On August 12th, 2016, the Vancouver Art Gallery submitted a request to your departments requesting a federal contribution of \$100 million towards the construction of the new Vancouver Art Gallery.

The Vancouver Art Gallery is the largest public art museum in Western Canada, and is recognized as one of Canada's and North America's most respected and exciting visual art institutions. The Vancouver Art Gallery currently serves over 550,000 visitors annually, including 40,000 members.

The new building will enable the Gallery to engage well over a million visitors each year. It will serve as a hub of creativity and innovative thinking, and significantly strengthen British Columbia's creative community. The proposal to build this important new arts and cultural facility has been in the works for several years, and enjoys strong public, municipal, provincial and private sector support.

In 2008, the Province of British Columbia made a leadership gift of \$50 million towards the construction of the new Vancouver Art Gallery.

In 2014, the Vancouver City Council unanimously endorsed the project and donated 2/3 of a downtown city block with an estimated value of \$100 million. In addition, the Gallery's own capital campaign has already secured commitments by \$30 million from its Trustees, with plans to raise an additional \$70 million towards the construction of the facility, and an additional \$50 million towards an operating endowment.

I am writing to advise you that the Province of British Columbia considers the construction of the new Vancouver Art Gallery a strategic infrastructure priority for our province.

I would also note that this project will be "shovel-ready" and ready to break ground in late 2017, with a scheduled opening date of 2021. Given the three-year construction timeline for the project, the funding can be distributed over that time period.

I would welcome hearing your thoughts on this proposal.

BACKGROUND

Founded in 1931, Vancouver Art Gallery Association (the VAG) is a BC-registered not-for-profit Society and a federally-registered charitable organization located since 1983 in the retrofitted and leased former provincial courthouse at Robson Square between Hornby and Howe Streets in downtown Vancouver. For over a decade, the VAG has been working toward the development of a new home. (Please see Appendix A)

The VAG's mission is to spark curiosity through the visual arts, instilling a greater cultural understanding by presenting the work of outstanding artists, using art to engage, motivate and inspire.

It is considered a medium-sized regional public art gallery within the national context, with an annual budget of about \$19M, a 25-member Board as its governing body, a full-time staff of 125, around 450 volunteers, 40,000 members & about 570,000 visitors a year.

Individual donations are the gallery's largest single source of annual income and provide 19 percent of revenue, with the City of Vancouver the largest public sector funder at 12 percent; the Province through the BC Arts Council provides 4 percent (\$715,000) and BC Gaming 1 percent (\$225,000); federal agencies come in at 2 percent. (Please see Appendix B)

The VAG servers:

- Approximately 570,000 visitors including 40,000 members (Approximately 30 percent are under 35).
- 202,000 participants in our art education activities.
- 20,255 students in our school programs (7,000 receive subsidized access).
- 17,000 exhibition tours provided in multiple languages.
- 55,000 visitors are welcomed free of charges under our community access programs.
- 90,000 150,000 visitors annually attend the Gallery's touring exhibitions and activities in Canada and abroad.

APPENDIX A TIMELINE

- 1983 The VAG opens its new home in the former courthouse on Hornby Street
- 2001 Kathleen Bartels is hired as Director of the VAG
- A master planning process determined that the VAG required a greatly expanded facility on a new site to accommodate growing demand for its exhibitions, education and public programs, the display of the collection, adequate storage space for the growing permanent collection, and appropriate environmental climate controls and required seismic challenges.
- 2007 VAG's four year Strategic Plan assumed a combined public sector investment of two thirds of the new facility costs by all levels of government and one-third by the VAG's own capital campaign fundraising and a minimum of \$100 million raised through the Gallery's capital campaign.
- **2008** VAG receives \$50M in a one-time grant from the BC government to support a new or refurbished site.
- 2010 VAG mounted a broad public campaign, convincing the arts community to lobby city council for the gallery's moral right to the site.
- 2011 City of Vancouver supports preparation of a business plan for the new build.
- 2012 Confidential business plan prepared by Lord Cultural Resources found that the new proposed gallery would be operationally viable, and could financially support itself on its current funding model.
- 2012 Over 200 Vancouver members of the arts community signed a letter supporting the plan to build a new VAG.
- **2013** Vancouver city council voted unanimously to grant the VAG a 99-year lease at 688 Cambie, with the following conditions.
 - The VAG would have to raise \$100M in federal government funding and an additional \$50M in funding from the provincial government by 2015.
 - The VAG would have to raise 75 percent of the construction budget before building begins.
 - Demonstration of a clear operational strategy.
 - Continued support for local artists.

