

## Recent Announcements

 May 22 NR/Event (AEST): Two 2-year pilot projects announced that will work to break down barriers to participation for equity-seeking groups in tech-related sectors. BC's tech sector continues to grow but has a projected talent shortfall and low levels of diversity and inclusion from key groups, including women, people with disabilities, and Indigenous peoples. This \$2M investment will work to close this gap.

May 17 NR/Event (EDU): Construction underway on Grandview Heights, Douglas schools for Surrey students: Two new Surrey schools – Grandview Heights Secondary and a Douglas-area elementary school – are now under construction and will provide more than 2,100 new student spaces by 2021. Government has approved an additional \$32.6 million for the Grandview Heights Secondary school, for a total budget of up to \$93.2 million. The school will have capacity for 1,500 students. The new Douglas-area elementary school, near Peace Arch border crossing, has a total budget of up to \$33.1 million and will have capacity for 605 students.

## **Statement by OIPC on Minister Sims**

## Background:

- Media is reporting on a May 17 statement from Information and Privacy Commissioner McEvoy responding to Kate Gillie's claims about Minister Sims records' management.
- The Commissioner states that the Minister's alleged failure to document government decisions does not fall under his authority, as the Minister herself is designated under the Information Management Act with ensuring compliance with a duty to document.
- He calls on government to make changes so that his office holds that responsibility under FIPPA.
- On the alleged use of personal email, he states that there is no prohibition against using personal email and therefore "the individual's concern is not, by itself, evidence of a violation of FIPPA that would cause my office to investigate." He reinforces however that using personal communication for public business is "extremely poor practice."
- Kate Gillie worked as a constituency assistant for MLA Sims for six weeks in January and February 2019 before being terminated.
- The email Ms. Gillie sent to the Premier's Office on March 4th does not relate to FOI, but rather constituency matters, including a support letter for 10 visa applicants.

## Message:

- I understand this was a challenging HR matter involving a former employee and the Minister has been clear that the claims aren't true.
- As the Minister has said, constituency staff are not government employees and don't do government work it's perfectly normal that constituency business be done on non-government accounts. That's how the system works.
- Last month, B.C. became the first province in Canada to legislate government's obligation to create adequate records of key decisions.
- The former Commissioner, David Loukidelis has said B.C.'s new approach will meet or exceed requirements to document government decisions in other jurisdictions around the world.

Why did your office receive allegations in March and do nothing?

- My Chief of Staff met with the Executive Director of Caucus as the individual did not work for government and her claims relate to her employment as a CA.
- Her claims were looked into at the time and it was determined no donations had been made and there was no other evidence found to support them.
- As it is an HR matter, and the purview of caucus -- not government, we can't go into any further details.

On the Dec. 18<sup>th</sup> letter regarding visa applications from Pakistan:

- MLAs get requests for all sorts of assistance from members of the public.
- Minister Sims has said she didn't see this letter before it went out but that she has taken responsibility.
- I also understand she took steps to make sure it wouldn't happen again.

## **Potential Sale of Private Surgical Centre**

### Background:

- Pamela Fayerman of the Vancouver Sun reported on May 22 that the False Creek Healthcare Centre may be up for sale.
- It is one of B.C.'s first and biggest private surgery facilities. It's parent company appears to have put all 5 surgery centres it owns across the country up for sale, highlights perceived risks facing private surgery businesses, including the Cambie case in B.C.
- Government have asked physicians at private clinics that receive public funding to sign the letters to ensure a full understanding and awareness of the *Medicare Protection Act* and indicate they will abide by it.
- The Act states that its purpose is to ensure that "access to necessary medical care is based on need and not an individual's ability to pay." Extra billing has been, and remains to be, illegal under the Medicare Protection Act.
- Fayerman's reports are based on company reports to shareholders. Government does not have information on whether False Creek is for sale - that is an independent business decision.

## Message:

- Businesses always make their own business decisions based on a variety of factors.
- Our focus is on improving fair and equitable access to the public health care that people in B.C. rely on.
- We're increasing access to publicly funded surgeries and MRIs to decrease wait times.
- We've purchased two private MRIs and brought them into the public system, and embedded the innovations of the former Richmond hip and knee program into our surgical strategy to increase the number of hip and knee replacements being performed.
- We're also expanding the use of our existing public capacity by opening unused operating rooms.

