

International Education



B.C. Brand Reputation

- Over 184K international students from 150 countries studying at all levels in B.C. in 2021 – up 83% since 2013.
- \$6.6B international student spending in B.C. in 2019, supporting an estimated 53,000 direct and indirect jobs.
- \$1.5 billion in total annual revenues for post-secondary institutions and K-12 districts (19% of public PSI revenues).
- 22% of Canada's international students come to B.C. to study.



B.C. Economy

- Diverse, open, growing, globally connected economy.
- Added 101,000 jobs in 2021¹.
- Employment now nearly 104% pre-pandemic levels.
- 10-year Labour Market Outlook forecast: +1M job openings
- New immigrants projected to fill 35% of openings (346K jobs).
- 83,000 further job openings will need to be filled.
- 17% of Canada's Post-Grad. Work Permit holders are in B.C.
- 31% of BC PNP nominees studied at the post-secondary level in B.C.



Quality Education System

- 25 public post-secondary Institutions; 3,800 program; internationally recognized research and innovation.
- Strong inter-PSI transfer system
- 20 private degree-level PSIs.
- Over 200 regulated & qualityassured private training institutes
- Trades Training System supporting 90+ skilled trades
- Education Quality Assurance designation sets BC standards
- Approx. 270 EQA-designated PSIs eligible to host international students.


- Educated, diverse workforce supports Economic Plan, CleanBC and Future Ready action plan.

Crown Agency Role

- BCCIE coordinates sector, leads new market development, international partnership engagement, strengthens domestic capabilities.

- \$1.5M government funding.
- Cross-sector representation on board.

Key External Drivers





- Domestic headcount enrolment: -69,995 (-17%) (2010/11 – 2020/21)
- ↑ International enrolment +48,300, to 78,951 (public PSIs).
- 184,350 international students in B.C. at all levels (2020/21)
- 55% of international students from India and China.
- 80% of international students in Lower Mainland



- Significant revenue from international tuition.
- International students are important contributors to regional and seasonal labour markets.




- Rising federal immigration targets 431K (2022) \rightarrow 500K (2025).







e.g. Information and digital gateway for education and career connections; help workers transition to new opportunities; enhance worker protections; culture of continuous learning and training.





MSR/MoSAM Mandate Letter Statement

"Ensuring that international students have a positive experience in British Columbia is important. Whether they choose to stay here and build a new life or return home to put the skills they learned here to work in their home community, the experiences of international students will inform their view of and relationship with British Columbia and Canada for their entire lives. Fair treatment and rapid response to issues and challenges are key to ensuring positive experiences and will help us build our international reputation and continue development of economic, cultural, and personal links with countries around the world."

MoSAM Deliverable (shared with MSR)

"Ensure government is able to respond quickly if private institutions promote or offer sub-standard education to international students, and develop protections for international students that support their fair treatment across the sector."

Related Deliverables (MoSAM)

- * Pass legislation... that will govern the recognition of foreign credential standards.
- * Engage [stakeholders] to identify issue preventing internationally trained workers from working in their field.
- * Propose additional measures to advance a successful foreign credential recognition program.
- * Clear, faster career paths for skilled immigrants.
- * Support the Minister of Municipal Affairs to improve the range of services and supports for new international arrivals.

Other Related Deliverables (MAK)

Support the Minister of State for Workforce Development to help ensure B.C. quickly removes barriers so new international arrivals can find employment sooner in their field of training.