- 2014 VAG announced the short list of five architectural firms as finalists to produce the design for the new downtown gallery. The competition drew submissions from 75 firms representing 16 nations.
- **2015** City of Vancouver extended the deadline for fulfillment of the conditions to December 2018.
- **2015** Conceptual designs were revealed to the public in the fall from the internationally recognized Swiss firm Herzog & de Meuron Architekten selected to design the facility:
 - The Proposed building is 310,000 square feet and stands 230 feet high, or about 21 storeys.
 - It features 85,000 square feet of exhibition space—more than double what the current VAG site has now.
 - The project is slated to cost \$350M, including a \$50M endowment to support the bigger cost of operation.
- 2015–2016 Schematic design.
- 2016 Design development.
- **2017** Pre-budget submission to the House of Commons Standing Committee on Finance requests \$100M from the Federal Government.
- 2017 Business Case submitted for Project Identified by the Province of British Columbia under the New Building Canada Fund: Provincial-Territorial Infrastructure Component, National/Regional Projects.

It is my great honour to write to you as a cifizen in full support of your commitment to reconciliation with First Nations and to building a strong and sustainable economy for British Columbia.

I am a self-employed artist, living for many years in Vancouver-Mount Pleasant. I have been an active member of the Western Front, an artist-run centre, since 1973 and am co-founder of Centre A, the Vancouver International Centre for Contemporary Asian Art. After a long career in art and cultural activism, it has been my privilege for the past three years to serve as a trustee of the Vancouver Art Gallery Association.

A value driven organization

One of the largest cultural institutions in Canada, the Vancouver Art Gallery holds to the same ideals as your government. Indigeneity, sustainability, cultural diversity, education, innovation, Canada-Asia relations, gender equality, public health, engaged citizenship and social cohesion are all expressed and encouraged through the gallery's rich array of exhibitions and public programs.

Demonstrating wide public support

With a collection of 11,500 art works, over 32,000 voting members, annual attendance of 525,000 and lineups that often stretch around the block, the gallery has clearly outgrown its current facility in a repurposed colonial courthouse.

Ready to build a new facility

The project to build a new home for the Vancouver Art Gallery has been under development for many years and is now shovel ready. The total cost of construction is \$300 million (comparable to other new or expanded museums of this scale in Canada). An additional \$50 million will be raised for an expanded operating endowment. On time, the new building will open in 2021.

A coherent capital plan is in place

The Province of British Columbia was the first to endorse this vision, with an investment of \$50 million in 2008. The City of Vancouver followed up by dedicating the last available block of publicly owned land in downtown Vancouver. The gallery's board of trustees has pledged an initial \$40 million. Additional asks of over \$100 million are now in negotiation. Everyone is waiting for the provincial and the federal governments to come on board.

The federal government is forthcoming

The federal government has been asked for \$100 million and would realize this support through its multi-year investment in Canadian infrastructure. The Prime Minister and key ministers are expressing their enthusiasm. It is up to the Province of British Columbia to provide a business case for this support under the terms of its infrastructure agreement with Ottawa.

The business case is complete

The business case is now on the desk of the BC Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure. It has been developed by ministry staff working closing with Vancouver Art Gallery management and is ready for submission to Ottawa.

The Province of British Columbia is an essential partner

The federal government will be looking for a further contribution from the Province at a later date, perhaps in the form of assistance with the operating endowment.

The direct economic benefits are significant

The new Vancouver Art Gallery will be an engine of economic development, creating secure permanent jobs, attracting talent and spawning new business initiatives. As part of a major re-imagining of downtown Vancouver, the new gallery will anchor a cultural precinct at the east end of Georgia Street, linking the Queen Elizabeth Theatre, the Vancouver Public Library and the CBC to a new civic park and real estate renewal around False Creek, post viaduct.

An important driver for tourism

The gallery has commissioned independent studies that show a considerable impact on tourism and related economic benefits.

Over and above the economic argument, the social benefits are huge.

Represent and promote Indigineity

The Vancouver Art Gallery presents and tours exhibitions by leading and emerging First Nations artists of British Columbia, often accompanied by major publications. It has recently presented the work of Susan Point, Robert Davidson, Charles Edenshaw, Sonny Assu, and Yuxweluptun Lawrence Paul. The gallery has a significant and growing collection of First Nations art. In these and other ways, the Vancouver Art Gallery has a meaningful role to play in the ongoing process of reconciliation.

Encourage cultural diversity

Throughout its collection, its programs, its staff and board, the gallery recognizes the value of cultural diversity. It is a truly inclusive place where a wide audience of different race,

class, age and sexual orientation can come together. It colebrates the possibilities of meaningful communication across cultural difference and actively explores this theme.

