The original review panel stated this dam wasn't needed. The B.C. Utilities Commission has concluded that this dam does not need to be built to meet the energy needs of the province. I urge you strongly to approve the Site C dam. My views are based on the following:

- 1. With the drive to replace carbon-based energy, electricity needs will increase significantly in the short, medium- and long-terms.
- 2. Hydro power is the perfect complement to the interruptible power of virtually all current, proven "green" power technology. The water storage capability of hydro power is a "battery" storing power to be used when interruptible power sources are low. I am not convinced of the storage capacity of other forms of power.
- 3. The true cost, at this point, is the total estimated cost minus the amount already spent and the additional costs of suspension or termination of the project. On that basis, the project must be considered economical, particularly when one considers the long lifespan of a hydro electric generating facility such as Site C.
- 4. I have little confidence in both the pace of development of alternative sources of "green" power or their net green benefits over hydro power. Nor do I believe the total environmental impact of Site C is greater than the total environmental impact of other forms of renewable energy, such as wind or solar power when one includes all the environmental impact of production of the equipment, sourcing of the materials required, construction and operation. Recognize also, that the lifespan of these alternatives is significantly shorter than that of Site C, resulting in environmental impacts each time one of these alternative sources is replaced.
- 5. From my own knowledge and that of acquaintances, there is not a significant impact of Site C on agriculture in British Columbia. First, the land lost to agriculture is, for the most part, not the best food-producing land. Second, we do not have a shortage of agriculture land for food production. The Peace River area itself has a significant high-quality land base capable of producing food. Third, a source of water for irrigation is the foundation of significantly greater food production. The storage capacity of the reservoir can serve as that source of water.

I believe the opposition to Site C is driven by ideological considerations. I trust your decision will reflect sound, unbiased analysis.

There will be some uncertainty, at this point, regarding the total cost and expected completion date. However, that does not change my view that the project should proceed without any further delay.

I do not envy your choice around Site C, given the current build state of the project left to you by the Liberals. The abandonment costs are certainly large, however the prospect of cost overruns are very real

Even if completed to the original budget, the installed costs from Site C are very high relative to other options available in 2017.

I am writing to you primarily to emphasize that dams are old technology, with little economic benefits beyond the employment created in their massive construction. Their lead times are huge, creating the large financial uncertainty you have found associated with generation starting many years from now. New technology, including wind and distributed stograge, can be deployed incrementally as require with short lead times. They are also associated with products and services that can be developed and demonstrated domestically and then exported around the world.

In 2017, BC should be using our heritage Hydro assets, with their inherent flexibility, to build new industries that will benefit BC jobs and economic growth into the future. There are myriad technologies BC could develop that would lead to exportable skills and tech, including for example development of new renewable generation, demand response methods to integrate electric vehicles, and distributed stograge. Pursuing these opportunities will have far greater ongoing associated jobs and economic activity than building 1970s era dam technology as we decarbonize our energy system. Moreover the local, positive development of these resources with private partners taking on the risk, as well as positive First Nations development of their resources, is the best path to follow in terms of social license and fiscal prudence.

I urge you to consider these points and frame a decision to abandon the Site C project, that is highly likely to have massive cost overruns, in the context of positioning BC as a leader again in climate change mitigation by encouraging private investment in BC to develop, test and deploy these new technologies. Not to stay the course with an old and expensive technology that has little value beyond the current heavy construction jobs and that was predicated on the pipe dream of justifying an LNG electrification option. Give BC Hydro and the Ministry of Energy and Mines new directives to create an innovative environment for these new technologies, and thereby turn BC into a hub of innovation in this emerging space. s.22 However, due to the anti-community based renewable policies of the previous government and now yours, I am forced to seriously consider relocation from British Columbia. s.22 s.22 . It has become increasingly clear be it from the planned end of

the carbon neutrality mandate to proceeding with Site C, that there are few opportunities in British Columbia for the foreseeable future.

