It seems like the Prime Minister has now told everyone in no uncertain terms that the Feds have the last say on pipelines and I assume he has now told you.

If I were you I would drop your stupid attempt to stop the pipeline before you are totally embarrassed and humiliated by Trudeau. If you are able to say you did it to save BC jobs and billions of tax dollars then I think many of Weavers followers may even agree with you. In any event it is far better to do it for this reason than for political expediency.

I really think you should push the case for a pipeline fro Alberta to Prince Rupert, one that the Prime Minister has so far discouraged. There is no doubt that Canada needs to get our oil and gas to tidewater. Practically everyone In the energy industry knows this and it is now being acknowledged by many in government including Trudeau and Jim Carr. I

personally think oil exports from Prince Rupert would be far less of a problem than from Burrard Inlet where a spill would have a disastrous impact on the local economy.

We need to get our oil to tidewater for a number of reasons but the major one is geopolitical where the Trump and future US administrations have us over a barrel. The costs to Canada are huge given the \$30 cost differential between Western Select and WTI. At present the discount is probably costing Canada \$50 billion a year.

We have one of the largest oil and gas resources in the world and the argument that we should just leave it in the ground just does not make sense. If we do not mine and export the resource then someone else will. Just look at the US that now has increased their oil production from 9 to 10 million barrels a day in the last year and now exports 1.5 million barrels to China and Asia from the Gulf Coast. The US also exports LNG from Sabine Pass to Europe Asia and even Mexico.

The US has given us warning that they will be increasing oil and gas production and that they will be taking our market share. They now have no reason to take our gas unless it is at a huge discount and I cannot see this changing until a democratic president gets into the Whitehouse.

For goodness sake someone in authority has to recognize what is happening to our energy sector and do something about it. Justin Trudeau recognizes this but does not seem to care.

I just hope that you understand that the energy industry has in the past produced most of the high paying jobs in the country, has invested hundreds of billions of dollars in capital expenditures and produced the backbone of our tax revenues in many Provinces and the Federal government for the last 20 years.

That fact alone limits what your party can achieve in its efforts to govern. You need the support of all parties to get legislation passed. I hope that your efforts are rewarded.

It would also appear that you are are being ganged up on by both the Federal Government as well as other Provincial Governments regarding the Kinder Morgan Pipeline expansion. It would seem that you are going to end up with the the expanded transportation pipelines whether your province wants them or not. It may take years to get through the bureaucratic red tape that you can wrap around the issues but they will move forward with the projects. I for one am in favour of transportation networks for our energy resources, providing they are done with the utmost of care and limited disruption to the environment. Transporting heavy oil from Alberta is the wrong approach to this dilemma. An oil spill of this type would certainly cause a catastrophe.

The reason for my email is to put forth an idea that has been on my mind for some time. We all know that transporting heavy oil (bitumen) by rail car should be abolished. That method of transportation is far too dangerous. How many more Lac Megantic events have to happen before we abandon this method of transporting heavy oil. Your province should be the first to object to the transportation of all heavy oil by any means. Alberta should be made to refine the heavy crude at source or transport it to where there is a market for it. Assuming that the world wants our heavy crude is a mistake. They have their carbon taxing in place. Let them deal with the dirt in their own province.

I put forth the following idea for your consideration. Your province should allow for the expansion of the pipeline networks provided they be used to transport light oil only. It is less damaging to the environment in the event of a spill and its commands a higher premium on the world markets. Your province's limited refining industry would benefit from receiving light oil. You can't stop them from building the infrastructure but you should be able to dictate what gets transported into your province. Have you given this angle any thoughts?

The heavy oil that Alberta wants to transport should go to Ontario, Quebec and possibly Newfoundland. Ontario can further develop its refining industry (much of which has been mothballed!!) and provide good well paying jobs. Quebec can do the same as well as prepare the heavy oil for transportation to world markets. Newfoundland has its own resources that they are developing successfully. It is absolutely ludicrous that heavy oil from Venezuela be received in Quebec.

I'll never understand how decisions are made by politicians. Pierre Elliott Trudeau Government in the 70s implemented an idea that in order to develop Canada's budding oil industry, oil from world markets would be shipped and refined to Quebec and points east. The remaining provinces received Canadian oil. Canada's oil industry no longer needs this incentive. Our oil industry is second to none.

Eventually, natural gas will be the flavour of the day as we move to a lower carbon footprint. British Columbia has been bless in so many ways. I hope your province becomes the leading developer of natural gas industries. Westport Fuel Systems is a fine example of what the future can hold.

As friends and neighbors, we should all be getting along working towards building a better neighborhood. Whenever I invite my friends and neighbors over for a glass of wine, one of the big headaches is cleaning up that inevitable red wine spill! Sometimes we simply can't get that terrible stain out from the clothing, carpet or furniture and sadly, end up having to throw out or replace that item.

It is my understanding that a dil-bit spill is even harder to clean up from the environment than a red wine stain. I also understand it's very hard to replace the environment once it's ruined.

Thus, it seems a reasonable request that until someone can find the equivalent of the "Tide To Go Stain Eraser for dil-bit" or documents a successful clean up procedure (the equivalent of blot and dab with paper, pour salt, let dry and remove), we defer the risk of destroying the environment and hold off on increasing exports of dilbit.

I understand deferring implementation of the pipeline may have serious implications to the Alberta economy and I sympathize. So, let me propose an interim solution.

Greater Vancouver can only refine 50% of the gasoline and refined petroleum based fuels locally, leaving the rest to imports from the United States and subject to refinery constraints and currency fluctuations. That's why we're paying almost \$1.50/litre here, while Calgarians pay about \$1.05. How about using the pipeline to ship refined petroleum product and gasoline to the West. It will be consumed locally so there are no concerns about polluting our beautiful coastline. While still not perfected, we have a much better track record and procedures for cleaning those types spills up. Our pocketbooks will definitely appreciate the savings and I'm sure Albertans will appreciate the revenue in theirs.

Some things are simply irreplaceable and when they are ruined, that's it. Just because they are priceless, does not mean they don't have value.

We've all made some poor choices in the past, said and done somethings we've regretted afterwards, especially after a few glasses of wine! I encourage everyone involved to put an end to the neighborhood squabble and

think about the best outcomes for all and we can get back to sharing the good stuff in glass. After all, we're going to be neighbors for generations to come.

We are also very aware of the **horrible** response to the quite recent oil spills in English Bay, and due to the sinking of the The Nathan E. Stewart tug near Bella Bella. Our premier Horgan is only doing his job to do anything to protect our BC Coastline since oil spill response is clearly responsible even for diesel oil, let alone the tar and dilbit mix coming through that existing Kinder Morgan pipeline.

