Premier announces new classrooms on the way for Surrey students

SURREY – A new elementary school, two additions to existing schools and the land needed to build another school, will help ease overcrowding and improve classroom conditions for students in Surrey, Premier John Horgan announced today.

"Surrey students and their families have been waiting too long for new classrooms for their growing school district. The wait is over. We're getting it done," said Premier Horgan. "We are delivering the safe and comfortable schools kids in Surrey deserve."

The Ministry of Education is investing almost \$64 million to:

- build a new elementary school in the Douglas area of South Surrey;
- expand Frost Road Elementary and Coyote Creek Elementary schools in Fleetwood; and
- buy land for a future elementary school in Grandview Heights.

"We have been working hard to accelerate the approval of capital and seismic projects throughout B.C.," said Rob Fleming, Minister of Education. "These three projects and the land purchase will relieve pressure on the surrounding schools in Surrey, reduce the number of students learning in portables, and make life better for students, educators and parents."

The new \$24.3-million, two-storey elementary school will be built beside Dufferin Park, and will accommodate 605 students. It will have a Neighbourhood Learning Centre (NLC) with two child-care rooms, as well as project, media and technology spaces and outdoor washrooms. This school will help relieve enrolment pressure at nearby Hall's Prairie Elementary, Pacific Heights Elementary and South Meridian Elementary. Construction is expected to start in March 2019 and be complete by December 2020.

"Our board has been pushing hard and working closely with Minister Fleming to obtain funding for new school spaces for our students, so it is wonderful to see the government making these investments," says Surrey Board of Education chair Laurie Larsen. "I know our trustees join our students, staff and parents throughout the Surrey School District in welcoming the announcement, and we all look forward to the next one."

The \$5.6-million addition at Frost Road Elementary school will create six classrooms, with space for 150 more students. Four portables currently at the school will be removed at the end of construction.

Coyote Creek Elementary school's \$4.9-million expansion will add four classrooms, creating 100 new spaces for students. Two portables will be removed once the project is complete. Construction at both Coyote Creek and Frost Road is expected to begin in April 2019, with completion anticipated in June 2020.

These three projects, combined, add up to 855 new K-7 spaces in Surrey.

The Province is also investing \$28.9 million to purchase land for a future elementary school, at the southeast corner of 20th Avenue and 165th Street. The school will be needed to accommodate the growing number of students in the South West Grandview Heights area, and will relieve pressure at the existing Sunnyside Elementary. The Surrey School District is contributing \$1.4 million toward the site purchase.

Including today's announcement, government has invested \$107 million for two new elementary schools, three additions, two seismic upgrades and a site acquisition since September 2017. These include a new \$24-million, 655-seat elementary school in Grandview Heights, and a \$9-million, 300-seat expansion at Pacific Heights Elementary school.

Quick Facts:

SN Surrey Schools April 30, 2018

- I would like to start by acknowledging we are on unceded Coast Salish territory.
- Thank you all for being here today.
- Public education changes lives and unlocks prosperity.

Questions & Answers Surrey Schools

Q: What are you doing to reduce the number of portables in Surrey?

- We agree that there are far too many students going to school in portables in Surrey.
- The number of portables in this district increased significantly under the previous government's watch, and we are working hard to address the backlog of badly needed capital projects here in Surrey.
- We are working with the Surrey School District and the City of Surrey to accelerate capital investment in the district and fix this problem that was ignored for too long.
- In the past five months, this government has already invested over \$107 million for two new elementary schools, three additions, two seismic upgrades and a site acquisition.

Q: Why aren't you funding an addition at Sunnyside?

- We are working closely with the Surrey School District to address their capital needs as quickly as possible.
- The future elementary school to be built on the land purchased, along with the new Edgewood Elementary School (formerly called Grandview) and addition at Pacific Heights Elementary that were announced in December will help relieve enrolment pressures at this school.
- The ministry funds capital projects in the order they are prioritized by the school district. The Surrey School District prioritized the projects being announced today before the addition at Sunnyside.

Q: The additions at Frost Road and Coyote Creek are removing six portables – four at Frost Road and two at Coyote Creek. Will there still be portables in use at the schools once the additions are complete?

• These expansions will remove all the portables currently in use at the schools.