Play a material role in the development of Canada Asia relations

Through its highly successful *Institute for Asian Arts* and its longstanding policy of presenting and collecting work by Asian and Asian Canadian artists, the Vancouver Art Gallery recognizes British Columbia's pivotal role in fostering Asia-Pacific trade, tourism and social development. The gallery provides a rich context for the understanding of Canada's rapidly changing culture and economy.

Foster invention, innovation and creative exploration

The arts are the heart and soul of our newly emerging economy of ideas and images. The gallery encourages curiosity and wonder. It fosters new relationships and new possibilities, helping to build in minds young and old an understanding of history and a readiness to engage with complex challenges of the future. The new gallery will attract creative leaders to British Columbia, both as visitors and as permanent residents who will contribute in durable ways to society.

Provide valuable tools for education, citizenship and social cohesion

The current facility already welcomes a large number of student visits. Public school programs sell out as soon as they are announced. The new building will integrate classrooms and workshops within its exhibition spaces. At the centre of the building will be a well-equipped and flexible theatre space, accessible to community partners for lectures, performances, discussions, conferences and concerts. A large public plaza and street level galleries will offer free admission.

Demonstrate the power of gender equality

It is important to note that many of the leaders of this project are women, including the gallery director, Kathleen Bartels, the lead architect, the chair of the capital campaign, several senior staff, many trustees and major donors.

Provide a focal point for the green economy

The new museum is an environmentally friendly project. This innovative facility will achieve the latest standards of Leeds and Passivhaus construction. Its design incorporates two gardens—with full size trees—it foregrounds the use of BC wood products and affords spectacular rooftop views of the mountains. Designed by renowned Swiss architects Herzog & DeMeuron, the engineering and construction partners are all BC based.

Build healthy communities

Fostering values of democratic public engagement and providing spaces for the quiet contemplation of works of art, the new Vancouver Art Gallery will help to build healthy, cohesive and resilient communities. It will be a place where complex and difficult issues can be explored in a nuanced and supportive atmosphere.

The timing could not be better

With all three levels of government supporting the vision, now is the time to act.

The Government of British Columbia is well prepared

The gallery is in active and productive discussions with a number of your ministers. We have already met with the Minister of Education, the Minister of the Environment, the

Minister of Social Development and Poverty Reduction, the Minister of Tourism, Arts and Culture and the Minister of Finance. We have sent invitations to meet to other members of your cabinet and to Vancouver members of your caucus.

The federal government is ready to commit

The Prime Minister, the Minister of Finance, the Minister of Infrastructure and the Minister of Heritage have all been briefed on the project and have expressed their support on numerous occasions. They are eager to proceed with a major social infrastructure project in British Columbia that has proved its viability. The BC Liberal caucus stands firmly behind the project.

Federal money has been set aside

The federal investment will come from moneys already earmarked for social infrastructure.

The project is well managed, transparent, on time and on budget

We have undertaken years of research and development, given careful consideration to options and costs, conducted a juried, international architectural competition, provided steady board oversight and built an expert locally based project management team.

There is great risk in delay

The planning and coordination of the project has targeted 2021 as the opening date for the new facility. If this is delayed much longer, there is a risk that competing forces, rising costs and changing political climate will combine to present major obstacles.

No turning back

The status quo is not viable. The current facility is too small for both the public and the staff. It fails to meet its seismic requirements, which puts its priceless art collection at risk. Its spaces are woefully inappropriate to their purpose, with cramped galleries, bad circulation, no education facilities and no lecture theatre. To stay put and renovate would cost just as much as building a new space, if not more.

This is a project of the people, for the people, by the people

The New Yancouver Art Gallery is not a project initiated by the government, nor is it a private sector venture; nor is it the pet project of any single philanthropist or coterie of donors. The Vancouver Art Gallery is a non-profit charitable organization, publicly accountable, a democratic and community based initiative with 32,000 members, supported by a much larger number of people who understand the importance of art to society.

Provincial involvement will express the highest ideals of your government

Like building libraries, schools and hospitals, this undertaking will demonstrate our highest aspirations as a community. There can be no better use of public land, no greater purpose for the public purse than to create a permanent space for the collection, presentation, celebration and teaching of art.

Create an important symbol and leave a lasting legacy

Exactly what the Louvre has done for Paris, the Tate Modern for London or the spectacular new Remai Modern has done for Saskatoon, the new Vancouver Art Gallery will do for us. It will act as a beacon to the world, announcing what many of us already know—that Vancouver is an international city of the arts and that British Columbia has transcended is colonial past as a land of resource exploitation to become a truly creative player in a new,

greener economy based on renewable energy, harmony with nature, respect for First Nations and recognition of the power of human imagination to build a great civilization.