Here are my issues:

- 1) The approval process for the Kinder Morgan tripling pipeline was extremely flawed and unfair.
- 2) Why we should we be forced to have that tripled volume of tar crude and dilbit being shipped right through the middle of the Vancouver Metro region? This is patently stupid and totally unreasonable for us to be expected to accept.

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

Electronic monitoring equipment failed to detect a pipeline rupture that spewed more than 176,000 gallons of crude oil into a North Dakota creek, the pipeline's operator said Monday. It's not yet clear why the monitoring equipment didn't detect the leak, said Wendy Owen, a spokeswoman for Casper, Wyo.-based True Cos., which operates the Belle Fourche Pipeline. Advertisement

A landowner discovered the spill near Belfield on Dec. 5, said Bill Suess, an environmental scientist with the North Dakota Health Department.

Suess said the spill migrated about 6 miles along Ash Coulee Creek and fouled an unknown amount of private and U.S. Forest Service land along the waterway. The creek feeds into the Little Missouri River, but Seuss said it appears no oil got that far and no drinking water sources were threatened. The creek was free-flowing when the spill occurred but has since frozen over. Advertisement

Suess said about 37,000 gallons of oil had been recovered as of Monday.

Owen said the pipeline was shut down immediately after the leak was discovered. The pipeline is buried on a hill near Ash Coulee Creek, and the "hillside sloughed," which may have ruptured the line, she said.

Subject: consumer choice

With a stroke of her pen Premier Notley has taken away from the people of her province their right to choose what products to buy. This arbitrary political decision to restrict imports penalizes both the people who have worked so hard to create British Columbia's world class wine industry and Albertans by restricting consumer choice. This restriction of consumer choice will surely cause tremendous financial hardship to both Alberta and British Columbia business owners and their employees.

Domestically, British Columbia's hospitality industry is in a similar predicament. The Liquor Control and Licensing Branch has arbitrarily restricted the ability of restaurants and bars to purchase the full range of products they wish to carry by forcing them to purchase all liquor product only from the limited stock of the B.C. Liquor Distribution Branch retail stores. Our province has an incredible world class dining scene, but our drinks and cocktail programs suffer due to this archaic policy of restricting choice. We have never been given a proper and mindful answer for this policy.

In order for our restaurants and bars to compete on a world class level we need choice. The current model does not allow for our industry to compete globally due to lack of choice and availability. Import agents in our province import a vast array of world class products and ingredients but most are not available for purchase by our bars and restaurants.

In reaction to recent events and in fear of government enforcement, restauranteurs and bartenders across the province are scrambling to remove beer, wine, and spirits from their shelves and menus that were bought from provincially licensed private retailers. The hospitality industry purchases products from private stores because those stores offer access to a broad selection of specialty products not carried by the Liquor Distribution Branch, and available in quantities less than a full case. Our industry's sophisticated customers demand quality and choice and, as a result of the liquor control branch's arbitrary policy, the hospitality industry is struggling to provide that choice.

The restriction placed on licensee to licensee sales is not enshrined in law. Rather, it is entirely created by a policy of the liquor control and licensing branch. This is a policy that can be changed today with the stroke of a pen, giving all British Columbians the right to choose. Such a change could even help our beleaguered wine industry as smaller establishments will not be required to purchase BC wines by the case, but could purchase smaller quantities from private stores. We anticipate that some may argue that a restaurant or bar "can order the products through the government store". It is possible to order some specialty products through government stores, but they must be ordered by the case and government stores cannot process orders above a certain size. Moreover, it can take weeks for specialty products to arrive, not to

mention the incredible cost of inventory s.22 s.22

Two weeks ago, we sent the attached letter to Attorney General David Eby and cc'd, at his request, our MLA Shane Simpson. We have yet to hear a reply from either party or their staff. Thus, we felt it was time to share this letter with the rest of the Members of British Columbia's Legislative Assembly. There is no intent to embarrass our MLA or the Attorney General, but this issue needs to be addressed. We understand that these are busy times in government but this pressing issue negatively affects an entire business sector and puts jobs at risk.

Because the policy restricting licensee to licensee sales is not required by law, with a stroke of a pen our government can provide choice for all consumers.

The right to choose freely within a marketplace is enshrined in our society and culture. No one person or government should have the power to impede that right for purely arbitrary reasons. Please read the attached letter. It's time for an open an honest discussion about choice. At the very least British Columbian's deserve an answer to this simple question: why can't bars and restaurants in our province buy from licensed retailers?

Dear David Eby, Attorney General Province of British Columbia

Thank you for your encouraging words to the media on Friday. They give our industry hope for change and confidence that you are approaching the subject with an open mind. I believe that this situation provides an excellent opportunity for our three political parties to work together to deliver much-needed change for our province.

I understand that your government is considering law reform to accommodate our industry buying specialty products from private retailers. In this discussion, a change of law or law reform is not required but rather the standard terms and conditions applied to our licenses. It is the terms and conditions alone that bar licensee to licensee sales. This is an exercise of discretion by the general manager of LCLB. No change in law is required to amend those standard terms and conditions.

A change in law can take quite a long time, during which our wine, spirit and craft beer festivals and other events, such as The IVSA Product Salons, winemakers dinners and whisky festivals will continue to possibly contravene the law. Most of our industry festivals, including the upcoming Tip a Wee Dram whisky festival, raise money for charitable organizations, yet the current law and enforcement policy severely hinders these events and their charitable recipients. As you are most surely aware the Victoria Whisky Fest, one of the world's finest whisky festivals, was hindered by enforcement. Distillery operators, importers and brand ambassadors from across the globe descended on our capital only to be told that they were unable to share their products with us, as they weren't bought from an LDB store (although legally registered and approved for sale through private liquor stores in BC). Vancouver's Whisky Classique held the following Monday also had empty tables as the presenters brought whisky to share purchased from outside the LDB. Liquor Inspectors made a visit to the two IVSA (International Vintners & Spirits Association) Product Salons this month to check for LDB receipts even though some of these products are showcased for private retailers. After operating outside of the current policy for much of its tenure The Vancouver International Wine Festival has only recently become compliant.

Restaurants and bars need to stay competitive; offering choice to our guests is one such way we do so. B.C. is already fortunate in having a wider selection of products than most provinces, but each LDB store cannot stock the vast array of beer, wine and spirits available in the system and therefore these products, which are often of a specialty nature, need to be made available through private licensees. In saying that, we all understand that there is a system in place for Specialty item ordering, however aside from having to purchase slow moving inventory items by the case. We were, until very recently, unable to even see what is available within the system. Currently, if we wish to have a list of all available LDB SKU's we must purchase it from the LDB head office for \$55. I also have applied to Store 100 to access spec products for our restaurant but my application was denied. The private LRS's, however, have access to Store 100 and its inventory, and thus are able to provide wider selection to our

industry. As an example, there is a Powell River LRS that reportedly stocks upwards of 300 craft beer SKU's yet the local LDB stocks only 20. What are the restaurants and bars to do?