Q: Has the Ministry reached an agreement with the Surrey School District on cost-sharing?

- We are continuing to work toward reaching a cost-sharing agreement with Surrey that works for everybody more details to come shortly.
- We are looking forward to moving forward on projects under a new agreement.
- I'm proud of the relationship we've built with the Surrey School District.

Q: Does the Surrey School District have to contribute to these projects?

- The district is contributing \$1.4 million in land capital toward the site purchase.
- Cost sharing requirements are determined on a case by case basis and the district was not required to contribute to the other three projects we announced today.
- We are continuing to work with the district on reaching a cost-sharing agreement that benefits everybody and look forward to sharing more details on that soon.

Q: Are these projects included in the previous government's announcement of \$217 million?

- That announcement was a promise made by the previous government as part of Budget 2017 – to approve \$217 million worth of projects over three years. There were no projects actually approved as part of that announcement.
- In fact, the only project that was actually approved and funded by the previous government as part of that \$217 million was a \$26-million elementary school in Clayton Village.
- In the past five months, this government has already worked together with the Surrey School District and the City of Surrey to actually approve \$107 million in funding for two new elementary schools, three additions, two seismic upgrades and a site acquisition.

Q: Why can't you fund all of the capital projects needed in Surrey right now?

• We want to see the number of portables reduced as quickly as possible across the province and especially in Surrey, and this is a great step toward that goal.

- We have established a Project Office to manage the large volume of capital projects in Surrey.
- We will work collaboratively with the City of Surrey and the school district to find solutions to speed up new school construction.

Q: Will the ministry fund the district's capital plan of 22 projects?

- We have reviewed the Surrey School District's capital plan, and are supporting them to move forward on their highest priority projects.
- We're open to changing policies that will allow us to spend and invest more quickly in getting new schools built, while at the same time ensuring that taxpayers are getting value for their investments.
- Right now, our focus is to get a lot more schools built more quickly.
- We're looking at how to do things differently than what has been done in the past with reasonable policies that make sense not just for Surrey, but for all of the growing school districts in the province.

Q: When will you fund the rest of the seismic upgrades that are needed in Surrey?

- The safety of students, teachers and support staff is our top priority.
- We have a goal to ensure every family in B.C. can send their children to seismically safe schools.
- We inherited a backlog of seismic projects that need to be expedited, and we are getting to work on that in Surrey and across the province.
- In Surrey, 75% of high-risk schools have had their upgrades completed.
- We have supported the Surrey School District to move forward on planning for four out of the five remaining seismic projects in the district.
- We are working with the Surrey School District to find ways to accelerate funding approvals and get to work on seismic upgrades.

Q: The Surrey School District has said they are not receiving enough funding to cover increasing portable costs, and other increasing operational costs in the upcoming year. What is your response to that?

- Education is a top priority for our government and we are moving forward on improving funding for B.C.'s education system.
- We have tabled a budget that is the largest single investment in K-to-12 education in the province's history, and that has the largest capital budget in B.C. to date.
- Operating grants for school districts in 2018/2019 are set to increase to almost \$5.2 billion – up over \$130 million from 2017/2018
- Surrey is expected to receive an estimated increase of \$22.4 million in operating funding next school year, bringing the total to \$650 million for 2018/19. This is in addition to \$37 million provided to the district through the classroom enhancement fund.
- Surrey school district will also see additional savings of \$2.7 million in 2018/2019 through MSP reductions, network savings and reduced pension contributions.
- The immediate 50% cut to MSP premiums, as well as pension plan changes, and NGN savings helped Surrey school district realize \$7.2 million in savings for this school year.
- We are making investments, like today's, to create more classroom spaces to support students in Surrey.
- We are reviewing the district's five-year capital plan and working closely with the Capital Project Office in Surrey to accelerate the pace of school construction from green light to ground breaking.
- This is a transitional year as districts work to implement the Memorandum of Agreement with the BCTF and there are some unique situations and challenges.
- One of those challenges has been an increase in the number of portables in the fall as districts create smaller classes to comply with the MOA.
- We are committed to making sure the use of portables to address growth pressures is not a long-term solution.

Q: Will Government create a policy that states non-temporary portables will be funded through means other than the operating budget?

• We are looking at all of our options and working with the District to find ways to eliminate the use of portables in a way that best benefits students.