It's time to make a major public announcement

We are ready now to bring to the key players to the stage. Yourself, the Federal. Government, the Mayor of Vancouver and major private donors can stand together for the official unveiling of the final design. The public is eager for this event to take place.

Dear Premier, I know you face moments of destiny every day. This is one of them. It is not an exaggeration nor mere rhetoric to say that we find ourselves right now at a golden moment of opportunity. It's up to you and you alone to make it happen.

Thank you for your consideration and please accept the expression of my ongoing gratitude for the excellent work you do for all the people of British Columbia.

On August 12th, 2016, the Vancouver Art Gallery submitted a request to your departments requesting a federal contribution of \$100 million towards the construction of the new Vancouver Art Gallery.

The Vancouver Art Gallery is the largest public art museum in Western Canada, and is recognized as one of Canada's and North America's most respected and exciting visual art institutions. The Vancouver Art Gallery currently serves over 550,000 visitors annually, including 40,000 members.

The new building will enable the Gallery to engage well over a million visitors each year. It will serve as a hub of creativity and innovative thinking, and significantly strengthen British Columbia's creative community. The proposal to build this important new arts and cultural facility has been in the works for several years, and enjoys strong public, municipal, provincial and private sector support.

In 2008, the Province of British Columbia made a leadership gift of \$50 million towards the construction of the new Vancouver Art Gallery.

I am writing to advise you that the Province of British Columbia considers the construction of the new Vancouver Art Gallery a strategic infrastructure priority for our province.

I would also note that this project will be "shovel-ready" and ready to break ground in late 2017, with a scheduled opening date of 2021. Given the three-year construction timeline for the project, the funding can be distributed over that time period.

I would welcome hearing your thoughts on this proposal.

Founded in 1931, Vancouver Art Gallery Association (the VAG) is a BC-registered not-for-profit Society and a federally-registered charitable organization located since 1983 in the retrofitted and leased former provincial courthouse at Robson Square between Hornby and Howe Streets in downtown Vancouver. For over a decade, the VAG has been working toward the development of a new home. (Please see Appendix A)

The VAG's mission is to spark curiosity through the visual arts, instilling a greater cultural understanding by presenting the work of outstanding artists, using art to engage, motivate and inspire

It is considered a medium-sized regional public art gallery within the national context, with an annual budget of about \$19 million, a 25-member Board as its governing body, a full-time staff of 125, around 450 volunteers, 40,000 members & about 570,000 visitors a year

Individual donations are the gallery's largest single source of annual income and provide 19% of revenue, with the City of Vancouver the largest public sector funder at 12%; the Province through the BC Arts Council provides 4% (\$715,000) & BC Gaming 1%(\$225,000); federal agencies come in at 2%.(Please see Appendix B)

The VAG servers:

- Approximately 570,000 visitors including 40,000 members (Approximately 30% are under 35)
- 202,000 participants in our art education activities
- 20.255 students in our school programs (7,000 receive subsidized access)

- 55,000 visitors are welcomed free of charges under our community access programs

2012 Confidential business plan prepared by Lord Cultural Resources found that the new proposed gallery would be operationally viable, and could financially support itself on its current funding model.

2012 Over 200 Vancouver members of the arts community signed a letter supporting the plan to build a new VAG.

Vancouver city council voted unanimously to grant the VAG a 99-year lease at 688 Cambie, with the following conditions.

- The VAG would have to raise \$100 million in federal government funding and an additional \$50 million in funding from the provincial government by 2015.
- The VAG would have to raise 75 per cent of the construction budget before building begins
- Demonstration of a clear operational strategy
- Continued support for local artists

VAG announced the short list of five architectural firms as finalists to produce the design for the new downtown gallery. The competition drew submissions from 75 firms representing 16 nations.

2015 City of Vancouver extended the deadline for fulfillment of the conditions to December 2018

2015 Conceptual designs were revealed to the public in Fall from the internationally recognized Swiss firm Herzog & de Meuron Architekten selected to design the facility:

- The Proposed building is 310,000 square feet and stands 230 feet high, or about 21 storeys.
- It features 85,000 square feet of exhibition space—more than double what the current VAG site has now.
- The project is slated to cost \$350 million, including a \$50 million endowment to support the bigger cost of operation.

To the Members of the Vancouver Art Gallery Association

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Vancouver Art Gallery Association, which comprise the statement of financial position as at June 30, 2017, the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes, comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Notes to Financial Statements

Year ended June 30, 2017

Purpose of the Organization: The Vancouver Art Gallery Association (the "Association") is a not-for-profit organization incorporated in April 1931 under the Society Act (British Columbia) and is a registered charity for Canadian income -tax-purposes. Its-objectives are to establish and maintain an art-gallery for the perpetual benefit of the City of Vancouver and its citizens. On November 28, 2016, the new Societies Act (British Columbia) become effective. The Association has until November 28, 2018 to transition to the new Act.