## **B.C. Care Providers Report on Long-Term Care**

## Background:

- A new report out from the B.C. Care Providers Association on May 22 claims that 45,000 new long-term care beds will be needed over the next decade
- Government is working to improve residential care services for services for seniors, while ensuring they can live independently at home for as long as possible.
- It is a complex issue that can't be limited to beds it includes having appropriate staffing for current beds and facilities, working with health authorities to determine where investments are needed in the short and long term and attracting and retaining care professionals.
- Canada's ministers responsible for Seniors are also meeting this week in PEI. The Canadian Medical Association and other organizations are advocating in the media for improved supports for seniors in light of Canada's aging population.
- Parliamentary Secretary Kang is attending the meetings on behalf of B.C.

## Message:

- Seniors deserve dignified and quality care. We've received the report and are staff are taking a look at it now.
- The old government failed to invest adequately to support seniors. On their watch, nine out of ten seniors' care homes didn't meet minimum government standards.
- Helping seniors live at home and independently for as long as possible is our first priority. We're investing in primary care, and expanded adult day programs and respite care programs in the community to support seniors and the people who care for them.
- We're also working to rebuild the residential care services seniors count on:
  - We've increased staffing in residential care homes so seniors get more one-onone time with staff
  - We've put an end to the contract flipping and unstable working conditions in residential care homes that diminished quality of care for seniors
  - There's more to come we're going to keep working to improving and strengthening services to ensure seniors receive the care they deserve

#### **Surrey Hospital & Healthcare**

#### Background:

- People continue to inquire about when people can expect news on the new Surrey Hospital, including the location.
- Government announced on Dec. 18, 2017 that concept planning was starting and would take approximately a year, but there has been no news since then.
- The new urgent care centre opened in November 2019.

## Message:

- For too long, people in Surrey have struggled to access the healthcare they need that's why our government is planning for a brand-new hospital in Surrey.
- We're working as fast as we can The Minister has said we hope to have something to announce soon. We know that this is important for people in Surrey.
- In the meantime, we've also opened a new urgent primary care centres in Surrey so people who don't have a family doctor access teams of health care providers.
- Earlier this year, we announced a new emergency department and surgical suite at Peace Arch Hospital to provide better care and more surgeries for people in South Surrey and White Rock.
- There's more to do we're just getting started.

# Where is the new hospital going to be located?

- That's something that's being looked at right now part of the concept planning stage is identifying potential locations.
- The old government made that work more challenging when they sold off land in Surrey that could potentially have been used for the hospital.
- We're working as fast as we can to clean up their mess and get this done for people.

#### **New Hospital Pay Parking Petition**

#### Background:

- On May 20, Global reported that another petition has been started on hospital pay parking calling for 4 hours of free parking at the Langley Hospital for emergency room patients.
- Media may ask when government will take action provincially.
- In November 2018, the City of Surrey voted to formally eliminate pay parking on the streets near Surrey Memorial Hospital but not at the hospital itself, and asked Fraser Health to reconsider its parking fee structure.
- Another campaign continues to call on Fraser Health to institute free two-hour parking at the lots at Surrey Memorial itself.
- Coquitlam's mayor is also calling on the provincial government to help reduce the cost of parking at hospitals, specifically Royal Columbian in New Westminster.

- I appreciate people's frustration on hospital parking. That's why we decided shortly after forming government that we would not put in pay parking at any new hospital sites.
- Pay parking revenue increased dramatically over the past ten to fifteen years under the old government.
- I know Minister Dix is looking at how we can make things fairer and reduce this burden, while maintaining the resources to support the health care people deserve.
- For people who need relief now, health authorities have a hardship process to waive fees where it poses a particular challenge to patients and families.

#### **Gas Prices - BCUC Investigation**

#### Background:

- Government issued Terms of Reference regarding the BCUC investigation of high gas prices. The BCUC is to report back to Minister Ralston by August 31st.
- The Opposition has complained that the terms prevent the BCUC from looking at impacts of government policy including gas taxes and the Low Carbon Fuel Standard.

#### Message:

- The rapid increase in gas prices in B.C. is alarming and increasingly out of line with the rest of Canada. People in B.C. deserve answers.
- We have asked the BCUC to conduct a fair, transparent and comprehensive independent investigation, to get some of those answers.
- The BCUC has the investigative powers to address questions like, why are the gas companies' margins so much higher in B.C. than the rest of Canada.
- I've also spoken to the Prime Minister about increasing capacity in the existing pipeline to improve the current supply of gasoline and relieve prices.