One of the arguments the government has used during these discussions relates to the small discounts (16%) made available to the private retailers and how this affects the bottom line of the LDB. The small margin lost is offset by the labour component being passed onto the private stores (whose labour costs are greater than 16% of product pricing) resulting in a net win, financially, for the province. There should be no fear in our industry changing course and buying solely from the private stores as they too cannot stock all of the products we use. Without this change in policy how are we to acquire the rare, interesting and slow-moving specialty items that B.C. consumers are asking for and that are required to operate our businesses?

We understand that there are pressures from the BCGEU not to change the policy, but by limiting access to specialty products that businesses need to survive simply limits their economic success, which limits their ability to employ workers, to make more tax contributions, as well as reducing the amount of business they do and the liquor they sell. The overall economic impact of permitting an industry to survive is far greater than any lost revenue from the 16% discount to LRS's.

I do not want to see this become a partisan debate when the legislature reconvenes on February 15th. If this were to happen, my fear is that no change will occur. I have spoken with the parties, associations and stakeholders that Mr. Hicken is consulting and feel that some of the requests that are being made; wholesale pricing, flat tax on high-end products among others, require more consultation and discussion. At issue is choice for consumers; the reversal of this policy is an easy fix and shouldn't require more consultation and discussion. Several Liberal party members reached out to us asking what they could do to help. We have told them that they had their chance to fix this issue, that they chose not to and that we would not be used for political gain. We told them that they need to take ownership and work with every member of the legislature to make this right.

Again, a change in law is not required. The restriction on licensee to licensee sales is a policy of the general manager of the LCLB, so the issue could be addressed tomorrow by a change in policy at the LCLB level. Not only do the current LCLB's policies bar licensees from offering a wider selection, there are other systemic issues. When an LDB store runs out of a product (beer, wine or spirits), we cannot, under the current policy, purchase these products from a private retailer, even as a temporary stop-gap solution. Moreover, if the LDB, as a whole, or an individual LDB store, decides to de-list a product, we are forced to re-write our beer, spirit, wine and cocktail lists. Those of us operating in metropolitan areas face an inconvenience of possibly sourcing the product at other LDB stores, while rural and small-town licensees don't have that option.

I have a proposal that will help our entire industry and boost your government's profile among small-business owners and consumers. I would like to see your

government direct a change in LCLB policy to allow licensee to licensee sales while the changes in law are being discussed, drafted and passed. As for government reporting; virtually all of the LRS's have a "membership" program where an individual's account holds a record of purchase, we could use our licensee number and the retailer could submit a record of sales electronically. Any retailer that does not have the infrastructure in place would not be able to participate in licensee to licensee transactions.

Our industry owes choice and quality to our guests - neighbours and tourists alike. Our little place in the world has whisky lovers from all over the globe dropping in for a rare dram or two (yes, we do have a drinks and whisky tourism industry in our province and need to stay competitive in what we can offer tourists from places like Seattle and Portland). Our craft beer producers have made our province a global microbrewery capital and our wine industry is recognized worldwide. It is only a matter of time before our distilled spirits producers follow suit. For these industries to flourish we need their products on our industry's wine, beer and cocktail lists and the spirits on the back bars in full display for the world to see. Sadly, most are not available on the LDB shelves. Without this change in policy, our small producers may not succeed. We feel that the government, regardless of which party is in power, should be aligned with these interests.

For the past 15 years our drinks and tourism industries have flourished with this nonenforced policy. There are few bars or restaurants in this province that do not have something that was acquired outside of an LDB store on the back bar to make their cocktails shine, in a cooler to quench a thirst or on their wine list to accompany a fine meal. We in the hospitality industry are only responding to consumer demand.

I know this is what the people of our province want and will support this change in policy and eventually in law. Please do the right thing and reverse this archaic policy and let the people of B.C. have choice.

Re: Alberta Ban on British Columbia Wine

The boycott of British Columbia wine by the Province of Alberta poses a substantial financial threat to the wine and agriculture industries in communities within the Okanagan Valley, including the City of Penticton. Wine tourism is a significant industry and key driver in our region and is used to leverage not only return visits, but residential recruitment, investment and economic development.

The Okanagan Valley is Canada's second-largest wine producing area. There are approximately 4,000—hectares of vineyards planted in the region, accounting for more than 90% of all wine produced in British Columbia, second in economic importance for wine production to the Niagara Peninsula of Ontario. The City of Penticton, with a population of only about 34,000 is currently home to 44 wineries and is located within an hour's drive of another 275 established wineries.

The consequences of this inter-provincial trade dispute will be felt immediately by our local workers, farmers, wine makers and tourism businesses, however, if this is to continue, it will be harmful to our community, our province and our national economies. The effects of this dispute are far reaching and the local workers and business owners of the City of Penticton do not want this dispute to continue any longer.

At the February 20, 2018 City of Penticton Regular meeting, Council passed the following resolution:

THAT Council send a letter to the Office of the Premier regarding the negative effects a provincial trade dispute will have on the local economy.

ISSUE: Government of Alberta's boycott of the purchase of BC Wines by the Alberta Gaming and Liquor Control Board

BACKGROUND:

On February 6, 2018 Alberta Premier Rachel Notley announced that the Government of Alberta (Alberta) was immediately implementing measures to boycott British Columbia (BC) wines including the halt of imports by the Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission (AGLC); and stepped up enforcement of Direct to Consumer sales. These measures were in response to its opposition to BC's January 30th, 2018, announcement that BC was proposing a second phase of consultations and regulations to improve preparedness, response and recovery from potential spills (i.e., Kinder Morgan Trans Mountain pipeline expansion project).

In response, Premier Horgan issued a statement on February 6, 2018 stating BC's support for its wine producers and the intent to respond to the Alberta's "unfair trade actions". In an interview on February 7, 2018, Premier Horgan further stated that BC would not seek retaliatory action but reiterated BC's intent to defend the BC wine industry.

In 2017, BC exported an estimated 17.2 million bottles or over 1.4 million cases of wine worth an estimated \$70 million (wholesale) to Alberta.

BC and Alberta are parties to both the New West Partnership Trade Agreement (NWPTA) and the Canadian Free Trade Agreement (CFTA) which include specific trade obligations and dispute settlement provisions.

The BC Wine Institute (BCWI) met with the Minister of Agriculture, the Honourable Lana Popham on February 6, 2018 and with representatives of the Ministry of Jobs, Trade and Technology and the Liquor Control and Licensing Branch of the Ministry of Attorney General on February 7, 2018.