"Our board has been pushing hard and working closely with Minister Fleming to obtain funding for new school spaces for our students, so it is wonderful to see the government making these investments," says Surrey Board of Education chairwoman Laurie Larsen. "I know our trustees join our students, staff and parents through-out the Surrey School District in welcoming the announcement and we all look forward to the next one."

The \$5.6-million addition at Frost Road Elementary School will create six classrooms with space for 150 more students. Four portables currently at the school will be removed at the end of construction.

Coyote Creek Elementary School's \$4.9-million expansion will add four classrooms, creating 100 new spaces for students. Two portables will be removed once the project is complete. Construction at both Coyote Creek and Frost Road is expected to begin in April 2019 with completion in June 2020. These three projects combined add up to 855 new K-7 spaces in Surrey.

The Province is also investing \$28.9 million to purchase land for a future elementary school, at the southeast corner of 20th Avenue and 165th Street. The school will be needed to accommodate the growing number of students in the South West Grandview Heights area, and will relieve pressure at the existing Sunnyside Elementary. The Surrey School District is contributing \$1.4 million toward the site purchase.
Including today's announcement, Government has invested \$107 million dollars for two new elementary schools, three additions, two seismic upgrades and a site acquisition since September 2017. These include a new \$24-million, 655-seat elementary school in Grandview Heights and a \$9-million 300-seat expansion at Pacific Heights Elementary school.

- 1. 605 space new elementary in Douglas \$24.3 million
- 2. 150 space addition at Frost Road Elementary in Fleetwood \$5.6 million

The new school and additions will add up to 855 new K-7 spaces in Surrey.

Construction on the new Douglas elementary is expected to start in March 2019 with completion in December 2020.

Sunnyside Elementary (the school where the event is being held) is not receiving any capital funding with this announcement. The future elementary school to be built on the land purchased, along with the new Edgewood Elementary School (formerly called Grandview) and addition at Pacific Heights Elementary that were announced in December will help relieve enrolment pressures at this school.

Surrey schools

These new investments are in addition to the thousands of seats currently under construction in Surrey schools. A new Grandview Heights Secondary and two new Clayton area elementary schools, as well as classroom additions at Sullivan Heights, Panorama Park and Woodword Hill elementary schools, have already been announced. Work is underway on the 1,500-seat Salish Secondary, expected to be complete this fall.

Growing student enrollment in Surrey continues to drive overcrowding and receive significant media attention. Since 2001, student enrollment has increased 18% – from 58,648 students to about 69,446 in 2015/16. The Surrey School District currently has about 325 portables, up from about 270 last year.

Recently, a summit was held in Surrey between Minister Rob Fleming and other ministry officials, as well as representatives from the City of Surrey and Surrey School District to discuss ways to accelerate new school construction to address space pressures. Including today's projects, Government has now announced \$107 million dollars for two new elementary schools, three additions, two seismic upgrades and a site acquisition since September 2017. These include a new \$24-million, 655-seat elementary school in Grandview Heights and a \$9-million 300-seat expansion at Pacific Heights Elementary school.

Questions & Answers Additional student spaces in Surrey

April 30, 2018

Q: What are you doing to reduce the number of portables in Surrey?

- We agree that there are far too many students going to school in portables in Surrey.
- The number of portables in this district increased significantly under the previous government's watch, and we are working hard to address the backlog of badly needed capital projects here in Surrey.
- We are working with the Surrey School District and the City of Surrey to accelerate capital investment in the district and fix this problem that was ignored for too long.
- In the past five months, this government has already invested over \$107 million for two new elementary schools, three additions, two seismic upgrades and a site acquisition.

Q: Why aren't you funding an addition at Sunnyside?

- We are working closely with the Surrey School District to address their capital needs as quickly as possible.
- The future elementary school to be built on the land purchased, along with the new Edgewood Elementary School (formerly called Grandview) and addition at Pacific Heights Elementary that were announced in December will help relieve enrolment pressures at this school.
- The ministry funds capital projects in the order they are prioritized by the school district. The Surrey School District prioritized the projects being announced today before the addition at Sunnyside.

Q: The additions at Frost Road and Coyote Creek are removing six portables – four at Frost Road and two at Coyote Creek. Will there still be portables in use at the schools once the additions are complete?

