Paving the way for overnight commercial truck parking

DELTA – The Government of B.C. will construct a new truck parking facility in Delta to benefit commercial truckers traveling to the Lower Mainland, Transportation and Infrastructure Minister Todd Stone announced today.

"Operating a commercial vehicle is demanding work, and truck drivers need safe, convenient places to park overnight," said Stone. "The addition of new truck parking facilities in the Lower Mainland is just one of a number of commitments our government has made in B.C. on the Move to address efficiency and safety improvements for the trucking industry."

The new truck parking facility will be constructed on provincial land on Nordel Way at Highway 91 in Delta, across from the Nordel commercial vehicle inspection facility. Site preparation will begin this fall and construction will start in spring 2016. When completed later in 2016, the truck parking facility will have room for up to 40 heavy trucks to overnight. It will include lighting, washrooms, garbage cans and a sani-dump.

"When heavy trucks have no safe, convenient place to park, they end up on our residential streets or on agricultural land," said Surrey-Fleetwood MLA and Minister of Education Peter Fassbender. "The addition of this facility will remove some trucks from Surrey streets and improve conditions for commercial drivers."

"We are working with the Province on a number of initiatives through the Provincial Trucking Strategy," said BC Trucking Association president Louise Yako. "A strong trucking industry relies on strong transportation infrastructure, and new truck parking facilities in the Lower Mainland are welcome improvements to the network."

This facility at Nordel Way and Highway 91 is the first of at least two new truck parking facilities in the Lower Mainland, as committed in B.C. on the Move, the Province's 10-year transportation plan. Evaluations are currently underway for a second facility in the Lower Mainland.



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Questions and Answers Updated July 7, 2015 BC on the Move Truck Parking Facility announcement

1. What is the facility that government is constructing?

- We are building a truck parking facility with room for up to 40 commercial trucks to overnight.
- It will have washrooms, lighting and a sani-dump.

2. How much will it cost to build?

 The cost estimate is still being determined as we finalize the design.

3. Who is paying for the facility?

This project is funded by the Province of B.C.

4. When will it be ready?

- We are doing site preparation starting this fall, with construction starting in spring 2016.
- The facility will be ready later in 2016.

5. When open, who will operate the facility?

- The ministry intends to initially manage, operate and maintain the parking facility through the maintenance contractor.
- However, other options will be assessed including partnership arrangements.

6. Is this intended to be truck staging or parking for port truckers?

- No, this facility is not for staging it's meant to provide convenient parking and a rest area for truckers.
- We're making this facility available to all truckers on a first-come, first-served basis.

7. How will this parking facility be policed so that it's not used or monopolized by port truckers?

- The site will be for use for all truckers on a first-come basis.
- The ministry will monitor use of the parking area to determine if any concerns or problems arise.

8. Does the Province have any other facilities like this?

 While the ministry operates and maintains many rest areas across the province, this is the first facility that will be focused solely on addressing specifically overnight parking for commercial vehicles

9. Will truck drivers have to pay to park and use the facilities?

 No, the usage will be similar to a rest area and available on a first come first serve basis.

10. Will the Province be constructing any more of these parking facilities?

- In B.C. on the Move, we committed to building at least two facilities in the Lower Mainland
- We're currently doing evaluations for a second site.
- This will involve working with industry to identify locations, conducting public consultation as part of the assessment, and ensuring that we are providing the best possible site for our trucking industry.

11. When would any public consultations happen?

 Public and stakeholder engagement to determine the second site would begin this fall.

12. Was there any consultation on the Nordel site?

 We consulted with stakeholders, including the trucking association, on the site we're announcing today.

13. Will any be sited in Surrey?

- We recognize the need for truck parking in the Lower Mainland, particularly in the Delta-Surrey area.
- We are looking for potential sites in Surrey.

14. Is the Province considering any sites in Abbotsford?

- The ministry has recently reviewed and assessed a number of potential sites across the Lower Mainland, which included locations in Abbotsford.
- It was determined that the most immediate needs were around both Delta and Surrey.
- The ministry will continue to review the need for additional locations moving forward

15. Would land in the ALR be considered for this type of facility?

- The ministry is considering sites for truck parking facilities in areas that are zoned for this type of use.
- ALR sites are not a focus for the ministry.
- Where truck parking facilities could be located next to land within the ALR, environmental impacts will be studied and mitigation measures put in place to limit any impact.
- Where appropriate, environmental assessments and consultation with First Nations and communities will be part of the ministry review process.

