Premier announces new school and more classrooms for Surrey students

SURREY – Nearly 1,000 students in Surrey's Grandview Heights area will enjoy brand-new classrooms in the near future, Premier John Horgan announced today.

The Province will fund a new, \$24-million elementary school in Grandview Heights, along with a 300-seat, \$9-million addition at Pacific Heights Elementary school.

"Kids deserve a positive, healthy learning environment so they can have the opportunity to thrive in their education and succeed in life," Premier Horgan said. "We're investing in our kids and working hard to build the schools and additional spaces that are desperately needed in growing communities around the province."

Construction is expected to begin at Pacific Heights in May 2018, and the new classrooms will be ready for students in September 2019. The new Grandview Heights elementary school is scheduled to open in the 2020-21 school year.

"My top priority is to focus on improving student outcomes in British Columbia, and learning environments are key to that," said Minister of Education Rob Fleming. "Getting kids out of portables remains my mission, and these new student spaces are doing just that."

This investment benefits families by giving children a chance to learn in a healthy, modern setting.

Enrolment forecasts for the Grandview Heights-area schools show a shortfall of more than 2,200 elementary seats in the next 10 years. Government is committed to getting students out of portables and into classrooms as quickly as possible.

"When our Premier committed to eliminate all portables in Surrey within four years, we were excited to see how that might unfold," said Surrey Board of Education chair Shawn Wilson. "Our board is thrilled to see our number 1 capital project – a new Grandview-South Surrey area elementary school – become a reality.

"I thank Pacific Heights Elementary students, staff and parents for their patience and expect they will be excited and relieved to know additional classrooms are coming and that the district can get on with construction. We are hopeful that this is only the first step in a detailed and aggressive capital plan from the ministry."

The new Grandview Heights elementary school, and the addition to Pacific Heights, will help to ease current and future enrolment pressures on nearby elementary schools, including Sunnyside, Rosemary Heights and Morgan.

To further reduce the use of portables in Surrey, the Province and the Surrey School District have established a project office to manage the city's large volume of capital projects.

Quick Facts:

- The new Grandview Heights elementary school will be built at 16650 23rd Ave. with a capacity for 655 students.
- The addition to Pacific Heights Elementary school will add 12 classrooms to that school.
- Both projects will be fully funded by the Government of British Columbia.
- These projects are in addition to the thousands of new seats currently being created for students in Surrey schools.
 - Work continues on the new 1,500-seat Salish Secondary, a new 1,500-seat
 Grandview Heights secondary, one new 605-seat Clayton-area elementary and one new 655-seat Clayton-area elementary.
 - Additions to Sullivan Heights, Panorama Park and Woodward Hill elementary schools also have been announced and will create up to a combined 600 new student seats.

Questions & Answers Additional student spaces in Surrey

December 7, 2017

Q: Why can't you fund all of the capital projects needed in Surrey right now?

- We have an ambitious capital plan that will make life better for British Columbians.
- We're going to build schools, hospitals, transit and transportation infrastructure in communities and create jobs in every corner of our province with \$14.6 billion in capital spending over three years.
- We are working to make sure students can learn in safe, healthy environments. The most urgent thing is to set a course for what expeditious, accelerated school construction looks like in Surrey.
- We also want to see the number of portables reduced as quickly as possible across the province, and this is a great step toward that goal.
- We have established a Project Office to manage the large volume of capital projects in Surrey to accommodate enrolment growth.
- We will work collaboratively with the City of Surrey and the school district to find solutions to speed up new school construction.

Q: Are you still forcing the school district to pay 50% of new school construction costs?

- The projects we are announcing today are fully funded by the Province.
- As one of B.C.'s fastest growing districts, we know it's critical that we find ways to speed up approvals and accelerate construction for Surrey schools.
- For future new schools, the Surrey School District will be required to fund 20% of the project costs this is a big win for students and families.
- We continue to work with the school district and the City of Surrey to identify actions each of us can take to accelerate projects and get students out of portables.
- I'm proud of the relationship we've built with the City of Surrey and the Surrey School District, and I look forward to seeing it grow.

Q: Why are you confining new school investment to Grandview Heights? What about the rest of Surrey?

- I recognize that there are many more projects in fast-growing communities in B.C. that we need to take care of. These are just the first steps.
- This area is growing at an extremely rapid pace, and we needed to take action to make sure we can make life better for students and their families.
- By creating these extra spaces, it eases enrolment pressures at other schools including Sunnyside, Rosemary Heights, Morgan and East Kensington elementary schools.
- We are also working on the new Salish Secondary and Grandview Heights secondary school, as well as two new Clayton area elementary schools and additions to Sullivan Heights, Panorama Park and Woodword Hill elementary schools.
- This is about more than investment dollars we are working the school district and the City of Surrey to find ways to accelerate capital projects.
- We have committed to eliminate the use of portables in Surrey schools in four years, and we are working diligently toward that goal.

Q: Will the ministry fund the district's capital plan of 22 projects, building new schools or expanding existing schools?

- We are working with the Surrey School District, and reviewing their capital plan, to create more spaces for students.
- We're open to changing policies that will allow us to spend and invest more quickly in getting new schools built, while at the same time ensuring that taxpayers are getting value for their investments.
- Right now, our focus is to get a lot more schools built more quickly.
- We're looking at how to do things differently than what has been done the past five to 10 years with reasonable policies that make sense not just for Surrey but for all of the growing school districts in the province.

Q: When will you fund the rest of the seismic upgrades that are needed in Surrey?

• The safety of students, teachers and support staff is our top priority.