Province takes further action to protect B.C. wine industry

VICTORIA – The Province is acting to protect and support B.C. wine producers. Today, Bruce Ralston, Minister of Jobs, Trade and Technology announced B.C. is formally challenging Alberta's measures through the Canadian Free Trade Agreement's (CFTA) dispute settlement process.

"B.C.'s wine industry is an important contributor to our economy, creating good jobs and other economic benefits for people in B.C." said Ralston. "We're standing by our wine producers and the communities that rely on this important industry by launching a formal trade dispute, and we are confident we will be successful."

The Province has notified the Government of Alberta that it's formally requesting consultations under the CFTA regarding Alberta's actions to ban the sale of B.C. wine. .

"Alberta's actions threaten the livelihood of the families that have worked so hard to build B.C.'s world-class wine industry," said Ralston. "These actions are inconsistent with Alberta's obligations under the CFTA, and we will protect our reputation and the interests of British Columbians."

Consultations can start immediately and can last a minimum of 120 days. If consultations don't resolve the matter B.C. can call for an arbitral panel to hear the issue. This will be the first formal dispute to occur under the new CFTA.

In addition to this trade challenge, the Province is supporting B.C.'s wine industry by proclaiming April to be B.C. Wine Month. Government is also increasing opportunities to have B.C. wines in local BC Liquor Stores, including local wines from small and medium producers that are not typically available outside of the wineries. Funding is also being made available for the Buy BC: Eat Drink Local campaign, and to support the marketing of BC VQA wines to new international markets.

Quick Facts:

- B.C.'s wine industry employs about 12,000 people, and has an economic impact of \$2.8 billion annually on our province.
- B.C. is home to 929 vineyards, including over 350 licensed wineries.

Pursuant to Article 1003 (Consultations) of the *Canadian Free Trade Agreement* (the "CFTA"), I am writing to inform you that the Government of British Columbia is hereby requesting consultations with the Government of Alberta regarding certain measures that act to restrict of the sale of British Columbia wine in Alberta. In British Columbia's view these measures are inconsistent with Alberta's obligations under the CFTA.

1. Measures Subject to Consultation

The measures at issue here are the Government of Alberta's direction to the Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission (the "AGLC") to put a halt to the import of British Columbia wine into Alberta and the AGLC's implementation of that direction (collectively, the "Measures"). In the course of consultations additional non-compliant measures may become apparent and British Columbia reserves the right to add any such additional measures to its complaint.

2. Applicable Provisions of the CFTA

A preliminary assessment of the Measures indicates that the following provisions of the CFTA are most relevant in the circumstances:

- Article 201 (Non-Discrimination)
- Article 301 (Right of Entry and Exit)
- Article 316 (Non-Discrimination)
- Article 317 (Commercial Considerations)

If during consultations other provisions of the CFTA appear to be applicable we will bring them to your immediate attention.

3. Summary of Complaint

British Columbia is of the view that the Measures discriminate against British Columbia wine and restrict its movement across provincial boundaries. In addition, the implementation of the Government of Alberta's direction by the AGLC is not consistent with commercial considerations. The CFTA requires Alberta to extend non-discriminatory treatment to all British Columbia wine and to allow its free movement across provincial boundaries. The CFTA also requires the AGLC to make its purchases of wine solely in accordance with non-discriminatory commercial considerations.

Premier Horgan says this safeguard has generated disproportionate and unlawful reactions from the Alberta government, specifically their decision to ban the import of wines from British Columbia.

"The actions by the Alberta government threaten an entire industry and the livelihoods of people who depend on it," said Premier Horgan. "We have taken steps to protect our wine industry from the unwarranted trade action by the Government of Alberta."

"It's not about politics. It's not about trade. It's about British Columbians' right to have their voices heard on this critical issue," said Premier Horgan. "And it's about B.C.'s right to defend itself against actions that may threaten our people, our province and our future."

The Premier adds that consultations will begin soon on the remaining four safeguards announced in January by Environment and Climate Change Minister George Heyman. These safeguards include:

Premier Rachel Notley: Hello to everyone. Thank you all for being here today. I'm here today with a few very dedicated and very experienced Canadians who have come from all walks of life and who have all made an enormous contribution already to our country.

Ms. Janet Annesley, Mr. Jim Carter, Mr. Trevor Tombe, Ms. Ginny Flood. We have Ms. Anne McLellan, and Mr. Frank McKenna with us on the phone, I believe. We have, I believe, Peter Tertzakian joining us by video conference from Calgary. Peter Hogg was unable to make it, but thankfully we were able to have a good conversation with him yesterday. We are also joined by the Minister of Economic Development and Trade, Deron Bilous. Minister of Energy, Margaret McCuaig-Boyd, and also by video conference is Minister of Environment and Parks, Shannon Phillips. And then of course we have a number of our very dedicated deputy ministers and public servants with us as well.

This is the first meeting of our market access task force, and I'm looking to this group for a couple of very specific things. First, we've done a lot of work in advance of this meeting, and we are going to be going over that work today. I am looking to this task force on their advice on that work, and I'm gonna be looking to this task force, as well, to provide additional legal and strategic advice to make sure we can end the delays and the games and get the Trans Mountain pipeline built. Secondly, I'm hoping we can capitalize and use the deep connections that many in this group have with leaders across the country to again end the games and get the Trans Mountain pipeline built. We've been clear, the BC government overstepped their authority.

Let me remind you, a couple of weeks when BC launched their review, they said they would impose regulation to limit bitumen transportation. That part of their plan point five as we call it, is fundamentally unconstitutional. The BC government has not backed away from that threat as we believed they must. No province has the right to approve what goes into a federally approved, federally regulated pipeline. To be perfectly clear, when it comes to protecting the British Columbia coast, the Canadian coast, we are with BC 100 percent. That's not the question. The issue, however, is that BC cannot pretend that they are not part of the country. And they don't get to assume rights that they clearly don't have. It's an attack on the economic security and certainty and well-being of working Albertans and working Canadians throughout our energy sector, including tens of thousands of British Columbians.

As I've said the federal government is talking to British Columbia, and for the time being I am willing to let those conversations happen before taking further action, but make no mistake, we are not standing still. BC has triggered a fight with Canada. This task force is helping us lead our response. These folks know how, that the need to get our resources to the coast, the need to diverse our export markets and the need to create good jobs for people, these things don't just matter to

Albertans they matter to all Canadians and so to that end we are going to discuss today further responses to BC beyond the wine ban and we are going to talk about potential responses to any attempt, any attempt, to frustrate progress on this important project.

