Hi Bowinn,

In 2014, the BC Ministry of Highways and Transportation (MoTI) increased the speed limits on various highway segments across B.C. totaling approximately 1,300 km. Much of the justification was based on a consultation process soliciting opinions on speed limits by local communities. In early 2016, UBC completed a study on behalf of MoTI to review changes to collision rates and it was found collisions went up by 11% due to the increases in speed limits. Although the study concluded a significant increase with high statistical confidence, the speed limits for only a few locations were repealed and variable speed limits installed at a few other locations.

With the issue of motor vehicle collisions affecting public health and also a key driver in cost escalations to ICBC rate payers, the increase in highway speed limits 4 years ago is one that is disconcerting given that it was directly attributable to increases in highway accidents. Of course no expenditure of public funds should result in net negative impacts to society. With the seriousness of the matter, we recommend the current government respond to the findings and consider repealing all of the speed limit increases, not just at a few locations.

The post-implementation report released by the MoTI (link below) erroneously suggests the UBC study results were not significantly significant, which contradict the actual wording in the UBC report.

Key quotes from the UBC Civil Engineering report:

"Overall, the results showed that the sections of roadway where new speed limits were imposed, experienced an increase in the number of severe (fatal and injuries) crashes of 11.1%, following the implementation of speed limit increases. This increase was found statistically significant at the 95% confidence level."

"The results are consistent with similar studies conducted worldwide in showing an increase in fatal and injury crash frequency after raising the speed limit."

Question: If there were studies conducted worldwide with similar conclusions, why was the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure unaware of these studies? If they were aware of the studies, why did they go ahead with the speed limit increases contrary to world-wide experience? We do not design the safety of buildings using public opinion, and although

public opinion is important, we believe that when available, evidence-based scientific and best-practice approaches should lead decisions.

General common sense defies the logic of increasing speed limits without any supportive engineered measures such as roadway improvements. If only speed limit signs are changed, allowing for higher travel speeds, one can assume at the very least accident rates will remain the same, if not increase. How could one conclude increased speed limits would reduce accident rates? Even with accident rates being the same, the severity of the same number of accidents at higher speeds will result in more injuries and fatalities due to increased kinematic energy (i.e. vehicle-damage only accidents will increasingly cause human injury; survivable injury-related collisions will increasingly become fatalities). Therefore the question of who and why this policy change was initiated and justified is important to understand, as they, or ultimately the Minister of the day, should be held accountable for any net injuries and fatalities (while 11.1% increase of these types were statistically concluded from the collision data pre-2016, it is our professional opinion accident rates could be even higher now).

Although this matter is outside of your mandated purview, if you can consider this information and use it as best as you are able. We are not privy to the inner-decisions within the MoTI but we simply would like to know if any steps will be made to rectify this public safety issue to ensure our recommendations will at least be seriously considered.