- We have a goal to ensure every family in B.C. can send their children to seismically safe schools.
- We inherited a backlog of seismic projects that need to be expedited, and we are getting to work on that in Surrey and across the province.
- In Surrey, 75% of high-risk schools have had their upgrades completed.
- We are working with the Surrey School District to find ways to accelerate funding approvals and get to work on seismic upgrades.


Q: Will Government create a policy that states non-temporary portables will be funded through means other than the operating budget?

 We are looking at all of our options and working with the District to find ways to eliminate the use of portables in a way that best benefits students.

Q: There are hundreds of education assistant (EA) jobs left unfilled in Surrey. What will government do to make sure students are getting the support they need?

- School districts are very near the end of hiring over 3,500 full-time teachers, the largest hiring campaign of teachers in B.C.'s history.
- Filling specialist positions has historically been a challenge, not only in B.C. but in other provinces as well.
- We are also aware that the recent hiring has created pressures on Teachers Teaching on Call lists in some districts and districts are working to replenish those lists.
- That's why we appointed a task force of experts from the education sector to assess the current workforce challenges and bring back recommendations within the next six weeks on immediate actions we can take.
- We continue to monitor the situation and Make a Future, the recruitment support division of the BC Public School Employers' Association, continues to work with school districts to assist with their immediate recruitment requirements as well as the sector's long term workforce planning needs.

Background:

Government is investing \$24 million to build a new 655-seat elementary school in Surrey's Grandview Heights area, and \$9 million to build a 300-seat addition to the nearby Pacific Heights Elementary School.

The Surrey School Board, City of Surrey, local development community, and local residents have all expressed concern with the shortage of student space in Surrey.

Enrolment forecasts for Grandview Heights area schools indicate a shortfall of more than 2,207 elementary seats within the next 10 years. Government has committed to "get students out of portables and into classrooms by building new schools in fast-growing communities."

The Grandview Heights area elementary schools, including Pacific Heights Elementary, are collectively operating over capacity with a combined shortfall of 401 seats this year and a capacity utilization of 124%. The level of growth in the Grandview Heights area cannot be accommodated through additions, boundary changes, or program moves.

The new Grandview Heights elementary school, and the addition to Pacific Heights, will help to ease current and future enrolment pressures on nearby schools including Sunnyside, Rosemary Heights, Morgan and East Kensington elementary schools.

New Grandview Heights elementary school

This new school is needed to address rapid enrolment growth at nearby schools. The new school will be built to accommodate 655 students on district-owned property at 16650-23rd Avenue. It is scheduled to be open for the 2020/21 school year.

The school will be arranged into six learning communities of four to five classrooms each, gathered around common collaborative area in support of 21st Century learning.

Addition to Pacific Heights Elementary School

Pacific Heights Elementary accommodates kindergarten to Grade 7. The operating capacity of the school is 308 with an actual 2017/18 enrolment of 426 students, and a capacity utilization of 138%.

The 12-classroom, 300-seat addition to the school will reduce the need for portables in the future.

Construction on the addition is scheduled to begin in May2018 and be ready for students in September 2019.

Surrey schools

The Surrey School District currently has about 325 portables, up from about 270 last year.

These new investments are in addition to the thousands of seats currently under construction in Surrey schools. A new Grandview Heights Secondary and two new Clayton area elementary schools, as well as classroom additions at Sullivan Heights, Panorama Park and Woodword Hill elementary schools, have already been announced.

Work is underway on the 1,500-seat Salish Secondary, expected to be complete in fall 2018.

Growing student enrollment in Surrey continues to drive overcrowding and receive significant media attention. Since 2001, student enrollment has increased 18% – from 58,648 students to about 69,446 in 2015/16.

Recently, a summit was held in Surrey between Minister Rob Fleming and other ministry officials, as well as representatives from the City of Surrey and Surrey School District to discuss ways to accelerate new school construction to address space pressures.

A surrey parents group held a rally at Earl Marriott Secondary School on Oct. 28, 2017 with a message to Government to "build schools now."

Infrastructure and Capital Spending: Surrey

Capital spending in *Budget 2018* is expected to total \$26.2 billion over the three years of the plan (2018/19 to 2020/21), of which \$15.8 billion is for taxpayer-supported capital investments. The capital plan addresses key service and infrastructure priorities across the province and is built on the basis of affordable debt levels.

Provincial capital investments are made through school districts, health authorities, post-secondary institutions, Crown agencies and ministries. Capital funding is provided through a number of sources, including the provincial government, as well as the federal government, local governments and other third parties (e.g., private donors).

Capital projects located in Surrey that are underway:

<u>Health</u>

- Fraser Valley Cancer Centre in Surrey expansion of acute care unit chemotherapy area,
 \$8.0M (Provincial)
- Surrey Memorial Hospital Inpatient Psychiatric & Seclusion Room \$4.60M (provincial)

Housing

- BC Housing is providing \$15 million in capital funding for 50 transitional beds and 50 shelter beds for men and women who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless. The project is located at 14150 Green Timbers Way in Surrey.
- BC Housing is providing capital funding to new Aboriginal housing developments through the Provincial Investment in Affordable Housing program. Elizabeth Fry Society of Greater Victoria is receiving \$1.3 million for a 15-unit project in Surrey, and Kekinow Native Housing Society is receiving \$9.4 million for a 106-unit project in Surrey.
- The Province is providing capital funding of approximately \$13 million for three modular housing projects, totalling 160 supportive housing units for people who are homeless, or at risk of homelessness. The modular housing that will be located at three sites, including 10662 King George Blvd. and 13550-105 Ave. The third site will be confirmed at a later date. The new homes will be operated by Lookout Housing and Health Society. (Capital funding provided via Modular Housing program)