1. Significant accounting policies:

The financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with Canadian Accounting Standards for Not-For-Profit Organizations and includes the following change and significant accounting policies:

(a) Change in accounting policy:

In the current year, the Association changed its policy on the accounting for contributions from the deferral method to the restricted fund method as described in note 1(g). Previously, under the deferral method, all externally restricted contributions were initially deferred, and subsequently recognized as revenue when spent in accordance with the restrictions. Contributions of or for the acquisition of capital assets were deferred and recognized as revenue on the same basis as the amortization expense for the related asset. The change in accounting policy has been applied on a retrospective basis.

As a result of the change in accounting policy, the amounts previously reported as at and for the year ended June 30, 2016 have accordingly been restated as follows:

(b) Fund accounting:

These financial statements include the undernoted funds which are segregated for purposes of carrying on specific activities as described below.

- (i) The General Fund reflects the results of general operations of the Association.
- Georgia Street building and receives restricted income earned by The Vancouver Art
 Gallery Endowment Fund for Acquisitions of Art. The Association also receives restricted
 income from The Vancouver Art Gallery Foundation (the "Foundation") which has
 established several acquisition endowment funds (note 12(a)). The purpose of the fund is
 to manage the funding and expenditures on the art collection (the "Collection") of the
 Vancouver Art Gallery.
 - (iii) The Building Fund was established in 2008 for the express purpose of accumulating, managing and distributing funds to plan, develop and build a new Vancouver Art Gallery (note 11).
 - (iv) The Operating Capital Fund was established in 2012 for the purpose of accumulating and managing capital that is either raised through external contributions or internal funds and is restricted expressly for the purpose of meeting future working capital or other contingency funding needs of the General Fund. Any temporary financing provided by the Operating Capital Fund to the General Fund is recorded as an interfund balance to be repaid to the Operating Capital Fund. Any contributions received specifically for this fund are considered to be held on a permanent basis as they are not available other than for the General Fund's financing requirements.

in addition, the Life Benefactors Endowment Fund was initially established in 1989 and the income from the Fund is intended to finance special projects as determined by the Board of Trustees. This fund is permanently restricted and administered by the Vancouver Foundation as described in note 10 and is not included in these financial statements.

(c) Cash and cash equivalents:

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and highly liquid investments with terms to maturity of three months or less at the date of acquisition.

(d) Short-term investments:

Short-term investments-consist of highly-liquid-investments with terms to maturity between three and twelve months at the date of acquisition.

(e) Prepaid exhibition costs:

Prepaid exhibition costs consist of exhibition expenditures that have been paid by the Association, the benefits of which relate to exhibitions held subsequent to year-end. These expenditures are recognized as exhibition expenses over the duration of the exhibition.

(f) Inventories:

Inventories are comprised primarily of the following categories:

- (i) Books, jewellery, paper products, gifts, reproductions and clothing held-for-sale in the Gallery Store is stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost is determined on a weighted average basis.
- (ii) Owned artwork held-for-sale or rental in the Art Rental & Sales Department, where the Association is the title holder and ultimate beneficiary, is stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

Costs for inventories include all costs incurred in bringing inventories to their present location and condition. Net realizable value is defined as the anticipated selling price less the costs to sell. Any previous write-downs to net realizable value are reversed when there is a subsequent increase in the value of inventories.

(g) Revenue recognition:

The Association adopted the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions in the current year (note 1(a)). Restricted contributions for which a corresponding restricted fund is presented are recognized as revenue of that fund in the year received or receivable. Any externally restricted contributions for which there is no corresponding restricted fund is recorded in the general fund, using the deferral method of accounting. Under this method of accounting, revenue received with specific external restrictions is deferred and recognized in the period the related expenses are incurred or the restrictions are met. Government grant contributions provided for use towards general operations are recognized on a straight-line basis over the period for which the grants are provided.

Contributions of or toward the purchase of capital assets under the general fund are recorded as deferred capital contributions and amortized into revenue at the same rate as the amortization of the related capital asset.

Restricted capital contributions to be maintained as part of the Operating Capital Fund are recorded as revenue within that fund in the year they are received or receivable.

(g) Revenue recognition (continued):

The portions of membership fees and exhibition loan fees relating to future periods are deferred and amortized into revenue over the period of membership or exhibition,

Gallery Store, Artist Editions and Art Rentals & Sales revenues are recognized at the time the sales and rentals are made.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Pledged donation amounts are recorded as revenue when the amount to be received and the timing of collection can be reasonably estimated, typically when signed pledge forms are received, and ultimate collection is reasonably assured.