16. Surrey is in the process of rezoning land to accommodate a major private truck parking facility. Will the Province support this or similar developments financially?

- Municipalities are recognizing and acting upon the need for such facilities in their communities.
- These types of facilities are needed around the province.
- In our transportation plan, we committed to explore partnership opportunities with the private sector to identify locations that would suit development of commercial truck stops and facilities.
- We are committed to taking an in-depth look at this.
- We are commissioning a report that will identify the industry's growth potential, to identify workable locations, and to see what the different partnership models could look like.
- This assignment is currently out to tender, and we expect work on this project to get underway later this summer.
- Consultations with the trucking industry and other key stakeholders will be an important part of this work as it progresses.

INTRODUCTION:

• Thank you for joining me today.

OVERVIEW- B.C. on the Move

- British Columbians rely on our transportation network every day to get to work or school, to access services, to get goods to market and to stay connected to each other and the world.
- Recognizing the importance of transportation to the economic well-being of our province, we developed a new 10-year transportation plan called B.C. on the Move, which I launched earlier this spring.
- B.C. on the Move is our roadmap for the next decade's worth of transportation investments, in every corner of British Columbia, and for every facet of transportation.
- It outlines critical investments and improvements throughout the province that will improve the daily lives of British Columbians.
- B.C. on the Move is supported by a \$2.5 billion investment from the Government of B.C. over the next 3 years alone.
- And I'm particularly proud of the fact that for <u>first time ever</u> our 10-year transportation plan includes a Provincial Trucking Strategy.

IMPORTANCE OF TRUCKING INDUSTRY:

- Trucking is critical to our economy over \$3 billion in goods are trucked between our gateway ports and the rest of Canada every year.
- B.C.'s trucking industry has 23,000 companies, 40,000 trucks & over 33,000 employees.
- A strong trucking industry relies on a strong transportation network.
- So, increasing the economic efficiency of the trucking industry, while enhancing safety, is a top priority for our government.
- In B.C. on the Move, our Provincial Trucking Strategy contains a number of important priorities, and I'd like to update you on our progress.
- In B.C. on the Move, we committed to working with industry to expand the number of corridors pre-approved for the transport of 85-125-tonne loads and to improve roads and bridges to accommodate those heavy loads.
- Pre-approved corridors for heavy loads enable the trucking community to get the permits they need faster and more easily.

ANNOUNCEMENT

- We also committed to construct two new truck parking areas for commercial trucks in the Lower Mainland.
- And, today, I'm announcing that the provincial property that we've gathered on today will be the site of the first of those truck parking areas in the Lower Mainland.
- I've heard the need for convenient truck parking areas for commercial rigs in the Lower Mainland.
- I've heard it from those in the industry.

- And I've heard it consistently from MLA Fassbender and our other Surrey MLAs as well as from MLA Hamilton our Delta MLA.
- By providing safe and convenient parking, trucks will have more options that will help reduce congestion around residential neighborhoods and in agricultural areas, which will reduce congestion and benefit communities and lands.
- When completed, this new truck parking facility at Nordel Way and Highway 91 will have room for up to 40 trucks to overnight.
- Facilities here will include lighting, washrooms, garbage cans and a sanidump.
- As you can see, we've got some work to do to get the site ready.
- We expect site preparation to begin this fall.
- Construction will start in spring 2016 and the site will be available for truck parking later next year.
- This will be the first of two such parking facilities in the Lower Mainland.
- We are currently evaluating options for a second site along the Highway 91 corridor as well as other available sites in Surrey.
- We will be talking with industry to identify other locations, along with public consultation, to ensure we are selecting the best possible sites for the industry.
- But we know that the need for safe trucking parking and rest areas isn't just a Lower Mainland issue.
- We've heard from Louise and the BC Trucking Association and others in the industry - that truck stops and rest areas are very important additions to our transportation network throughout the province.
- In B.C. on the Move, we committed to explore partnership opportunities with the private sector to identify locations that would suit development of commercial truck stops and facilities.
- We are committed to taking an in-depth look at opportunities to partner with the private sector.
- To this end, we are commissioning a report that will identify the industry's growth potential, the most promising locations for private sector development, and what the different partnership models could look like.