### Why is the BCUC not looking at impacts of taxes on gas prices?

- Taxes on gasoline are publicly known. We publish regular bulletins on it.
- What's not transparent is how and why the oil and gas companies make huge increases to the price at the pump without any apparent link to what's reasonable.
- Over the past few months gas prices in greater Vancouver have gone up 40 cents, while the carbon tax only went up one cent. The other 39 cents goes to oil & gas companies.
- The BCUC investigation will finally be able to get British Columbians some answers from the oil and gas companies on their price hikes.

# Will the BCUC be able to look at the how the Low Carbon Fuel Standard is affecting prices?

- We've maintained the 2020 target for the Low Carbon Fuel Standard set by the previous government.
- That cannot explain the massive increases in gas prices we've seen in recent months.
- But as British Columbians, we are completely in the dark when it comes to how oil and gas companies choose to make massive increases in the price at the pump.
- Many in the media have commented how difficult it is to get someone from that sector to explain their decision when it comes to gas prices.
- Clearly, we need the powers of the Commissioner in order to get some answers.

## **Teacher Bargaining**

#### Background:

- Over the weekend multiple media stories and social media posts covered the BCTF's
  position that the proposals around class size and composition tabled by the BC Public
  School Employers' Association (BC PSEA) amount to requests for concessions and the
  undoing of the language restored by the Supreme Court case win.
- The BC PSEA lead negotiator has responded to media with more detail about what led to the proposals and clarified that the language can be negotiated through bargaining.
- The BCTF has said they're willing to bargain over the summer and that they don't intend to initiate strike action in the fall.

### Message:

- After 16 years of underfunding by the last government, we are focused on improving services and putting the success of our students at the centre of all we do.
- We are investing in schools for our kids and families, for our teachers and support staff.
- We have invested \$1 billion more than the old government did in 2016/17.
- We are looking forward to a respectful round of negotiations between the teachers' union and the BC Public School Employers' Association.
- Unlike the former government that ripped up contracts, we respect teachers and all they do for our kids.
- No one is looking for concessions. Both sides are looking for change change that is good for teachers, good for students, and good for the education system.
- Bargaining belongs at the bargaining table that is where the parties are working to achieve positive results and it's where solutions will be found.

What do you think it means hearing the teachers' union say they're willing to bargain over the summer and that they don't intend to initiate strike action in the fall?

- It's positive to hear that the parties are so engaged in negotiations.
- We know it's going to take some give and take seeing their commitment is a good sign good for parents and for the teachers.

#### **Housing market downturn**

#### Background:

- Vancouver Sun has reported on a study by a real estate consultant who says that property owners have lost \$89 billion in paper value equity over the past year as the housing market undergoes moderation.
- In May 2017, at the peak of the market, the benchmark price for a single family home in Greater Vancouver was \$1.6 million. Today it's \$1.4 million, a drop of more than 10%.
- CMHC's latest market analysis said that overvaluation is coming down and house prices in Vancouver are moving closer to levels supported by market fundamentals.

- Having a housing market and economy driven by speculative investment and money laundering isn't good for anyone.
- In Vancouver, we saw prices increase by over 75% in 5 years.
- People can't afford a home in their own communities, and businesses can't find the workers they need.
- We're cautiously optimistic that the housing market is returning to balance. The cost of housing in Vancouver are moving closer to levels supported by market fundamentals.
- We'll be watching the market trends closely.

#### **Spec Tax and Assessment Notices**

#### Background:

- On Friday May 17, the Ministry of Finance released information confirming that based on the returned declarations more than 99% of British Columbians will not be subject to the Speculation and Vacancy Tax.
- Additionally, 80% of respondents who will have to pay the tax are made up by foreign owners, satellite families and non BC residents.
- Those who still haven't filled out their declarations will begin to receive Notices of Assessment in the coming days and weeks.
- The notices include a reminder that owners who are exempt but haven't submitted their declarations are still able to do so and will not have to pay.
- If owners who are exempt submit a declaration even after the tax is due on July 2nd they will be exempt. However, if an owner is not exempt and fails to pay the tax by August 2nd the amount owing will begin to accrue interest (but no penalties).

- We committed to taking action on out-of-control housing prices and that's what we've done.
- I'm pleased to see that the Speculation and Vacancy tax is doing what we said it would, by helping get speculation out of the market and returning some balance to the housing market.
- The initial data confirms that over 99% of British Columbians won't be paying this tax.
- And the vast majority of those subject to the tax are foreign owners, satellite families and Canadians who aren't residents in B.C.
- Assessment notices are beginning to go out but for people who are exempt it's not too late to fill out declarations online without any penalty.

