ISSUE: BRYCE CASAVANT'S EMPLOYMENT STATUS

ADVICE AND RECOMMENDED RESPONSE:

- Bryce Casavant is currently employed as a Senior Compliance and Enforcement Officer Specialist with the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations (FLNRO).
- As Mr. Casavant is a professional public servant, it would not be appropriate to comment on matters relating to his employment status. That is an issue that is appropriately addressed by the Public Service.

SECONDARY MESSAGES:

- While it is public information that Mr. Casavant has challenged the settlement agreement that confirmed his transfer to the his current position from his former role as a Conservation Officer at the BC Labour Relations Board, it would be inappropriate to comment on the matter while it is still ongoing.