- This assignment is currently out to tender, and we expect work on this project to get underway later this summer.
- Consultations with the trucking industry and other key stakeholders will be an important part of this work as it progresses.

CONCLUSION:

Truck Parking for Independent Truckers

SUMMARY:

 Concerns have been raised over the lack of parking spaces that are available for independent truckers.

 Consultations with organizations in the lower mainland as well as outside the lower mainland have been completed.

BACKGROUND:

- Independent truckers have raised concern over the shortage of commercial vehicle parking and staging locations south of the Fraser River within the Lower Mainland.
- Currently, there are over 35 privately-operated lots in the lower mainland, mostly in Surrey and Langley, with over 2,000 available parking spots. The charge out rate is between \$200-\$250 per month.
- There is approximately 103 acres of parking (trucks & trailers) with an average of 19 parking spaces per acre.
- There are many unpermitted locations in the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR); however, the lands located within the ALR are not permitted to be used.
- Municipal governments currently do not own or operate parking sites.
- Independent truckers have indicated that they are seeking not only locations to park their trucks for overnight and rest, but also suitable locations for truck maintenance, repair and shift change.
- Concerns have also been raised in regards to insufficient staging areas (port/container), lack
 of amenities such as washrooms and security, and cost.
- Consultations have taken place with local governments in the lower mainland (Surrey, Delta, Richmond, Langley and Abbotsford), Port Metro Vancouver, Private Truck parking Facilities, BC Trucking Association, and Independent Trucking Operators.
- The general consensus from these groups is a lack of available and economic truck parking in the lower mainland. The ongoing need to enforce illegal truck parking was also noted from local government.

- BCTA requested further in depth consultations before moving into the next phase of the project.

- Other jurisdictions such as the City of St. John, City of Toronto, Port of Seattle, Port of Long Beach, Washington State Department of Transportation, and Ontario Ministry of Transportation have also been consulted.
- The majority of organizations contacted outside the lower mainland did not have issues with lack of truck parking. Toronto and Washington State both noted challenges related primarily to long-haul trucking which requires only occasional single-night parking.
- The Port of Seattle noted similar truck parking challenges to B.C. and have constructed a
 125-truck capacity (no trailers) parking facility free of charge. Although the facility was
 intended as a temporary pilot project, the steady use has established the lot as a permanent
 fixture.



RE: Nordel Sites 5,6 and 7 Summaries

Nordel Site 5:

Refer to Fig. 1: Site 5 – Additional Services attached.

• Sanitary Sewer: Discussions with the municipality indicate that Site #5 would require a municipal grade pump station located on its property which would service Site 5 (8100 Nordel Way), the Weigh Scale Site (8150 Nordel Way) and Site 6 and 7 (8099 Nordel Way). The municipal grade pump station would include the following: 2 only Flygt submersible pump model NP3153.181, 464 HT impeller/15hp/600v/3phase for flow 30l/s, 1.8m diameter FRP fiberglass tank and Duplex Control Panel in a 3-compartment kiosk at an estimated s.13,s.17 50mm water service connection in chamber should be provided near access to pump station for maintenance/cleaning. From the new pump station, a 150mm diameter sanitary forcemain is required to tie into an existing sanitary manhole on Nordel Court, east of Nordel Way.

Site #5 would be required to provide service stubs to the Weigh Scale Site and Sites #6 and #7, ending at its property line, and protect them under rights-of-way. MOTI is preparing to register interest on the statutory right-of-ways for the sanitary service stubs to the property line. There would also be a right-of-way to the north of Site #5 so that it could put in a sewer service stub in the future. These right-of-ways would be in place prior to the sale of the property.

The new pump station and sewer services would be located in municipal right-of-way and would be maintained within Site #5 by the municipality. Before and during construction of the pump station on Site #5 the existing pump station in Site #7 would be kept in operation for the interim until construction was complete.