It is disappointing that your government put the interests of big labour and an entrenched public sector bureaucracy at BC Hydro ahead of the public interest. It would have been far more cost effective to cancel the project, and use alternative low-carbon generation sources. Unlike Site C, these projects would not require the additional 6 billion plus capital expenditure upfront but would also prevent the negative cash flow from generating power to be sold at a loss. As any profits from the project would occur far in the future, I see no compelling financial case for this generation approach.

Even if a mass electrification of society were to occur over the next half century, a prudent investment strategy would be to spread out the capital investment in line with demand growth. Due to availability of alternative lower cost generation sources such as a sixth turbine at Revelstoke, wind projects in the southern interior, Vancouver Island and North Coast, there is no rational justification for the project.

The BC Utilities commission has said it does not make sense economically, the Peace region has already experienced significant impact from Hydro-electric power and other industrial impacts, and there is no market for the power. This is not to mention the very real concerns of indigenous groups in the area and their ability to materially exercise their treaty rights. The area also has moderate agricultural potential with the ability to meet the vegetable (not entire dietary) needs of around 1 million people.

Thank you for your attention to this matter. As someone who has spend considerable amounts of time studying renewable and other low-carbon energy systems, I highly recommended cancellation. There is a lot more political capital to be gained in putting small biomass power plants as sawmills and pulp mills than one big project in a very conservative part of the province.

BC needs your government to be looking towards the province's long term best interests, and you should not be supporting the Site C project for the following particular reasons:

- Site C is unanimously opposed by the First Nations who are most directly
  affected, and would destroy their ancestral territory and sacred sites. When
  the Federal Government is finally saying (after only 70 years...) that it will
  approve the UN's Universal Declaration of Human Rights, it ill becomes other
  levels of government to not do so as well. Respecting First Nations is in any
  case simply the right thing to do.
- It is unconscionable to destroy a whole river valley ecosystem for no immediate or urgent need; any need for power is short term in comparison with the long term need for that food-producing agricultural land, which would be lost forever if the project goes ahead.
- This issue has province-wide, and in fact planet-wide significance, and should not be decided exclusively on the basis of local interests. Most of the project's benefits to the local area would be short term, limited largely to the construction period.
- It seems quite likely the costs of the Site C project would continue to
  escalate, and who knows what the final cost would be. The past 'investment' in
  the project is not an adequate reason to continue it; any accountant will advise
  you that cutting your losses is often a wise thing to do, and in any case, much
  of the spending on the project has already been beneficial to local residents,
  and would not be a waste.
- BC is fortunate in having abundant fresh water resources, but huge dams are early 20th technology. Alternative energy sources are becoming increasingly feasible, and will become more so if we invest in them, as the BC Utilities Commission report points out. There is no reason jobs cannot be provided from this field rather than from dam construction, and enlightened leadership from your government would go a long way towards making that happen.

Letting the Site C project continue would clearly align your government with Cristy Clark's Liberals, which you have spent a lot of time and energy trying to deny. Please keep your eye on the

John Horgan, Premier of BC.

Dear Premier:

s.22 , I've followed Site C for years. I urge your government to cancel this badly-flawed, financially risky project. Cancellation should create more jobs, not less.

Below is a bullet list after this short intro.

Mainstream media primarily gives the Liberal perspective on Site C. It's usually framed as 'Pros of Proceeding and Cons of Cancelling'.

Cost distortions play a big part. Cost of proceeding is usually understated [eg \$8.8B though trends imply at least \$11-12B. Cancellation costs are over-stated [[eg West Moberley Chief Willson's estimate of \$500 million remediation vs \$1.8 B, which exceeds BC Hydro's estimate]. As well, assets such as highway work are miscounted as a cancellation cost.

Another cause of media distortion is omission of factors weakening the case for proceeding. And the financials alone are enough reason to cancel Site C.