Revenue and expenses related to fundraising and other special events, where the Association is the principal to the events, are recorded on a gross basis.

(h) Capital assets and building project under development:

Purchased capital assets are recorded at cost. Contributed capital assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution. Assets acquired under capital leases are amortized over the estimated life of the assets or over the lease term, as appropriate. Repairs and maintenance costs are charged to expense. Betterments that improve the service potential or extend the estimated life of an asset are capitalized.

Building project under development includes development and construction costs as well as overhead costs directly attributable to the new Vancouver Art Gallery. The carrying value of these assets reflects the current project plan of the Association, and will be evaluated annually in accordance with the Association's impairment of capital assets and building project under development policy as described in note 1(c)(vii).

Capital assets are amortized on a straight-line basis over the useful lives of the assets as follows:

Assets under development or construction are not amortized until the asset is available for productive use.

(i) Impairment of capital assets and building project under development:

The Association reviews, for Impairment, the carrying value of capital assets to be held and used whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that a cost incurred to acquire or develop an asset does not provide future service potential to the Association. If such conditions exist, an impairment loss is measured at the amount by which the carrying amount of the asset exceeds its residual value.

(j) Foreign currency translation;

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies have been translated at the rate of exchange in effect at year end. Non-monetary items, revenues and expenses are translated at rates of exchange in effect when the assets were acquired or obligations incurred. Exchange gains and losses are included in the determination of excess of revenues over expenses for the period.

(k) Pension plan:

The Association maintains a defined contribution plan for its employees. Pension plan costs for the employees of the Association are funded annually and are charged to operating expenses. These costs totaled \$188,889 for the year ended June 30, 2017 (2016 - \$173,529).

(i) Collection:

The costs of additions to the collection are charged as an expense in the Acquisitions Fund in the year of acquisition.

(m) Donated works of art, materials and services:

The Association receives donated works of art, materials and services, including services from governance members, the value of which is not reflected in these financial statements given the difficulty of determining the fair value.

(n) Financial Instruments:

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value on initial recognition. Freestanding derivative instruments that are not in a qualifying hedging relationship and equity instruments that are quoted in an active market are subsequently measured at fair value. All other financial instruments are subsequently recorded at cost or amortized cost, unless management has elected to carry the instruments at fair value. The Association has not elected to carry any such financial instruments at fair value.

Transaction costs incurred on the acquisition of financial instruments measured subsequently at fair value are expensed as incurred. All other financial instruments are adjusted by transaction costs incurred on acquisition and financing costs, which are amortized using the straight-line method.

(n) Financial instruments (continued):

Financial assets carried at cost or amortized cost are assessed for impairment on an annual basis at the end of the fiscal year if there are indicators of impairment. If there is an indicator of impairment, the Association determines if there is a significant adverse change in the expected amount or timing of future cash flows from the financial asset. If there is a significant adverse change in the expected cash flows, the carrying value of the financial asset is reduced to the highest of the present value of the expected cash flows, the amount that could be realized from selling the financial asset or the amount the Association expects to realize by exercising its right to any collateral. If events and circumstances reverse in a future period, an impairment loss will be reversed to the extent of the improvement, not exceeding the initial (o) Use of estimates:

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the year. Significant items requiring the use of management estimates include the determination of useful lives of capital assets for purposes of amortization, valuation of inventories, allowance for doubtful accounts related to accounts and pledges receivable, and provisions, if any, for contingencies. Actual results may differ

2. Pledges:

(a) General Fund:

In accordance with the Association's revenue recognition policy, included in grants, pledges, interest and accounts receivable are pledges receivable of \$2,215,178 (2016 - \$1,894,634) net of \$120,000 (2016 - \$20,000) In provision for impairment.

(b) Building Fund:

Total to date, the Association raised \$34.5 million in private sector pledges for the development of the new Vancouver Art Gallery, excluding interest earned. Of this amount, \$18.6 million of these pledged donations have finalized documented agreements, of which payments of \$3.4 million have been received by the Association. The remainder of the pledges are confirmed and are in the process of finalizing their respective agreements. As these are all long term pledges, they have not yet been recorded as an asset on the financial statements.

4. Bank indebtedness:

The Association has an available operating line of credit of \$2.25 million which bears interest at the bank's prime rate plus 0.50% and is secured by a general security agreement representing a first charge on the Association's assets excluding:

- (a) gifts, bequests and donations received by the Association with instructions for the specific use not forming part of the general operating expenses of the Association; and
- (b) any funds, including interest accumulated thereon received with respect to the relocation related capital campaign, including without limitation the \$50 million funding received from the Province of British Columbia.

