Thanks so much for your participation on our teleconference yesterday. We've followed up on your questions and I've provided some responses below.

- Resources/Support for First Nations communities *Note Emergency Management BC (EMBC) coordinates emergency management services/supports but other agencies on the call also provide supports during emergencies so others please feel free to add to the list below*
 - EMBC provides the same level of service for both First Nations communities and local governments regardless of jurisdictional boundaries.
 - When emergencies occur EMBC leads the coordination of supports & services for all impacted communities
 - EMBC staff are communicating daily with impacted First Nations communities through our provincial regional operations centres (preocs). Currently, EMBC has 3 preocs open in Kamloops (Central), Nelson (Southeast) and Terrace (Northwest) as well as our Provincial Emergency Coordination Centre (PECC).
 - Specific support EMBC is currently providing to First Nations communities:
 - Daily coordination calls
 - We have had excellent participation from impacted First Nations communities on our coordination calls facilitated by the EMBC preocs. The coordination calls allow First Nations communities to connect with agencies providing supports such as BC Wildfire Service, First Nations Health Authority, Indigenous Services Canada, BC Hydro, First Nations Emergency Services Society, Ministry of Indigenous Relations & Reconciliation etc. EMBC facilitates the calls and if there are any unmet needs EMBC follows up directly with the First Nation community to ensure the need is met. An important benefit of the calls is the ability for First Nations communities to connect with each other.

- Direct communication with impacted First Nation communities
 - Indigenous staff members and staff who have worked closely with First Nations communities are currently working in the preocs and PECC as First Nations liaisons. In addition to the coordination calls, the First Nations liaisons are reaching out directly to impacted First Nations communities on a daily basis to ensure their needs are met
- Reimbursements
 - EMBC preocs work with First Nations communities to reimburse all eligible response costs

• Emergency Social Services

- All impacted First Nations communities are eligible to receive Emergency Social Services (ESS) during an evacuation which can be accessed through reception centres
- Rates and types of supports offered by ESS:
 - 1. Food.
 - a. Restaurant meals. Total per day -\$45.00/person
 - * Alcohol and gratuities not included.
 - i. Breakfast \$10.00
 - ii. Lunch \$13.00
 - iii. Dinner \$22.00
 - b. Groceries. Total per day -\$22.50/person
 - Lodging Accommodation referral forms will be provided by the ESS teams at the Reception Centre.
 - a. Hotel/Motel/B&B
 - i. The cost of hotel rooms are covered by the Province.
 Additional expenses such as video rentals, room damage or long distance calls are the responsibility of the evacuee.
 - b. Billeting can be provided in private homes.
 - i. If you stay with friends/family or community members, the Province will reimburse the person hosting you.

- ii. Rate is \$30/night for the first person. \$10/night for each additional adult and \$5/night for each additional child.
- iii. Billeting amount is paid directly to the person hosting the evacuee.

3. Clothing.

- a. Clothing is provided as needed to preserve health and modesty. Clothing may include footwear or special needs items such as baby diapers.
- Rate is \$150 per person given once, and may be increased to \$200.00/person based on need

4. Transportation.

- a. If transportation has not already been arranged by the local authority.
 Transportation necessary to meet immediate needs can be covered on a case by case basis (taxi or bus passes).
- b. If evacuees were required to drive 100km to receive ESS in their own vehicle, a \$30 gas referral can be issued.

5. Incidentals.

- a. At a rate of \$50.00/per person.
- May include items such as personal hygiene products, laundry supplies, pet food and pet lodging, medications for a 3 day period, and other immediate needs as required.
- 6. *Note Communities who offer to be a host community for evacuees can be reimbursed for eligible ESS associated expenses with prior EMBC approval. The preocs manage this approve process so please recommend that communities who are receiving evacuees contact the preocs so that they can get a task number and then get reimbursed for their expenses

3. Additional financial supports & Provincial Declaration

- Last year during the wildfires additional financial support was provided to evacuees. The additional financial support was provided after the province declared a provincial state of emergency but is not tied to the declaration. At this time we have not received information on any additional supports to evacuees beyond the ESS supports listed above.
- A provincial state of emergency may be issued by the Minister or the Lieutenant Governor in Council and is in effect for 14 days when issued and may be extended or rescinded as necessary
- At this point the province has not declared a provincial state of emergency but we will keep you posted on any changes.

I wanted to touch base with you regarding some ongoing issues we are having with the Ulkatcho community. We are having some communication and resource issues at the junction of the 4 fire zones.

Ulkatcho is concerned about their heritage sites, and other value sites. However, due to the fact that there is no risk for human life or property, there are no structural protection heading that way. They have requested projected evacuation maps, and resources to create guards or roads in the area. However coordinating this between the zones is tricky.