#### Cons of Proceeding with Site C

- \*Tension cracks, possibly enhanced by nearby fracking, would increase direct costs and pose flood risks.
- \* High risk of over-runs mean Site C could cost \$12 Billion-plus
- \*Likely credit downgrade over Site C / Hydro debt [with financial and political consequences]
- \*Lost farmland potential for future jobs and food as our climate changes.
- \*Cost [financial and political] of fighting First Nations lawsuit[s]. A government loss would either raise costs or risk project closure at a later stage.
- \*Cost of Site C power would exceed the costs of future alternative projects due to plummeting costs for, eg, solar, wind and storage batteries.

[While not financial, fallout would be heavy with part of the NDP base, Greens [potential NDP voters] and First Nations. The satisfaction of Liberals and part of the NDP base would turn to blame when rising Site C costs affect Hydro rates, taxes and BC's credit rating. On finances alone, the NDP would be forever tainted by Site C.]

#### Pros of Cancelling Site C

\*BC's alternate energy sector would grow instead of shrinking due to Site C's market effect.

\*More jobs [upgrading existing dams and alternative energies] since they net out above Site C jobs. More jobs, longer-lasting jobs, better spread throughout BC. [It would help the NDP if this was explained by private-sector energy experts.]

\*Cheaper energy for Hydro users. [In Abu Dhabi and Chile, solar slid under 3 cents k/wh last year. This year, that price-cut reached the US, eg Tucson Electrical Power's 20-year contract with NextEra.

\*Financial, structural and legal risks [see above] are avoided.

Premier Horgan, based on energy/finance trends plus the factors listed above, cancellation is the wisest and safest choice.

This would take leadership. But compared to proceeding, cancellation holds more upside for BC [and the NDP] and far less risk.

I urge your government to take the path you would have chosen in the first place.

The NDP I believe in would use dam upgrades and clean energies - not a controversial, financially risky mega-project.

The NDP I believe in would maximize sustainable jobs, protect the environment and minimize financial risk.

Subject: On Drowning the Peace

Dear NDP MLAs,

#### **Excuses**

Here's the first thing that I can't get past regarding your decision to drown the Peace: I just don't believe the reasons you've given for doing so.

Political activists come to understand there is a difference between the truth: the facts as known by those who have educated themselves on an issue, and the "party line": the story told by politicians to the less informed to make the party's actions palatable while not revealing their real reasons.

As you know, Site C is a dam to nowhere. It will perpetuate an outdated grid-dependent infrastructure, and produce energy that we won't need for years – if ever – at far higher production costs than sales costs.

The party line tells us that we must go ahead with the dam anyway. It says there is nothing to show for the officially estimated \$4 Billion of "sunk" costs to shut down the dam project. So in order to maintain our credit rating, those costs would have to be paid at a more punitive rate than the \$10.7 Billion officially (I, personally, am forecasting \$12 to \$15 Billion) estimated to complete it.

But those who have been encouraging you to save the Peace note that much of the infrastructure built for Site C is already an asset; that the estimated \$2 Billion to repair the mess would probably be closer to the \$336 Million spent on a similar dam amelioration in the US; that the BC Utilities Commission report assumed that termination costs would be amortised over a 30 year period, making the impacts on ratepayers negligible; and that while the cost of not completing the dam won't impact our credit rating, completing the dam might.

I'd be hopeful that you might change your minds based on these comments, but I also note that some of you have doubled down on your story and have been doing the party line dance in the media.

I am sadly and personally familiar with the processes of cooption. I recognise it's unlikely that you will change your opinion now that you've committed yourselves to it to this degree.

Nevertheless, the Peace Valley Landowners' Association has asked the Auditor General for an emergency review of your decision, to see which of the duelling economists are right.

Hopefully we will know soon.

If not the reasons given then why? Because we don't believe the party line, many long term political activists have speculated on the real reasons for your decision.

Some think, for example, that with the launching of a new bidding process, it's a gift to the unions and NDP insider lobbyists.

I believe Site C will be used as an excuse to ignore the science on the environmental impacts of fracking, so that the stranded power from Site C can be used by the LNG industry as the Liberals planned.