Again, together, we are going to make the point, again and again and again for as long as it takes as many times as it takes that this project was approved in the national interest and it must be built in the national interest. We're not going to stand down until that happens. These folks on our task force have deep connections across the country, industry, investors, academics, the legal community, all levels of government, all across the country so we're going to keep the pressure on. That includes any and all measures to ensure that all provinces respect their constitutional responsibilities. It includes any and all measures to make sure that we are defending working families across Alberta and across Canada. And, any and all measures to ensure that the facts about this pipeline are known. The fact that the pipeline comes with the strongest climate leadership plan in Canada - one that means new pipelines don't increase emissions from our oilsands.

The fact that this project comes with billions of dollars' worth of benefits for people in communities all across the pipeline route and all across Canada. And, the fact that this pipeline comes with new, world class coastal protections, protections that will make sure that all shipping, not just energy exports but all exports are at long last safer. So, it's going to be a productive conversation and my guess is that it's also going to be a very probably Canadian conversation. This is the right team with the right priorities. Together, with the backing of hundreds of thousands of people from Alberta and across Canada we are going to keep the pressure on.

Thank you to everybody here for joining me here today and thank to each and every member of our task force for your dedication for preserving what are the best interests of all Canadians. I look forward to working with all of you. So thank you very much and thank you to those on the phone and everywhere else and I look forward to having a good.. 

Re: Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission Ban of British Columbia Wines

We are counsel for the British Columbia Wine Institute Society. We have been instructed to commence an originating application against the Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission (the "AGLC") related to the AGLC's recent actions to ban the importation of British Columbia wines.

We expect to file the application in the Alberta Court of Queen's Bench in Calgary on February 26th, 2018. Our client will seek a declaration that s. 77 of the *Gaming and Liquor Act*, R.S.A. 2000, c. G-1 is constitutionally invalid, a declaration that the recent banning actions taken by the AGLC are *ultra vires*, and other relief, including an injunction against the AGLC.

While our application will be filed with a placeholder date, we will ask that Associate Chief Justice Rooke provide us with an emergency special date so that we may seek an immediate interim injunction against the AGLC, with the balance of the application to be adjourned and heard without delay. As required, we are writing first to you to ask that the AGLC consent to an emergency special hearing date.

We are able to proceed on March 2, 5 or 6, 2018. We ask that you promptly advise us of the availability of the AGLC on those dates. We caution you that if we do not receive a response by 1pm MST on February 23, 2018, we will advise Associate Chief Justice Rooke of



this request and ask that a date be set unilaterally. We will, of course, copy you and counsel on any correspondence to the court.

We would naturally prefer to avoid an emergency injunction hearing if possible. The AGLC must surely appreciate that a prohibition on the importation of any Canadian good based solely upon its province of origin raises serious constitutional issues, that irreparable harm will be suffered if this ban is not immediately lifted, and that the balance of convenience favors lifting the ban until the constitutional issues are determined. We therefore urge the AGLC to immediately lift the ban pending that determination. If the AGLC is prepared to lift the ban to avoid an emergency hearing, please advise us forthwith.



Pursuant to Article 1003 (Consultations) of the *Canadian Free Trade Agreement* (the "CFTA"), I am writing to inform you that the Government of British Columbia is hereby requesting consultations with the Government of Alberta regarding certain measures that act to restrict of the sale of British Columbia wine in Alberta. In British Columbia's view these measures are inconsistent with Alberta's obligations under the CFTA.

1. Measures Subject to Consultation

The measures at issue here are the Government of Alberta's direction to the Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission (the "AGLC") to put a halt to the import of British Columbia wine into Alberta and the AGLC's implementation of that direction (collectively, the "Measures"). In the course of consultations additional non-compliant measures may become apparent and British Columbia reserves the right to add any such additional measures to its complaint.

2. Applicable Provisions of the CFTA

A preliminary assessment of the Measures indicates that the following provisions of the CFTA are most relevant in the circumstances:

- Article 201 (Non-Discrimination)
- Article 301 (Right of Entry and Exit)
- Article 316 (Non-Discrimination)
- Article 317 (Commercial Considerations)

If during consultations other provisions of the CFTA appear to be applicable we will bring them to your immediate attention.

3. Summary of Complaint

British Columbia is of the view that the Measures discriminate against British Columbia wine and restrict its movement across provincial boundaries. In addition, the implementation of the Government of Alberta's direction by the AGLC is not consistent with commercial considerations. The CFTA requires Alberta to extend non-discriminatory treatment to all British Columbia wine and to allow its free movement across provincial boundaries. The CFTA also requires the AGLC to make its purchases of wine solely in accordance with non-discriminatory commercial considerations.

Province takes further action to protect B.C. wine industry

VICTORIA – The Province is acting to protect B.C. wine producers whose businesses are being impacted by the Alberta government's recent boycott on B.C. wine imports. Today, Bruce Ralston, Minister of Jobs, Trade and Technology, announced B.C. is formally challenging Alberta's measures through the Canadian Free Trade Agreement's (CFTA) dispute settlement process.

"B.C.'s wine industry is an important contributor to our economy, creating good jobs and other economic benefits for people in B.C." said Ralston. "We're standing by our wine producers and the communities that rely on this important industry by launching a formal trade dispute, with the ultimate aim of reaching a positive resolution."

The Province has notified the Government of Alberta that it's formally requesting consultations under the CFTA regarding Alberta's actions to ban the sale of B.C. wine in that province. B.C. sees these actions as inconsistent with Alberta's obligations under the CFTA.

"Alberta's actions threaten the livelihood of the families that have worked so hard to build B.C.'s world-class wine industry," said Ralston. "B.C. has an obligation to protect our reputation and the interests of the people and industries that are part of our strong, sustainable economy."

Consultations can start immediately and can last a minimum of 120 days. If consultations don't resolve the matter B.C. can call for an arbitral panel to hear the issue. This will be the first formal dispute to occur under the new CFTA.

In addition to this trade challenge, the Province is supporting B.C.'s wine industry by proclaiming April to be B.C. Wine Month. Government is also increasing opportunities to have B.C. wines in local BC Liquor Stores, including local wines from small and medium producers that are not typically available outside of the wineries. Funding is also being made available for the Buy BC: Eat Drink Local campaign, and to support the marketing of BC VQA wines to new international markets.

Quick Facts:

- B.C.'s wine industry employs about 12,000 people, and has an economic impact of \$2.8 billion annually on our province.
- B.C. is home to 929 vineyards, including over 350 licensed wineries.
- There are just under 3,900 hectares of wine grapes grown in B.C.

- Over 60 different grape varieties are produced in the province, including Merlot, Pinot Gris, Pinot Noir, Chardonnay, Cabernet Sauvignon, Gewurztraminer, Cabernet Franc, Syrah, Riesling, and Sauvignon Blanc.