## Illecillewaet/CBA

#### Background:

- The Illecillewaet four-laning project along Highway 1 to Alberta is the first CBA contract to be awarded.
- The winning bid came in \$22 million over budget (approx 33%) as a result of increased costs in building materials and labour unrelated to the CBA.
- The projected was awarded to Emil Anderson Construction and work is expected to get underway in June with completion expected in Spring 2022.
- Tom Fletcher wrote a column highlighting ICBA claims that the cost overruns were due to the CBA.

#### Message:

- We're moving forward with major improvements on Highway 1 to make life better for people who travel in the region, beginning with the Illecillewaet four-laning project.

#### Mobile home park demolition - Surrey

#### Background:

- A real estate developer has purchased the mobile home park West Villa Estates.
- On May 8 they presented a contract to the over 200 owner residents, largely seniors, stipulating that residents will need to vacate their homes in 2021.
- The deadline to sign the contract in order to receive the terms is Wednesday May 22.
- MLA Brar met with some residents on May 22 and there has been some media interest.
- The same developer started redeveloping another mobile home park, Green Tree Estates, in early 2018.
- They secured all proper approvals and compensated \$11 million, total, to the 80 residents. Tenants have until December 2019 to move, but some already have, resulting in empty mobile homes needing to be demolished for health and safety reasons.

- This is obviously a difficult time for these people.
- MLA Brar is making sure that they're fully aware of their rights and the resources available to them.
- If they feel the law isn't being followed, we encourage them to appeal to the residential tenancy branch.
- Ultimately, decisions about land use are up to the municipality.
- The province's role is to ensure people's rights are protected.
- That's why we took action to provide more security for park tenants facing eviction as a result of park owners closing or converting a park. Changes include:
  - o ensuring a minimum 12-month notice to end a tenancy
  - o increased compensation landlords must pay tenants to at least \$20,000

#### **Surrey Police Force**

#### Background:

- On May 22, Surrey City Council had a closed door meeting, during which time they reviewed the Surrey Police Report for the first time.
- Later that day, the City of Surrey delivered the report to the provincial government.
- Starting May 23, the City of Surrey will launch public engagement on their plan to transition from a the RCMP to a Surrey Police Force.
- The city says the purpose of the engagement is for people to learn about the transition process and offer input into the priorities of the new force.
- The first engagement session is scheduled at the Cloverdale Recreation Centre from 3pm-7pm.

#### Message:

- We want to make sure the people of Surrey feel safe in their community.
- I'm glad to say we've now received the Surrey Police report and I know the Minister and officials are working diligently to review it.
- The Minister of Public Safety has a responsibility to ensure it is a thorough plan and will keep Surrey safe.
- Our top priority in this is the safety of people living in Surrey, so we'll be taking the time needed to get this right and not rush through this important work.

# Will you publicly release the report?

• I understand the City of Surrey is launching public consultations. It seems to me they will need to release the report in order to consult the public on it.

#### **Reference Case**

#### Background:

- On Friday May 24, the BC Court of Appeal will publicly release the verdict on BC's reference question.
- In April 2018, BC sent a reference to the BC Court of Appeal which consists of a proposed amendment to the Environmental Management Act and three questions to confirm the province's authority to make such a law and its application to an interprovincial project like a railway or pipeline.
- The reference questions seeks to confirm the scope and extent of provincial powers to regulate environmental environmental and economic risks related to the transportation of heavy oils across BC.
- In December 2018, BC and the federal government submitted written arguments for the reference case.
- Each jurisdiction responded to each other's written arguments in February 2019 and hearings for the case occurred in March 2019.
- During the hearings, media reported that BC argued it can't stop TMX, but has the authority to introduce laws to protect the environment from an oil spill.

### Message:

- Our government has been clear we are concerned by the risk that an oil spill poses to our environment, our coast, and the tens of thousands of jobs that depend on it.
- We have a responsibility to defend the interests of British Columbians and that's exactly what we've been consistent in doing.
- We launched this case to confirm our jurisdiction to address the serious risks of diluted bitumen.
- I look forward to hearing the verdict from the court this Friday.

# Will you appeal the verdict if the court rules against your government?

- We've always said that this case would likely end up before the Supreme Court of Canada.

#### Background:

- The B.C. Civil Liberties Association and the Canadian Civil Liberties Association have criticized the recently introduced Community Safety Act legislation.
- These groups have said the legislation will violate rights such as the presumption of innocence when charged with a crime and due process in the court system.
- They've also said changes violate the Constitution's Charter of Rights and Freedoms section on right to life, liberty and security of the person.
- In the next few days, the B.C. Civil Liberties Association is expected to publish a letter in the media calling on government to withdraw the bill or make changes.
- Second reading of the bill wrapped up on May 1, and it will go to committee stage during the week of May 27-30.