I can't even begin to express how strongly I hope to be proven wrong on this.

#### **Ethics**

Regardless of whether I'm right about all of the above or none of it however, here's the other thing I can't get past: I see no ethical difference between Trudeau's decision to allow Kinder Morgan to put BC's economy and environment at risk "for the good of Canada", and the NDP's decision to destroy First Nations' and other landowners' property "for the good of BC".

Only in a state of dire emergency does a government have the moral right and horrible duty to make decisions that benefit one set of people at the expense of another. Site C is not that emergency.

As for your plans to ameliorate the harm you are doing – well – you just can't make up for the loss of traditional lands by relocating folks and the graves of their ancestors.

Sacred ground simply isn't interchangeable.

Because, and only because, of my personal loyalty to Doug Routley and Leonard Krog, I've been trying to decide what, if anything, would help me move past this betrayal of human and environmental rights to make it possible for me to continue to support your party.

Maybe, I thought, if you impose a moratorium on fracking? Or maybe if you do that and force fin fish farms out of the ocean? Or maybe if you do those things and stop Kinder Morgan? Or maybe all of the above plus forcing mining corporations to clean up their messes and start following the law? And fix BC Hydro. And fix the ferries. And ...

But none of those things take me past your imperialist decision to destroy First Nations' beloved and sacred lands – their national heritage – "for the good" of Settler society.

I promised all of you when you were considering Site C that if you went ahead with the dam to nowhere I would send my NDP donations to the West Moberly and Prophet River First Nations to help with their court case against your government. I have done that.

But since the Dec. 11 decision, I've also struggled with whether I can support the NDP in any way - S.22 S.22

Here's what I've decided: when all the First Nations of the Peace forgive the NDP for what's been done to their homelands, I'll go back to supporting the party.

As for how – or whether – I will vote in the next election, it's too early to say.

I'll just have to see whether this ends up being the last time your government betrays the trust I had that you would be different from the previous one.

Sadly, given my surmise above about the fracking review, and from the sounds of what's on the table regarding the BC Ferries review, I suspect it won't be.

Dear Premier John Horgan,

Having heard your government's decision to carry on with this project I now believe our province ought to move forward on a variety of initiatives to encourage the use of the resulting future increase of available electricity. One such is the sale of that power into the continental grid - particularly to Alberta. Another is, as I believe I heard discussed by a representative of your government, the elimination of tier 2 residential rates - those which curtail demand due to high costs particularly from those folks who have electric baseboard heating in the interior. Another is the now slowly growing source of demand by electric vehicles so that when the extra power becomes available BC can take full advantage.

As I understand, there are now available some purchase incentives for BC citizens to use when buying a new electric vehicle or plug-in hybrid. Having family in Ontario discussing this type or program I can't help but think there is room for our province to increase the amount of incentives subject to a sliding scale based on purchase price and capped at a reasonable sum. Commercial vehicles could be a great addition to the incentive program. Also to have a further modest increase in demand for electricity it would seem that if incentive programs were expanded to include electric bicycles and scooters more folks, especially us seniors, would buy such units.

While there have been many positive announcements made by your admiinstration recently, I think I am correct in recalling one directed towards getting additional charging facilities for electric vehicles. It relates to the sale of electric power by other than licenced utilities. Hopefully this means that auto service stations, RV campsites, motels, restaurants and more will soon be able to install the necessary infrastructure so as to service customers who want their electric vehicle charged while travelling. I recognize that for northern communites there may not be much additional hardware to be installed as many already have plug-ins for customers so as to keep their engine blocks, transmissions and batteries warm when the vehicle is parked but in the south and on the islands more is needed.

In that regard it appears to me that an early start on high speed charger installation would get BC to the point of being able to offer electric vehicle customers the necessary charging speed to quickly top up and be on their way anywhere in the more populated areas of BC. No doubt there would be many interested municipalities who, with a matching grant, would be interested in getting this kind of infrastructure construction program going. In my view, as few as 100 such stations in larger municipalities could handle demand for the southern half of our province.