Pursuant to Article 1003 (Consultations) of the *Canadian Free Trade Agreement* (the "CFTA"), I am writing to inform you that the Government of British Columbia is hereby requesting consultations with the Government of Alberta regarding certain measures that act to restrict of the sale of British Columbia wine in Alberta. In British Columbia's view these measures are inconsistent with Alberta's obligations under the CFTA.

1. Measures Subject to Consultation

The measures at issue here are the Government of Alberta's direction to the Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission (the "AGLC") to put a halt to the import of British Columbia wine into Alberta and the AGLC's implementation of that direction (collectively, the "Measures"). In the course of consultations additional non-compliant measures may become apparent and British Columbia reserves the right to add any such additional measures to its complaint.

2. Applicable Provisions of the CFTA

A preliminary assessment of the Measures indicates that the following provisions of the CFTA are most relevant in the circumstances:

- Article 201 (Non-Discrimination)
- Article 301 (Right of Entry and Exit)
- Article 316 (Non-Discrimination)
- Article 317 (Commercial Considerations)

If during consultations other provisions of the CFTA appear to be applicable we will bring them to your immediate attention.

3. Summary of Complaint

British Columbia is of the view that the Measures discriminate against British Columbia wine and restrict its movement across provincial boundaries. In addition, the implementation of the Government of Alberta's direction by the AGLC is not consistent with commercial considerations. The CFTA requires Alberta to extend non-discriminatory treatment to all British Columbia wine and to allow its free movement across provincial boundaries. The CFTA also requires the AGLC to make its purchases of wine solely in accordance with non-discriminatory commercial considerations.

Province takes further action to protect B.C. wine industry

VICTORIA – The Province is acting to protect B.C. wine producers whose businesses are being impacted by the Alberta government's recent boycott on B.C. wine imports. Today, Bruce Ralston, Minister of Jobs, Trade and Technology, announced B.C. is formally challenging Alberta's measures through the Canadian Free Trade Agreement's (CFTA) dispute settlement process.

"B.C.'s wine industry is an important contributor to our economy, creating good jobs and other economic benefits for people in B.C." said Ralston. "We're standing by our wine producers and the communities that rely on this important industry by launching a formal trade dispute, with the ultimate aim of reaching a positive resolution."

The Province has notified the Government of Alberta that it's formally requesting consultations under the CFTA regarding Alberta's actions to ban the sale of B.C. wine in that province. B.C. sees these actions as inconsistent with Alberta's obligations under the CFTA.

"Alberta's actions threaten the livelihood of the families that have worked so hard to build B.C.'s world-class wine industry," said Ralston. "B.C. has an obligation to protect our reputation and the interests of the people and industries that are part of our strong, sustainable economy."

Consultations can start immediately and can last a minimum of 120 days. If consultations don't resolve the matter B.C. can call for an arbitral panel to hear the issue. This will be the first formal dispute to occur under the new CFTA.

In addition to this trade challenge, the Province is supporting B.C.'s wine industry by proclaiming April to be B.C. Wine Month. Government is also increasing opportunities to have B.C. wines in local BC Liquor Stores, including local wines from small and medium producers that are not typically available outside of the wineries. Funding is also being made available for the Buy BC: Eat Drink Local campaign, and to support the marketing of BC VQA wines to new international markets.

Quick Facts:

- B.C.'s wine industry employs about 12,000 people, and has an economic impact of \$2.8 billion annually on our province.
- B.C. is home to 929 vineyards, including over 350 licensed wineries.
- There are just under 3,900 hectares of wine grapes grown in B.C.

- Over 60 different grape varieties are produced in the province, including Merlot, Pinot Gris, Pinot Noir, Chardonnay, Cabernet Sauvignon, Gewurztraminer, Cabernet Franc, Syrah, Riesling, and Sauvignon Blanc.
- In 2016, B.C. wine exports increased 4% to \$9.7 million shipped to 17 international markets.
- Ice wine exports were \$1.8 million of the total.
- The top markets for B.C. wine were China (54%), Taiwan (23%) and the US (11%)







There is a strong interest from BCWI in partnering with LDB and AGRI on developing these initiatives. There is also a strong interest in partnering on communications.

"Alberta's actions threaten the livelihood of the families that have worked so hard to build B.C.'s world-class wine industry," said Ralston. "These actions are inconsistent with Alberta's obligations under the CFTA, and we will protect our reputation and the interests of British Columbians."

In addition to this trade challenge, the Province is supporting B.C.'s wine industry by proclaiming April to be B.C. Wine Month. Government is also increasing opportunities to have B.C. wines in local BC Liquor Stores, including local wines from small and medium producers that are not typically available outside of the wineries. Funding is also being made available for the Buy BC: Eat Drink Local campaign, and to support the marketing of BC VQA wines to new international markets.

Quick Facts:

- B.C.'s wine industry employs about 12,000 people, and has an economic impact of \$2.8 billion annually on our province.
- B.C. is home to 929 vineyards, including over 350 licensed wineries.
- There are just under 3,900 hectares of wine grapes grown in B.C.



Steelhead runs:

Greens asked what is being done to support Fraser steelhead runs

Pleased to hear about federal fisheries changes. Taking lead in making sure feds feet is held to the fire.

Wine court action (CFTA):

MLA Ashton mentioned more court action launched... this time over wine.

Minister Ralston mentioned the Canadian Free Trade Agreement and that PJH invited Leader of Opposition to condemn AB's actions but that Wilkinson refused to stand up for the industry choosing instead to side with AB.

Minister Pophal said the situation is being taken seriously. Have consulted with Wine Institute, wine producers and they've put forward measures to support them. Government is increasing marketing support (domestically and internationally) and increasing shelf space.

Tourism:

MLA Clovechok says AB tourists are cancelling holidays in BC opting to stay in AB instead.

Minister Beare responded that wine producers are facing an unfair attack from AB. AB is violating trade agreement. Says Liberals are more interested in scoring political points than supporting tourism industry

Premier Horgan responded to the supplemental – saying government issued press bulletin outlining our intention to consult on Jan 30. The response from AB was to impose trade sanction on BC. "Press release here, trade sanction over here". Our response has been measured. He used the word "hysterical" to describe AB's response.

George Massey / Patullo - fed funding:

MLA Paton asked about the George Massey Tunnel in light of Friday's announcement re: Patullo. He asked if the federal government is contributing to the Patullo bridge replacement?

Minister Trevena says new Patullo bridge is what mayors and community wanted. The bridge is outdated and needs replacing. It's on priority list. Says government is talking to feds about funding. MLA Throness asks why no representative from Ottawa at Friday's bridge announcement (and not at earlier child care announcement) and questioned why government would go ahead without securing federal contribution?