- This is intended to target properties which have links to gangs and organized crime.
- We're giving neighbours of places like drug labs and those commonly linked to gun and gang activity—a safe, effective, and timely solution, and giving authorities more powers to shut down those sites.
- We've moved quickly to modernize the act to address the current realities of organized crime in B.C., and to ensure that it's fair, efficient and minimizes administrative burden.
- Similar legislation exists in five other provinces and one territory.

#### **Statement by OIPC on Minister Sims**

#### Background:

- Media is reporting on a May 17 statement from Information and Privacy Commissioner McEvoy responding to Kate Gillie's claims about Minister Sims records' management.
- The Commissioner states that the Minister's alleged failure to document government decisions does not fall under his authority, as the Minister herself is designated under the Information Management Act with ensuring compliance with a duty to document.
- He calls on government to make changes so that his office holds that responsibility under FIPPA.
- On the alleged use of personal email, he states that there is no prohibition against using personal email and therefore "the individual's concern is not, by itself, evidence of a violation of FIPPA that would cause my office to investigate." He reinforces however that using personal communication for public business is "extremely poor practice."
- Kate Gillie worked as a constituency assistant for MLA Sims for six weeks in January and February 2019 before being terminated.
- The email Ms. Gillie sent to the Premier's Office on March 4th does not relate to FOI, but rather constituency matters, including a support letter for 10 visa applicants.

- I understand this was a challenging HR matter involving a former employee and the Minister has been clear that the claims aren't true.
- As the Minister has said, constituency staff are not government employees and don't do government work it's perfectly normal that constituency business be done on non-government accounts. That's how the system works.
- Last month, B.C. became the first province in Canada to legislate government's obligation to create adequate records of key decisions.
- The former Commissioner, David Loukidelis has said B.C.'s new approach will meet or exceed requirements to document government decisions in other jurisdictions around the world.

## What did your office do after receiving allegations in March?

- My Chief of Staff met with the Executive Director of Caucus as the individual did not work for government and her claims relate to her employment as a CA.
- Her claims were looked into at the time and it was determined no donations had been made and there was no other evidence found to support them.
- As it is an HR matter, and the purview of caucus -- not government, we can't go into any further details.

# On the Dec. 18<sup>th</sup> letter regarding visa applications from Pakistan:

- MLAs get requests for all sorts of assistance from members of the public.
- Minister Sims has said she didn't see this letter before it went out but that she has taken responsibility.
- I also understand she took steps to make sure it wouldn't happen again.

#### **B.C. Care Providers on Okanagan Health Care Assistant Shortage**

#### **Vernon Overdose Prevention Site Proposed Location**

#### Background:

- Media has reported concerns about a proposed downtown location for Vernon's first overdose prevention site, and opposition from the local Chamber of Commerce.
- Interior Health has proposed a location, but no final decision has been made.
- The opening date and exact location will be determined after Interior Health selects a community partner to deliver those services.
- The Chamber of Commerce has said that it doesn't want a site in the downtown core, and recommended that an OPS be located at or adjacent to Vernon Jubilee Hospital.

#### Message:

 Overdose prevention sites are a critical part of our response to the overdose crisis, and to connecting people to treatment and care.

### **Kelowna - Urgent Primary Care Centre**

#### Background:

- Kelowna and West Kelowna are still waiting for news on the possibility of a new urgent primary care centre in the Kelowna area.
- Some have called for the Centre to be in West Kelowna, and some physicians have suggested in the media that government is ignoring West Kelowna and has already decided to put it in Kelowna.
- There have been a number of media stories in the Okanagan about people being unable to access family doctors.

- We have been working closely with local divisions of family practice, Interior Health and others around an urgent primary care clinic for the Kelowna area.
- We will have more to say soon.
- We know that after years of the old government's neglect, there are a lot of people in Kelowna who can't access the healthcare they need.
- We're rolling out team-based care across the province so that more people can access teams of health care providers and receive care after hours without having to wait long hours in emergency departments.

#### **Gas Prices - BCUC Investigation**

#### Background:

- Government issued Terms of Reference regarding the BCUC investigation of high gas prices. The BCUC is to report back to Minister Ralston by August 31st.
- The Opposition has complained that the terms prevent the BCUC from looking at impacts of government policy including gas taxes and the Low Carbon Fuel Standard.