 Water: This would include keeping the existing 250mm diameter water main to the site and adding 450mm diameter water mains at the border of the Weigh Scale Site, 8150 Nordel Way to create a looped system. The looped system would provide a stub for Site #7. The water service including the looped system required would cost approximately s.13,s.17



Nordel Site 6:

Refer to Fig. 2: Site 6 and 7

Sanitary Sewer: A private sewage system comprised of gravity pipes, forcemain and a lift station services all sites within the Nordel Interchange area (Sites 5, 6, 7, the Weigh Scale and the area to the north of Site 5). All sewage from the Weigh Scale Site and Site #5 is directed via 75mm/100mm forcemains to a sewage manhole near the southwest corner of Site #5. From there sewage is gravity fed through a 150 mm PVC pipe under Nordel Way and into a Sewage Lift Station located in Site #7. Sewage is then pumped via a 100mm forcemain across Site 6 and 7 up to a municipal sanitary sewer manhole on Nordel Court where it then connects into the North Delta Sewer Area Extension. S.13,s.17

Future Sanitary Sewer: Site #5 would be required to provide service stubs to the Weigh Scale Site and Sites 6 and 7, ending at its property line, and protect them under rights-of-way. MOTI is preparing survey for the necessary statutory right-of-ways for the sanitary service stubs to the property line of Site #5. The sanitary sewer ending at the property line of Site #5 for Sites 6 and 7 would need to be built under Nordel Way to provide sanitary service to Site #6 and Site #7. After the sewer main crosses Nordel Way from Site #5 to Site #7, the main would have to be extended to Site #6 for sanitary service at an estimated cost of \$1.13.5.17

- Water: There is an existing 150mm diameter water main servicing Site #6 which would remain.
- Storm Sewer: As a result of the Highway 91 Connector works the drainage ditch was relocated between
 the road works and the site. The drainage ditch discharges to a culvert under the Highway 91 Connector
 which is then conveyed along the north side of the Highway 91 Connector where it travels to the Silda
 Channel, then through 2 municipal 1200x1200 concrete flood boxes under River Road before it finally
 discharges in to the Fraser River.
- Roads: A new controlled intersection was constructed for the Nordel Connector Road. This controlled
 intersection was provided with a southern leg that provided access directly to the northern boundary of
 Site #6. If Site #6 and Site #7 are not consolidated road access will need to be provided through Site #6
 and to the western property line of Site #7.

The access road going through Site #6 would be a 2 lane 14m wide paved road complete with curb, gutter, sidewalk on one side, street trees on both sides and street lights on one side with an estimated s.13,s.17

Site #5 would be required to provide service stubs to the Weigh Scale Site and Sites 6 and 7, ending at its property line, and protect them under rights-of-way. MOTI is preparing survey for the necessary statutory right-of-ways for the sanitary service stubs to the property line of Site #5. The sanitary sewer ending at the property line of Site #5 for Sites 6 and 7 would need to be built under Nordel Way to provide sanitary service to Site #6 and Site #7, an estimated cost for this is s.13,s.17 s.13,s.17

Water Mains: A municipally owned 300mm water main is the supply source for Site #6 and Site #7.
 From the terminus of the 300mm water main the private system starts at a water meter within the highway dedication (currently located to the north of Site #6). From there a 150mm/50mm service main provides water to Site #6 and Site #7. A number of service connections and a fire hydrant are provided from this private system. Future water demand and fire safety requirements will determine the adequacy of the system.


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

Hi Renee.

The salt shed and shared utilities was a bit of a curve ball for us. This was not part of our original estimate. We identified this onsite, but had not received info from MOTI in any detail. I spoke to Mark Hallam and asked him to send me the engineering work completed on the salt sheds as this will be the highest risk factor. He has apparently S.13 over the past several years assessing the salt sheds and potential remediation requirements, so having our environmental folks review what's been done, will expedite whatever else we may need to do.

It was not known until my call with Mark that the utilities onsite connected 3 different parcels, so our water/utilities team has to take this under consideration as part of the prelim work. It sounds as though these shared utilities can remain onsite to continue servicing what is does today.

Road work and connectivity is being completed as part of the roadway design and traffic engineering portion of our work. As well a meeting has been set up with the gateway and GMT teams, that will assist in understanding this better and any potential changes to the existing roadway footprint.

I will send Mark a note requesting the info again to ensure we incorporate this into our study.

- 50% design submission will be provided this week for MoTI review.
- Site survey completed.
- Preliminary site plan completed. Design changed from all back-in backout sites to pull through. Total number of expected stalls in the order of 60 (still under some refinement). Estimated triple turnover on a daily basis (ie 180 trucks using the site per day).
- Washroom and sani-dump to be installed in adjacent locations to allow for potential future connectivity.
- Washroom options being prepared (pre-fab and outhouse).
- Utility, pavement structure, site lighting 50% designs in progress.