Minister Trevena says government is in negotiation with the federal government on many projects. Hopeful.

Intention paper:

MLA Tegart asked the Environment minister to confirm timeline for development of proposed

regulations?

Minister Heyman said we it's important to protect environment and protect jobs that depend on coastline and rivers and streams. Will put out intention paper when its ready.

- I encourage all British Columbians, now more than ever, to remember to Buy BC, to support the families and the people who work in B.C.'s wine industry.

CFTA Trade Dispute

- B.C.'s wine industry is an important contributor to our economy, creating good jobs and other economic benefits for people in B.C.
- We're standing by our wine producers and the communities that rely on this important industry by launching a formal trade dispute.
- We've notified the Government of Alberta that we're formally requesting consultations under the Canadian Free Trade Agreement (CFTA) regarding Alberta's actions to ban the sale of wine.
- Alberta's actions threaten the livelihood of the families that have worked so hard to build B.C.'s world-class wine industry.
- These actions are inconsistent with Alberta's obligations under the CFTA, and we will protect our reputation and the interests of British Columbians.

This will be the first formal dispute to occur under the new CFTA.



Hi folks,

Changes to the KMs to reflect PJH's script & statement, with the new QAs included.

- The people of BC are looking to our government to make sure any spill of diluted bitumen does not threaten our province's economy, environment and our coast.
- We have a responsibility to ensure the best possible protections are in place to protect the tens of thousands of jobs that rely on BC's clean environment.
- We have proposed for consultation a number of measures on spill preparedness and response that would apply to anyone looking to ship hazardous materials through our province.
- We are moving forward in the coming weeks with consultation on the first four measures:
 - Spill response times
 - Geographic response plans
 - Compensation for loss of public and cultural use of land
 - Application of regulations to marine spills
- We are confident in our right to protect BC's environment, economy and coast from the consequences of a diluted bitumen spill.
- BC is preparing to refer this constitutional question to the courts. We are retaining expert legal counsel to ready that reference and confirm our rights in court.
- Other jurisdictions have reacted by targeting BC businesses with disproportionate and unlawful trade measures, which threatens an entire industry and the people whose livelihoods depend on it.
- We've been clear from the start that the appropriate place to resolve this is in the courts.
- We have said all along that we will defend BC's interests and we are confident that the Courts will confirm we have the jurisdiction to do so.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

AB and the Federal Government say you are admitting you are wrong and giving in. Is this a climb down?

- Absolutely not, we continue to assert our rights to stand up for the interests of British Columbians.
- We believe it is our right to take appropriate measures to protect our coast from the drastic consequence of a diluted bitumen spill.
- We are simply taking the high road to settle this in the Courts, where it belongs, without resorting to attacks on small businesses and workers.

What if Alberta doesn't back down?

- They have claimed all along that they are confident we don't have the jurisdiction to regulate to protect our environment.
- If they are as confident as they say, there is no reason not to settle this in the Courts.
- And there is no excuse for continued attacks on BC businesses and workers.

Are you suspending consultations on the policy proposal?

- We are confident that the Courts will affirm we have the right to stand up for BC's interests.
- While we proceed with the reference we are not beginning consultations.

What about the scientific panel - will that still go ahead?

 Yes, we have been clear that there are gaps in the science with regard to the behaviour of diluted bitumen and whether and how it can be cleaned up.

- The Royal Society of Canada has clearly identified that there are gaps, and the Federal Government has agreed and actually committed funding to research this problem.
- We will have further details on this going forward.

Which court are you referring and what exactly are you asking them?

• This is the subject of legal advice we are receiving now on the best path for our province and we will have further details soon.

You promised to use every tool, are there other tools you will be rolling out?

- I want to be clear that our proposals on spill preparedness and response – including the measure we are referring to the Courts – are not about any one company – they would apply to anyone shipping dangerous product through the province.
- If you are asking about Kinder Morgan, we have always said that we thought this project was not in BC's interests.
- We have intervened in the Federal Court of Appeal to argue that the federal government failed to consider BC's interests when approving the project.
- We have also sought leave to appeal the ruling of the NEB in order to defend the rights of municipalities and provinces to oversee permitting and ensure the environment is protected.

The opposition has complained about you giving a heads up to environmentalists about the previous announcement. Did you tell anyone about today's announcement?

- The Ministry regularly notifies relevant stakeholders of government announcements as a courtesy.
- The exception is for tax measures and statutory decisions on whether to grant a permit for a project.
- The previous government followed a similar process for their proposed regulations

 We followed the normal process and respected all rules both in January and for today.

Have you asked Alberta to end the wine boycott, and if so what was their response?

- We have been clear that Alberta's decision to target BC businesses and workers is both unfair and unlawful.
- They have claimed from the start that they are confident that we don't have the jurisdiction.
- We disagree with them clearly, but if they are as confident as they claim I see no reason for them to continue with unfair trade actions.
- As you know we have taken steps to protect our wine industry and we have launched a formal challenge of their trade restrictions through the Canadian Free Trade Agreement.

Do you support the BC Wine Institute's constitutional challenge against Alberta's ban on wine?

- We clearly agree that Alberta's decision to target BC businesses and workers is both unfair and unlawful.
- We have been working closely with BC wine producers to defend our industry and the workers and will continue to do so.
- We have also launched a formal challenge of their trade restrictions through the Canadian Free Trade Agreement.

VICTORIA – The provincial government will be moving forward with consultation around four bitumen spill safeguards while referring to the courts the outstanding issue around B.C.'s right to protect B.C.'s coast, Premier John Horgan announced today.

"We believe it is our right to take appropriate measures to protect our environment, economy and our coast from the drastic consequence of a diluted bitumen spill," said Horgan. "And we are prepared to confirm that right in the courts."

Horgan says his government will be retaining expert legal counsel to ready a reference to the courts, adding that it may take several weeks to bring the reference forward. This reference will seek to reinforce B.C.'s constitutional rights to defend against the risks of a bitumen spill.

Horgan says this safeguard has generated disproportionate and unlawful reactions from the Alberta government, specifically their decision to ban the import of wines from British Columbia.

"The actions by the Alberta government threaten an entire industry and the livelihoods of people who depend on it," said Horgan. "We have taken steps to protect our wine industry from the unwarranted trade action by the Government of Alberta."

"It's not about politics. It's not about trade. It's about British Columbians' right to have their voices heard on this critical issue," said Horgan. "And it's about B.C.'s right to defend itself against actions that may threaten our people, our province and our future."