#### Message:

- The rapid increase in gas prices in B.C. is alarming and increasingly out of line with the rest of Canada. People in B.C. deserve answers.
- We have asked the BCUC to conduct a fair, transparent and comprehensive independent investigation, to get some of those answers.
- The BCUC has the investigative powers to address questions like, why are the gas companies' margins so much higher in B.C. than the rest of Canada.
- I've also spoken to the Prime Minister about increasing capacity in the existing pipeline to improve the current supply of gasoline and relieve prices.

### Why is the BCUC not looking at impacts of taxes on gas prices?

- Taxes on gasoline are publicly known. We publish regular bulletins on it.
- What's not transparent is how and why the oil and gas companies make huge increases to the price at the pump without any apparent link to what's reasonable.
- Over the past few months gas prices in greater Vancouver have gone up 40 cents, while the carbon tax only went up one cent. The other 39 cents goes to oil & gas companies.
- The BCUC investigation will finally be able to get British Columbians some answers from the oil and gas companies on their price hikes.

# Will the BCUC be able to look at the how the Low Carbon Fuel Standard is affecting prices?

- We've maintained the 2020 target for the Low Carbon Fuel Standard set by the previous government.
- That cannot explain the massive increases in gas prices we've seen in recent months.
- But as British Columbians, we are completely in the dark when it comes to how oil and gas companies choose to make massive increases in the price at the pump.
- Many in the media have commented how difficult it is to get someone from that sector to explain their decision when it comes to gas prices.
- Clearly, we need the powers of the Commissioner in order to get some answers.

## **Teacher Bargaining**

## Background:

- Over the past weekend multiple media stories and social media posts covered the BCTF's position that the proposals around class size and composition tabled by the BC Public School Employers' Association (BC PSEA) amount to requests for concessions and the undoing of the language restored by the Supreme Court case win.
- The BC PSEA lead negotiator has responded to media with more detail about what led to the proposals and clarified that the language can be negotiated through bargaining.
- The BCTF has said they're willing to bargain over the summer and that they don't intend to initiate strike action in the fall.

### Message:

- After 16 years of underfunding by the last government, we are focused on improving services and putting the success of our students at the centre of all we do.
- We are investing in schools for our kids and families, for our teachers and support staff.
- We have invested \$1 billion more than the old government did in 2016/17.
- We are looking forward to a respectful round of negotiations between the teachers' union and the BC Public School Employers' Association.
- Unlike the former government that ripped up contracts, we respect teachers and all they do for our kids.
- No one is looking for concessions. Both sides are looking for change change that is good for teachers, good for students, and good for the education system.
- Bargaining belongs at the bargaining table that is where the parties are working to achieve positive results and it's where solutions will be found.

What do you think it means hearing the teachers' union say they're willing to bargain over the summer and that they don't intend to initiate strike action in the fall?

- It's positive to hear that the parties are so engaged in negotiations.
- We know it's going to take some give and take seeing their commitment is a good sign good for parents and for the teachers.

#### **Speculation Tax and Assessment Notices Sent**

#### Background:

- On Friday May 17, the Ministry of Finance released information confirming that based on the returned declarations more than 99% of British Columbians will not be subject to the Speculation and Vacancy Tax.
- Additionally, 80% of respondents who will have to pay the tax are made up by foreign owners, satellite families and non BC residents.
- Those who still haven't filled out their declarations will begin to receive Notices of Assessment in the coming days and weeks.
- The notices include a reminder that owners who are exempt but haven't submitted their declarations are still able to do so and will not have to pay.
- If owners who are exempt submit a declaration even after the tax is due on July 2nd they will be exempt. However, if an owner is not exempt and fails to pay the tax by August 2nd the amount owing will begin to accrue interest (but no penalties).

- We committed to taking action on out-of-control housing prices and that's what we've done.
- I'm pleased to see that the Speculation and Vacancy tax is doing what we said it would, by helping get speculation out of the market and returning some balance to the housing market.
- The initial data confirms that over 99% of British Columbians won't be paying this tax.

- Assessment notices are beginning to go out but for people who are exempt it's not too late to fill out declarations online without any penalty.

