KEY MESSAGES/SUGGESTED SCRIPT:

- I want to start by thanking you for the work and effort you have put into this project.
- Your leadership and the technical expertise of the COC is clearly evident in the concept you've put together.
- You presented your Hosting Proposal to me and the Premier.
- You asked the Province to support moving the Bid forward.
- I want to respect the Indigenous led approach you've brought to this process and speak with you directly before the provincial government communicates its position around a 2030 Games Bid.
- Our government has considered your Hosting Proposal and decided.
- Now is not the right time for the Province to invest in a 2030 Olympic and Paralympic bid.
- Simply put, the costs are too high and the risks too many.

- You are all aware of the urgent challenges we have in health care, in affordability, in labour supply, in housing.

- Yes, a bid might advance work in some of those areas.
- But, frankly, not enough.
- We are focused on addressing these challenges directly, and not through a 2030 Games bid.
- When this work first started, we had not secured bids for the FIFA World Cup in 2026 or the Invictus Games in 2025.
- We were also very concerned about supporting the Tourism sector's recovery from COVID.
- But that has changed: We have secured the rights for both events and the Tourism sector has rebounded faster than expected from COVID.
- Frankly, our hosting plate is full.
- We are also supporting a bid to host the North American Indigenous Games in 2027.
- Planning and executing these major events take a significant amount of time and resourcing.
- To be successful, we must dedicate provincial resources to these nearer term events.
- We hope you'll join us in that effort.
- We believe these events will bring focus to your Nations and to reconciliation on the international stage.
- I know this has been a lot of work on the Hosting Proposal.
- So, I want to thank everyone involved in this process again for your work and commitment to this
 project.

BACKGROUND:

2030 Games Leadership/Governance

- The Leadership Assembly is the decision-making body for the project and is comprised of the COC, CPC, four host First Nations, the City of Vancouver (CoV) and Resort Municipality of Whistler (RMOW).
 - The Hosting Proposal submitted to the Province for consideration came from the Host First Nations with the support of the COC and CPC.
- Neither the province or federal government has been part of the formal decision-making for the project.
