- It's a regressive tax that puts a \$2.6 billion dollar burden on the people who can least afford to pay for it.
- By eliminating MSP premiums, B.C. families will save \$1,800 per year.
- I know the Employer Health Tax is still a concern for many of you.
- We're listening, and we're going to keep working on implementation.

- The Minister of Finance will have more to say on that in the weeks ahead.
- Other Provinces such as Quebec and Ontario have employer health taxes.
- Ours will be the lowest payroll tax of its kind anywhere in Canada.
- With small employers entirely exempt.
- And with 85% of small businesses not paying anything at all.

Small Business

- We're also taking steps to help small business grow.
- That's why we reduced the small business corporate income tax rate by 20%, from 2.5% to 2%.
- It is now the second lowest in Canada, tied with Alberta and Saskatchewan.
- We also cut in half the provincial sales tax on non-residential electricity.

- PST charges on non-residential electricity will be eliminated entirely by April, 2019.
- A couple of weeks ago Bruce Ralston,
 Minister of Jobs, Trade and Technology
 announced B.C.'s Small Business Task
 Force.
- The Task Force will listen to entrepreneurs and business owners like you throughout the province.
- So we can continue to improve B.C.'s small business climate.

 Minister Ralston also appointed an Innovation Commissioner to work with new and existing businesses to ensure our province is leading the way in the new economy.

Climate Change

 Two final points that our government is working on that I want to leave with you today are: Climate Change and Reconciliation with indigenous communities.

- Our economic future will be shaped in large part by the challenge of climate change.
- We have a responsibility to the people of BC, and to future generations to find workable solutions.
- Our government is developing a plan to fight climate change, grow a sustainable economy and make sure families come out ahead.
- But government can't do it alone.