### Indigenous youth reporting sexual assault to RCMP officer

#### Background:

- A 2012 video shared online by APTN shows a 17-year old Indigenous youth (at the time in the care of MCFD) reporting a sexual assault to a male Kelowna RCMP officer.
- The officer interrogates her about past sexual history and why she went to the alleged assailant's house and asks "Were you turned on by this at all? Even a little bit?"
- The youth is a claimant in a lawsuit against MCFD and social workers Saunders and Stynes which alleges Saunders opened joint bank accounts with youth and siphoned their funds. The youth has added the allegation that Stynes punished her for reporting the sexual assault described in the video.
- The Federal Public Safety Minister condemned the actions in the video, calling them "abhorrent". The Federal Minister of Indigenous Relations commented: "totally inappropriate and I don't know where people get that kind of right to re-victimize somebody, it's disgusting". Minister Conroy called the video sickening and horrible.
- Since the story broke, the youth, now 24, has spoken to APTN and CBC about her experience and Grand Chief Stewart Phillip has condemned the RCMP and MCFD.
- Government is unable to publicly confirm whether an individual is or was in care.

- The video is heart-wrenching and appalling.
- Our government firmly believes that when people come forward to report sexual violence, especially young people and Indigenous peoples, they must feel safe and be supported. That's our expectation.
- Women, especially Indigenous women and girls, face many barriers in reporting sexual violence. We must do everything possible to reduce those barriers and protect survivors of sexual violence.
- We are having discussions in government about how best to support survivors of sexual violence because clearly, more needs to be done.

#### If asked about the Police Act/government making changes

- The Minister of Children and Family Development has asked the Provincial Director of Child Welfare to look at this matter under her authority in the Child, Family and Community Service Act.
- We are having discussions in government about how best to support survivors of sexual violence because clearly, more needs to be done.
- The discussions we are having are broad and there are no immediate plans for amendments to any act.
- As well, the Provincial Director of Child Welfare in her capacity as a statutory officer, has sent a letter to the RCMP to express her grave concerns about the media clips that were publicly posted. She is seeking follow up from the RCMP.

If asked about the recent Executive Director of Service firing in Kelowna:

I'm unable to discuss personnel matters.

If asked about letter of apology the youth's lawyer says social workers asked her to write:

I don't have all the details but I can say the video is deeply disturbing.

If asked about the case regarding Saunders allegedly defrauding youth:

- While I can't speak to matters before the court, I can tell you we're doing our due diligence to ensure those youth affected are appropriately compensated.
- We've been reaching out to young people and have referred them to legal counsel.
- As soon as we heard of Mr. Saunders' actions, we put services in place for the young people he may have affected.

#### **West Kelowna Transmission Line**

#### Background:

- In February 2015, then Premier Christy Clark announced BC Hydro would build a new transmission line in the Okanagan, specifically for power to be delivered to West Kelowna, Westside and Peachland.
- At the time of this announcement, three options for the new line were identified. The final route, timing and budget were not announced.
- In the fall of 2016, BC Hydro publicly identified Alternative 2 (connect Westbank Substation to Nicolo Substation using a primarily different route than existing line) as the preferred option, but did not make a final decision.
- BC Hydro was expected to announce the preferred alternative for the transmission line in early 2019, but cost estimates for three initial options had increased significantly since the initial estimates in 2016.
- To allow for additional time to review the cost estimates and consider all alternatives, including improving resiliency of the existing line, BC Hydro has informed all stakeholders a final decision on the line will be made in early 2020.
- The City of West Kelowna has been publicly critical of the delay, and in April, sent a letter to BC Hydro stating they do not support the the resiliency alternative.
- BC Hydro has since met with West Kelowna Council to discuss the topic, and have scheduled two open houses in June for people in West Kelowna and Peachland to learn about the status of the project.

- Our government wants to make sure people living in the West Kelowna and Peachland have access the clean, reliable electricity.
- We've been taking a close look at the all the options, and it turns out that the preferred alternative identified by the old government had higher costs than first thought.
- That's why BC Hydro is taking the time they need to consider the costs and other details of the existing options and considering a new one.
- We want to make sure we make the best decision for people living in the region, so we've been doing our due diligence on this, working with First Nations, local government and stakeholders.
- I invite people in the region to attend BC Hydro's open houses in June to learn more about the project and options.

#### **Tolko Sawmill Shift Reduction**

#### Background:

- On May 10, Tolko Industries Ltd. announced the permanent closure the Quest Wood sawmill in Quesnel and a reduction from two to one shift at one of its Kelowna sawmills.
- The Opposition has criticized recent forestry changes, alleging the changes have created unnecessary bureaucracy, will force companies to leave BC and will cause job loss.
- Media could ask about the shift reduction at the Kelowna sawmill.

- I know how hard it is for a community when these things happen.
- The forestry sector is facing serious challenges from international forces, and the decline of available timber following the pine beetle surge.