Lastly, I think this kind of approach could be successfully marketed to US tourists. Instead to the Schwarzenegger/Campbell hydrogen highway why not the Brown/Horgan electric highway?

Thank you for your attention. It's once again an exciting time to live here in Metro Vancouver with your government actually fulfilling the promises made in the last election!

PS. While I have voted for Green candidates vying for a seat at all 3 levels of government for many years, my faith in your approach was such that a vote for Morgane Oger seemed best this year. It still does.

Thank you for taking the time to share your views with me about the future of the Site C dam. I appreciate the active participation from British Columbians on this issue and want to assure you that I listened and heard your concerns.

As you are most likely aware, we have made the difficult decision to proceed with Site C. The project should never have been started, but we cannot change the previous government's mistakes. To do anything but move forward would require British Columbians to take on \$4 billion in debt that would have to result in massive cuts

to the services people count on us to deliver. After witnessing the legacy of BC Liberal cuts, I can't allow that to happen again.

I understand that this may not have been the outcome you hoped for, and want to assure you that as this project continues, we will honour and respect the commitment demonstrated by those who oppose Site C and share in their determination to move British Columbia to a better future.

Our Government will address many of the concerns we heard from British Columbians throughout the province with a number of conditions and initiatives including:

- A new Project Assurance Board that will provide independent oversight to future contract procurement and management, project deliverables, environmental integrity, and quality assurance all within the mandate of delivering the project on time and budget. Based on current projections, BC Hydro has revised the budget to \$10.7 billion.
- Establishing new Community Benefits Programs mandated with ensuring that project benefits assist local communities, and increasing the number of apprentices and First Nations workers hired onto the project.
- Ensuring a Peace River Legacy Fund implements solutions to longer-term environmental, social and economic issues.
- A new BC Food Security Fund based on Site C revenues dedicated to supporting farming and enhancing agricultural innovation and productivity across British Columbia.
- Activating the \$20 million agricultural compensation fund to offset lost sales and stimulate long-term productivity enhancements in Peace Valley agriculture.

We recognize the significant impacts on Treaty 8 First Nations and that's why Honourable Scott Fraser, Minister of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation, and I met directly with Treaty 8 Leaders in their territory. Our Government and BC Hydro will work in partnership with Treaty 8 First Nations on measures to address their concerns, including a re-design of the Highway 29 re-alignment to reduce impact on potential burial sites and sacred places, and the establishment of a Treaty 8 project advisory committee. Further, we will ask BC Hydro to consider the development of a new procurement stream for smaller scale renewable electricity projects where First Nations are proponents or partners.

Our Government remains fully committed to meaningful reconciliation with Indigenous peoples - to working in partnership with all First Nations, and to implement the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. Once again, I want to thank you for your valuable perspective on this issue. I am committed to continuing a dialogue with all British Columbians as the project proceeds. Sincerely,

Dear Premier Horgan,

I write to you as Chair of the Peace Valley Solidarity Initiative ("PVSI"). On December 11, 2017, your Government announced it will be supporting the completion of the Site C dam and the flooding of the Peace River Valley, including the West Moberly First Nations territory, Prophet River First Nation territory and the homes of many others.

On November 1, 2017, the British Columbia Utilities Commission ("BCUC") submitted its Final Report to your Government's inquiry into Site C. This report concluded BC Hydro's forecast for future energy needs to be "excessively optimistic." It found that "increasingly viable alternative energy sources such as wind, geothermal and industrial curtailment could provide similar benefits to ratepayers as the Site C project." And it held the costs of termination and remediation to be approximately \$1.8 billion in addition to the costs of providing alternative sources of energy.

But while your Government has held the BCUC up to be an independent, impartial regulator and source of information for determining the future of Site C, your decision does not reflect their findings or conclusions. In contrast, despite a stated commitment to transparency, your Government's decision is based on information and advice to which no member of the public has access.