Summary of each site:

Nordel

The 50% drawings for the Nordel preliminary design package are attached. The following provides a summary of ongoing work:

- <u>Parking Count</u>: The current parking count is 41 stalls. The small truck shown near the washrooms is a maintenance/garbage truck.
- <u>Amenities</u>: The current plan proposes two unplumbed toilets, two bear-proof garbage cans, perimeter fencing, and a sani-dump station.

- <u>Site Lighting</u>: We have confirmed that perimeter lighting is not sufficient. Site lighting is progressing as per the attached plans.
- <u>Land Use Planning</u>: We are awaiting information to confirm setback requirements which may affect the overall count and layout.
- <u>Utilities:</u> The existing pump station is being assessed to confirm capacity to support the new sani-dump. We do not anticipate a need for a new pump station at this time. The proposed work will not impact the existing utilities servicing adjacent parcels.
- Geotechnical: Desktop assessment is complete.
- <u>Archaeological:</u> Desktop archaeological risk assessment is ongoing. We anticipate risk to be moderate based on proximity to nearby archaeological sites and Burns Bog.
- <u>Environmental:</u> Desktop environmental study is ongoing. Our team is looking at Ministry of Environment site registry information and assessing risk from current operations and current adjacent land uses.

- No this is intended to be convenient overnight parking for long-haul truckers traveling to and through the Lower Mainland those vehicles that wouldn't otherwise have permanent parking.
 - 2. How will this parking facility be policed so that it's not used or monopolized by port truckers?
- The site will be for use on a first-come basis, and is intended primarily for long-haul truckers.
- The ministry will monitor use of the parking area to determine if any concerns or problems arise.

As discussed, updated technical memos for these new sites. In addition, please see answers from Surrey as per below.

1. What is the timeline of the applications in the City of Surrey for private parking facilities? When would they be approved?

The first step is to apply for a Temporary Use Permit which may take a few months: request is submitted to council and may take 2 meetings to be approved. The applicants are then given 6 months to complete work based on comments from the City: ensure proper grading with adequate gravel material that won't produce too much dust, pave the access to reduce gravel being tracked onto the roadway, adequate drainage with the provision of oil/grit separator or settlement pond. Fencing, gates, and lighting are optional, but if they are provided, they must be appropriate for the zoning.

Once the required work is complete, they may apply for permanent use which is fairly quick – only one council meeting required if everything is in order.

2. How long has the City of Surrey been holding these applications?

Some of the applicants are older (10 years), most are more recent. The aim is to have them processed in a timely fashion (within 1 year or so). Enforcement has been focused on eliminating illegal operations on ALR lands, then they will put pressure on the older TUP sites.

3. What are the details of the application? Is there a fee, or is it charged like a business?

Fees for the TUP are around \$1,300, plus a public notice fee of \$1,000. In order to get permanent use accepted they need to submit a Site Plan, Landscaping Plan, and turning movements plan. Once approved the applicant can obtain a truck parking license for approximately \$650.

OTHER JURISDICTIONS

It appears that all trucks parking facilities in other jurisdictions are operated by private businesses as opposed to government entities.

CANADA

Many provinces in Canada have Flying J Fuel Stop gas station chains which accommodate truck parking for free (driver must stay with the truck). All Flying J Fuel Stop stores include amenities such as restaurant, ATM, laundry, shower, and WIFI.

There is one truck parking in Edmonton, AB that charges \$35/day and \$375/month. The facility includes basic amenities such as 24/7 access, fully fenced secure site, automated gates, and yard lighting.

There are some privately-owned truck parking lots in BC and Ontario that offer monthly rentals only between \$200-\$300/month.

USA

Many states in the USA have two big gas station chains, Flying J Fuel Stop and Love's Travel Stops, which accommodate truck parking for free (driver must stay with the truck). All of these gas stations have amenities such as restaurant, ATM, laundry, shower, and WIFI.

There are several states that offer daily truck parking and have amenities such as security cameras, electric gate, restrooms, driver's lounge, and WIFI:

California - \$7/day Texas - \$11/day Arizona - \$15/day

EUROPE

There is one truck parking in Holland that charges € 1.50 per hour day time (or Cad\$2.06), € 1.00 per hour evening time (or Cad\$1.37), and maximum charge for 24 consecutive hours is € 14.50 (or Cad\$19.87).