Accounts payable and accrued liabilities:

Included in accounts payable and accrued liabilities are government remittances of \$30,149 (2016 – \$36,530), which includes amounts payable for PST, and payroll related taxes.

10. Endowment funds:

Endowment funds are permanently held and administered by the Vancouver Foundation. Consequently these funds are not included as assets of the Association in these financial statements. These funds, at market and cost values, are comprised of:

Under the terms of these endowment funds, the Association receives investment income earned on the capital. Income for the year ended June 30, 2017 of \$373,685 (2016 - \$357,709) from the Vancouver Art Gallery Endowment Fund for Acquisitions of Art and has been recorded in the Acquisitions Fund. Income for the year ended June 30, 2017 of \$35,116 (2016 - \$36,353) from the General and Life Benefactors components of the Vancouver Art Gallery Endowment Fund has been recorded in the General Fund.

11. Building Fund:

On March 31, 2008, the Province of British Columbia made a grant to the Association in the amount of \$50,000,000, with a restriction that the funds be used for the general purpose of planning, developing and building of a new Vancouver Art Gallery. This grant funding along with all additional contributions received by the Association restricted for the purpose of the new art gallery have been recorded as externally restricted revenues of the Building Fund in the year the funds are received. The Association received \$348,353 of such contributions in 2017 (2016 - \$32,187).

During the year, the Association made disbursements of \$5,416,355 (2016 - \$6,470,551) from the Building Fund related to the new Vancouver Art Gallery building project, including \$3,776,811 (2016 - \$3,866,067) of costs capitalized to building project under development, \$247,278 (2016 - \$367,899) of capitalized computer, software, and furniture and fixtures, and \$1,392,266 in other building project operating expenses.

Unspent funds are invested in accordance with the Association's Board approved investment policy. During the year ended June 30, 2017, unrestricted investment income earned on these investments and recorded under the General Fund was \$527,682 (2016 - \$674,259). The Board of Trustees approved the interfund transfer of the investment income earned during the year to the Building Fund. As at June 30, 2017, cumulative investment income transferred to the Building Fund totaled \$6,228,820 (2016 - \$5,701,138).

12. Related and economic interest:

(a) Vancouver Art Gallery Foundation:

The Foundation was incorporated in March 1998 under the Society Act (British Columbia) and is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act. The Foundation has until November 26, 2018 to transition to the new Societies Act (British Columbia). Its purpose is to receive, hold and invest bequests, donations, gifts, funds and property, the income from which supports the programs, operations and activities of the Association. The Foundation's Board of Trustees is elected by the membership of the Foundation, which consists of the Association's Trustees and the elected Foundation's trustees who are not Association's Trustees. The Foundation has not been consolidated in the Association's financial statements.

For the year ended June 30, 2017, the Foundation's donation to the Association amounts to \$537,566 (2016 - \$525,856). The Foundation also receives income on endowment funds, which are permanently held and administered by the Vancouver Foundation. The market value of these funds at June 30, 2017 is \$11,603,364 (2016 - \$10,927,669).

As at June 30, 2017 the Association has \$88,046 (2016 - \$146,144) in accounts receivable owing from the Foundation.

(b) Friends of Vancouver Art Gallery:

Friends of Vancouver Art Gallery ("Friends") is a non-profit organization incorporated in the United States in March 2003 and is independent of the Association.

Its purpose is to receive donations, gifts, funds, and property from residents of the United States for the benefit of the Association. During fiscal 2017, the Friends made a \$14,274 (2016 – \$14,520) donation to the Association, which is recorded in fundraising revenue in the statement of operations.

(c) Other:

During the year, the Association received approximately \$1.8 million (2016 - \$1.9 million) in contributions by members of the Board of Trustees or organizations affiliated with these members comprising donations, sponsorships and special event support.

13. Collection and Acquisitions Fund:

Collection:

The Association is responsible for the management of the Vancouver Art Gallery collection and fine arts reference library. The collection comprises of paintings, drawings, sculptures, photography, prints and other visual art materials. The Association incurred \$1,199,728 (2016 - \$201,615) in expenditures acquiring new works for the collection during the year. There were no disposals of any collection items during the year.

13. Collection and acquisitions fund (continued):

The Association's art collection is held for the perpetual benefit of the City of Vancouver and its citizens.

Acquisitions fund:

During 2010, the Association received a bequest of \$2,852,477 from the Estate of Anne Eliza Winn, which is held externally with a trustee. As a condition of the bequest, funds may only be used to purchase original works of art from the 'Group of Seven' and the Association is reimbursed from the bequeathed funds at the time of purchase. During the year, the Association purchased a work of art by Frederick Varley entitled Indians, Rice Lake, BC, dated 1935 for \$239,894 (2016 – nil).