Indeed, in a blog post released on December 11, the Attorney General, David Eby, stated that after receiving BCUC's Final Report, your Government received "unambiguous advice" from financial experts that suggested concerns about BCUC's conclusions. Mr Eby goes on to state that your Government was told that the accounting models used by BCUC for determining the costs of alternatives to Site C were "dramatically different," and that abandoning Site C would actually cause hydro ratepayers or BC taxpayers to incur an immediate \$3-4 billion public charge. Along these lines, members of your Government have, since Monday, expressed concerns about the sacrifices that would have needed to have been made in order to cover this public charge.

With respect, without access to the information and advice you received, and in the face of significant amounts of contrary information and data received by your Government during its inquiry into Site C, we do not accept the justification offered for continuing with construction of Site C.

As such, we request that your Government release to the public by January 5th, 2018 all information and advice it received that led to your December 11th announcement, including but not limited to:

-the financial advice and analyses you received in response to BCUC's Final Report; -the accounting models used by your advisors to question BCUC's findings; -your analyses of the consequences of these accounting models on taxpayers and ratepayers; -the methods by which you incorporated the value of the Peace River Valley, First Nations territory, and homes that will be flooded into your decision and the above analyses; and -any other analysis, opinions, advice or data considered in reaching the final decision to continue construction of the Site C dam.

The construction of Site C represents regressive decision-making at a time when climate change, food security, and reconciliation should be top of mind for all British Columbians and our government. As such, we see the release of this information as integral to the accountability you owe to our province and its citizens.

The John Hart Dam in Campbell River is undergoing 1 billion dollars in seismic upgrades- 65 years after it was constructed. How much will be spent on maintenance of the Site C dam after it

is built? Will the 70 year mortgage on the dam be paid off before major retrofits and upgrades will be needed?

The fact is, the money we spend on this boondoggle is still wasted money even if we call it an "asset" and spread the pain over 70 years to BC Hydro ratepayers. It can be categorized as an asset, but that does not make it a good investment in the public interest. (BTW the 12 billion dollar asset will also be a 12 billion dollar liability on BC Hydro books)

Here is a question I would really like answered: What will be the total cost of the project including interest on the 70 year debt pay down and annual dam maintenance? David Eby said that taking on 3- 4 billion dollars in debt by cancelling the project would add debt servicing costs of 150—200 million dollars per year. What will the debt serving costs of 12 billion be over 70 years? Using David Eby's debt payment formula the annual interest payment on 12 billion dollars would be 450- 600 million annually? No matter if the debt shows up on the government or BC Hydro's books it is going to cost a lot more to pay off a 12 billion asset for Site C construction costs then a 4 billion dollar write it off.

How much power would BC Hydro be able to generate by setting aside 1 billion dollars worth of incentives for BC Hydro customers to install solar or wind? How many jobs would this create? s.22

who tell me that solar installations in the residential and commercial market would take off if there were incentives for BC Hydro customers to purchase solar and wind technology. Besides creating a lot of jobs, most of the capital investment comes from citizens and business. Not long term public debt. The cost of incentives for citizens to invest in solar and wind would be much lower than the debt servicing costs the province is going to incur for the next 70 years.

Site C is expected to increase hydro generation in the province by 8%. Many other countries such as Britain, Germany and the US have exceeded this already. In Canada Ontario is generation 15% from solar and wind. The public deserves a much better analysis of the total costs and benefits associated with building the dam vs cancelling site C and investing in solar/ wind.

A more deeper look at the reason for this "difficult decision" begs the question of who is in control here? The opinion of bond rating agencies seem to be more important than the long term interests of BC citizens? Are these not the same institutions that rated trillions of dollars of US sub prime mortgages as triple A and double A rated investments. We all know what happened- the economic crisis of 2008.