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### **Old Growth Logging on Vancouver Island**

### Background:

- On May 13, the BC Green Caucus called for an immediate moratorium on logging old growth forests on Vancouver Island and called for a transition to logging secondgrowth.
- They suggest the province focus on value-added manufacturing and mill retrofits.
- Their press conference was attended by Metchosin Councillor Andy MacKinnon, the Ecoforestry Institute Society and the Ancient Forest Alliance. Mayor Lisa Helps and Mayor Josie Osborne provided quotes in their release.
- In April 2019, BC Timber Sales advertised advertised a timber sale licence with cut blocks in the Parkinson Creek area near Port Renfrew and close to Juan de Fuca Park.
- ENGOs and area residents raised concerns about impacts on legacy trees and on ecotourism operations.
- BCTS did not discover any legacy trees in their initial review but is reaching out to the Ancient Forest Alliance about legacy trees they reported finding.
- The BCTS has now indefinitely delayed the auction, as they inadvertently missed a stakeholder during their consultations.

## Message:

- Our government is committed to protecting the important biodiversity of old growth.
- We're also committed to ensuring a continued vibrant and innovative forest sector.
- Ministers Heyman and Donaldson met with environmental stakeholders earlier this year. This was the first of ongoing talks that will help inform our old growth strategy.

Minister Sims has denied the claims and said she had clarified that constituency business should be done on Legislature accounts - not government accounts.
- The lawyer's letter was also sent to the Office of the Information and Privacy Commissioner who is reported to be looking into the matter according to Woodford.
- The Opposition also released a March 4th email from Ms. Gillie that was sent to the Premier's Office that contains a variety of claims (without evidence) including that MLA Sims was offered \$10,000 donations in exchange for constituency casework, including a support letter for 10 visa applicants from Pakistan, three of whom allegedly turned out to be on a US security watch list.
- MLA Sims has said that the visa letter was improperly replicated for individuals whom she did not know and her e-signature applied without her seeing the final copy.
- On May 15, the Opposition raised additional allegations that a fundraiser for the Chinese community was organized by the Minister's constituency office and the riding association fundraising chair Rabina Sattar. MLA Sims denied the claims.

# Message:

- With regard to the matters sent to the Premier's office, they were looked into at the time and it was determined no donations had been made and there was no other evidence found to support them.
- The matter was dealt with by Caucus as it relates to an employee of the MLA office not of government.

# On the Dec. 18<sup>th</sup> letter regarding visa applications from Pakistan:

- MLAs get requests for all sorts of assistance from members of the public.
- Minister Sims has said she didn't see this letter before it went out but that she has taken responsibility.
- I also understand she took steps to make sure it wouldn't happen again.

# On allegations of donations

- As elected officials we serve the people we represent because that is our job.
- There is no record of any of the alleged donations and the Minister has been clear she didn't solicit or accept money.

### Indigenous youth reporting sexual assault to RCMP officer

## Background:

- A 2012 video newly shared online by APTN shows a 17-year old Indigenous youth (at the time in the care of MCFD) reporting a sexual assault to a male Kelowna RCMP officer. It takes over two hours and she is alone with the RCMP the majority of the time.
- The officer interrogates her about her past sexual history and why she went to the alleged assailant's house and asks "Were you turned on by this at all? Even a little bit?"
- The youth is a claimant in a lawsuit against MCFD and social workers Robert Riley Saunders and Siobhan Stynes which alleges Saunders opened joint bank accounts with youth and siphoned their funds. The youth has added the allegation that social worker Stynes punished her for reporting the sexual assault described in the video.
- The youth's lawyer is questioning why no foster parent or social worker was with her when she was questioned alone.
- In QP on May 15 the Federal Conservative Leader asked the Public Safety Minister if he would be reviewing the incident. The Minister condemned the actions in the video, calling them "abhorrent".
- The Federal Minister of Indigenous Relations commented: "totally inappropriate and I don't know where people get that kind of right to re-victimize somebody, it's disgusting" and MP Cullen called for an investigation.
- Government is unable to publicly confirm whether an individual is or was in care.

## Message:

- I haven't seen the video but what I have been told of it is disturbing and appalling.
- Our government firmly believes when people come forward to report sexual violence, especially young people and Indigenous peoples, they must feel safe and be supported. That's our expectation.
- Women, especially Indigenous women and girls, face many barriers in reporting sexual violence. We must do everything possible to reduce those barriers and protect survivors of sexual violence.