• These expansions will remove all the portables currently in use at the schools.

Q: Does the Surrey School District have to contribute to these projects?

• No, the Surrey School District does not have to contribute anything towards the school construction projects announced today.

• The district is contributing \$1.4 million in land capital toward the site purchase.

Q: Has the Ministry reached an agreement with the Surrey School District on cost-sharing?

- Yes I am very excited to have reached a cost-sharing agreement with Surrey that works for everybody.
- We are looking forward to moving forward on projects under this new agreement.
- I'm proud of the relationship we've built with the Surrey School District.

Q: Are these projects included in the previous government's announcement of \$217 million?

- That announcement was a promise made by the previous government as part of Budget 2017 to approve \$217 million worth of projects over three years. There were no projects actually approved as part of that announcement.
- In fact, the only project that was actually approved and funded by the previous government as part of that \$217 million was a \$26-million elementary school in Clayton Village.
- In the past five months, this government has already worked together with the Surrey School District and the City of Surrey to actually approve \$107 million in funding for two new elementary schools, three additions, two seismic upgrades and a site acquisition.

Q: Why can't you fund all of the capital projects needed in Surrey right now?

- We want to see the number of portables reduced as quickly as possible across the province and especially in Surrey, and this is a great step toward that goal.
- We have established a Project Office to manage the large volume of capital projects in Surrey.
- We will work collaboratively with the City of Surrey and the school district to find solutions to speed up new school construction.

Q: Will the ministry fund the district's capital plan of 22 projects?

• We have reviewed the Surrey School District's capital plan, and are supporting them to move forward on their highest priority projects.

- We're open to changing policies that will allow us to spend and invest more quickly in getting new schools built, while at the same time ensuring that taxpayers are getting value for their investments.
- Right now, our focus is to get a lot more schools built more quickly.
- We're looking at how to do things differently than what has been done in the past with reasonable policies that make sense not just for Surrey, but for all of the growing school districts in the province.

Q: When will you fund the rest of the seismic upgrades that are needed in Surrey?

- The safety of students, teachers and support staff is our top priority.
- We have a goal to ensure every family in B.C. can send their children to seismically safe schools.
- We inherited a backlog of seismic projects that need to be expedited, and we are getting to work on that in Surrey and across the province.
- In Surrey, 75% of high-risk schools have had their upgrades completed.
- We have supported the Surrey School District to move forward on planning for four out of the five remaining seismic projects in the district.
- We are working with the Surrey School District to find ways to accelerate funding approvals and get to work on seismic upgrades.

Q: The Surrey School District has said they are not receiving enough funding to cover increasing portable costs, and other increasing operational costs in the upcoming year. What is your response to that?

- Education is a top priority for our government and we are moving forward on improving funding for B.C.'s education system.
- We have tabled a budget that is the largest single investment in K-to-12 education in the province's history, and that has the largest capital budget in B.C. to date.
- Operating grants for school districts in 2018/2019 are set to increase to almost \$5.2 billion – up over \$130 million from 2017/2018
- Surrey is expected to receive an estimated increase of \$22.4 million in operating funding next school year, bringing the total to \$650 million for 2018/19. This is in addition to \$37 million provided to the district through the classroom enhancement fund.

- Surrey school district will also see additional savings of \$2.7 million in 2018/2019 through MSP reductions, network savings and reduced pension contributions.
- The immediate 50% cut to MSP premiums, as well as pension plan changes, and NGN savings helped Surrey school district realize \$7.2 million in savings for this school year.
- We are making investments, like today's, to create more classroom spaces to support students in Surrey.
- We are reviewing the district's five-year capital plan and working closely with the Capital Project Office in Surrey to accelerate the pace of school construction from green light to ground breaking.
- This is a transitional year as districts work to implement the Memorandum of Agreement with the BCTF and there are some unique situations and challenges.
- One of those challenges has been an increase in the number of portables in the fall as districts create smaller classes to comply with the MOA.
- We are committed to making sure the use of portables to address growth pressures is not a long-term solution.

Q: Will Government create a policy that states non-temporary portables will be funded through means other than the operating budget?

• We are looking at all of our options and working with the District to find ways to eliminate the use of portables in a way that best benefits students.