Future cost overruns for this project are a very real (and I think likely). The construction costs could well exceed what is budgeted due to geotechnical problems that have already added 2 billion in costs. What will be the consequences to the long term debt and total cost of the project if project costs come in 1,2 or 3 billion more? What will be the governments options if interest rates spike sometime in the future? I wonder how long it will be before BC hydro rates become more expensive than solar due to this additional debt load. What will happen when BC residents start to install solar and wind because it is cheaper than buying from BC Hydro? Who will pay the Site C 70 year debt then?

Did the costs of FN litigation get added into the costs of site C?

In the long run the cost to the tax payers and/ or BC Hydro customers makes going forward with Site C a BIG MISTAKe?

Then there are the other non economic reasons not to go forward with Site C:

FN reconciliation requires leadership and doing things differently, not just talk. Your governments choice on Site C sends a very clear message on your priorities- FN reconciliation is not a high priority.

Loss of ecologically significant lands, loss of farm land.

GHG emissions from all the concrete and other construction activity on the project and the methane that will be released due to flooding?

You have seriously undermined NDP support in the province from many of your long time supporters- and this when you have a razor thin hold on power! Your government has pushed cynicism to new heights. I am looking for inspired leadership that does not make business as usual decisions for (perceived) short term political gain and special interests at the expense of the public interest.

No more \$\$ or votes to the NDP from me. Looking forward to supporting any recall campaigns where a green candidate has a chance to throw out an incumbent NDP member who said they opposed Site C during the election.

# **An Open Letter to John Horgan** Premier of British Columbia

RE: Site C Dam

Dear Mr. Horgan,

The Mining Justice Alliance (MJA-Vancouver) and Canada-Philippines Solidarity for Human Rights (CPSHR) join the public outcry of British Columbians with your NDP government's appalling decision to continue the Site C dam operation.

Site C dam is an injustice, not only against the First Nations but in particular the Treaty 8 First Nations who are adversely affected by and oppose Site C.

As residents of the Unceded First Nations territory known as British Columbia, we understand that the Indigenous peoples' struggle for land and life in Canada, is just as important and equally as dire as it is in the Philippines and anywhere else in the world.

It would be impossible for us to demand justice for the thousands of Indigenous Filipinos in the Philippines who are currently fighting against corporate development projects, such as dams and large-scale mining, and not demand the same justice be done for the First Nations whose lives would be negatively impacted by the Site C.

We denounce the continuation of Site C and see your decision as a

betrayal to the First Nations people and to the people who believed in your party's promise of "making reconciliation a cross-government

priority." Reconciliation does not begin with the destruction of 13,000 hectares of ancestral First Nations domain, a prime agricultural land,

a place for hunting and fishing among other practices.

I write to you as Chair of the Peace Valley Solidarity Initiative ("PVSI"). On December 11, 2017, your Government announced it will be supporting the completion of the Site C dam and the flooding of the Peace River Valley, including the West Moberly First Nations territory, Prophet River First Nation territory and the homes of many others.

On November 1, 2017, the British Columbia Utilities Commission ("BCUC") submitted its Final Report to your Government's inquiry into Site C. This report concluded BC Hydro's forecast for future energy needs to be "excessively optimistic." It found that "increasingly viable alternative energy sources such as wind, geothermal and industrial curtailment could provide similar benefits to ratepayers as the Site C project." And it held the costs of termination and remediation to be approximately \$1.8 billion in addition to the costs of providing alternative sources of energy.

But while your Government has held the BCUC up to be an independent, impartial regulator and source of information for determining the future of Site C, your decision does not reflect their findings or conclusions. In contrast, despite a stated commitment to transparency, your Government's decision is based on information and advice to which no member of the public has access.

Indeed, in a blog post released on December 11, the Attorney General, David Eby, stated that after receiving BCUC's Final Report, your Government received "unambiguous advice" from financial experts that suggested concerns about BCUC's conclusions. Mr Eby goes on to state that your

Government was told that the accounting models used by BCUC for determining the costs of alternatives to Site C were "dramatically different," and that abandoning Site C would actually cause hydro ratepayers or BC taxpayers to incur an immediate \$3-4 billion public charge. Along these lines, members of your Government have, since Monday, expressed concerns about the sacrifices that would have needed to have been made in order to cover this public charge.