We are looking for some support or direction on what we should do to move forward. We have sent Lindsey Wood to the community to work with them specifically and to coordinate the zones. I was advised to get in contact with you and to see what your thoughts were. There are concerns that this will be going political if not managed adequately.

We followed up with NWE PREOC (John Hawkes, Ops Chief) regarding numbers. Rough estimate at this time is less than 150 people left in the area. There is no confirmation of how many people remain. We asked for more accurate numbers to be provided if they become available (little confidence this will occur).

Latest information on Verdun Mountain Fire from BCWS Sit Rep provided below.

Verdun Wildfire (R11796)

Location: 10 km southwest of Grassy Plains

Status: 16,987 hectares

Cause: lightning

Resources: 110 firefighters and 41 pieces of heavy equipment.

Status: There was growth overnight on the eastern flank. The west flank also grew overnight out to Keefes Landing Rd. Heavy equipment continues to build guard from Takysie Lake to Bintauwta Road south. This guard is expected to be completed by end of day today. Once complete, and if weather conditions allows, firefighters will be looking for opportunities to burn-off along this guard. Structural Protection Specialists continue to help protect structures around the Takysie Lake, while also continuing to assess properties in the area. Today, structural protection will be occurring along Tatalrose Rd, as resources allow. There continues to be a structural protection crew assigned to a night shift. Today, crews will be mopping up along the west flank of the fire and in areas south of Takysie Lake.

Today the ATF will have potential evacuation capability with a Griffon helicopter which will be on ground alert today.

The helo will be stationed in Smithers and can be airborne in as quick as 30 mins.

The alert crew day will end at 2300L (ie 11 PM) but can be extended 3 hrs to 0200 tomorrow morning.

The helo hoist is currently not working but is expected to be fixed by tomorrow morning.

For planning purposes the helo can normally carry up to 8 people; this can be effected by fuel loads and temperature.

The Sea King Helo is currently flying up north in the area of dease lake and bob quinn lake supporting BCWS, so may not be available for a potential evac tasking.

We would still like to get an idea for our planning purposes of how many community members are there.

Issue: Self-evacuating due to smoke

- We're asking people, who have self-evacuated to larger communities due to smoke, to consider returning home.
- In many communities hosting evacuees, accommodations are reaching capacity.
- Emergency Social Services are intended to help those on evacuation order, and while some exceptions were made during this wildfire season, accommodations are now needed for those on evacuation order.
- Because smoky conditions shift and move, self-evacuating to another community does
 not guarantee a person's exposure will be reduced, and unnecessary relocation or travel
 will only add stress and anxiety that can also have negative health effects.
- Due to weather patterns, in many cases the smoke conditions in major urban centres are worse than the areas residents have left.
- Returning home will help host-community Emergency Social Services create the capacity for people who have been evacuated from their homes due to a direct wildfire threat.

Ignoring Evacuation Orders specific to FNs:

- First Nations are responsible for making evacuation decisions in their communities.
- We recognize First Nations' jurisdiction over their lands, their experience with wildfires, and they are integrated into our response efforts.
- Being placed on an Evacuation Order can be a difficult and emotional experience, and some in First Nations communities, residents may be reluctant to leave their homes behind.
- We share the safety concern with First Nations leaders about those who refuse to leave.
- Ignoring an Evacuation Order puts yourself and your loved ones at risk and puts frontline firefighters at risk.
- If you have been placed under an evacuation order, you have been advised to leave the area for your own safety and to ensure the health and safety of firefighters.
- First Nations communities who have issued evacuation orders will have the address of the closest reception centre on the order.
- We continue to support First Nations communities through regular engagement with the BC Wildfire Service, Emergency Operations Centers, reception centers and by connecting them with the First Nations Health Authority and Friendship Centres.

Issue: Burns Lake

Some people are <u>questioning</u> why certain wildfire resources were not deployed to help fight the Nadina Lake and Verdun fires on the South Side of Francois Lake, about 70 km southeast of Burns Lake. BC Wildfire Service shared information via email and social media that said the fire suppression resources in question are not effective tools in fighting these particular fires.

