Public announcement of this change made on September 14.</li> <li>The Restricting Public Consumption of Illegal Substances Act received Royal Assent on November 8. Under this bill, a person must not consume any decriminalized substances at parks, beaches, and sports fields, as well as within 6 metres of bus stops or entrances to businesses and residences that are adjacent to public spaces, such as a sidewalk.