With respect, without access to the information and advice you received, and in the face of significant amounts of contrary information and data received by your Government during its inquiry into Site C, we do not accept the justification offered for continuing with construction of Site C.

As such, we request that your Government release to the public by January 5th, 2018 all information and advice it received that led to your December 11th announcement, including but not limited to:

- -the financial advice and analyses you received in response to BCUC's Final Report;
- -the accounting models used by your advisors to question BCUC's findings;
- -your analyses of the consequences of these accounting models on taxpayers and ratepayers;
- -the methods by which you incorporated the value of the Peace River Valley, First Nations territory, and homes that will be flooded into your decision and the above analyses; and
- -any other analysis, opinions, advice or data considered in reaching the final decision to continue construction of the Site C dam.

The construction of Site C represents regressive decision-making at a time when climate change, food security, and reconciliation should be top of mind for all British Columbians and our government. As such, we see the release of this information as integral to the accountability you owe to our province and its citizens.

Re: Present and Future Financial Impact on BC Ratepayers and Taxpayers of Completion vs. Cancellation of Site C

We are writing you on behalf of the Peace Valley Landowner Association and the Peace Valley Environment Association to request that you initiate an urgent examination pursuant to Section 13 or other applicable provision of the *Auditor General* Act to answer the following questions:

- a. Is the attached December 11th, 2017 memorandum prepared by McCullough Research correct? (Attached, below.)
- b. Is it true that if the BC government abandoned the Site C project, British Columbia would have no alternative but to incur an immediate \$3-4 billion public charge on either BC Hydro ratepayers or BC taxpayers? Please refer to the attached statement of Attorney General David Eby. (Attached, below.)
- c. What is the likely minimum cash impact on present and future BC Hydro ratepayers and BC taxpayers of completing Site C vs. cancelling Site C?
- d. What mitigation measures are available through policy, legislation or regulation to minimize the cashflow impact of cancellation of Site C on BC Hydro ratepayers or BC taxpayers?
- e. What viable options does the British Columbia government have to ameliorate the accounting (as opposed to cashflow) treatment of Site C cancellation costs?
- f. Is the best practice to exclude or include sunk costs when deciding whether or not to complete a project such as Site C?
- g. Should accounting treatment be the decisive factor when considering whether or not to complete a project such as Site C?
- h. Other questions you deem relevant to determining whether or not the BC government is acting in an effective, economic and efficient manner with respect to Site C.

This requested examination is in the public interest because the now \$10.7 billion Site C project is the largest capital infrastructure project in the history of BC and there is a fundamental difference of opinion on the potential financial impacts of moving forward with Site C vs. cancelling Site C.

These questions fit well within the overall terms of reference for your Site C dam review which we understand was placed on temporary hold pending the

outcome of the British Columbia Utilities Commission Site C Inquiry. The purpose of your review is summarized in the following way, "...explain to the legislature and the people of British Columbia the information and analysis provided to government, the progress and costs to date, and the potential impacts moving forward". In order to fully understand the potential financial impacts moving forward it is necessary to be able to compare those financial impacts to that of cancelling the project.

As an independent officer of the legislature, *all* British Columbians rely on your examinations and reports to be assured the British Columbia government is achieving its objectives effectively, economically and efficiently. At its core, the BC government is asserting that the only effective, economic, and efficient way to meet demand for electricity in the 2030's is to spend a further \$8.6 billion (assuming no further cost overruns) to complete Site C. And that effective government decision making requires that the accounting treatment of project costs is and should be the decisive factor.


Respectfully, we request that this matter be treated on an urgent basis. While this project is only 20 per cent complete, we understand that costs are incurred to the tune of \$60 million per month. Given the scope of the questions, the previous work completed by your office, and the inquiry recently completed by the British Columbia Utilities Commission, we are hopeful the interim results of your examination and responses to some, if not all, of the above questions will be publicly available in January 2018.