The premier adds that consultations will begin soon on the remaining four safeguards announced in January by Environment and Climate Change Minister George Heyman. These safeguards include:

- Spill response time
- Geographic response plans
- Compensation for loss of public and cultural use of land
- · Application of regulations to marine spills

ISSUE: Government of Alberta's boycott of the purchase of BC Wines by the Alberta Gaming and Liquor Control Board

BACKGROUND:

On February 6, 2018 Alberta Premier Rachel Notley announced its intent to implement measures to boycott BC wines including the immediate halt of imports by the Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission (AGLC) and stepped up enforcement of Direct to Consumer sales (Alberta wine boycott). These measures were in response to its opposition to BC's request for further review of the Kinder Morgan Trans Mountain pipeline expansion project (Trans Mountain project), Alberta has not released, to date, written or specific details on the Alberta wine boycott measures.

In response, Premier Horgan issued a statement on February 6, 2018 stating BC's support for its wine producers and the intent to respond to the Alberta's "unfair trade actions". In an interview on February 7, Premier Horgan further stated that BC will not seek retaliatory action but reiterated BC's intent to defend the BC wine industry.

In 2017 BC was estimated to export about 17.2 million bottles or over 1.4 million cases worth an estimated \$70 million in wine to Alberta.

BC and Alberta are parties to both the New West Partnership Trade Agreement (NWPTA) and the Canadian Free Trade Agreement (CFTA) which include specific trade obligations and dispute settlement provisions.

The BC Wine Institute (BCWI) met with the Minister of Agriculture, the Honourable Lana Popham on February 6, 2018 and with representatives of the Ministry of Jobs, Trade and Technology and Liquor Control and Licensing Branch of the Ministry of Attorney General on February 7, 2018.





She said this needed to be done and that more reform were on their way.

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





VICTORIA - On the heels of Alberta's boycott of B.C. wines, the B.C. government is ramping up its support for the industry by proclaiming April as B.C. Wine Month, including a special month-long promotion at all public liquor stores.

"B.C.'s wine industry is made up of family-run vineyards and wineries that have chosen farming and wine-making as their passion and their profession," said Minister of Agriculture Lana Popham. "In addition to delivering fantastic wine, they also provide good jobs in communities throughout the province, and we are proud to shine a spotlight on the work they do and the wine they make. - * Funding for an expansion of the Buy BC: Eat Drink Local campaign, to further develop partnerships between the BC Wine Institute and the British Columbia Restaurant and Food Services Association.
- * Funding to support the marketing of BC VQA wines to new international markets.

While the Province has worked to develop this support, the Ministry of Agriculture has been involved in ongoing engagement with wine producers throughout the province.

"We are grateful for the loyalty and support we have received from the consumers across B.C. and Canada in response to Alberta's announcement to boycott B.C. wine," said Miles Prodan, president and CEO of the BC Wine Institute. "We appreciate the Province's quick response in support of B.C.'s wineries, and we remain resolute in our mission to secure sales opportunities here in B.C. for the many B.C. grape wineries across the province, most of which are small, family-owned-and-operated businesses, and will continue to promote our local world-class products at home and abroad."

B.C.'s wine industry employs about 12,000 people, and has an economic impact of \$2.8 billion annually.

Quick Facts:

* B.C. is home to 929 vineyards, including over 350 licensed wineries.

- * There are just under 3,900 hectares of wine grapes grown in B.C.
- * Over 60 different grape varieties are produced in the province, including Merlot, Pinot Gris, Pinot Noir, Chardonnay, Cabernet Sauvignon, Gewurztraminer, Cabernet Franc, Syrah, Riesling and Sauvignon Blanc.
- * In 2016, B.C. wine exports increased 4% over the previous year to \$9.7 million shipped to 17 international markets.
- * Ice wine exports were \$1.8 million of the total.
- * The top markets for B.C. wine were China (54%), Taiwan (23%) and the United States (11%).

I am writing to you on behalf of the British Columbia Grapegrowers' Association (BCGA) to convey our concerns regarding Alberta's announced boycott of British Columba wine. Our organization represents over 300 commercial grape growers whose livelihoods depend on resolving this political battle.

For a decade, B.C. grape growers faced increasingly challenging times as the cost of land and farming that land in British Columbia rose while the price of grapes remained stagnant. In 2013, however, we began to see grape prices rise and in the last two years our members have finally begun to see financial gains; in 2016 BC benefitted from \$55 million in sales of wine grapes. Now, when the industry is growing and strengthening, is not the time to constrain or limit the markets for our end products.

Alberta is the second biggest wine market for the industry, accounting for an estimated \$72 million sales annually. With this channel removed it will significantly reduce wine sales and, in turn, reduce the market for our locally grown grapes. The industry creates 12,000 full time jobs, many which will be negatively impacted by the significant loss of sales in Alberta as well as tourism from our neighbouring province.

This dispute, resulting from a yet-to-be-determined industry decision should not be fought on the backs of our framers and small businesses.

I urge you to seriously consider the points I have outlined and find a way to negotiate an end to this dispute as the interprovincial trade war will hinder our industry.

The first document is with ministries for comment. At a high level it works, but

we really need to nail down exactly what Liquor Distribution Branch is able to do in particular.

I also just received a heads-up draft of what the BC Wine Institute intends to send to government (Premier's Office and Ministers Eby, Popham and Ralston with DMs) tomorrow as their 5 priorities (see attached). I'm told they're likely to add a sixth priority on export development in response to some members but they recognize that we have the programs in place already to do this.

I walked through these with Miles (BCWI) and candidly told him that we're likely to support some but not all of them. He's very positive about any quick response from government of support and would like to help out with any government announcements.

We've started the work with other ministries, but based on today's discussions, my sense is:

UPDATE: The Liquor Distribution Branch and Agriculture think that \$4 per bottle wholesale seems wrong and so question the 17.2 million bottles figure used by Notley.

They have confirmed that \$70 million wholesale (paid to BC wineries) and \$160 million retail (purchases in AB) figures are correct. They are working to come up with a bottles figure but don't normally track that data.

Based on \$160 million retail value, it is likely that it is actually just 2 to 3 bottles per BCn of legal drinking age over the year. So one bottle every 4 - 6 months

- In response to Alberta's sudden attack on the BC wine industry, the BC government pulled together an advertising campaign over the weekend aimed at supporting BC producers.
- The ads ran in the BC edition of the Globe and Mail, the Vancouver Sun, the Province and the Prince George Citizen.
- The final cost of the campaign is expected to be less than \$40,000.
- The ads were produced by Grey Advertising in Vancouver. Grey is an established Vancouver firm and is a new addition to GCPE's list of pre-approved advertising suppliers.
- Going forward, government is also exploring a number of specific measures to support the BC Wine industry.

- These measures will focus on both supporting smaller vineyards who face a disproportionate impact from Alberta's boycott as well as measures aimed at promoting BC wines to a broader audience.