Amounts are recorded as bequest revenue and art acquisition expenses under the Acquisitions Fund in the year the purchase occurs. The market value of the unspent funds at June 30, 2016 is \$686,495 (2016 = \$893,016).

14. Remuneration to employees, contractors and directors:

For the year ended June 30, 2017, the Association paid total remuneration of \$1,834,994 to the top ten employees and contractors for services, each of whom received total annual remuneration of \$75,000 or greater.

No remuneration was paid to any member of the Association's board of trustees.

15. Financial risks:

(a) Liquidity risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Association will be unable to fulfill its obligations on a timely basis or at a reasonable cost. The Association manages its liquidity risk by monitoring its operating requirements. The Association prepares budget and cash forecasts to ensure it has sufficient funds to fulfill its obligations. There has been no change to the risk exposures from 2016.

(b) Interest rate risk:

The Association's bank indebtedness has a variable interest rate based on prime plus a margin. As a result, the Association is exposed to interest rate risk related to the amount of bank indebtedness outstanding (note 4).

15. Financial risks (continued):

(c) Credit risk:

The Association is exposed to credit risk related to its accounts and pledges receivable. It is management's opinion the related risk is not significant due to the nature and credit worthiness of the counterparties and that the amounts are only recorded when ultimate collection is reasonably assured.

(d) Industry:

The Association operates in the cultural industry environment and can be affected by general economic trends. A decline in economic conditions, public consumer-spending levels or other adverse conditions could lead to reduced revenues and changes in operating results.

(e) Currency risk:

The Association is, from time to time, exposed to financial risks as a result of exchange ratefluctuations and the volatility of these rates related to their foreign currency denominated accounts payable. As at June 30, 2017, the Association has payables outstanding denominated in various foreign currencies, most notably \$121,619 in USD accounts payable. The Association does not currently enter into forward contracts to mitigate this risk.

There were no changes to the risk exposures from 2016.

16. Commitments:

The Association leases its current premises from the City of Vancouver for a period of 99 years ending 2079 for annual payments of \$1. The fair value of the rent cannot be readily determined and is not recorded in these financial statements.

The Board of Trustees has approved \$4.5 million for the next phase of the development of the new Vancouver Art Gallery building project, which includes \$1.6 million in contractual commitments outstanding at June 30, 2017.

17. Comparative information:

New Gallery Funding Issue: (From TAC Issues Note)

- The VAG is seeking \$100 million in federal government funding and an additional \$50 million from the Province to build an iconic \$350-million art gallery at 688 Cambie Street in downtown Vancouver.
- The VAG has already received \$50 million in a one-time grant in 2008 from the B.C. Government to support a new or refurbished site. In 2006 the Province provided the City of Vancouver with \$5 million to plan a cultural district, which is yet to be determined.
- At about 300,000 square feet, the proposed new facility would more than double the space of the current gallery.
- It's important to note that in VAG document "The Transformation of the Vancouver Art Gallery", it states: Province of British Columbia: a leadership gift of \$50 million by the Province, with an understanding that additional future financial support would be provided once all levels of government have signed onto the project with financial support. (pg. 5)
- The document also states: We are requesting that Budget 2017 include a federal contribution of \$100 million over the next three years toward the capital costs of the new Vancouver Art Gallery related to the project's construction phase. (pg. 6)

BACKGROUND ON VANCOUVER ART GALLERY:

- For more than 85 years, the Gallery has played a vital role in sustaining and developing the visual arts in British Columbia. Its permanent collection numbers 12-thousand works of art, a repository of the visual art history of British Columbia, held in trust for the people of Vancouver and British Columbia. The collection includes noted works by Emily Carr, the Group of Seven (including Lawren Harris, AY Jackson, Jock Macdonald and others), EJ Hughes, Jack Shadbolt, contemporary First Nations artists (including Jim Hart, Sonny Assu, Susan Point, Beau Dick and Brian Jungen), and the internationally renowned Vancouver photoconceptual school (including Jeff Wall, Rodney Graham, Stan Douglas and Ken Lum).
- The Gallery operates on a budget of about \$20M, of which it raises about \$16M (or 80%).
- The Province of BC provides about a million dollars in funding to the Gallery each year, via the BC Arts Council and BC Gaming grants.
- For more than a decade, the Gallery has been pursuing construction of a new building with more space for exhibitions, display of the permanent collection, and education. In 2013, the City of Vancouver provided a lot in downtown Vancouver, contingent on certain fundraising goals being met. In 2015, the Gallery hired international architects Herzog & De Meuron to design a new \$350M gallery.