- The BC Wildfire Service is currently exploring a variety of suppression tools, including a range of water delivery systems. These higher capacity water delivery systems require close proximity to very large bodies of water. They also require relatively flat topography, and are most effective in densely populated areas.
- Recently, a high-capacity water delivery system was brought to the Babine Complex, about 70 km southeast of Burns Lake, to be assessed as a structural protection tool for the fires in this area.
- In areas of the fire where this tool would be most effective, the water sources were insufficient, the terrain was challenging and there was significant distance between structures.
- The BC Wildfire Service deferred to the contractor's knowledge of their system, and it
 was determined by the contractor that this high-capacity water delivery system was not
 an appropriate tool for this fire complex.
- As a result, the contractor is being released from the fire complex as the system is not a
 useful suppression tool for this particular fire.
- The BC Wildfire Service is currently evaluating the use of alternate water delivery systems for utilization on the Babine Complex as well as for future use with wildfire

2018 Wildfires First Nations Supports Messaging:

- Our top priority is the safety of all British Columbians, including First Nations communities.
- We have escalated our response to fighting the wildfires throughout B.C. by declaring a state of emergency and requesting federal assistance.
- These actions will give us access to the additional resources we need to battle the wildfire situation, protect property and ensure the safety of British Columbians, including First Nations.
- We are committed to supporting First Nations communities who have been hard hit by B.C.'s wildfire situation.
- We've provided Emergency Social Services support, including billeting and commercial accommodation, meals, clothing, incidentals, pet care, emergency transportation, and emotional support through community agencies to all affected First Nations communities.
- We've also provided communications systems, disaster psycho social supports, HEPA filters to increase indoor air quality and emergency social services (ESS) for evacuees.
- We have daily calls scheduled with affected First Nations communities to answer questions, provide assistance and support, including helping with forms, resource requests and notifications and expense eligibility.
- Additionally, we are working to connect First Nations communities with the First Nations
 Health Authority and the Prince George Native Friendship Centre to provide translators,
 activities and events for evacuees.




A quick update for you on the southside/burns lake issue from Yesterday. Things were relatively quiet on this front today, but have just reignited online.







Use of water delivery systems in the Babine Complex

BURNS LAKE – BC Wildfire Service is exploring a variety of suppression tools, including a range of water delivery systems. Recently a high-capacity water delivery system was brought to the Babine Complex to be assessed as a structural protection tool for the fires in this area.

These higher capacity water delivery systems require close proximity to very large bodies of water. They also require relatively flat topography and are most effective in densely populated areas.

In areas of the fire where this tool would be most effective, the water sources were insufficient, the terrain was challenging and there was significant distance between structures. BC Wildfire Service deferred to the contractor's knowledge of their system and it was determined that this high-capacity water delivery system was not an appropriate tool for this fire complex.

There are situations where water delivery systems would be effective on the fireline and the BC Wildfire Service will continue to evaluate these and other suppression tools.



My name is

That area is currently being ravaged by three out of control wildfires. The alert areas have met up on the entire south side of the lake and are creeping around the heads of both ends.

There is a severe shortage of resources in the area. For the four fires there is 37 support personnel and 16 choppers. Each fire has to share these limited resources. The Verdun fire has 19 firefighters and 13 heavy equipment. The Nadina Lake fire has 25 firefighters and 54 heavy equipment. The Island Lake fire has 7 firefighters and 15 heavy equipment. Does this seem, by any stretch, to be enough equipment to fight fires that are anywhere from 4500 to 25,000 hectares? The bombers have to be shared between four out of control wildfires. There are several heavy equipment operators, loggers and industry professionals who actually know how to fight fire who aren't allowed to do their jobs because the forestry has people in place who supposedly know better than men and women who have worked in the forest industry their entire lives. These people come in and order experienced people to stand down or send them off the lines completely. These people in charge aren't knowledgeable about the area, the industry, what their equipment and operators are capable of or how to effectively use the resources at their disposal. Many equipment operators have taken their equipment and left due to the mismanagement of their equipment.

The majority of still lives up there. Many do not have insurance due to extremely high premiums and extensive lists of things they will and will not cover.

Many people are not being allowed to return to their homes even in alert areas even with proper documentation and permits. How is that ok? There are several large ranches in the area who are cutting fences and opening gates in the hopes that their livestock make it.

The fire sites were not promptly updated with correct information and many evacuees were not allowed to register at the evacuation centre due to the maps not showing them as on evacuation order. The RCMP members manning the barricades have even less information than the fire centres. Family and friends of people living in the area have no idea what's going on as there is hardly any news coverage on any station about the situation.

The lakes district is one of the highest producing timber districts in the province. They are simply letting it burn because there isn't the population density of the lower mainland. There are fires in the lower mainland that are not out of control and not threatening any structures and they have triple the amount of resources. This just blows me away that the people in charge have such a blatant disregard for anywhere that isn't the lower mainland. Where do they think the gas, the oil, the lumber and many of the resources that they depend on to live their daily lives come from? I don't know if the mismanagement of resources comes from the ignorance and inflated egos of the forestry officials in charge or a lack of resources in general or a combination of both but either way it's unacceptable. Why hasn't the province of BC declared a state of emergency? Why has the premier just now made a bid for federal help? And why are only 200 soldiers coming and out of that number, how many are actually going to be out fighting fires? This is our past, our present and our future. This is our livelihood, our legacy, and our economy burning to the ground. This is our story and it needs to be told.
